INTERESTING FACTS ABOUT OAKLAND COUNTY

On May 6, 1812, Congress passed an act to make a survey of this territory. The report of that survey was in part:

"That with few exceptions the land was low and wet with a very thick growth of underbrush intermixed with very bad marshes, but generally very heavily timbered with Beech, Cottonwood and Oak in addition to numbers of lakes. The streams are generally narrow, and very deep compared to their width, the shores and bottoms of which are (with few exceptions) swampy beyond description, and it is with the utmost difficulty that a place can be found over which horses can be conveyed in safety. Taking the county altogether, so far as has been explored, and to all appearances, together with the information received concerning the balance, is so bad there would not be more than one acre out of a hundred, if there would be one out of a thousand, that would in any case admit of cultivation."

This proved to be a serious drawback upon the county which was very naturally considered as of little value for agricultural purposes, if not worthless altogether. But during the years of 1817 and 1818, a few venturesome pioneers braved the dangers of the forest and morass, and demonstrated the report of the surveyors to be untrue. And since that time the county's development has been rapid.

The County was organized in 1819, and on June 28, 1820, the Governor divided the County into two townships, Oakland and Bloomfield, which had

a population of 300.

On April 12, 1827, the County was divided into five townships, Oakland, Troy, Bloomfield, Farmington and Pontiac, which had an aggregate valuation of \$338.00, \$849.00 in 1828. The aggregate township expense including its proportion of the County costs was \$823.32.

The first Supervisors elected by these townships were Roger Sprague of Oakland, Stephen V. R. Trowbridge of Troy, Lemuel Castle of Bloomfield, Amos Mead of Farmington, and Jacob N. Voorhies of Pontiac, who were paid one dollar per day while the board was in session.

In 1831, the Townships of Southfield and Sagana were added to the County.

In 1833, Novi, Royal Oak and Grand Blanc.

In 1834, Mia, Commerce, West Bloomfield and Lyon.

In 1835, Waterford, Milford, Highland and Avon.

In 1836, White Lake and Orion. Grand Blanc and Sagana were then discontinued.

In 1837, Addison, Brandon, Independence, Rose, Springfield, Oxford, and Groveland were added, and Mia was discontinued.

On March 5, 1838, the Township of Holly was added to the County making a total of twenty-five townships.

In the early days the County must have been overrun with wolves as we find in the Proceedings of the Board of Supervisors that one of their first official acts was to increase the bounty on wolves. This cost the county considerable in payment of bounties for their destruction, as in the October session of 1831, the Board paid the County bills totaling \$756.09, of which \$235.00 was for bounties on 47 wolves. At the following session in March, 1832, bounty was paid on 46 wolves amounting to \$230, while the total of all other County bills paid amounted to only \$318.40. From 1827 to October, 1834, the County paid bounty on 412 wolves a total of \$2,-049.50. The bounty being \$4.00 in 1827 was raised to \$5.00 for wolves and \$2.50 on whelps. By the 1840's this situation was pretty well taken care of, for we find that in 1843 there were bounties paid on only four wolves.

From 1820 to 1827, the County was governed by a Board of County Commissioners. These Commissioners were replaced by a Board of Supervisors in 1827, who governed the affairs of the County until Jan. 1, 1839, when again it was changed back to a Board of Commissioners who served until March 22, 1842. This Board consisted of Isaac J. Voorhies, George Brownell, and William Axford.

The pioneers of our County must have looked to the future of our

County as a Manufacturing center, as well as a great Agricultural county, for we find in July 7, 1849, the Oakland County Agricultural Society was organized. The purpose of the organization was for the encouragement and advancement of Agriculture, Manufacture and Mechanical Arts.

During the years from 1836 to 1850, business in the County was carried on to a large extent by the transfer of County orders. As, for example, when one of the County officials was paid, he was given a County order by the Clerk. This order he would have split up in smaller orders—sometimes as many as twenty-five and thirty. These being the right amount to pay his bills. These orders would find their way back to the County Clerk's office, many times to be split up in the proper amount to transact some business. This would lead one to think that money was very scarce during those years. County officials were paid semi-yearly and some, yearly, during these early years, and their salary was very small. In 1831 the District Attorney was put on an annual salary of \$75.00 per year. This was in line with salaries paid other County officials.
In 1851, the County was divided into five Representative Districts. At

this time the population of the County was 31,267.

LATE FACTS

Oakland County is, with the exception of Sanilac County, the largest in the southern peninsula, having an area of 900 square miles, with 400 lakes with an area of over 20,000 square acres, or one lake to each 2 square miles. These lakes are stocked annually with approximately four and a half to five million fish, consisting of Blue Gills, Yellow Perch, Black Bass, Brook Trout, and Great Northern Pike.

In Oakland County, at Drayton Plains, is located a Fish Hatchery that is the largest of its "kind" in the world for the production of Blue Gills and Bass. This property consists of 87 acres, 50 of which is under water, capable of producing 5,000,000 Blue Gills and 250,000 Bass yearly.

Of the 57 State Parks in Michigan, with an area of 37,000 acres, 11

are located in Oakland County with an area of 1006 square acres.

There is, also, one County Park located near Davisburg with an area

of over 600 acres.

These parks are all accessible by the network of good roads in Oakland County consisting of 288.10 miles of concrete, 105.25 miles of Black Top. and 244.40 miles of Gravel, all County roads, besides 189.30 miles of State and Federal roads divided as follows: Concrete, 158,84; Black Top, 20.26; and Gravel, 10.20 miles.

Oakland County has approximately 560 miles of established County Drains, consisting of 110 miles of closed drains and 450 miles of open

The annual sessions of the Board of Supervisors are held on the Tuesday following the second Monday of April, on the fourth Monday of June, and on the third Monday of September, and a regular session may be held in January of each year by the adjournment of the September Session to a date certain in January.

Special sessions of the Board may be called by a request of at least one-third of all the Supervisors which request must be filed with the County Clerk at

least fifteen days before the meeting.

6th. Unfinished Business

Rule I. The Chairman shall take the chair at the time the Board stands adjourned, and the Board shall be called to order and the Roll of members called.

Rule II. Upon the appearance of a quorum the Journal of the preceding day shall be read by the Clerk, and any mistake therein shall be corrected by the Board.

Rule III. The Board shall appoint a Chairman pro tempore, who shall perform the duties of the chair in the absence of the Chairman.

Rule IV. The Chairman shall preserve order, and shall decide questions of order, subject to an appeal to the Board.

Rule V. Every member, when he speaks, shall address the Chair standing in his place. No member shall speak more than twice in any one debate on the same day without leave of the Board.

Rule VI. When two or more members rise at once the Chairman shall name the member who is first to speak.

Rule VII. No motion shall be debated until the same is seconded; and it shall be reduced in writing if desired by the Chairman or any member, delivered at the desk and read by the Chairman or Clerk, before the same shall be debated, but it may be withdrawn any time before decision or amendment.

Rule VIII. When a question is under debate, no motions shall be received but to adjourn, for the previous question, to lay on the table, to postpone indefinitely, to postpone to a certain day, or to amend; which sev-

eral motions shall have precedence in the order in which they stand arranged.

Rule IX. A motion to adjourn shall always be in order. That and the motion to lay on the table shall be decided without debate.

Rule X. The previous question shall be in the form "Shall the main question now be put?" It shall only be admitted when demanded by a majority of the members present, and its effect shall be to put an end to all debate and bring the Board to vote upon pending amendments and then upon the main question.

Rule XI. When a member shall be called to order, he shall sit down immediately, until the Chairman shall have determined whether he is in order or not; and any questions of order shall be decided by the Chairman,

subject to an appeal.

Rule XII. A motion to convene as a committee of the whole shall be in order when there is no privileged motion before the house, and when carried by a majority of the members voting the house shall convene, but any action taken in committee-of-the-whole must be confirmed in the regular session of the Board.

Rule XIII. No member shall absent himself from the Board without leave first being obtained and no member shall draw compensation unless he shall have answered roll call at least once each day or has himself recorded present during said session.

Rule XIV. Ayes and Nays shall be ordered when demanded by any member of the Board provided said member shall demand same before the vote is ordered.

Rule XV. Each member shall be required to vote on every question unless excused by the Chairman.

Rule XVI. When a question has been once put and decided by ayes and nays, it shall be in order for any member (voting in the majority) to move a reconsideration thereof. On all other questions any member may move a reconsideration. But no motion for a reconsideration shall be in order unless made on the same day, or succeeding day, on which the vote was taken, nor shall any question be considered more than once without unanimous consent.

Rule XVII. After the ayes and nays are called upon any question, and after the question is stated from the Chair, and the Clerk directed to call the roll, no member shall be entitled to speak on the question.

Rule XVIII. Select committees to whom reference shall be made shall in all cases report a state of facts, and their opinion thereon, to the Board.

Rule XIX. When the Board adjourns the members shall keep their seats until the Chairman announces adjournment.

Rule XX. Section 1. The following standing committees shall be appointed by the Chairman during the first session of the Board and shall be composed as follows:

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Section 2. The Board of Supervisors may by resolution create Special Committees with a definite assignment and when so created such committees shall hold over until their assigned project is completed unless sooner discharged by a majority vote of the Board of Supervisors but the Chairman shall have the same power of appointment of such special Committee as he has in the case of standing committees.

Special Building Committee _____ 7 members
Special Courthouse Committee _____ 7 members

Section 3. The Chairman of the Board shall be empowered to fill all vacancies on Committees caused by resignation or otherwise.

Rule XXI. Section 1. All requests, communications, petitions or questions brought before the Board by any County Officer or County Board, or any other party or organization, shall be submitted in a written or printed form, and unless otherwise ordered by the Board, referred by the Chairman to the proper Committee for consideration.

Section 2. All requests, communications, petitions or questions brought to the attention of the Clerk and/or the Chairman of the Board, when the same is not in session, may be referred by the Chairman, without convening the Board, to the appropriate standing committee, and in the event no appropriate standing committee exists, then to the Miscellaneous Committee.

Section 3. It shall be the duty of such committees to prepare the necessary facts and details concerning the matters so referred, including the opinion of the Civil Counsel as to the legal principles involved therein, notify the Chairman when such information is ready and make a written report to the Board when the same convenes, with or without recommendations.

Rule XXII. No standing rule of the Board shall be rescinded, changed or added to, except by the consent of a majority of the members elect of the Board and with one day's notice of the motion thereof.

Rule XXIII. The rules of parliamentary practice as comprised in "Roberts' Rules" shall govern in all cases in which they are not inconsistent with the standing rules and orders of the Board or the Constitution or the laws of the State of Michigan.

PRIVILEGED QUESTIONS

Rule XXIV. Privileged questions are questions that may be considered when other questions are pending. They are:

1st. To adjourn.

2nd. To adjourn to a certain time.

3rd. The previous question.

4th. To lay on the table.

5th. To postpone indefinitely.

6th. To postpone to a certain length of time.

7th. To commit or to amend.

The first, when made and seconded, is always in order. The first, third and fourth must be decided without debate.

PREVIOUS QUESTIONS

Rule XXV. The previous question, when moved and seconded, is a motion to determine all amendments to the question pending and the pending question itself, without further amendments or debate, or before any other motion is in order, except to adjourn. It shall be stated in the form, "Shall the main question be now put?"

RECONSIDERATIONS

Rule XXVI. A motion for reconsideration may be made by any member of the prevailing side with n one day after the question was determined, but if such motion be laid on the table it shall there remain.

MOTIONS

Rule XXVII. When a member desires to make a motion he shall arise and address the Chair, and when recognized by the Chair he has the floor to make his motion, and if the motion is seconded, it shall be stated by the Chair after which it may be debated.

Rule XXVIII. A motion to adjourn to the call of the chair may be made whenever an adjournment, as contrasted with a dissolution of the assembly is desired, and such motion shall have the effect and be construed to mean an adjournment to a day certain, the day certain being fixed by the chairman of the Board of Supervisors, provided, however, notice of the re-convening of the board by the chairman shall be given to each member thereof by the posting of such notice in the United States mails, sufficiently stamped, properly sealed and plainly addressed to each member at his last known address, 10 days preceding the reconvening of the session; provided further, that such notice will be considered waived by attendance and answer to the roll call, at the re-convened meeting and, provided further, that no such adjournment shall be considered as a dissolution of the assembly and always a continuance of the session in which it is made.

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
