

OAKLAND COUNTY FACTS AND FIGURES By Joe Haas

My only peeve with the people of Oakland County is that more of them do not get out and explore its many attractions and advantages.

It has most everything in a scenic and outdoor recreational way that can be found anywhere else—in addition to its industry, agriculture, dairying and fruit raising. Yet, its residents will travel to other states and even to far off nations to see less than what their home county offers them.

Nowhere else can be found such diversified facilities within easy reach of so many people as are available in Oakland County.

Its four hundred fresh water spring-fed lakes, together with its rivers and creeks, coupled with its numerous wood-covered hills and scenic vistas, truly make it the playground of southeastern Michigan.

Its six state parks, also the Pontiac Lake, Kent Lake and many other outdoor recreational grounds have an appeal to outsiders that seems to be overlooked by a great portion of its own people. Bathing beaches at Cass Lake, Pontiac Lake and Kent Lake are among the largest inland beaches in Michigan. Their waters are much better adapted for the purpose than those on the Great Lakes, being several degrees warmer throughout the season.

In its score or more public parks and playgrounds are tables and other facilities so that more than 25,000 people can enjoy picnic meals at one time.

In the county are forty golf courses, some of which are among the sportiest in the country and many of which are open to the general public.

The wide expanses of the county's larger lakes are quite ideal for sailing and other water transportation. Ice skating is a favorite winter pastime.

The numerous hills offer exceptional skiing facilities, on some of which power tow lifts are operated, rounding out an all year program of outdoor amusement.

Since that time two centuries ago when that greatest of Indian chiefs, Pontiac, selected the present area of Oakland County for his home, although he ruled a domain extending from Lake Superior to the Gulf of Mexico, it has been an ideal residence site. The Indians populated it to a greater extent than other areas and since its first settlement by the whites in 1817, its home life has been its greatest asset.

Nature was kind to Oakland County to an extent seldom equaled. Then, with the development resting on that firm foundation, its residents have an atmosphere and environment in their surroundings that cannot be matched

anywhere else.

With 2,750 miles of highways, outside of its fourteen cities and ten villages, of which 600 miles are paved, it has the roads to easily reach all of its numerous scenic spots and recreational grounds.

The roadside tables placed in beautiful spots along Oakland County's paved roads draw a big patronage of people from Wayne and other outside counties, the license plates on the cars showing the home county people to be in the minority.

No other inland area in the United States can boast of historical lore that surpasses Oakland County. It was here that Chief Pontiac lived when he plotted his conspiracy that would have changed the entire course of empire had it succeeded. And it barely escaped a successful culmination.

It was here that the manufacture of means of transportation was started over one hundred years ago when a Pontiac blacksmith made his first wagon, and which has continued through the changing times until the

County now is among the world leaders in that respect.

In addition to its many natural attractions, among the points of interest in Oakland County are Pontiac and its world-famous auto, truck and other plants, Cranbrook Foundation, Bloomfield Hills residential section, McMath-Hulbet Astronomical Observatory, State Fish Hatchery, Shrine of the Little Flower, Detroit Zoological Park, White Chapel Memorial Park, Parke-Davis Biological farm, numerous nationally famous stock farms, together with state, county and local sanatoriums and hospitals besides numerous amusement

Yet, there are many people within the borders of Oakland County's twenty-five townships who know less about it than outsiders who are attracted here and avail themselves of the possibilities offered them.

Let's make 1950 the year to see more of our own county.

ORDER OF BUSINESS

1st. Reading of Minutes

2nd. Special Order of Business

RULE. 1. Robert's Rules of Order shall govern the sessions of this Board unless the following specified By-Laws conflict therewith, in which event the following By-Laws shall supersede as long as they are not in conflict with the Constitution and laws of the State of Michigan.

RULE II. The Chairman shall take the chair at the convening of each session, call the Board to order and direct a roll call.

RULE III. If a quorum is present, the minutes of the preceding meeting shall be read by the Clerk and corrections or omissions called for by the Chairman and if there are none, the Chairman shall declare the minutes approved as read, or corrected, whatever the case may be. Provided, however, that if the minutes have been printed and mailed to the members more than 72 hours previous to the meeting the Chairman shall ask if there are any corrections or omissions to the minutes as printed and if there are none, he shall declare the minutes approved as printed or as printed and corrected, whatever the case may be. Provided further, that unless something contrary appears in the minutes of a meeting the minutes of the previous meeting shall be presumed to have been duly approved.

RULE IV. The chairman shall preserve order and decide questions of order subject to an appeal to the Board.

RULE V. Every member desiring to speak, shall rise, address the Chairman and when recognized, speak from his place or on request of the Chairman, proceed to the nearest microphone and speak from there. Provided, however, no member shall speak more than twice on any one subject in one day unless with unanimous approval of the Board.

RULE VI. No motion shall be debated until the same is seconded, and it shall be reduced to writing if desired by the Chairman or any member, delivered to the desk and read by the Chairman or clerk before the same is debated. However, the Chairman may proceed with other business, pending the presenting of the motion or resolution in written form, and the matter shall be considered a special order of business when presented, to immediately follow the matter then on the floor.

RULE VIII. Any member desiring to bring a matter before the assembly may rise and, when recognized by the Chair, present by way of Motion or Resolution the matter desired to be brought before the Assembly. The Chairman shall ask if the motion or resolution is seconded and if seconded, the person offering the Motion or Resolution shall be presumed to have the floor to discuss the same. However, if he sits down, the floor shall be open to any member recognized by the Chair.

RULE VIII. No member shall absent himself from the Board without leave first being obtained, and no member shall draw compensation unless he shall have answered roll call at least once each day or has himself recorded present during said meeting.

RULE IX. Ayes and Nays by Roll Call shall be ordered when demanded by any member of the Board, provided said member shall demand same before the vote is ordered.

 ${f RULE}$ X. Each member shall be required to vote on every question unless excused by the Chairman.

RULE XI. When a question has been once put and decided by Roll Call of ayes and nays, it shall be in order for any member (voting in the majority) to move a reconsideration thereof. On all vive voce votes, any member may move a reconsideration. But no motion for a reconsideration shall be in order unless made the same day, or succeeding day, on which the vote was taken.

RULE XII. Section 1. The following standing committees shall be appointed by the Chairman during the first session of the Board and shall be composed as follows:

Section 2. The Board of Supervisors may by resolution create Special Committees with a definite assignment, and, when so created, such Committees shall hold over until their assigned project is completed unless sooner discharged by a majority vote of the Board of Supervisors but the Chairman shall have the same power of appointment of such Special Committees as he has in the case of standing committees.

Section 3. The Chairman of the Board shall be empowered to fill all vacancies on Committees caused by resignation or otherwise and all Committees, standing or special, shall carry over the Session in which they were appointed until their successors are duly appointed and qualified and if a quorum remains, said quorum shall be authorized to perform the functions of the Committee until its personnel is filled by appointment.

RULE XIII. Section 1. All requests, communications, petitions or questions brought before the Board by any County Officer or County Board, or any other party or organization shall be submitted in a written or printed form, and unless otherwise ordered by the Board, referred by the Chairman to the proper Committee for consideration. However, the Chairman may, between meetings, refer any matter called to his attention to the proper committee for report at the next meeting.

Section 2. A copy of all requests, communications, petitions or questions brought to the attention of the Board of Supervisors by either the Clerk or the Chairman or any member thereof and referred by the Board to a Committee or Committees, shall, within 48 hours thereafter, be forwarded to the Chairman of such Committee by the Clerk with a copy of the referring resolution attached, and said Clerk shall within the same time, also forward a copy of the same to the Board of Auditors.

RULE XIV. A motion to adjourn, to the call of the Chair, (fix time of next meeting), may be made whenever an adjournment as contrasted with a dissolution of the assembly is desired, and such motion shall have the effect and be construed to mean an adjournment to a day certain, the day certain being fixed by the Chairman of the Board of Supervisors, provided, however, notice of the reconvening of the Board by the Chairman shall be given to each member thereof by the posting of such notice in the United States mails sufficiently stamped, properly sealed and plainly addressed to each member at his last known address ten (10) days preceding the reconvening of the session; provided further, that such notice will be considered waived by attendance and answer to the roll call at the reconvening meeting and, provided further, that no such adjournment shall be considered as a dissolution of the assembly and always a continuance of the session in which it is made.

RULE XV. All committee reports involved in making up the budget shall be filed in the office of the Board of Auditors on or before the 5th day of October of each year, copies thereof forwarded to each member of the Board of Supervisors on or before the 15th day of October and no changes or amendments shall be made therein without concurrence by a majority of the members of the Committee made by the Board of Supervisors in adopting the budget.

RULE XVI. All Annual Reports such as those of Welfare Board, Auditor General, Drain Commissioner Road Commission, Tuberculosis Sanatorium or any others, shall be filed in the office of the Board of Auditors in triplicate and one copy thereof forwarded to each member of the Board of Supervisors on or before the 5th day of October of each year.

RULE XVII. No requests, resolution or motion that will directly at the time of being made, or later under its provisions, cause the expenditure of money, can receive final action or passage until it has been referred to the appropriate committee or committees, and reported for consideration on the recommendation of the committee at a subsequent meeting of the Board.

MEETINGS OF THE BOARD

RULE XVIII. (a) At the statutory meeting of this Board held on the Tuesday following the second Monday in April of each year, the Board of Auditors shall submit to the Board of Supervisors a "Tentative Budget for allocation purposes", and the Board of Supervisors shall refer the same to a joint meeting of the Salaries, Appropriations and Ways and Means Committees, which Committees shall meet preceding the meeting of the Board of Supervisors held on the third Monday in April, viz: the deadline for filing the final allocation budget with the County Tax Allocation Board.

(b) There shall be a regular meeting of this Board at ten o'clock A. M. on the Friday preceding the third Monday in April at which time the joint committees referred to above shall consider their report to this Board with their recommendations on the adoption of the final allocation budget to be acted on the following Monday. The Chairman of the Ways and Means Committee shall act as Chairman of the joint Committees; however, if a majority of the personnel of any of the three committees does not concur with the joint committee report, the Chairman of that Committee shall present to the Board of Supervisors a minority "joint committee report" pointing out the reasons for nonconcurrence and the Board of Supervisors shall thereafter dispose of the matter according to its judgment.

RULE XIX If in the judgment of the Chairman, there is a confusion of Parliamentary procedure existing, he shall have the right to request a "Motion to clear the floor", which Motion, if made and seconded, shall be undebatable, shall take precedence over all motions, shall be forthwith put by the Chair and if carried, shall clear the floor completely.

RULE XX. When any main question is on the floor the motions outlined hereafter shall be applicable thereto in the order they appear in the analysis and subject to other motions as indicated therein.
