
MAP OF OAKLAND COUNTY CITIES, VILLAGES AND TOWNSHIPS

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

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

BEGINNINGS

The year 1970 marks the sesquicentennial of the official beginning of the County of Oakland. It was 150 years ago that Governor Lewis Cass issued a proclamation which created a new county to be called Oakland out of the Northwest Territory.

Up until just a few years prior, this area north of Detroit and accessible only by the Indian's Saginaw Trail, was thought to be an inpenetrable swamp not suited for development. This image was shattered in 1817 and 1818 when Government land surveyors and some prominent Detroit citizens began venturing into the Oakland County area. Instead of swamps and marsh, they found desirable land which abounded with natural resources. These resources included over 400 lakes, hills and forest which were recognized as attracters of residents and tourists then as they are today.

In 1820 Governor Cass set the County Seat in Pontiac — a central location no more than a days journey from any point in the County. Oakland's first term of court was held this same year in an old log building; reportedly, Oakland's first court house was without door, floor, or chimmey.

Improvement to this was made four years later in 1824 with the construction of a new Court House and Jail combined. This facility had two stories and was constructed out of squared logs.

Following a thirty-two year period, characterized by indictments of the structure as being unfit for use and constituting a public nuisance on one hand, and lack of sufficient funds to construct a new court house, a court house to replace the wooden facility was approved for construction in 1856. This facility was constructed of brick and cost \$12,284 plus some County land valued at \$2,500.

The brick structure lasted until 1904 when after another lengthly period of debate and much publicity, the voters approved a new Court House. The 1856 Court House was abandoned, torn down, and replaced by the first twentieth century version in 1904 at a cost of \$100,000.

PRESENT COURT HOUSE

Oakland's fifth Court House, the facility which houses today's government, was constructed in 1960. Unlike previous Court Houses, however, the 1960 version was designed and programmed to maintain pace with the growing County by allowing planned additions. Thus, while the Court Tower was constructed in 1960, subsequent additions have been made in the form of an auditorium for meetings by the County Board of Commissioners and community groups, and two administrative wings. The second wing has been completed and brings the total County Court House Complex to a floor area in excess of a quarter of a million square feet.

Housed in the Court House Complex are about 500 of the County's 1600 employees (exclusive of the Road Commission) comprising the central judiciary, legislative, and administrative functions.

For the convenience of Oakland's citizens and visitors, the complex includes ample free parking and a modern, spacious cafeteria.

BROAD SERVICES

One can see that the County's Court House Complex has come a long way from the old 1820 log building. But so has the County. The 1820 Court House served 320 persons. Today's Court House serves a population which is in excess of 900,000 people and is expected to approach 1,000,000 in the 1970 census. This large scale

population expects its County to provide service in an effective and efficient manner. To this end, data processing, microfilming, modern accounting procedures, capital budgeting, a personnel merit system, and other administrative machinery has been put into operation.

Oakland's people also look increasingly to the County to carry out functions as an instrument of self government in response to needs expressed by its citizenry and representatives. In this sense, planning and the developement of streets, highways, airports, sewer and drainage facilities, parks and recreation programs, mental health and traditional health programs, social welfare programs, and programs for neglected, dependant and delinquent children are carried out. By their nature, some of the County's facilities and programs, such as airports and parks, have different locational requirements than other functions. Many parts of the County's large organization, however, have need to be in proximity of each other in the interest of efficiency and convenient service to its citizenry. This points to geographic centralization in a service center complex.

SERVICE CENTER COMPLEX

Such a center has been developed in Oakland and the Court House serves as its focal point. The Service Center Complex is located on a 450 acre site and serves as the hub of County Government. The County has been working towards the development of this complex by systematically constructing facilities as needed and funds permit. The complex is laid out in a spacious setting according to a master plan — thus giving direction to an ultimate development which will be functional as well as aesthethically pleasing. Sixteen buildings and most of the County's departments and institutions presently are housed here.

One of the principles designed into the Service Center is the "Community" concept of campus development whereby similar or related functions are grouped together. The next addition will epitomize this concept with the construction of a service building which will house the Drain Commission, Department of Public Works, and the Facilities and Operations Division.

Under construction at the Service Center is the new Law Enforcement-Jail Complex. The present jail, located in downtown Pontiac, was constructed in 1922 and has been rendered inadequate in terms of both layout and capacity. In designing its replacement, the County has looked to the future in anticipating what appears to be an expanded role for the Sheriff's Department in law enforcement. Nationwide research as to how a jail and its related facilities might be designed to be functional and operationally efficient has resulted in a plan, which, when constructed, might serve as a model for other local agencies who deal in law enforcement. The Sheriff's Department, County Morgue, and an Operating Center for Civil Defense Operations will be under the same roof. A closed circuit television system for surveillance and security, a crime laboratory to provide technical assistance on a local basis for crime solving, and a communication control center for law enforcement for the entire County are among the plans.

Oakland's leaders believe that local government ought to be as close and convenient to its citizenry as possible. In Oakland, this implies need for geographic decentralization of certain functions. The County's long range planning calls for this to take the form of development of a series of satellite Service Centers. Located in these centers will be departmental branch offices. Like the parent Service Center, they will be arranged in a campus type development.

Oakland's officials are proud of the County Court House Complex and its related facilities. Visitors from other counties, states and nations have found and will continue to find themselves most welcome.

RULES FOR ORGANIZATION AND PROCEDURE OF OAKLAND COUNTY BOARD OF COMMISSIONERS

I. ORGANIZATION

OATH OF OFFICE (Rule 1)

(a) A person elected to the office of County Commissioner, before entering upon the duties of his office, shall take and subscribe to the oath as provided in Section 1 of Article II of the State Constitution and shall deposit said oath with the County Clerk.

ELECTION OF BOARD OFFICERS (Rule 2)

(a) At the commencement of the first session of each year there shall be elected by a majority vote of the Board elected or serving, to continue in office until their successors are elected and qualified, a Chairman of the Board, and a Vice Chairman, each of whom shall take and subscribe the constitutional oath of office.

APPOINTMENT OF COMMITTEES (Rule 3)

- (a) All standing and select committees shall be appointed by a committee on committees composed of the Chairman of the Board and four representatives from the majority party and four representatives of the minority party as determined by a majority vote of the Board elected or serving. The appointments made by the Committee on Committees shall be subject to the approval of the Board of Commissioners, given by a majority vote of the Board elected or serving, the duration of such appointments shall be one year.
- Special and Interim Committee. The Board Chairman may appoint, which will stand if no objection by the Board, in such case a majority shall be required to establish the committee.
- (b) Any changes in committee structure or personnel or filling of vacancies or dismissal of, other than standing committees, shall require 3/5ths vote of the board elected or serving.
- (c) All standing committees shall require a 2/3rds vote of the board elected or serving to be dismissed, or altered.

STANDING COMMITTEES (Rule 4)

- (a) The standing committees shall be as follows: (Committee responsibilities and definitions Schedule A).
 - 1. Planning, Zoning and Building

 - Equalization
 Human Resources
 - 4. Public Protection
 - 5. Legislative
 - 6. Personnel Practices

- 7. Public Works
- 8. Finance
- 9. Aviation and Transportation
- 10. Local Affairs
- 11. Regional Affairs
- 12. Committee on Committees (see Rule 3)
- (b) As to the committees on Human Resources, Personnel Practices and Retirement, Planning, Zoning and Building, and Public Works, a Chairman of these committees shall not be appointed to the Finance Committee.
- The first named board member of any committee shall be the Chairman and the second named member shall be the Vice Chairman. In the temporary absence of the Chairman and Vice Chairman, the member next in rank in the order named, and so on, as often as the case shall happen, shall act as Chairman. In case of a permanent vacancy in the Chairmanship of any such committee, the Committee on Committees shall appoint another Chairman, which appointment shall be subject to the approval of the Board of Commissioners. In the apparent prolonged absence of a member of a standing committee, the Committee on Committees may recommend appointment as defined in Rule 3 above, until the absent Commissioner returns. It shall be the duty of any committee to meet upon the written request of a majority of the members of the committee.
- A majority of each committee shall be a quorum.
- (e) Committee meetings shall be subject to the call of the Chairman of the committee, notwithstanding adjournment to a specific time. Such call shall be cleared through the Chairman of the Board to avoid conflicts only.
- (f) Regular meetings of the Board shall be held the first and third Thursday of each month at 9:30 A.M. except as otherwise provided by law. A special meeting between meetings adjourned to a fixed date shall be held on written petition of 1/3rd of the members of the Board, which petition shall be filed with the County Clerk at least 10 days before the meeting.

II. PROCEDURE

PRESIDING OFFICER (Rule 5)

- (a) 75th anniversary edition of Robert's Rules of Order shall govern the sessions of the Board unless these rules conflict therewith, in which event, these rules shall supersede as long as they are not in conflict with the constitution and laws of the State of Michigan.
- (b) The Chairman of the Board shall preside over all sessions of the Board of Commissioners and he shall be an ex officio member of all committees. In the absence of the Chairman, the Vice Chairman shall preside, and be vested with all of the powers of the Chairman. The Vice Chairman shall also be an ex officio member of all committees, but shall attend only in the absence of the Chairman of the Board at such meetings.
- (c) Although the Chairman and Vice Chairman of the Board serve ex officio as members of all committees of the board, they shall have the right to vote only on the committee on which they are permanent members.

TEMPORARY PRESIDING OFFICER (Rule 6)

(a) In the absence of both the Chairman and Vice Chairman of the Board, a majority of the Commissioners of the Board present shall appoint a member to act as presiding officer until the Chairman or Vice Chairman shall appear.

DECISIONS SUBJECT TO APPEAL (Rule 7)

(a) The Chairman shall decide all questions arising under Board rules and general parliamentary practice, subject to an appeal, which appeal shall be determined by 3/5ths of the Commissioners present.

RECOGNITION (Rule 8)

(a) Every member desiring to speak shall rise, address the Chair and, when recognized, speak from his place or, on request of the Chairman, proceed to the nearest microphone and speak from there.

TIME FOR DEBATE (Rule 9)

(a) On all motions brought before the body one hour debate (excluding recesses) will be allowed.

DIVISION OF TIME (Rule 10)

(a) The debate time must be divided equally so each member of the Board may be allowed to speak on each motion. Provided that a member may waive his time by not speaking or may yield his time to another member of the Board.

CALLING THE QUESTION (Rule 11)

(a) After one hour the question may be called by a majority vote (except as otherwise provided in the rules). The one hour limitation shall include all discussion on amendments and statements of clarification.

CHAIRMAN TO PRESERVE ORDER (Rule 12)

- (a) The Chairman shall preserve order and decide questions of order subject to an appeal of the Board.
- (b) No unauthorized person shall be on the floor without permission of the Chairman and/or a majority of the Board.
- (c) No literature, other than official documents coming from County Departments, shall be permitted to come before the assembly or be placed on members desks unless signed or endorsed by or attributable to a current member of the Board of Commissioners
- (d) Members of the administrative staff of the County shall be allowed to address the Board upon pending matters if so requested by a Board member.
- Upon invitation or request by a Board member, non-members of this Board may address the Board of Commissioners on matters before it unless an objection is raised by a simple majority of the members of this Board.

ORDER OF BUSINESS (Rule 13)

- (a) The order of business of the Board of Commissioners shall be as follows:
- 1. Call to order by the Chairman of the Board
- 2. Invocation
- 3. Roll call 4. Approval or correction of minutes
- Communications
- 5. Communications6. Reports of standing committees
- 7. Reports of special committees
- 8. Special order of business
- 9. Unfinished business
- New and miscellaneous business
 Adjournment to a fixed time

DUTIES OF COMMITTEES (Rule 14)

- (a) The committees shall report upon all matters referred to them, without unnecessary delay; and shall return all petitions and other papers referred to them to the Clerk of the Board. At least a majority of the members of a committee is required to report any matter referred to a committee, to the Board of Commissioners.
- (b) Each committee shall keep an action journal recording all action on resolutions in the committee with the names and votes of members. A member of the committee wishing to explain his vote may file a written explanation with the Clerk of the committee within two board meeting days after the vote is taken, which explanation shall be attached to the action journal. The journal shall be retained for at least 90 days after dissolution of such committee of the Board and shall be available for inspection at all reasonable business hours, by any member of the Board (Journal keeping requirements Exhibit B incorporated by reterences).
- (c) To bring a question to the floor without report from that committee requires a 3/5ths vote of the Board elected or serving.

RESOLUTION (Rule 15)

- (a) Any member desiring to bring a matter before the Board may rise and, when recognized by the Chairman, present by way of motion or resolution, the matter desired to be brought before the Board. The Chairman shall ask if the motion or resolution is seconded and, if seconded, the person offering the motion or resolution shall be presumed to have the floor to discuss the same. However, it he sits down, the floor shall be open to any member recognized by the Chair.
- 1. The Chairman of the Board shall refer all matters, subject to committee consideration to the appropriate committee, unless an objection is raised, then the matter shall be assigned by majority resolution.
- (b) All resolutions reported back to the Board shall be subject to amendments by any Board member, which amendments shall be first considered by the Board. Every resolution appropriating money, when reported back to the Board tavorably by another committee shall, together with the amendments that may be made by the Board, be referred to the committee on finances for consideration.
- 1. When reported back to the Board by said Finance Committee (which Finance Committee report shall also include the amendments, if any, that were recommended by the committee which first considered the resolution), for the information of the Board a fiscal note shall be attached by the Finance Committee to each bill expending county funds, said resolution to be laid on the Clerk's desk and read in full.

PRINTING (Rule 16)

(a) All bills shall be printed or reproduced upon introduction, unless otherwise ordered by the Board. All resolutions not previously printed or reproduced shall be printed or reproduced on being referred to the committee of the whole.

REFERENCE TO COMPILER'S NUMBER (Rule 17)

(a) In all bills to amend any part of the last compilation of the county resolutions, the section or sections amended shall be referred to in the title of the bill, by the compiler's numbers, and the object of the resolutions shall be expressed in its title. The title of any bill amending any resolution not compiled shall refer to the section or sections amended and state the number of the resolution.

AMENDMENT OF RULES (Rule 18)

(a) These Rules may be amended at any regular meeting or adjourned meeting after the opening of a regular session, by a two-thirds vote of the members-elect, providing, either an oral notice has been given at a preceding meeting occurring within sixty days or a written notice has been forwarded to each member not less than five days preceding the offering of the amendment.

EXHIBIT A COMMITTEE RESPONSIBILITIES

1. FINANCE

Ways and Means

To plan ways and means of financing the County activities, to recommend to the Board of Commissioners plans for the County activities each year, to the end that there may be sufficient monies raised and available to pay the current fixed operating expenses and all approved extraordinary and/or unanticipated expenses, to receive by reference

from the Chairman, all reports from other committees if those reports involve an appropriation of monies; however, the Chairman of any committee which intends to make a report involving an appropriation at a meeting of the Board of Commissioners occurring later, may submit a copy of the proposed report to the Chairman of the Finance Committee not less than five days preceding the meeting of the Board of Commissioners and the Finance Committee shall be prepared to report on the availability of the sum of the appropriation involved.

2. PUBLIC WORKS

Drain

To provide liaison between the Drain Commissioner and the County Board of Commissioners, to confer from time to time with the County Drain Commissioner and advise with him relative to the functioning of the department, the adequacy of staff and personnel and presentation to the Board of Commissioners of matters requiring the approval of the Board of Commissioners and to coordinate functions between the Drain Commission and the office of the County Treasurer.

Roads

To provide liaison between the Road Commission and the Board of Commissioners, to confer and advise with the County Road Commission on all matters wherein the discretion or approval of the Board of Commissioners is involved and, if necessary, present the matters formally to the Board of Commissioners by appropriate resolution.

Public Works

To provide liaison between the Department of Public Works and the Board of Commissioners and presentation to the Board of Commissioners of matters requiring, the approval of the Board of Commissioners.

3. HUMAN RESOURCES

Health

To provide liaison between the Health Officer and the County Board of Commissioners to confer with, on request, the Board of Health, to provide liaison between the Board of Health and the Board of Commissioners.

Juvenile

To provide liaison between the Juvenile Court and the County Board of Commissioners, to advise and confer with the Juvenile Division of the Probate Court, to inspect and make recommendations to the Board of Commissioners relative to the facilities for housing juveniles, combatting juvenile delinquency and adopting the general approved methods of handling juveniles.

Social Services

To provide liaison between the Oakland County Social Services Board and the County Board of Institutions and the Board of Commissioners. To annually inspect the facilities under the administration of these agencies for the purpose of recommending such alterations or changes as are deemed by the Committee to be advisable. To inform the Board of Commissioners on all matters affecting the public welfare of the County and its citizens, to recommend social service program implementation and social service policy changes to meet the needs of the community.

Veterans Affairs

To provide liaison between the Oakland County Veterans' Affairs Commission and the Board of Commisioners: to consult with the Chairman of the Commission and recommend to the Board such changes or additions to the staff or facilities as to them shall seem advisable; to receive and report to the Board on all matters referred to it; to familiarize itself with the obligations of the County to the Veterans and recommend to the Board such steps as will insure the Veterans their rights under laws extending rights to Veterans.

OTHER

Liaison with Dog Warden, Community Mental Health Services Board and Human Relations.

4. PERSONNEL PRACTICES

Personnel Policies

To become informed on salaries and wages paid in industry to skilled and unskilled labor, professional and non-professional services and yearly review the salaries and

wages paid for comparable service by the County and as far as possible, adjust the same accordingly and recommend approval of the same by the Board of Commissioners when the annual budget is adopted, to advise with the Board of Auditors upon request as to classification or reclassification of employees, to yearly advise the Finance Committee as to the gross amount of money recommended to be raised for salaries, to study the basic living standards and, as far as practicable, anticipate economic trends to the end that salaries and wages may be flexible enough to meet existing conditions, to report to the Board of Commissioners on the adequacy or excess of personnel in the several departments, to prepare and enforce specific rules and regulations and to carry out the provisions and intent of policies established pursuant to Miscellaneous Resolution #4551 adopted by the Board of Supervisors on April 12, 1966, and to recommend to the Board of Commissioners the provisions of all employe fringe benefit programs.

Retirement

To meet with the Oakland County Retirement Commission and provide liaison between that Commission and the Board of Commissioners concerning all matters contemplated in Section 12-a of Act 156 of the Public Acts of 1851 as amended prescribing the duties and defining the powers of Boards of Commissioners.

5. PUBLIC PROTECTION AND JUDICIARY

Disaster Control and Civil Defense

To recommend the appointment of a County Director of Civil Defense to the Board of Commissioners, to provide liaison between the Director of Civil Defense and the County Board of Commissioners, to confer with and advise the Director of Civil Defense relative to the functioning of the Department on request, the adequacy of staff and personnel, and to present to the Board of Commissioners all matters requiring the approval or action of the Board.

Judiciary

To provide liaison between the Circuit and Probate Courts and Courts of Limited Jurisdiction and the Board of Commissioners; to confer with Circuit and Probate Courts on matters pertaining to Courts; and to make recommendations and presentations to the Board of Commissioners on matters requiring the attention of such Board.

Law Enforcement

To provide liaison between the Sheriff, Prosecuting Attorney, Local Law Enforcement Agencies in the County and the Board of Commissioners and to investigate and report to the Board of Commissioners on matters involving the advancement and improvement of Law Enforcement in the County and all Law Enforcement Agencies therein.

6. LOCAL AFFAIRS

Boundaries of Cities and Villages

To examine all petitions filed with the County Clerk which involve the jurisdiction of the Board of Commissioners relative to a change of boundaries of townships, cities or villages and report to the Board of Commissioners on the sufficiency or insufficiency thereof with recommendations as to action thereon and dates for elections, if involved; to determine the priority of presentation of petitions to the Board of Commissioners, when conflicting petitions are filed, with recommendations on the date of submission to the electors of the question involved and, if there is no conflict, the filing date shall control.

Cooperative Extension Service-Markets

To provide liaison between the Cooperative Extension Service of Michigan State University and the Board of Commissioners. To guide and encourage the educational programs of the Extension Service to gain major benefits for the people of Oakland County. To have general supervision and control of the Oakland County 4-H activities. To assist in coordinating the efforts of the state or federal government designed to aid the agricultural interests of the County and in the conservation of natural resources. And to inspect yearly and report to the Board of Commissioners on the market facilities in which the County is interested, with recommendations as to improvement of the operation or other pertinent suggestions. Liaison with Library Board.

7. PLANNING, ZONING AND BUILDING

Buildings and Grounds

To annually, between the fifteenth day of April and the fourth Monday of June, inspect all county owned buildings and grounds, and file with the Board of Commissioners, a detailed written report with recommendations as to the necessary improvement, repair or upkeep needed to place the buildings in a reasonably sufficient state of repair and the lands in a reasonably sufficient condition considering the aesthetic surroundings; to biennially survey excess lands owned by the County or acquired by any of its subsidiary corporations and recommend either retention of the same or disposal and, if disposal is recommended, the report shall show the concurrence of the departmental committee assigned to the department which was instrumental in acquiring said lands; to conduct the sale of lands, the sale of which has been approved by the Board of Commissioners and in the conduct of such sale, the following procedures shall be involved and followed.

If there are no statutory regulations or restrictions on the sale, it may be conducted as follows:

- 1. The Board of Auditors, with the concurrence of the Planning, Zoning and Building Committee, shall employ two real estate appraisers, one of whom shall be approved by the American Institute of Real Estate Appraisers or senior member of the Society of Residential Appraisers, and pay the standard fee therefor, or as an alternative the appraisal staff of the Equalization Committee may be used by the Auditors if authorized by the Board of Commissioners for the Planning, Zoning and Building Committee. No land shall be sold at less than the lowest appraisal price unless such appraisal shall be waived by the Board of Commissioners.
- 2. All sales of lands shall be made in one of the following ways:
- a. Private Sales: The Board of Auditors, with concurrence of the Planning, Zoning and Building Committee, may sell at private sale for not less than the lowest current appraisal price placed upon the property in accordance with (1) above.
- b. Public Sale: The Board of Auditors, with the concurrence of the Planning, Zoning and Building Committee, may advertise once each week for two successive weeks (unless otherwise prescribed by Statute) and either a public auction held or sealed bids received up to but not later than the time fixed for opening of the same, which shall be in full view of the interested public. The Committee shall fix a minimum acceptable price at which said lands can be sold which minimum price shall not, unless otherwise authorized by the Board of Commissioners, be less than the lowest appraisal under (1) above.
- c. Whenever the requirements of (a) or (b) above have been fulfilled and no sale made within thirty (30) days thereafter, the Planning, Zoning and Building Committee may authorize the Board of Auditors to notify the licensed brokers in the area that the lands are for sale at not less than the lowest appraisal or highest bid received and the Auditors shall be authorized to pay from the proceeds of such sale the customary broker's fee therefor, or less.
- 3. The Planning, Zoning and Building Committee shall be vested with the authority to determine the amount and type of advertising to be done, the time and place of sale, provide for such terms as it deems reasonable, the manner in which it is to be conducted and make reasonable rules and regulations pertaining to the same not in conflict with the requirement of the By-Laws.
- 4. In all cases the Committee may withdraw any lands authorized for sale up to the time the Auditors shall have received a commitment thereon and shall at any public sale reserve the right to reject any or all bids received.
- 5. All new construction and all alteration of existing structures beyond what would normally fall in the category of maintenance shall be under the general jurisdiction of the Planning, Zoning and Building Committee, such committee shall be charged with, subject to the approval of the Board of Commissioners, establishing location of buildings, employment of architects, preparation of plans and specifications.
- 6. The Board of Auditors shall advertise for and receive bids, then notify the Finance Committee of date of opening bids and, in conjunction with the Finance Committee and the Planning, Zoning and Building Committee open the same. The Chairman of the Finance Committee shall report to the Board of Commissioners on the bids received with the joint recommendation of the Board of Auditors, the Planning, Zoning and Building Committee and the Finance Committee as to disposition thereof and appro-

priate action to be taken thereon. The Planning, Zoning and Building Committee and the Board of Auditors shall make necessary inspections. No payment shall be made to the contractor or architect until the Planning, Zoning and Building Committee or the Board of Commissioners approve the same.

County Coordinating Zoning and Planning

To coordinate zoning ordinances submitted by the townships under Act 184 of the Public Acts of 1943; to notify the clerk of the interested township with reasons for approval or disapproval; to work and cooperate with the County Planning Commission in furtherance of the plan of county development; to advise the Township Zoning Boards to the end that highways, streets, parks, sewers, drains and general land use may fit into overall planning for the area affected.

Liaison—Airport Zoning Board; Building Authority; Parks and Recreation Board; Board of Institutions and Planning Commission.

8. LEGISLATIVE

To recommend to the Board of Commissioners proposed legislation, to aid and assist in preparing and introducing bills to bring about the enactment of legislation desired, to become informed on pending legislation detrimental to the interests of the County and oppose the same, to prepare or review proposed County ordinances and make recommendations concerning the same, to keep contact during legislative sessions with the Corporation Counsel's Office and advise with him on pending matters between meetings of the Board of Commissioners.

Liaison to Municipal and Township Governments.

9. AVIATION AND TRANSPORTATION

To provide liaison between the County Airport Committee and the County Board of Commissioners to confer from time to time with the County Airport Committee and advise them relative to the functions of the department and Committee, adequacy of staff and requirement of facilities and to report to the County Board of Commissioners and to coordinate the County Aviation and Transportation activities with other County departments and activities.

10. EQUALIZATION

Auditor General—Local Taxes

- 1. Shall prepare a form for Township and City Clerks to report to the County Clerk, all taxes to be raised for township, school, highway and all other purposes, as provided in Section 36 of the General Property Tax Law (M.S.A. 7.54);
- 2. Shall receive and examine all certificates, statements, papers and records submitted to it showing the moneys to be raised in the several townships and cities for school, highway, drain, township and all other purposes, and if it shall appear to the committee that any certificate, statement, paper or record is not properly certified or that the same is in anywise defective or that any proceeding to authorize the raising of any such moneys has not been had or is in anywise imperfect and such certificate, statement, paper, record or proceeding can then be corrected, supplied or had, such Board may authorize and require such defects or omissions of proceedings to be corrected, supplied or had. (M.S.A. 7.55);
- 3. Shall (on or before the October Session) prepare a statement showing the taxes to be raised in each city or township for school, township, highway, drain and all purposes including special assessment rate taxes, which statement shall also show the amount of county taxes apportioned to each city or township to be raised and shall mail the same to each city assessor or township supervisor prior to the October Session of the Board of Commissioners, giving him notice that, at such meeting the Board of Commissioners will hear and duly consider all objections made on the millages to be spread against the state equalized value of properties to be affected. After hearing all objections by any taxpayer, the Board will direct such millages be spread against the state equalized value of such properties listed in the assessment rolls of the proper townships and cities.
- 4. Shall present a recommendation in the form of a resolution to the Board of Commissioners at its final meeting during the month of October, recommending that such millages be spread against the state equalized value of properties in the proper cities and townships.

- 5. Shall, as provided in Section 41 (M.S.A. 7.82) of the General Property Tax Law, supply a form for the clerk of each city and incorporated village to report all taxes levied in their respective cities or villages not included in the general (winter) tax levy, to the County Clerk.
- 6. Shall, after receiving such statements, cause to be prepared a statement, as provided in Section 41, for the County Clerk showing the aggregate valuation of all property as assessed in each assessing precinct within the County during the current year; also, a detail of all taxes to be raised in the County for such year in all townships and cities and shall submit the same to the County Clerk for filing with the Auditor General within thirty (30) days after the close of the October Session of the Board of Commissioners.
- 7. Shall cooperate with the office of the County Treasurer in preparing and presenting to the Board of Commissioners, the report on rejected taxes, cancelled taxes and/or the respread of the same. To examine each year, as required by statute, the assessed valuations of the taxing units, to equalize the units to the end that the county tax burden be fairly and justly apportioned to the lesser units than the County, to become informed on the Huron-Clinton Authority; to advise the Corporation Counsel if the state equalization should be challenged; to employ and equip, subject to the approval of the Board of Commissioners, the necessary technical and clerical help needed by the Committee in performing its functions.

Liaison-Tax Allocation Board.

11. REGIONAL AFFAIRS

Provide liaison with inter-county Boards, Authorities and Commissions, i.e., Huron-Clinton Metropolitan Authority, Council of Governments.

12. COMMITTEE ON COMMITTEES

By-Laws

To study all proposed revisions of the By-Laws of the Board of Commissioners and report to the Board on proposed revisions originating with the Committee or referred to it by the Chairman.

Miscellaneous

To receive, investigate and report to the Board of Commissioners on any and all matters referred to it by the Chairman, to provide liaison between the Board of Commissioners and offices to which no committee has been named. Receive and make recommendation to the full Board regarding membership and chairmen of standing and special committees. To receive, review and recommend to full Board, changes in By-Laws and Rules.

JOURNAL KEEPING REQUIREMENTS

KEEPING AND CORRECTION OF THE JOURNAL

The Clerk shall keep a correct Journal of each day's proceedings of the Board of Commissioners, supervise the publication thereof and make such corrections therein from day to day as may be necessary. He shall cause copies of the daily journal to be placed in the files of the Chairman of the Board, Commissioners, and in the files of the Committees. During the consideration and passage of appropriation bills, the Clerk is authorized to correct totals that may have been affected by amendments made to items in the bill, such corrections to be made in the bill and the Journal.

COMMITTEE ACTION JOURNAL

Each Committee shall keep an action Journal recording all action on bills and resolutions in the Committee with the names and votes of members. A member of the Committee wishing to explain his vote may file a written explanation with the Clerk of the Committee within two legislative Board days after the vote is taken, which explanation shall be attached to the action Journal. The Journal shall be retained for at least 90 days after final adjournment of the Board and shall be available for inspection at all reasonable business hours by any member of the Board.

ANNOUNCEMENT OF PRINTING AND ENROLLMENT OF BILLS AND RESOLUTIONS

The Clerk shall announce at each Board meeting the numbers of all bills and resolutions which have been printed or reproduced and placed in the files of the Commissioners, and the numbers of the resolutions that have been enrolled and passed by the Board of Commissioners, and such announcements shall be entered in the lournal.

BILL HISTORY

The Clerk shall keep a record of all bills received by the Chairman of the Board. Such record shall include the title, bill or resolution number, name of member introducing each bill or resolution, committee to which the bill is referred and an entry therein of every disposition made of each bill and the date thereof. He shall also make an index of all bills and resolutions introduced to the Chairman of the Board, referring to the same by their numbers.

COMMUNICATIONS TO THE CHAIRMAN OF THE BOARD

All communications to the Board of Commissioners received by the Chairman of the Board, or request, communications, petitions, or questions brought to the attention of a Committee Chairman or a Commissioner for referral to the Chairman of the Board, shall be logged by number and date and two duplicates be made: a master copy and a Commissioners Inspection File, which shall not be inspected by any other than members of the Board of Commissioners.



- FIRST MONDAY IN JUNE—Last day for Allocation Board to issue final order approving allocation of tax rates to local units. Sec. 15 Act 62 P.A. 1933 AM Act 17 P.A. 1955—MSA 7.76.
- WEDNESDAY AFTER THE FIRST MONDAY IN JUNE—Last day for local unit to certify its tax levies for apportionment. Sec. 16 Act 62 P.A. 1933. AM Act 17 P.A. 1955—MSA 7.76.
- BEFORE JUNE 30—Township Supervisor prepares assessment and tax rolls and furnishes same to Township Treasurer. MSA 15.3642 (1) PA 31, 1966.
- FIRST MONDAY IN AUGUST—Drain Commissioner to file a report of the amount to be spread at-large with the Township or City Clerks. (By resolution of the Board of Supervisors.)

- 17. SECOND MONDAY IN AUGUST—Township Clerks to file statement of local taxes authorized for school, township and drain purposes with the Supervisor. (MTL Sec. 36 MSA 7.54 provides for this to be done on or before the 15th of September.)
- LAST MONDAY IN AUGUST—The Supervisor and City Clerks are to file a statement of all taxes requiring authorization or the Board of Commissioners with the County Clerk. (MTL 36 MSA 7.54 requires this to be done before October 1.)
- FIRST DAY OF SEPTEMBER—Secretary of School Board files with Township and City Clerks certified copy of resolution of Board certifying amount of taxes to be levied in the District.
- 20. THIRD MONDAY IN SEPTEMBER—First meeting of the October Session of the Board of Commissioners. Final date for filing by Drain Commissioner of certification of Drain Rolls and amounts to be Spread at-large on the County, Townships and Cities with the Board of Commissioners. (To be fixed by resolution of the Board of Commissioners.)
- 21. OCTOBER SESSION—Board of Commissioners to approve the budget and pass the incident appropriation resolution. (MTL 37, MSA 7.55 provides that this shall be done during the October Session of the Board.)
- 22. OCTOBER SESSION—The Chairman of the Board is directed to call a meeting of the Board for the purpose of having a hearing on an order directing the spreading of all local taxes and the passage of a resolution directing the township, school, highway, drain and all other taxes to be spread on the rolls of the proper Township Boards and Cities. The Clerk of the Board of Commissioners shall immediately after the passage of the resolution apportioning and directing the spread of the taxes, make out two certificates showing the millages apportioned to each township or city for state or county purposes and the millages of township and school taxes to be raised in each taxing district, one copy of which he shall deliver to the County Treasurer and the other copy to the Supervisor or Assessor of the proper City or Township. MTL 38—MSA 7.57.
- DECEMBER FIRST—Supervisor or Assessing Officer shall have the Tax Roll completed. Tax Roll is to be delivered to the Township or City Treasurer for collection. MTL 43—MSA 7.84.
- DECEMBER FIRST—Tax becomes a lien upon property assessed. MTL 40—MSA 7.81.
- JANUARY 10TH FOLLOWING YEAR—City or Township Treasurer to make settlement of taxes collected prior to this date within 10 days. MTL 42—MSA 7.83.
- FEBRUARY 14TH FOLLOWING YEAR—Last day for payment of taxes without penalty of 4% being added. MTL 44—MSA 7.87.
- MARCH 1ST FOLLOWING YEAR—Tax collection period ends. The various City and Township Treasurers shall return the County Tax Roll with all proper certifications and tax warrants filled out to the County Treasurer's Office along with the delinquent roll. MTL 45—MSA 7.89.
- 28. COLUMNIZATION ON DELINQUENT ROLL—Those cities which bill their taxes in a lump sum showing percentages rather than columnization shall break down the different items to columns before their delinquent rolls are returned to the County Treasurer. MTL 39—MSA 7.80.




