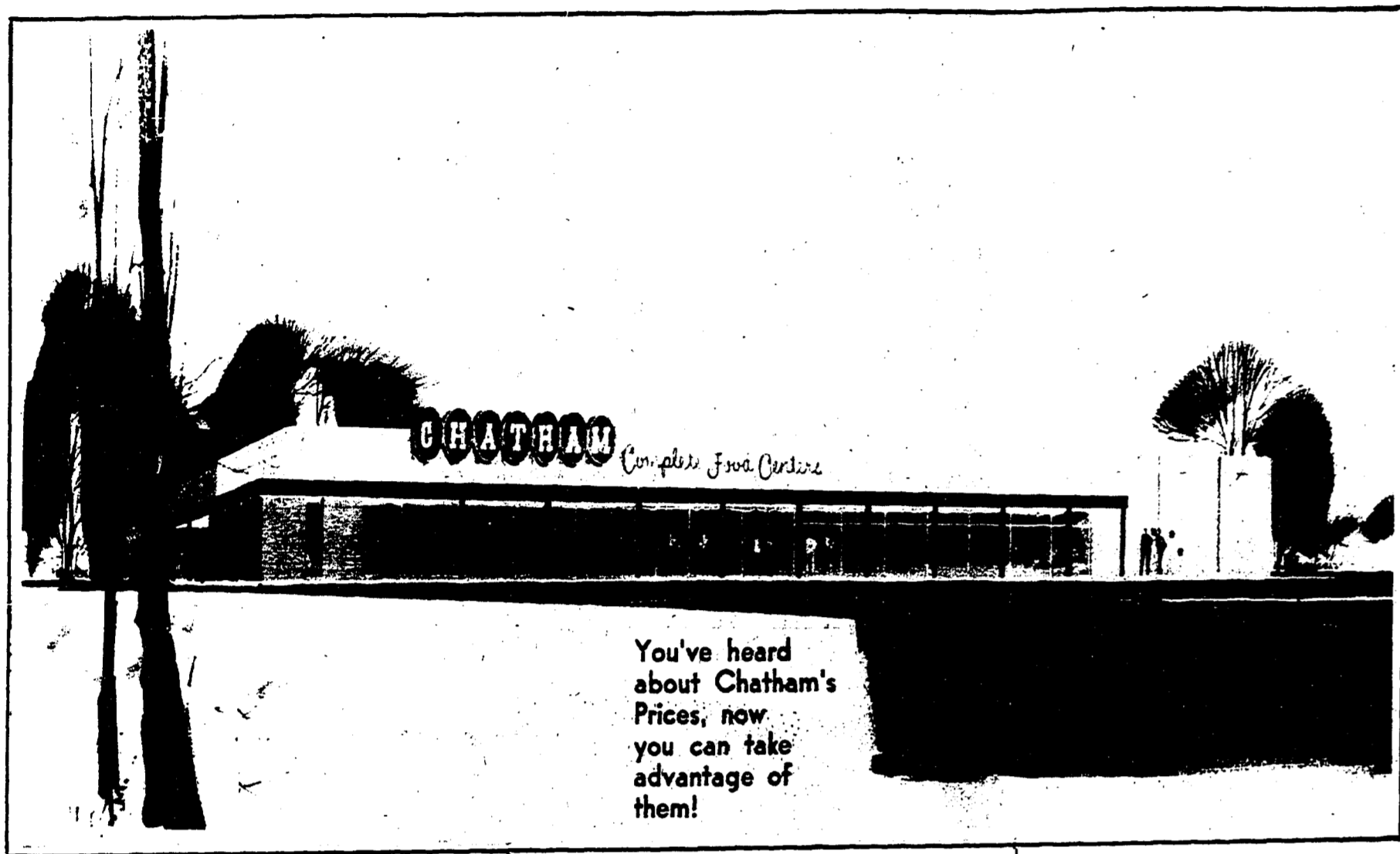
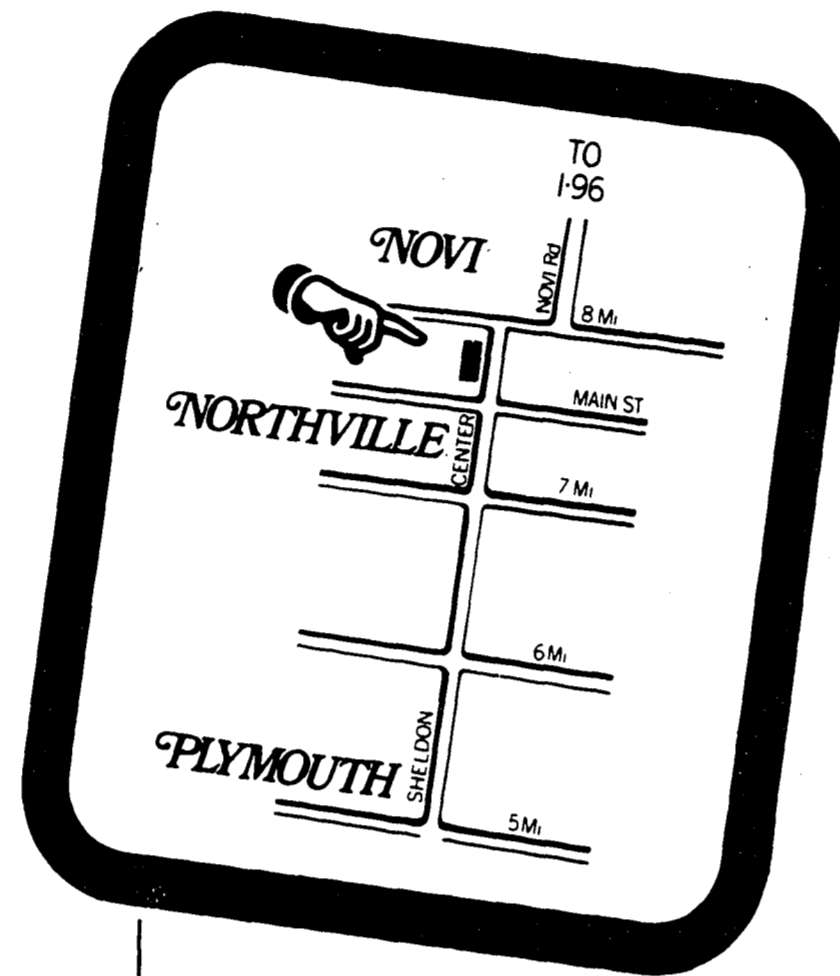


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Novi Fights Back in '58 by Incorporating

Editor's Note: Following is the seventh in a series of articles concerning the various artificial boundaries that affect people and officials living within the circulation area of this newspaper.

Its southern boundary being whittled away by Northville and a large chunk of its northern territory lost to the new city of Wixom, Novi Township finally got its own incorporation movement off the planning boards late in 1957.

Viewed by some as the "closing of the barn door after the horse has escaped" and as a senseless urban step for a largely rural area by others, petitions for village incorporation nevertheless were filed early in December, 1957—two weeks after Wixom voted to become a city.

Three areas of what was or had been Novi township territory were excluded from the

incorporation plan. They were: that part of Novi which had become Wixom city property; three sections of land (including Northville Estates) on the southern boundary; and part of Brookland Farms subdivision.

Brookland Farms and Northville Estates subdivisions were excluded because they did not yield the necessary signatures on the incorporation petitions. And excluded areas adjacent to Northville resulted because they were either already part of Northville city or up for annexation to that city.

Brookland Farms, located northwest of Nine Mile and Novi roads, thus following the incorporation election) became an "island" in the middle of Novi—a situation that still exists today.

By the end of 1957, Novi officials had seen the following happen:

- Northville had annexed 82 acres of Novi land that presently houses the Northville High

School and Amerman Elementary School.

- Northville for the second time voted to annex practically all of the remaining Novi property from Tall to Novi roads and from Base Line to the 9 1/2 mile line, and this annexation was again being challenged in court.
- Wixom had incorporated first as a village then as a city, encompassing the tax plumb represented by the Ford Lincoln plant, and was preparing its new city charter.
- Novi had petitioned to incorporate as a village but because insufficient signatures were obtained, two Novi subdivisions—Northville Estates and Brookland Farms No. 1—had to be excluded from the proposed new village.

With the dawn of the new year, the then Novi township supervisor, Frazer Staman, held out hope that Novi through village incorporation could protect its boundaries from further encroachments. "I think 1958 may be

the turning point," he predicted.

He saw approaching changes, especially in new developments, that could rally a new esprit de corps in the community.

History proved him only partially correct. Meanwhile, the late Wixom Mayor Joseph Stadnik was making his predictions:

- "The people of Wixom have consolidated their four corners into one solid mass. The first village council and appointed officials have given Wixom the preamble to good government, and if the new city officials will continue what has been started, the flow of government shall not be interrupted."
- And some Wixom citizens would now question the validity of his prediction as well.

In March, 1958 Novi citizens voted 909-422 to incorporate as a village—an historic occasion making Novi the largest (in acreage) village in Michigan.

Citizens also elected a commission to draw up the new village charter. Elected were: Walter Tuck, Harry Watson, Russell Buton, Dicon Trafalilian, and Dick Groeneweg.

Two months later, Wixom, having already voted to become a city, approved its new city charter by a vote of 925-45. At the same time, elections chose their first City mayor and city council.

- They were: Joseph Stadnik, mayor (he had been mayor of the village); and Ray Lahti, Gerald (Bill) Abrams, Jesse Birchard, Mrs. Lotte Chambers, Gunnar Mettala and Walter Tuck, (not the same man as in Novi) councilmen. All had been members of the village council but Lahti. Of these, only Mettala still serves.

School Board OKs New Busing Policy

A new school district busing policy, which provides for the transportation of all students within a specified distance of school, was enacted by the Novi Board of Education Monday night.

Unanimous adoption of the policy took place at a special public hearing in the high school auditorium that attracted dozens of Novi citizens.

"Specifically, the policy makes the following five provisions:

- That all students in grades kindergarten through five, who live one mile or more from school, be bused to and from school.
- That all students in grades six through 12, who live 1 1/2 miles or more from school, be bused to and from school.

Meanwhile, the superintendent is to provide the board with a cost analysis of transportation versus crossing guard, pathway, etc. The board directed this analysis following a citizen's question and Dale's response that transportation, in his opinion, would be less costly.

"Presumably, under the new busing policy, the safety committee could direct that transportation be provided Meadowbrook Glens children without action by the board.

The board also requested that a traffic study on 10 Mile Road be conducted by the Oakland County Road Commission — ostensibly for the purpose of determining if flashing traffic signals can be provided — and it asked that the county consider moving 50-mph speed limit sign away

from the school crossing area. Trustee Robert Wilkins found the speed limit sign as defeating the purpose of the crossing sign painted on the roadway, namely to slow traffic.

In still another move, the board directed the superintendent to make the Meadowbrook Glens pathway more permanent, thus permitting maintenance (snow-removal) in the winter.

However, this and the other actions concerning Meadowbrook Glens may be unnecessary if it is found that transportation (busing) would be less costly and if the safety committee decides to provide transportation.

Among objections, questions and positions put to the board by citizens were these:

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'Tap' Dispute Sparks Anger

- Orchard Hills Elementary school children north of 10 Mile Road and east of Meadowbrook Road.

City to Lease Police Trailer

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Walled Lake Inks Contract

Teacher contract ratification by the Walled Lake Education Association (WLEA) was announced at the Walled Lake Board of Education meeting Monday night.

The contract covers 475 teachers throughout the district. Included in the contract are wage hikes averaging five percent.

Starting salaries for teachers with a BA degree were raised from \$8,100 to \$8,450 with the maximum degree were set at \$8,126. Formerly, the figure was \$8,667. Maximum level after 12 years was raised from \$15,001 to \$15,839.

Also included in the contract for the first time in the district is a \$7,000 term life insurance policy covering each teacher.

The contract was negotiated for a two year period. Wage and calendar items are scheduled for re-opening in one year, however, increases will not be retroactive to September because of the price freeze.

Mrs. Evelyn Brown, president of the WLEA, commented that the teachers were pleased with the settlement.

Her comments were echoed by Superintendent Donald Sheldon, who welcomed what he considered the relatively modest terms of the contract in view of the uncertain conditions and recent millage loss.

Dump Bids For Garage

Plans for a bus garage were shelved, at least temporarily, Monday night as the Novi Board of Education voted unanimously to reject bids received last month.

The board took its action following a recommendation for rejection by the board committee as reported by Vice-President Bruce Simmons.

CITIZEN OPINIONS were evenly divided as to the manner of developing the small park area obtained by the city from Michigan Bell Telephone on North Center street.

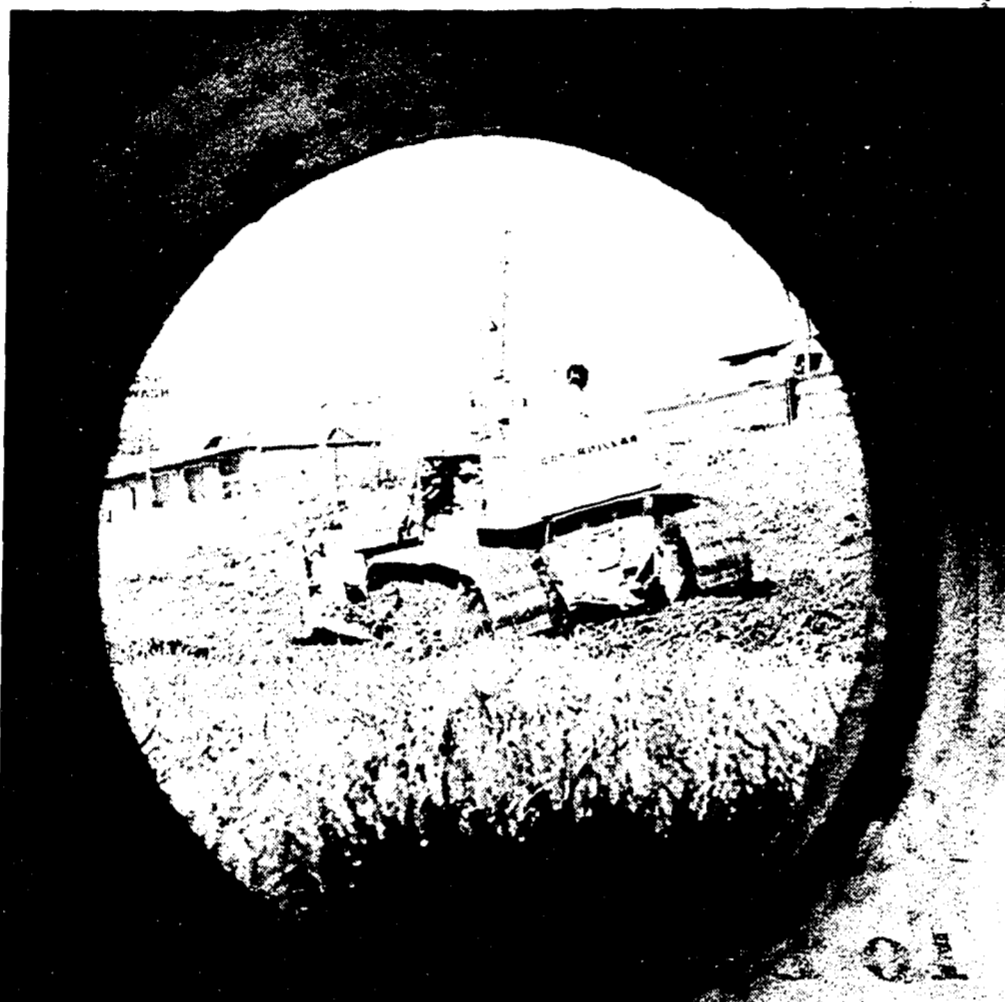

Tie Vote Delays Police Expansion

Hiring of a third full-time township police officer was delayed at least until November when a vote to table further action on the issue ended in a tie Tuesday night.

He emphasized he will inform parents of the effect of the local district "as soon as we know. However, there is no need for panic."

How Much Should Adopted Child be Told?

How much should an adopted child be told about his natural parents? Is there a real danger that, given sufficient information, he will desert his foster parents or cease to identify with them? There is no pat answer to fit all situations, but University of Michigan child psychologist Edward M. Schwartz finds that many couples, having had to meet certain standards to become adoptive parents, continue to believe society is evaluating their competence. As a result, they may be overindulgent, creating in the child a "sense of anxiety and omnipotence."

When a couple feels insecure about their role as adoptive parents, their anxiety intensifies the child's concern about his own status. He needs to be able to communicate openly his feelings and frustrations about being adopted, Schwartz notes. Inevitably the child must cope with the rejection by his original parents. "The child should be allowed to feel angry about this," Schwartz says. "After all, it's no easy pill to swallow."

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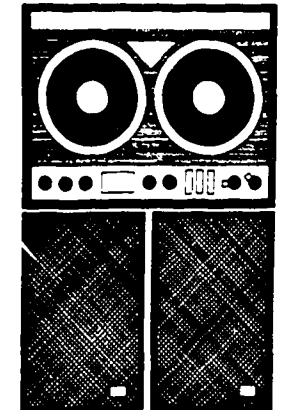

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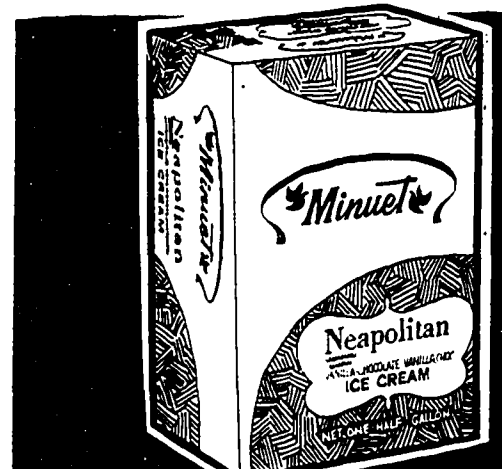

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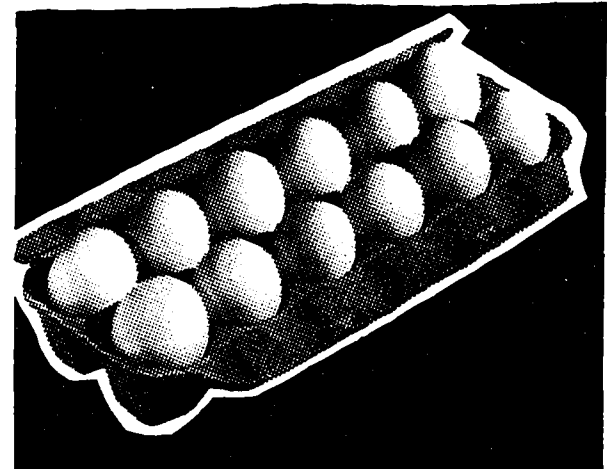

Boundary Hearing Slated Wednesday

Novi's citizens will have an opportunity to register their opinions on two important matters affecting the future of the city as both items are slated for public hearings next week.

Up for discussion at Monday night's council meeting will be the proposed articles of incorporation for a public building authority. If passed into being, the authority will be used for the construction of a new municipal complex.

Wednesday night the State Boundaries Commission will conduct a public hearing on the city's petition to annex all present township property with the exception of Brookland Farms subdivision.

The city council made that abundantly clear at their Monday night meeting, as they directed City Manager George Athas to report their opposition to the Intercounty Drain Commission.

At the same time City Engineer Charles Finsky of Johnson and Anderson reported on the feasibility of building a storm water detention system within the boundaries of Novi. This detention system is proposed by Novi as an alternative to the Randolph Drain improvements.

Discussion about the Randolph County Drain has been taking place between officials of the City of Northville and Novi for the past several months.

Basically the building authority will allow the city to raise money for public building projects without having to go to a vote of the people.

The Randolph Drain originates in the Novi area of Nine Mile, west of Taft, and passes through Northville into the Rouge River branch.

The Drain has previously been able to handle the storm runoff adequately, but recently, however, due to what Athas termed "some unwise building policy," in the Novi area, the drainage system is overflowing.

Drain Plan Lacks Support from Novi

Novi wants nothing to do with the present plan for improving the Randolph Street Drain.

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heard a report from city engineer Charles Finsky concerning the feasibility of extending a water line east down Grand River from the current eight inch main supplying Old Orchard subdivision.

Other council business centered around the acceptance of the bid of Central Heating Company for installation of a furnace in the city hall was accepted.

The bid of Regal Janitorial Service for cleaning the city hall, the city hall annex, and the library was accepted.

Finsky was advised to study an alternate plan and report his findings at a future meeting.

The bid of John Mach Ford for two new police cars was accepted.

The bid of Timber Trust Buildings of Howell for construction of a steel pole fire station was accepted.

The council also authorized Mayor Crupi and Clerk Mabel Ash to sign a leasing agreement for a mobile home for the detective's bureau.

Legal Help

City Hires Fried

Disbarment proceedings being launched against City of Novi Attorney Howard Bond led to a special announced meeting of the city council Saturday morning.

Immediate action of the council was to hire Attorney David Fried, who is to give Bond assistance in all legal matters concerning the city. Fried, a former Novi resident who lives in Willow Creek, was previously employed by the Novi Board of Education.

The special meeting was called to air proceedings being conducted by the Bar Grievance Board concerning a disbarment action against Bond in a non- Novi case.

Bond denies charges against him and is confident he will be vindicated. However, he has indicated a willingness to resign as city attorney rather than cause County Probate Court.

The council's Saturday meeting was called to discuss three things: the advisability of attaining an additional legal counselor; the possibility of a change in legal counsel; and to consider a means of solving the immediate backlog of legal work and legal problems facing the city.

Other councilmen stated their belief that Bond's personal legal problems may be causing a burden on the city. Specifically, the comment referred to a recent decision against Novi in a suit filed by Mobile Home Parks of America.

Decision will be appealed, Novi lost by default as Bond had failed to file a brief.

Subdivision Service Asked

Protest Busing Policy

Local busing—not the court-ordered busing now being in Detroit—remains a nagging problem for Novi school officials.

Having adopted a new busing policy last week, the board of education Monday was confronted with its first citizen protest.

Steven Adams, president of the Meadowbrook Manor Association, representing the subdivision of Eight Mile Road, voiced objection to the discontinuance of buses traveling in the subdivision, emphasizing that the objection is based on the safety of children.

Pointing out that children boarding buses on Eight Mile Road are put into a dangerous situation because of the heavy traffic on Eight Mile Road, Adams wondered aloud why, after several years the board (or administration) should suddenly change its position in permitting buses to enter the subdivision.

When the board advised Adams that the newly adopted policy also created a special committee consisting of two board members and Superintendent Thomas Dale to hear appeals, Adams assured the board such an appeal would be forthcoming from his association.

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Delay School Opening Again

The on-again, off-again opening of the new middle school is likely to be off for one more week, Superintendent Thomas Dale reported this week.

Parents were notified of the opening in opening by written communication Friday, Dale said, and similar notification is planned when the opening is rescheduled.

Greenfield Construction, reported Dale, has completed construction of the 11 Mile Road sewer arm but air testing, which has detected a number of leaks, delayed use of the arm as a holding tank.

Temporary plans call for sewage from the school to be emptied into the sewer arm where it is to be held and later pumped out pending completion of the interceptor into which the sewer arm empties.

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Anti-Busing Meeting Draws 700 Citizens

Apparently disgruntled by a lack of direction and a lengthy talk, many of the estimated 700 persons attending an anti-busing meeting at Walden Lake Western High School last week walked out before the program ended.

Sponsored by the Walden Lake Home Owners Civic Association, the Thursday program was promoted by Attorney Robert Lord as an "informative talk."

The audience, for the most part, was calm throughout the evening although it was apparent that many attending were prepared to become vocal in the opposition to the busing issue triggered by recent court rulings.
