water plantings in the Great Lakes, including: Lake Michigan at Platte Bay, Big Sable Point and Portage Lake and Lake Huron at Hammond Bay, Harrisville, Port Hope, Port Sanilac and Lakeport.

About 825,000 coho and

chinook were planted in open water to provide a larger and longer salmon fishing season this fall on the Great Lakes. The Cass River, which empties into Saginaw Bay via the Saginaw River, received its first plantings last year. Although 450,000 salmon will be swimming through the Bay, only a few are expected to be hooked because of the Bay's warm water, generally higher than the 50-55 degree temperature preferred by both coho and chinook for

Sixteen streams have now been planted with chinook with the best catches expected from 1969 plantings since this king-sized partner of the coho usually takes three to four years to mature. This variety will run 20 to 40 pounds with 1970 plantings weighting from 15-25 pounds and '71 plantings between five and 12 pounds.

A few giant chinook from 50 to 65 pounds may be taken from Lake Michigan. These are from the 1967-68 plantings. Coho, which matures at three years, generally will run eight to 18 pounds with a few fouryear-olds at 25 to 33 pounds, The state record for chinook is 42 pounds, eight ounces, caught last fall in the Pere Marquette River : The largest coho is a 30-pound, eight-

Athas Resigns as City Manager

NOVI CITY OFFICES Council Denies Request

A rezoning request which would have allowed construction of a proposed 824unit multiple complex on 80 acres of land south of 11 Mile Road was rejected by the Novi city council Monday. The action came at a public hearing called to consider the request of Philip Mc Cafferty to rezone 80 acres from its present R-1 (one family residential) to R-2-A restricted multiple family residential).

The property is located south of 11 Mile Road midway between Taft and Novi Roads. Opposing the rezoning Monday were a group of approximately 40 residents of adjoining property. The council's action came by a 5-2 vote after the city's

planning commission had unanimously recommended the request be denied. James Cherfoli, planning board secretary, noted that it was only at the insistence of the petitioner, McCafferty, that the hearing had been allowing multiples in this area originally and had denied the request to hold a public hearing on the matter,' Cherfoli told the council. "It

was only because the petitioner asked us for the opportunity to present his arguments to the council and the public that we consented to the hearing." McCafferty's presentation was based on the tax advantages of multiple units over single family units.

That study is about six months away om completion. At Monday's hearing three citizen arguments against the rezoning were offered. Plans call for development of some 900 multiple (either apartment or townhouse) units around a nine-hole golf course.

Control of any human disease is best effected when the disease is prevented rather than cured, regardless of how effective the cure may be; the prevention of polio by Salk Vaccine is the most dramatic example of this fact.

Dental decay is the most common disease that attacks human health amd much of it can be prevented by the use of fluorides. In the United States some 88 million people living in 7,400 communities now have fluoridated water, but this reaches less than half the children in the United

The other means of application are not as effective nor as available to all residents as is fluoridated water. In Philadelphia the average cost was 4.7 cents per person for an entire year. It is clear that the amount of dental need and the status of fluoridation make it obvious that fluoridation of all public water is necessary to control dental disease. Prevention is imperative as the dental needs are greater

than the capacity of the profession to treat and almost

I oppose the addition of fluoride to our water system for several reasons.

Fluoride affects arthritics and diabetics (especially older people) and is a poison.

Fluoride works only on children's teeth in the formative years, three to seven. How many children would this help? An average child drinks less than one pint of

Most important are the costs involved to treat all city water, as much as one and one half million gallons per day. Fluoridation would cause the city's taxpayers thousands of dollars to buy automated equipment and to treat this water. This "Sodium fluoride", with over-treatment, can do more harm than good.

Who will pay for this fluoridation in the end? According to the state's laboratory report, we (South Lyon) have .4 to .5 parts per million (milligrams per liter) of natural calcium fluoride in our water without treatment. The amount set by Michigan's Department of Health to be added is "not to exceed one ppm (mg-1).

Is it worth it in South Lyon? I don't think so when our children drink 50 of our 1,500,000 gallons per day.

However, the administrator said that financially, it's a disadvantage. "We are reimbursed by the state for the actual number of credit hours taken, not the total number of students enrolled. A year and a half ago, average credit hours taken by each student was 9.3. In the spring, average credit hours was 8.9, with about 9 credit hours or less expected to be the average this fall.

The Botsford Inn, now enlarged and with modern conveniences, is still in the hotel-restaurant business. I is open for breakfast from 7 to 11:30 a.m., lunch from 11:30 a.m. to 3 p.m. and dinner, 3 p.m. to 10 p.m. It also is open Sundays for brunch from 10

a.m. to 2 p.m. and dinner from 1 to 8 p.m. On the route between Detroit and Chicago, three inns are within a five-mile radius in the scenic Irish

The first, Bauer Manor, is on US-12, seven miles west of Clinton, across the road from Evans Lake. Still a restaurant, it is open daily both for transient guests and special parties, with live entertainment on Saturdays. Built about 1840, it was first used as a stagecoach stop and

Walker Tavern is undergoing restoration for a second year under state supervision and at present is closed to the public. Mott, Churchill Battle for Title

One thing most coaches in the Western Six Conference agree on is that Farmington Harrison will not repeat as league champions.

"They've lost too much to be able to come back," said one coach. "Dave Manos was their whole team and he's gone and so are a lot of other people who were important to them.' Replacing Harrison, most Western

Six coaches agree, will be either Waterford Mott or Livonia Churchill. In fact, three of the four coaches interviewed - Walled Lake Western Coach Mike Mancini is new and unfamiliar with the league - saw the race as a two-way brawl between the Chargers from Churchill and Mott's

Corsairs. The only coach who did not see the race as a two-team affair was Ken Kaestner, coach of the Livonia Churchill squad. "Farmington Harrison has eight

starters coming back," he said, "but Mott has everybody returning. Nobody is even going to come close to them. They've got Tim Simon (quarterback) on offense and Gordon Sheldon (linebacker) on defense. They'll have one of the top teams in Oakland County this year. Nobody is going to beat Kaestner is probably correct. Mott

should finish on top with Churchill second, followed by Harrison, Walled Lake Western, and Northville. Every coach in the league expects his defense to be tough this year, but the only squad which boasts a potentially potent offense is Mott. Tim Simon a 5'10", 160 pounder, won All-Conference honors last year as a junior and is back to direct the Mott attack.

"He's the big reason we decided to switch to the wishbone this year," reported Perry. Exceptionally fast, he does the 40 yard dash in 4.8 seconds in full uniform, Simon will have plenty of backfield running help.

Greg Aldrich, 6'1", 185, is a fullback who does the 40 in 5.0 seconds and Perry says he has six good running backs headed by 170 pound Dale Romeo (4.9 for the 40) and 185 pound Bruce Lovett (5.0 for the 40).

Heading the Corsairs' defense will be Gordon Sheldon, an All-Oakland County and All-Suburban selection last year as a junior and a bonafide All-State prospect in 1972.

"He's 6'3", weighs 235, and does the 100 in 9.5 seconds," says Northville coach Chuck Shonta, in explaining Gordon's appearance on the field. Actually, Sheldon is only 5'11", 235, and does the 40 in 5.2 seconds in full uniform. Big difference.

Mott Coach George Perry saw the race as a battle between his own team and Churchill, but picked the Chargers on top. "Their jayvees were undefeated until their last game," says Perry, failing to mention that they lost their last game to his own jayvee squad. Churchill Coach Ken Kaestner picked his own team to finish third behind Mott and Harrison. "I know a lot of people are pointing the finger at us, but we just haven't got that much," he

The Churchill team will pit its hopes on its defense. "We're smaller than past Churchill teams," said Kaestner, "but we have good speed and good

Last year's winner was John Osborne, Novi head coach. Still another special selection will be the Most Valuable Player—an honor that last year went to Novi's quarterback, Steve The 1971 All-Star Team was dominated by the Novi Wildcats, who earned seven positions on the mythical 22-player squad.
