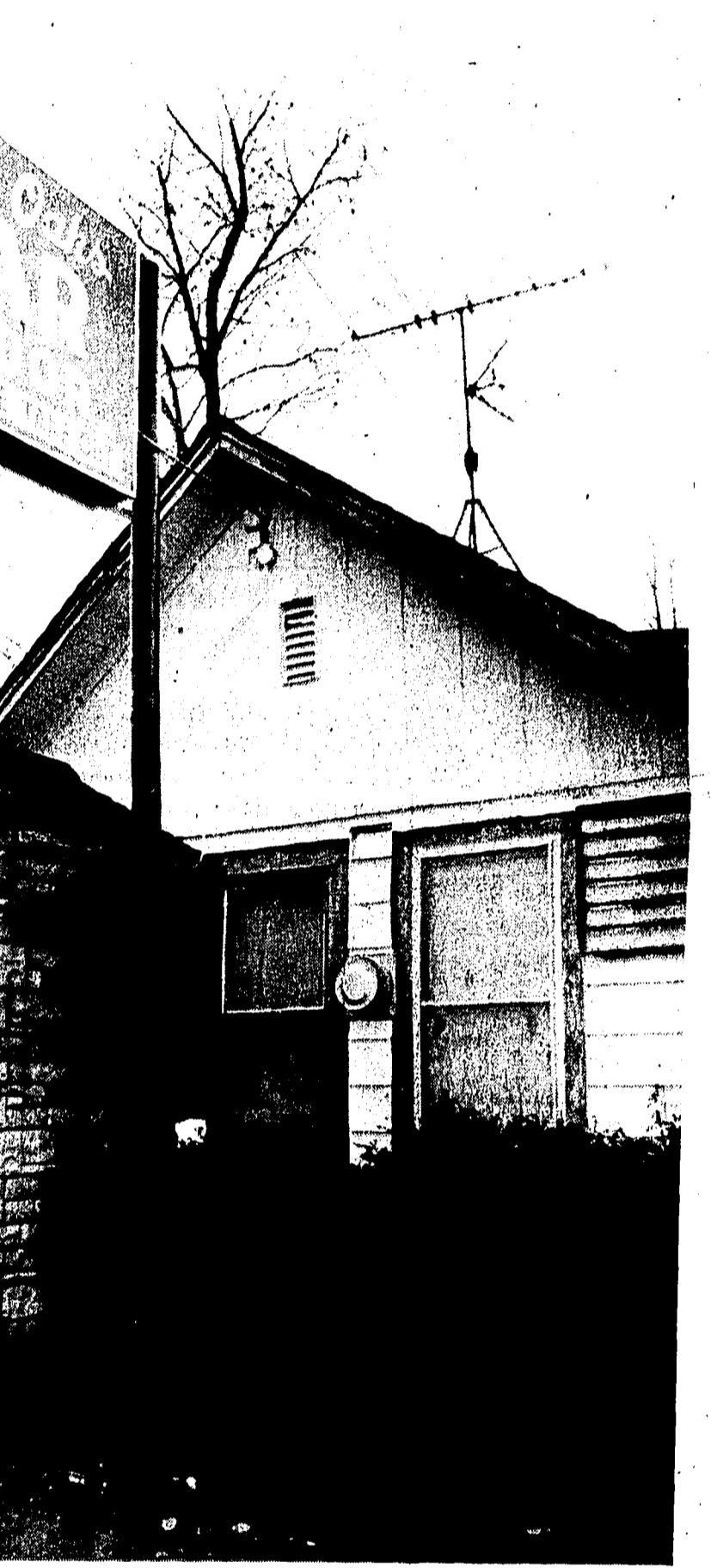

Northville man arraigned for Novi-Bowl heists

Jerry Thompson, a 35-year old Northville man, was arraigned at 2nd District Court March 28 for his part in what police believe were a series of robberies that have occurred recently at Novi-Bowl.

Thompson and a 15-year-old juvenile were arrested by police March 27 at Novi-Bowl. Apparently Thompson had been using the youth to break into cars in the parking lot.

Police recovered more than \$8,000 in stolen merchandise hidden between the false ceiling and the roof of the Novi-Bowl.

Thompson served as night mechanic at the bowling alley. The news reported incorrectly last week he was employed as night manager.

Police report that Thompson had been treated in the past as a heroin addict and was undergoing methadone treatment. Methadone is a less powerful drug which supposedly lessens an addict's dependence on heroin.

Police said that Thompson sold some of the stolen merchandise to people in the Novi-Bowl bar.

Police said the citizens band radio that was in the car the youth was allegedly breaking into the night he was arrested had been purchased at the Novi-Bowl bar two days earlier.

Through Model United Nations program

Students get excited about international issues

It took seven months of digging, researching, studying, countless fund-raising efforts, financial aid from the Walled Lake Rotary and Union Lake Optimist Clubs and a great deal of self-motivation, but for 30 Central High School students, the time was well spent.

They were all delegates to the Great Lakes Invitational Model United Nations held recently on the campus of Michigan State University in East Lansing.

All members of the Model United Nations Club at Central, the students represented the Ukraine, Libya, United Kingdom, Zaire, Mexico and Venezuela at the five-day conference.

Using basic United Nations sources available in the school library coupled with field trips to the Detroit Public Library housing a UN depository and countless letters to embassies, the students compiled actual UN voting records, learned individual country history, politics and history.

Club sponsor Glenn Ruggles said the students become thoroughly informed on deep issues the average American doesn't get into or usually understand. All issues debated at the Model UN are current and in debate at the UN in New York.

"Each student delegation is totally responsible for searching out the issues, digesting them, collecting references and background data and in the final writing of resolutions.

Then, at the conference itself, the students assume the role of the world leaders, playing those roles in such convincing fashion they claim they actually "become" that country.

"Sometimes after a heated debate and its time for a break, the kids won't even talk to each other because of an issue. Everyone is really involved in their country," commented delegate Jim Rupp.

"It's not hard to do," said Beth (Buff) Iserman pointing to the fact that a Central student received a slap across the face from another delegate last year because of an issue. "The kids take their subject personally and seriously. If a country suddenly abandons a policy, their allies can get pretty angry," the pert chairperson of the Libya delegation commented.

Under debate in both committee and on the General Assembly floor were the issues of today... general arms control, human rights, women's rights, terrorism, Apartheid, and nuclear disarmament. The debates were fierce, convincing, accurate, believable. The resolutions factual, hard-hitting, to the point.

"One thing for sure, we had procedure crammed into our heads," said Herb Langer. "We were so used to calling 'point of order' we even did it when we got back to our classrooms."

Claiming they did so much studying on their countries they know them inside out, the young delegates also said the conference developed "creative thinking and diplomacy."

"The good part about the Model UN Club is that it attracts those students who have a real interest in world problems," remarked Ruggles. "The end result is that the interest opens new channels which can later open doors in international affairs."

The club, which was instituted at Central in 1969, has seen six former delegates continue their interest during their college years. All work with the non-profit Great Lakes Invitational Conference Association which yearly supervises the conference.

The enthusiastic, well-versed students said the entire conference was in their hands, pointing to the fact that no advisors are allowed on the floor during sessions. The delegation chair-

man are the floor leaders who must muster the support for their individual resolutions. "Sometimes you do a lot of bluffing," they laughed.

"The radical countries afforded the most fun because they could be far out and get away with more," said Scott Freeman, a member of the Libya delegation. "The first world countries

— the Western nations, were more powerful, but we really had it," he said, prompting a mini-debate in the school hallway.

Freeman was awarded the Security Council Committee best delegate award for speech making and delegate ability. Tim Ruggles copped an honorable mention for similar abilities

in the Social, Cultural and Humanitarian Committee at the conference. Of the 238 resolutions submitted by delegates at the 250 member conference, 119 were submitted by Central students. Of those, ten passed through committee and were debated on the General Assembly floor. Two received

final passage at that level by the model body and were forwarded to the United States mission to the United Nations in New York.

"We as delegates had to convince others on the issues at hand," said Freeman. "What's important is not if you win or lose, but how you play the game."

Teen's poor posture may indicate scoliosis

Susan, 14, as many other teenagers, never seems to sit up straight in a chair.

Her parents constantly grumble about her slouchy postures and the way Susan and her friends seem to lie around, rather than sit or stand, whenever possible.

But these bad posture habits may be camouflaging a potentially serious condition that cannot be corrected by well-intended nagging.

When she was younger, Susan's parents carefully watched her growth. Dressing and bath times made that easy. Now, the maturing young woman's sense of privacy and modesty prevent her mother from even entering the room when Susan is changing clothes.

Susan might also be complaining of other seemingly innocuous problems, which her parents slough off.

"The right pantleg of my jeans is always too short," Susan laments.

"Well, maybe your right leg is a bit longer," says Mother. "No one is perfect."

The problem could be an indication of scoliosis — a condition in which young spines, especially of girls, curve sideways — laterally — and is usually detected at the beginning of the teen years.

Doctors and school officials are becoming increasingly aware of the condition and are eager to inform

parents through early detection programs.

Hartland Consolidated Schools is one of those area districts which is embarking on an annual examination program for students in the last growing years — fifth through ninth grade — in hopes of catching scoliosis in early stages and avoiding surgery or complex treatment.

Developed in conjunction with Henry Ford Hospital, Detroit, which staffs a scoliosis clinic, Hartland's program includes a 30 second examination of students' backs in gym classes during April and May.

Hartland's school nurses, Ethel Good and Mary Clark initiated the early detection program, according to Dr. Arthur Behrmann, Lakes Elementary principal and director of health services.

"They persevered when they learned that similar screening projects in other school districts have proven successful in detecting spinal deformities and preventing disabilities in young people," he said.

An informational meeting, for Hartland parents was offered last night to launch the screening program. A film explaining scoliosis and a question and answer time with school nurses and Henry Ford Hospital staff member were included.

Tonight, (April 5) another awareness workshop is being offered in Walled

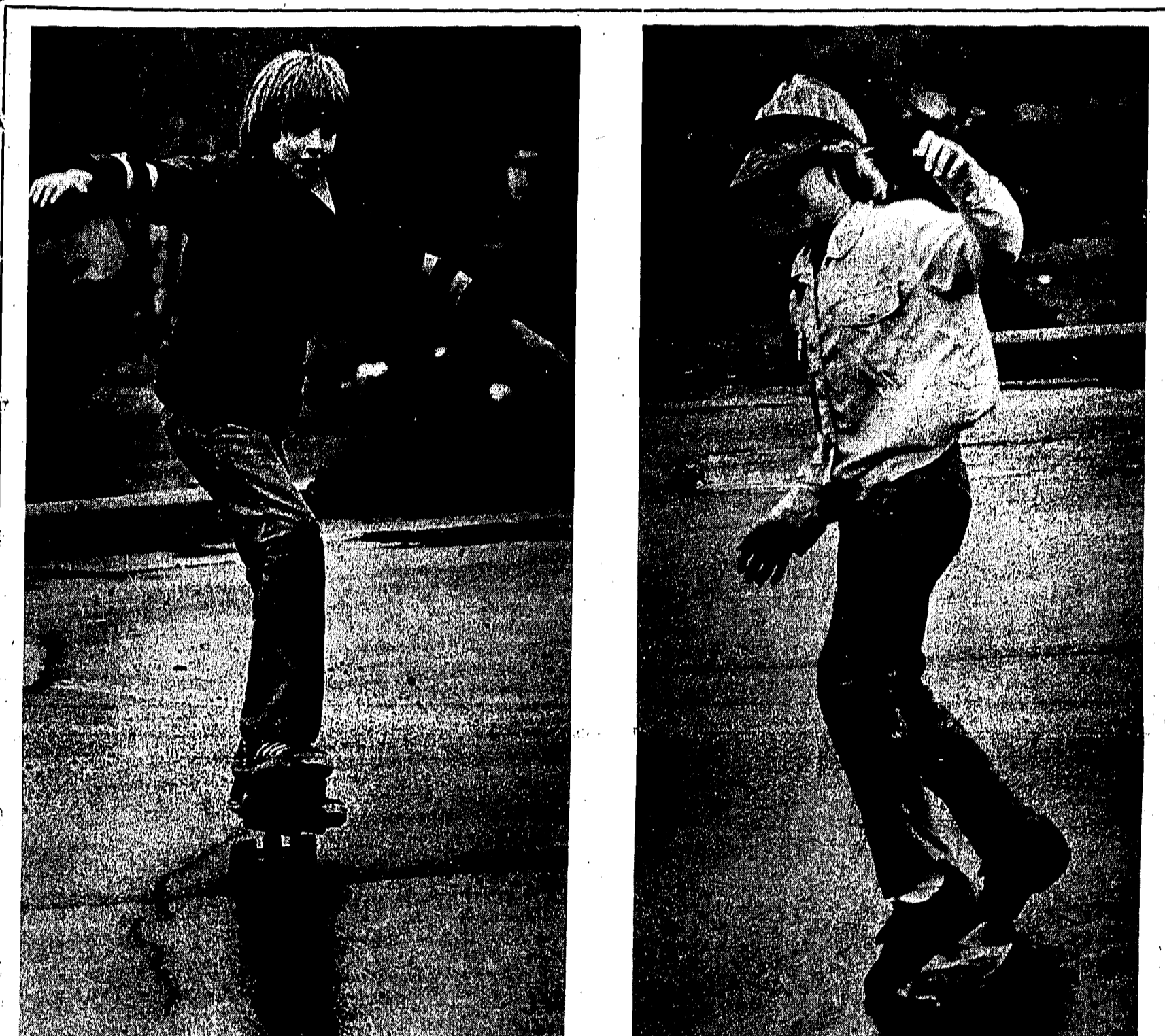
