# Schools face deficit budget for 1978-79 budget in the 1978-79 school year. Assistant Superintendent for Business Harry Carlson told the Walled Lake School Board at a special budget hearing Monday that projected expenditures of approximately \$19.7 million will exceed projected revenues of \$19.2 million

If the budget projections hold true, it will mark the second consecutive year in which expenditures have exceeded revenues in the Walled Lake School

Although figures have not yet been finalized, the school district is expecting a deficit of approximately \$118,500 for the 1977-78 school year which officially

Deficit budgets are prohibited in Michigan, but the Walled Lake Schools technically are not operating "in the red" because of a fund equity of approximately \$1.1 million left over from the 1976-77 school year.

Nevertheless, Carlson cautioned the board that serious consideration must be given to the future of school financing in the Walled Lake District. "The fund equity will cover our deficits in 1977-78 and 1978-79, but we'll be

down to only about \$500,000 in fund equity after the 1978-79 school year," he "I think we're going to have to start asking some very serious questions as to what we're going to do in 1979-80," he continued. "Do we curtail programs? What impact will the tax limitation proposal that appears headed for the November ballot have on our finances? Will we have to ask the voters to ap-

Walled Lake's City Council can take a positive step toward sound planning for the future by rescinding a previous action and maintaining a 120-foot right-ofway on Decker Road.

City officials stated their intent to reduce the right-of-way on Decker Road to 86-feet last summer at the request of B. H. Carey, a local developer who plans to build a subdivision on the west side of Decker Road, south of Maple. The narrower right-of-way facilitates property setback requirements for the proposed sub-

New information has come to light, however, which indicates that it would be advantageous to the city to maintain the 120-foot right-of-way on Decker Road.

Brian Blaesing, an environmental concerns coordinator with the Oakland County Road Commission, reported that Decker Road was designated as a primary road in a 1969 Intercounty Highway Commission Master Plan to provide continuity of the regional road network. As long as Decker is included as a part of that network, the city is eligible to apply for up to 72 percent federal funding for road im-

If the right-of-way on Decker is reduced from 120-feet, it will no longer be considered a part of the network and the city will no longer be eligible for federal fun-

Blaesing also reported that if the Decker Road right-of-way is reduced beneath the 120-foot standard, the county would have to designate another north-south road through Walled Lake as a primary road to provide regional road network continuity.

The only other north-south road that could be designated, stated Blaesing, would be East Walled Lake Drive.

Armed with this information, it would seem that the most logical choice facing the city would be to maintain the right-of-way on Decker Road at 120 feet.

The two most prominent reasons for such a conclusion are readily apparent.

First, the city cannot afford to pass up the opportunity of federal monies for road construction. Related to this concern is the fact that the city has already received federal funds to offset the cost of improvements currently being made on Decker. As Mayor Gaspare Larmarca correctly pointed out, the city would place itself in a tenuous position with federal funding by accepting money and then backing out of a commitment.

The second obvious reason relates to the likelihood that East Walled Lake Drive would be designated as a primary road if Decker is dropped from the intercounty master plan.

East Walled Lake Drive is already badly over-congested and is not suitable for handling an increased traffic load. Furthermore, any attempts to widen the road would result in considerable

right-of-way acquisition costs to the city as well as hardships to existing property owners.

Although it is true that there are a number of undesirable homes along the road, it is also true that there are many fine homes along the road and that many property owners have invested time and expense in upgrading their homes.

There appear to be two primary objections to maintaining the 120-foot right-of-way on

Some officials are concerned that a 120-foot road would lead directly to construction of a fivelane road. Blaesing stated unequivocally, however, that Decker will remain a city road and that any changes to the actual road width would have to be approved by the city.

The need for additional lanes on the road will be mandated by the amount of traffic. If the traffic load does not materialize, there will be no need whatsoever for Decker to become anything more than a two-lane Road. If the traffic volume increases to the point that additional lanes are required, the city will be in a good position to react to the need — with the assistance of federal dollars.

The point is that Decker will never become any more than a two-lane road unless the city decides that it should be more than a two-lane road.

The second objection is that the 120-foot right-of-way will cause hardships to certain existing property owners. Although the point is undoubtedly true, it is also true that a far greater number of residents will be inconvenienced if East Walled Lake Drive is designated as a primary

In addition, it makes much more sense to firmly establish the 120-foot right-of-way on Decker now before more development takes place along the road. By providing proper setbacks at the present time, the city can ensure that relatively few homeowners would be inconvenienced if the need to expand the width of the road ever develops.

The City of Walled Lake will commence with a road study by professional consultants within the next few weeks. We strongly suspect that one of the primary recommendations of that report will be that the city needs some sort of by-pass to relieve traffic congestion in the central business district. Decker Road could conceivably serve such a purpose, particularly if Novi follows through with plans to extend Decker to 13 Mile.

The city's professional consultants are virtually unanimous in their recommendation that the 120-foot right-of-way be maintained on Decker Road.

It is sound advice. As planning consultant Tod Kilroy stated last week, the city has a responsibility to provide for the needs of future residents, as well as present residents.

# Mandate smoke detectors?



YES ...

Legislation creating mandatory compliance to require smoke detectors is the only solution to present day complacency.

It is unfortunate that the general public assumes that tragedies only happen to other people, but it is a fact repeated constantly that indifference, particularly on the part of the parents, contributes to such a great extent to children needlessly becoming a statistic. Individuals involved in dwelling fires are generally

unconscious from the effects of smoke before becoming a fatality from the fire itself. The thing that amazes me is the total indifference on the part of a great many people in relation to fires. How many children have been taught emergency routes from a dwelling and other pertinent instructions to minimize panic and lessen the possibility of needless fatalities?


It is inconceivable considering the competitive low cost of smoke alarms and the ease of installation that anyone would consider this lifesaving device beyond their means or a major installing project.

To state that compliance is mandatory and to create an enforceable ordinance becomes an extremely frustrating situation. I agree that compulsory approval from the homeowner to inspect the smoke detector would be considered by many as an invasion of privacy, but to what extent could you expect voluntary cooperation to comply?

I would suggest that failure to cooperate with a qualified inspector would become a matter of record and assumption on the part of the inspector that no smoke detector was installed. In the event that a fire occurred in the dwelling without a smoke detector, whether personal injury was involved or not, the homeowner would be subject to a fine in an amount to discourage any further non-compliance.

Smoke detectors are perhaps the single greatest device yet devised to save lives in the home. This is true as long as the smoke detectors are properly installed and maintained, and assumes that they are of the type which has been determined to be safe for use around &

The problem with mandating the use of smoke detectors in private homes is in the enforcement. Enforcements is relatively straightforward with new construction. It is a simple matter for a building inspector to check the smoke detector installation at the same time the final inspection is made.


It is a different story in existing homes. Either some means must be developed requiring the installation of smoke detectors at the time of improvements to the house or when the house is sold to a new owner or a flat requirement imposed that all houses must be equipped with smoke detectors by some predetermined date.

The requirement of adding smoke detectors at the time of home improvements or at the time of the sale of the house would also be relatively straightforward by means of an automatic inspection.

Verifying the installation of smoke detectors by a predetermined date is impractical if not impossible for at least two reasons: (1) the cost in manpower and time makes it prohibitive, and (2) without invading everyone's privacy or through voluntary invitations to the inspector, verification could not be made.

The installation of smoke detectors in new construction is already mandatory through the building codes, but installation in existing home should remain on a

Time and places change but memories.

They came flooding back as I read The Flint Journal's recollection of the tornado that destroyed my native town.

One hundred and sixteen killed. Many hundreds more injured, many seriously. Three hundred homes demolished. Two hundred and fifty houses damaged. Whole neighborhoods where I spend my teens sucked up in an instant and scattered across a scarred landscape.

A quarter century has passed since the twister struck the Beecher area at the northern boundary of Flint in June of 1953.

Fortunately, I was spared a first-hand experience and my parents, brother and sister and our home escaped. The indistinguishable funnel, which resembled a boiling, earth-hugging cloud swept east along Coldwater Road, between former Northville mayor Mike Allen's monument business on the south and our home on the north.

It plowed through the gas station at Clio Road but spared the next door dairy where I had scooped ice cream as a teen, then hopscotched along the road on its easterly path.

It bent and uprooted giant trees in the woods behind our home, where my parents watched in horror from a basement window. and then began its devastating attack on houses and occupants and frightened motorists as it approached Saginaw Street — the main artery into Flint.

In its brief but stunning existence, the tornado took the lives of several personal friends, injured dozens of others, and all but destroyed the high school where three years earlier Edgar Guest challenged my graduating class not to fear the future but rather to shape it.

A few tried reshaping Beecher following the tragedy, but most of the survivors moved away. One member of the class who heard Guest's challenge came back to become prin-
