

Village residents ask for end to 'eyesore'

Several residents of Oak Island Drive last week asked the Wolverine Lake Village Council to take action against a property owner whose lot allegedly is rat infested and covered with garbage. One resident said she talked to the woman who owns the property and was told that a new home won't be built on the lot until the owner retires in about eight years. Another resident said the lot, with a foundation that was lifted after a condemned home was razed two years ago, is "quite an eyesore."

In Walled Lake Schools

School lunch prices going up

The cost of student lunches in the Walled Lake School District will go up five cents across the board this year. The increase in the cost of student lunches was approved unanimously (6-0) by the Walled Lake Board of Education at its Monday night session. As a result of the increases, the cost of lunches in the elementary schools will rise from 40 to 45 cents, lunch costs in the junior high schools will rise from 45 and 50 cents to 50 and 55 cents, and lunch costs at the senior high school level will rise from 45, 50, and 55 cents to 50, 55, and 60 cents. In addition to the five cent increase in student lunch prices, the school board also approved an increase in the cost of adult lunches from 65 to 75 cents. The increase in lunch prices is expected to generate an increase of approximately \$40,000 in revenue for Walled Lake's food service program. Director of Food Services Wayne Daniels also told the board that the district is considering the purchase of a new piece of equipment (a trayveyor) which will permit the offering of a multiple choice menu at the elementary school level. Daniels stated that "this unique idea will be the first of its kind in the State of Michigan to the best of our knowledge." Cost of the trayveyor has been estimated at approximately \$25,000. Deputy Superintendent Roland Langerman said that the cost of the trayveyor will be offset in part by the sale of existing equipment, a decrease in personnel, and an anticipated increase in the amount of lunch program participation at the elementary level. Daniels also said that he is planning to expand the usage of tablecloths in the elementary lunch rooms to give atmosphere in the multi-purpose rooms and produce an increase in lunch counts. The board voted to approve the increase in lunch costs after Daniels reported that the food service budget would run a deficit of approximately \$32,000 without the increases. Total revenues without the increase were pegged at \$830,000 with total expenditures placed at some \$862,000. Increase in lunch prices will result in a \$40,000 plus increase in total revenues and will enable the district to realize an excess of revenues over expenditures of some \$7,635. Langerman noted that elementary school lunch prices have not been increased since 1969. The last increase in the cost of lunches at the secondary level was approximately five years ago, according to Langerman. The Deputy Superintendent stated further that the cost of lunches in the Walled Lake District was relatively low in comparison with the costs in other Oakland County School Districts. Daniels reported that the costs of lunches in Walled Lake last year were the lowest in the county. Local lunch costs will remain among the lowest in the county even when the five cent increase has been added. In a report to the board of education, Daniels noted that wholesale food prices will remain among the lowest in the county even when the five cent increase has been added.

Wixom seeks CBD improvements

Downtown Wixom is one step closer to receiving a new look, according to Assistant to the Mayor Steve Bonczek. But the city is still a long way away from having its hopes turn to reality. Oakland County officials have reviewed Bonczek's "Downtown Revitalization program" and have approved the plan for including in its Overall Economic Program, which it will refer to the state Economic Development Authority. "We were listed in the top one-third of all the projects that they've received," said Bonczek. "We were categorized as a number two priority." Bonczek explained that Oakland County categorizes the development of industrial parks and sites as a number one priority; establishing commercial facilities as a number two priority; and building public service facilities as a number three priority. "We've been informed that there are 12 serious applications that they will present to the state board for grant monies," said Bonczek. "Right now we'll have to wait on the state's decision." Bonczek's plan for the revitalization of downtown Wixom includes the upgrading of the business area through acquisition, demolition, and physical improvements centering around an "Old World" theme. "We've talked with some of the business owners and we've been included in the county's plan, but this is still a future project," he said. Bonczek hopes to have the city take on downtown look similar to the cities of Plymouth, Rochester, and Northville. Estimated cost of the program is in the neighborhood of \$500,000, with 60 percent of the cost picked up by an EDA grant for public works and development facilities. The remaining 40 percent would come from future community development block grants acquired by the city. "Our downtown program discusses the uses of certain historical buildings as commercial outlets. A good example of this is the old homes in Northville that are being used for real estate offices, antique shops, and furniture stores. The two programs would work together; demolishing some places and upgrading others in the Old World theme." He further stated that the Wixom Historical Society hoped to make Wainstock Street an historical district. "We've got some very old homes there and we'd like to see the area receive recognition," he said. Although plans for the downtown Wixom area are proceeding as hoped, Bonczek noted that it would be quite some time before any actual work could be done. "We have to hear from the state and federal boards yet," he said, "so this is still a future project." Bonczek hopes to have some word on the project's progress by October 1.

Village to study road projects

Action on requests to blackout two Wolverine Lake Village roads was delayed last week by the Village Council. A public hearing on a proposed special assessment district roll to pay for blacktopping Dunreath Street was adjourned when Village Attorney Gary Allen informed the council that the assessment roll was supposed to have been published in a public notice of the hearing. Total estimated cost of the improvement to Dunreath is \$9,883, according to Council President John McLellan. Property owners will pay \$3.50 a lineal foot for the blacktopping project, if the council approves the assessment roll. Following publication of the notice, the council will hold another hearing on Dunreath at a special meeting scheduled for September 6. McLellan also was directed by the council to prepare plans and cost estimates for blacktopping Oakview Street, from Giengray to Oak Island Drive. He is expected to have the plans ready for the September 6 session. At a hearing on the proposed Oakview blacktopping, several residents asked for information on where the road would be located since the actual roadway apparently doesn't follow the subdivision plan. One resident, Leo Cadwell of 2622 Oakview, said he "lost" 10 feet of front yard several years ago when the street was relocated, and added that he will sue the village, if the blacktopping takes any more of his lot. Village officials suggested that the street could be surveyed, but several residents said it would be difficult to check the alignment of Oakview because of the winding road and the distance from benchmarks. Administrator Bill O'Brien said it probably would be best to blacktop the existing route. An Oakview resident south of Oak Island Drive asked to have the blacktopping extended through the intersection in front of his home. McLellan said he would include the lots immediately south of Oak Island Drive in plans for the project. If the council approves the plans next month, a hearing must be held on the assessment roll for the blacktopping. On a related matter, the council last week authorized the resurfacing of Giengray Road at an estimated cost of \$30,348. The Detroit Concrete Products Company of Novi was awarded a contract for the project. A second contractor bid on the project, but O'Brien noted that the cost was almost double the low bid.

A-train arson case remains under scrutiny

The case of the intentionally set A-Train fire in Novi may never be solved. "That's the way it's beginning to look now," Oakland County Arson Investigator Dave Milam says. The A-Train fire was ruled as an arson case by Milam shortly after the bar, located on Grand River Avenue just east of Wixom Road, was gutted on July 4. At the time, Milam said he was hopeful of coming up with the persons who set the bar on fire. The A-Train was owned by two area businessmen, Emery Jacques, a Plymouth attorney and former Novi Township official, and Allen Heyn, Jacques is half-owner of the building itself, insured for \$250,000, while Heyn is half-owner of the building and sole owner of the business - which includes the liquor license. The A-Train is located in one of the seven parcels of Novi Township slated to join the city October 1, unless a court appeal is filed. If the annexation becomes effective, the now-unused A-Train liquor license would be the only one available in the City of Novi.

Middle schools to open in Novi

After months of preparations, Novi school administrators will soon put into operation two middle schools along Taft Road.

The new system will place all fifth and sixth graders in the old high school building, now called Middle School North. All seventh and eighth graders will attend the middle school building that was used last year, now called Middle School South.

Preliminary estimates show that about 490 students will attend Middle School North and 440 students in Middle School South for a total of 930 students when school opens on September 6.

The two buildings have starting and ending times approximately one hour apart in order to add a bus run and cut expenses. Middle School South will begin at 8:15 a.m. and end at 2:40 p.m. while Middle School North will open at 9:15 a.m. and close at 3:45 p.m.

Serving as principal for both schools will be Dr. Robert Youngberg, with help from assistants at both schools. Assistant Principal at Middle School North will be Paul LePine and the assistant principal of Middle School North will be Milan O'Brienovich. Youngberg says research has shown the removal of the fifth graders from the elementary system and placing them into the middle school system to be an educationally sound decision. "We are going to think of ourselves in terms of schools within schools," Youngberg says. "The philosophy here will be that we will have a planned graduation from elementary to high school." For example, the fifth grade will utilize self-contained classrooms for the most part, staying close to the format used in many of the system's elementary programs. The sixth grade will begin to use two formats, one part using the self-contained classroom structure and the other working within the framework of the team teaching approach, where youngsters are exposed to several teachers and subject areas. In the seventh and eighth grades, Youngberg says, students begin to come closer to the methods used in the high school where students move from class to class. Another feature of Middle School North will be to use one hour each day as an activity hour, in which students select a non-academic activity to participate in under teacher supervision. The activity period will be held in various hours each day in place of a recess period. When the dual middle school proposal was first discussed, one matter of concern was how to separate the fifth grade children from the older seventh and eighth graders. Youngberg says the different bus times and the separation of the buildings should take care of the problem. He adds, however, that children from the two schools will be given an opportunity to mix at some extracurricular activities. The renovation of the old high school in order to handle the younger students has been going on for several months and Youngberg says he hopes work will be completed by the opening of school.

Due to annexation

Novi Township election up in air

Jeffrey R. Portko defeated incumbent Ernest Bacsonyi for the Republican nomination for the lone trustee vacancy on the Novi Township Board in last week's primary election.

Under ordinary circumstances, the victory in the primary would virtually assure Portko of a position on the board after the general election in November since there were no Democratic candidates for the vacancy.

But these are not ordinary times in Novi Township. And Portko's victory last week may not mean very much by the time November rolls around.

Portko lives in the Chateau Estates Mobile Home Park which is slated to be annexed to the City of Novi on October 1—roughly one month before the November general election.

If the annexation goes through as scheduled, Portko would be ineligible to take office even if he's elected in November.

Portko's situation is just one of several which could arise out of the tentative annexation of all of Novi Township with the exception of the Brookland Farms Subdivision Number One to the City.

Howard Altman, Director of Elections for Oakland County, reported that he has just started to study the possible ramifications to the election in November if the annexation goes through as scheduled.

Altman said that township voter records would have to be transferred to the city, but he was even more concerned about who would be responsible for running the township election since the present township clerk, Virginia Snider, is a Chateau Estates resident.

"There are a number of interesting possibilities and questions which could arise," said Altman. "We've already started work on resolving them before it comes time to print up the ballot for the general election."

Although he emphasized that he has not yet arrived at definitive answers, Altman said that the names of Portko and other non-Brookland Farms residents vying for election will probably remain on the ballot even though they would be unable to take office if elected.

If the annexation goes through, a write-in candidate may be elected to the lone vacancy on the township board or a quorum of the board may be charged with appointing someone to fill the vacancy.

The township clerk position would also be affected by the annexation since Mrs. Snider, the present clerk, is also a resident of Chateau Estates.

Mrs. Snider is opposed by Robert Mohr, a Democrat who lives in Brookland Farms, for the clerk's position in the November election.

Novi rezoning delayed

Councilmember Guy Smith maintained his opposition to the project by questioning consultant Calms as to whether the OSC district at Eight Mile — Haggerty road, the 89-acre complex would include: — a four-story office building that would serve as regional headquarters of a major United States corporation presently located in New York; — 400,000 square feet of office space in a series of buildings; — a "recreation complex" that would include a theater, bowling alley, and racketball courts; and — a series of retail stores.

Wixom receives subdivision plans

Plans for the construction of a single family residential subdivision have been presented to the Wixom Planning Commission.

Wexford Mews will contain 237 single-family residential lots on approximately 90 acres of land located on the north side of Charns Road, immediately west of Smoker's Hidden Creek Subdivision.

The Wixom planners voted unanimously (8-0) to grant tentative preliminary plat approval for the proposed subdivision at its August 7 session.

The subdivision must still receive preliminary and final plat approval before building permits will be issued.

The subdivision is to be developed under its existing RA-1 (single family residential) zoning classification, using the city's Open Space Option.

William Lee, who owns a 2.5 acre parcel on the north side of Charns Road, told the planners that he was concerned with both drainage and trespassing problems.

"There will be 12 backyards on my garden and I'm concerned that the residents on those lots will be using the garden for recreational purposes," he said.

Lee stated further that the storm water run-off from the subdivision lots would contain weed killer and lawn fertilizer that would create havoc with his farming efforts. He asked the planning commission to consider making the developer install a privacy fence to protect his property.

Similar concerns regarding drainage and trespassing were expressed by Carlton Oldford, a Charns Road resident representing the interests of two other property owners, Robert and Daniel Julian.

Diagram of the Defiance Volcano II wood burning stove showing internal components like the primary combustion chamber, secondary combustion chamber, and heat exchanger.

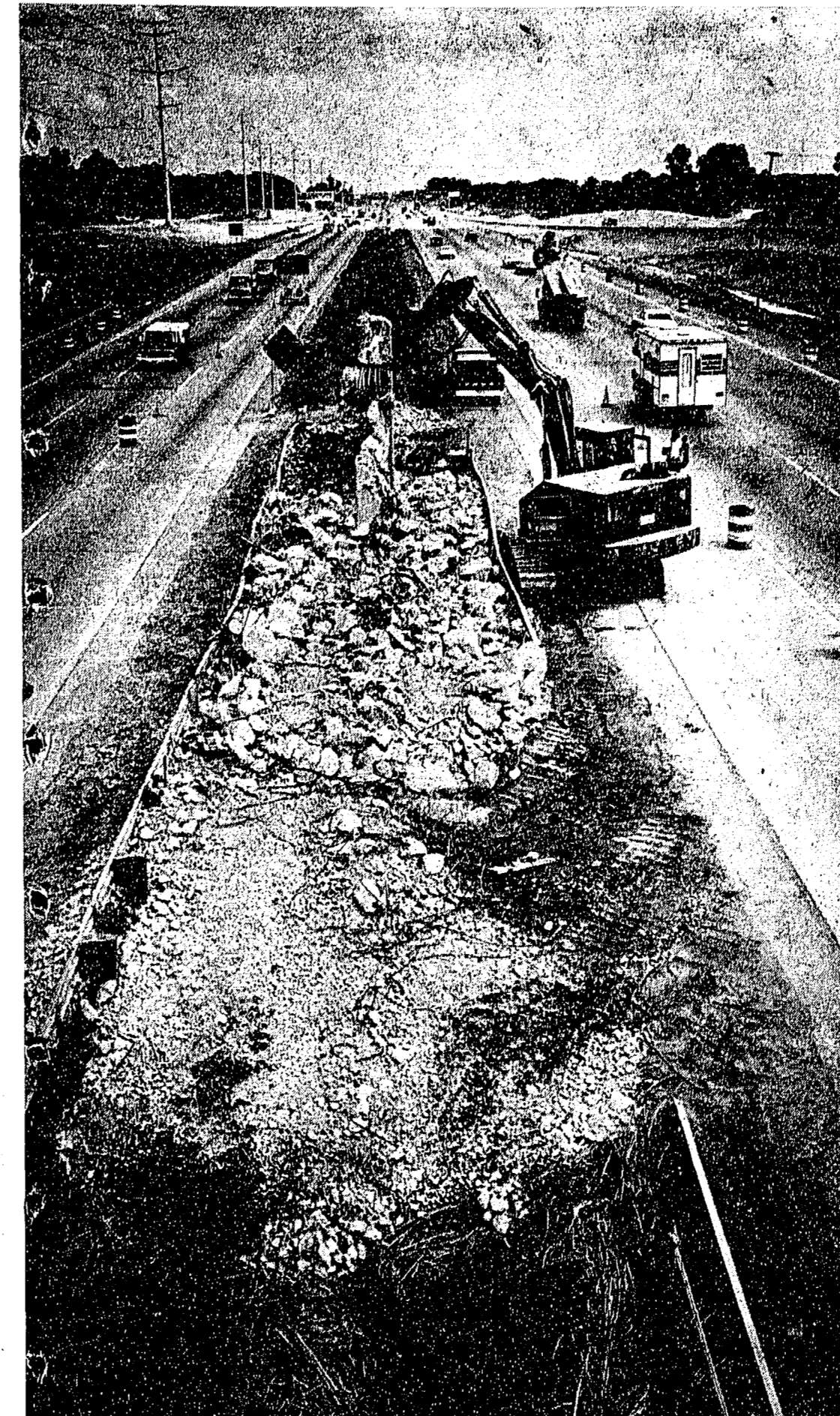

Firemen responded to the scene at 1:17 a.m. August 13, but were unable to put out the blaze until about \$25,000 in damage was done.

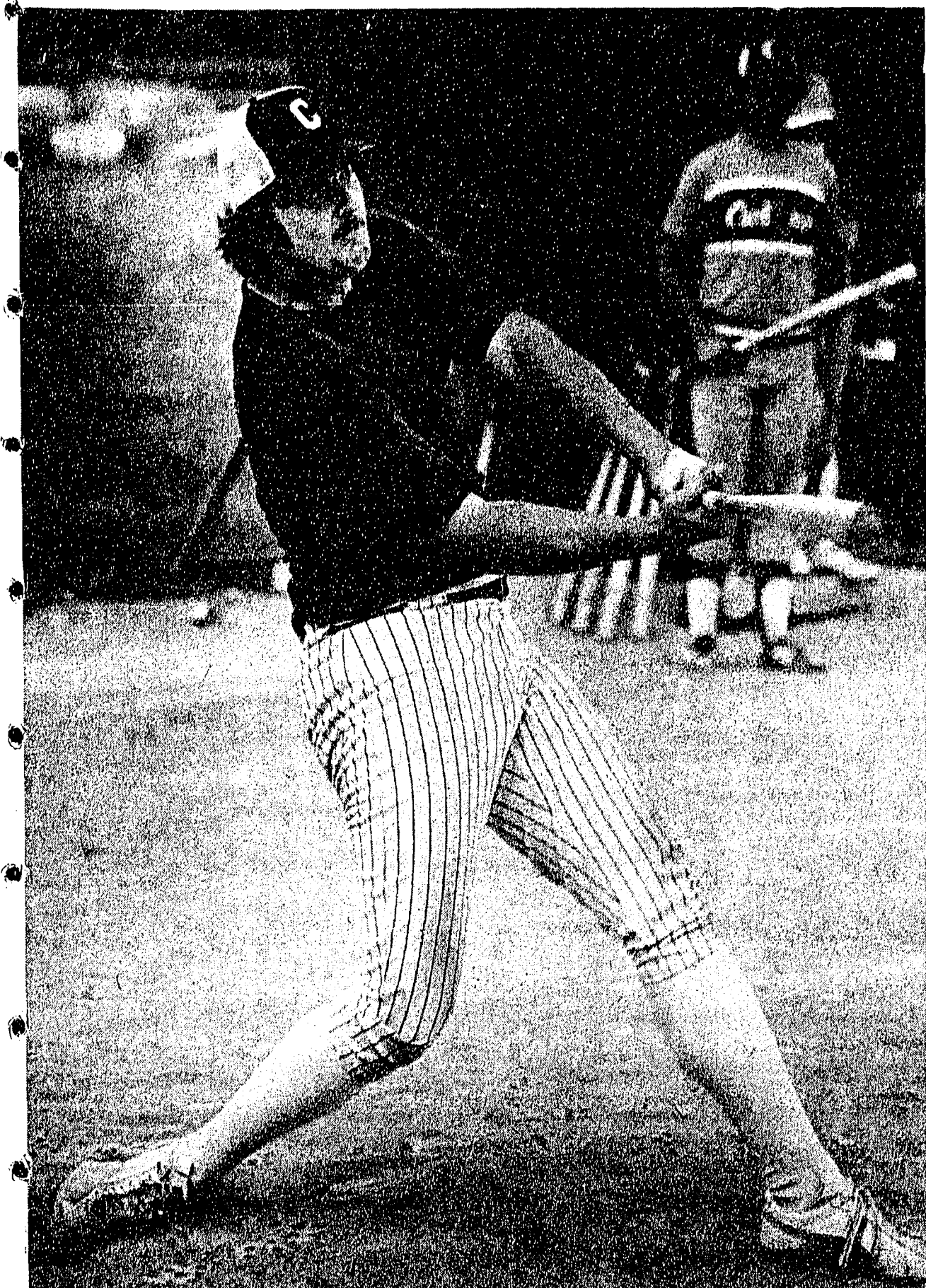

I took a second look at the tall attractive blonde in the tight blue jeans and seductively opened white blouse. But then again, I always been known to take second looks at people fitting that description.

A mark that still stands today.

But Camille didn't do any water skiing at last Thursday's media party at Tivoli Gardens, and she won't be among the competitors when the Nationals are held there August 23-27. She recently fell victim to cartilage damage in her right knee and won't be able to ski for a few more weeks.

But that doesn't mean she won't be busy. During our conversation Camille was besieged by a promoter telling her that she had to be in Southfield the following morning at 7 a.m., which meant a 6 a.m. pick-up time from Ann Arbor, which meant a 5 a.m. wake up call.

"Isn't it great being a celebrity?" I asked considering my own 8 a.m. awakening.

"Yeah, great," she said.

I've always loved the southern drawl, (from my brief stay in Atlanta), so I was hoping to hear more of it when I questioned her about her start in the sport.

"I started when I was four years old," she said. "and I just kept at it." It was a stock answer and I knew she had been asked that question many times before. But what she said next really surprised me.

"I just turned 18 and I'd really like to go to some of those Detroit discos," she stated. "I just got here at 5:30 this morning from Chicago and Lake Geneva and it seems like I never have any time to enjoy any of the travelling."

Damned if I didn't have plans this past weekend.

But I'll be back at Tivoli Gardens for the National Championships later this month. Anyone with at least the remotest interest in the sport of water skiing should also attend. The AWSA people running the show are the nicest I've ever run into -- they even let me ski a couple rounds! Hospitality at its finest... and it'll be there August 23-27 at Tivoli Gardens (four miles south of the I-96 and M-23 interchange near Brighton).

Find sometime to check out the first national water skiing championships ever held in Michigan.

And say hello to Camille.

A few groans and creaks of resistance were heard as a piece of Americana from Wixom was reduced to a pile of rubble



Old Wixom barn falls before backhoe

It didn't give up without some resistance, that barn of some fifty odd years. But it proved no match Thursday morning to the reaching bucket of a backhoe that toppled it, and certainly some ghosts of the past, to the ground.

In a few short minutes, the hallmark to a passing American scene was nothing more than a pile of rubble. Just plain, old barn, it stood, tucked in the corner of the Tiffin Brothers' property in Wixom. Acquired about three years ago by the city, the buildings on the property became a restoration project of the Wixom Historical Society.

The barn, gaining a starboard list over the years, was a dusty, dim, dirt-furred affair. There were some rotted boards, mainly on the back side. Shingles, missing from the roof, allowed water to soak its timbers.

It shuddered a bit with the fist jolt from the machine, as if to brace itself for a fierce windstorm. A few more jolts to the side and a blow to the mid-section of the hip-roof, brought the old building sagging to its knees.

It stood in its corner "since sometime -- maybe in the 20's," some oldsters recollect, built by the Tiffin boys, Charlie and Bill.

The boys, colorful old bachelors, lived in the house until their deaths in 1973.

They tilled the soil, pumped their water with an old hand pump "out front," and used a three-holer outhouse "out back."

And as was the practice "back then," the boys found it necessary to make some additions to the original barn. They added a couple of lean-to's of questionable design to the back of the barn and then erected a chicken coop. It was more up-to-date with cement floor and foundations.

Oddly enough, the coop withstood the sands of time for fewer years than the barn.

The boys were not beyond embellishing their structures. Tacking black tarpaper around the base of the barn, white lines were painted simulating concrete blocks -- no doubt a modernization project.

The walls were decorated with a bevy of old license plates and a collection of middle-aged bottles. There was a variety of hoes, worn half their original size from the boys tending their garden.

Two narrow stalls were placed in a corner of the barn, apparent housing for the Tiffin steeds of yesteryear. From the size of the stalls, the animals were not of mighty size but served the purpose when the boys were out "squirring" young ladies in their wagon.

On the second floor of the barn, fashioned from wide plank boards, was

a collection of weathered chicken cages sporting dented wire sides. A large hay window looked out onto the yard. A stack of old wooden shutters piled nearby might have been another one of their beautification projects.

No one can remember seeing them on the small cottage. Restoration authorities from Greenfield Village claimed the shutters "didn't fit the house."

Although of questionable historic value, some society members were opposed to the demolition. Others said it was last on a list of priorities for restoration. And the cost of restoring the building was more than the society, already involved in the main house, could readily bear.

Still others viewed the building as an eyesore, doomed to fall at any time. As

one member put it, "It would take a lot of work and an equal amount of money to bring that building back." And then casting a sideways glance at the building, he added, "And I don't know that I'd like to be the guy on the roof putting on the new shingles."

A no-cost offer from Monarch Wrecking Company, spelled the ultimate end for the old barn. Although its president, Ve Cuppelli, said he has done his share of saving old buildings with historic value in the past, the Tiffin barn itself did not hold much for the future.

A few short hours later, the area was completely void of the pile of rubble, carted off to an unknown site. All that remained of the barn were the scars from the wide tractor tread cut into the grass and the levelled brown soil.

Although of questionable historical significance, some Historical Society members were opposed to the demolition

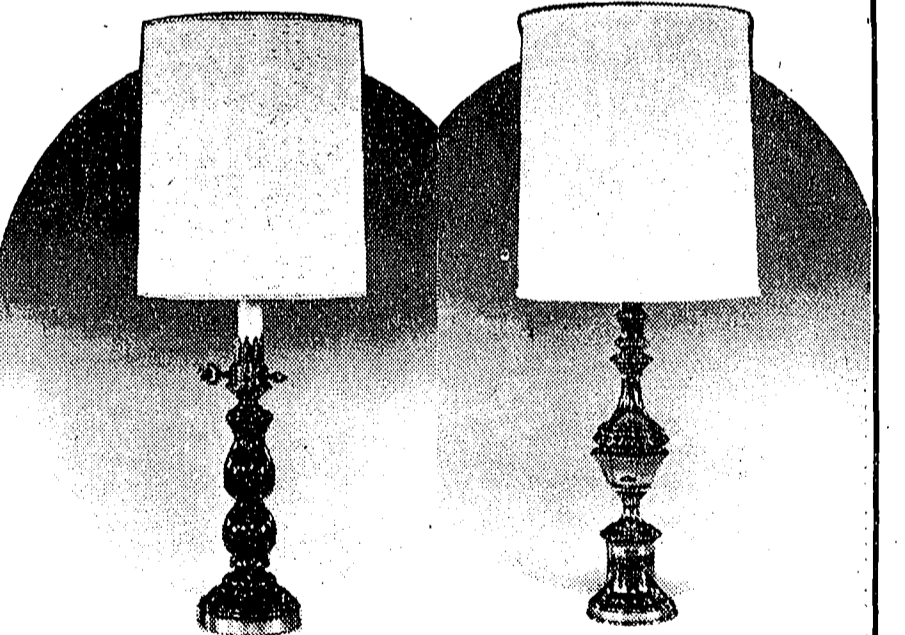

Mrs. Romaine Roethel of Novi will be attending the 58th Annual National Convention of the American Legion Auxiliary in New Orleans, Louisiana.

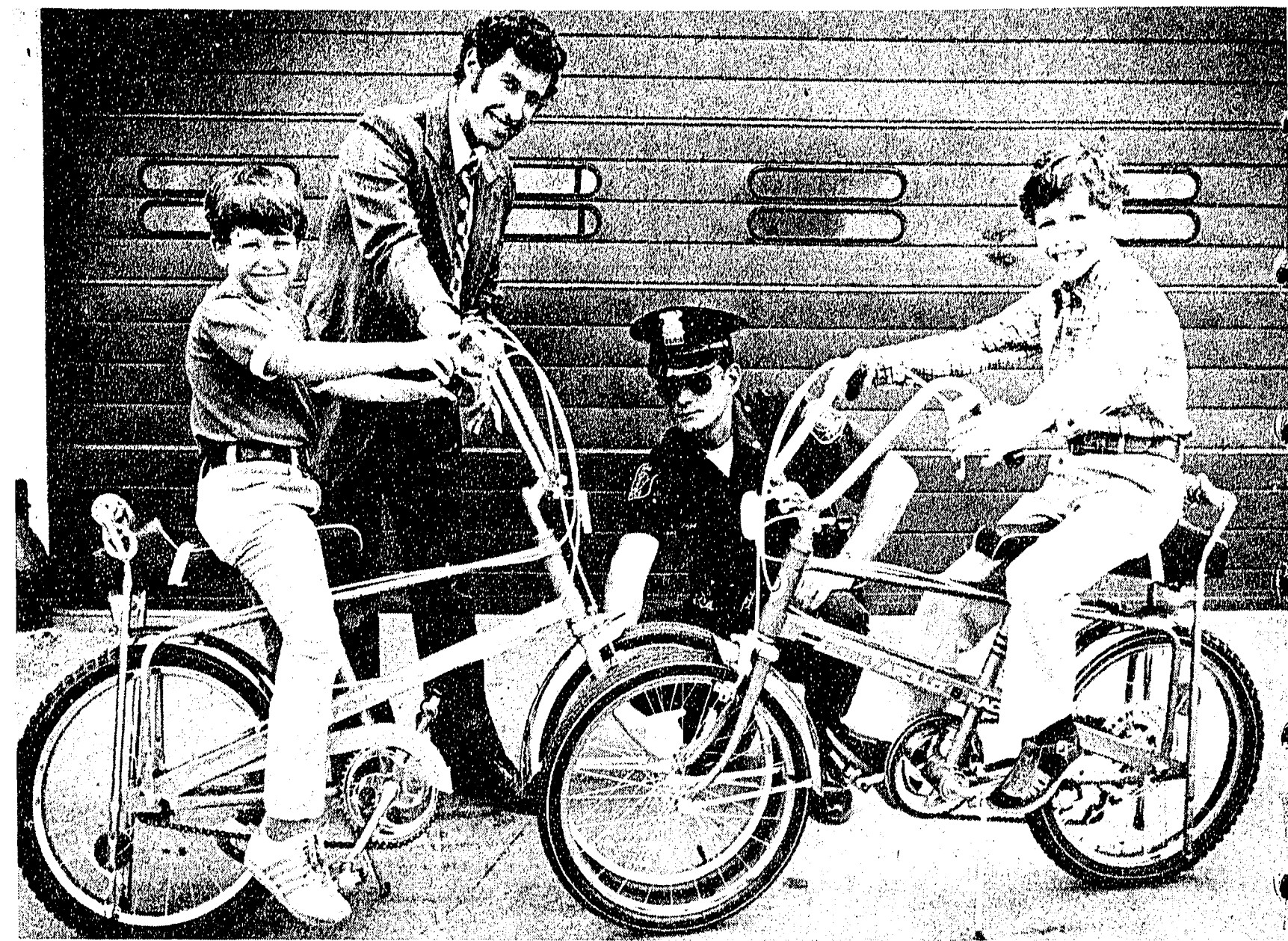

Take care in selecting fur coats

Thinking about buying a fur coat to help ward off the chill winter winds? With furs on pre-season sale in many women's apparel shops, the wise buyer can take advantage of savings while achieving a fashion look and feeling.

A fur coat is an important purchase to any woman so it should be chosen wisely. Just where and how it will be worn should be considered. Versatility is a key word.

The fur itself should have bright luster, uniform color, dense fur, silky texture and soft, pliable leather. Good quality will add to the fur's longevity.

As a general rule, it takes about three weeks to make one coat — furs cannot be assembled essentially a handicraft requiring the skill of many people.

No endangered species, as established by the International Union for Conservation of Nature and Natural Resources, are currently being used and sold by the United States fur industry.

All furs must bear a label giving the animal's true English name. The same holds true in all fur advertising. The name of the country of origin must be given for all imported furs as well as information on its processing — whether it has been bleached, dyed or tipped.

While the selection of a fur is of prime importance, a good fur also deserves good care. Ten tips will help prolong the life and preserve the beauty of any fur coat.

- Hang the coat in an uncrowded place on a heavy coat hanger.
- A padded or rounded wooden hanger is best. Never store a fur in a plastic bag.
- Never place a fur near heat.
- Don't pin flowers or jewelry on the coat.
- To prevent rips and undue wear, unbutton the coat and raise it a little to allow "give" when sitting down.
- Never apply scotch to a fur.
- Protect the coat from long exposure to bright sunlight.
- While a little rain or snow won't hurt a fur, one that has been soaked through should be taken, at once, to a furrier for special treatment.
- If a fur is damp, shake it carefully and then hang it to dry in a cool place with circulating air — not in a closet.
- Occasionally shake the coat gently to fluff it and help keep it clean. Never use a comb, brush or cleaning fluid.
- Have the fur cleaned regularly by a specialist to remove soil, soften the leather, and bring back the luster.
- A fur coat may not require special handling during the summer months if the climate is dry or the home is air conditioned. Otherwise, the fur should be placed in cold storage.

A month in Utah with is older brother Rob proved to be a super experience for 16-year-old Buck Trombley. The soon-to-be junior at Walled Lake Western High termed the trip "somethin' else." In the vernacular of the day, that was a five star review.

WORC grant aids Novi's parks

A project set up by the Novi Parks and Recreation Department, and funded by a Department of Natural Resources grant, has given 22 Novi students summer work while upgrading local natural resources and recreational facilities.

The youth, supervised by college students Jeff Bunker and Ken Foley, have been creating miniature facsimiles of some of Novi's "old relics" for incorporation in the Power Park playground. Called a "tot-city," the sturdy buildings, on completion, will provide climbing, crawling, and plenty of play space for Novi's younger residents.

In addition, the crew has been working on nature trails at Lakeshore, Power and Brookfarm Park. Called exercise and cross country ski trails, they are nearing completion.

The grant, procured by Joy Davis, has provided the salaries, workmen's compensation and materials for the

projects. Called the Work Opportunity Resources Crops, the project has not only provided assistance to the city but has given good working experience to the batch of students, falling mainly into the 15 to 16 age group.

Parks and Recreation Director Barry Smink viewed the program as "a good idea" and one which he said he hopes can be expanded next year. A two-year project, Smink said the work corps has spent the majority of its time constructing the buildings for the tot city and working on the nature trails. "We're just waiting on the delivery of wood chips to finish out the trails," he said.

Smink also said the Parks and Recreation staff will work on the buildings over the winter, adding the finishing touches and final coats of paint.

"The kids have received good working experience and provided input on the project," added Smink. Originally the buildings for the "tot-city" were to

be replicas of Novi's historic buildings. The ten-week summer employment program will be completed August 25 with Bunker and Foley remaining on the job for an additional two weeks.

Smink said he felt the projects achieved what the DNR grant had set out to do. The grant, in the amount of \$31,700, was, according to Smink, "well spent."

Walled Lake officials concerned with increased vandalism in park

Walled Lake officials are becoming increasingly concerned with the amount of vandalism taking place in the city this year, particularly in the city park.

The most recent incident of vandalism occurred over the August 12-13 weekend when extensive damage was reported in the Hiram Sims Memorial Park.

Vandals set fire to a heavy plastic porta-potty on Friday, August 11, completely destroying it. The porta-potty was being rented by the city.

The vandals returned the following Monday and set about the task of destroying several picnic tables in the park which had been constructed by the city's DPW Department.

They came back again on Tuesday to complete the task, reducing all the picnic tables with the exception of one to a pile of lumber scattered around the park grounds.

"The amount of vandalism in the city park is really beginning to get out of hand," commented Cicely Brookover, chairperson of Walled Lake's Parks and Recreation Commission.

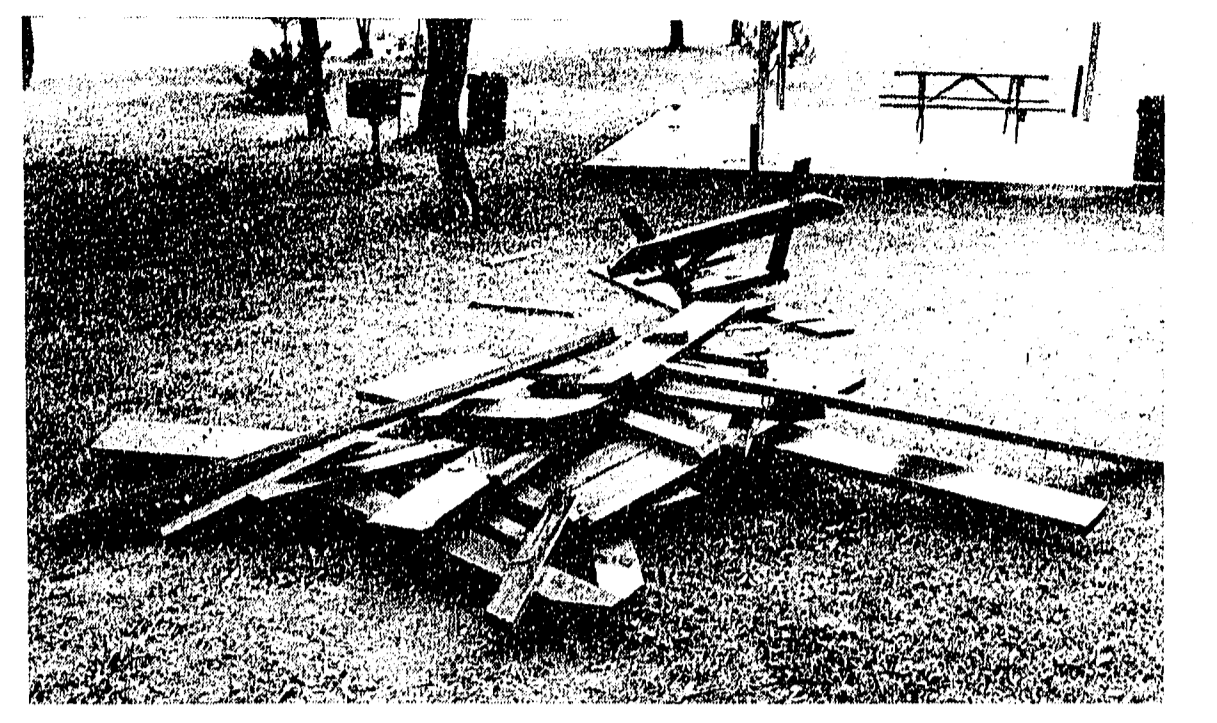
"Whoever is responsible is really working hard at it," she continued. "It must have taken a great deal of work to burn the porta-potty and I'm still not certain how they managed to destroy the picnic tables. They were really very well constructed."

The most recent incidents of vandalism merely add to a long list of incidents in the park over the past two years.

Earlier this year vandals ripped 40 fence posts from recently-poured cement at the park. The fence posts were subsequently dumped in the lake.

In addition, a second entrance gate to the park was torn from its hinges earlier this summer.

Vandals destroyed drinking fountains which had been placed in the park last summer, and a sign marking the entrance to the park lasted approximately one week before it, too, was destroyed.

Walled Lake Schools prepared for September 6 starting date

Students in the Walled Lake School District will mark the start of the 1978-79 school year by returning to classes on Wednesday, September 6.

But there won't be quite as many students attending classes in Walled Lake Schools this year.

Total enrollment in the Walled Lake District reached an all-time high of 11,600 during the 1976-77 school year, but dropped to 11,430 during 1977-78 and is expected to further decline to 11,300 during the 1978-79 school year.

The decline in enrollment over the past two years is reflected in the relatively stable number of staff. There will be just 13 new teachers in the district this year. Approximately 10 new teachers have been hired to replace teachers who have resigned, while three learning disabilities teachers have also been added to the staff.

The major changes in staff involve a shuffling of elementary school principals brought about by the resignations of Wixom Elementary Principal Donald Lamb and Dublin Elementary Principal Ethel Mugler.

Lamb stepped down from the principal's post at Wixom to return to the classroom and Miss Mugler has retired after a career of 29 years of service to the district.

The district has hired Robert James Voss, 31, and Gail M. Stephens, 31, to fill the vacancies in elementary principal positions.

Voss will become principal at Twin Beach and Mrs. Stephens will be Wixom principal at Loon Lake Elementary. Former Twin Beach Principal Robert Pontichiaro has been assigned to Dublin Elementary, while former Loon Lake Principal Bruce Moody will take over at Wixom Elementary.

The other major change in the Walled Lake District this year involves the imminent completion of a \$4.5 million addition to Walled Lake Central High School. The addition was made possible by a \$3.8 million grant from the federal government.

The addition will ultimately include facilities for an expanded science program, vocational education and arts programs, food service, a new gymnasium, and a new library.

The council expressed some concern with the request, however, and asked that Ex-Cell-O revise its request for the industrial development district boundaries so the tax abatement could be limited to the proposed new 60,000 square foot facility instead of the entire 44-acre site.

Stuart, the assistant corporate controller at Ex-Cell-O, announced at the August 15 council meeting that the original 44-acre request had been reduced to a 9.5-acre parcel being considered as the location of the proposed administrative building.

Councilman Thomas Brookover and Walter Lewandowski had led the move for a reduction in the size of the district. Brookover had argued that if the company's request for designation of all 44 acres had been approved, the council would find it difficult to reject subsequent applications from Ex-Cell-O for tax relief certificates for other new buildings or renovations and additions to existing buildings.

Commerce firemen eye own ALS plan

Commerce Township's firemen still want an advanced life support (ALS) program added to the Fire Department, and last week they offered to lead a campaign to have township voters approve additional millage to pay for the service.

Several firefighters showed up at last Tuesday's Township Board meeting to discuss an ALS proposal submitted to Commerce officials by the Fleet Ambulance Service.

However, discussion of Fleet's plan was tabled by the board because Township Attorney Douglas Chartrand had not had an opportunity to prepare a legal opinion on whether Wolverine Lake Village residents would be served by the program. Chartrand said he requested the delay because the question of township financing for the ALS service is "just the tip of the iceberg."

The attorney said there are a number of inconsistencies in state law and court decisions on the type of services that a township must provide to villages within its boundaries.

A legal opinion on whether village residents are entitled to ALS service under a possible township contract also could have an effect on other services, such as sewer and the Lakes Area Special Dial-A-Ride van, Chartrand said.

The firefighters' main concern was whether they would be allowed to continue emergency medical technician training and apply that training to their jobs. If the township enters into a contract with Fleet, the firefighters would be asked to provide a similar program to Commerce for \$24,000 a year and the use of Fire Station Number Two.

The supervisor asked a number of questions of the firemen that appeared to be aimed at getting the firefighters to admit that it would take six or seven men, at an annual salary of about \$25,000 each for wages and benefits, for one-year of training alone.

Village taxes in doubt

A state law that provides for differential millage rates for villages within a charter township is unconstitutional, according to a recent legal opinion issued by Michigan Attorney General Frank Kelley.

Commerce Township officials had asked for an opinion from their attorney on that issue and also on the question of what services the township must provide to village residents who pay the 1.41 mills property tax in addition to a village levy.

Commerce Supervisor Robert Long raised the question to a section of the law that requires a charter township to maintain separate budgets for police and/or fire departments that serve a village and a village, the charter township act also appeared to limit the taxes that could be levied on a village for township services to one mill.

However, Kelley, in an opinion requested by state Representative Ernest W. Nash (R-Diamondale), said it is unconstitutional to allow a "differential millage within the boundaries of a village located within a charter township."

Before the attorney general's opinion was issued July 28, though, the MTA's legal counsel informed Long that, while the law was ambiguous, the "safer course to follow is for the charter township to only levy within the village the amount necessary for general operating purposes up to a maximum of one mill and to contract with the village for the funding of police or fire service or both on the basis of such millage within the village as may be determined to be equitable, thereby leaving it up to the village to levy its own sums or to pay the same out of its own general fund as it may determine in its best interests."

Ex-Cell-O request okayed

Walled Lake's City Council voted August 15 to establish an industrial development district at the request of the Ex-Cell-O Corporation to encourage the location of a proposed addition to the company in Walled Lake.

Creation of the industrial development district will enable Ex-Cell-O to qualify for a 50 percent, 12-year property tax reduction on a proposed \$3 million administration building.

The council's action does not necessarily ensure the construction of the proposed facility in Walled Lake, however.

In requesting the creation of the industrial development district, Ex-Cell-O officials stated that creation of the district would be one of the factors taken into consideration when a final decision on the location of the addition building is made.

The proposed building is expected to contain some 60,000 square feet of office space.

The Troy-based Ex-Cell-O Corporation had initially asked the council to designate its entire 44-acre site on Ladd Wy, county, and school property taxes for 12 years.
