Historic cemetery hunt reveals no headstones

Editor's Note: In the interest of preserving a bit of Novi's past Novi Editor Kathy Jennings and local historian John Richter and his wife Mary recently conducted a search for a nearly forgotten cemetery on Taft Road just north of Nine Mile.

Moss which once covered graves has spread across the odd shaped parcel just north of Nine Mile.

Foundations of a school are still outlined in stone, and somewhere northwest of the building is, or was, a small 10 to 12 plot cemetery.

It has all grown over with tall weeds and bramble bushes, but with a little poking and digging it was hoped a headstone or two might be uncovered.

John Richter provided a prod which when stuck below the surface of the earth sounds when stone has been struck. His shovel which also converts to a pick axe came into use when stone was hit.

The former cemetery site now has about five holes more than it did when we got there, but no headstones

It appeared by the indentations in the ground that bodies and headstones had been removed at sometime

By digging in those areas two small bricks which the Richters identified as marker bricks were uncovered. The markers were used to outline the boundaries of the cemetery, according to Richter.

Near the marker bricks there was another hollow ring as more "stone" was struck with the prod.

It looked like we might be onto something - but it turned out to be the tile septic system for the old school. In another corner of the plot we found junk. Pleces of glass and scrap metal were piled upon other pieces. Apparently, the southwest corner of the piot was used as a dump for the unusable.

And of course a few large rocks were unearthed. Richter wondered aloud whether those dearly departed would begin speaking to us, since we had the

audacity to disturb them after all these years in peace. But none of them seemed to mind. We got no messages from the dead, though it might have been interesting to hear from one - the first Novi Township Supervisor, who is believed to have been laid to his

final rest in that cemetery. Samuel White, served as township supervisor in 1835, 1839, 1843 and 1844. He originally settled the southeast quarter section of section 28 (between Nine and TenMile and Taft and Beck roads.)

Durrant's history of Oakland County, 1877, reports the cometery was known "as the Samuel White Burial Grounds, being gven by him for cemetery purposes. It is immediately adjoining the schoolhouse lot and formerly laid in common with it, but in recent years has been properly enclosed by itself."

White apparently served as the superintendent of the poor at the aims house located in Waterford and was an Oakland County representative to the Constitutional

He deeded the property for a cemetery in 1843. A copy of the original deed places the cemetery as follows: "beginning at the southeast corner of the above described land (that being on the east line of section 28, twenty rods north of the southesast corner in the center of the highway and running south eight degrees thirty minutes west thirteen rods, north one degree thirty minutes west seven rods, north eighty eight degrees thirty minutes east to the center of the highway thence to the place of beginning excepting twenty rods) running south eighty eight degrees thirty minutes west five rods north one degree thirty minutes east to the center of the highway to the place of beginning the same being for a Publick Burial Ground and no

Since the location of the cemetery has been brought to the attention to city officials it is likely developers will not be allowed to build upon that property, according to City Manager Ed Kriewall.

The historic site was found by William Gladden when he traced the deed on the property to determine its ownership.

So where are the headstones from the 137 year old

cemetery? Richter has a number of theories.

"I heard they took the headstones out and carried them to a farm at the corner of Ten Mile and Taft." Richter said. "The stones were turned over with the inscriptions down and used as a walkway between the house and some out buildings."

Richter indicated another possibility he has heard is that the tembatones were used to prop up a women's tollet on the school site to prevent it from settling.

There may be other theories as well. But, in the meantime, the only traces which can be found of the old cemetery areth history books and the memories of Novi's true old timers.

City slates meeting on foster care plans

Meadowbrook Road and in two Novi subdivisions will be discussed in an informational meeting tonight (Thursday) at city ball.

Residents are invited to attend the session at 8 p.m. in the Novi Public Library at Ten Mile and Taft Road.

Novi has received applications to build a home for eight adults on Meadowbrook Road and to establish homes for six adults in existing residences at 24810 Highland Drive in Meadowbrook Glens and at 41548 Tamara in Orchard Hills.

Representatives of Metropolitan Home Services, Inc. and Community Living Services, Inc. who have made application to establish the homes will speak at the meeting along with representatives from the Department of Social Services.

City Attorney David Fried and Father Kevin O'Brien of the Holy Family Catholic Church also have been invited to speak at the meeting.

Tom Miller, community service director for Macomb-Oakland Regional Center, the agency responsible for placing adults in the homes also will be pre-

Last week he explained the type of facility which has been proposed in Orchard Hills and Meadowbrook Glens.

which have been proposed on considerably slower than normal, Miller explained.

It is proposed that six formerly institutionalized adults, probably a mix of female and male adults will reside in of taking a walk on their own. the homes on Tamara and Highland Drive, Müler said.

Residents are placed in the home based upon common interests, approximate common ages and compatability, according to Miller.

Staff members will live with the residents and provide 24 hour supervision, he said. Additional staff members will work in shifts to provide specialized medical needs or training the residents may need.

The live-in staff will not necessarily be a husband and wife team, but they are carefully chosen and screened before being given such a position,

They also receive special training and orientation, as well as on-the-job training, he explained.

"We maintain a 3-1 staff ratio and that is about as good as you can find anywhere in the country," Miller said. Close supervision will be the rule in

accompanied by staff members until it has been determined they are capable

"But I don't think that will happen for guite some time," Miller said.

The Community Service Director said residents likely will not be present in the home during the day.

Those under age 28 attend training classes in special education, while those 27 and older work in sheltered employment situations, Miller said.

Macomb-Oakland Regional Center, affiliated with the state department of social services, has 900 persons under its care, Miller explained.

Of that number 800 have been placed in community homes. The agency has established 175 foster care homes with six or lewer residents and 60 group homes with more than six residents.

"In November we were recognized by President Carter as the number one program for residential placement services and we feel we offer a quality program," Miller said.

"Through this program we try to offor a normal life situation," Miller said. "These people have been warehoused in Institutions with 30 kids for one attendant. In the homes they get a more normal exposure to the community and in the first year there is a phenomenal

Residents air concerns over foster care homes

Nearly 20 concerned residents gathered in the pasement of Michael and Jan Flavin to discuss the news which had disrupted their holidays - a home for mentally retarded adults has

been proposed next door. There were few inflammatory

The group discussed the situation

There was no serious discussion of the violent methods used in other communities to keep such facilities out.

But they all expressed the frustration which causes such violence to erupt. There is a feeling among some

residents in the Orchard Hills subdivision that there is virtually nothing they can do to block establishment of a home which they do not want in their neighborhood

"I've never fought a battle where from the beginning I've felt so defeated." said hostess Jan Flavin. "Everywhere I him there are more walls."

Marilyn Refalo has contacted an attorney who told her there is virtually no legal way the neighbors can prevent establishment of the home.

"He said law suits to keep such homes out of residential areas have been argued all the way to the state Supreme Court and lost. The attorney 1 talked to said we would just be throwing our money away if we tried to fight it in the courts," Refalo said.

She was told the best course of action would be to document incidents which occur after the home has been established and use that information to get its license revoked.

There seemed to be a strong sense retarded or will they be aircholics and that locating an adult feater care home drug addicts? within a subdivision without giving the neighbors any input into that decision is somehow unfair.

"It doesn't seem fair that when you've shopped around to find the home you want, close to a school, in a nice neighborhood, that this can happen," said Betty Davies. "With the price of homes these days we can't afford to

move so we are just trapped." Despite their apparent feeling of futility the residents are doing what they can to show they oppose the home. Some said they "wouldn't feel right if

they didn't give it their best try." They decided to write Senator Doug Ross, Representative Richard Fessler, Oakland County Commissioner Daniel Murphy and Governor William

Milliken. But what primarily emerged from the meeting were many unanswered

questions. It seemed everyone had heard

The image of mentally retarded pecple as drawn by some members of the

group was that of adults who really are children or possibly sexual deviants. Supervision of the residents, that supervisor's background, training and

qualifications were a real concern. Will the "caretakers" live with the residents or will they work in shifts? they asked. How much supervision will there be of these patients? Some people

had heard that the residents of the home will "wander." "Will our streets be safe?" one woman wanted to know.

Probably most disturbing to the residents of Orchard Hills were the conversations with people who said this type of home simply does not work out.

"I talked to a woman who works for Oakland County and asked her what she thought about these homes. She said she definitely would not want them as neighbors - and that's her job," ex-

claimed Davies. The concerned residents discussed the information they had discovered in their quest to find a lever which could be used to stop establishment of the

loster care home. For example, one county employee reportedly informed Davies that adult foster care homes should be located in Ferndale, Southfield or Oak Park because of the proximity of those com-

munities to training facilities. "With the President's request that we park our cars one day a week it seems it would be more feasible to nut these homes close to the training facilities in Pontiac, Farmington and Oak Park," Davies said.

The groups asked William Anglin to represent their concerns in an uncoming meeting sponsored by the city to inform residents of the plans for the three foster care homes proposed in Novi.

It was suggested that a petition be passed door to door in the subdivision. But another resident asked what purpose a petition would serve.

Anglin summed it up, saying "we need to express our opposition for whatever reasons - get as much ammunition as we can muster which is as Questions were raised about the strong as possible and then shoot it at

Postal authorities plan new Novi Road office

Plans for the construction of a new post office in Novi have been announced by the United States Postal Service. Construction of the new building has been scheduled to begin in the summer.

The new post office will be constructed on the former Zukins Catering Service property at 24901 Novi Road. The existing building will be demolished and replaced with a one-story building which encompasses some 8,100 square feet.

The two-acre parcel is tocated on the west side of Novi Road between Ten Mile and the Cao railroad crossing. The property was acquired by the U.S. Postal System several years ago in anticipation of the need for expanded

A contract of \$28,187 has been awarded by U.S. Postal authorities to Lane,

Riebe, Welling Architects of Farmington for design of the building. Plans call for the new post office to be completed and open for business by the summer of 1981. "We need more room, a larger facili-

ty to handle our increased routes and deliveries." expiained Postmaster Neal Lahring. Novi's branch of the U.S. Postal Ser-

vice has doubled its routes in the past five years and nearly doubled its deliveries, he said. The Novi Post Office has been located

in its present facilities at 43111 Grand River Avenue since December 1, 1975. Features of the new post office will be additional interior space to improve overcrowded working conditions. The new site also will provide additional parking facilities.


