## City approves millage vote for recreation

Novi voters will be asked in August to approve a charter amendment which will permit the city to levy up to one-half mill per year for the operation of the Parks and Recreation Department.

Novi City Council members voted 6-1 Monday to put the question before the voters on the primary election ballot.

Voters previously have supported a three-year levy of one-half mill for the Parks and Recreation Department. The levy expires July 1, 1981.

Approval of the proposal would make the Parks and Recreation millage a part of the city charter and allow it to be levied each year without returning to the voters for approval.

Parks and Recreation Director Tom O'Branovic told the council that the parks and recreation commission had considered a number of alternatives before recommending that the size of the millage be retained at one-half mill.

"The half-mill will always be used responsibly," O'Branovic told the council.

All seven council members supported the millage levy for the Parks and Recreation Department, although Council Member Robert Schmid expressed concern with a permanent millage.

Schmid suggested that the voters be asked to approve another three year millage. When that millage expires it could be decided whether the economy and the city's financial position would allow a permanent millage for the department, Schmid proposed.

Additionally, Schmid expressed philosophical opposition to a separate millage for individual departments within the city.

"I have no problem with the department and I hope this millage will pass, but I question whether it's timely," he said. "I think it might be premature. I would prefer that the administration take over the Parks and Recreation Department in two or three years and finance it through the general fund. If the department is viable and there are no more pressing needs within the community, funds will be budgeted."

Schmid said he thought approval of a permanent millage would tie the hands of future councils. Approval of the half-mill request would permit the department to spend the half-mill whether it were needed or not and despite the fact there might be greater needs in the community, he said.

"I can foresee a situation three years from now when we could have fewer police, beautiful parks and no one to maintain them," Schmid said. "My concern is that it should be an administrative responsibility to control the budget and spend the money according to the city's needs — not what is popular. This department may not be necessarily based on our needs two years from now."

However, other council members supported the concept of a permanent millage for parks and recreation.

Council Member Martha Hoyer said she did not believe approval of the charter amendment would reduce the options of future councils.

"The charter language we're considering states the millage 'shall not exceed' one-half mill. If the council feels the department is over budget it can cut the millage levy. The council reviews the budget each year," Hoyer said.

Council Member Patricia Karevich said that although the department has many responsibilities ranging from maintaining the parks to cleaning the community building, the city has been running the Parks and Recreation department for the last few years "with very little money — they've been stretched thin." She added that residents are demanding more from the parks and recreation department. "People are demanding money in this area."

Mayor Romaine Roethel said adopting the ballot proposal might facilitate planning and encourage the parks and recreation department to earmark a portion of each millage levy for land acquisition. "If they can count on a budget for five or six years they might be more likely to set aside a certain amount of funds for land acquisition without having to return to the voters for additional monies."

Council Member Ronald Watson told the council he believed that "sometime we have to make a decision to develop a program and make it a very good program rather than every three years expending effort simply to keep the program alive. That effort being expended over and over might be better used to improve the program."

Council members subsequently voted 6-1 to put the question before the voters. Chambers, Hoyer, Karevich, Smith, Watson and Mayor Roethel supported the action, while the lone dissenting vote was cast by Schmid.

## Novi studies viability of new master plan

Novi will have one of the most diversified commercial/industrial bases in the metro Detroit area if a proposed revision of the master plan is adopted in its present form.

That, at any rate, was the opinion expressed by City Planning Consultant Charles Cairns of Villean-Leman & Associates as the city council and planning board began consideration of an update of the city's master plan at a special joint session last week.

Cairns made the comment in response to questions from Council Member John Chambers about the viability of the proposed master plan revision from a cost-revenue basis.

"What I'm concerned about," said Chambers, "is the economic feasibility of the city we are planning to create."

Specifically, Chambers noted that, after flood plains are removed from "usable" land tables, the proposed master plan calls for 81 percent residential and 19 percent commercial/industrial development.

"I'm concerned about the tax yield," explained Chambers. "Are we going to be able to support that percentage of residential development with that percentage of commercial/industrial development?"

Although Cairns said it was almost impossible to give a definitive answer to the question, he added that the proposed master plan makes Novi somewhat unique in that it proposes an extensive industrial and an extensive commercial tax base.

"This plan should give you a unique industrial/commercial mix," stated the planning consultant. "I don't believe any of your neighbors have the potential that you do here in Novi."

Last week's session marked the start of the city's consideration of a revised master plan which has been prepared by Villean-Leman.

Planning Board Chairman John Roethel noted that portions of the revised master plan have been submitted over the past five years. The city's current master plan was adopted in 1967.

A total of four preliminary studies have been submitted by the planning consultants in conjunction with the revision of the master plan: a commercial/industrial study, a residential study, a land use study and a transportation study.

## Fifth graders love campouts

What's more fun than a slumber party and teaches more about nature than a Euell Gibbons handbook?

Enthusiastic fifth graders in the Novi Schools will tell you its Fifth Grade Camp.

All fifth graders in the school district spend five days at the Walled Lake Outdoor Education Center.

There students combine the academics — math, science, and language arts with their observations of nature, in a setting which provides a new situation for students and staff members who live together 24 hours a day.

Students are divided into three groups and about 85 to 90 students attend camp at one time. Some groups attend winter camp and others visit the camp in spring. The final session of the school year is being taught this week.

Planning the camp program is done by a group of 10 teachers who work together, but who divide the administration of the three-campgrounds and are responsible for their own session.

Experts are brought to camp to give students first hand learning experiences. Geology, wild flower, and survival experts are an example of the type of consultants who speak to students.

Middle School North Principal Paul LePlae reports the program offers students who may not excel in other areas a chance to demonstrate some of their strengths. Camp can serve as a positive socializing event for many students for whom camp is their first time away from home, LePlae said.

Visitors to the camp are likely to find groups engaged in various activities. One group may be preparing for a hike to seek out wild flowers,

while another is learning what kinds of creatures they can find in a fallen log. A third group could be learning about solar energy and some students will be playing four-square or doing needle work.

One camp favorite is Samoa Moa — the youngsters who have worn the snake around their neck will tell an interested observer the snake has 30 ribs.

When not otherwise occupied some students merely sit and watch the snake. Donna Peters, Colleen Schmidt, Genal Kucera, Todd McNary, Tabatha Lockwood, Rebecca Killich, Kelly MacArthur, April See, and Charles Kauter were watching Samoa last week as they waited for Fallen Log class to get underway.

Fallen log class is one which was taught during the April 23 camp session taught by Glen Walthall. Students find a fallen log in the woods, hack it apart and take pieces of it back to the class room to see the creatures inside, Walthall explained.

A similar class is conducted which is called Pond Water. Students are given the opportunity to view amoebas, algae and other organisms through a microscope.

Before such classes students are shown film strips or movies to demonstrate the types of organisms they will be looking for.

Walthall indicated students are intrigued by the Owl Pellet activity. Since owls eat live animals they cannot digest the entire creature. So they regurgitate pellets. Students locate these pellets in the woods and open them up. Inside are skulls, bones and teeth of the animal consumed by the owl.

Mary Knauer, another fifth grade teacher, reported the evening activities also are enjoyed

by the students. A sing-a-long, square dancing, a magic show and night hikes counted among the evening events.

Many parents visit the camp during the evening and a large number of them put on night-time activities for the students, Knauer said.

"The kids really get excited about camp," Knauer said. "It really gives them a chance to get to know one another and socialize. These kids are 10 and 11 years old so for many of them it's a new experience."

Administrators may praise the program, but the real enthusiasts are the fifth graders. Some may complain about the food, but everyone agrees camp is fun.

"I think quiet time is the most fun," said Donna Peters. She also enjoyed the hiking trails with wildflowers and trees.

Stephanie Unangst said she thought the night hikes — walking down the trails without lights in order to learn to listen while walking — were the best activity. "They're spooky. I fell down seven times the last time I went out."

Cindy Taylor said she learned during the survival presentation that "the most thing to be scared of when you're lost in the woods is yourself. People just panic and if they hear a rescue coming they'll run the other way."

Patty Lenaghan thought the hiking was one of the best parts of camp. "There are so many pretty, beautiful flowers," Patty said.

She recounted a story of Dutch Breeches she learned on the wild-flower hike.

"The Dutchmen's wife hung up tetry husband's pants by the ankles. Their pants froze during the night so when the Dutchmen put on their pants they walked with stiff legs. It sounds strange, but it's true."

## From accreditation team

# Novi schools receive top grades

Novi High School — its staff, programs, and facilities — apparently dazzled members of the North Central Accreditation team which evaluated the total offerings of the school in January.

In a written report of its findings during the evaluation, members of the visiting team repeatedly complimented the staff for its enthusiasm and admired the school facility itself.

A summary of the review prepared by Dr. Lloyd Peterson who chaired the evaluation team, stated there are several major strengths at Novi High School upon which the school and community can build as they continue their efforts to improve education for students. Those strengths include:

- a highly dedicated, competent and experienced teaching staff;
- outstanding administrators who are not only capable and well-organized, but who also have the respect and confidence of students and staff;

• a supportive and involved community that has a high level of expectation of the schools;

• a student body that for the most part exhibited positive attitudes toward their teachers, their school and their education;

• a well-organized and supportive central administration along with a very competent board of education dedicated to the very highest principles of good education; and

• a community with potential for growth. The relatively slow growth of the population should give the school opportunities for continued improvement and lead time to do the planning well, the accreditation team stated in its report.

Specifically, the team reviewed the philosophy and objectives of the school and its curriculum. Reviews were made of guidance services, library and audio visual facilities and materials. Evaluations of school-community relations and the qualifications of staff

members also were made. An evaluation of course work was included.

Relations between the school and community are positive, according to the report presented by the accreditation team. "The school seems to function consistently with the philosophy and objectives that have been set forth. The school also maintains a wide variety of student activities which are supported by many students," the educators stated.

The evaluation team also reported that "parents are pleased with the excellent lines of communication between the school and the home and there seems to be mutual respect between administration and staff in carrying out the educational program."

Regarding educational offerings, the team said the program is conducted "in a fine spacious and well-designed physical plant creating an excellent learning environment."

"The overall success of the instruction program is mirrored in the respect

demonstrated by the student body toward the school and teaching staff.

"The school itself has approximately 120 course offerings, providing a tremendous variety of educational experiences for a relatively small high school. These many offerings, combined with the Novi School District's association with the Southwest Oakland Vocational Education Center, more than adequately meet the needs of a very high percentage of the student body."

The North Central team also stated that the "strengths of the educational program include the organizational structure of the curriculum council which provides an on-going vehicle for evaluation and change of the educational program. Additionally, the curriculum process exhibits a responsiveness to students, parents, community and staff. The diversity of the educational program and the talents of

Applications coming in

Search begins for superintendent

Applications for the job of superintendent of Novi Schools have begun to trickle in. Dr. Evert Ardis, chief consultant heading the search for a replacement for Superintendent Gerald Kratz, reported that his office has been receiving a few applications every day since the announcement of the opening. To date 28 persons have applied for the position. Twenty-three of the applicants are from Michigan and three are from Connecticut, Illinois, Kentucky, New York and Ohio. Applications will be accepted until May 16. Ardis indicated earlier that he expects 100 to 125 applicants for the position.

Under the terms of the contract, the district has agreed to pay consultant fees of \$3,000. The fee includes \$100 per day for meals, mileage, postage, telephone and supplies. It also includes \$400 for the clerical services of Ardis' co-worker Jacqueline Terpestra who will be processing, filing, corresponding and organizing materials throughout the search.

Board members also agreed that they need to sit down with the consultants before the preliminary screening of candidates in order to insure that the consultants are aware of the qualities the board is seeking in its next superintendent. Board President Ron Milam indicated the board also hopes to discuss the candidates which survive the consultant's initial screening before the board begins the interviewing process.

Merits of the top 20 candidates rather than the top six as chosen by the consultants. It was pointed out that all applications will be available for all board members to review, however. Milam said a meeting with the consultants may prove worthwhile since there may be as many ideas of what qualities are needed in a superintendent as there are school board members.

Schools score high

Continued from Nov 1, the teaching staff allows for a high degree of student success. Individual curricular offerings were reviewed in detail and team members pointed out strengths and weaknesses in each area. Visiting team members also made recommendations for improving the programs at Novi High School. They suggested that in a number of areas such as science and physical education the full potential of the high school facilities are not being realized. It was suggested that available facilities will be used more fully as school enrollment increases.

Greater communications between the high school and middle school to improve a continuity in programming also was suggested. The purchase of more audio-visual equipment in a number of areas, especially in the library was recommended. It was noted that the wide diversity of course offerings are both a strength and a weakness. The number of courses offered has created student scheduling problems and the team noted that a wide variety of courses is useless if the students are not able to schedule them.

Permit request still pending

Pizza Company owners agree to remove marina

The Union Lake Beach Club has agreed to remove its marina dock behind the Pizza Company restaurant pending review of a permit application to operate the facility by the Michigan Department of Natural Resources (DNR).

The Beach Club applied for a permit for a 39-slip marina earlier this year. The Union Lake Shores Association, representing some 700 homeowners, said the firm may install temporary docks until a decision is made on issuing a permit for the facility.

The state agency issued a permit April 23 for the 48-slip Sports Village marina on Union Lake, immediately south of the Beach Club. The permit may be challenged, though, by the Union Lake homeowners who opposed its issuance.

In fact, the DNR said that the benefits of recreational boating opportunities would outweigh the "minimal resource degradation" of the lake. A boat livery operation of some sort has been operated on the Sports Village site for about 25 years.

### It pays to keep track of those records

By JEAN DAY

The day of reckoning has passed. You finally computed whether you owed Uncle Sam or whether he owed you for 1979, and the return was mailed — by April 15 if you owed, and probably earlier if you expect a refund.

The checks, statements and receipts used to compute the 1979 income taxes have been shoveled aside. Hopefully, they weren't put in the waste basket.

Whether you paid or are in line for a refund, those papers still can't be dumped. Ideally, they should be saved in an envelope with the income tax return for the year to which these papers pertain.

Save them with records of the 1977 and 1978 returns. They can't be thrown out yet either.

According to tax preparers, some records should be retained almost forever. Others have accepted time limits.

Northville City Attorney Philip Ogilvie, who in private practice does tax work for his clients, offers some limits for record keeping that apply to most Michigan residents.

Depending on material, most papers should be retained three or six years. "Forever" applies to documents like house transactions which should be kept as long as you own the house — and

for three years after selling it.

But unless you have room to store ever-increasing amounts of paper work, some annual culling-out is in order. Right after income tax time in the midst of spring cleaning is as good a time as any.

Otherwise, you may leave your children or other heirs a mountain of material to dig through to find significant records.

Here are the attorney's responses to specific records:

#### CANCELED CHECKS

Keep checks that involve any consumer dealing which may be in question for six years. That is the statute of limitation for commercial transactions. After that, you generally can't be questioned.

Being practical, a year is long enough to keep utility and department store proof of payment because each monthly statement indicates any past due bill. The 12 months provide a record of a year's heating and utility costs.

Before throwing away department store receipts, however, it is good business to sort through and keep records of any purchases classified as home improvements. File these with house papers. Include checks for any capital improvements, such as a new

furnace or kitchen remodeling (but not a new washer or dryer, which may not be claimed as improvements).

Keeping such home records is especially important if you are not 55 or older and expecting to claim the once-in-a-lifetime tax forgiveness.

Any business-related receipts, such as for a new typewriter, if you use it for work at home, also should be retained.

#### CHARITY DONATION RECEIPTS

The receipt given you by a church for rummage sale items or the statement from your local historical society for a valuable gift as well as paid church pledge statements should be kept with income tax records for three years.

The attorney adds that the donor should "hope they don't claim fraud — for fraud has no statute of limitations."

#### CREDIT CARD RECEIPTS

These also should be retained for three years if they are used to claim legitimate expenses, such as gasoline for business or entertaining bills.

People who own their own businesses and doctors and lawyers, especially, are likely to have returns questioned and will need this proof.

Right now, Ogilvie points out, the government is auditing returns from 1976.

"Don't think that when you received your refund check, you were home free. That only indicated that the mathematics had been computer checked. The government has three years to question the return statements."

#### HOSPITAL RECORDS

Actual dates of hospitalization, names of physicians and other professionals who treated the patient can be as important as the paid bill. If it becomes a court case later, such information can be used to force the hospital to divulge its records, the attorney explains.

If there is any question at all, keep them longer than the normal six years.

#### INSURANCE POLICIES

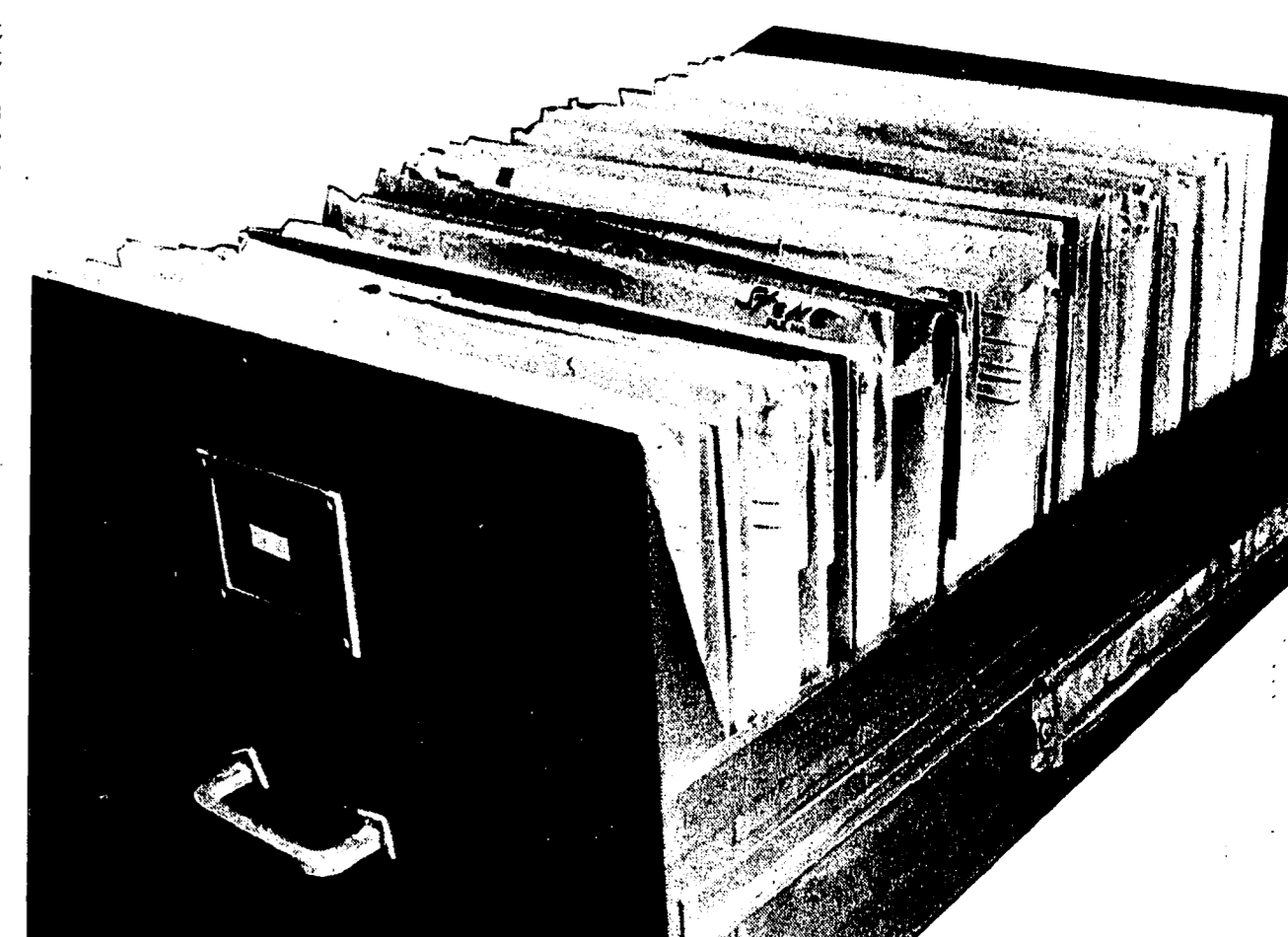
Keep automobile policies only until you sell the vehicle unless you have been involved in an accident during the time you owned the car.

Keep life insurance policies for as long as they are in force.

#### TRIP RECEIPTS

Believe it or not, keep that hotel bill from Chicago or Acapulco with your records for six years. Again, that is the limit for civil action.

I thought I finally had Brian Martin on the ropes this time. The sports editor of another newspaper in this chain — The Brighton Argus — Martin is forever bragging about the allegedly "superior" high school teams that exist in his coverage area. He never fails to remind me when a Brighton, Howell, Pinckney or Hartland team has jumped all over our Novi Wildcats, and how much more enjoyable it is to write about "his" schools.

Well, you can imagine my delight when I heard last week via Jim Haynes, our Novi sportswriter, that not only had Novi's Tracy Sobkow no-hit the Pinckney Pirates in softball, Wildcat Bill Bishop had no-hit Pinckney in baseball. This time it'd be Martin who'd have to do the explaining.

Naturally, my opening line upon seeing Martin last Tuesday was creative and imaginative. "Heard your Pinckney baseball team got no-hit by Novi," I said in my best how's-the-weather tone.

"No they didn't," was Martin's quick-witted reply. "(Pirate Coach) Gary Eddings told me that Pinckney had a hit in that game. I don't know what you're talking about."

Okay, I thought, the guy's determined to deny me my moment of triumph. But after replaying our snappy dialogue in my head, I came away with the feeling that he wasn't putting me on.

My suspicions were confirmed the next day when I read the Argus story. "Novi one-hits Pirates." I then decided that in the interest of good, investigative reporting, I'd best find out what was going on.

I heard from Novi Coach Bob Weinburger first. He said that a controversial official scoring decision occurred in the third inning of the Pinckney game (which everyone agrees was won by the Wildcats, 4-2) where a ball was hit to third base. According to Weinburger, the Pinckney batter hit a soft line drive to the Wildcat third sacker, who proceeded to misjudge the speed of the ball.

In his attempt to field the sphere, Weinburger continued, the infielder first went down for the low-hit ball and then came up too fast, thinking it was hit harder than it really was. As a result, the coach said, the ball went through his legs untouched for an error.

"You have different judgments on those kinds of balls all the time," Weinburger said, "even in the major leagues. And if I were in his (Eddings') position I'd have called it a hit, too."

"But I talked to the kid who was keeping score, and I even talked to the umpires after the game," he continued. "They all said the ball was definitely an error. Besides, the first hit of a game should be a decent one."

On the other side, Eddings did apparently agree with Weinburger regarding the nature of the play itself. He said that the ball in question was "a one-hopper that nobody touched. He didn't even get his hands on it."

"But if the kid had dribbled it or even ticked it," Eddings added, "that would have been different. As long as he can't touch that ball, though, it's a hit. It doesn't matter to me if he (Weinburger) wants it to be a no-hitter, but I can't tell my kid that that's not a hit."

So is it a no-hitter or not? Well, based on what those coaches say, I'd guess it depends which team you root for. But as a point of fact — not bias — it should be mentioned that the home team (Novi, in this case) is traditionally the official scorer under baseball rules.

Incidentally, I didn't see any report on the Novi softball no-hitter against Pinckney in last week's Argus. And you can bet that I won't ask Brian Martin about it, either.
