Census figures show population near 22,000

The last time a Federal census was conducted in Novi there were 9,868 residents. Ten years later preliminary figures from the U.S. Bureau of Census show the population has shot up 124 percent.

When final figures come in it is expected Novi's population will have climbed to more than 22,000 residents, according to Assistant City Manager Alex Allie.

And that figure is an increase over the special census just completed by the city as recently as August of last year. In that tabulation, the city counted 20,274 residents.

Unofficial figures released by the

census bureau last week show 21,567 residents locally, but city officials believe that when the errors in enumerating are resolved the population will reach at least 22,000.

Preliminary figures from the federal census now are being reviewed by the city to determine whether a recount is needed in specific areas within the city, Allie said.

It appears census counters did not include residents in five township parcels, which were annexed to the city last year, in the preliminary figures. Although residents in the largest former township parcel — Chateau Estates — were properly counted as

residents of the city, Allie said.

It also appears mistakes in enumeration occurred west of Beck Road, he said.

Despite the rapid population increase, the figures really held no surprises for the city, Allie said. He said the numbers are consistent with historical trends and city projections.

"If there were any surprises it was that the average number of persons per household dropped from 3.60 to 2.79. It shows that people who have moved here in the '70s don't have as many children. But that is just a reflection of national trends," Allie said.

Federal census bureau figures show

that in addition to a population of at least 21,567 residents, there are 657 vacant homes in the city. Assuming that those new homes will be occupied this year and each will have 2.79 residents, there should be 23,500 residents in Novi by April 1981, Allie projected.

Beyond next year the city probably can expect even greater annual population growth, he predicted.

"The city's growth has been fairly consistent since 1975. If the economy turns and housing rebounds we can expect, based upon the 2,500 plots for residential homes on the books, to experience even higher growth years in the future," Allie said.

He added that dramatic increases should be seen if the city population growth follows the same pattern it did after the 1975 recession.

"After the economy turned in 1976 and 1977 our growth doubled. Activity could be light at the beginning of 1981, but after that we should start seeing growth in the subdivisions that are now in various stages of development," Allie said.

The latest population counts also will prove important in the city's financial picture.

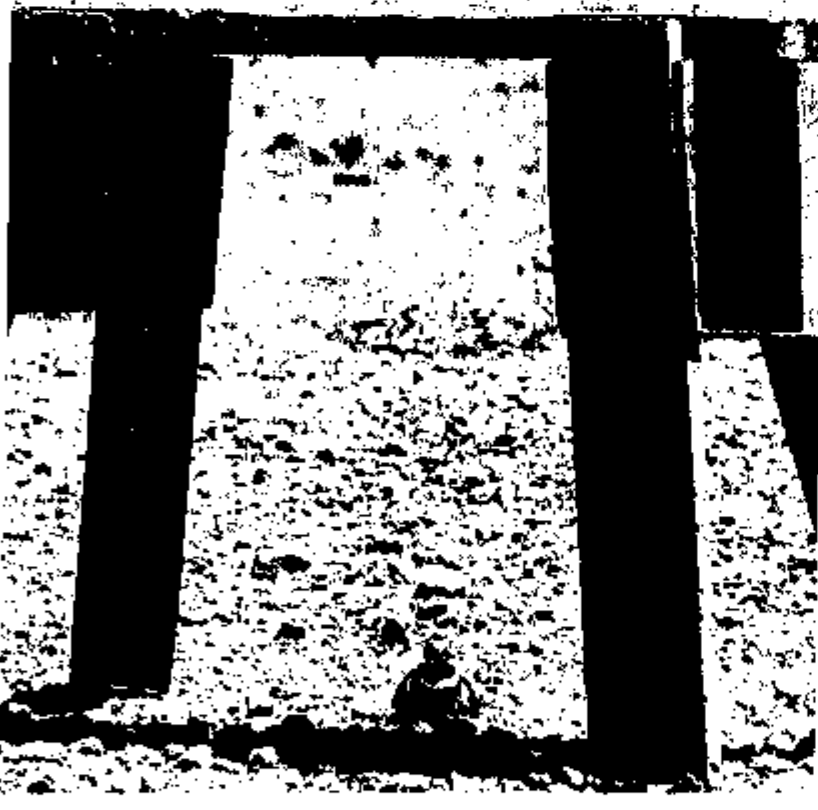
Population figures are used in various federal and state formulas in determining the amount of aid to which

a municipality is entitled.

For example, Act 51 monies (state funds collected through gasoline taxes which revert to the local municipality based on the number of miles of major and local roads and the community's population) could be expected to increase as much as 124 percent.

The gasoline taxes which revert to the city are based on a formula which considers only the population counted in the 10 year census. Funds the city now is receiving under Act 51 are based upon the 1970 count of 9,600 residents.

Federal revenue sharing also will be affected by the increased population count, Allie noted.



Feathered parishioner

Car dealers eyed on Grand River

A proposal to create a special "auto dealership" district along the south side of Grand River Avenue between Novi and Meadowbrook roads has received a less than enthusiastic review from the Novi City Council and Planning Board.

The "auto dealership" proposal was presented by City Planning Consultant Charles Cairns last week in response to a request from the council to study the potential for general commercial development along the Grand River strip between Novi and Meadowbrook roads.

Cairns told Novi officials last week that his "auto dealership" proposal was based in part on the knowledge that the city will receive a site plan for a proposed automobile dealership on the south side of Grand River within "the near future."

The concept of grouping automobile dealerships in a single area was adopted by Novi officials several years ago when the Regional Center Area Development Plan was adopted.

Specifically, that plan called for an area at the northwest corner of the Novi Road/1-96 interchange to be developed as a planned automotive sales and service complex.

Cairns noted last week that only one new car dealership has been erected in the regional center area and that it remains unoccupied to date.

The planning consultant noted further that several other major land type uses — including a motor inn — have since been proposed on the area originally intended for development as a automotive sales and service complex.

"We remain of the opinion that a consolidation or grouping of automotive

sales and service uses in a particular area can be advantageous from a planning standpoint," said Cairns in his comments last week.

"And, if the area originally proposed for such uses becomes occupied with other land use types, another area should then be investigated for potential automotive sales and service development."

Such an area, he suggested, may well be the Grand River Avenue frontage west of Meadowbrook Road.

"As an extension of the proposed non-center commercial area at the Novi Road/Grand River intersection, a planned automotive sales and service uses could be a substantial economic enhancement to the area," said Cairns. The existing commercial zoning along the south side of Grand River extends to a depth of 340 feet.

Cairns stated last week, however, that if the "auto dealership" proposal is adopted, the commercial district should be extended to a depth of 500 feet to provide adequate room for the dealerships with increased setback requirements.

Additionally, Cairns proposed that a 1,000 foot strip of land between the Grand River frontage and the single-family residential subdivisions (Meadowbrook Glens) to the south be zoned to multiple-family in order to provide proper transition.

Council Member Robert Schmid and Planning Board Chairman John Roethel expressed opposition to creating an "auto dealership" district along the south side of Grand River.

Schmid, who had asked Cairns to study the commercial development

Windows open for breeze tempt summer thieves

Summertime and the pickin' are easy — for the thief who finds unsecured windows and doors left open to allow a breeze through the house.

Novi police report that the Willowbrook subdivision has been hit particularly hard in recent weeks by thieves who gain entry to homes by popping out screens or finding a door or window which has not been locked.

Detective Lieutenant Richard Faulkner reported that police have logged several cases which seem to follow the pattern of the thief entering through an open window.

Last week a thief entered an open window above the kitchen sink in a residence on the 2000 block of LeBost. The screen had been removed and left propped against the house. The thief made off with \$300 in assorted change found in various places throughout the house, according to police.

A brown wooden bank containing \$100 in change was taken from the master bedroom along with a plastic box which also contained \$100 in change. A cosmetic case worth about \$50 was also removed. In a second bedroom three small banks containing change and a coffee can full of pennies, together worth approximately \$100, were taken.

In a similar incident a window screen was pried off another residence in the 2000 block of LeBost on June 15. In this case \$22 worth of alcoholic beverages, including Amaretto and beer, were stolen.

Various alcoholic beverages also were stolen from another nearby residence in a break-in June 12. Police reported a twelve-pack of beer, a six-pack of beer, and bottles of wine and Cold Duck were stolen in the incident.

In a break-in which occurred June 10,

an estimated \$395 worth of merchandise was stolen from yet another residence in the 2000 block of LeBost.

The responsible parties gained entry to the home by cutting through a screen on the bathroom window. Taken in the heist was a \$300 pearl necklace, a \$70 radio, \$18 worth of cigarettes and \$17 worth of alcoholic beverages.

Faulkner warned residents that the best way to prevent such incidents is to make certain that all doors and windows are secured at night or before leaving the house.

EDC gives Sheraton initial okay

There may be a Sheraton in Novi's future.

Gerald Abel, who has announced plans to develop a hotel in the city's regional center area, told the Novi Economic Development Corporation (EDC) last week that the facility will be affiliated with the Sheraton chain, according to City Clerk Gerri Stipp.

Abel appeared before the EDC last Thursday to request approval of a resolution of inducement to finance construction of the proposed hotel.

The hotel is slated for construction on a six-acre parcel on the west side of Novi Road (opposite the Twelve Oaks Mall) near the I-96 interchange.

The proposed 234-unit hotel already has received preliminary site plan ap-

proval from the Novi Planning Board.

Members of the EDC voted unanimously last week to approve a resolution of inducement for the facility, according to Stipp. The amount of EDC financing has been set at \$8 million.

The resolution of inducement is the first official step in obtaining EDC

financing. In essence, approval of the inducement resolution signifies that the EDC is interested in the project and "induces" the applicant to proceed through the necessary steps.

As a unit of municipal government, an EDC can issue tax-free revenue bonds to assist with the construction of commercial and industrial projects. Since lending institutions do not have to pay taxes on interest earned from the loan, they typically offer the lender an interest rate that is two to three points lower than is available under conventional mortgages.

The EDC retains ownership of the completed facility until the loan has been retired through payments from the company. Public funds cannot be used to retire EDC loans and the city's credit rating is not affected.

While Abel is attempting to secure final site plan approval and EDC financing for the hotel, there is no new word on his application for one of the city's two remaining Class B (Hotel) liquor licenses.

Novi's City Council last year adopted guidelines for awarding liquor licenses which give top priority to hotels and convention facilities which contain more than 250 units.

Since the hotel proposed by Abel contains less than the 250-units designated in the guidelines, the city is considering whether the standard should be waived.

Robbery suspect released on bond

A 20-year old Farmington Hills man charged in connection with an armed robbery of the Detroit Bank-Novu branch has been released on bond.

Bert S. Bedrosian appeared for examination before 52nd District Court Judge Martin Boyle Thursday.

He was charged with two felonies including one count of armed robbery and one count of kidnapping. He also faced charges on two counts of possession of a firearm in the commission of a felony.

The armed robbery and kidnapping charges both carry maximum sentences of life imprisonment. Possession of a firearm in the commission of a felony carries a mandatory two-year jail term.

Bedrosian was bound over to circuit court on all four charges. He will be ar-

raigned before Judge James S. Thornburn on July 14.

The suspect was released after posting bond. Boyle reduced the \$100,000 cash surety bond which kept Bedrosian in jail since the time he allegedly tried to rob the bank on March 21.

Upon completion of defense arguments during the examination Bedrosian's attorney asked that the bond be reduced. Boyle agreed and the new bond was set at \$40,000 with release being granted after posting 10 percent, or \$4,000.

Bedrosian is charged with entering the Detroit Bank-Novu trailer in the regional center area, wearing a stocking cap and carrying a hand gun.

According to police, Bedrosian

ordered six employees to lie on the floor and then directed Bank President Willard Oliver to remove the money from the cash drawer and safe.

Police allege the men then took the bank president hostage and tried to escape with nearly \$50,000 in cash.

After exiting the bank the Oliver struggled with his captor in an attempt to disarm him. Police officers on the scene fired a warning shot at the suspect who then gave up and dropped his gun to the ground, according to reports.

All the stolen money was recovered.

Novi Police Officers Diane MacGregor and Dennis Jelly, who played a major part in the arrest after being the first to respond to the scene, were commended for their actions by the Novi City Council Monday.



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Master plan review concluded

Novi council divided on residential density levels

Novi's City Council concluded its study of a proposed revision of the city's master plan last week with an occasionally heated dispute over residential density levels.

The council has been reviewing the revised master plan in a series of special joint sessions with the planning board over the past two months in an effort to arrive at a general consensus over which direction the city should take with land use development.

Although the responsibility for approving the master plan rests with the planning board, it is the responsibility of the council to implement the plan through its rezoning actions.

Changes recommended by both the council and planning board will be made to the proposed revised master plan which will be put in final form prior to official adoption.

The planners must still schedule a public hearing before the revised master plan can be adopted.

The final joint study session between

the council and planning board last week ended with an impasse over proposed residential density levels.

The impasse centered around what density level should be ascribed to the section of land that lies between Taft and Beck roads on the east and west and Ten and Eleven Mile on the south and north.

The discussion apparently was prompted by James Shaw, a former council member, who noted that the revised master plan proposes R-4 (3.3 dwelling units per acre) on the east side of Beck Road and R-1 (6.5 dwelling units per acre) on the west side of Beck Road.

Shaw said he questioned the advisability of placing the R-4 district immediately adjacent to the R-1 district.

"The master plan is setting the tone for the development of the entire city," said Shaw. "I perceive the present proposal will lead to incredible intensity of development in this area."

"By creating high density levels through the R-4 zoning, you're also in-

creasing the intensification of commercial development to service the demands that come with a high concentration of residents."

Shaw added that he was concerned that the city's lowest density levels have been proposed along the borders of Northville and West Bloomfield, while the highest density levels have been proposed along the Ten Mile corridor.

"I'm concerned about what is happening to the heart of our community," he said.

Council Member Martha Hoyer noted that an R-3 (2.9 dwelling units per acre) zoning is proposed on the city's existing master plan for Section 21 (the section between Taft/Beck and Ten/Eleven Mile) and asked why the revision of the master plan now proposes the R-4 zoning designation.

City Planning Consultant Charles Cairns said he believed the R-3 designation has viability, but that he had inserted the R-4 designation on the revised master plan in order to conform with two previous rezoning actions.

In an apparent effort to respond to Shaw's request for a "mix" of density levels, Council Member John Chambers made a proposal to lower density levels south of Nine Mile and north of 10 1/2 Mile in the southwest quadrant of the city.

The proposal was opposed by Council Members Ronald Watson and Robert Schmid who proposed that R-3 (2.9) be inserted along the east side of Beck Road between Ten and Eleven Mile.

The proposal was by Watson and Schmid was opposed by Michael

Sheldon who pointed out that the owner of a 100-acre parcel on the southeast corner of the Ten Mile/Beck Road intersection has entered into a payback agreement to provide sewer taps for his property based on the existing R-4 density levels.

The council ultimately split 3-3 on the issue of density levels along the east side of Beck Road between Ten and Eleven Mile.

Chambers, Hoyer and Mayor Romaine Roethel expressed a preference for the R-4 (3.3 dwelling unit per acre) density level along the east side of Beck Road. And Watson, Schmid and Guy Smith expressed a preference for the R-3 (2.9 dwelling unit per acre) on the east side of Beck Road.

As a result of the impasse, it is unclear at this time as to what density levels will be proposed on the master plan for Section 21. However, the issue seems likely to be debated further prior to official adoption of the new master plan.

Painting the community center was proposed by the city's Parks and Recreation Department in recognition of National Parks and Recreation Month, according to Director Tom O'Branovic. And as far as he's concerned, the project was a success.

"We got the building completely painted — it makes a big difference. It was a beautiful day and we got a lot accomplished," O'Branovic said.

"For our first real effort of the year I'd say it was fairly successful. We hope to continue this kind of activity and get

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ORDINANCE NO. 145A-11

AN ORDINANCE AMENDING Section 8.8 of Ordinance No. 145 of the City of Walled Lake known as the Walled Lake Water Supply Section 1, Amendment.

Section 8.8 of Ordinance No. 145 is hereby amended to read as follows:

8.8 The City shall pay for all water used by it at the established rates except that for fire hydrant rental it shall pay \$50.00 per year for equal quarterly installments.

All Ordinances or parts of Ordinances in conflict herewith are hereby repealed only to the extent necessary to give this Ordinance full force and effect.

Section 3. Severability.

Should any Section, subdivision, clause, or phrase of this ordinance be declared by the courts to be invalid, the same shall not affect the validity of the Ordinance as a whole, or any part thereof, other than the part so invalidated.

Section 4. Effective Date.

The provisions of this Ordinance are hereby ordered to take effect twenty (20) days after its adoption or upon publication in the manner prescribed by the Charter of the City of Walled Lake, whichever shall be the later date.

Section 5. Savings.

All proceedings pending and all rights and liabilities existing, acquired, or incurred at the time this amendatory ordinance takes effect are saved and may be consummated according to the law in force when they were commenced.

City road projects awaiting funds

Efforts to secure funding for proposed highway construction projects in Walled Lake have advanced to the next step, according to a report issued to the city council by City Manager Peter Parker.

Along the list is a proposed project for the resurfacing of East Walled Lake Drive between Ferland and Fourteen Mile. The Oakland County Urban System Task Force has given the project a "priority A" rating which, according to Parker, gives it "a great deal more priority" when funds are awarded.

The cost for the project is estimated at \$100,000 and is under review by SEMCOG until August 29, when the Executive Committee will endorse it and forward it to funding agencies, according to Parker's report.

Parker said he assumed the next step in the process would send the East Walled Lake Drive proposal to the state.

Federal Highway funds take effect October 1 and the future of the project will become more definitive on that date.

"Council decided to wait until spring of 1981 before beginning the project," Parker said. "After October 1, we will know the amount of money available. That's a fact."

Prioritizations are established through the Transportation Improvement Plan (TIP), Parker said. The plan indicates needs of the community as a factor.

Also under consideration are six other projects:

- a non-motorized path for both Pontiac Trail and Fourteen Mile estimated at \$45,000
- construction for Barnston at Pontiac Trail
- construction for Pontiac Trail at Decker
- new construction for Maple Road preliminary engineering
- sidewalk construction for Pontiac Trail between Wellsboro and South Commerce Road
- The non-motorized path for Pontiac Trail and Fourteen Mile has been set as a "priority B."

This means that federal funds for these projects are not available at this time and will be taken under consideration upon allocation of new funding, according to Parker.

The remaining projects will be submitted to SEMCOG, Parker said. Changes in the status of the remaining projects are due to the inability of the Oakland County Road Commission to participate financially, the city manager reported.

Because of this, Walled Lake will be responsible for the non-federal share of the projects in the TIP fiscal year 1982-83 program submitted to SEMCOG.

Township, firefighters reach heat agreement

Firefighters in Commerce Township have advised Supervisor Robert Long that a grievance filed against the township has been dropped.

The grievance, dated May 13 and supposedly filed nine days later, asked the township to take appropriate action concerning erratic temperature maintenance from pre-set thermostats in fire station living quarters.

The complaint, which had entered its third and final phase prior to arbitration, was submitted by firemen Todd Martin, Jerry Thompson and William Kabinzinski.

According to temperature readings taken by various firefighters, temperatures in the living quarters of the fire stations were recorded at under 60 degrees and as low as 55 some June nights.

The decision to cut the grievance short of an arbitrator's judgment was made in response to the township's having a heating specialist examine the sites in question.

Stephen Lyons, president of the local firefighters union, told The News last Friday that the grievance would probably be dropped, following the specialist's visit last Tuesday, June 24.

"Since they (township officials) have made an effort, we will probably write a letter to Mr. Long telling him it's been dropped," Lyons said.

Long was submitted the letter Monday, saying he had received information that the grievance had been discontinued.

Long added that on the day the heating specialist visited the fire stations, he told Lyons the thermostats could be changed immediately. The thermostats have not yet been altered, but Lyons indicated that the action taken by the township seemed satisfactory.

Lyons had previously said that the grievance would continue and would not stop "until those things (the pre-set thermostats) are out."

Firefighters had claimed that part of the bitterness erupting over the thermostat regulators' installation was that they were never consulted.

"They didn't even bother to ask us to be aware of temperature conditions," Lyons had pointed out.

Last Tuesday morning, the firefighters' grievance entered a final phase leaving only 15 days between themselves and an arbitrator's decision. Firefighters were seeking maintenance of the temperature to fall at least within President Carter's energy conservation standards, even though fire stations are among those municipal buildings exempt from these guidelines.

Lyons claimed that only two fire stations had the pre-set instruments while the township hall and deputy's office among other municipal buildings, were equipped with manual thermostats. Township Clerk Robert McGee had denied that accusation at Commerce's Board of Trustees meeting June 10.

The board agreed at its May 13 meeting that something had to be done about the situation, but by its June gathering no action had been taken.

Lyons verified that repairs were not planned for the stations until fall. The township supervisor explained that he thought heating work could not be performed adequately during the summer. Firefighters Martin and Thompson told the board June 10 that morale in the fire department was deteriorating, and that a lack of action was costing the community's taxpayers money in the form of sick pay.

"I have stood by the oven to keep myself warm and I will continue to stand by the oven until someone does something," Thompson told the board, before asking it take immediate action.

Following discussion the board unanimously passed a new motion giving immediate attention to the examination and repairing of the fire stations' furnaces. Long requested that Fire Chief Clarence Kutikuhn get someone to examine the heating systems in all three of the township's fire stations.

An individual who had previously done similar work for Commerce was contacted.

Fourteen days passed between the board's call for immediate action and the maintenance visits. Outside temperatures returned to a seasonally normal level calling for little use of the heating system during that time, according to various firefighters.

Wixom holds action on engineering fees

A request from the Wixom engineering firm of Pate, Hirn and Bugie, Inc., for approval of an increase in its fee structure has been tabled for further consideration by the Wixom City Council.

Specifically, the council voted 4-2 to table consideration of the request pending receipt of information regarding the size of the proposed increase in the fee structure. The motion, also called for the city to obtain the rate schedule of a competitive engineering firm.

The request for the increase was submitted by City Engineer Laurence H. Pate who noted that the firm charges for inspections and other limited services on an hourly rate basis, even though most of its services are performed on a percentage of the cost of construction.

"Unfortunately, we find that inflation related to increases in salaries, increases in professional liability and other insurance premiums, utility increases, increases in Social Security and particularly gasoline cost increases make it no longer feasible to furnish engineering services at our presently hourly rate structure," said Pate in his letter to the council.

Council Member Sidney Resner subsequently moved that action on the proposed increase be postponed until the city engineers provide information about their former rates as well as the new rates. Additionally, Resner's motion called for city officials to obtain information about the rates being charged by comparable engineering firms in the area.

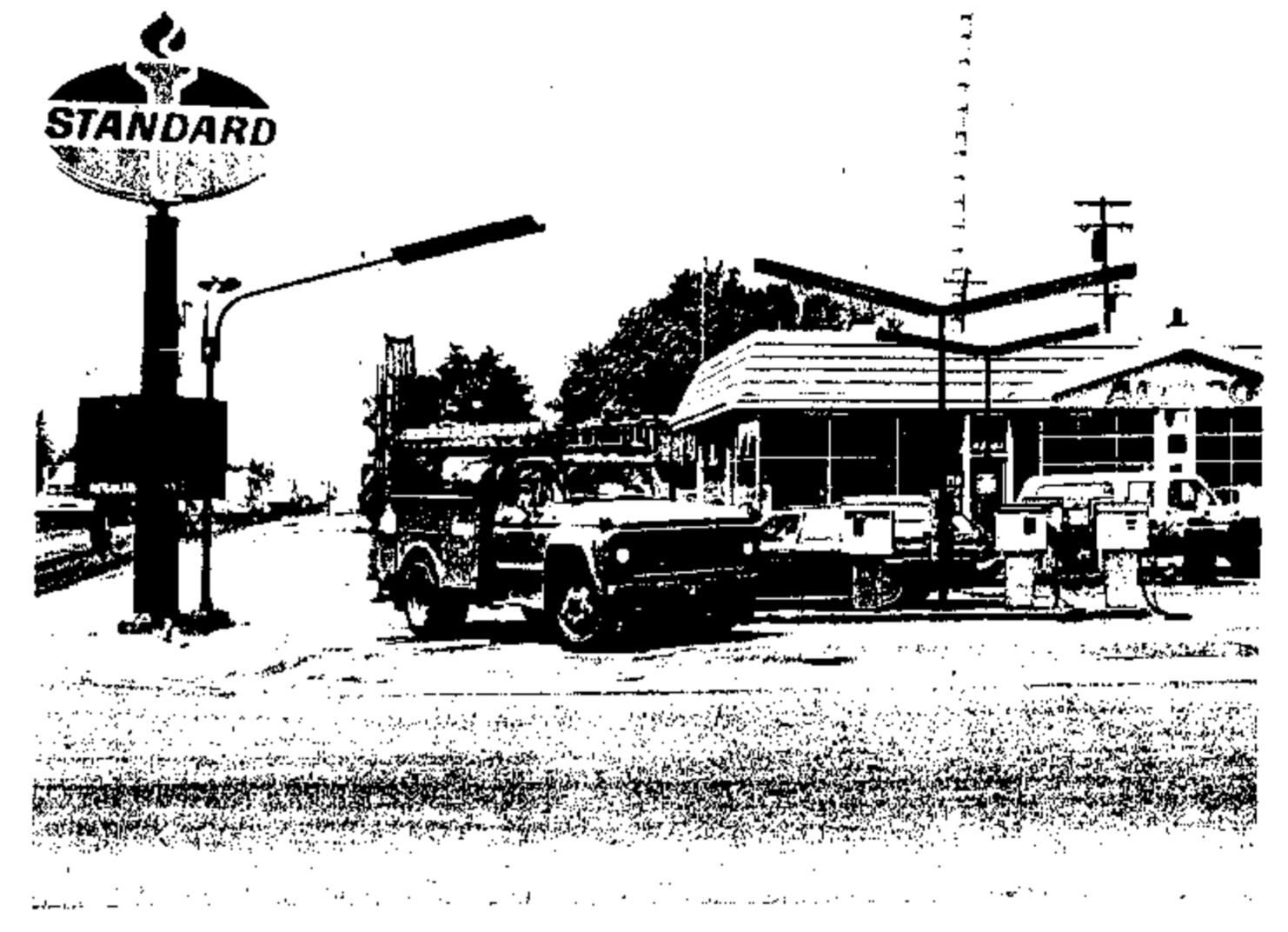

Village planners table rezoning consideration

The Wolverine Lake Village Plan Commission last Wednesday elected to table the proposed Lakatos property rezoning pending a response from a personal representative of the estate.

Attorney Thomas Smith, representing relatives of the late Mr. Michael Lakatos who have inherited the property, requested that he be given a chance to address the situation in writing. Smith's request followed a public hearing in which several citizens urged the commission to change the zoning on the Lakatos property from commercial (C-1) and multiple family (RM-1) to single family residential (R1-A).

Those citizens are residents of Ethel Drive and Payne Court, which are close to the 11-acre Lakatos property on South Commerce Road between Indiana and Ethel streets in the village.

They contend that the change is necessary to preserve property values and the "character" of the neighborhood because of the possibility of drawbacks such as added pollution and traffic problems that could result from multiple family or commercial development.

The suggested zoning change was presented to the planners in January, when residents of Ethel and Payne Court originally petitioned the commission to change the zoning. The matter was then referred to former Village Attorney Gary Allen, who said the petition could be considered.

Smith, who said he didn't see why the parcel should be rezoned and opposed the proposed change, said he would prepare a written reply by July 16 so that it could be reviewed by the planners when they next meet July 23.

He served as president of the Northwest Forum and during World War II was president of the Strathmore Business Association. It was at that time that Smith helped residents plant victory gardens and organized war bond campaigns.

He is survived by his wife Vivian (Betty). The couple celebrated its 53rd wedding anniversary on June 1. A daughter, Colette Drake Mallet of Novi, and a son, Howard E. Smith of Farmington, also survive. In addition, a sister Beryl Allison of Brantford, Ontario, six grandchildren and four great-grandchildren survive. He was preceded in death by a sister and grandson.

But being "usual" wasn't what Ned Nikodem was looking for — yes, he and friend Beth Bloom decided that they wanted to host a picnic that was anything but "usual."

The two some-what-workers at a Ford division located in the FoxCo, began planning "their" picnic over a month ago. The event, staged Friday night in a secluded natural outdoor setting at the Farmington Community Center, featured "absolutely, positively no plastic."

And grubbies were an "absolute no" also.

Guests were notified that the Nikodem picnic was strictly a black tie affair. Men were to be attired in formal evening dress, the gals in corresponding gowns.

Instead of volleyball, guests were treated to live chamber music. Replacing plastic and paper were settings of china, crystal, silver and linen. The "picnic" setting was complete with candles inside hurricane lamps and fresh flowers.

And the menu? No fried chicken and watermelon at the Nikodem-Bloom affair. Instead, guests were treated to a full, seven-course gourmet spread including Neopolitan fish terrine and pate en croûte. The event was staged to coincide with vacation time so that Chef

Ned could have the freedom to cook the entire menu at leisure.

"Some people may think we're a little weird," Bloom claimed, "but Ned and I both love very formal affairs. We wanted to take advantage of the summer weather, hence the formal gourmet picnic brainstrom."

The entire menu was planned by Nikodem who is a gourmet cook by choice. "I love to eat good food. I like to try new things and I don't mind banging around in a kitchen," said the young marketing man. "That doesn't mean I eat lavishly every day—I go the yogurt route occasionally," he said.

Nikodem said he started cooking out of necessity — a not so unusual occurrence for a bachelor. The basics, he said, were learned at his mother's apron strings, a person he described as a "damn good cook."

A year ahead paved the way to "bigger and better things" for Nikodem who learned a few culinary tricks from the household's French chef. "I also am known for ripping off ideas and recipes from my friends," he laughed.

Gourmet cooking began in earnest after his return to the states and residency in a Novi condo. "I literally got tired of a very hum-drum food existence," he reported. "I decided to explore the world of the kitchen and put together all those things I had learned along the way. Gourmet cooking offers the best of everything."

The Nikodem-Bloom picnic was complete with wines and champagne appropriate to the dishes served. With the exception of marinated meatballs served hot in a chating dish and the culinary

finale, Bananas Foster, the remaining dishes were served icy cold.

Following hors d'oeuvres, guests dined on chilled melon soup, a pureed blend of cantaloupe, honey dew, orange juice and white wine. Attention was then turned to neopolitan fish terrine featuring a layered mousse of white fish, scallops, salmon, finely chopped fresh spinach and scallions.

Moving to the entree, guests feasted on pate en croûte, a masterpiece of ground pork and veal baked in pastry. Nikodem said the void created by the lost meat fats during oven time later was filled with a beef consommé aspic.

Completing the array of fine foods was vegetables a la Greque, a combination of squash, tiny carrots, mushrooms, cauliflower and broccoli cooked and marinated in an aromatic, spiced liquid, and gazpacho salad, a bright, finely diced mixture layered in a clear glass serving bowl.

Donning his chef's apron, Nikodem then delighted his formally attired guests by preparing flaming Bananas Foster at tableside.

"Really," said Nikodem, wiping his hands on a white linen napkin, "why not take advantage of the best of everything — good food, good friends and good weather." Beth Bloom nodded her head in full agreement.

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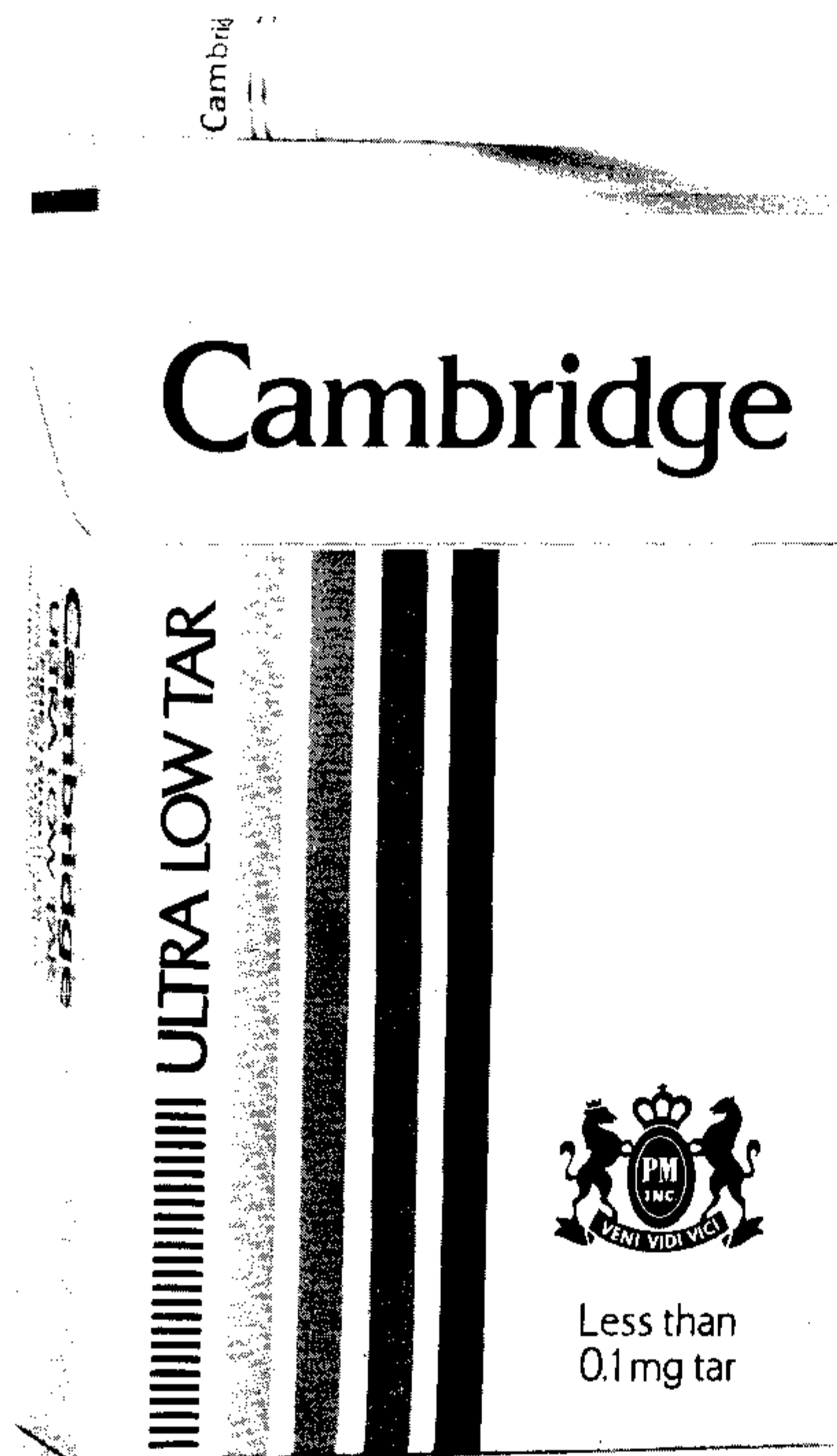
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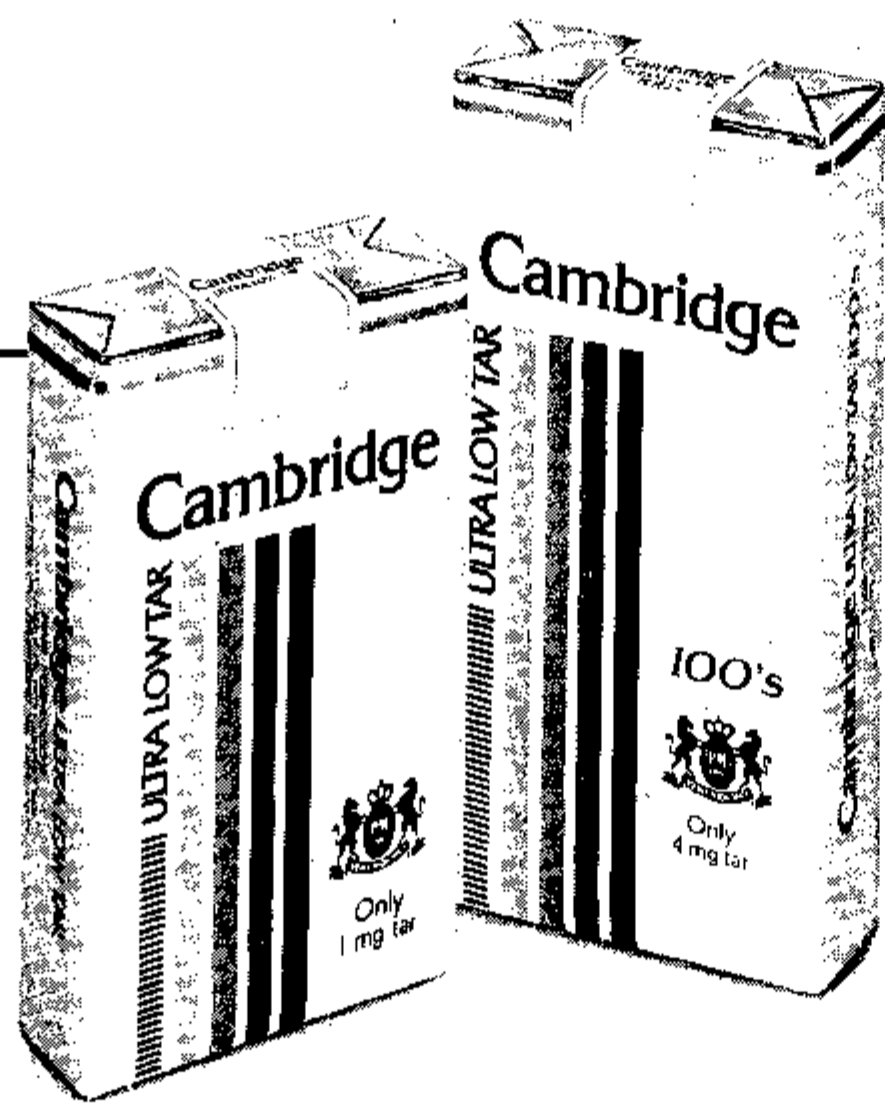

Hip 'shaving' aids victims of chronic arthritic pain

"If my life ended today I would know there are some people out there who are better off because of me. That is the biggest satisfaction of my job."

An orthopedic surgeon at Botsford General Hospital in Farmington, Doctor John Swienkowski is one of a few surgeons in the country who performs a relatively new hip operation which eliminates the pain caused by chronic arthritis, hip disease or is the result of bone problems due to auto accidents.

The new procedure, developed by four European surgeons independently around 1974, involves a resurfacing of the hip joint as opposed to joint replacement — done in the more common total hip replacement surgery.

The head of the hip bone is shaved, a metal cup is cemented to it and a semi-circular cover — made of high density polyethylene, a firm but flexible plastic —

serves as the hip socket.

The result is a joint which allows freedom of movement without pain, with only a minuscule amount of bone being removed.

The Northville Township surgeon points out that this procedure cannot be used in every case, however.

"This method is basically for people who still have the head (of the high bone) but it may be worn," he said. "The friction on the worn spot causes the acute pain."

"Instead of removing some two inches of bone, we scrape maybe eight or 10 millimeters of bone from the head."

One major advantage of this procedure, Swienkowski said, is the greater number of alternatives a patient has.

"In a standard total hip you are locked in," he explained. "If in a few years it loosens or there are other problems the only thing you can do is put in another one."

"If a resurfacing has been done, you still

have the bone intact and can do a second resurfacing or a total hip replacement, if necessary," he stated.

But the 25 resurfacing operations Swienkowski has done at Botsford during the last three years have proven highly successful.

None of the patients — who ranged from 21 to 66 years of age — has had any major problems. Because of his success, the 35-year-old surgeon is very confident that within five years resurfacing will replace total hip surgery as the standard procedure.

"In five years a 10-year study being conducted in Europe will be completed and I truly believe the failure rate for resurfacing will be less than for total replacement," he predicted.

A recent study conducted at the Mayo Clinic in Minnesota revealed that one of four total hip replacements performed between 1972 and 1977 was unsuccessful, Swienkowski said.

In addition to the greater number of alternatives offered to the patient with resurfacing, the chances of infection, always a danger, are reduced significantly.

The space between the polyethylene cup and the hip socket is greatly reduced and the space which develops in the bone surrounding the pin — used in total hip replacement — obviously, is non-existent, he said.

"Thus, the area where the infection could set in is greatly reduced."

Though Heinz Wagner of Germany and M.A.R. Freeman of England generally are credited with developing the resurfacing procedure, which also has proven very successful for them, Swienkowski says a lot of credit should go to a Michigan resident who some 20 years ago developed a variation of the method.

"Charles Townley who works as a surgeon
