







A master plan for the proposed improvements was unveiled before the city council last week. Adoption of a master plan at a public hearing is required before the city can apply for state and federal funds to implement the proposed im-

public hearing before the Novl City Council last week and said they agreed with the proposed improvements, although they asked for beefed up police patrols in and around the park. Richard Stopinski told the city council that residents in the area could live with the park plan,

but added that there currently is no control of juveniles in the park. "They pull wheelles, driving around and around and they park all over. We never get any coopera-

tion from the police - I've given up calling," Stopinski said." Parks and Recreation Director Thomas O'Branovic responded that increased use of the park by citizens should help to improve the at-

nosphere cited by Stopinski. "Through the years the park has not been maintained, which promoted vandalism and a wrong use of the park," observed O'Branovic, "But with continuous development this could be turned around. We'll get more family-oriented gatherings instead of vandals."

City Manager Edward Kriewall told the council he had spoken with Police Chief Lee BeGole about developing a plan for greater controls at the park. The chief reported he was unaware of problems at the park, but in light of the complaints registered by residents would make plans to increase partrols in the park, Kriewall told the council (see related

Council members expressed concern there was no existing plan for patrolling the park. "I'm amazed that with the use of the park over the past six weeks there is no program for patrolling the park," said Council Member Martha Hoyer. "That's how you alleviate problems before they

However, he asked the city to turn over a 10-foot easement between the park and adjacent property, which had been intended for a walkway, but never developed. Council members asked City Attorney David Fried to look into the possibility of vacating the walkway easement.

Residents also thanked Parks and Recreation Director Tom O'Branovic for explaining the plan to them in a neighborhood meeting prior to the public hearing before the council.

THE history of eye glasses began i

Germany, in the year 1683. The lenses were combined in a leather mask to correct focusing problems. Early in the 17th century venders went

from city to city, offering ready-made eye glasses along with telescopic devices. Spectacles during this era were, at best, general purpose magnifiers - and we must realize that prescription-ground lenses, as we know them today, were still 200 years in the future.

Benjamin Franklin played a major role in the development of eye glasses; and that noted American invented the bi-focal lens in 1784. No portrait of Mr. Franklin is complate without his famous creation.

The first settler in the new world said to have worn glasses was Peter Brown, a Pilgrim, It was in the year 1620. The frames were made of low grade steel, and only a few could afford glasses.

Theodore Roosevelt created a personal trade-mark with his pince-nez spectacles -More recently, Charlie McCarthy, lovable side-kick with Edgar Bergen, always appear-

ed wearing his monocle. eye glasses have been the forerunners of the inspiration in eye-wear of distinction.

#### Parks - Yes

Commerce Township voters would be wise to vote in favor of a millage proposal that would raise funds for the purchase of some 260 acres of recreational land from the Huron-Clinton Metropolitan Authority (HCMA) in the August 5

Instead of requesting a specific millage levy, Commerce officials are asking voters to approve a planthat would raise \$247,000 per year for the next four years to purchase the property on a land contract

The plan will permit the township board to set the tax rate that would raise the money to make the annual payments.

Commerce officials have established that the additional tax necessary to raise the funds would amount to slightly less than one mill per year based on the township's current 1980 equalized value of some \$257.64 million for real and personal property.

# Library — Yes

Commerce Township voters will be confronted with an advisory question regarding library services when they go to the polls in the August primary next Tuesday.

Specifically, township voters will be asked if they approve of a proposal to levy three-tenths of one mili to continue to receive library

Commerce presently provides its residents with library services on a contractual basis with Walled Lake and Milford, Township residents formerly had access to the West Bloomfield Township ped in 1976 when Commerce relected a request to provide the equivalent of three-tenths of one mill to continue the service.

# If the advisory question is approved next Tuesday, Commerce residents again will be able to use the West Bloomfield library.

The Walled Lake, Milford and West Bloomfield libraries have requested that Commerce provide three-tenths of one mill in order continue the service. All three libraries would qualify for state aid if they receive local tax support at the equivalent of the three-tenths of

one mill figure. Commerce Township Supervisor Robert H. Long has cautioned that citizens may not have access to libraries next year if the millage proposal is defeated.

Cost of the proposal will equate to approximately \$9 per year for the owner of a \$60,000 home. Although not all residents userfale norary faculties, we believe it is a service that should be available to all township residents. And threetenths of one mill is a small price to pay for the service.

# Daniels for U.S. Congress

Lower drinking age?



When the Michigan Legislature raised the drinking age to 21, it ignited once more, the long running controversy over whether or not 18 through 20 years olds

are really wise enough to handle drinking.
While such a debate really comes down to a value judgement, the fact of the matter is that so long as 18 is the legal age of majority, it should be considered illegal to prohibit 18 through 20 year olds the right to drink.

When the government lowered the age of majority to 18, it immediately granted 18 year olds all the rights and responsibilities of any other legal adult. Among those many liberties was the right to enter a bar and

drink or purchase liquor from a store. Hence, when the state forbids 18, 19 and 20 year olds from drinking, it is quite literally forbidding a right that, for all intents and purposes, cannot be denied any

In an era when women are being recognized as equals and when society is finally recognizing its obligations to all its members, it seems to be a sociological step backward to deny legal adults certain rights on the

# Yes on county parks

Oakland County parks and recreation officials will ask voters August 5 to renew a quarter-mill property tax for five years to acquire, develop and maintain the county park system.

We believe the millage should

For the past 14 years, county property owners have paid this tax. They have been rewarded with an excellent parks system, covering more than 2,700 acres at eight locations and providing a wide range of year-round recreational activities.

The county parks offer playgrounds, picnicking, camping, boating, fishing, swimming, tennis and other court games, golf, nature centers, cross-country skiing, snowmobile trails and ice skating, as well as a unique wave action pool, activities centers, outdoor horse arenas, conference centers

and banquet facilities. In addition, the county parks agency provides senior citizen ac-

tivities, recreational classes, special events and the popular mobile recreation units. The mobile units feature such activities as swimming, skating, art, puppet shows, movies and nature, and sports, and they visit numerous Oakland communities.

Renewal of the tax, which was first approved in 1966, would provide the lion's share of income to the county parks system - about 56 percent of this year's \$4.5-million budget - while taking very little out of taxpayers' pockets - 25 cents for each \$1,000 of state

equalized value of their property. Oakland County residents already have made a substantial investment in their parks system to the tune of \$9.5 million since 1966 for land acquisition and capital and building improvements. Renewal of the millage will provide funds to protect that investment and make further improvements for future

This should be entitled, "An Echo from the Past," or "Here We Go Again." Those persons promoting that the drinking age be reduced again, obviously were not paying attention to the reasons the State of Michigan raised the age back to 21 years.

The latest statistics from the state show a reduction of lives lost by the drinking driver by 17 percent and the total number of accidents reduced by 21 percent. This kind of figure should tell us something

The old argument of "If I can die for my country on the battlefield and vote when I'm 18, why can't I drink?" is not really valid. It is a proven fact that drinking changes personality, attitudes and ability to react -

I personally don't want any drunk on the road endangering the lives of those in my family or yours. Keeping off the roadway the number of potential persons drinking seems like a good idea to me. The number of families broken, maimed for life of killed over the years is staggering. Last year, 1,849 per sons lost their lives on the roads.

It is ironic that the nation is united in its effort to have 50 hostages returned and at the same time, take for the granted the mass slaughter on the highways.

California Congressman George E. Brown in a recent speech stated, "There is a good reason why society wants a higher legal drinking age." I wonder what motivated two-thirds of the state 3 lawmakers who voted for the resolution to put the mat-

The thunderstorm that struck at 9 A.M. Wednesday, July 16 was the worst in the area's history. Over 500 utility poles were snapped like toothpicks by hurricane force winds.

8,000 spans of Detroit Edison wire were ripped apart and 700 miles of overhead lines downed. Facilities which took years to build were destroyed in a few minutes. Much of the damage was caused by trees falling on lines and poles.

Immediately after the skies cleared, experienced damage evaluators began to assess the degree of destruction.

Transmission towers and cross arms were twisted piles of steel. Thousands of uprooted trees littered

the streets blocking access to power lines. Nearly 35 substations and 200 dis-

tribution circuits were interrupted. In all, more than 300,000 customers

were left without power. By noon, repair crews were transferred to the southern portion of Detroit Edison's electrical system where the damage was heaviest. On Thursday, every available company, contract and tree trim crew

was at work in Detroit and Wayne, Washtenaw and Livingston counties. Working ahead of the repair crews, evaluators determined the degree of trouble in each circuit. They estimated

There will be a section on the ballot which has the following wording at the top: "I desire that the party indicated below shall have its name, party vignette and candidates listed on the next general election ballot."


If you wish your minor party candidates to appear on the November general election ballot, it is important for you to vote this section of the ballot in the August primary by indicating your party preference. In order for a minor political party to have candidates listed on the November ballot, the party must have received a vote total of more than three-tenths of 1 percent of the total number of voters voting in the August primary election. 


# **COUNTY COMMISSIONERS**
