# Novi's commercial building going strong

Anyone driving through Novi would commercial and industrial developnever guess that the construction industry has been one of the major victims of inflation and soaring interest

To be sure, residential construction has slowed down almost to nothing. But the slowdown in residential construction has coincided with an increase in commercial and industrial development — at least in Novi.

"There's no question about it," confirmed Building Official Earl Bailey. "There's very little going on in the way of residential construction, but we've got plenty to keep us busy in the way of

Not unexpectedly, a large portion of the commercial development is taking place on the west side of Novi Road in the regional center area where structural steel appears to be going up

Construction of an Art Van Furniture store got underway early in the year, and skilled tradesmen are finishing up the exterior in time to move into interior work before winter sets in.

Stuctural steel is also going up on Ramco-Gershenson's West Oaks shopping center, immediately south of the Art Van store.

The West Oaks development is slated to include K mart, Service Merchandise, Kroger's and Perry Drugs as well as a series of smaller retail shops.

Bailey reported that structural steel is already up for the K mart and retail stores, and the Building Department is of Novi Road. reviewing site plans for Service Merchandise, Kroger's and Perry Drugs.

Michael Ward, an executive vicepresident of Ramco-Gershenson. reported that K mart and Service Merchandise are looking to open in April. Art Van also is eying an opening in the spring, Ward said.

Although it's doubtful that structural steel can be installed before the winter sets in, construction plans for the Novi Sheraton also are underway in the regional center area. The Sheraton Motor Inn is slated for construction immediately north of I-96 on the west side

Gerald Abel of Pico Management, developers of the hotel, said that the contract for land balancing operations was awarded last week and construction will begin as soon as final permits are obtained. Plans call for the hotel to be completed by January 1, 1982, according to Abel.

Additional commercial construction in the regional center area is taking place on the Twelve Oaks periphery property on the east side of Novi Road where structural steel is in place for Detroit Bank - Novi, a division of Detroit Bank and Trust.

Structural steel has also been erected for a branch of the Manufacturer's Bank of Novi on the east side of Novi Road between I-96 and Grand River

Two other projects currently underway in the regional center area are the Woodland Medical Center on Twelve Mile and the Glen Oaks Apartments behind the Twelve Oaks Mall.

Workmen are putting the finishing touches on Woodland Medical which is slated to open later this month, while initial land balancing operations are just beginning on the Glen Oaks Apart-

The Glen Oaks project represents Novi's first mid-rise (five stories) luxury apartment complex. Officials with the New Apostolic Church of North America, developers of the complex, are pushing to complete the project as quickly as possible.

Although the bulk of the development activity is taking place in the regional center area, it is not limited to the regional center area.

A new branch office of the Security Bank of Novi is nearing completion on Beck Road near Pontiac Trail. And a three-story office building in the Orchard Hill Place office park complex at Eight Mile and Haggerty also is nearing completion.

Additional activity is taking place on Nine Mile where structural steel is up for the Weltronics Corporation. The industrial firm is planning to construct a 57,600 square foot building with an estimated price tag in excess of \$2.5 million. Upon completion, the building will serve as headquarters for the Weltronics Corporation which presently is located in Southfield.

"We've only issued 87 permits for residential construction so far this year," reported Bailey. "That's down from 238 at the same time last year so the residential market is down significantly.

"But considering the economy, we're still getting more than enough commercial and industrial development to keep us awfully busy."

# Six lanes pursued for Twelve Mile

Novi and Farmington Hills have join- Farmington Hills which is experiencing ed forces to establish a "task force" that will pursue the widening of Twelve the road. Mile from Orchard Lake Road in Farmington Hills to the Beck Road interchange with I-96.

A resolution calling for the formation of the "Twelve Mile Road Improvement Committee" was adopted unanimously by the Novi City Council Monday, and the Farmington Hills council is expected to adopt a similar resolution in the near luture.

In essence, the resolutions call for the formation of a committee to "study the traffic concerns along Twelve Mile" in Novi and Farmington Hills.

The "task force" has been created specifically to create a plan for widening Twelve Mile and solicit financial support from the Oakland County Road Commission.

Members of the task force appointed Monday include resident representative Michel Duchesneau, business representative William Clogg and coun-

cil representative Robert Schmid. Members of the task force are expected to develop a proposal that will call for Twelve Mile to be widened to a six-lane boulevard divided by a grassy

The proposal to widen Twelve Mile into a six-lane boulevard originated in extremely high levels of traffic along

The Twelve Mile proposal also is one of the key aspects to Novi's revised master plan. In a 1979 study of Novi's thorougfares, City Planning Consultant Charles Cairns notes that a study conducted in 1969 by professional traffic consultants indicated that Twelve Mile will be a major access route to Twelve Oaks Mall.

In fact, the report percent of the traffic to the regional shopping center would use Twelve Mile as a primary route.

Recent traffic counts by the Oakland County Road Commission reveal that the report has proven to be accurate.

In addition to the traffic generated by Twelve Oaks, changes in land use considerations in Farmington Hills have added to the interest in making Twelve Mile a six-lane highway.

Farmington Hills has designated the strip of land between Twelve Mile and I-96 as an office corridor. Office-type uses generate a great deal of traffic, and the designation of that strip for construction of office buildings in Farmington Hills has added to the volume of traffic the road will carry at ultimate development.

division to check their candy, especially Reggie Bars, to determine if they contain any foreign objects.



# Sheraton Motor Inn breaks ground

Groundbreaking ceremonies for the Novi Sheraton Motor Inn were held last Tuesday and earth balancing operations for the \$8.5 million

facility are already underway. If all goes well, the new hotel on the west side of Novi Road opposite Twelve Oaks Mall could be open by January 1, 1982, according to Jerry Abel of Pico Management which is developing the hotel.

"We hope to have it ready for opening in 14 months," said Abel, "but there are a lot of contingencies built into that timetable.

'We're hoping for a mild winter so we can get the structural steel up this year and continue work throughout the winter."

Abel is a co-partner in Pico Management with Tony Wisne, owner and chairman of the board of Progressive Tool and Industry Company - a manufacturer of tools, fixtures, guages and specialty equipment for the automotive industry.

Progressive Tool was founded in 1941 and occupies some 250,000 square feet of floor space with plants in Novi and Southfield. The company has more than 400 employees and has annual sales volume in excess of \$35 million.

Abel was formely a partner and stockholder in firms which owned the Holiday Inns in Southfield and Farmington Hills.

Abel revealed that negotiations were conducted with the Hilton, Ramada Inn and Holiday Inn chains before the decision was reached to enter into a franchise agreement with the Sheraton

"Ramada and Holiday Inn would also have granted us franchises, but the Hilton people felt the site was too close to their hotel in Plymouth," he

"We finally decided to go with Sheraton because they fell in love with the site and exhibited a lot of professionalism and a lot of class. Sheraton

is strictly a first-class operation." Abel said that Sheraton retains tight control over every phase of the hotel development through the franchise agreement.

"They have preliminary and final site plan approval; and they have final approval over everything that goes into the hotel, right down to the furniture." he said.

"You don't have final approval of the franchise until they've come out and approved the site when you're ready to open."

The Novi Sheraton will contain some 222 rooms and eight meeting-banquet rooms which can accommodate up to 400 people. Recreational amenities in the hotel include indoor and outdoor swimming pools, whirlpool, sauna, an exercise room, two racquetball couts, two cocktail lounges and a restaurant.

Abel said that Novi is considered a "fantastic location" because the mainstream of the city (the metropolitan Detroit area) is moving in a westerly direction out I-96.

"When we built the Farmington Holiday Inn in 1971, everyone said we were crazy," he said. "There was no 696 and no 275, and construction was

just beginning on the Farmington Industrial Park. "We feel the same thing is happening here in Novi and we want to be a part of it."

# Meadowbrook gets no-passing zones

Meadowbrook Road between Nine and Ten Mile has been designated a nopassing zone in response to citizen requests for increased traffic control in

Double yellow stripes were painted through that mile of roadway Friday by crews from the Oakland County Road Commission.

"No passing" signs are expected to be erected on Meadowbrook Road by the end of the week, according to Ed Smiadak, Novi Department of Public Works Superintendent.

"There were already some no passing zones on Meadowbrook because of the sight distances, but we extended them all the way from Nine to Ten Mile because it is a highly residential area," Smiadak explained.

Corporal John Johnson, who is in charge of traffic for the Novi Police Department, said the no-passing zones were instituted as a result of a study of Meadowbrook Road initiated by the

Residents on Meadowbrook Road petitioned the city council in September for traffic controls to reduce the number of drivers who exceed the 30 mile-per-hour speed limit posted on the street. A petition bearing 37 signatures was presented to the council by William Ruck, who headed up the petition drive.

The petition suggested that stop signs, speed bumps, no passing signs or other similar measures be installed to control the high speed traffic on Meadowbrook Road.

Johnson said he believe creation of the no-passing zone between Nine and Ten Mile should slow the traffic considerably.

Johnson added, however, that other suggestions made by the residents have been ruled out at this time. Traffic studies as well as citizen com-

plaints must be considered when determining what traffic controls to use on a road, Johnson said. "Before we take any action it has to

be justified — if there were a lot of speeding traffic there would be a lot of accidents. There really aren't that many accidents in that area, so we act `accordingly," Johnson said. If there were more accidents, it is

possible that more stringent traffic control measures would be recommended for the area, Johnson said.

"Meadowbrook is a through street and as a major artery in Novi many people use the street who don't live on it. On such a through road you don't put stop signs at every intersection. Stop signs don't control speed," Johnson

He also stated that speed bumps often

"create more problems than they solve."

"Speed bumps create a large liability on the road authority — in this case, the City of Novi — when they are installed on through streets," Johnson said. He also said that police patrols on Meadowbrook Road have been increas-

ed. But he quaulified that statement,

saying the department has only limited manpower and patrols are limited by "Patrol units may be advised to spend as much time as possible in a specific area like Meadowbrook Road. but they are responsible for patrolling an entire area around Meadowbrook





As presently zoned, approximately 348 single family homes could be developed on the property (120 acres at 3.6 units per acre). proposed mobile home zoning would allow approximately 804 mobile home units on the property (120 acres at 6.7 dwelling units per acre)." 

Flames swept through a building in Wixom's Village Apartments complex early last Wednesday, destroying four units and causing smoke and

One resident suffered minor burns in the fire and was treated and released from the Henry Ford Hospital West Bloomfield Center. No other injuries were reported. Wixom Fire Chief George Spencer reported that

the fire broke out shortly before 4 a.m. Wednesday. Fire fighters from Wixom, Walled Lake and Commerce responded to the scene and had the fire under control in approximately 40 minutes. The chief said it took an additional two hours "mop up the hot spots." Fire fighters were able to

vacate the scene at 8 a.m., approximately four hours after receiving the report. The blaze was limited to the northern one-third (12 units) of Building Three in the Village complex. Each building contains a total of 36 units on three

third floor were completely destroyed by the blaze. The four apartments on the second floor suffered smoke and water damage, and the four first-floor apartments were damaged by water. The cause of the blaze has been attributed by in-

Spencer reported that the four apartments on the

vestigators to a kitchen fire which burned out of Spencer said a resident in one of the units turned

on a burner under a pan of grease and then fell asleep on a couch in his living room. The man awoke at approximately 3:45 a.m. to find flames reaching from the pan to the ceiling. He attempted to smother the blaze by covering the pan with a stack of newspapers, but the fire was

already too hot and he was unable to cut off oxygen and extinguish the fire, according to the fire chief. Spencer reported that the flames were visible from the Pontiac Trail fire station when the alarm came in at 4:01 a.m. and were completely through the roof by the time fire fighters arrived on the

"It was a fully-involved fire by the time we received the call," reported Spencer. Although the fire was restricted to the northern third of the building, the entire building was evacuated until the blaze was brought under control. The American Red Cross set up an emergency station in the clubhouse at the apartment complex to provide temporary quarters for the displaced

John Knecht, manager of the Village Apartments, stated that residents in the northern third of the building have been given housing in vacant apartments elsewhere in the complex. Residents in the southern two-thirds of Building Three, which was not damaged by the blaze, have returned to their dwelling units.

Knecht also reported that construction has already started to replace the burned out portion of Last week's fire was the third at the Village in the last three and one-half years. A portion of

Building Two was destroyed by flames on July 19, 1977, while a portion of Building Ten was destroyed by fire on September 6, 1979.



#### Pioneer Meadows sewer plans to be portion of citywide study

Instead of moving ahead with a separate set of plans to resolve sewage treatment problems in the Pioneer Meadows subdivision, it now appears that plans for sewering Pioneer Meadows will proceed as part of a city-wide study of sewer needs, ac-

cording to Novi City Manager Ed Kriewall. Novi has been warned by Oakland County Sanitarian Keith Krinn that Pioneer Meadows, a 60-home subdivision at Beck Road and Eleven Mile, should be sewered as soon as possible. Krinn said the subdivision should be sewered because of an increase in the number of septic system failures on the north side of Pioneer Meadows.

City officials investigated the possibility of "fast tracking" plans to sewer the subdivision, but it now appears those plans will be part of an overall study of potential pollution problems across Novi. City officials met recently with approximately 25 residents of the subdivision to discuss the possibility of installing sewers.

Kriewall characterized the residents' reaction to

the city's presentation as being "not too dismayed about the project — as long as federal funding is If the federal government agrees to fund the sewer construction project, it could finance up to 80

percent of the costs. However, the federal government could decide to pay 80 percent of only a portion of the project or could refuse to fund any of the costs. As a result, residents were given cost estimates for the total project to demonstrate how much they could expect to pay if federal funds are unavailable. Preliminary figures worked up by city engineer's Mosher, Kapelczak, Inc. show that the



The anticipated opening of an adult foster care home in a Commerce Township subdivision resulted in an informational presentation by agencies associated with the home last Tuesday in Smart Junior High School

Nearly 125 township residents turned out for the three-hour program which included speakers from the Macomb-Oakland Regional Center (MORC). the Oakland County Association for Retarded Citizens (OCARC) and a licensing consultant. The proposed site for the foster care facility is located at 2008 Alsup in the Huron Woods subdivi-

While a township official called the gathering "orderly." Jean West of MORC said she was uncertain of the crowd's response to the presentation. "I think a lot of people were receptive to the information in the presentation. But there were a lot of people who didn't ask questions. I couldn't get a perception of what the majority thought," West

Michael Swajanen, a licensing consultant governing the township area, who will make a recommendation to the Bureau of Regulatory Services in Lansing, explained the licensing process. Swajanen will be responsible for conveying to the

state Department of Social Services, from a local viewpoint, the acceptability of the Alsup Street home. Social Services will make the final decision on whether or not the facility will be approved. The process for receiving permission to open the facility demands approval from various branches of the state government, Swajanen explained. "When we take applications for licenses, there

are various types of applicants. In this case, the licensee won't be living in the home," he said. Procedures governing approval of a license for the Huron Woods subdivision home will include inspections of the site for environmental health by the Department of Public Health, fire safety to be conducted by the Department of Social Services' fire safety specialist, and a study of the facility's

physical plan by Swajanen. Following notification of any violations, the applicant is given time to correct those unacceptable indings before a final inspection is completed by Swajanen, Based on this last site study, the licensing consultant will make his recommendation. "The applicant is apprised of findings of each in-

dividual's study. It is up to the applicant to correct those before the final study," Swajanen said. To date, Swajanen reported that the fire safety survey has been completed and some violations have been sited at the proposed Alsup home. Swajanen also informed those present at the meeting of state laws covering adult foster care

The licensing consultant confirmed that some opposition offered to the proposed Alsup home was invalid because it did not conform to state regulations. Swajanen noted that Public Acts of 1977, numbers 28, 29, and 30 — spell out stipulations to be followed in determining site acceptability Covered in those acts, according to Swajanen,

are regulations which state six or fewer residents can be placed in foster care homes in single-family residentially zoned areas. Also outlined in those regulations is the specification that homes may not be within 1,500 feet (over

one-quarter mile) of each other. Still, Swajanen pointed out that many "very valid concerns" were raised during last Tuesday's gathering. Some of those queries focused on the placement agency and the people who conduct staff

training, he added. West, development specialist for MORC, which has the chief responsibility of community placement for the developmental disabled, gave an over-

view of her agency's duties. West explained that MORC is an agency of the Department of Mental Health responsible for about 1,000 mentally retarded individuals. That figure

represents the number of people admitted to MORC facilities — with about 115 on the agency grounds and the remainder living in various com-The proposed Alsup site will be administered by a non-profit organization, known as Alternative

Living Programs and Health Assistance (ALPHA),

under contract with MORC to provide certain ser-

vices in the home's operation. Robert Perryman will serve as administrator of the proposed Alsup site, if it's approved, according to West. And Perryman's first attempt at such a project has concerned some residents, West

"I think the concern is understandable," she noted. "But we have a training program, which Mr. Perryman attended (12 weeks, 40 hours a week, including both in the field and center training), and we feel that Mr. Perryman is well prepared for taking on his first home." MORC would assist Perryman's venture with

Others requiring less supervision are classified under a "basic care" category — receiving about \$9 daily. #### Township okays rental policy for Richardson center

A policy governing use of the Richardson Community Center by community groups and residents has been adopted by the Commerce Township

The board voted to adopt the policy recently on a 5-1 vote. The lone dissenting ballot was cast by Trustee Bruce Enfield who said he felt the township's parks and recreation commission should have been given an opportunity to review

Enfield, who also serves on the parks and recreation commission, originally proposed the policy so that the township could realize income through rental of the facility when it was otherwise

Policies drafted by the commission for use of the Richardson Center were twice rejected as insufficient by the board which voted in September to direct the township's three fulltime elected officials to iron out difficulties with the plan.

The policy adopted by the board makes the community center available at no charge for community group activities Monday through Friday from 3:30 p.m. to 2 a.m. and on weekends from 6

"Community groups" are defined as "nonprofit organizations generally recognized as serving the interests of Commerce Township."

The policy further states that the group "shall be a service organization; branch, lodge, chapter of national or state organization, engaging in fraternal, civic or service purposes, a local civic organization unaffiliated with a state or national organization, an organized politial organization or a similar group."

Under the terms of the policy, the Richardson Center also is available for rental to Commerce Township residents for a \$150 fee and a \$100 securideposit. The policy specifically prohibits graduation parties from being held in the center,

The policy also notes that the \$100 security deposit does not limit the liability of the leasee in the event that damages exceed the amount of the

Permission to use the center must be received in writing by the township supervisor.

The center will generally be scheduled on a "first come, first served" basis with community

The policy states further that a "primary factor to be used for determining use approval shall be the date and time applications are received by the township supervisor'' or his designee.

The number of particpants involved in a use request also will be a major determination ir allocating area for an activity, the policy states.







Novi Mayor Romaine Roethel is abundantly aware of the frustrations involved in battling state and federal agencies.

In an attempt to convince officials from SEMCOG and the U.S. Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) of the need for extending the Huron Valley (super sewer) System to the so-called northern communities (Novi. Walled Lake, Wixom and Commerce Township), Roethel recently provided SEMCOG and EPA officials with reports that detail the existence of pollution problems in three Novi subdivi-

The reports outlined the need for sanitary sewer systems in three western Novi subdivisions. The Pioneer Meadows subdivision is singled out as being in immediate need of sewage facilities due to the failure of several septic systems in the area.

The Novi mayor received responses to her efforts from EPA Regional Adminstrator John McGuire, SEMCOG Executive Director Michael Glusac and Congressman William Broomfield.

The responses from McGuire and Glusac were polite but noncommital. Both officials suggested that there may be means other than super sewer of abating the pollution problems and noted that studies are underway to determine the most cost-effective means of providing sewer ser-

The responses were reasonable enough. Glusac noted that SEMCOG has dropped its opposition to a study that will determine if super sewer is the most cost-effective means of providing adequate sewage capacity to the northern communities. That study is currently underway.

What bothered us about the responses, however, was the fact that McGuire attached his letter to an EPA brochure entitled "Small Wastewater Systems: Alternative Systems for Small Communities and Rural Areas."

The brochure tends to reveal what may be the underlining reasons behind the reluctance of the EPA and SEMCOG to extend the Huron Valley System to the

Did you vote?



Elections in a free country place a great deal of responsibility on each individual citizen. Not only do we each have the right to vote as we choose but we have the responsibility to educate ourselves on the consequences of our voting or not voting.

This past election didn't arouse my enthusiasm greatly because I saw no new creative ideas being presented—nothing I could rally behind. However, still felt responsible for choosing from what was available. If I didn't like the choices then perhaps I'd better work toward seeing that better choices are available in the next election.

The candidates and issues which are presented on a ballot are there because those citizens who did care put them there. It's easy to become cynical and think that the special interest groups run the government so what difference does my one vote make.

This disillusionment with government helped bring the Nazis to power in the 1930s in Germany. Those who disagreed with them were apathetic until it was

This seedy side of politics does exist, but most special interest groups are not strong enough to be political machines so individual citizens can make a difference by voting for or against candidates or

Expressing my views through my vote may not bring miracles or a cure-all to all problems but, especially in a close election, a single vote can make a differencle in future government policy.

I did not vote yesterday, nor could I have if I wanted to. I am not registered. Had I been registered I would have voted, but this change of heart came too late for me to do anything about it this year.

I have agreed to write about why I didn't vote as long as this newspaper agreed not to identify me. Although I thought I had good reasons for skipping the election, I now feel the reasons may only have been accurate, but not valid.

I think it is still fair to say that the choices in many races are unattractive. But as election day neared, it became clear that the races might be extremely close. And even in those races where neither candidate was particularly outstanding, there were definite distinc-

I used to feel that non-voters would send a message of disdain to politicians and force changes. That now seems unlikely. Politicians, after all, respond to little else than campaign contributions and voting trends. If only one of four people vote, then it's all the easier for them to manipulate elections.

Unscrupulous politicians have little to gain from an informed, active electorate and much to benefit from the cynicism and apathy that keeps me from the

#### Industrial firm eyes Novi facility

The S&M Heating Sales Company has received preliminary site plan approval for construction of a 24,000 square foot split-level industrial building from the Novi Planning Board.

The industrial building is proposed for construction on a two acre parcel on the south side of Eleven Mile between Meadowbrook and Novi roads. The Eleven Mile corridor between Grand

River and I-96 is slated for industrial development

on the city's master plan. S&M Heating Sales Company is a heating con-tractor presently located on Telegraph Road in

Objections to site plan approval were expressed by City Planning Consultant Charles Cairns who maintained that the site plan did not meet the city's zoning ordinance.

Specifically, Cairns noted that the site plan proposed 19 parking spaces in the front yard and the zoning ordinance permits only five visitor or handicapped spaces in the front yard. Cairns also noted that the S&M site plan in

dicated a front yard loading/unloading area, a violation of the ordinance which prohibits front and side yard loading areas in industrial districts. Cairns' objections were challenged by Leon Kohls, the architect for the proposed industrial

building, who maintained that the city's zoning ordinance does not prohibit front yard parking or loading/unloading areas. After reviewing the ordinance, Cairns admitted that he could find no ban against front yard

loading/unloading areas, but maintained that the prohibition against front yard parking was still a part of the ordinance. The planners subsequently voted unanimously to grant preliminary site plan approval. The ap-

proval was made contingent upon resolution of the questions regarding front yard parking and oading/unloading areas.

Fulford, a Redemptorist priest from Detroit, will speak this weekend at Holy Family Catholic Church in Novi on Meadowbrook Road between Ten Mile and Grand River. . He will speak at the all Masses on Saturday

and Sunday and will also lead follow-up discussions for teenagers and adults next Monday and Tuesday (November 10-11) at 7:30 p.m. Masses e scheduled for Saturday at 5 p.m. and Sunday t 8:30 a.m., 10 a.m. and noon.

Fulford has talked on alcoholism before more an 1,000,000 people since August, 1975. He began he fight against alcoholism more than 10 years ago when he realized he could no longer carry his workload as pastor of a large parish and went to Guest House, a rehabilitation center for alcoholics

Following his recovery, Fulford began speaking on his experience during weekend Masses at churches throughout the state and describing programs of help for families with alcohol problems.

"At the outset," he says, "I was somewhat fearful that pastors would not care to have so delicate a subject discussed in the pulpit and the parishioners were not quite ready for a homily that began: 'I am Father Jack and I am an alcoholic.' Fortunately, the fears were not well founded."

Fulford says alcoholism is often styled a family disease because all members of the family are hurt by the situation. Scarcely any families remain untouched by alcohol in some way; there are 100 million drinkers in the United States and about 10 million of those are active or latent alcoholics or are predisposed to addiction, according to Father Louis Miller, editor of the Homiletic and Pastoral Review.

During the discussion session on Monday, Fulford will explain what alcoholism is, what brings it about, what it does to individuals and identify the symptoms that mark a progression to acute and chronic conditions of On Tuesday, he will speak on means — primarily spiritual — of ar-

resting the disease, helping family members deal with problems created by having an alcoholic relative and getting assistance for those who need help but refuse interference from others.

# 'Cat defense levels Northville gridders

The battle was one of fruitless frustration for the Mustangs, who had the bad fortune to lose a couple of key starters to injuries early in the game. By the time it was over, questionable referees' calls that went Novi's way had Northville officials absolutely beside themselves on the sidelines.

Meanwhile, on the field Rentner finished an outstanding career by carrying for 106 yards in 10 attempts. Included among those rushing tries were second-quarter touchdown romps of 35 and 25 yards that dug the Mustangs into a hole they never climbed out of.

 Chris Caudell got the visitors on the scoreboard first, booting a 17-yard field goal in the opening stanza. Then Rentner went to work, and the result was a 15-0 Novi lead by halftime. The teams battled through an uneventful third

period before Pat Korte added to the Novi margin with a beautiful touchdown run. The Wildcats executed a variation of the old "Statue of Liberty" play to perfection as Rentner dropped back to pass and then handed off to Korte at the last second. The senior weaved through a confused clan of Northville defenders and plopped over the goal line for a 21-yard score and a 21-0 Novi lead.

Soon after, however, Northville quarterback Dave Greer found Scott Robins down the sidelines for a 79-yard pass play with less than two minutes remaining, spoiling Novi's bid for its third shutout of the year. But the Mustang connection couldn't prevent the home team from avenging a 21-14 setback at the hands of Osborne's men a year ago. Novi's sudden, flashy scores were in direct contrast to its relentless defense. Leading a stingy Wildcat group were Korte, Pat Buzolits and Steve Wright, all of whom racked up eight points Linebacker Mike Sarkissian also perfromed well
