

State finance axe cuts city, school budgets

Statewide budget blues are bad news for the budgetary pictures in both the City of Novi and Novi Schools, but local officials still are uncertain exactly how bad the situation is.

City and school officials do know that Governor William G. Milliken's recently announced reductions in the state budget have left them wondering if they will be able to balance their respective budgets this fiscal year.

In the governor's latest round of budget cuts a total of \$288.5 million was slashed to balance the state's budget.

Assistant City Manager Alex Allie reported that the governor has cut two programs affecting cities — \$9.5 million in state shared revenue to city's was taken in one blow and \$3.5 million was

axed from a second state aid program. Locally, Allie expects to see the city lose \$15,000 to \$20,000 in general fund revenues as a result of the decrease in state shared revenues.

The city budgeted \$600,000 in state shared revenues — a figure city officials thought would be on the low side when the budget was drafted.

"We thought we were being pessimistic when we budgeted \$600,000 and now we won't even be getting that much," Allie said.

Based on the latest available data, Allie believes the maximum amount that Novi could lose is \$20,000. But state aid could be reduced another five percent if the economy does not recover, he estimated. In the end, the total reduc-

tion will be based upon the revenue the state takes in.

Allie said it may be the end of fiscal 1980 before the city is sure how much state sales tax will be returned locally. Figures on the local share of income tax to be received may be available earlier since that allocation is figured on the calendar year, Allie said.

City officials have not started a search for places to cut the budget, Allie said. Right now city officials are pinning their hopes on revenue sharing funds from the federal government.

"We won't go back through the budget until we learn the fate of federal revenue sharing. We're counting on that to stabilize the budget. If that's rejected by Congress it's back to the

drawing board," he said.

The city did not include federal revenue sharing funds in its anticipated revenues for the current fiscal year since legislation authorizing those allocations expired in October and there was no guarantee that Congress would reinstate the program.

However, federal revenue sharing has passed the U. S. House of Representatives and is now awaiting approval by the Senate, according to Allie.

Meanwhile, school officials are reeling from the \$65 million reduction in revenues to local school districts which comes on top of \$158 million in aid to schools already slashed from the budget earlier this year.

Superintendent Robert Piwko said

school officials have been unable to pin down exactly how much Novi Schools stand to lose.

"We just don't have anything specific, nothing is confirmed," Piwko said.

Projections of how individual school districts will be affected are flying fast and furiously, however.

Piwko said that from early projections estimates were made that Novi Schools could lose up to \$100,000 in state aid.

To demonstrate the uncertain state which the budget cuts have generated, Piwko noted that within a matter of hours Monday he received conflicting information on the size of the cuts.

Late Monday the superintendent heard that school districts such as Novi

which do not get state aid on a per student basis — known as out-of-formula districts — face a 75 percent cut in categorical aid. Categorical aid is state reimbursement for programs such as transportation and vocational education.

He went on to report that one set of formulas which he heard early Monday showed the state reimbursement for transportation might be cut 47 percent, vocational education would be reduced 24 percent, special education would be reduced 18 percent, community education reimbursements would be totally eliminated and state funds for professional development would be slashed 31 percent.

"We're not sure what it all means t," Piwko said.

Auditors give city top budget grades

Novi has ended the 1979-80 fiscal year in the black — with a fund balance of \$348,000 and a report from the auditors that the city books are in good order.

Accountant Thomas D. Doescher of Plante & Moran had no specific recommendations for improving the city's accounting methods and in fact reported that Novi's books are "in as good shape as any community we audit."

In addition to reporting that the books are in good order, Doescher said the city is in good financial position.

"You had a good year. You lived within your budget and there's a small fund balance to help you through next year," Doescher said. "Next year could be tough financially, but you will be the benefactor's of the 1980 census. So overall you should be in good financial shape."

A summary of the audit showed the city took in more than \$3.4 million in general fund revenues in the past fiscal year. General fund revenues primarily are generated from property taxes.

This year the city received approx-

imately 48 percent of its revenue from property taxes, 17 percent from state shared revenues and 10 percent in federal revenues. Licenses and permits made up 8 percent of the city's revenues, and interest earnings on investments comprised 10 percent of the city's revenues.

General fund expenditures, which include monies spent directly on services to local taxpayers, totalled more than \$3.2 million.

The largest city expenditure was for police and fire protection. Some 51 percent of the budget or approximately \$1.6 million was spent for the public safety departments.

The second largest cost to the city was \$555,000 for general administration, which includes departments which indirectly provide city services such as finance, assessing and the city manager's office.

The difference between the general fund expenditures and general fund

Jury acquits Novi man of first degree murder

A jury has found William W. Curtner, 28, of Novi, not guilty of first degree murder in connection with the January shooting death of his roommate.

After three hours of deliberation the jury returned a not guilty verdict to Oakland County Circuit Court Judge Robert Webster and Curtner subsequently was released.

Testimony in the case was heard throughout last week.

Court Services Officer Corporal William Brown reported that the jury's not guilty verdict was based on the belief that when Curtner fired the fatal shot he had been trying to protect another roommate from an attack by the man who was killed.

Andrew Lalomia, 24, of 21150 Old Novi Road was killed when he was shot through the neck with a 20 gauge "slug round" shot gun.

Brown said that in the jury's deliberations they requested a typed copy of the elements of each of the charges under which they could have prosecuted Curtner.

The focus of their deliberations centered on a paragraph included in a high misdemeanor charge which described an innocent person as one who was excited and could not determine how much force was necessary to protect another and therefore could not be held responsible for his actions, Brown said.

Brown said the judge and prosecutor talked with the 12 member jury after the trial and determined the jury had reached its decision based on the interpretation of that portion of the law.

According to testimony in the trial, the shooting apparently resulted from a disagreement regarding financial arrangements in the home shared by three men.

Reportedly the disagreement ensued throughout the day of the shooting. Defense witnesses said that when the shooting occurred, Lalomia was trying to strangle roommate Carl Baker.

Baker told the court he thought his roommate was being choked to death, according to Brown.

Prosecution witnesses said it would have been impossible for Baker to have been strangled if Lalomia were gripping him in the manner in which the incident was described to police. The grip

would have created some discomfort, but would not have been fatal, according to prosecution testimony.

They further noted that although defense testimony was to the effect that Baker could not swallow solid food for several days after the incident, he did not seek medical treatment for the neck injury.

Police also maintained that if he had been strangling his roommate in the fashion described to police the deceased would have had powder burns on his arm from the blast.

Other prosecution testimony revealed that after Lalomia was shot, but before police could investigate the crime scene, a knife was placed in Lalomia's left hand to make it appear as if a struggle had ensued. Lalomia was right-handed, witnesses testified.

The defense attorney said in opening statements that his client had "foolishly" placed the knife in his roommates' hand.

Jurists had the option of finding Curtner either not guilty, guilty of first or second degree murder, manslaughter or reckless and careless use of a firearm.

Options were open to the jury because the man initially was arrested on an open charge of murder. In district court he waived examination and was bound over to Oakland County Circuit Court on a charge of first degree murder.

Flea market owner threatens suit

Novi's new Master Plan for Land Use Development — which has not yet been officially adopted — is already facing its first threat of a legal challenge.

Gabriel Glantz, owner of the six-acre parcel on which the Walled Lake Flea Market is presently located, told the Novi Planning Board last week that he strongly opposes plans to designate his property on the master plan for single-family residential development.

"I'm convinced that this type of change on the master plan would reduce the value of our property 90 percent or more," said Glantz.

"The property has been used for commercial purposes since 1924 when it was the Walled Lake Casino and Amusement Park. It's been zoned commercial

since 1945, and I've been paying taxes on it as commercial for the past 12 years.

"If you go through with your plans to change it to a residential designation on the master plan, I will have to take some kind of step as early as possible to preserve our rights," he continued.

"The proposed action is so clearly unconstitutional, arbitrary and confiscatory, I don't believe there would be much to talk about in court," he added.

Glantz also suggested that the planning board had decided to designate his property as residential on the master plan because "it's only hearsay, but I understand that some council member has an ax to grind against me and my property."

Glantz did not indicate which council member he feels has "an ax to grind." Glantz and the city have been involved in several law suits over the past several years.

The decision to designate the 6.25 acre Flea Market for residential development was made at the planners' November 12 session.

Planning Consultant Charles Cairns previously had proposed that the Glantz parcel be designated on the master plan for a convenience commercial shopping center.

But the designation was challenged by the planners who maintained that location of a convenience center on the Glantz property would have a negative impact on both Walled Lake and traffic

on Thirteen Mile, East Lake Drive and Novi Road.

Planners ultimately decided to remove all non-residential designations north of 12½ Mile from the master plan and replace them with a single-family residential designation. The action was taken in spite of warnings from Cairns that it might be difficult to defend in court in light of existing commercial uses on the west side of Novi Road in the Thirteen Mile area.

"From a planning standpoint, I would personally prefer to see the entire area go residential because of the potential for strip commercial development that exists with the existing designations," said the planning consultant.

Cairns added, however, that the city's chances of defending a residential designation on the master plan for the Thirteen Mile/Novi Road area against a legal challenge "are modest."

In registering his opposition to the proposed residential designation, Glantz asked the planners last week to review its decision before adopting the master plan.

"My dream has always been that some big corporation would want to lease the property for an office use," he said.

"Ever since the opening of Twelve Oaks, rarely a week goes by that I don't get calls from people interested in using the property."

Glantz also said he has rejected bonafide offers from a "7-11 type store" and a credit union who wanted to utilize portions of the 6.25 acre site. "I'm not interested in segmenting the property

Schools set up millage committee

Interested citizens are being sought to serve on a committee to review the financial needs of the Novi Community Schools and prepare a millage renewal proposal to come before the electors next school year.

Board members appointed to the committee include Trustees Joel Colliau, Robert Schram and Ron Milam. An open invitation has been extended to local citizens interested in serving on the committee, and board members also have been asked to submit the names of citizens willing to serve on the committee.

Novi is facing the expiration of 10.5 mills, or approximately one-third, of its operating millage.

The Novi Schools currently levy a total of 34.94 mills. The schools levy 27.94 mills for operations and seven mills for debt retirement.

Previously, voters have approved the levy of 23.5 mills for operations of the school district and 7.1 mills to repay debts incurred through construction of Novi High School and other capital improvement projects such as Novi Woods Elementary.

The millage is due to expire with the December 1980 tax collection.

Superintendent Robert Piwko explained the committee will determine the tentative millage needs for the school district in the 1981-82 school year.

Committee members will be looking at the district's budget and Michigan's financial picture in an attempt to get a handle on the district's millage requirements, Piwko said.

Colliau said he believed the committee also should study the long-range financial needs of the school district and develop figures for a three-year period.

Board President Sharon Pelchat said she would prepare a formal charge for the committee which outlines the group's duties and present it at the first meeting of the group — tentatively scheduled for December 2 at 7:30 p.m. in the school administration building on Taft Road.



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To reduce book thefts

Library security system sought for Novi High School

Purchase of a security system to cut down on the number of books being stolen from the Novi High School library has been recommended to the board of education.

Librarian Dolores Gerhardt told the school board last week that 540 books were stolen during the 1979-80 school year — seven percent of the total number of volumes and 24 percent of the new books.

Gerhardt said she was unable to find any high schools in neighboring districts comparable in size to Novi High School but that Lakeland High School in the Huron Valley District was the size of Novi when it installed a security system several years ago.

The librarian noted that the security system is being recommended as a last resort. "We've tried various ways to protect our collection, but they didn't cut our losses," Gerhardt told the board.

"Districts which use the system claim it's cut their losses 90 percent," said Gerhardt. "Some libraries say their losses are so minimal that they've stopped taking inventory."

"It will stop the kids who really don't want to steal books. Those who want to steal them will still steal the books," she said.

In order to avoid the Check Point system, a student would literally have to tear up the book to remove the electronically activated disk, Gerhardt said.

She said the security system would cut down on the number of students who simply don't take time to check out a book.

"It will stop the kids who really don't want to steal books. Those who want to steal them will still steal the books," she said.

She added that she believes most books are taken out of negligence. She went on to say that the losses of library books each year that "Novi has to be loaded with books that belong to this library. Occasionally we have kids who bring back a grocery bag full of books."

She noted that the number of stolen books has made it difficult to build a good collection. She has refrained from buying new books because of the expense.

Trustee Robert Schram said he believes installation of a security system would pay for itself in one year, but he opposed the installation of more than one entrance and exit gate.

Novi agrees to join sewer extension study

A study to determine the need for a sewer arm which could improve sewer service to a small area in the southeast corner of Novi (Eight Mile/Haggerty Road area) will be undertaken as a result of recent action by the city council.

Council members voted 6-0 to enter into an agreement with Wayne County which calls for Novi, Northville Township and Livonia to participate in a study of sewage system needs. All three communities could be served by a sewer line along Haggerty Road.

Construction of the sewer along Haggerty Road would permit sanitary sewer lift stations to be eliminated and replaced with a gravity-flow sewer line. Gravity sewer lines are considered a more effective method of transporting sewage.

Walled Lake told hike in sewer rates coming

Sewage disposal charges will increase 39 percent for Walled Lake residents beginning February 1, 1981.

Walled Lake residents receive sewer service through the Walled Lake-Novi Sewage Disposal System which is operated by the Oakland County DPW.

Dornan predicted the average bill in Walled Lake, currently totaling \$25 per unit quarterly, will rise to \$34.75 per unit quarterly come February.

When sewer rates increase in Walled Lake, the city will probably attempt to extend the higher rates to areas in neighboring communities which also use the sewage disposal facility.

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Wixom building department investigation requested

A Wixom developer has said he will request an investigation of alleged irregularities in the Wixom Building Department through the State Department of Labor — Bureau of Construction Codes.

Ed Coogan, president of Kelly Homes, said that he has made a verbal request for an investigation and is preparing to submit a written request. Specifically, Coogan has accused Wixom Building Inspector William Tyler of improprieties in obtaining proper inspections for construction of his own residence on Hillcrest Street in the Hickory Hills Golf and Country Club subdivision.

Construction Codes said that the request for an investigation will be reviewed and a determination made as to whether an investigation will be conducted.

Coogan's allegations are the latest development in a month-long dispute between the developer, city officials and residents in the Birch Park subdivision. In addition to charging that irregularities exist in the inspections of Tyler's home, Coogan also charged last week that no final occupancy permit was ever issued for Wixom City Hall and asked that all city departments and all council members be cited for every day that the building was occupied

without a permit. In the meantime, the city has issued Coogan five violations for occupying a building on Pontiac Trail without a certificate of occupancy.

Coogan moved his Kelly Homes' offices into the building after the building in which his offices formerly were located was destroyed by fire November 8. Police have said that the fire was caused by arson. A court date of December 4 has been scheduled to hear the charges filed by the city against Coogan.

Coogan's attempts to develop the lots by installing a dirt road and drainage met strong opposition from Birch Park residents who aired their complaints to the city council on several occasions.

The controversy began to heat up when Tyler issued Coogan a violation for moving into a new office on Pontiac Trail before obtaining a certificate of occupancy. In response to what he calls "harrassment" on the part of the city, Coogan lodged some charges of his own last week. Specifically, the Kelly Homes president charged that no final occupancy permit was ever obtained for Wixom City Hall and that there have

been irregularities in the inspections of Tyler's personal residence. City records show that a temporary occupancy permit for city hall was obtained January 9, 1978, but that a final occupancy permit has never been approved.

Coogan has asked that all city departments and council members be charged with a violation for every day that city hall was occupied after the six-month temporary permit expired on June 9, 1978. The alleged irregularities in the construction of Tyler's personal residence conducted by Bartimore were dated in September, 1980 — more than a month.

In addition to charging that it is improper for Tyler to conduct and sign inspections of his own home, Coogan also notes that the inspections allegedly conducted by Bartimore were dated in September, 1980 — more than a month.

Wixom no longer top choice for new ethanol refinery

Wixom is no longer the top choice for construction of a \$100 million ethanol refinery.

Ypsilanti Township officials, on the other hand, are doing just about everything in their power to convince U.S. Ethanol to locate the proposed ethanol refinery in their community, according to Stawick.

Ypsilanti Township reportedly has guaranteed U.S. Ethanol some tax abatement for the proposed facility and also is working with company officials to secure adequate sewer and water utilities.

The township also is working with U.S. Ethanol on site plan review processes, according to Stawick. U.S. Ethanol received a \$500,000 grant from the U.S. Department of Energy in June to prepare a feasibility study for development of a refinery. The grant was offered throughout the

United States in an effort to develop alternate energy sources that will reduce the nation's dependence on foreign oil imports.

A total of 1,000 grant applications were submitted, and U.S. Ethanol's application was one of 99 approved for funding. U.S. Ethanol was the only Michigan company to receive a grant. Stawick indicated that the feasibility study will be completed sometime in January. If the study is accepted by the Department of Energy, the company will receive federal loan guarantees for 90 percent of the estimated \$100 million construction costs.

The plant will produce 50 million gallons of ethanol per year and will employ 150 people on three shifts, according to John Ambrose who is coordinating the firm's feasibility study.

If the feasibility study is approved, construction could begin as early as March 1981 and would take 12-18 months to complete, Ambrose said. The reluctance of Wixom officials to work closely with U.S. Ethanol is based on a variety of factors, not the least of which are the effects the proposed facility could have on the city's sewer system and water supply.

Since Wixom is not hooked up to Detroit water, local officials are concerned about the effects the plant could have on the water table.

Additionally, the city's wastewater treatment system is already under restrictions from the Department of Natural Resources, and local officials are concerned that the plant will be unable to handle an additional one million gallons of discharge per day. U.S. Ethanol's request for tax abatement also has run into some resistance from city officials. Mayor Assistant Stephen Bonczek noted recently that he sees no reason for granting tax abatement to a firm which has received \$500,000 grant from the federal government for its feasibility study and also

will receive federal loan guarantees for 90 percent of the project. Other Wixom officials have raised concerns about environmental aspects associated with the plant which will use coal as its primary energy source.

Ypsilanti Township, on the other hand, has access to Detroit water and adequate sanitary sewer facilities, according to Ambrose. Both the Wixom and Ypsilanti sites meet the company's needs for rail access as well as access to major highways.

"We haven't eliminated Wixom as a potential site," stated Stawick. "But at this point, we're getting a great deal of cooperation from Ypsilanti Township which just haven't received from officials in Wixom."

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Group home proposed at Eight Mile site

A Utica corporation has applied for a license to operate a group home for the mentally retarded at 4777 Eight Mile Road in Northville Township. The license application notice sent to the township from the state Department of Social Services (DSS) is dated October 23. The newly-elected township board of trustees discussed the application at its November 20 meeting. BACKGROUND

The program consolidates several previous HUD programs, and is directed toward such objectives as:

- Elimination of slums and blight.
- Elimination of health, safety, and welfare hazards.
- Conservation and expansion of housing.
- Alleviation of economic distress.
- Expansion and improvement of community services.
- A more rational utilization of land and other natural resources.
- Reduction in isolation of income groups.
- Restoration and preservation of historic properties.

To meet these objectives, certain activities are allowed. Some examples are:

- Property acquisition.
- Certain public works and facilities projects.
- Rehabilitation projects.
- Preparing comprehensive community development plans.
- Economic development.

Some activities are not allowed. For example, facilities for which the funds cannot be used include:

- Stadiums and sport arenas.
- Schools.
- Transportation depots.
- Hospitals and nursing homes.

PUBLIC HEARINGS

Prior to submission of an application, the City is required by the Federal regulations to make this program known to the citizens.

- (1) "Provide citizens opportunity to participate in the development of the application."
- (2) Encourage submission of the citizens views and proposals particularly by those of low and moderate income."
- (3) "Provide timely responses to citizens proposals."
- (4) "Schedule hearings that encourage broad participation (citizen views in housing and community development particularly those of low and moderate income)."

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County calls cuts probable for township sub-station

Continued from Walled Lake 1

adding that the cuts could concern the township payroll. Presently, three county-financed cir-

cle cars are stationed in Commerce. Sergeant Frank Mousier, also of the county sheriff's department, explained that the circle cars may be eliminated, thus reducing the

number of deputies in the township sub-station. Hubbell cleared what had become a muddled picture of the township's police protection.

Two weeks ago, Goodrich told The News that cuts in the township force were forthcoming due to financial difficulties. Goodrich said November 10 that the county sheriff's office had notified him of the cut and called the move "a matter of economy."

This announcement came on the heels of a defeated township proposal for added law enforcement personnel in Commerce. Goodrich totally denied any connection between the reduction and pressure toward the future passage of the proposal, which he anticipated would come before voters again in a special March election.

"Commerce only pays for six officers and we tried to subsidize the rest until Commerce could pay for them," Goodrich said. But following the elec-

tion, Goodrich was told by township officials, "the word was Commerce was pleased with the coverage it was paying for."

The advisory question to establish a special assessment district to pay for additional police protection failed 3,669 to 1,037 in the November 4 general election. Goodrich sees few answers in sight.

"The only resolution right now, that's financial, is that state law allows the township to levy up to five mills. Right now, they are levying zero. We're paid out of the township's general fund," Goodrich said.

"It is my understanding that the board made a promise it would not levy any taxes without voter support — and it's going to stick to that promise," he continued.

Man arrested on soliciting charges

In Novi

A 20-year-old Northville man was arrested on charges of accosting and soliciting after he allegedly propositioned a sales clerk at Twelve Oaks Mall.

Novi police are seeking warrants against Stoney L. Bruce. A New Hudson woman reported that she was approached by the suspect while she was working at the mall. He began talking about trucks, she said, and then offered to get her a cup of coffee.

When he returned with the coffee, his discussion turned to sex and he made progressively more expensive offers for sexual favors, according to reports.

The victims told police they met two men in the mall who offered to sell them some LSD. The youths agreed to talk with the men and arranged to meet them in the parking lot.

The two men allegedly showed them some marijuana cigarettes and "some acid" which the victims told police were not real drugs.

One of the suspects then pulled a gun from under the dash, falsely identified himself as a "Twelve Oaks narc" (narcotics officer) and demanded to see identification from the youths.

The suspect then removed \$14 from the wallet of the male victim and ordered the youths out of his car.

One of the suspects was described as a white male, 6-1, weighing 155 pounds with medium blonde hair and a mustache and beard. The other suspect was described as a white male, 6-1, weighing 180 pounds with long brown hair. Police also are seeking two white females in connection with the incident.

Both are approximately 25 years of age with long black hair.

Thieves took \$50 worth of goods from a home in the 2000 block of Dixon Road on November 14.

They apparently gained access through a rear door on the west side of the residence.

Taken in the heist were a \$50 microwave oven, a \$90 digital watch, an \$80 clock radio, a jewelry box and silverware.

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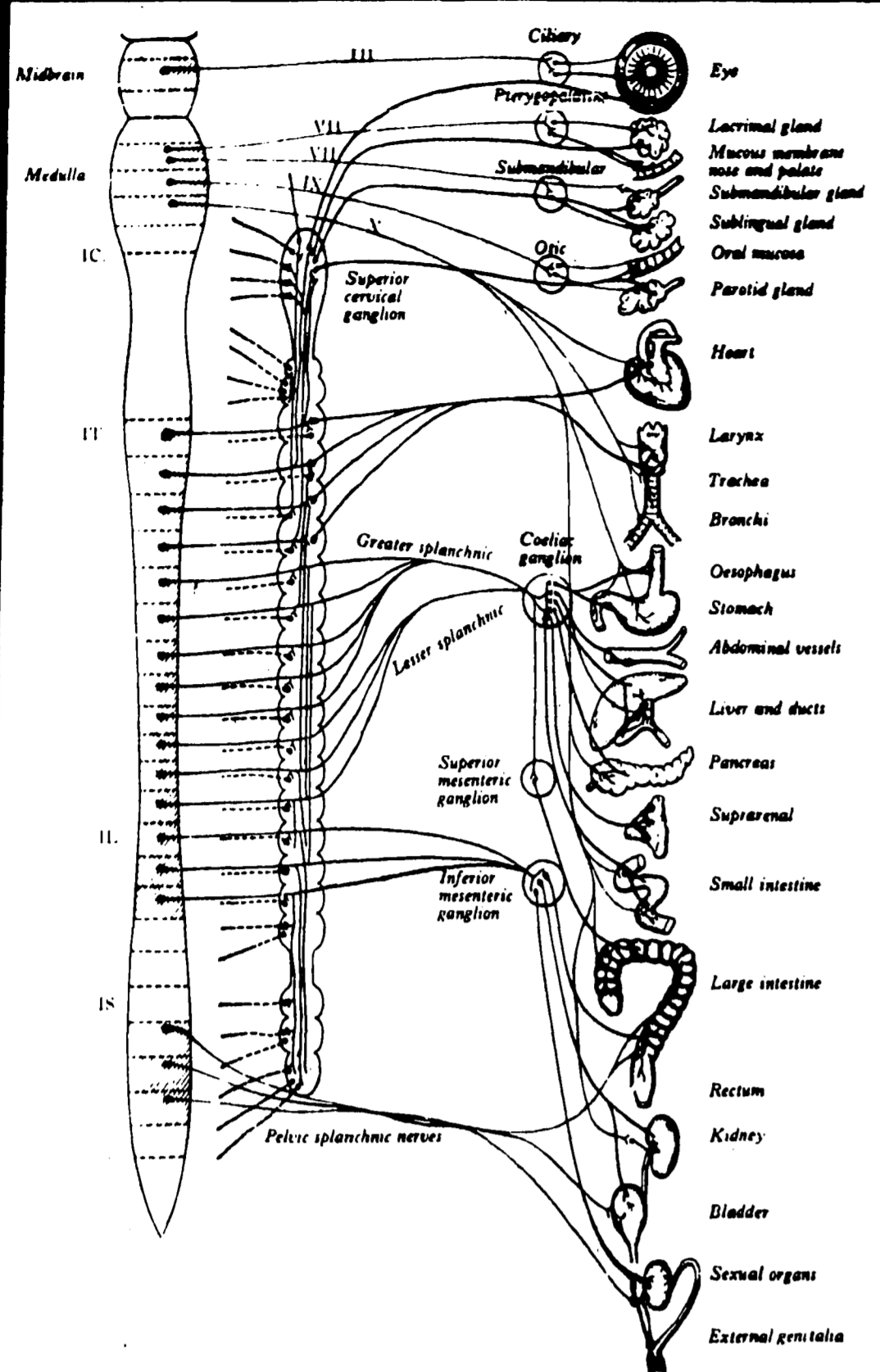
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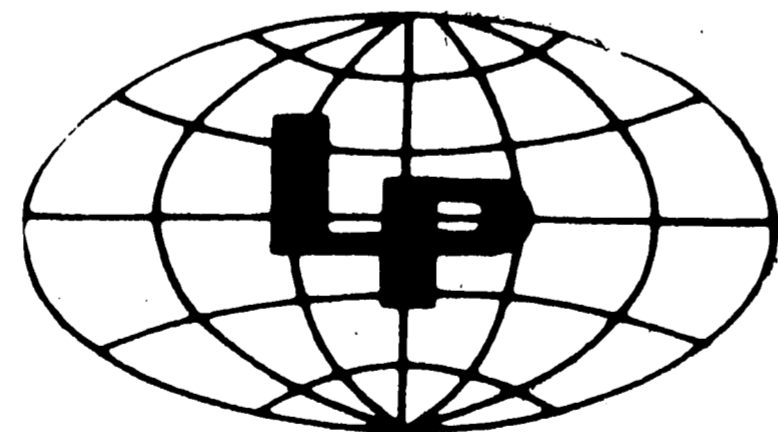
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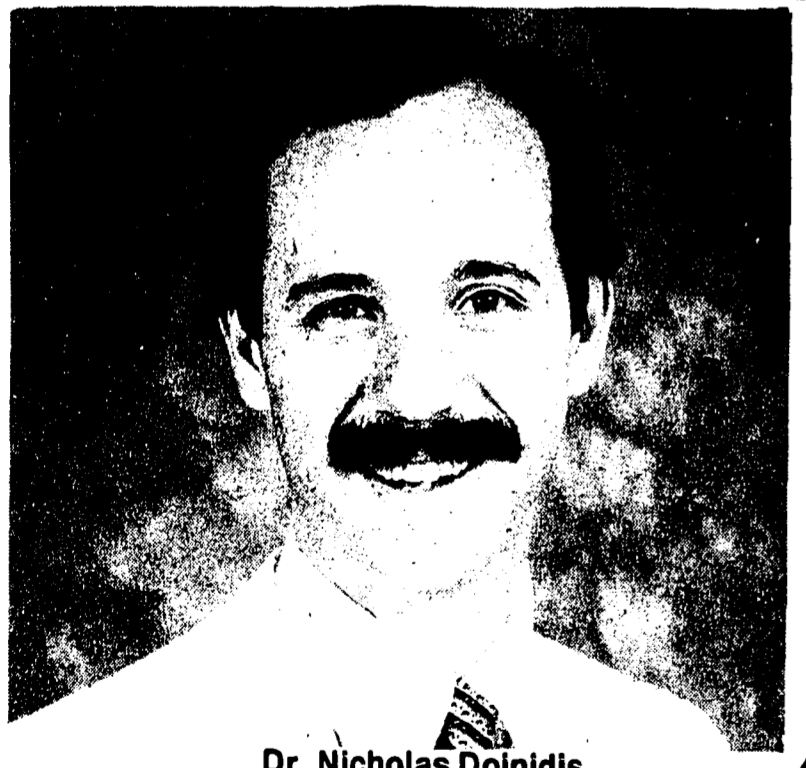
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Helping out

Novi-Northville Fish says Thanksgiving food baskets get a big boost from Scouts

It's easy to think of Thanksgiving as just one more chance to gobble up holiday treats and lounge in front of the television watching parades and football games. Others view Thanksgiving as an opportunity to get together with relatives in other cities and states.

For Kathy McGuffin of Novi-Northville Fish, dozens of Novi Cub Scouts and Boy Scouts, and eight needy families in this area, however, tomorrow will be a real day of thanks-giving: combined efforts by the Scouts and Fish volunteers contributed to the delivery of eight large loads of groceries to those families this week.

"You just don't realize how fortunate you are until you see some of these families," says McGuffin, who heads up the Novi contingent of Fish volunteers. "Some of them are really desperate."

Novi-Northville Fish is a community organization that helps provide temporary food supplies, clothing, child care, shelter and transportation when families in need of assistance call the Fish hotline for help. The organization also provides drivers for elderly and home-bound citizens who need help to make doctor appointments, and marshals volunteers to help with handyman tasks for those who can't do the work themselves.

Fish is a completely non-profit organization staffed by approximately 125 volunteers and it depends on donations and assistance from community service groups like the Jaycees, area churches and businessmen. The group has no fundraising projects.

Collecting supplies for Thanksgiving baskets, an annual project of Fish, received a big boost this year from Novi Scout troops thanks to the efforts of Jim Young, a Novi High School sophomore who is working toward his Eagle Scout ranking.

Part of the requirement for qualifying for the badge is developing a service project that will benefit the community, and Jim's decision to round up younger Novi Scouts for the holiday effort is credited by McGuffin as helping to complete the most successful food drive to date.

Jim approached leaders for Cub Pack 239, which includes five Cub dens and two Webelos dens, asking for their support of the project. He also brought members of his own Scout Troop 51 into the project. Jointly, the youngsters waged a door-to-door campaign asking for donations from community residents.

And the things they came back with, McGuffin says, will be unbelievably useful for the families who received the foodstuffs.

McGuffin delivers the supplies herself, along with another Fish volunteer. All

calls to Fish are kept strictly confidential, she says, as are food basket deliveries.

In some cases, dropping off such needed items is a thankless job, she admits. "There will be a couple of families who will be very upset when we show up," she says. "They don't want to accept charity. It's kind of difficult at times because it has to be handled very discreetly."

Despite occasional protests, however, Fish workers believe the work they do is needed. And McGuffin is convinced that outlying areas really need to start up their own Fish programs, too. She says the Novi-Northville chapter answers quite a few calls for help in Walled Lake and has received queries from South Lyon, although that is simply too far for the group to extend its boundaries.

Pure volume indicates Novi-Northville Fish is dealing with a very real presence of economically-troubled families; to date, Fish volunteers have answered more than 825 calls for help this year alone. Last year, they answered over 400 calls.

As Novi and Northville grow, so do the number of emergency calls, McGuffin explains. And the hard-hitting waves of inflation and unemployment have contributed to keeping Fish volunteers exceptionally busy.

McGuffin simply can't say enough about how fortunate Fish was to have had such help from the local Scouts. Partly, she's pleased because she believes that awareness of other people's difficulties should be instilled at an early age.

But McGuffin also appreciates the Scouts' work because she knows first-hand what good use the food will be put to.

"When I go to deliver the food," she says, "I usually take another member of Fish with me. And on the way back, there's always silence. We are just overwhelmed."

Blood donors honored at recognition ceremony

Five Novi-Walled Lake area residents are among 50 special blood donors who were honored by the American Red Cross Blood Services at the fourth annual Pheresis Recognition Reception.

Local honorees were Leslie Cook, Sverre Jorgensen and Huguette Rainright of Novi and James Kennel and Jon Ferguson of Walled Lake.

Dr. A. William Schafer said the Red Cross considers pheresis donors as "special people" because they don't give whole blood. They give a specific component of their blood for a specific patient. They might give plasma, or platelets or white cells in a procedure that takes two or more hours.

In the pheresis procedure, said Dr.

Schafer, blood is drawn from one arm and passed through a blood separating instrument that separates and collects a single blood component. The remaining blood components, including the red cells, are returned to the donor usually through the other arm. The body normally replaces the component drawn in pheresis within 24 hours.

Pheresis therapy is used to treat patients undergoing cancer therapy or have leukemia or aplastic anemia or other diseases which respond to this type of medical therapy.

Pheresis donors range in age from 17 (with parental consent) to 65. Additional information about the pheresis program may be obtained from the Red Cross at 833-4440, extension 252.

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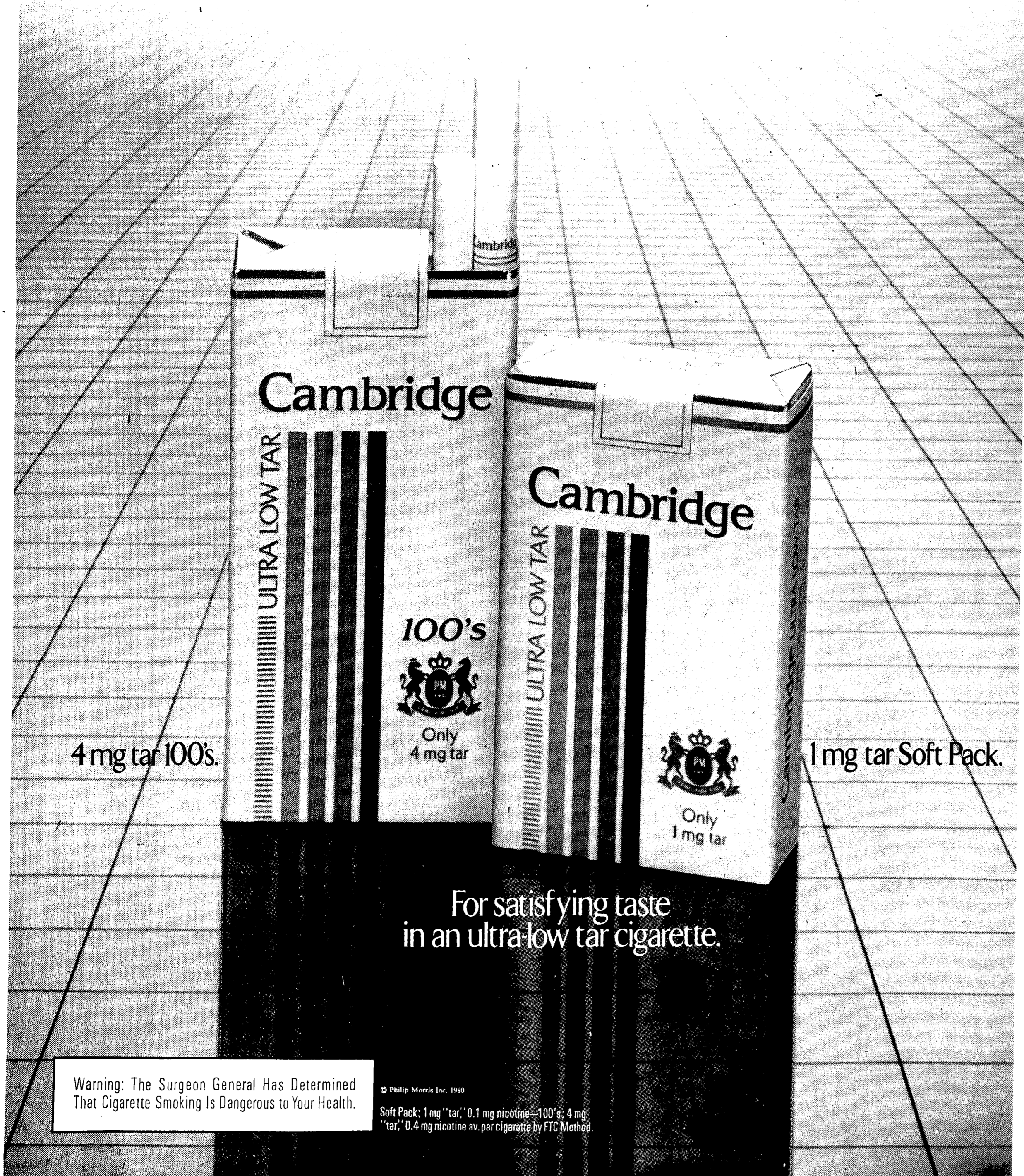

Chiropractors claim treatment is science

"Science begets knowledge, opinion, ignorance."
Hippocrates
Or does it?
For Cornelius J. Farren, doctor of chiropractic whose practice is now located in South Lyon, there was some hard criticism of his choice to become a chiropractor back in 1956.
The criticism did not question his ability to practice as a qualified chiropractor, but rather the criticism was aimed at Farren's desire to become a chiropractor.
"Personally, many friends I grew up

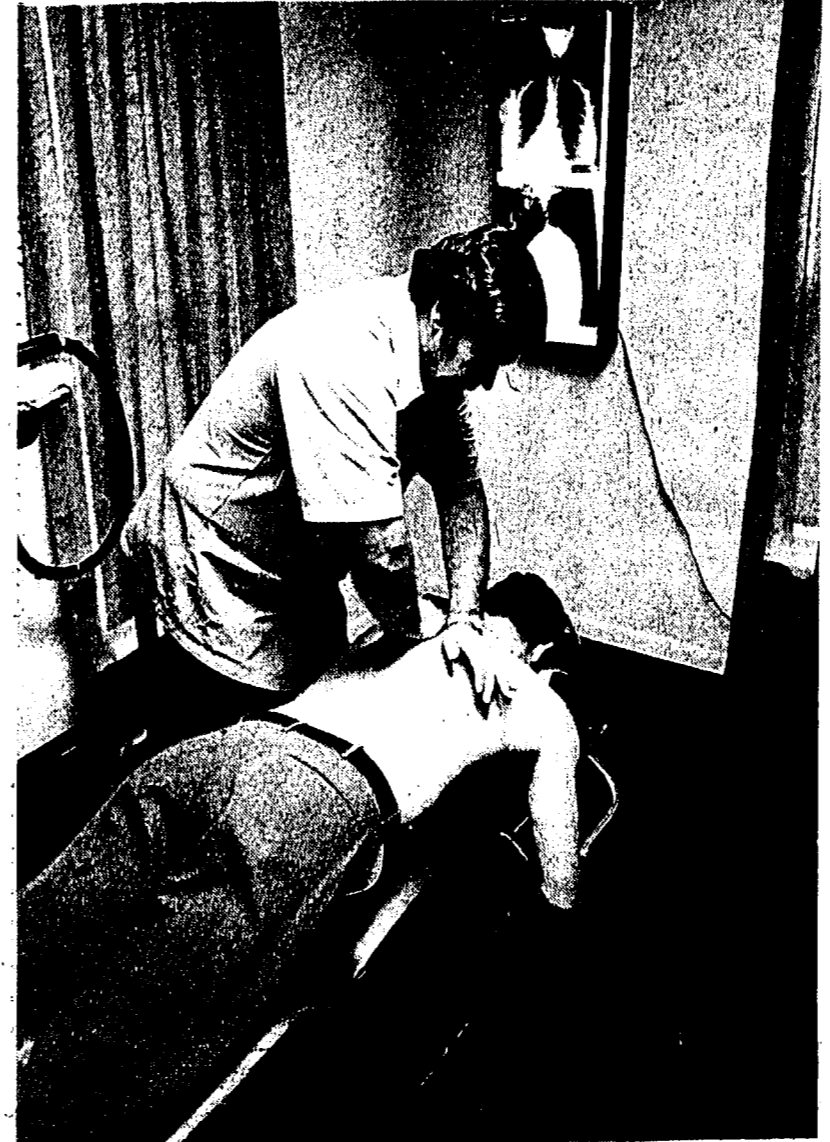
with came to know me as a quack," Farren said. "Sometimes it hurt, when they said I was going to be a quack and rip off the people."
But Farren, now 38, looks back and knew that he made the right decision about his chiropractic profession. Currently, his practice is located in South Lyon, and he said he is keeping busy by treating 25-30 patients daily.
"They had no knowledge of what a chiropractor was at all," Farren said. But the above experience and sometimes critical view society takes on chiropractors had a negative effect on Farren for a time after he became a practicing chiropractor.
"When I first started," Farren said,

"I was very defensive and it usually hurt my ego and confused the patient." According to Dr. Timothy Terry, president of the Michigan Chiropractic Council, the experience Farren went through was not unusual for the times. Terry said the five years between 1965 and 1970 were some of the toughest years for chiropractors.
"They were called quacks, and labeled unprofessional and unethical," Terry said.
The profession of chiropractors was under fire especially from the American Medical Association (AMA). Terry said during that time, the AMA had a committee which existed to criticize the chiropractic profession.
"In the late 1960s it was a big political fight," Terry said. "The AMA had a committee, and that committee's sole purpose was to destroy the chiropractic profession."

But Terry said the move backfired for the AMA. Terry agreed there was a need to improve and upgrade the education of chiropractors, and criticism from the AMA helped to accelerate that process.
"The profession grew out of criticism from the AMA," Terry said. "And we are now a better professional standard at chiropractic colleges are higher, and better qualified instructors are being hired to teach."
Chiropractors, however, are not recognized or affiliated with the AMA. Dr. Marilyn Sauder, a medical doctor and general surgeon with a practice in South Lyon, said she does not see chiropractors in the same class as medical doctors.
"No, they should not be recognized," Sauder said. "I think chiropractors are in the same category as physical therapists."

Sauder said the vast majority of chiropractors have a skill, but she does not believe they have a science.
"They claim a knowledge that is not there," Sauder said. "But I do believe they have an art of relaxing muscles."
The central philosophy of chiropractic medicine deals with the central part of the human body, the spine.
According to the American Chiropractic Association (ACA), "Chiropractic is based on the premise that the relationship between structure and function in the human body is a significant health factor and that such relationship between the spinal column and nervous system is the most significant."
Farren said this is most important in his practice. Farren said chiropractors believe that malfunction of an organ or pain and stiffness in a joint or muscle is caused by an interruption of normal nerve impulses between the brain, spinal column and nervous system.
"As a chiropractor," Farren said, "I do what I can through manipulation to remove the interference."
According to Terry, the blocking of normal nerve impulses that can cause pain and body malfunction is called subluxations. More specifically,

subluxation is the mis-alignment of a vertebrae in the spinal column interfering with the normal nerve transmission.
The human spine has 33 bones called vertebrae. Soft disks between each vertebrae act as shock absorbers and allow for flexibility and movement. The spine also has more than 1,500 supporting muscles and ligaments and 31 pairs of nerves feeding to and from various parts of the body.
To rid the body of subluxations, adjustment and manipulation is used by chiropractors. Terry said an adjustment is moving a specific section of the spine to correct a subluxation. Manipulation is the overall movement of the total spine or any other bone or muscle.
Through these processes, chiropractors claim they can help eliminate pain, and more importantly, find the cause of the pain and try to reduce or eliminate it through adjustments and manipulation.
Leonard Westphal, 24, has been a patient of Farren's for the past 1½ months. Westphal works at the Michigan Seamless Tube Mill in South Lyon as a crane operator. For the past 12 years, Westphal said he has lived with a very painful back.
Westphal first visited regular medical doctors for treatment. But they never found the source of the pain or helped reduce the back pain.

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Vikings grapple with rebuilding

Boy, does Randy Hyde know what it's like to fight an uphill battle.

After three years of coaching the Walled Lake Central wrestling team — and watching the Vikings win just once in each of the past two seasons — Hyde is infinitely familiar with the term "rebuilding." But that's pretty much the outlook again this winter, he says.

"We just didn't get many people to come out last year," Hyde notes, "and it looks pretty much the same this year. I was expecting a much better turnout."

"What can I say? I'm pretty depressed about it."

The Viking grapplers aren't only undermanned, they're underclassed. As of late last week, only 15-20 students had come out for the squad. Among that bunch are just two senior and three junior returnees who will figure prominently in the club's 1980-81 plans.

Leading the seniors will be Steve Allen, a winner in 20 matches last year.

Though Hyde says he's still not positive who'll line up in which weight class, he's presently got Allen pegged at the 132-pound slot.

Joining Allen will be Barney Kelley, a strong but untested battler who's currently slated to fill the 138-pound class. Kelley suffered a broken foot last year, resulting in his missing the entire season.

Moving down to the juniors, Scott Cartwright, Rob Pytel and Ed Brinker will try to boost the Vikes in the middle weights. Cartwright's tentatively slated for duty in the 126-pound category, while Pytel and Brinker currently look to see action at 132 and 145 respectively.

The sophomores consist of four varsity holdovers from last winter. John Andrews (105) and Brian Golin (112) are on one end of the scale while Tim Ginster (155) and Mike Arnold (167) occupy the other end.

Ginster and Arnold, unfortunately, are exceptions on the team — that is, the club has historically had difficulties filling out the heavier weight categories. Hyde explains that many students who would be ideal choices to fill these spots usually play football.

"The upper weight people who play football certainly are familiar with working out," the young pilot states. "But I don't think they want to put in the extra work that you've got to do in wrestling."

"It's just a matter of too much work and too much time for the kids to want to take."

With that in mind, it seems that Central's wrestling coach can only hope that one or two things happen this year, and soon: 1) that one or more surprise grapplers will emerge; and/or 2) that more come out for the team as the season progresses. But Hyde's realistic enough to admit that the chances of either of those hopes panning out are dim.

Central's ultimate real hope, Hyde says, lies within the still-developing bodies of prospective future wrestlers.

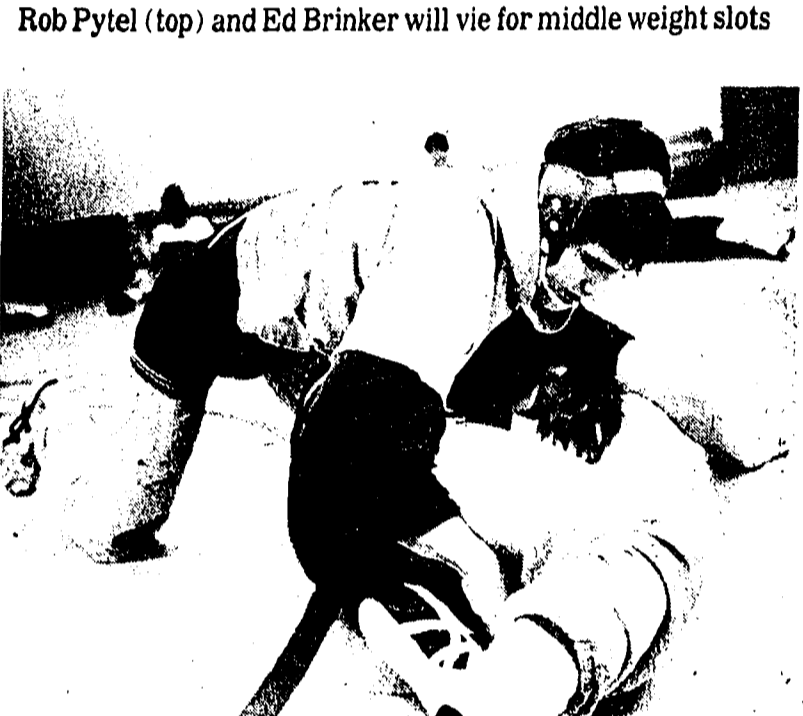
Improvement a key for Wildcat cagers

"This bunch looks as good as the 1973-74 team," the veteran mat mentor says. "We have depth, experience and leadership."

Incidentally, that 73-74 club finished with a 15-1 record.

McBride's optimism is understandable. Seven of his 50-plus varsity hopefuls are seniors, nine more are juniors and the underclassmen show plenty of promise.

Leading this winter's crop, of course, is team captain Angelo Buttazzoni. A participant in the 167-pound weight class this season, he finished fifth in the state at the Class A level a year ago and posted a 39-5 overall record.

Buttazzoni will be flanked by three senior alternate captains for the 1980-81 campaign, and a fine-looking trio it is. Eddie Miu, the author of a 29-1 record a year ago, returns to anchor the 98-pound position. He'll face competition from sophomores Ralph Henriksson and John Desjardins.

The only weight class not yet mentioned (138) seemingly belongs to Frank Hadish right now. The sophomore comes over from neighboring Walled Lake Central.

McBride also has good reason to be optimistic about the future with such freshmen as Bruce Giddings, Matt King, Matt Turner, Ken Tank, Steve McBride, Gino Rea, Bobby Rich and Rod Shev.

Looking at this year, the Western coach says "we have a well-balanced team. We've got a lot of people at all of the spots except 145 and heavyweight."

"It's still early, but we're starting to come around. The ranking matches that we hold (the club was slated to do

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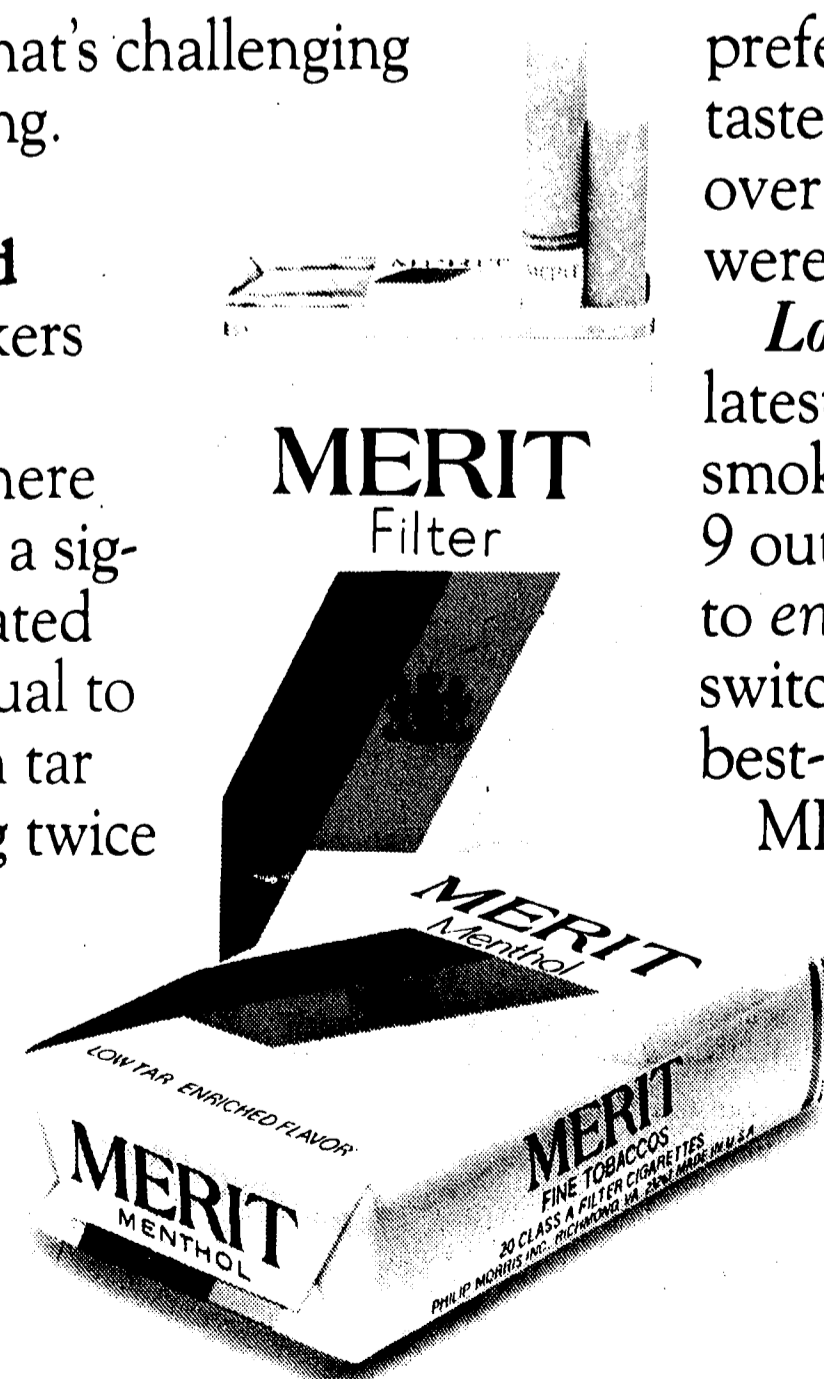

starting line-up at the forward slot, moving forward Caryn Lamb to a guard position "to help our perimeter passing."

The two finals foes met once earlier this season. That was the 1980 opener way back on September 9 when Harte led Brighton to a 61-60 overtime win.

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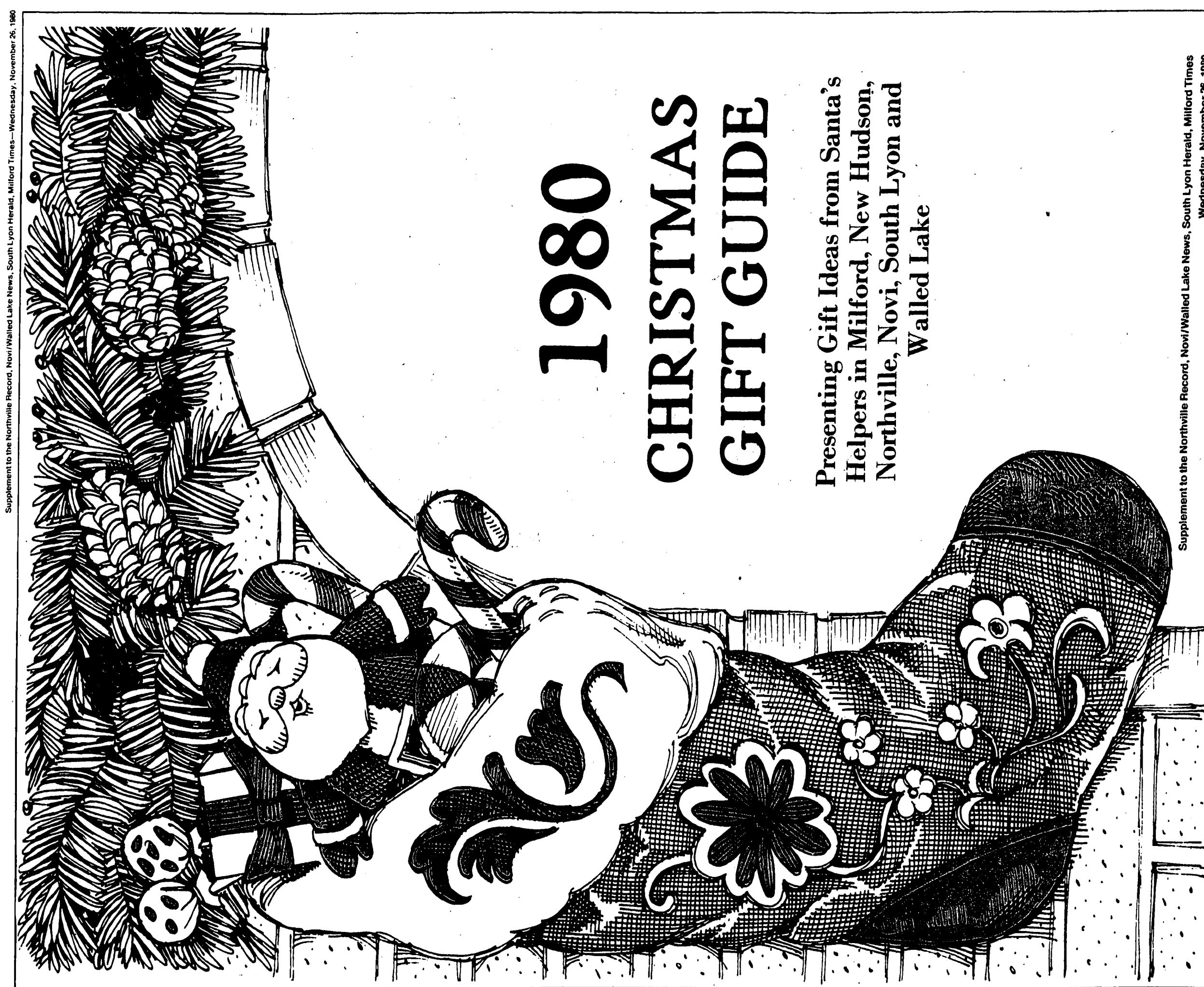
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Symbols of Christmas have varied meaning

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Fish House Punch

The following recipe for Fish House Punch, favorite treat of the Henry Ford Museum and Greenfield Village, is one of the most potent and one of the best originated in 1732 with that famous old Philadelphia Club called the "Slate in Schuykill".

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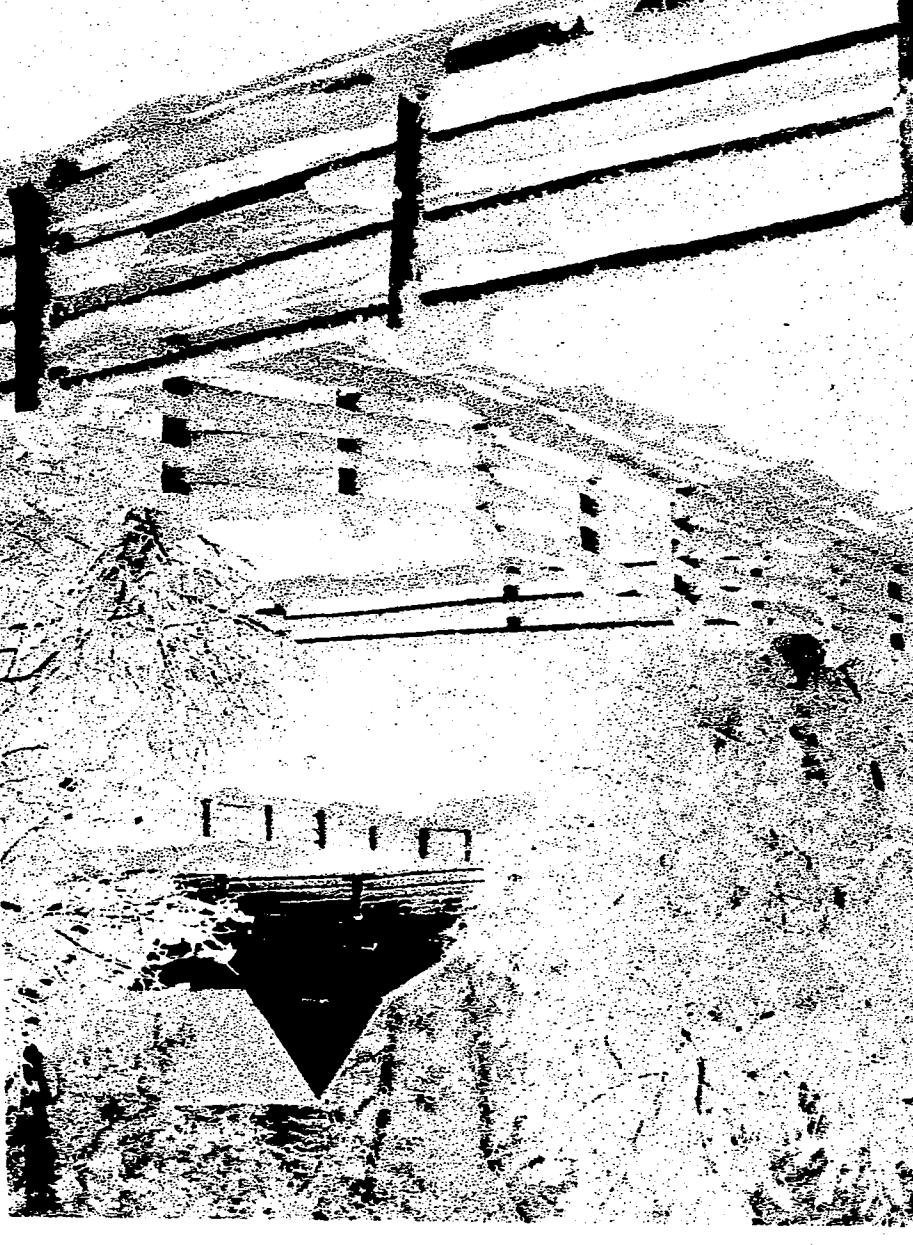

Area residents begin to look forward to the big bird somewhere around October when the fall harvest of pumpkins, squashes and cranberries fills the shelves in anticipation of Thanksgiving.
Most cook the turkey on that last Thursday in November with a table that should rightly be called a "grooming board."
Then, with Christmas shopping, decorating parties and all the other preparations for the season, we give the thought to a Christmas feast that could be a shade different.
Not only is it traditional to present turkey with all its trimmings, it's easier.
But, really, a crown roast of pork or lamb, stuffed in the center with its own ground meat, nuts and cranberries and accompanied by Yorkshire pudding, is not difficult to fix.
A German sauerbraten marinated in ginger snaps, an English standing roast of beef accompanied by Yorkshire pudding, a French breast of veal stuffed with ground pork, rice and olives may require a little more time, but each is well worth the effort.
Recipes for all these treats are available in any good basic cookbook.

Therefore the Jews observe Hanukkah for eight days in honor of this miracle.
Winter rites
Similarly, wintertime festivities took place in early Egyptian and Greek civilizations. The Goths, Saxons and Druids of the northern lands all celebrated the arrival of the winter solstice with great feasting and sacred rituals.
These pagan rituals eventually melded with the Christian celebration of the birth of Christ, and the season's
festivities took on an international character as Christianity grew in acceptance throughout the centuries.
At first, the Church resisted observation of pagan rituals but, failing in that attempt, it incorporated the forms into the Christian celebration.
Custom of gift-giving
Perhaps the most well-known and widespread of all Christmas traditions is the practice of giving gifts.
The early Romans made gifts to their emperors during Saturnalia; the three wise men, or Magi, brought gifts of gold, frankincense and myrrh to the Christ child; and an archbishop from Lycia brought the gift of faith to many.
This generous archbishop from Asia Minor was the good Saint Nicholas, or Santa Claus, the patron saint of girls and boys.
Children all over the world write to him at his home at the North Pole with their gift requests, a practice which has been abstracted from a Germanic legend.
The symbols of Christmas are both sacred and secular. From special holiday cakes to the star on the Christmas tree, from sidewalk Santas to the scene of the nativity, the mix of pagan and Christian symbolism is thorough.
Celtic traditions
Kissing under the mistletoe stems from ancient Celtic tradition.

Decorating the tree — in early times, with fruits and sweets — stems from an early Germanic worship of vegetation.
Sending Christmas greetings to friends and associates to express friendship and good-will first came about in Victorian England.
An English first
Queen Victoria's husband, Prince Albert, introduced the first Christmas tree in England from his native Austria in 1841.
Centuries-old customs have been handed down in a spirit of heart-warming brotherhood. Children grow excited at the thought of Santa's visit, or the chance to sit on his knee at the local department store.
Singers both young and old venture out into the crisp night, filling the air with the sweet sounds of Christmas carols.
College students gather in the dorm lounge, surrounded by bowls of popcorn, needles and thread, red and green ribbons, and an eight-foot tree waiting to be decorated.
Heart-warming season
Very few hearts escape being touched by the spirit of Christmas. Bustling commuters don't seem as easily bristled during the holiday season.
The mailman steps a little lighter, despite the increased weight in his bag. Teachers give less homework. Mothers
allow their babes an hour or two longer before bedtime.
Christmastime is time to take stock of the good things in life; the simple pleasures, the comforts, the blessings of family and friends.
Pleasures of memory
And, when the 12 days of Christmas have passed, and the decorations return to their boxes until next year, there always is the lingering pleasure in remembering all those smiling faces and dancing eyes in his bag, the true symbols of holiday happiness.

Greenfield Village buildings wrapped in holiday past

Yule log rooted in ancient past

Of the many Christmas traditions that have survived through the ages, one of the most ancient is the ceremonial lighting of the Yule log on Christmas eve.

It is a tradition that is more strongly rooted in European culture than in our own, yet it is not uncommon for an American family—including those in this area—to gather around the hearth on Christmas eve, sipping eggnog and watching flames dance.

Ancient tradition

This ceremony dates back to the time of the Saxons and Goths, as well as the early Germanic tribes, who burned such a log at their festival of the winter solstice.

The log was often a stump or root of a tree that had been obtained from one's own land or a neighboring woods, and which was brought into the house not to be affected by all the activity and preservative in the water at its base. "Even nicer," say the economists, "delicious peanut brittle can now be made quickly and easily in a microwave oven. No more stirring constantly and checking closely until the mixture reaches the proper temperature."

Quick-cooking

The following recipe takes only nine minutes to prepare in a microwave oven, and it's so good you'll want to make several batches for gift-giving, too.

OLD FASHIONED PEANUT BRITTLE

1 cup raw peanuts
1/2 cup sugar
1/2 cup white corn syrup
1 tsp. salt
1 tsp. baking soda
1 tsp. vanilla

In a 1 1/2-quart casserole, stir together peanuts, sugar, syrup and salt. Cook for 10 minutes at HIGH, stirring well after four minutes.

Add butter and vanilla. Cook one minute longer at HIGH. Add baking soda and quickly stir until light and foamy.

Immediately pour onto lightly buttered baking sheet.

Spread out thin.

When cool, break into pieces. Store in air-tight container.
