

Annexation of Novi Township in question

Some law suits never die, or even fade away.

Like a ghost come back to haunt city officials, Novi Township has won an appeal of the 1979 circuit court decision which gave the city the authority to annex seven township parcels.

"I thought this case was over with," City Attorney David Fried told the city council Monday.

But it's not over yet.

The Michigan Court of Appeals has ruled that the Ingham County Circuit Court was wrong when it decided to uphold the state boundary commission's action and to authorize the city's taking jurisdiction of the seven township parcels.

That means the state boundary com-

mission, which decides annexation matters, could again be asked to review its decision to approve the annexation of seven of the eight township parcels.

The boundary commission approved the annexation in 1972 and, after a reconsideration of that decision ordered by the Michigan Supreme Court, the annexation was approved again in 1978.

Fried says the city will not accept the appeal court decision and intends to take the matter to the Michigan Supreme Court.

"The court of appeals doesn't even have the facts right," said Fried.

According to the decision by the appeals court, the matter must be reconsidered by the boundary commission because that body did not spell out the reasons it decided against including the

eight township parcel in the annexation.

According to the appeal court decision: "Ingham County Circuit Court erred in denying Novi Township's (request that the commission review its decision) on the grounds that the boundary commission was required only to make a decision and that decision had been made. The decision also must be a meaningful one, as required by law. By not examining the evidence and applying the criteria required by law, the commission's decision was arbitrary, capricious and clearly in violation of law."

Which is to say that state law provides a set of criteria under which all annexation petitions are reviewed. When the boundary commission made its decision, no explanation of their ac-

tion was recorded, an action to which the appeals court took exception.

The appeals court decision also focuses on the question: "What did the Michigan Supreme Court expect when it asked the boundary commission to reconsider its decision regarding the annexation of the seven parcels?"

Under the appeal court ruling, the supreme court was asking the boundary commission not only to review the question of amending the original annexation petition, but also to consider a separate petition which asked for the annexation of Brookland Farms, even though that petition was defeated by voters in the area proposed for annexation in 1973.

"The circuit court and the attorney general's office have both made decisions on what the Supreme Court wanted when it asked the boundary commission to review its decision, but apparently the of appeals doesn't

believe them," Fried said. "Beyond that, I can make no sense of what the appeals court wants the boundary commission to do. Part of our case before the state supreme court will be asking it to interpret what the appeals court has said. Until the court decides whether it will hear this question things will be status quo in the township," Fried said. (see related story)

While the city prepares to fight the decision, Novi Township Attorney John Bauckham says the decision was one he and his clients had been hoping for.

"This is the position we've taken all along. The boundary commission did act arbitrarily by not including the eighth parcel. There is no reason not to include it in the annexation that do not apply to the other seven parcels. And when they considered the matter a second time there was no decision, no findings of fact. We felt the boundary commission had not performed its job and

the appeals court has agreed."

Chris Dembowski of the state attorney general's office offered much the same opinion of the appeals court decision.

"The court of appeals wants the commission to look more closely at the overall question as to whether it would be more reasonable to include the eighth parcel with the other seven," Dembowski said. "The commission had before it a petition to annex seven parcels, which it approved. When the question came before them a second time they decided they didn't want the eighth parcel included. But they didn't include findings of fact or hold public hearings. Apparently the court thinks this should have been treated as a full annexation question from the first step."

He went on to say the attorney general's office had not analyzed the case yet.

Parks and Rec sets Snofest

If you think snow means slippery road conditions, wet shoes and shovelling the driveway, the Novi Parks and Recreation Commission suggests that you think again.

In fact, officials at the Novi department are hoping for an abundance of the white stuff February 21 and 22. Those are the scheduled dates for the Snofest, a fun-filled outdoor extravaganza that will feature six activities.

Just name the snow-related happening and chances are it'll be on tap that weekend. Planned events include a cross-country ski race; ice skating races; a co-ed flag football tournament; an ice fishing derby; a snow sculpture contest; and a field day.

"We're designing Snofest for the family," said Bill Scott, recreation supervisor for the commission. "It really should be a great time. Hopefully, the whole community will want to participate."

Whether or not the entire community chooses to do just that, everyone — young and old — will certainly have an opportunity. Some events will include up to 10 age divisions, and one — the ice skating races — will total 14.

The skating races will be held Saturday afternoon during Snofest. They'll take place at Lakeshore Park on Walled Lake, with the distance being one or two laps around the rink. Entry fee is just \$1; late registration begins at 1 p.m. that day in the Lakeshore Park Community Building.

Then there's the Novi Nordic Classic, slated for February 21 at Ella Mae Powers Park. There will be 10 age divisions, with medals going to the top three finishers in each division. Distance for the cross-country ski action is 2.4 to 4.8 kilometers.

Race time for the Classic is 10:30 a.m., and the entry fee is \$3. Late registration at a cost of \$4 will be held at Novi High School, beginning an hour before the race.

For those of you who still have to satisfy your football fix, the Snoball Tournament is co-ed flag football at its best. The rules for the games — which will be held at Ella Mae Powers Park Saturday and Sunday — stipulate that a "flag" pulled from the belt of an opposing player constitutes a "tackle." A limit of eight teams can participate in the single-elimination event at a cost of

\$25 per team. Entry deadline is February 16.

Want to enter a family event? Try snow sculpturing. Categories include originality and largest sculptures, and entries must be 75 percent snow or ice. Cost is just a dollar per entry, so design a figure at your home and enter.

The Ice Fishing Derby, which also costs only \$1 to enter, will occur Sunday, February 22, at Lakeshore Park. A mass start will take place at noon at the Lakeshore Park Beach, while registration begins at 11:30 a.m. in the park's Community Building. There will be eight age divisions and two categories.

Last — but not least — is the field day, which includes four events for all ages. The saucer relay will include teams of an adult and child; the ball-hop relay will feature teams of two adults and two children; the snowshoe races will include seven male and female age groups travelling about 40 yards; and the tug-o-war will pit community groups against each other.

Until Supreme Court acts Township remains in city

What happens when the annexation that the city has considered as fact for nearly two years is suddenly rejected by the Michigan Court of Appeals?

Nothing, yet. Decisions rendered by the court of appeals which are being challenged at the supreme court level are considered "stayed" until a decision in the matter is reached by the high court.

Novi City Attorney David Fried has announced the city will appeal a decision by the court of appeals to the Michigan Supreme Court.

"The city will continue to treat the annexation as a fact until the Supreme Court tells us otherwise," Fried said. "We will continue to operate with the seven annexed parcels as part of the city until the Supreme Court says 'no,'" Fried said.

Next in the sequence of events is that the state supreme court will decide whether the state boundary commission acted properly when it approved the annexation of seven of eight parcels of Novi Township or whether it must reconsider its action.

If the Supreme Court rules in favor of the city, the annexation will be upheld. But if the township prevails, the question must again be considered by the boundary commission.

As Township Attorney John Bauckham put it, if the township prevails it could be "a mess."

"I tried to get a stay of transfer (of township property to the city), but the court rejected it. Now people are realizing what a mess we're in."

Problems the attorney foresees include taxes, rezonings and city elections.

"The township has not collected taxes, while the city

has collected them at the city rate. What happens to the excess money — the difference between what the township would have collected and what the city did collect? My position is that if this decision is upheld the city will have to pay back to the taxpayers the money that it has collected erroneously."

Bauckham said the rezoning decisions the city has made also would be "improper." Novi has zoned all of the seven parcels to bring them into conformance with the city's zoning ordinance.

But Fried said he would be "very surprised" if the annexation, which has already taken effect, would be overturned.

"Remember that the township's request that the city be restrained from taking jurisdiction was denied by both the circuit court and the appeals court, and the Supreme Court did not restrain the city from taking jurisdiction."

Regarding the repayment of taxes, Fried said that while the annexation was undecided — between 1972 and 1979 — the township collected taxes at the township rate. When the question of taxation arose the city decided not to collect back taxes from Novi Township, although it could have been argued the money rightfully belonged to the city.

Fried said he believed the same type of reasoning would be applied to the city — taxes collected by the city would not have to be returned to the township if the annexation were reversed.

Novi took jurisdiction in seven parcels of Novi Township in February 1979. Police patrols, rezoning, placing township residents on the tax rolls and registering them as voters in Novi were among the actions taken by the city after the annexation became effective.

Paving projects, resurfacing priorities in proposed program

Priorities for new road construction as seen by Novi city administrators include the further extension of Decker Road, paving Meadowbrook from Twelve to Thirteen Mile, and paving Eleven Mile from Grand River to Meadowbrook, according to a proposed five-year road plan unveiled Monday by City Manager Edward Kriewall.

Council members are scheduled to discuss the road program in a special work session February 9.

The five-year road plan was developed to prioritize road construction and maintenance projects — an action necessitated by voter rejection in November of special assessments against residential property owners for construction of major roads and maintenance of subdivision roads.

In explaining the proposed plan, Kriewall said that paving both Meadowbrook and Decker roads from Twelve to Thirteen Mile would relieve traffic currently using Novi Road.

The manager has suggested the council may want to authorize engineering design work on both roads so the city can be prepared to pave the roads when development accelerates.

It will be determined which road will be built first during the design stage.

Kriewall recommends the engineering be undertaken in 1981 and a decision on which road is constructed first would be based on the engineers' findings.

Eleven Mile should be paved because the "potential for development in this largely industrial corridor is imminent," according to Kriewall.

Sanitary sewer and the potential for water line extensions already exist in that area. Constructing Eleven Mile would round out the utilities needed in that area to open it for development, Kriewall said.

"The merit of paving this segment is more development than traffic relief, but we do have the potential of special assessing in this largely non-residential area," Kriewall reported.

In another portion of the road pro-

gram, aging streets in four subdivisions should be resurfaced as soon as possible, Kriewall said. He projects repairs could cost as much as \$678,000.

Streets in Meadowbrook Lake, Willowbrook Estates Sub 1 and Westridge Downs as well as the entrance to Brookland Farms are showing enough aging and wear to warrant resurfacing, Kriewall noted.

"Other than these four subdivisions, there is no evidence of other general resurfacing needs that can be identified at present," he said.

Road repairs in other subdivisions can be funded by Act 51 monies, Kriewall said. (Act 51 funds are state gasoline and weight taxes which are allocated to local municipalities based on a formula which includes miles of major and local roads and population).

Other projects foreseen include intersection improvements, mile road overlays, sealing road joints and engineering studies.

Kriewall projected the intersection of Thirteen Mile and Novi Road, the intersection of Ten Mile and Novi Road, and the intersection of Twelve Mile and Haggerty Road should be improved in the next five years.

A buildup of asphalt on the recently-paved mile roads should begin as soon as possible, Kriewall reported.

Engineering work should be planned for Grand River and the Novi Road ring-road plan and for mile road alignment surveys.

Regarding the funding for the majority of the projects, Finance Director Les Gibson said, "Indications are that the major and local street funds should do a little better than cover the cost of maintaining streets starting in 1980-81."

"However, lighter more fuel-efficient vehicles have reduced the gas and weight tax receipts. Until the effects of this trend can be evaluated along with (additional funds the city expects as a result of) the new census I would not recommend anticipating any funding of construction from this source."

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Bullish on Novi

Commercial developments move ahead despite economy

The health of the economy is a topic that has been cussed and discussed. But the bleak economic conditions haven't slowed down the developers of three major projects in Novi who remain "bullish on Novi" and are moving full speed ahead with plans to open this year.

The two most imminent projects — the West Oaks (K mart) shopping center and Art Van Furniture — both are located in the so-called regional center area around Twelve Oaks Mall. In addition, plans for the Marty Feldman Chevrolet dealership on Grand River Avenue also are moving forward at a substantial pace despite the economic forecasts.

The development most likely to have the earliest opening date is the Art Van Furniture Store on the west side of Novi Road, opposite Twelve Oaks Mall. Kenneth Van, personnel director for Art Van, reported last week that the exterior of the store has been just completed and interior workers are presently installing dry wall and electrical work on the inside of the building.

Van said he is looking for an opening

in March or early April. The Art Van store in Novi will contain 55,000 square feet, making it the largest in the Art Van chain which extends across the state.

Not only will it be the largest Art Van store, it also represents something of a new approach in merchandising for the chain because it will include a design gallery which will feature "upper-end" merchandise, according to Van.

Van expressed no reservations about proceeding with the opening of the new store in site of the economic conditions. "We're very optimistic about the future of our company and the Novi community," he said.

Although it appears as if Art Van Furniture will be the first of the new developments to open in Novi, the West Oaks shopping center won't be far behind. West Oaks is the largest of the three major projects slated for opening this year.

Structural steel at West Oaks has been erected and the exterior walls are presently being constructed.

West Oaks will have K mart and Service Merchandise Catalogue Store as

Final plans set for regional center area

Final plans have been completed for the construction of roads, water mains and storm sewers in the regional center area opposite Twelve Oaks Mall on the west side of Novi Road — known as Section 15.

The plans specify how the city expects utilities within the development to proceed. Putting the utilities, such as roads, water mains and sewers in the ground opens the interior of Section 15 for

development.

It now is expected the project will cost a total of \$6.2 million, council members learned Monday.

That breaks down to \$4.4 million for the road system, \$1.3 million for the storm sewer and nearly \$500,000 for the water system.

City Engineer Harry Mosher told the council that as the plans have evolved the price of constructing the utilities has gone from an initial \$8 million to \$5



Walled Lake-Novi sludge site eyed

Milford Township site considered

The head of the Walled Lake-Novi waste treatment plant will soon ask for Milford Township approval to spread a dry sludge from the city's plant on 30 acres of farmland.

James E. Johnson, agricultural engineer for the DNR's wastewater operations section, said the sludge consists almost entirely of phosphate, potash and various forms of nitrogen.

The material will be applied according to strict guidelines which govern a land application program. The sludge will not be applied within 500 feet of a residence; within 150 feet of a private drinking water well; within 200 feet of property lines or within 200 feet of roads.

"All that will be allowed is enough phosphate to grow a corn crop," Johnson said.

The concept of the program is to employ human waste to fertilize crops instead of attempting to treat it in waste treatment plants, Johnson said.

Johnson explained that the DNR and Dowson do not establish the program without the approval of the township's officials.

"We do not want to begin to apply the sludge in areas where it is not wanted," Johnson said.

Dowson said the project was "an effort to gain full control over the sludge. Right now I pay someone \$12 per yard to haul it away, and I don't know what he's doing with it. Now I'll know what he's doing with the sludge, and I'll have control over it," he added.

Milford Township learned with surprise last week that the DNR had ap-

proved of the land application program. Johnson apologized for the way in which the township learned of the program and explained it was not his intent to slough the township's authority.

"The copy of my letter giving tentative approval to the project got to Mr. (Robert) Garrity, the township's supervisor, before Mr. Dowson was able to talk with him," Johnson explained.

Johnson said this week he would be discussing a similar plan with officials representing the Village of Milford. The plan in Milford cannot undertake a land application program because the sludge contains harmful organisms, he said.

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Volunteers still needed to donate seniors rides

At least a little relief will be supplied to Walled Lake Villa residents looking for a ride.

Barbara Sharp of the Oakland-Livingston Human Service Agency (OLHSA) said two drivers have volunteered rides for senior citizens stranded because of the Oakland County Advanced Reservation Transportation (OCART) strike.

"Two people called and volunteered their services for Monday and Tuesday (the days most desired for rides)," Sharp said.

Through the combined efforts of OLHSA, The Walled Lake News and the City of Walled Lake, a "driver hotline" has been established in OLHSA offices. People are being urged to call 624-5520 to help out.

Several things of notice have happened during the first week of the program. Sharp noted that Sister Sheila of St. William's Parish and her church's support by getting the information into their church bulletin.

In addition, Sharp recorded one unusual call.

"An OCART driver called," she noted. "She was happy that something was being done and suggested individuals write letters to SEMTA urging them to settle the strike."

Sharp said the driver recognized that numerous groups had contacted SEMTA officials about concerns. But the OCART employees said individual correspondence might mean more in getting the dispute resolved.

The four-month long OCART strike is at the heart of the Villa's transportation dilemma. Previously, residents could subscribe to the service and attain a

permanent reservation for weekly pick-up under the 30-bus system.

Short-term reservations for rides were also available on 24 hours notice. Sharp recognized that the economic climate may be contributing to the initial low response. She observed that with people being out of work and the soaring gasoline prices — volunteers might not be as willing.

Still, there is optimism that more drivers can be attained.

Interested volunteers are asked to call OLHSA at 624-5520 and leave their names, phone numbers and information regarding when they would be able to supply rides. Rides can be offered on a one-time basis, but Villa residents are hoping to find people who can drive weekly during a regular time period.

Mondays and Tuesdays between 9 a.m. and 3:30 p.m. have been targeted as times most desirable for rides to hospitals, clinics, stores or friends' homes. But any free time would be appreciated as well.

Information collected by OLHSA is being delivered to the Villa where potential drivers' data will be posted on a bulletin board for seniors seeking rides.

Villa residents have expressed the desire to offer monetary donations to drivers who might assist in covering gasoline expenses.

Drivers might include their ability to accommodate handicapped residents in submitting information.

Among some of the more sought after rides are transportation to and from Woodland Medical Center and Twelve Oaks Mall in Novi and the Henry Ford Hospital outpatient clinic in West Bloomfield.

Union demands list key in opening negotiations

Walled Lake City Manager J. Michael Dorman is hopeful that a swift and judicious decision can be reached when clerical and Department of Public Works (DPW) employees begin contract negotiations during the upcoming months.

The city manager was optimistic that the 1981 negotiations "could be very fast."

"I'd just as soon suggest it's going to be a smooth process," Dorman said.

Probably few members of the union associated with the American Federation of State, County and Municipal Employees (AFSCME) would argue with Dorman's wishful thinking.

During March of 1979, the city employees went on a three-day strike after working eight straight months without a contract. The union's nine members began their walkout after attempts to have their chief spokesman address the city council proved unsuccessful. Conflicts over cost-of-living allowances were the final straw that put the union members out on the picket lines.

A three-year contract, scheduled to expire this June 30, was signed during May 1979. The pact was retroactive to July 1, 1978 and allowed for a 10 percent raise during that first year and seven percent each in the second and third years.

Talks for the last contract did not begin until April, allowing three months before the pact would expire.

This year, Dorman said it will be up to the union to inform the city of its demands.

"They'll have to come up with a list or non-list of demands saying this is what has to be done."

"The city would be looking for a request by the union. And the city would respond," Dorman added.

Bus mishap kills boy

A third grader at Keith Elementary School died Monday as a result of injuries he received after being run over by the school bus he had exited. Sgt. Jerry McClure of the White Lake Police Department said.

McClure said witnesses stated Michael Roy Thompson, 8, of 9170 Cooley Lake Road, Union Lake, exited a school bus at the intersection of Cooley Lake Road and Cooley Approach at 3:15 p.m. and was knocked down and run over by the rear wheel of the bus.

The driver, Leno Sacco, 56, told police he did not see the youngster, McClure remarked.

The sergeant said the driver was not held, but noted that the investigation is continuing. The victim was transported to Pontiac General Hospital by Riverside Ambulance where he died about three hours after the accident.

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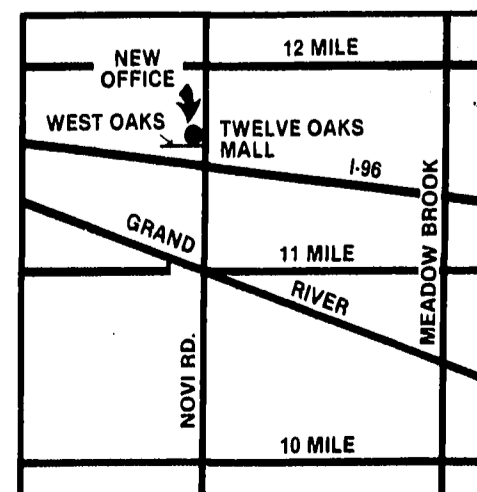
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Board to set millage date

Committee studies school finances

Ronald Frizzell of Union Lake has been appointed chairman of a special citizens committee which will look into the financial status of the Walled Lake School District.

The committee was formed to investigate the district's financial status and formulate a recommendation as to how the school board should deal with a projected deficit of \$915,800 in the 1981-82 school year.

Specifically, the committee is expected to make a recommendation as to whether the Walled Lake Schools should attempt to solve their financial problems by asking voters to approve additional millage.

The committee was formed after Assistant Superintendent for Business Harry Carlson projected that the district will have a \$1,057 million deficit in the current school year and an

\$815,800 deficit in 1981-82. Although the deficit in the current school year will be offset by a fund equity account of approximately \$1.54 million, the remaining fund equity will be insufficient to cover the 1981-82 deficit.

The projected \$815,800 deficit in 1981-82 does not include any pay raises for employees beyond regular incremental increases. Virtually all of the district's employee unions are scheduled to negotiate new contracts this year.

Carlson has reported that a one percent improvement in the wage schedule for all employees equates to \$170,000. If school employees negotiate new contracts calling for a seven percent increase, the total cost to the district would be \$1.19 million.

A seven percent increase in the salary schedule would swell the projected deficit in the 1981-82 year to more than \$2 million.

Superintendent Don Sheldon stated that the committee will have free access to all the district's financial records so that it can reach a decision as to what direction the district should take — seek more millage or implement additional cutbacks in programs and personnel.

Sheldon also stated that he will recommend that the school board schedule a date for a millage election at its February 9 meeting.

"We have to reserve a date with the Oakland County Elections Division at this time in order to have a spring millage election," Sheldon explained.

"If the committee recommends that we not seek additional millage, the board can always come back and nullify the date."

Other members of the committee are George Allard of Union Lake, Pat Bell of West Bloomfield, Randall Bryant of Walled Lake, Cynthia Campion of Walled Lake, Marilyn Cooper of West Bloomfield, Nancy Dingledey of Wixom and Sharon DiRezo of Walled Lake.

Also on the committee are Jim Edwards of Walled Lake, Jacqueline Friedman of West Bloomfield, Don and Wanda Hicks of Union Lake, Ed Hunter of Walled Lake, Shirley Huntington of Walled Lake, Pat Jackman of West Bloomfield, Don Lechner of Pontiac and Patricia Mansfield of Union Lake.

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Connelly looks at lake rehab extension

The Wolverine Lake Village Lake Board has asked lake board attorney Thomas Connelly to find out whether the contract between the board and P&M Marine, project contractors for the Wolverine Lake Village lake rehabilitation, can accommodate extending the time period during which work on the lake would be done.

According to Connelly, who also serves as attorney for the village, the lake board directed him to research the contract because it was uncertain what legal problems could arise if it decided to hold a second drawdown this fall so individual beach cleanups could be completed.

Lakefront improvements — while not

actually part of the rehabilitation project that has involved installing a secondary well and dam drawdown mechanism, and removing several hundred tree stumps from the lake bottom — are the only phase of the Wolverine Lake rehab project engineers believe cannot be completed before spring or original plans.

Phil Braswell and Jim Burns of Snell Environmental Group, project engineers, recently suggested the lake board and village consider holding a second drawdown this fall so that all interested residents could have improvements done to their beaches. According to the engineers, because the project was delayed longer than ex-

pected, P&M Marine will be unable to do all the work residents would like to have done.

Connelly says the contract specifies "a time frame within which (the contractor) had to complete the work. We are trying to determine what extending the time frame would do that contract."

While Connelly has not yet made a recommendation to either the lake board or village council, he believes both sides will be able to renegotiate the contract without running into legal difficulties. According to the contract, he says, P&M Marine was to have started work sometime in November, but because of unavoidable delays he was unable to actually begin working until

January, which adversely affected the time table for beach cleanups.

Renegotiating the contract would probably be centered on only one area, Connelly says: covering inflationary costs of sand and other materials needed to do the beach work. "He bid on the opportunity to contract with the individual lot owners," Connelly says of P&M Marine, "and he doesn't want to be held to those prices if his costs go up."

Connelly says he expects to make a recommendation to the lake board and village council in the near future, possibly as soon as the February 10 meeting of the council, set to begin at 7:30 p.m. in the village offices.

DSS move pleases users

"Those that can will be able to walk to it. I'm sure they'll be happy."

Jerry Beers, vice president of the Lakes Agency Council, was happy with the relocation site, but concerned about commissioners' decision to move DSS out of the McComb Building.

"I'm pleased to see they're staying in Walled Lake," Beers said. "However, I'm not convinced, as the Board of Commissioners were, that this is a wise use of taxpayers' money."

Beers spoke before the commissioners last fall urging them to leave DSS offices in McComb and find housing for the 52nd District Court elsewhere.

Sherris Meadows of Oakland-Livingston Human Service Agency (O.L.H.S.A.), also supported the retention of DSS offices in the Walled Lake area. Meadows was among agency representatives, who attended the Board of Commissioners' meeting that Beers spoke at.

"Oh, terrific," she said upon first hearing that Consumers had been selected as the new site for the DSS offices. "I feel that it's going to be good for the seniors and low-income families in the Villa and complex behind it."

Meadows added that she was pleased DSS decided to stay in Walled Lake.

"If they had moved towards Union Lake, it would have been a disastrous move. People come from South Lyon to use the offices. If they had moved to Union Lake, they might as well have moved to Pontiac," she concluded.

Walled Lake City Manager J. Michael Dorman believes the retention of social services in the city will be important to the business district.

"It's a positive move," Dorman observed, "that means retention of jobs, retention of one of the main businesses and climate."

Four facilities were eyed as housing for the DSS offices. Other sites that were considered included the vacant Great Scott store in Walled Lake, T-Way Discount in Union Lake, and another unidentified site on Oakley Park Road in Commerce Township.

Both the Union Lake and Commerce Township sites were eliminated from consideration because of their lack of proximity to DSS consumers.

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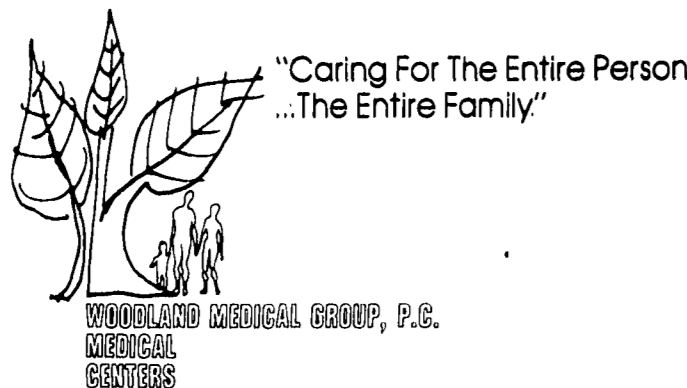

Mother reports man approaches nine-year-old girl

In Wixom

The mother of a nine-year-old Wixom girl told police her daughter was approached by several young men on two separate occasions last week. In both instances, the girl had just gotten off a school bus and was on her way home from school when the incidents occurred.

According to reports, at about 3:45 p.m. January 22, a thin, dark haired young man between 15 and 19, accompanied by three other men, asked the girl if she wanted a ride and told her to hop in.

The two incidents are the latest in a series of reports concerning children in the Maple North Trail area being approached by a group of men in a car. Wixom police, who say the incidents could simply be pranks, will be conducting special seminars for children in Wixom and Loom Lake elementary schools on what to do in such a situation. Officer Richard Ziegler of the crime prevention unit will speak in the schools.

Police encourage children to be aware of any approaches by strangers

and report them to their parents and the police immediately.

Schools report new free lunch guidelines

The Novi Community School District has announced its new policy for Free Meals and Reduced Price Meals for children unable to pay the full price of meals served under the National School Lunch, School Breakfast, Special Milk Program and USDA Donated Foods Program.

This change in income eligibility is required as a result of recent Congressional action.

The new guidelines differ from previous guidelines in three ways: 1) they are not based on Federal Office of Management and Budget guidelines that are not adjusted by the Department of Agriculture, 2) they remove the hardship provisions, and 3) in place of hardship provisions, they include a standard deduction.

Local school officials are required by Public Law 96-499 to make changes in the guidelines. These changes will affect the eligibility of some children for free and reduced price meals.

The new income guidelines are effective February 15, 1981.

Children from families whose income is at or below the levels shown are eligible for free meals or reduced price meals:

Family size — 1: \$5,700 for free meals, \$5,701 to \$8,350 for reduced price meals.

Family size — 2: \$7,220 for free meals, \$7,221 to \$10,730 for reduced price meals.

Family size — 3: \$8,750 for free meals, \$8,751 to \$13,110 for reduced price meals.

Family size — 4: \$10,270 for free meals, \$10,271 to \$15,490 for reduced price meals.

Family size — 5: \$11,800 for free meals, \$11,801 to \$17,870 for reduced price meals.

Family size — 6: \$13,320 for free meals, \$13,321 to \$20,250 for reduced price meals.

Family size — 7: \$14,850 for free

meals, \$14,851 to \$22,620 for reduced price meals.

Family size — 8: \$16,370 for free meals, \$16,371 to \$25,000 for reduced price meals.

For each additional family member add \$1,530 to the guidelines for free meals and \$2,380 for the guidelines for reduced price meals.

Application forms currently on file will be reviewed to determine if eligibility will continue, changed to another category or terminated. The information provided on the application is confidential and will be used only for the purpose of determining eligibility.

Applications may be submitted at any time during the year.

To discourage the possibility of misrepresentation, the application forms contain a statement above the space of signature certifying that all information furnished in the application is true and accurate.

An additional statement is added to

warn that the application is being made in connection with the receipt of Federal funds; that school officials may, for cause, verify the information in the application; and that deliberate misrepresentation of information may subject the applicant to prosecution under applicable state and criminal statutes.

In certain cases, foster children also are eligible for these benefits. If a family has foster children living with them and wishes to apply for such meals for them, it should contact the school.

Children of unemployed parents may qualify for free or reduced price meals if total family income include welfare payments, unemployment compensation and sub-pay benefits fall within the prescriptive family income guidelines.

In the operation of child feeding programs, no child will be discriminated against because of race, sex, creed, color or national origin.

Henning Bros. looking for refuse pact

Refuse collectors in Walled Lake are optimistic that an agreement can be reached regarding changing interpretations of their contract with the city.

Leonard Henning, part-owner of Henning Brothers, a disposal service firm that handles the city's municipal trash hauling, said he would accept a rewritten contract to settle conflicts raised by the pact.

"What the problem is, is that they owe me a lot of back money," Henning said. "Either they're going to pay the money or rewrite the contract."

"I'd be agreeable if it's rewritten," Henning added regarding the agreement.

Walled Lake began renegotiation attempts in September hoping to clarify the differing interpretations of the contract. Mayor Gaspare LaMarca, Department of Public Works (DPW) Superintendent John Nail and City Attorney Richard Poehlman were instructed to begin contract talks with the

city's collection agent for the past two years.

City Manager J. Michael Dornan, hired in November, has since replaced LaMarca in those discussions.

Confusion initially arose from Henning Brothers' taking over the city's past refuse contract with another company. Since then, both the city and Henning Brothers have continued to dispute various sections of the existing agreement.

The major difference focuses on whether the collection company should be paid per city units regardless of the need to make a pick-up there. Many businesses in the city limits pay other private firms to supply refuse collection services, making pick-ups by Henning Brothers unnecessary.

Henning Brothers also argued with the city over the definition of the word "units" in the contract. Whether an apartment complex with four dwelling areas should be counted as one unit or

four units has become an ongoing debate.

Henning has set February 15 as a personal deadline for concluding talks. The contract actually expires July 1.

"They've really been dragging their feet on it for over a year," Henning said, admitting he did not get along well with past City Manager Peter Parker.

The city has recognized that the

monetary gap grows larger week by week. And officials admit they hope to alleviate the problem and reach an agreement that could both serve the city within budgetary limits and allow the company to make a profit.

"I don't think I'll have any problems," Henning claimed. "I don't want any money that we're supposed to get."

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City attorney redrafting option for Prescott site

Walled Lake's City Council has directed City Attorney Richard Poehlman to redraft an option agreement for a parcel of lakefront property. The city is now offering John B. Prescott \$42,000 for his site adjacent to the city's Mercer Park.

City officials last offered Prescott \$40,000 cash. But since several closed executive sessions have concluded in a January 20 decision to have Poehlman draw up an agreement for the \$42,000 figure.

Council offered Prescott the \$40,000 after he upped the property's price tag to \$50,000. Officials said they decided on the lower offer, despite Prescott's request, because they felt the property owner was anxious to sell the parcel and the city was apparently the only interested buyer.

The city first offered Prescott \$46,000 in September when he made the property available for \$55,000. Prescott dropped his offer to approximately \$50,000. But the city still was not satisfied and

dropped out of the bidding. The offers and counteroffers have continued to fly between Prescott and the city since that time.

In November, the council failed to muster the necessary five votes to purchase the lakefront parcel for \$46,000. Four of six council members favored the purchase, but William Roberts, then campaigning for state representative, was absent during the ballot counting. He had previously supported the purchase.

City officials have speculated that Prescott may have made an offer to Robert Sukenik, developer of the proposed Watersview Inn to be located in the former Car Store dealership on Walled Lake Drive. Sukenik's property is immediately northwest of Prescott's parcel.

If purchased the property would probably be used to expand the lakefront recreation area. A public access site has also been discussed for boat launch on the parcel.

discriminate against a class or person because of race or color.

What a trade-off

High school students spend classroom time learning skills for future

By KAREN RICE

So classes are a bore. You're in the tenth grade now and you want to get out in the real world, do something with your life. Besides, going to school all day is just a waste of time when you know what you really want to do. Experience is the key anyway. Who needs classes to become an auto mechanic, a beautician or a short-order cook?

Maybe you've got it all figured out. Graduate from high school, go on to college, medical school and set up practice on your own. You've got the next few terms of high school all charted. Nothing to worry about, you know you aren't going to change your mind about your desired profession. And you certainly aren't interested in wasting your time in vocational classes. Who needs to learn a trade?

Alright, maybe you don't have everything figured out. You really aren't sure what you want to do, if you want to go to school or where your talents and interests lie. But you are relatively certain that by the time you

graduate from high school, you'll know exactly what you want to do with your life. And you can worry about getting the training for it then. Who needs to start now?

Well, the answers to those questions are things Richard Briggs has been talking about for a long time. Put simply, Briggs believes all high school students need schooling, that vocational education is a sure-fire way to learn more about career possibilities and that it's never too early to start thinking about the future.

Specifically, as a counselor-coordinator at Southwest Oakland Vocational Education Center (SWOVEC), Briggs is 100 percent convinced that all high school students can find something to stimulate their interests at the Beck Road facility.

So, he is encouraging high school students, their parents and all residents of Novi, Walled Lake, Wixom and Commerce Township to turn out for SWOVEC's tenth annual open house Sunday (February 8) from 1-4 p.m.

Teachers and students will be on hand to demonstrate what is being

taught in the classes, which range from architectural drafting and data processing to dental assisting and greenhouse management.

SWOVEC is one of four Oakland County vocational centers designed to help high school students learn skills and trades as an alternative or supplement to a traditional education. More than 1,200 students from 13 high schools in seven school districts — including Novi and Walled Lake — attend SWOVEC classes daily during the center's three sessions.

Nearly all of the 18 courses offered are regularly filled to capacity, Briggs adds. And students there are concerned not with extracurricular activities like school plays, football and the yearbook — but with what goes on in class. "The kids are here because they want to be," says Briggs. "There's nobody telling them they have to come here, they want to be here."

Briggs' guiding philosophy is that no student should leave high school without a saleable skill. That goes for teens planning to go on to college as well as students who have no interest in pursuing academics. In fact, Briggs says, taking a course at SWOVEC could

give college-bound students a definite advantage over their classmates.

For instance, a high school junior interested in pre-med or nursing might be well advised to sign up for the medical office assistant class. That would give them real exposure to the field of medicine early on, and they would familiarize themselves with what medical personnel other than doctors and nurses really are trained to do. And some high school experience in that field would be helpful when applying to colleges or when looking for interesting summer jobs.

High school students who aren't happy with studying all day and are planning to work immediately out of school also can find what they're looking for at SWOVEC, Briggs says. SWOVEC cosmetology students are ready to receive their license by the time they graduate from high school if they have put in the required amount of time, he notes. "If you wait until you get out of high school to do it," explains Briggs, "it will cost you \$2,000. It's free here."

And Briggs isn't the only one who recognizes SWOVEC's ability to turn out knowledgeable students. Businessmen — and increasingly, col-

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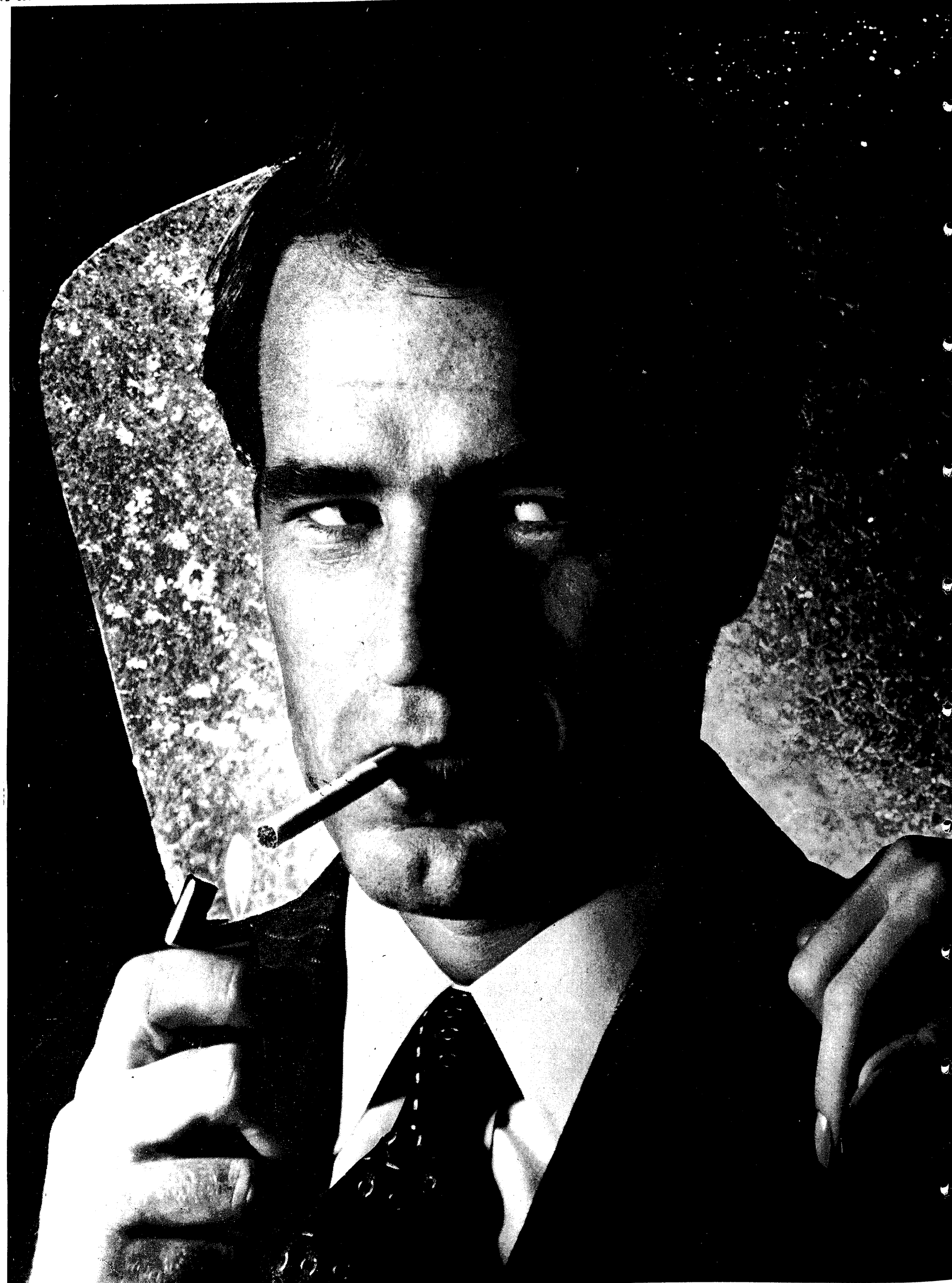

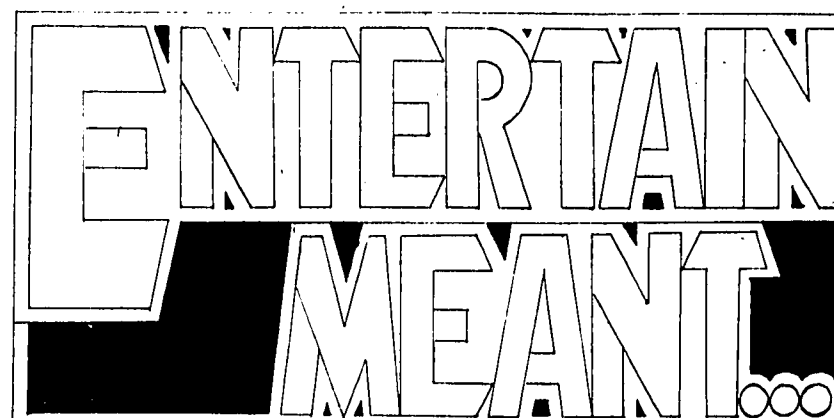

All's ready for giant ice carnival

The White Lake Inn, licensed as a hotel resort, sets on a scenic shoreline of Oakland County's third largest body of water. It's a favorite among local residents who want to drink a beer, play games and dance on weekends.

But after this weekend, the Inn and its owner, Richard "Buzz" Crozier, won't be the same.

The three-story structure, 3955 Ormond Lake Road, about three miles north of M-59 in White Lake Township, will be the center of what is likely to be the biggest winter event in Oakland County's history...at least, that's Crozier's hope.

Called the White Lake Winter Carnival, the event is an attempt by Crozier to duplicate the success of Tip-up Town, an annual extravaganza played out each winter on Houghton Lake in northern Michigan.

White Lake, with its 546 acres, 26 miles of shoreline and about 20 inches of ice, is a perfect setting for Crozier's dream.

The carnival, as it is described by Crozier, is a combination family-fun, public relations for local law enforcement and a wing-ding of a fund-raiser for Muscular Dystrophy.

The carnival starts Saturday, Feb. 7 at 9 a.m. and ends temporarily Sunday, Feb. 8 at 2 a.m. Seven hours later at 9 a.m. the carnival will start again and be over 2 a.m. Monday.

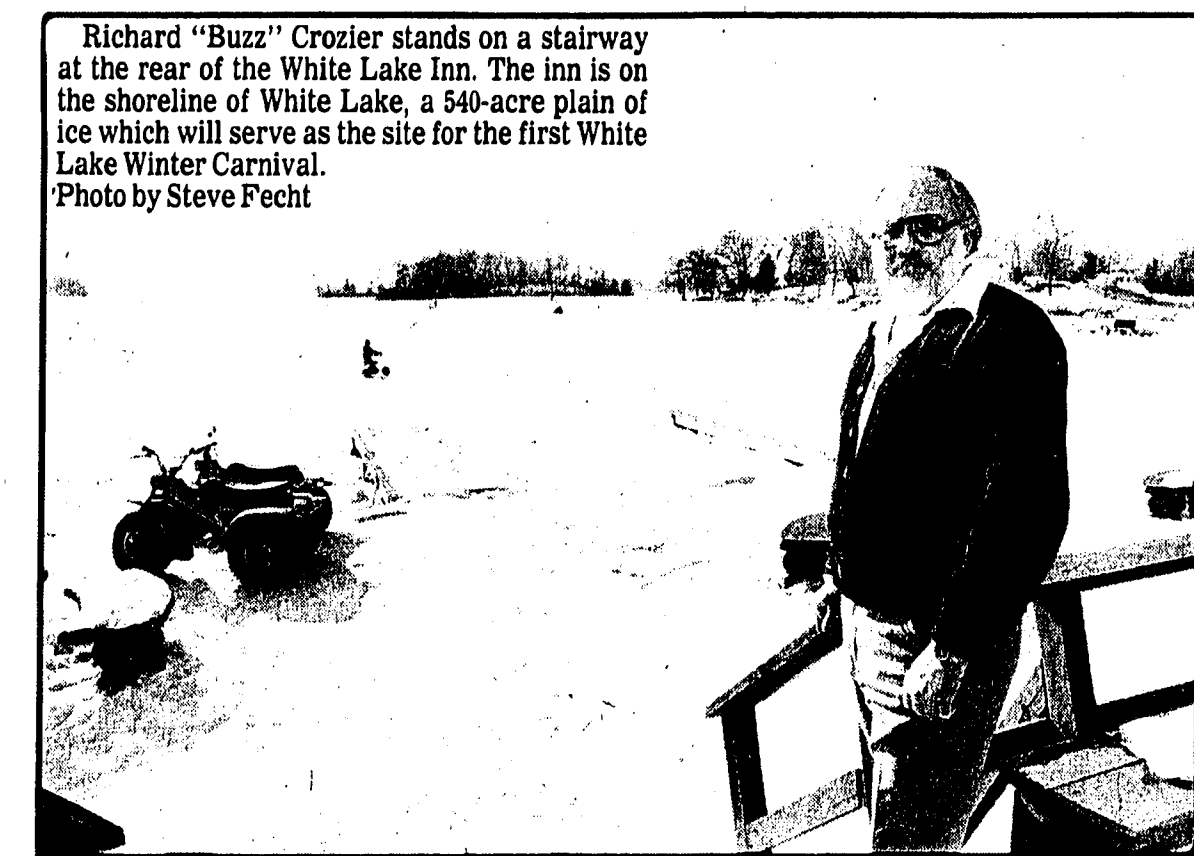
"I think it's going to be a huge success. It'll be the biggest thing ever to hit White Lake," said Crozier, 40, who purchased the inn nearly three years ago after a stint as a deputy with the Oakland County Sheriff Department's Marine Division and as a patrolman with the White Lake Township Police Department.

"We planned this with the family in mind. It's going to be cheap, not something that will cost a family \$30 to \$40. You can spend \$20, and your family will have a good day. "Everything will cost \$1. We decided on that instead of \$2 or \$3 because of the economy. Nobody has much to spend," Crozier remarked.

Fifty percent of the money raised at the carnival will be donated to Muscular Dystrophy, an aspect of the event that makes Crozier proud. But equally important to Crozier is the fact that area law enforcement personnel will be there in uniform to talk to youngsters.

"It's going to be public relations for the police to talk to and shake hands with their police and with local elected officials.

"I think it's vital for the police to create a good atmosphere with the

Warriors tumble to 0-4

Well, at least the losses after the News deadline. day clash and then moves are getting closer. Western heads to North Farmington for a Thursday.

The Walled Lake Western gymnastics team is still looking for its first victory of the 1981 season following recent losses to Hartland and Clarenceville. And although new Warrior Coach Bernadine Mahar isn't necessarily elated about that sad fact, she hasn't given up hope, either.

"It (losing) gets kind of discouraging," the 22-year-old coach admitted after Thursday's 75-15-73.1 loss at Hartland. "But other people have told me that we're coming along well, and the girls say they feel like they're doing better than they did last year. That's a good sign."

An especially good omen was the fact that Western's Karen Krzyskowski and Bev Guthrie notched state scores against the Eagles. Krzyskowski achieved her second such effort this season on the balance beam with a 7.8; Guthrie recorded a 6.8.

Mahar also expressed encouragement with the showings of freshmen Dawn Riemer and Debbie Wood. Each performed for the first time on the vault and balance beam, respectively, and their coach commented that "they got off to a good start."

Speaking of good starts, Gina Muscio appears to have accomplished exactly that. The junior rang up the team's only two state scores during an 84-25-79.6 defeat at Clarenceville January 19, excelling in floor exercises and on the balance beam.

The young Warriors — still fired up despite their 0-4 start — were to host tough Northville Monday,

Cathy Hirsch is still trying to figure out just what happened at Friday's volleyball match against Walled Lake Western.

The Walled Lake Central coach knows one thing: her club was brilliant in a first-game 15-7 rout of the Warriors. The Vikes led 13-1 at one point as Amy Rembisz and Wendy Keelty showed off their awesome spiking talents before the home crowd.

"I hate to make it sound like the referees beat us," the veteran coach said, "and I hardly ever make a point of discussing that kind of thing. But the whole experience affected us psychologically...we should have and could have beaten them."

Hirsch said that the most bitter pill to swallow occurred in the narrow game-two defeat. "We were supposed to serve, but Western served for two points," she said. "Then when the mistake was discovered, it was too late...we ended up losing by two."

The crowning blow, however, took place as the last point was scored. "The way the game ended was unreal," she said. "(Central's Caryn) Lamb spiked it, then it hit a Western player — I think it was Brigitte Nissen — and the ball went out-of-

bounds...but even though both teams saw it hit her, the referee said he didn't see it and the match was over."

Despite the bitter loss, Central had claimed a moral victory two nights earlier when it finally disposed of Milford Lakeland. The Vikes, who were beaten three times by the Eagles a year ago, dropped the opener 15-9 Thursday before posting successive 15-8 wins.

"We played our game and got over being intimidated," a happy Hirsch summarized afterward. "It was a big lift, knowing that we can beat a team like that."

The spiking of Lamb (16 good ones) and Rembisz (11) led the crucial win.
