Novi schools set millage renewal election

Voters in the Novi School district will be asked to go to the polls March 31 to approve the renewal of 10.5 mills to be levied for the next three years.

Members of the Novi school board voted 5-0 Thursday to set the special election date for the fifth Tuesday in March. When all seven members can be present at the February 19 session, it is that have expired. expected they will take formal action to put the 10.5 mill request on the ballot.

district can roughly estimate its local property tax revenues by multiplying the millage levy and the total state equalized valuation of the community.

The percentages of the increase in the equalized valuation show what kind of millage rollbacks the school district can expect. In years where the state equalized valuation exceeds the cost of living, the millage levy must be rolled

The increasing value of property in the community also will allow the schools to generate more revenues without increasing the millage levy.

Committee members cautioned that such figures are very tentative since they are all based on "figures which are strictly unofficial."

For example, the committee expects both revenues and expenditures to increase approxmately \$1 million per year for the next three years, while the millage levy does not increase.

Committee members said they did not try to guess what types of property tax cuts the legislature or governor might ask voters to approve in coming months, although those cuts could be expected to throw a monkey wrench into the committee's budget projections.

Assistant Superintendent William Barr said he knows of five plans which already have been proposed. "I expect there'll be as many plans as legislators before this is through," Barr added.

"We talked about what could happen if this plan or that plan passes, but finally we said we can't address what may or may not be on the ballot," Colliau said. "We had to ignore those plans and develop a recommendation based on the current financial structure of the school district and our best estimate of

Alternative routes sought for roads

In the interests of not increasing traffic congestion on Twelve Mile and preserving Tollgate Farm, Novi city council members have asked the adminstration to seek alternative routes for the extension of both Decker and Meadowbrook roads.

City Manager Edward Kriewall has recommended that engineering studies be made during 1981 for the extension of Decker and Meadowbrook between Thirteen and Twelve Mile. A decision to pave either road would depend on the results of the engineer's study, Kriewall said.

But council members told Kriewall Monday they would like to see information on alternative routes before approving a route extending those roads to Twelve Mile.

Suggestions offered by the council included paving Thirteen Mile to allow traffic coming from the north to get to Haggerty Road and curving the Decker Road extension so that it enters Novi Road north of 121/2 Mile.

Council members' comments supported the position taken by representatives of the Americana Foundation who are working in conjunction with Oakland Community College to preserve the 130-year-old Tollgate Farm at the corner of Twelve Mile and Meadowbrook.

body we discussed the fact that the Americana Foundation and Oakland Community College have extensive plans for the future use of the Tollgate Farm. Since that time, some \$60,000 has gone toward plans for the public use of the facility," Americana Foundation Attorney Gary Rentrop told the council.

"Decker Road which abuts the west boundary of the farm and Meadowbrook on the east could significantly impact the use of the parcel; particularly Meadowbrook which lies near the farmhouse.

"When we came to the council last fall it was our intent to work together in the planning, but it seems Novi is going very fast in its plans. Don't throw our plans up in the air after we have expended \$60,000 on them. We think we can work closely to resolve your thoroughfare problems without jeopar-

dizing our plans to retain the property." Rentrop offered no specific alternatives to the city's plan to pave Decker and Meadowbrook roads between Thirteen and Twelve Mile, but he asked that his group be closely involved in future plans to pave the roads.

City Engineer Harry Mosher tried to reassure those working to preserve the farm by noting that unique road design characteristics have been employed throughout the Novi Road Program in order to retain as much of the rural nature of the community as possible.

"We've done a lot of innovative things to preserve Novi's rural atmosphere. In fact, we've been forced to make design compromises that as engineers make us uneasy. I think Meadowbrook would be left as a lesser road than Decker, but it must be improved because it's a legal liability to the city," Mosher said.

He went on to say that designing the road so that it continues to be a "pastural, scenic type road" will be a challenge.

However, Council Member Patricia Karevich echoed the concerns expressed by the foudation representative.

'Maybe I'm being short-sighted, but extending these roads seems to me to be damaging the integrity of both the farm and the cemetery (at Novi Road and Twelve Mile). Wouldn't it be possible to bring Decker in to Novi Road north of 121/2 Mile?" she asked.

Mosher said such an intersection would be "almost completely impractical" because of swampy soil conditions in the area. He added that it would be necessary to improve Novi Road if Decker were to connect to it and the Oakland County Road Commission could not afford it.

City-School facility to be studied

It's only in the early idea stage, but very informal discussions have taken place between school and city officials regarding the construction of a community center that would house city employees and school administrators.

In a discussion of ballot proposals which might face Novi voters in the next six years, City Manager Edward Kriewall told Novi City Council members Monday about certain factors which could change the forecast he presented last year.

One of those factors would be an agreement to study the feasibility of a city-school administration building.

As discussed informally, the facility also would replace the existing community center on Novi Road.

Kriewall has projected the city would ask voters in November 1981 to approve funding to construct a community center and request approval for a separate city hall in 1986.

But Monday he advised the council that those target dates should be revised until the proposal for a city-school administrative facility/community center has been studied.

"With the economy in its current shape we're not sure whether we want to put anything on the ballot this year. Another aspect of the community center proposal is that a past member of a citizens study committee has suggested there might be some merit in considering a community center as part of a joint city hall and school administration facility," Kriewall said.

He went on to say that the original master plan for the municipal complex on Ten Mile calls for three buildings to be constructed between the police department and the library.

"To do a better job of planning we may want to explore the possibility of a community building with three functions. This would set the ballot issue (for a new community center) back while the joint facility is being con-

"We think the proposal has merit and should be discussed. It will require meetings with the schools," he noted.

Kriewall also explained that while it originally was expected the city could continue to use its quarters in the library until the late 1980s, it now appears the library may need to expand into what is now city hall before the city outgrows those quarters.

Mayor Romaine Roethel noted that the proposal was merely a "concept" at this point. She also commented that until the city is assured of the direction that federal and state government will take regarding the tax structure she could not foresee placing any bonding proposals on the ballot.

Council Member Martha Hoyer urged Kriewall to pursue the joint city-school administrative building and suggested a citizens advisory committee be formed to look into the issue.

"I hate to say this, but we may have to wait until we experience a severe situation before we go back to the voters with this," Kriewall said.

He noted that improvements to Nine Mile for the time being appear to have reduced flooding problems in the area.

Council Member John Chambers agreed the manager's point was 'valid" and suggested that the retention-detention pond standards recently adopted by the council might help with the drainage problems in the Nine Mile area.

"I know a lot of people were concerned that it wouldn't do any good to apdrain and, unless major flooding occurs prove a drain without improvements

upstream. Now we have the restrictions flooding and related drainage prowe need to improve the conditions upstream," Chambers said.

He also asked what would happen if the dam at Meadowbrook Lake broke. "Then we would have a health, safety

and welfare situation which would have to be taken care of," Mayor Romaine Roethel responded. When voters were asked in November

1979 to approve construction of the Patnales Drain it was pointed out that the drainage problems in the Meadowbrook Lake-Nine Mile area are rapidly deteriorating the dam at Meadowbrook

Approximately two-thirds of the city drains into the Patnales. Currently, it is largely an unimproved drain, causing

Kriewall said after the meeting that if the dam breaks it would create an emergency situation which would justify putting the question on the ballot as soon as possible.

Novi has recognized that the Patnales has needed to be constructed since 1969. In fact, it was slated for construction in 1980. But passage of the Headlee amendment mandated that funding of its construction go before the voters.

Council members agreed with the manager that the current economic uncertainties and tax plan proposals. made it a poor time to seek approval for

"The impression we've gotten is that there was a presentation of what was going to happen with the project and now that it's actually coming to fruition, (the villagers) are hearing something else. We want to find out if there are any shady, underhanded pretexts involved here." MUCC's involvement in the project stems from

the concerns of lakes area residents who are members of two of the 400-plus clubs that make up the Lansing-based agency. According to Eder, he was contacted by two or three lakefront property owners, representing Multi-Lakes Conservation Club and the Oakland Wetlands chapter of the Michigan Duck Hunters Association.

Village President John McLellan contends MUCC's involvement is typical of the bureaucratic confusion that has haunted the Wolverine Lake project since August, when the lake board officially adopted engineers' recommendations on the scope of the rehab. McLellan would not comment on MUCC's charges other than to say project engineers from Snell Environmental Group were responding to Eder's inquiry but has admitted he is upset about negative feedback he has received on drawbacks experienced during the project.

Eder has asked village officials to respond to a list of questions about what type of work is being done by the contractor, P&M Marine, under the lake rehabilitation. He would like to find out what the contract actually specifies the contractor should do as it pertains to beach clean-ups, stump removal and cutting of channels between deep

Specifically, Eder wants to know if the contractor is encouraging people to place sand on top of the muck rather than removing it and if doing that would be the best method of restoring the lake, whether or not the secondary well has been installed and how it will affect villagers' individual wells, whether stumps have been sawed off low enough or have been pulled and what types of material have been used in construction of the permanent drawdown mechanism that was installed in the

Glengary Road dam in December. According to Eder, the object of the letter is not to delay the rehabilitation project any further, but to obtain answers to those questions raised by observers who contacted him. The concerns of the MUCC, however, will have no actual impact on the lake project unless the Department of Natural Resources or the Army Corps of Engineers — both of which received copies of Eder's letter - decide to act on Eder's inquiries.

"We don't have any authority per se," Eder explains of the MUCC's role, "but we do have some clout with the DNR, the legislature and other

decision-making bodies." Village officials note all portions of the lake rehabilitation have been or are in the process of being completed. According to McLellan, the secondary well has already been installed and is operational. Approximately 300 stumps have been pulled or cut off as specified in the project contract, and several hundred more are slated for removal. The drawdown mechanism that controls the level of Wolverine Lake has been installed since December, he adds.

Beach clean-ups, which have been stalled due to a number of delays with onset of the program, are not actually part of the program but were to have been done on an individual basis.

Eder's letter, along with other aspects of the lake project, will be discussed at tonight's village council meeting, scheduled to begin at 7:30 p.m. at the

Former school superintendent returns to support Langerman

received a strong showing of support from approximately 50 individuals who turned out at the Walled

Lake school board meeting Monday. And not the least of those individuals was former Walled Lake Schools Superintendent George C. Garver who called Langerman "one of the most competent and most able people I have ever been privileged to be associated with.'

Also expressing support for Langerman were former board members Barbara Scully and Richard Miles as well as several citizens, teachers. board members and Superintendent Don Sheldon. performance was prompted by Trustee Janet Callahan's call for his dismissal at the January

board meeting. Callahan called for Langerman's dismissal on the grounds that "he has violated state law over the last 10 years in regard to the use of public funds, thereby causing the district and the board of educa-

tion to be in violation of the law." Callahan's charges related to Langerman's handling of the 1967 Building and Site Fund, a \$9.15 million bond issue approved by voters to construct, equip and furnish a senior high school (Walled Lake Western), new elementary school buildings,

and additions to existing school buildings. Garver, who served as Walled Lake Superintendent from 1965-1970 — when the bond issue was proposed and approved, said he believed the charges levied against Langerman to be "totally false, inappropriate and truly injurious to the reputation of a dedicated and competent member of your administrative staff."

Garver said the school board had been authorized by the State Department of Education at the time the bond issue was approved to utilize earned interest from the \$9.15 million bond issue "as a hedge against inflation and for other projects that might be approved at a later date by the board of education and the department of education."

Garver said the Municipal Finance Commission

initially wanted interest earned from the bond issue to be used for debt service, while the Walled Lake school board and superintendent took the position that earned interest should be made available to the district to assist with the building projects which were authorized by the people. "After a great deal of discussion, the Municipal Finance Commission dropped their demand for this transfer of the earned interest," Garver said. bonds and to utilize the interest as a hedge against

Oakland Schools to seek special education millage

Oakland County voters will be asked to approve a two mill tax increase for special education when they go to the polls in the general school election

The millage proposal, which was unanimously approved by the Board of Education of Oakland Schools last week, will be on the ballot in each of the 28 Oakland County school districts. The hoard will name a steering committee to

represent parents, local school board members, the intermediate board, local superintendents, special education directors, agencies working on behalf of handicapped citizens and Oakland Schools staff to coordinate information distribution throughout the county. "The issue of the growing shortfall between the

costs of special education programs and services and the funds to pay for them has been studied for more than two years," said Intermediate Superintendent William G. Keane.

"Recent reductions in categorical funding with the promise of continuing financial problems for Michigan state government focuses on the need for additional charter millage for special education in Oakland County."

The Oakland superintendent's committee on special education previously recommended that

wide millage increase for special education pur

If approved by the voters, the new millage would raise approximately \$22 million, if it were collected this year, for special education programs and services for Oakland County children from birth through age 25. Unreimbursed costs for special education programs and services in Oakland County school districts will exceed \$33.3 million this

In 1954, Oakland voters approved a .5 mill tax for special education programs. This county-wide tax. coming nearly 20 years before state and federal mandates requiring such services, was increased an additional .5 mills by voters in 1965 for a total of

The special education millage produced about \$11.2 million this year for programs available to all eligible Oakland students in their own district or in center programs throughout the county.

By an increasing margin, the voted county-wide special education tax fails to cover the costs of special programs still rising because of inflation and expanded requirements of both state and federal mandates. Local district general education



Kriewall noted that the city planner has recommended that Decker Road line up with Twelve Oaks Mall, rather than connect to Novi Road. But both Karevich and Council Member Robert Schmid opposed that proposal.

"I thoroughly disagree," Schmid said. "I'm not convinced there is no alternative to extending Decker Road and dumping all that traffic on Twelve Mile. We could be getting traffic to Twelve Mile and then have nowhere to put it, so we might not want any road dumping on Twelve Mile. I'd like to see another alternative for extending Decker with engineering facts rather than comments as regards to costs."

Mosher said that such a study would be "fun," but realistically-speaking Oakland County does not even have long range plans to improve Novi Road. "Ultimately, Decker won't be the main through road for the area — Novi Road will be — but there's no telling how far away that is," Mosher said.

Council Member Ronald Watson suggested that if extending Decker and Meadowbrook are interim solutions until the county improves Novi and Haggerty roads, then perhaps the city should consider doing work that ordinarily would be handled by

the road. If Decker Road is an interim solution and our big traffic areas are in other places we should be really cautious in proceeding. Any benefit we may get in the shortrun may be outweighed by the Council members asked for traffic studies

"We've been pretty positive, even when we were 0-5," Novi Coach Ron Flutur said after his team had avenged an earlier 62-51 loss to the Bulldogs. "We're not the kind of team that's going to blow people out too often, but we are the kind of team that tries to get the most out of what it has.' By the looks of things, the Wildcats have had some degree of success in ac-

complishing exactly that. Flutur doesn't have a regular who stands above 6-2, but that hasn't stopped the club from winning four of its last five conference Steve Wright and Todd Parsons — indisputably the big guns in Novi's recent

resurgence - spoiled the party for Brighton Friday with 23 and 18 points, respectively. Wright was of particular annoyance to the enemy, ramming home a three-point play and burying two free throws in the last two minutes to break open a see-saw game. The teams traded leads several times throughout the third quarter before Novi emerged with a 44-43 edge. It was around then that Wright and Parsons went to work on the Brighton defense, helping the Wildcats build a six-point cushion with three minutes left.

But it wasn't over yet. The Wildcats kept things interesting by missing the front end of three one-and-one free throw situations, prompting Flutur to remark later that "sometimes we make things exciting even when that's the last thing we have in mind." Wright took over from there, though, and Novi had pulled into a second-place tie with South Lyon (4-3) behind 7-0 Howell.

"We just tried to play good defense, rebound well and take good shots." was Flutur's answer when asked if he had changed the game plan for Brighton this time around. The final statistics revealed that the winners had indeed stuck to the game plan; Wright, Parsons and Pete DeBrule accounted for 23 rebounds between them, and Parsons (five) and Greg McComas (three) pick-pocketed


The big win helped erase the memory of Novi's 77-48 debacle at Redford Thurston three days earlier. Flutur conceded that the home team was clearly superior in that instance.

"Oh, yeah," the young coach admitted. They played good ball. But we made them look like All-Americans, too. We just didn't come ready to play." That much was apparent from the start, as the enemy moved ahead 24-10 after the first quarter and increased the bulge to a whopping 42-17 by halftime. 
Ahead 13-4 in the deciding game on the strength
