Residential construction awaits break in the economy

Only 107 residential building permits were issued in Novi during 1980, and unless the economy quickly recovers city officials expect the story could be much the same this year.

Nevertheless, the potential for building does remain. And despite the high interest rates and cost of building materials, some builders have braved the storm, putting up models or spec.

The following is an update on residential growth originally presented by The News in May 1979. The information on building permits, which is current as of the third week of January, was made

available by Novi Residential Plan Inspector Terry Morrone.

1. Birch Woods - William Gladden of Headliner Real Estate has received permission to construct 45 homes under a R-3 zoning designation. Building permits for two homes have been pulled. The subdivison is located on Wixom Road between Ten and Eleven Mile.

2. Carriage Hill — Developer Koppy-Densmore has pulled 12 building permits for construction of 72 homes under an R-2 zoning classification. The subdivision received final approvals in 1978. The subdivison is located on the east side of Meadowbrook Road bet-

3. Cedar Springs — The Petros Company which ultimately plans to build 240 homes in three phases, has taken out permits for 33 of 80 proposed homes in the first phase, all of the 41 homes in the second phase, and none of the 119 homes proposed in phase three. The subdivision, located between Ten and Eleven Mile and between Novi and Taft roads, is being developed under a R-4 zoning designation.

4. Charrington Green — Developer Norm Gallant has building permits for

> 5. Dunbarton Pines — The Beztak Company plans a total of 242 homes, built in two phases, under an R-3 zoning classification. They have permits to build 42 of 153 homes in phase one, while permits have not been sought for any of the homes in the second phase. The subdivision is located on the northeast corner of Nine Mile and Taft Road. Brookland Farms subdivision is east of the development, and Novi High School

is to the north of Dunbarton Pines.

6. Howell's Walled Lake Developer Seymour Eichenhorn has pulled permits for 20 of the 49 homes proposed in the subdivision located east of Novi Road, south of Thirteen Mile. The homes are being built under the R-4 zoning classification.

7. Hummingbird Estates -Leonard Wasczenski received preliminary approval for the 95-home subdivision in 1979, but has not obtained final approval. The subdivision is to be developed under the R-3 zoning designation. It is located west of Beck between Nine and Ten Mile.

ment of the program also is planned. Under the second goal - development of a family life education curriculum — the basic family unit from which an individual develops will be taught.

"Sex education is considered as only one aspect of 'Family Life Education.'" according to the definition developed by the committee.

This study is to be integrated into the general K-12 curriculum. It will be designed to give students an understanding of "those human realities and competencies, both personal and societal, which influence the roles and relationships within the family unit. This understanding should enhance the student's ability to make a more informed decision in the future relative to the familial situation," according to the committee.

Those aspects of the curriculum which provide students with the skills to make decisions regarding careers will be identified under the third goal. Students are to be prepared with knowlege and skills in four areas: selfawareness and assessment, career decisions, career exploration and career planning and placement.

Life Role Competency education has been defined under the fourth goal as studies designed to provide students with the skills to prepare them for the work world, understand personal satisfaction and successful family living, understand civic and social responsibilities, as well as aesthetic and humanistic appreciations encompassing the creative dimensions of life.

Under the fifth goal current methods of counseling students will be reviewed.

Ideas which could keep the Novi City Council busy for some time to come have been suggested as topics for future study sessions. Council Members John Chambers, Guy Smith and Ronald Watson offered specific topics for which the city manager will provide information

Novi council to abandon public rezoning hearings

On a trial basis Novi's City Council will discontinue public hearings on rezoning requests. Those who wish to address the council now will be asked to do so during the audience participation portion of the agenda.

Council members agreed by concensus recently to bring the city's policy for deciding zoning matters into conformance with the state statute. City Clerk Gerry Stipp brought it to the council's attention that state law requires only one public hearing on rezoning requests and that the hearing

can be conducted by the planning board. Previous city policy has been to conduct a public hearing before the planners and a second hearing before the city council. Since state law requires only one hearing, it was recommended that the hearing before the council be dropped.



According to Karen Menaud of the district's special services department, the aim of the Walled Lake program is to catch all elementary students by having them sit in on the puppet shows at least once. The puppeteers are putting on shows in all district elementary schools, especially concentrating on third and fourth graders. In addition, Menaud says, they are going out quite a bit in the community



: One of those reports — the Chairperson's report – recommends that the board ask voters to approve a three mill/two year proposal. The other report — the Minority report - recommends that the board appoint a "continuing advisory committee to explore, evaluate and make available to the board, the development of information to enable the board to make new kinds of choices in financial plan-

Specifically, the minority report would have the board appoint a continuing advisory committee to study the community's ability to support millage requests; reexamine the district's assets (landholdings and buildings); establish guidelines for the growth or reduction of staff relative to student enrollment; assess salary percentage increases for all district employees; and freeze hiring, purchases and curriculum changes until significant changes in the economic climate are seen.

Although we agree with the "Chairperson's Report" that additional millage is needed, we urge the board to adopt the Minority Report" at tonight's meeting.

Our recommendation is based on the following consideration: any effort to secure additional millage under the current economic conditions must be accompanied by an all-out effort to eliminate every conceivable doubt about the necessity for additional millage.

We have some reservations about the so-called Minority report. Specifically, we find efforts to portray the report as carrying equal weight to the Plurality Report as less than honest.

The facts are these: Eight committee members recommended that the board seek a three mill/two year proposal; six voted for a four mill/one year proposal. The remaining eight members of the committee signed the minority report. However. the eight who signed the minority report represent three different positions - four recommended an undetermined millage coupled with budgetary alternatives, two ecommended no millage and two abstained.

Carl McBride isn't one to look a gift horse in the mouth. The Walled Lake Western wrestling coach is taking four of his men to the Class A regionals Saturday, and that's no small feat when you consider that two of those grapplers didn't figure too prominently in his plans just after the 1980-81 season began. "We did an outstanding job, team-wise," the veteran mat mentor said after the Warriors had finished third in the 15-team Class A district action last Satur-

day. "And the people who are going to the regional deserve to be there." Especially Carlo Castiglione. The Western senior, who missed most of the football season with a knee injury, dislocated an elbow in mid-December and was thought to be through for the campaign. But the 185-pounder returned to the Warrior line-up two weeks ago, then fought back to earn a 6-4 decision over Birmingham Seaholm's Dan Bennett in the consolation round Saturday for a third-

"I was really happy to see Carlo make it," McBride commented. "No one worked harder or showed more determination than he did this year. He's one

Rolf Henrikkson is another Warrior who looked a long shot to make the regionals as recently as a couple of months ago. But the 105-pounder took over for the injured Ed Miu and posted a 14-8 record the rest of the way, including two wins (after a bye) Saturday. Henrikkson — only a sophomore — advanced to the final round before going down in the districts.

On the other end of the scale is Rich Richardson, the Western 198-pounder who has developed into a pin extraordinaire this winter. Richardson scored falls against his first two foes in 55, then 25 seconds Saturday. He then rang up another pin in 3:55, giving him 26 falls on the year to tie a school record set by

The Warrior junior couldn't make it four straight pins in the final, but nonetheless boosted his season's mark to 33-7 with a 3-0 triumph over Waterford Mott's Harry Green.

Then there's the wrestler whose presence at the regional (and state) meet was a foregone conclusion before the season even began — Angelo Buttazzoni. The feared 167-pound senior is looking better and better in his bid for a state title after enjoying a walk in the park Saturday. Buttazzoni had a bye in the first round before recording successive pins at 2:19 and 1:59, then beat Howell's Dennis Okopski (36-4) by default to earn his district title.

Despite all of those strong performances, however, two teams far surpassed Western's showing Saturday. Pontiac Northern won the meet with a whopping 54 points, and Howell was next at 130. The Warriors beat out West Bloomfield

There were few surprises in the rest of the top 10. Milford's 77-point total was good for fifth, beating out Pontiac Central by two points. Waterford Mott (51½) claimed seventh place over Birmingham Seaholm by the same margin, while Milford Lakeland finished ninth with 43 points.
