Novi council okays moderate tax reduction

Novi's City Council has decided to slightly reduce tax bills by rolling back the millage levy from a total of 9.9 mills to 9.3 mills.

Council members voted 6-1 to approve the rollback. The lone dissenting vote was cast by Council Member Guy Smith.

The council decided to reduce the millage in order to limit the collection of property taxes to the amount needed to balance the budget.

Without the reduction in the millage rate, the city would have taken in more revenues than expected when the

budget was adopted three weeks ago because the budget was adopted under the assumption property tax relief plan Proposal A would be adopted.

As a result of the May 19 defeat of Proposal A, the council was in a position to consider two options — reducing the millage or eliminating the tax collection fee.

The state allows cities to collect the fee to offset costs incurred for processing taxes for the school districts and county governments.

Eliminating the tax collection fee would have meant the city would have had to levy 9.7 mills in order to generate enough property taxes to meet the

budget. Reducing the millage and maintaining the one-percent tax collection fee would have required a 9.3 mill levy.

During discussion of the two alternatives, Smith told the council he believed if the tax collection fee were eliminated the city's expenditures should be reduced by \$90,000. He called the proposal to reduce the millage levy, while retaining the tax collection fee, a tax shift rather than a tax reduction.

However, to cut the city's expenditures by \$90,000 would have required refiguring the three-week-old budget and there was no support for such a

move among the other council members.

Smith said since the tax collection fee was not being eliminated he did not view the action the council was taking as a true tax reduction. "A buck is a buck," Smith said.

However, rolling back the millage rate does represent a moderate tax decrease for Novi residents.

By calculating the effects of Proposal A it was anticipated the city would collect \$2.04 million in property taxes under the original budget. Because the proposal was defeated the city would have collected \$2.11 million in property taxes or approximately \$66,000 more than projected when the budget was adopted.

Instead the council decided to limit property tax revenues to the \$1.88 million needed to balance the budget by reducing the city millage levy.

For the property taxpayers the rollback will amount to a tax reduction of approximately 60 cents per thousand dollars of assessed valuation on their property.

An example of the effect of the rollback is the property owner with a home valued at \$60,000 and assessed at \$30,000 who paid a total of \$307 in city taxes in 1980.

If the council levied the maximum amount of millage allowed that home owner would have paid \$339 in city property taxes. If Proposal A had passed the same resident would have been charged \$319 in property taxes.

Under the reduced millage rate approved by the council that homeowner will owe \$299 in city property taxes.

While Smith opposed levying the tax collection fee, other council members expressed the opposite viewpoint.

Mayor Romaine Roethel said she believed eliminating the tax collection fee would "threaten the people's confidence in the council."

"We can't tell them one year we need it and the next year tell them we don't," Roethel said. She added that she preferred allowing the people to "see an actual reduction in the amount of mills to maintain a budget already adopted."

Council Member Robert Schmid said

that although he opposed the tax collection fee when it was first instituted by the council, his initial opposition was due to the timing of the implementation of the fee, which came on the heels of the passage of the Headlee Amendment to the state constitution.

"Now we're talking about reducing taxes one way or another," Schmid said.

Council Member John Chambers noted the collection fee is used because other units of government do not contribute to the cost of assessing property or legal fees incurred when assessment appeals are argued before the tax tribunal.

Council Member Patricia Karevich said: "I think tonight as we deal with these alternatives we have to ask ourselves whether we agree with collecting the one-percent fee. Previously, we have agreed it does have a purpose — to collect for the different school districts and defending assessments before the tribunal. I'm convinced there is a pur-

Novi incumbents still unopposed as council election filing date nears

With three days left to file nominating petitions, it appears as if three incumbents to the city council may be running unopposed.

Three four-year terms on the council expire this year. Additionally, the mayoral seat will be vacant.

Incumbent Council Members Patricia Karevich and Ronald Watson have filed the necessary petitions to have their names placed on the ballot.

Council Member Guy Smith has taken out petitions, but had not filed them before The News deadline Tuesday.

City Clerk Geraldine Stupp said Tues-

day that except for the three council members running for re-election no one has pulled a petition for the council race.

Those wishing to file nominating petitions for election have until Friday at 4 p.m. Prospective candidates must have 100 valid signatures to have their names placed on the ballot. Candidates also can have their names placed on the ballot by paying a \$100 nominating fee.

Mayoral Candidates Martha Hoyer and John Roethel filed petitions to have their names placed on the ballot on May 18.

Hoyer presently is on the city council and has served in that capacity for six years. Roethel is a member of the planning board.

A third candidate in the mayor's race — Robert Schmid — also had not filed nominating petitions before The News deadline Tuesday. Schmid has been a council member since 1975.

With three candidates expected in the mayor's race it appears a primary election will be necessary. The local primary has been scheduled for August 4. The general election will be November 3.

Sheriff closes county jail, effects being felt locally

Overcrowding in the state's corrections system is slowly, but surely, creating a domino effect on local law enforcement policies and the leniency being given suspected criminal offenders.

Oakland County 52nd District Court Judge Michael Batchik confirmed that cramped situations in the county jail are resulting in a closer review of sentencing and bonding.

The latest furor was raised when the county sheriff's department transmitted a teletype to local police departments last Wednesday stating that "effective immediately we will accept no new male arrests from any agency that has lock-up facilities."

Captain Carl Matheny, of the county sheriff's department, verified yesterday that the edict restraining incoming prisoners had been altered Monday to allow "arraigned felons" placement in the county facility.

Matheny added that three men had been "shipped out to state prisons" earlier this week. But he expected 10 more prisoners would return to the county jail for retrials by week's end.

Asked when the county would remove its "no vacancy" sign, Matheny responded, "Right now, we really can't answer that. We realize this creates a problem for some small (police) agencies, but we really have nowhere to put them (incoming prisoners)."

Among the Lakes Area police departments only Novi has arrested an individual on felony charges since last Wednesday. And Lieutenant Richard Faulkner claimed there was "no problem" having the suspect transferred to county facilities following his arraignment.

Faulkner said the alleged felon was kept in Novi facilities from early Saturday until Monday afternoon. Failing to post bond, the individual was removed to Pontiac.

Other local police agencies have not arrested any suspected felons. But if the closed door policy of the county should continue, most would be hard-pressed to keep prisoners in their own facilities.

Novi maintains the most adequate retention cells with four holding areas (three for males, one for female).

The female quarters can comfortably accommodate two to three prisoners

for a matter of hours and one prisoner on an overnight basis, according to Sergeant Robert Starves.

The male detention area could hold a maximum of six individuals overnight and an estimated 15 prisoners for several hours, he added.

Wixom and Walled Lake would be most likely to face detention problems. Each of those departments has a single detention cell.

Wixom Sergeant Larry Beamish noted that his department does not have "people on at night" and thus, does not hold prisoners during that time.

Walled Lake does have the capability of holding prisoners during the evening hours, but does not have lavatory facilities in its cell classifying it for only short use, according to Corporal Raymond Knapp of Walled Lake.

From the police to the courts, the answer to the lurking problem of potential overcrowding is the same — leniency.

Just Monday, Batchik released a convicted South Lyon man offering him one year's probation and \$106 in fines.

The judge admitted that he would

Novi to reconsider restrictions regulating pinball arcades

Two requests for arcade licenses were tabled by the Novi City Council Monday until the ordinance regulating the establishments has been reviewed.

Faced with requests for arcade licenses from Novi Bowl at 21700 Novi Road and Sundae Delight, Inc., at 41736 West Ten Mile, the council decided to set a work session to review the ordinance because they said they foresee similar requests from a great number of other businesses where arcade machines are ancillary to the primary use.

The Novi arcade ordinance requires any business with two or more arcade machines to obtain an arcade license.

Problems in granting arcade licenses to such establishments arise because the arcade ordinance currently on the books regulates businesses which operate solely as arcades. The ordinance does not have appropriate restrictions for businesses where the operation of arcade machines are not the primary function of the business.

As an example council members discussed problems with the hours of operation and enforcement of the age restrictions in the arcade ordinance in places of business such as the Novi Bowl.

The arcade ordinance states "the premises" shall not be open for business between the hours of 1 a.m. and 7 a.m. unless a special permit is obtained from the police chief. Special permits can be granted only to conduct tournaments or for opening the arcade on legal holidays.

Since establishments with liquor licenses, like bowling alleys, are open until 2 a.m., Council Member John Chambers said he believes granting the license would be in conflict with the ordinance.

City Attorney David Fried told the

council that there would be a conflict if the ordinance were "literally interpreted." However, he said he interpreted the ordinance to mean "arcade machines should not be an attractive nuisance for young people after 1 a.m. and the question of whether or not the establishment is operating is not critical."

Chambers said he believed if the bowling alley were open the machines would be available "so we still have a problem and we can't give them a permit."

Council Member Martha Hoyer said she believed simply roping off the machines after 1 a.m. would be sufficient to meet the intent of the ordinance.

Mayor Romaine Roethel pointed out that under provisions of the current arcade ordinance there soon could be a proliferation of small arcades in local businesses.

"The way the ordinance is drafted we could have an arcade in every business. This is getting out of control," she said.

Another objection to granting the bowling alley an arcade license was the location of the machines.

Council Members Patricia Karevich, Ronald Watson and Chambers specifically opposed the current location of arcade machines in the bowling alley.

Karevich explained patrons of the bowling alley frequently are harassed by those using the arcade machines as they walk through the building. She asked that before the council grant the license a plan for the location of the machines be approved by the building department and police department and be submitted to the council.

Owner Nathan Harris told the council the machines could be moved onto the concourse or in a room with the pool

tables. He also volunteered to limit the number of machines to four.

"We're not in the arcade business, we're in the bowling business. I've got to keep the bowlers happy," Herman said.

Because council members were not sure where the machines would be located and due to concerns regarding the application of the ordinance in businesses where arcade machines are ancillary uses the matter was tabled.

A request from Sundae Delight, an ice cream parlor in the Novi-Ten Plaza, for an arcade license also was tabled.

Administrator's raise disputed

Wixom approves salary increases for city employees

Raises for 19 city employee positions were approved by the Wixom City Council last week. However, it took seven votes on the mayor's assistant's salary before the council could come to an agreement on the salary increases. In order to avoid such a problem in future budget deliberations, the council agreed that a salary administration policy which will include guidelines on salaries, compensatory time and overtime will be developed before October.

Wixom council sets up 'rainy day fund'

For the first time, Wixom has established a \$200,000 "Budget Stabilization Fund" - money that the city says will serve as a "rainy day fund." Wixom City Council members voted to institute the \$200,000 fund as part of their deliberations on the 1981-82 budget.

They also agreed to give the treasurer a \$5,000 raise - from \$17,500 to \$22,500. The deputy treasurer received a \$3,600 raise bringing that salary to \$15,500. The council also set the city clerk's salary at \$22,750 - a \$1,250 increase. The building inspector will be paid \$25,000. A police patrolman will earn \$22,500 plus overtime. The DPW superintendent will earn \$22,500. The fire chief will be paid \$22,500. DPW maintenance workers receive \$15,913. The librarian will receive \$14,500. And clerk-typists are to earn \$11,750.

Novi police arrest Wixom man on charges of sexual assault

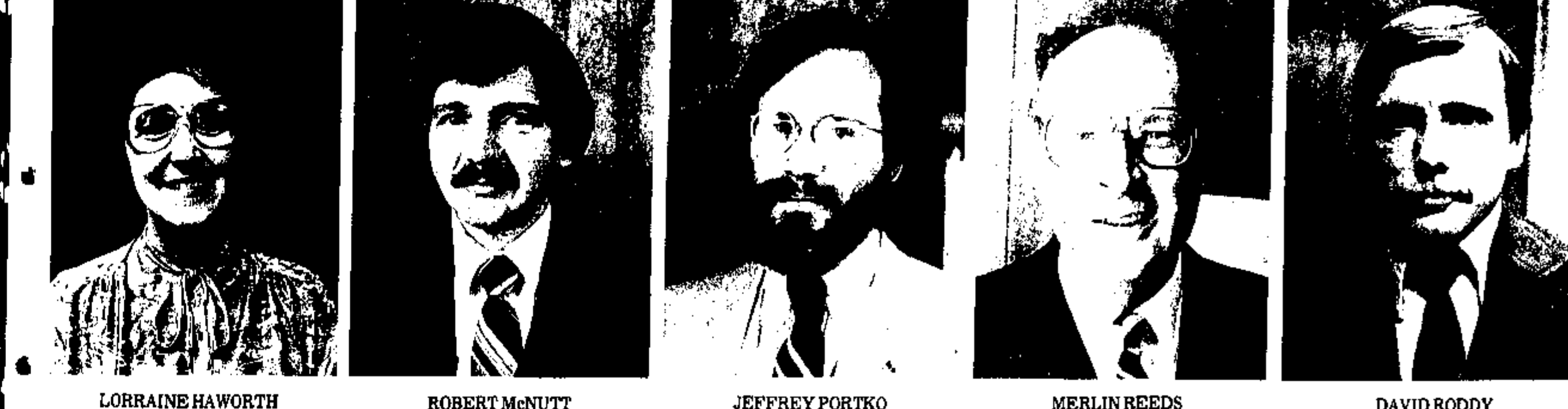

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Commerce continues battle over proposal affidavits

Commerce Township is still "fighting" over the state's requirement that it mail out Homestead Exemption Affidavits that have since become useless with the failure of Proposal A.

Township Clerk Robert McGee said last Thursday he expects Commerce may seek some form of financial reimbursement from the state for the time it has spent in handling the documents.

McGee confirmed that the township is planning to continue its suit against the state, claiming that the mailings were unconstitutional. The township clerk said that the insistence of the six private businessmen, who are also named as plaintiffs in the court action, was key to its continuation.

Commerce gained statewide attention by protesting through court action the mandatory mailing of the Homestead Exemption Affidavits. Joining the township's suit were James C. Merritt, Robert D. Shimmin, Ernest Fuller, Warren L. Williams, Thomas K. Zoner and Daniel Lublin.

Michigan Court of Appeals overturned an earlier Oakland County Circuit Court decision that placed a hold on the mailings.

More than \$1 million in state funding was used to finance the mailings that would only have been valid with the passage of Proposal A, a state tax reform package which met overwhelming defeat. The state paid each community 30 cents a parcel to mail these affidavits.

City organizing summer bus trips

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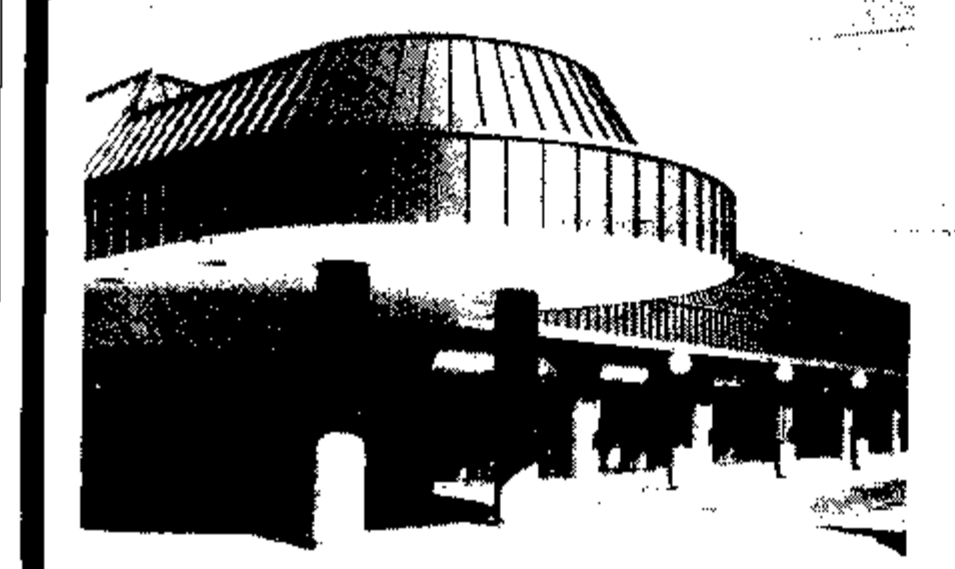
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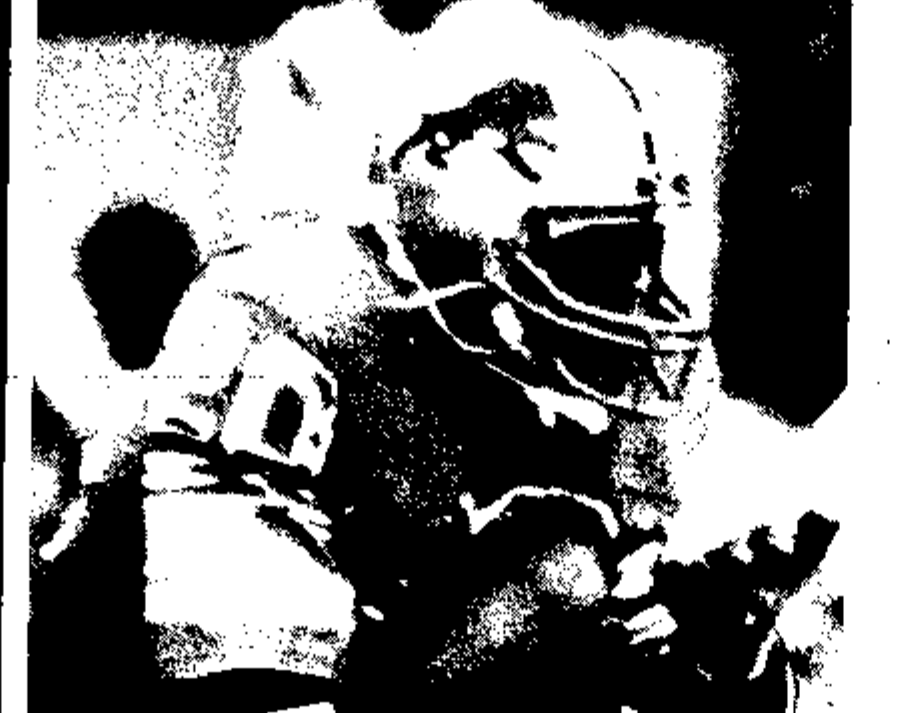

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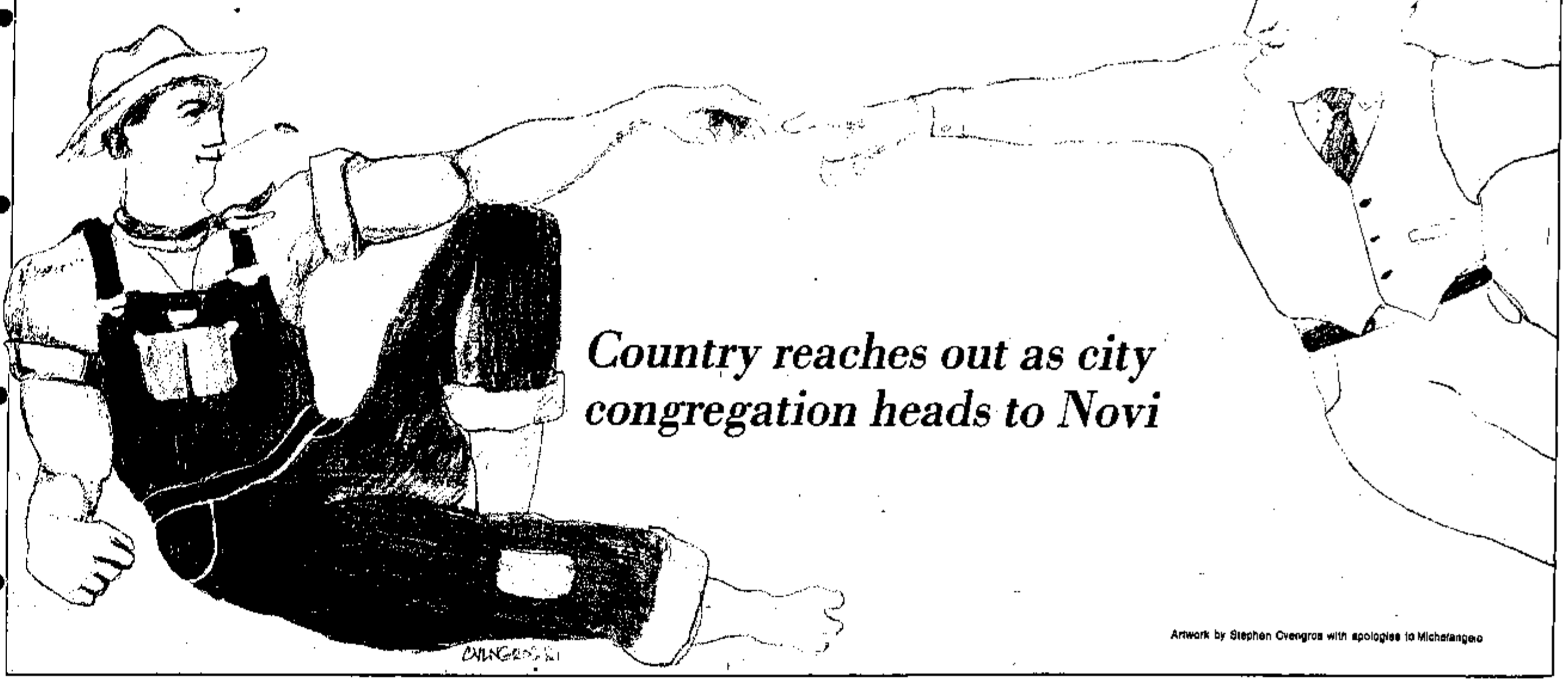

Whatever your style, everyone — especially diabetics — should take a look at the snacks that come along for the ride. Diabetics aren't the only ones who can benefit from making a habit of eating nutritious snacks to keep up strength.

Choosing foods that satisfy folks after hefty exercise and also meets the needs of diabetic diets is really easier than it seems. Summer snacking can be especially imaginative since so many fresh foods are in season.

Joggers, bikers, walkers, swimmers, roller skaters and even fishermen can turn down all-too-sweet snacks like carbonated beverages, candy bars, cookies and donuts. They can cancel the greasy, salt-filled chips and step up to more satisfying kinds of foods.

It seems like hot weather exercise makes snackers crave three things: thirst quenchers, quick pick-me-ups and hearty hold-me-overs. The one thing all have in common is that the snacks must be quick and easy to eat.

For some reason, Americans more than any others in the world have decided carbonated beverages are the only answer to thirst. Not so. Carbonated beverages are usually cold, but they don't necessarily serve as the best summer coolers.

For the diabetic athlete, regular pop is out of the question. Diet pop is okay, but why not try something else? One hundred percent pure fruit juices are a good substitute. They are available in more vending machines than ever before. Water, of course, is often overlooked as a thirst-quencher.

Or treat yourself to homemade "juicies." Freeze your favorite juice in ice cube trays. Just before the cubes are completely frozen, stick a popsicle stick or large toothpick in the center of each cube and return it to the freezer.

The quick pick-me-up category can stretch as far as your imagination will take it. As long as you remember that these foods need to be low in calories, sugar and fat content, the sky's the limit.

Fruits fill up most of this category, but how you eat them makes the combination possibilities endless. Start with fresh fruits or try to pick canned fruits labeled juice-packed, unsweetened, water-packed or sugarless. Keep them on ice to make them extra refreshing.

Dried fruits that have had no sugar added also are a good choice provided you don't overdo it. It's easy to eat more of these naturally sweet fruits than you should.

For special treats take a look at frozen fruits. Try keeping frozen grapes on hand. Ever think of rolling bananas in nuts and freezing them? Eating slightly thawed melon balls is sure to cool even the most blistered hiker.

Vegetables can give these pick-me-ups dimension. Semi-thawed cherry tomatoes, cool cucumber sticks, paper-thin slices of sweet potatoes kept in ice water, green pepper rings or lightly tossed cole slaw will keep you coming back for more snacks after a hot day's work.

If even these aren't quite enough and you find after you've cooled down that you need a quick, hearty snack, try some of these ideas.

Add cheese chunks to your fruit salad. Toss popcorn in peanut butter.

Keep hard-boiled eggs on hand or eat your honeydew melon with thinly sliced leftover pot roast. Keep a few peanuts on hand to munch along with frozen grapes. Snack on feta cheese and watermelon.

By keeping an open mind, combinations of fruit-coolers and protein are endless. Diabetic snackers owe it to other amateur athletes, gardeners and golfers to share the quick refreshers of summer with them. After a long, hard winter, everyone is ready for a change.

FLOSSING FACTS

Q. I'm a little confused about the type of floss to use and how to use it.

A. You should clean your teeth with dental floss at least once a day. The best time is after brushing at the end of the day. Slip the floss gently between the teeth and floss up and down each side until the floss makes a squeaking noise. This motion removes the invisible buildup of plaque. Unwaxed floss, does this job best. Also be sure to slide the floss carefully under the gum margin of

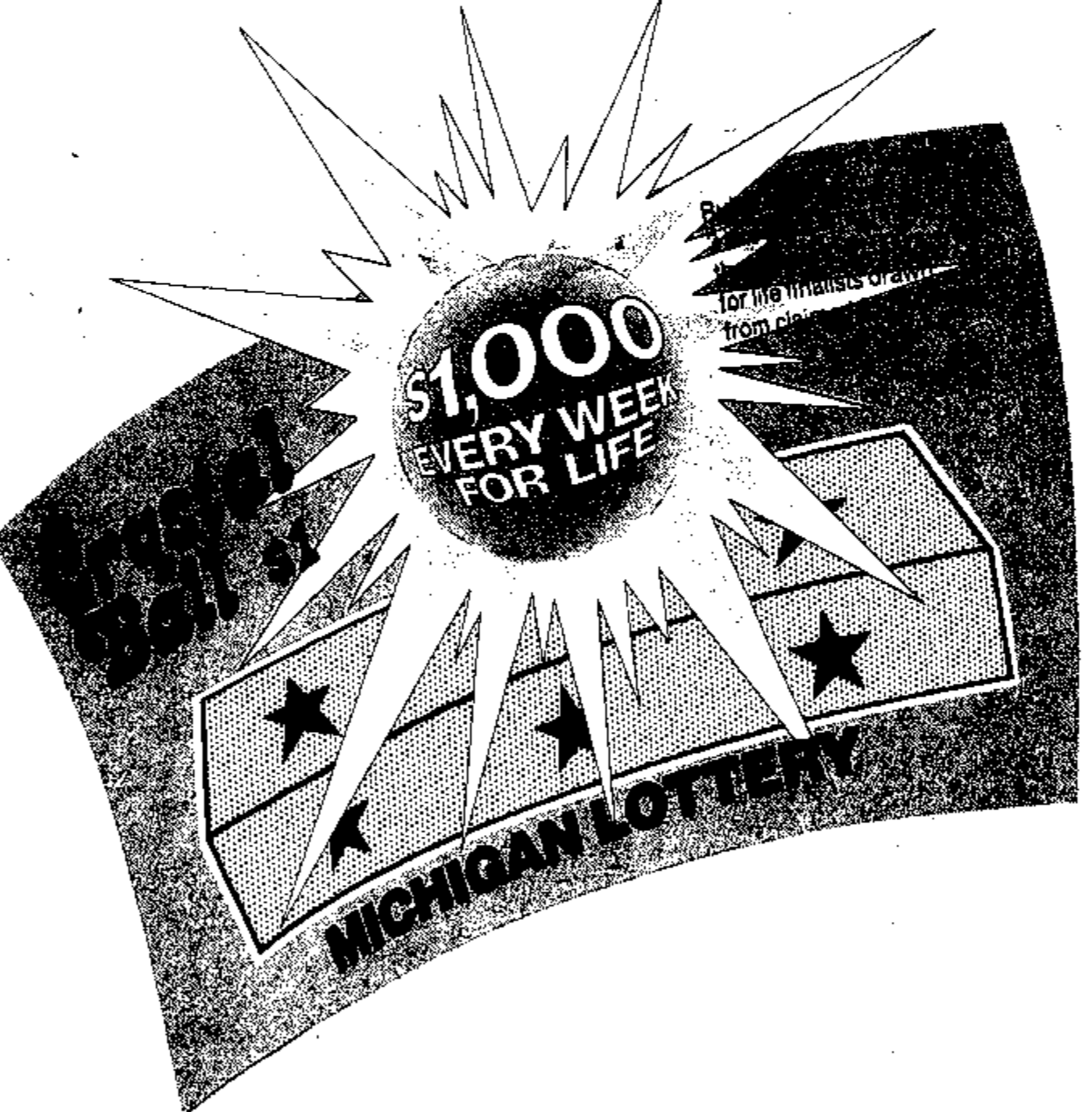

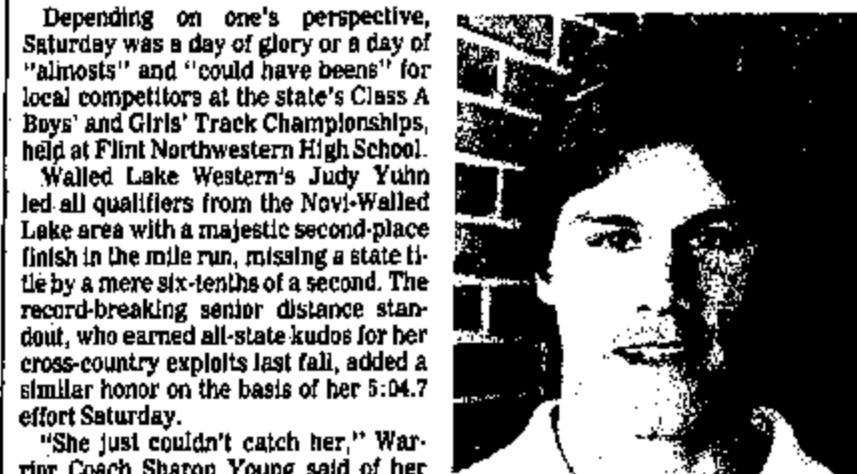
Warrior softball team cops first district title

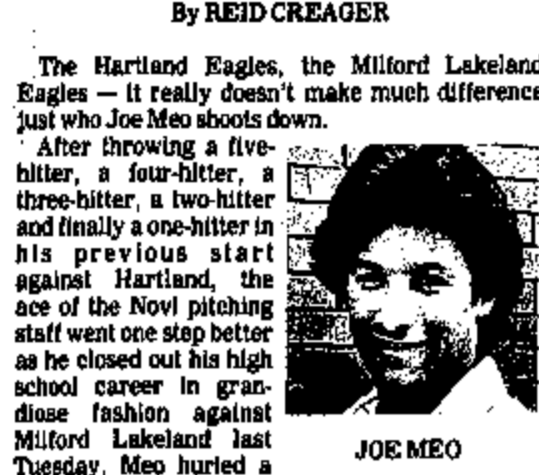

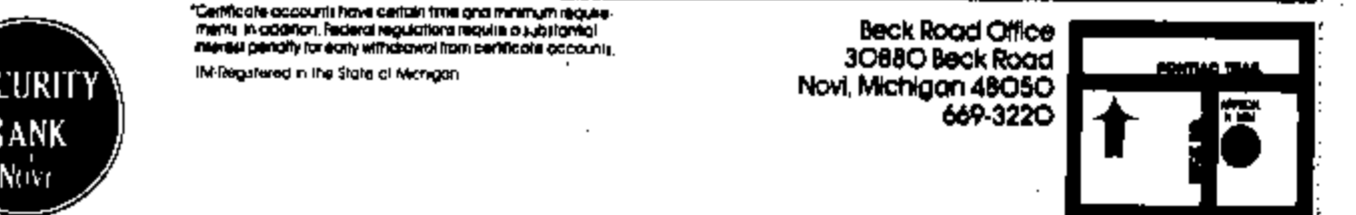

New tax plan coming?

By WARREN M. HOYT

After voters rejected 3-1 the latest property tax proposal, legislative leaders and Governor William G. Milliken agreed the issue has not been settled by the vote and the legislature, on its own, must devise a new tax plan.

He added he is looking at about 10 ways to cut property taxes, without providing any replacement revenues.

Opponents, meanwhile elated over the defeat of this proposal without nearly \$800 million in replacement revenues the 37.5 percent increase in sales and use taxes would have provided.

Among the other proposals advanced was one by Senator John Welborn (R-Kalamazoo) to cut property taxes by 10 percent, costing the state \$500 million.

Other legislators favor liberalizing the circuit breaker program to give more income tax credits for property taxes in relation to personal income.

Milliken, who said he does not rule out anything, said, "I would have to support more cuts than the \$500 million in Proposal A.

ASK THE LAWYER

Q. I was divorced from my husband in 1979. The judgment provided that my husband would be awarded the house, but that he would pay me the sum of \$10,000 for my equity within one year from the date of judgment.

Q. Can the state revoke an operator's license of a person who has been picked up for drunk driving and refused the breath test while demanding a blood test?

A. The Implied Consent Law, as interpreted by the Michigan Supreme Court, says that if you are arrested for drunk driving, you have the following rights:

Q. I am the landlord of a small two-story flat. My upstairs tenant recently lost his job. My tenant could not pay the \$125 per month rent, so he applied for assistance from the Department of Social Services. They agreed to pay \$165 per month when I know that I can rent the flat to a new tenant for \$150?

Q. My beauty shop operator did my hair with a substance that made my hair brittle and very unpretty. I am very embarrassed with the color of my hair and its condition. As a result, I am ashamed to go out in company. My beautician says he does not understand why that particular tint affected my hair that way. Can I sue this man for damages for the embarrassment and suffering he has caused me?

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Q. You most certainly can. You should not only sue the beauty shop operator, but you should also sue the company that manufactured the hair tint or dye that caused the embarrassing brittleness and distasteful color. You are entitled to damages for the pain and suffering that you have suf-
