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Klaver moves into assistant's post

The newest addition to the City of Novi's administrative staff, Assistant City Manager Craig Klaver, learned that he enjoyed working with people when he took a summer job driving a bookmobile for the City of Royal Oak. Klaver will be dealing with a lot of people in his new position in Novi — city employees he comes in contact with through his personal responsibilities, as well as Novi residents who will deal with him as a city administrator. Klaver who began his new duties Monday is in the process of settling in. He anticipates no problem filling the position which has been vacant nearly a month, since he previously has taken over jobs where the post went unfilled for a year. The new assistant city manager was selected from a field of 150 candidates. He comes to Novi from Royal Oak where he worked for 10 years. Over those years Klaver had a variety of positions, including a post in the

library, assessing department and personnel department. Klaver is a graduate of Oakland Public Library during the summer while attending college. The job lasted for three summers, but eventually the city's financial woes, which included a \$3 million deficit, required the elimination of the bookmobile program. He moved from the library to the assessing department where he worked as a clerk. When a real property appraiser position opened up Klaver took a competitive examination and was hired for the job. He worked three years in the assessors department. Experience he gained there qualified him for work in the personnel department and he subsequently moved there.

"I enjoy working with people, there's a lot of variety," Klaver said. He also has experience dealing with municipal insurance, workers compensation, employee relations and benefits. "I've handled traditional personnel functions — hiring, firing and payroll," he said. The 32-year-old administrator found that one of his most interesting jobs at Royal Oak was in the area of employee safety. In fact, he is president of the Society of Governmental Safety, a group which exchanges information on employee safety. "Eliminating injury and personal harm and pain to employees can be a savings to the city. Safety is an area where we can save money and lives at the same time." Despite such challenges in Royal Oak, Klaver decided to move on. "Royal Oak is a declining community. Both revenues and population are dropping. There the city is dropping programs — in Novi there seems to be the potential for growth in the city as

well as the city administration," Klaver said. He noted that as Royal Oak reduced its staff he was forced to do increasing amounts of clerical work, while actual administration of programs was cut back. In his new position Klaver is looking forward to gaining "more experience in overall city management, particularly in the area of negotiations." Besides his professional responsibilities, Klaver knows the demands of family life. He is married and has five children. The Klaver family currently resides in Berkley where they settled just 10 months ago. Klaver said that since they recently moved it would be difficult to immediately relocate and change the children's schools. But he noted that he is impressed with the community and hopes eventually to move to Novi. He and his wife are members of the First Congregational Church of Royal Oak, where he also has been softball coach.

Drivers say they'll use Decker

Unofficial results from last week's survey of drivers using East Lake Drive show that many plan to use Decker Road now that it is open. Novi officials cut the ribbon on the new roadway Monday. Drivers were stopped Thursday during both the morning and afternoon rush hours from 7-9 a.m. and 4-6 p.m. and questioned about their driving routes. Traffic was stopped on East Lake just north of Endwell Drive and one out of three drivers were questioned. When asked, "are you aware of Decker Road between Thirteen Mile and Fourteen Mile?" some 40 drivers responded "yes" and 188 said "no." Drivers were asked "will you continue to use East Lake or use Decker Road?" and 393 said they would use the Decker Road extension, while 182 said they would continue to drive East Lake Drive. Destinations and origins of each of the driver's trips also were questioned. It was found that the majority of the southbound traffic in the morning was headed to the I-96 expressway, according to Novi Engineering Consultant Raymond Cousineau. During the afternoon drive time the northbound drivers reported they were traveling to Pontiac and other points to the northeast. Cousineau reported that no major problems were caused by the interview which stopped traffic on the major traffic artery. Unofficial results of the interview would seem to confirm Novi officials' contention that Decker Road will be used as an alternative route for traffic previously using East Lake Drive. A second study must now be conducted to determine whether driving habits change as a result of the opening of Decker Road. It may be several weeks before that study is conducted, although city officials would like to finish the project as soon as possible. Novi is conducting the study to gather information requested by the Oakland County Road Commission. The county needs the information before it can evaluate proposed changes in the intersection of Thirteen Mile and Novi Road. Changes in the intersection are required before the city can obtain a traffic signal at the Thirteen Mile/Novi Road intersection. Residents in the area have requested a signal at the intersection for some time, but county officials have said a signal cannot be installed.

Schools consider increasing hot lunch prices by 20 cents

Lunch prices in the Novi schools may jump as much as 30 cents and milk prices can be expected to rise by nine cents if the Novi school board approves a plan to bolster a hot lunch program which is sagging from federal budget cuts. Increasing the lunch prices would bring the cost of elementary lunches to \$1. The cost of middle school and high school lunches would rise to \$1.10 and the cost of adult lunches would jump to \$1.65. Milk would be increased from 11 cents to 20 cents. The third aspect of the bail-out plan is to satellite food from Novi High School to Village Oaks Elementary, thereby saving preparation costs. Assistant Superintendent William Barr told the board last week that the schools anticipate losing at least 9.5 cents per lunch in monies formerly received from the federal government as hot lunch subsidies. Additionally, the schools previously have been allowed to get as much as 15 cents per lunch in commodities. The commodities allowance is expected to be cut back to 11 cents. To compound the problem, labor and food costs also will be rising, Barr told the board. Increased food costs alone are expected to raise the cost of lunches by seven cents each. Along with the unknown cost of labor and the reduction in federal aid those factors will make it necessary to charge higher lunch prices. If the school district did not raise lunch prices, general fund monies normally earmarked for other programs would have to be used to subsidize hot lunches and keep the program out of the red, Barr explained. Regarding the satelliting of lunches to Village Oaks, it was explained that the cost of producing lunches at the elementary is currently "out of line" when compared to other schools in the district. To counteract the problem it has been recommended that the Village Oaks kitchen be used to receive food prepared at Novi High School. In addition to those plans to bolster the financial situation for the hot lunch program, the school district will investigate ways to reduce the cost of producing lunches. Disposable tableware and serving utensils may be used. The schools also will look into the possibility of using vendor prepared hot sandwiches in high school and middle school ala carte lines. A number of parents appeared before the board requesting that any decision to satellite lunches to Village Oaks be delayed until they could learn more about the procedure. Mary Ann Pembroke of VOICE told the board that as many parents as could be reached were surveyed regarding the program and 106 of them opposed the satellite concept. She requested that parents be given an opportunity to view the program in operation and review the administration's cost projections to determine whether it is "the only alternative we have." Barr reported that objections initially were raised by parents at other schools when a satellite lunch program was instituted. "After they found out what we were doing the objections ceased to exist," Barr said. "Either the parents figured you can't fight city hall or the lunches aren't as bad as they thought they would be. In today's world of rising costs this is the time to do it." Parents pointed out that the schools may not be receiving complaints because people do not realize food is not prepared at the school. One parent told the board: "If you think parents are happy with the satellite program you are sadly out of touch." Currently, food is prepared at Middle School South and sent to Novi Woods

Church property rezoning request rejected by Novi planning board

After hearing strong objections from surrounding property owners, the Novi Planning Board has recommended denial of a rezoning request that would increase the market value of the property on which the Novi Methodist Church currently is located. Specifically, the planners voted unanimously to recommend denial of a request to rezone the property from its current R-4 (single family residential) classification to an OS-1 (office-service district) designation. Novi Methodist Pastor Richard Griffin reported in the rezoning application that the church would like to rezone the property to the office-service designation so it can be sold at a higher value than it can be with the single-family residential designation. Eda Weddington, chairman of the church's building committee, told the planners last week that the church is "busting out" of the present building and needs to sell the property to raise money to construct a new church in Novi. In order to expand, we need money," she said. "The only asset we have is our property, and if we can't rezone and sell it, it will be a long time before we can afford to make basic repairs." Planning Consultant Charles Cairns recommended approval of the rezoning request even though it does not strictly conform to the city's recently adopted master plan. Noting that the church is located immediately west of a shopping center on the southwest corner of Ten Mile and Meadowbrook Road and across the street from another shopping center on the northwest corner of the same intersection, Cairns suggested that the office-service designation would serve as a buffer to the single family residences to the south and west just as the church has for the past 25 years. "Use of the land for office purposes could serve as effective a buffer to the adjacent residences just as the existing multiple development to the north does to its adjacent residences," said the planning consultant. "Office use on the subject site would not be out of keeping with the intent of the master plan because the present non-residential use would not be changed," he added. "Hence, the overall intent of the plan for this area would not be adversely affected." Strong opposition to the proposed rezoning was expressed by residents of both the Orchard Hills and Meadowbrook Glens subdivisions. Petitions carrying the names of approximately 30 Meadowbrook Glens residents and 31 Orchard Hills residents opposed to the rezoning were submitted for the planners' consideration. Thomas McAllen and Thomas Bolenbaugh, two Orchard Hills residents who reside on property adjacent to the church, said they opposed the rezoning and wanted the church to remain. "When I bought my home, the church property was zoned residential and I want it to stay that way," said Bolenbaugh. "They (the church) have always been good neighbors," added McAllen. "I'd prefer to have them stay." Additional opposition was expressed by Debbie Chase, another Orchard Hills resident. She told the planners that she and her husband had moved from Troy to Novi a year ago to obtain a more rural atmosphere. "We checked the zoning (on the church property) and found it was residential," she said. "The church has said it wants to move to an area less commercial, but we want the same thing." "Rezoning the property to a non-residential designation will effect the homeowners in this subdivision who

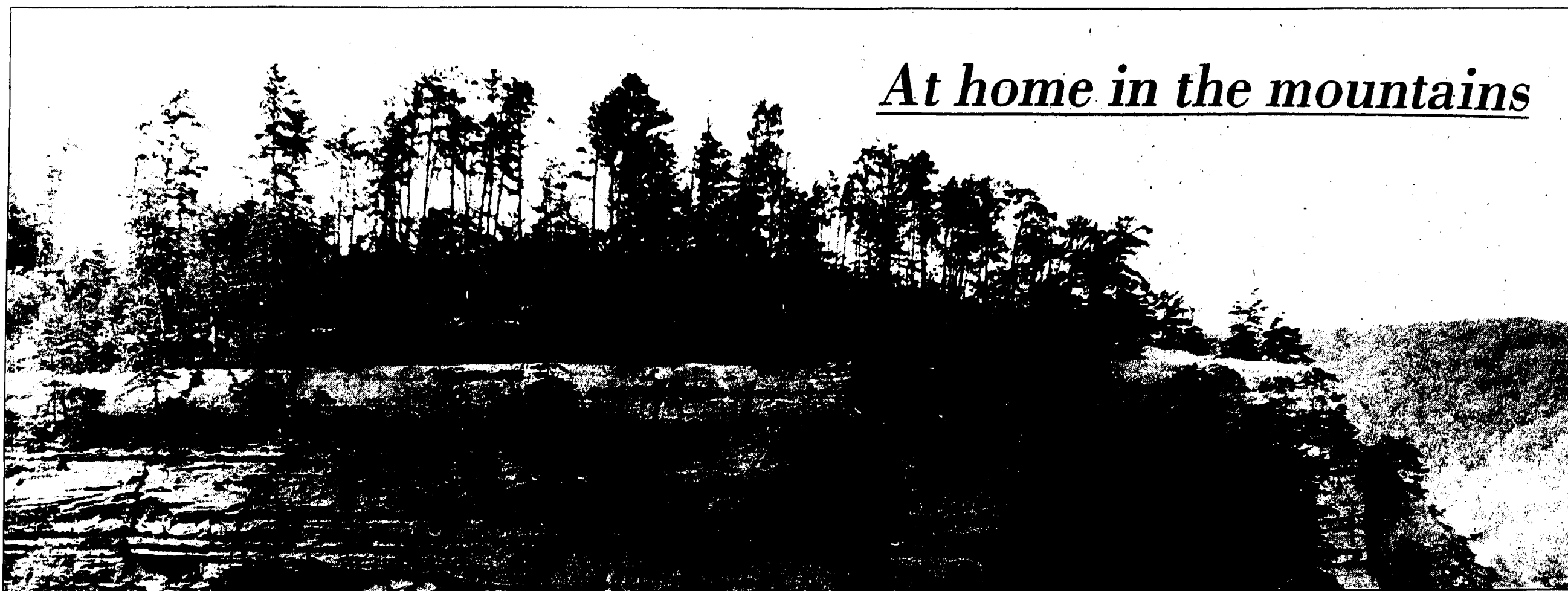

The mountains pull you into the heart of Kentucky. While the roads twist through the valleys...

Kim Spielman lives here and if anyone has a right to experience culture shock, she does.

Living in Peabody is as different as one can imagine from growing up in Novi...

Right now, though, Spielman is enjoying her life in the mountains. From her government issue trailer...

It is beautiful here, but many of the dozen or so people Spielman works with in the district ranger's office are not nearly as taken with Kentucky as she is...

Not Spielman. She admits she would like to work in other parts of the country...

As a wildlife biologist, Spielman has encountered some of that distrust while manning check stations during hunting season...

She's also faced the difficult chore of going door-to-door trying to educate people on how to prevent forest fires...

As part of the forest service staff, she becomes a part-time fire-fighter several times each year as hundreds of acres of woods go up in flames.

"In this area, you don't have the big crown fires like you have out west where the tops of the trees are on fire," Spielman explains.

"What we do is go to the front of the fire and rake a line down to mineral soil that might be about three feet wide unless it's a real hot fire..."

If Spielman has a complaint about Kentucky, it is that she occasionally feels lonely and "starved for conversation."

Now that she has a roommate, she says, she doesn't face that as much as she did last winter when she'd spend long nights alone in her trailer.

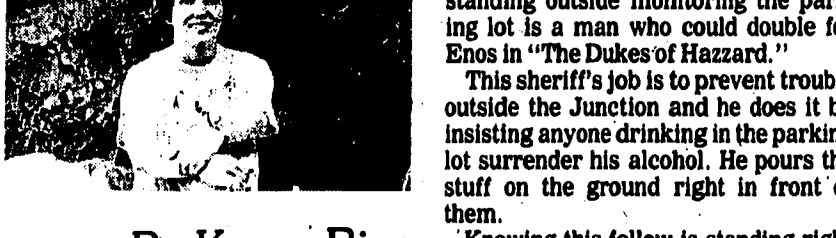

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McNish survives upset to claim Novi title

It came as no great surprise that powerful McNish/Goat Farm/Novi Bowl won the playoff championship of the Novi Parks and Recreation Department's Men's Resident Softball League.

After all, McNish/Goat Farm/Novi Bowl was the dominant team throughout the season, posting a 21-1 record during regular season play to take the tough "A" division championship by a full three games over their nearest competitors, Pit Stop Lounge.

With the score evened at one defeat apiece, McNish and Pit Stop then squared off in the decisive, winner-take-all tournament final.

Stonier adds to honors in prep golf tourneys

Novi's Mark Stonier continued to shine on the summer schoolboy golf circuit as he posted a highly commendable sixth place finish in the Junior Walter Hagen Tournament at Salem Hills Monday.

Stonier put together scores of 44-40 to finish with a total of 84 strokes in the tournament which brought together some of the top schoolboy golfers in southeastern Michigan.

To qualify for the Junior Hagen Tournament, which is sponsored by the American Cancer Society, golfers must finish in the top three at five regional locations.

Stonier gained a place in the finals by finishing second in the qualifying round at Godwin Glens where he carded an 81 (42-39) last week. His 81-stroke total in the regionals was just one stroke behind Country Day's Aaron Shapiro who shot an 80 over the Godwin Glens course.

While Stonier was qualifying for the Junior Hagen finals at Godwin Glens, other schoolboy golfers were qualifying for the tourney finals in regionals at Pontiac Country Club, Glen Oaks, Whispering Willows and Oak Ridge Golf Course.

Despite the fact that his 84 at Salem Hills left him in sixth place among the area's top schoolboy golfers, Stonier expressed dissatisfaction with his performance.

"I just wasn't hitting the ball that well," commented Stonier who will be a key member of the Novi High School

golf team this fall. "The course was playing awfully long — the fourth hole was a 615-yard par five, but I wasn't pleased with the way I was hitting the ball."

Although he was disappointed with the sixth-place finish in the Junior Hagen Tournament, Stonier has put together quite a record in a busy summer of golf.

He has finished in the top 10 in eight of the nine tournaments he has played in this summer. And his average score has been 78.67 strokes per 18-hole round.

The talented young Novi golfer is scheduled to vie for additional honors when he competes in the Michigan Metropolitan Junior Golf Association (MJGA) tournament at the University of Michigan course in Ann Arbor next Monday.

The MJGA is like a mini-tour for the state's top prep golfers. Golfers under 18 years old participate in a series of four tourneys at various locations. Their top three scores are then tallied, and the top 15 finishers in each geographic area of the state are eligible to advance to the MJGA finals at the U-M course.

Stonier qualified for the finals by shooting a 76 at Godwin Glens in the tour opener. He followed that with scores of 79 at Salem Hills and 71 at the Spring Lake Country Club.

His 54-hole total of 226 was fifth best among golfers in the West Division of MJGA play.

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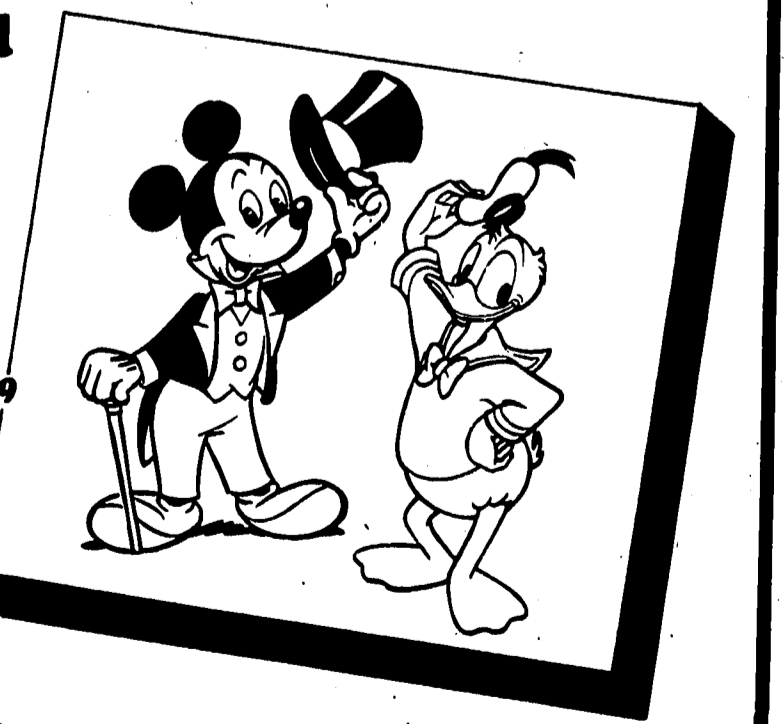

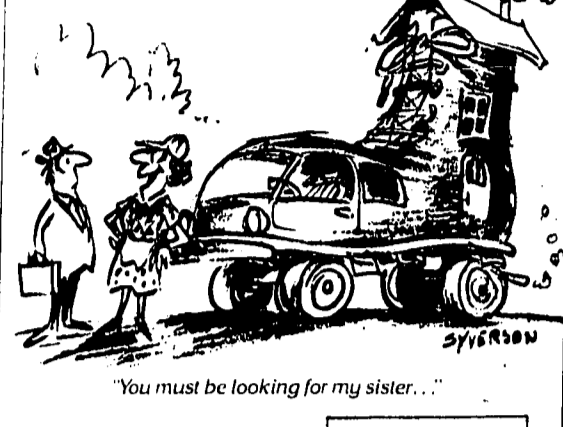
Young bikers flock to motocross track

The BMX course at Bogie Downs is similar to a standard motorcycle motocross course in design. It is scaled down for bikers, Steimer said. There are seven jumps on the track. The turns are banked and they're all on clay. It's really an ideal surface for kids. The dirt offers some cushion. The injury rate is very small, he stated. Not much in the way of protective equipment is needed in BMX, according to Tushis and Steimer. A helmet is required, as are long sleeves and long pants on all riders. There are three sets of pads on the 20-inch wheeled bicycles. Fenders or chain guards, which could cut riders in case of a fall, are not permitted.

Tushis calls Michigan the "hottest BMX state in the nation." California riders, who can ride all year because of the mild climate, have had the advantage in previous nationwide competitions, he said. Now that an indoor track is available, Michigan riders will have a better chance to show what they can do, he added. "BMX has been big in California for about five years. We have some of the hottest riders in the country here in Michigan. They are not to be overlooked. The kids don't have to put their bicycles away in October now that Bogie Downs is open," Tushis continued. Winter racing is a bit chilly for spectators, added Tushis. The temperature is set at 40 degrees.

However, the riders still manage to work up a sweat, he said. Tushis makes it clear that being an indoor track in Michigan isn't what makes Bogie Downs a good track. "It's not like everyone comes here because it's the only place (to race). It is, but it's still one of the best tracks there is," he explained. "Someone might open another one, but they'd have to go a long way to organize it better than Bogie Downs." BMX competition is open to all riders. Entry fees are \$6 for an evening of racing, which guarantees three motos for each entrant. ABA insurance is required and a group membership is encouraged. There is a \$2 admission charge for spectators.

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Gone Fishin'

Mid-summer dog days require special tricks

The general outlook from the local fishermen I've talked to has been that fishing has been somewhat on the slow side lately. Typical mid-summer "dog days." The majority of bass have gone deeper and are a little more difficult to locate and catch. We have also had a couple of cold fronts move through and that makes the fishing even tougher. Coping with cold fronts is difficult; the fish just seem to get a bad case of lock jaw. You may have read certain articles in various fishing magazines discussing feeding times of fish based on the various states of the moon. Many anglers religiously go by this theory. Personally, the only time I pay attention to the moon is when I'm night fishing. When the moon is full it gives off a gentle glow that lights the way for feeding fish. The full moon, along with seasonal weather, will also influence spawning activities. Fish, too, find the moon romantic. In my opinion, weather is the key factor which directly influences fish in their daily habits. You can carefully choose the right lure, lure presentation, time of day and stage of the moon, but if a strong cold front passes through, forget it. The perfect bass fishing days are warm, humid, hazy, overcast days where the weather trend has not changed drastically in at least the past three days. Warm, rainy days are also good, as long as they are not associated with a cold front. As a cold front moves in, the sky clouds up and it rains. The following day is usually high barometric pressure, crystal clear, not a cloud in the sky, a picture perfect day for a picnic — a lousy day for bass fishing. In the mid-summer, even if the weather has been steady, the fishing seems to die off. Old timers refer to these days as "dog days." During this period you'll find your luck will increase fishing after dark. This time of year, the bass will more readily hit surface lures and there is a wide variety of them to choose from. Before the introduction of the plastic worm back in the '60s, the famous Jitterbug was the big bass catcher and today it is still the most popular top water bait. Another excellent lure on the surface is the Hula Popper. Today's modern bass baits are also very productive at night. Your best bet now is to fish at night when the weather has been steady, casting surface lures near some type of vegetation, whether weeds, pads, reeds, any form of growth close to deeper water. If there is a full moon, this will also be to your advantage. The Michigan Bass Masters held a club tournament on the Portage chain of lakes two weeks ago and Jim Kolesar took first place honors. Second place went to Maurice Benson, third to Chuck Dean and a big bass to Bud Rogers.

Don't look now, folks, but August is almost half over and that means high school sports will be in full swing in less than a month. John Osborne, athletic director at Novi High School, announced last week that practices for the boys' football team and girls' basketball teams will begin next Monday (August 17). All Novi High School boys interested in trying out for the football team should report to the high school next Monday at 8 a.m. Girls interested in trying out for the girls' basketball team should report next Monday at 3 p.m. "Everybody should come ready to play," said Osborne, the only football coach and athletic director in the history of the high school.
