



## Armed robbers injure two Novi residents

Michigan State Police have apprehended two juvenile suspects and are seeking an adult male believed to be the third person responsible for an armed robbery on Cottisford Drive in Novi's Brookland Farms subdivision Saturday night.

According to Detective Sergeant Wayne Bullen of the Northville State Police Post, the juvenile arrests were made Sunday after one of the teens allegedly involved in the incident attempted to use a credit card stolen in the robbery.

Robert and Midge Haynie were returning to their Novi Township home late Saturday when three persons assaulted them in their driveway, hitting Mrs. Haynie in the head with the butt of a rifle and taking her purse, they told police.

"We drove up to the house and opened the garage door with the garage door opener and there they were," said Mrs. Haynie Monday from her hospital bed at St. Mary Hospital in Livonia. "I think they were hanging around waiting for someone. I think they were after money."

Mrs. Haynie was struck at least once, perhaps several times with the butt of what police believe was a .22 caliber rifle, opening a gash in her forehead and causing doctors to worry about possible damage to one of her eyes.

"Bob took on another one (of the in-

truders) in the driveway," she said, "and got inside to dial 911. I, by that time, was cold."

After the scuffle, the three suspects fled on foot, having taken Mrs. Haynie's purse but failing in efforts to get her husband's wallet.

More disturbing to the Haynies was the police discovery of several live rounds of .22 caliber ammunition in the driveway.

"It could have been someone trying to shoot us and the chamber jammed," Mrs. Haynie said. "We could have been shot."

Bullen said that was one of several possible interpretations of how the bullets came to land in the drive. They could have been ejected when the weapon was used to bludgeon her, or dropped from a pocket or hand.

When the detective questioned the young man, he "admitted he, with two others, committed the crime." The second youth was interviewed and confessed this evening, Bullen said.

Both were released in their parents' custody while awaiting processing as juvenile offenders through the county probate court. Police were still seeking the adult suspect Tuesday at press time.

In addition to the fraud charge in Harper Woods, those involved face armed robbery charges. Other possibilities, Bullen said, are charges for combination of a felony with a firearm (which carries a mandatory two-year sentence) and felonious assault.

## Radioactive vials harmless

Three experts with whom the police spoke said they were sure the vials presented no medical hazard. The police also were given information on safely collecting the cylinders.

responsible behavior, but pure love is magic and works miracles."

Reid said in her programs: "If a child responds correctly, the behavior is reinforced, but if the response is inappropriate or there is no response we re-teach. The inappropriate behavior is ignored."

"Even if you've said to a child in the past it's never too late to start saying yes," Reid went on to say: "Too often we teach them to say, 'I don't know.' We remember childhood fondly, as a golden time, but growing up can be emotionally painful if parents aren't skillful. When taught by shams children experience a loss of pride and self respect."

Parents also should know a child's success is measured by his aptitude, ability to understand instruction and perseverance, Reid said.

"When he was asked in later years why he never sold the picture he responded: 'when I became discouraged and felt my hands had lost their control, I would just sit and paint the roses and tell myself, "You're the kind of person I want to be."'"

## Police warn Novi parents

Novi police are seeking information about a man who has been approaching young girls and is accused of exposing himself to one of them.

Police have received at least two reports in recent weeks of a man in a black Camaro who has stopped teenage girls seeking directions to various places in Novi. The man has been seen mainly in various sections of an area from Grand River south to Eight Mile and Novi Road east to Haggerty Road.

The man is suspected of indecently exposing himself to one of the girls he approached.

Police reported that a young girl and her sister were stopped by a man in a black car when they got off a school bus at Pheasant Run on December 1.

He asked the girls for directions to Applegate Condominiums. When one of the girls asked him directions the man appeared confused and asked her to show him the location of the condominiums on a map.

When the girl approached the car and looked at the map the man began fondling his exposed penis. The girl then ran from the car.

Police believe the same man also has approached girls in the Village Oaks parking lot and at Novi Middle School South.

The man is described as a white male, 35-40 years of age. He is believed to have short, dark hair which is balding, police reported.

Police said that although the man has approached a number young girls there has been only one reported case of indecent exposure.

Parents have reported the man has sought directions from teenage girls, telling them he was new to the area. The incidents have reportedly occurred between 4 p.m. and 6 p.m.

Rush then contacted the parents of the three boys and explained the need to him. One of the boy's parents filed charges three weeks later and another boy's parents decided to press charges after they were contacted by Wixom police about the incident.

Wixom police received two other complaints about Reeves' disciplinary actions last year. One parent told Wixom police in February that her child had been slapped by Reeves. According to police, Reeves received a two-day suspension in March as a result of the incident.

In June, Wixom police received a copy of Herbert's letter detailing a series of incidents her son had allegedly witnessed at the school. According to her son, Herbert said, Reeves had allegedly hit several students and kicked one.

In her letter, Herbert stated: "I feel this matter looks like it should be seriously handled. I want to go on record now so that if the future a student is seriously hurt by Mr. Reeves, nobody will be able to say 'I'm so surprised (sic)!' I wasn't even aware there was a problem."

Herb also arranged a conference with Reeves and Moody to discuss the problems before she sent the letter to school officials and Wixom police.

Roseborough said Tuesday that Reeves will remain on suspension pending the outcome of an investigation by school officials. Roseborough refused to discuss specifics, but said the investigation would involve the "total perspective" of Reeves' performance.

Sheldon said Tuesday that Reeves was reinstated after the November 3-4 suspension, but was subsequently given a further suspension after allegations of another incident. Sheldon did not reveal details of the most recent alleged incident.

Reeves has been a teacher in the Walled Lake District for the past 26 years, Roseborough said. This is his first year as a teacher at Loon Lake Elementary.

## Portrait of a fallen soldier and friend

(EDITOR'S NOTE: When John E. Davis spoke to students at Walled Lake's Central and Western high schools, he went prepared. Davis wrote this story for them recalling a particularly poignant memory from his experiences as an ambulance driver during World War I. We think it's proof that old reporters never lose their touch.)

As high school students, I suppose you know that President Woodrow Wilson and both houses of the United States Congress declared war on the German Empire and Kaiser Wilhelm II in April of 1917. This was the First World War, known as "the war to end all wars." It took place because the German navy persisted in sinking American merchant ships in the Atlantic Ocean despite Yankee complaints.


When the declaration of war took place, I was on the staff of the Chicago Tribune, writing feature articles for the Sunday magazine of that paper. Within the week I was to be located in military headquarters and enlisted in the Army — along with thousands of others to do the same.

We drilled and trained for the next 12 months or more. Then one sunny morning, about a thousand or more got off a Dutch merchant ship at the docks in Liverpool, England, as U.S.A. Base Hospital Ten of Chicago, Illinois, where we paraded (doctors, nurses and buck privates) for two hours as the Liverpools whopped and English girls kissed us all.

About two weeks later, this Base Hospital One was established in a large park near the city of Nantes, France, operating as a section of the medical department of General John J. Pershing's Argonne Invasion army of some 400,000 Yankee soldiers.

We were not fighters, so we didn't carry weapons — just medical equipment of the ambulance drivers, with five assistants to help carry the wounded to the ambulances and then to hospitals for treatment.

## Remembering life, war and the good times

Tears well up in the old man's eyes when he talks about his past. Shades of people long gone, long forgotten by

Detroit Free Press' Detroit Magazine — is living here at West Winds instead of living on his own or with his family. But Davis, a lifelong optimist, doesn't wonder about that. He maintains his life at West Winds, the second con-

he signed up for a stint in World War I, based on his actual experiences.

The strength and reality of his emotion probably came through then as strongly as it does today. "It impressed me deeply," Davis says of the war. One particular memory of the war, he says, was the death of Billie Jean Kendall, whom Davis wrote about recently to share with Walled Lake high school students. (See related story.)

When the war ended, Davis returned to America and the Chicago Tribune before moving up to the New York Evening Star, where he "cultivated" the company of ambassadors and public figures with whom he was often on official international relations.

Davis married and had three sons and two daughters after returning from Europe. Of his children, only his youngest son, Michael Davis of Birmingham, is still alive. And he speaks sadly of the childhood death of another son, who developed consumption at the age of nine.

Shortly after the child's death, one member of Davis' staff at the New York Evening Star was given the opportunity to extend their condolences to then President Calvin Coolidge, who had recently lost his own son. The reporters selected Davis to meet with the president.

Davis was put in charge of a group of ambulance drivers and shipped off to France after a few months of first aid training.

During those trying days of scraping men off the battlefield and watching many of them die, Davis poured out his experiences in a notebook and sent stories back to the Chicago Tribune, where he had worked prior to his entry into the war. A foreign correspondent in a time when news was still starved for stories from the front, Davis couldn't avoid writing a series of "tear-jerkers."

Everyone but John E. Davis, who is telling his stories and their importance over now.

At 84, John E. Davis sits in the sunny visiting room at West Winds Convalescent Home in Commerce Township. Around him, other elderly residents of the home sit quietly, or talk to themselves, or shuffle in and out of the room. Occasionally, an elderly woman helps a wheelchair-bound resident negotiate the halls adjoining the dining room. Spotting one man, Davis says with compassion, "Mental case. It's unfortunate."

One can't help wondering why John E. Davis — an alert but slightly forgetful retiree reporter who daily pounds out 700 words on his electric typewriter and recently published an article in The

valecent home he has lived in. "I like the people," he notes. "And the girls talk good to me."

The attitude about what one would expect from a man who declares, "I have enjoyed every day of my life so far back as I can remember." And his positive outlook never wavers, even when he talks about the painful and tragic moments of his life — which he seems compelled to return to over again like the old sailor in Samuel Coleridge's "Rhyme of the Ancient Mariner."

The memories that are most deeply etched in his memory center around the deaths of people close to him — his nine-year-old son and World War I Doughboys, for example.

John E. Davis was nearing 30 when

He still recalls his first story, which the editor sent him to cover as a test. Davis went to a bar where some people were meeting. While he was there, two men argued, grabbed shotguns and shot each other. Davis ran to a telephone and called the newspaper, and he was still willing to extend a helping hand and advice to beginners. Perhaps that's what prompted this offer: "Six months with me and I'll make you a top-notch reporter."

Judging from John E. Davis' ability to write and his 70-plus years of experience, that's one valuable opportunity.
