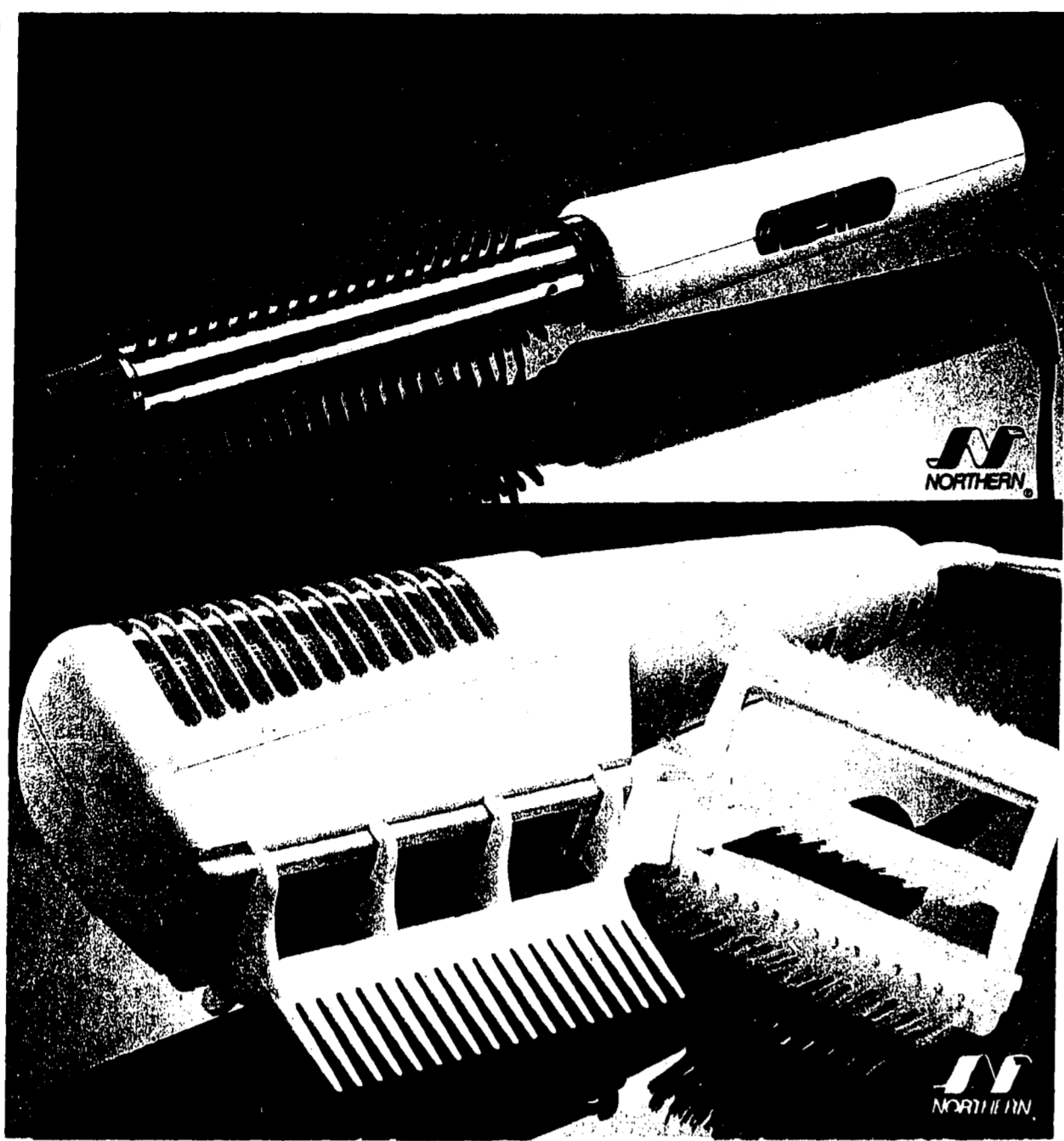

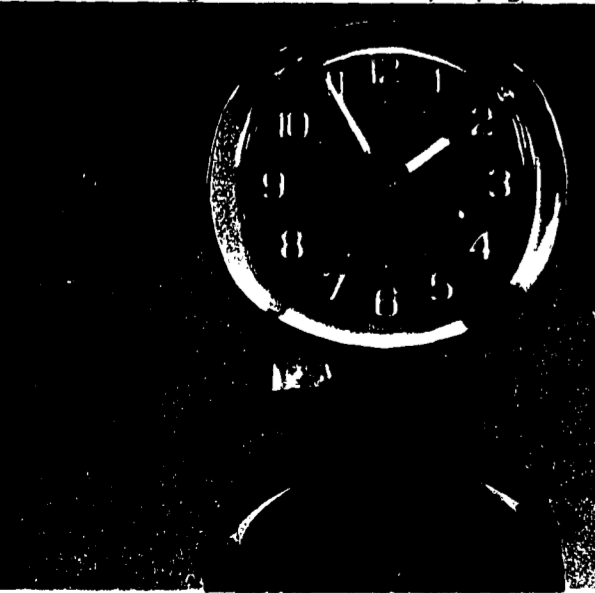

Armed robbers injure two Novi residents

Michigan State Police have apprehended two juvenile suspects and are seeking an adult male believed to be the third person responsible for an armed robbery on Cottisford Drive in Novi's Brookland Farms subdivision Saturday night.

According to Detective Sergeant Wayne Bullen of the Northville State Police Post, the juvenile arrests were made Sunday after one of the teens allegedly involved in the incident attempted to use a credit card stolen in the robbery.

Robert and Midge Haynie were returning to their Novi Township home late Saturday when three persons assaulted them in their driveway, hitting Mrs. Haynie in the head with the butt of a rifle and taking her purse, they told police.

"We drove up to the house and opened the garage door with the garage door opener and there they were," said Mrs. Haynie Monday from her hospital bed at St. Mary Hospital in Livonia. "I think they were hanging around waiting for someone. I think they were after money."

Mrs. Haynie was struck at least once, perhaps several times with the butt of what police believe was a 22 caliber rifle, opening a gash in her forehead and causing doctors to worry about possible damage to one of her eyes.

"Bob took on another one (of the in-

truders) in the driveway," she said, "and got inside to dial 911. I, by that time, was out cold."

After the scuffle, the three suspects fled on foot, having taken Mrs. Haynie's purse but failing in efforts to get her husband's wallet.

More disturbing to the Haynies was the police discovery of several live rounds of .22 caliber ammunition in the driveway.

"It could have been someone was trying to shoot us and the chamber jammed," Mrs. Haynie said. "We could have been shot."

Bullen said that was one of several possible interpretations of how the bullets came to land in the drive. They could have been ejected when the weapon was used to bludgeon her, or dropped from a pocket or hand.

As Novi Township residents of the Brookland Farms subdivision, the Haynies are technically under the police protection of the Oakland County Sheriff's Department. Dialing 911 in this area reaches Northville Township Police dispatchers, who presumably relayed the call to the state police.

"The state police came right away," Mrs. Haynie said, "and the ambulance came right away."

Less expected, however, was the immedicacy with which police were able to make arrests in the case. By the time they had arrived on the scene, the

suspects had fled, but less than 12 hours later they had one in custody and names of the other two.

According to state police, one of the youths involved attempted to use the couple's Hudson charge card to buy cologne at the Eastland shopping mall at around 11 a.m. Sunday.

As part of the department store's security measures, it placed a call to Haynie and learned the card had been stolen the previous evening.

Store security forces held the teen on charges of fraudulent use of a credit card, police said yesterday, until Bullen arrived.

When the detective questioned the young man, he "admitted he, with two others, committed the crime." The second youth was interviewed and confessed that evening, Bullen said.

Both were released in their parents' custody while awaiting processing as juvenile offenders through the county probate court. Police were still seeking the adult suspect Tuesday at press time.

In addition to the fraud charge in Harper Woods, those involved face armed robbery charges. Other possibilities, Bullen said, are charges for commission of a felony with a firearm (which carries a mandatory two-year sentence) and felonious assault.

Final Decker Road costs raise council questions

Novi has withheld final payments for the construction of Decker Road between Thirteen and Fourteen Mile until questions regarding an \$85,000 cost overrun on the project have been resolved.

A \$92,000 payment to contractor J. D. Armstrong Landscaping was held up by the council Monday. The city council requested the check not be issued until it receives additional information from the administration regarding delays which pushed the project cost up to \$563,000.

Decker Road was slated to be completed in 1980, but due to delays the roadway was not paved until 1981.

Engineering Consultant Raymond Cousineau told the council the project came in nearly 18 percent over the original contract price, primarily because during the course of the project the city did not have the funds to proceed with the job on schedule.

He explained the bids were opened in June 1980, but the contractor was not given permission to start until September because of problems with

receipt of federal funds used to finance the project.

Cousineau further said the contractor had been depending on good weather and favorable soil conditions to complete the job in the 1980 construction season.

However, soil conditions were worse than expected and favorable weather conditions did not materialize. Instead the weather ranged from 35-45 degrees and was cloudy.

Those factors alone accounted for \$25,000 of the increased construction price, according to Cousineau.

Another \$21,500 was added to the project when financing delays prevented the city from proceeding on schedule with paving work. When funds became available, the work was added back into the project at an increased cost.

Decisions to change the construction project in the field by the engineers acting as the city's agent also resulted in additional costs of \$10,000, Cousineau said.

Engineering Consultant Joseph Kapelczak also noted that poor soil con-

ditions required removing more soil, using more crushed concrete and adding more underdrains than was anticipated in the project specifications.

Despite the cost increases, Cousineau told the council "the final dollar figure is reasonable and in line with construction estimates" and recommended final acceptance of Decker Road.

Cousineau further defended the project saying, "Decker Road was unique for Novi in that there was no road there before. And you've got one hell of a road there. All in all, the project went very well."

Council members questioned changes in the plans for the project which occurred in the field.

Additionally, council members requested a full report on why funds were not available for the project to proceed on schedule. They questioned delaying the beginning of the project from June to September and requested information on contract provisions regarding increases in construction prices from the 1980 to the 1981 construction season.

Radioactive vials harmless

Novi police thought they might have had a dangerous radioactive substance on their hands recently, but it looks like the vial of unidentified material was for medical purposes rather than something designed for terrorist activities.

A resident in the 20000 block of Ripple Creek reported finding what appeared to be radioactive material while cleaning out debris left by a former resident of the home.

According to police, the two lead cylinders approximately 3 inches by 1.5 inches were found while the man was cleaning. He opened one cylinder and found it contained a glass vial labeled "Radioactive Material, Danger."

He resealed the cylinder and called police. Police then contacted the U.S. Department of Energy, the Michigan Department of Public Health and the

Federal Nuclear Regulatory Commission.

Three experts with whom the police spoke said they were sure the vials presented no medical hazard. The police also were given information on safely collecting the cylinders.

Police said Michigan authorities requested the cylinders be picked up by the police department so they could be collected by authorities at a later date.

Captain Richard Faulkner of the Novi Police Department said police had not yet received official word from authorities regarding the contents of the cylinders, but apparently the radioactive material "was a low grade which wouldn't have caused problems."

Faulkner said the former resident of the home was a doctor, which would explain the presence of the substance.

Love your children and they will learn

Love, unselfish love, is the key to teaching.

It was more than a speech—that was the message reading expert Ethna Reid delivered Thursday at Novi High School Auditorium before a crowd of approximately 80 parents and teachers.

"Love is the strongest thing in the world. Stronger than hate, criticism and even death, when you think about it. People without love are incapable of surviving."

"It's not a sudden death. It's like my plants. Without care first they are green then gradually they are yellow and one by one the leaves drop off. It usually takes about a year and then I'll throw it out."

"People also perish without love. There is a withering of the spirit and of the soul."

"Why is love so important? For every person with whom we interact—if they are to learn from us, if they are to know self-esteem, self appreciation or self confidence—they must know we love with an unconditional love, not a love based upon comparison."

"Without the knowledge of that love they must borrow their security; borrow it from appearance, status, past achievements or associations. This passes from generation to generation and borrowed strength builds weakness."

Responsible behavior, but pure love is magic and works miracles.

Reid said society expects teachers and parents "to know how to interact with children and help them become what we want them to be." But it doesn't just happen.

"In the 'Sound of Music there is a line: 'Nothing comes from nothing, nothing ever will.' We get what we put into it. The greater the effort the greater the reward. It's a simple formula. Any accomplishment takes sacrifice and monumental effort, energy. It takes time to earn the love and trust of a child."

"If you truly love someone, such as a child, you are willing to serve them. There is no substitute for pure love in the homes or the schools...to care enough to give completely of yourself, that is love."

To provide a loving atmosphere for their children parents must learn "a language of love not hate, humor not anger, one that will enhance life, not shrink the spirit."

"We need to learn the language our parents reserved for guests," Reid explained. "To some this may seem like manipulation, something suspicious like taking a Dale Carnegie course. Is it artificial? Picasso and Beethoven are artificial, they also are life giving."

Part of the new language parents must learn is "never say no," Reid pro-

Novi planners approve mobile home ordinance

Public hearings will be required before manufactured homes can be placed in Novi's single-family residential areas.

That's one of the key clauses in an ordinance amendment to govern the placement of manufactured homes in residential subdivisions.

Novi's Planning Board voted 6-0 last week to recommend approval of the proposed amendment which now will be forwarded to the city council for action.

The planners have been working for more than two months to come up with an amendment to govern the terms under which manufactured homes are permitted in conventional subdivisions.

The need to adopt special regulations was set off by the Michigan Supreme Court which ruled last year that units of government cannot prohibit manufactured homes from being placed in single-family residential zoning districts.

Novi's City Council joined numerous other cities in adopting a moratorium on building permits for manufactured homes shortly after the ruling took effect in order to gain time to draft rules and regulations governing the placement of the homes.

One of the key elements in the

Supreme Court's ruling was to recognize that manufactured homes are significantly different from conventional, site-built homes. As a result, the ruling empowered local units of government to adopt standards that will ensure compatibility between the two types of dwellings.

The ordinance recommended for approval by the planners last week stipulates that a manufactured dwelling unit must "be in harmony with surrounding dwellings in the surrounding area."

"Surrounding area" is defined as within 1,000 feet in all directions in the R-1 and R1-F (one acre lots) zoning districts and within 350 feet in the R-2 through R-4 zoning districts.

The proposed ordinance also requires the applicant to provide "photographic pictures" of all dwelling units within the surrounding area at the time a public hearing is held.

The purpose of the hearing is, in essence, to determine whether the proposed manufactured home is in harmony with existing dwelling units in the area.

In an apparent attempt to make the size of the manufactured home comparable to the size of site-built

residences, the planners have added language which requires them to be at least 29 feet in width exclusive of garages, porches and attached living areas.

Planner Roger Everett led the move to establish a minimum width of 24 feet. "I don't want them to be placed side-by-side on a lot," Everett explained.

Other planning board members speculated that the city may be besieged with requests for building permits for the manufactured homes after the ordinance has been adopted and placed on the books.

Planner Joseph Brett noted that manufactured units could be compatible with existing units if they are placed in undeveloped sections of the city.

"If mobile homes are the housing of the future, I could see a developer coming in and establishing a whole subdivision of this type of residence," he said.

"They would only have to be compatible with themselves if there is nothing else in the surrounding area."

Planner William Briggs added that he could foresee requests for "sort of spread-out trailer parks."

Library personnel chalk up more state, national honors

For a relatively small facility, the Novi Public Library is reaping more than its share of state and national honors for excellence.

Library Administrator Dianne Bush has reported two more honors reaped by members of the library staff in recent months—Children's Librarian Jane Brown has been named recipient of the prestigious Evens' Hennis Scholarship Award and James Evenus, a member of the library board, has received the top award in the state from the Michigan Library Association.

"We're very proud of our people and the honors they have achieved," Bush said. "I've always felt the Novi Library was fortunate to have such outstanding people, and these awards just underscore the point."

Brown, a Novi Library employee since 1978, was selected from a nationwide field of applicants to receive the Caroline Hennis Scholarship Award. Founded in 1926 by the Hartford (Connecticut) Public Library in honor of one of the great pioneers in American librarianship, the scholarship is awarded annually to an individual who specializes in library work with young children.

Brown started with the Novi Library as a volunteer who handled the story hour program when her own daughters were young. She became a member of the staff in 1978 and currently is in charge of all children's programming.

She will use the \$1,400 scholarship to continue her studies toward a master's degree from the University of Michigan's School of Library Science.

Evens received the Michigan Library Association's Walter H. Kaiser Memorial Award for his work as chief of the Duffield Branch of the Detroit Public Library System.

The award is given for innovation and excellence in library science in honor of Walter H. Kaiser, director of the Wayne Oakland Library Federation from 1945-71.

Evens' help rebounded the Duffield Branch from a struggling operation slated for closing into one of the top libraries in the City of Detroit.

The program was so successful that it is referred to as "Miracle on West Grand Boulevard" in library circles.

In 1975, the Duffield Branch fell to what appeared to be rock bottom. Book circulation was at an all-time low, operational costs were astronomical and there was a general feeling that the Duffield area was a non-reading community that would not use a library.

A study by Duffield staffers revealed that 80 percent of the children in their service area had never checked out a book from a public library.

Under Evens' leadership, the Duffield Branch stands today as one of the top libraries in Detroit.

Is annexation moratorium dead?

Where is the proposed annexation of Oakland County?

According to one county official — it's dead. And the county is attempting to resurrect it.

If you ask the state the same question, the response is not much different. "The moratorium question is done," James Hyde, executive secretary of the state boundary commission, told The News last week.

"It was my understanding that the moratorium question was completed with the action the (house policy) committee took (November 10)," Hyde added.

Oakland County Director of Federal-State Aid Russell Martin said yesterday that by approving a resolution following the house committee's denial, the county board of commissioners were hoping to revive what currently stands as a dead moratorium.

"It's actually dead," Martin said in classifying the status of the proposed moratorium. "We are trying to resurrect it."

The commissioners' unanimous resolution in support of such a moratorium has been addressed to the boundary commission and legislators, Martin confirmed. But no lobbyist pressure has yet been applied, or will likely be pushed for by the state lawmakers currently wrestling with the workman's compensation issue.

"I haven't contacted anybody directly on this (lobbying)," Martin said. "Frankly, I have the feeling it's going to be pretty hard to resurrect," he added, noting the growing time frame.

Chairman of the house policy committee, State Representative Joseph Forbes of Oak Park, suggested November 10 that the boundary commission can enact such restrictions upon itself (i.e. a moratorium) with legislative intervention — and should consider such action.

The temporary move was taken to avert a strike movement that could have been called in response to the expiration of the previous pact.

Lewis said no strike is currently planned following failure of ratification. The past contract was a three-year agreement signed in May 1979. The pact was retroactive to July 1, 1978 and allowed for a 10 percent raise during that first year and 7 percent increases in both the second and third years of the agreement.

Walled Lake DPW rejects union pact

Walled Lake Department of Public Works employees denied ratification of a tentative agreement that had been reached between city and union officials, both sides confirmed last week.

Cliff Lewis, the DPW union steward, said the proposed contract was voted down because the city "was trying to take too much work away from us."

Lewis added that the pact would have called for more contracting out of services than DPW could agree with.

The union steward added that Walled Lake also has suggested in the contract that employees submit to physical and mental examinations at the city's request.

"We're going to try and re-open negotiations with the city," Lewis told The News yesterday.

One of two bargaining units of AFSCME 25 (American Federation of State, County and Municipal Employees), the DPW group agreed June 18 to extend its contract for an unlimited period.

The temporary move was taken to avert a strike movement that could have been called in response to the expiration of the previous pact.

Lewis said no strike is currently planned following failure of ratification. The past contract was a three-year agreement signed in May 1979. PTA reports 'good'

Parents of students in the Walled Lake Schools are indeed involved and interested in their children's academic progress, according to Sandra Brian, the district's public relations coordinator.

Brian said the statement was based on parents' attendance at the parent-teacher conferences held November 19 at both Walled Lake Western and Central high schools.

Some 1,040 parents of the 1,795 Western students picked up report cards at the conferences (58 percent), and 750 parents of the 1,398 Central students picked up report cards (54 percent).

Parents also had an opportunity for five-minute sessions with each of their children's teachers.

Richard Smith, principal at Walled Lake Western, reported that attendance was up over last year which was the first year of the program.

"This is the most valuable organized contact we have with parents," said Smith. "As a result, parents have become more involved with problems of attendance and homework assignments. We now hear parents asking what they can do to help."

Forms which permitted parents to evaluate the new system of parent-teacher conferences were available at each school and the results from both schools were overwhelming reactions of "excellent" and "good," according to Brian.

Reading specialist Ethna Reid assisted Novi Woods teachers last week

Reading expert's program brought to Novi students

by KAREN RICE

It's time people found out about what's going on at Novi Woods Elementary School.

The teachers are excited about it. School administrators are excited about it. And the best part is, the kids are excited about it.

Amazingly enough, they're all excited about some things many people think are boring: Reading, writing and spelling. Cause for all the excitement stems from a program developed by Dr. Ethna Reid, a nationally-known reading expert who was in town last week to talk to area parents, work with Novi Woods teachers and check on how well her program is being implemented at Novi Woods, the apparent proving ground in the school district.

Reid's program was introduced to the Novi school system last spring when school board members decided to test it in one of the district's three elementary schools. Teachers at Novi Woods spent a week learning Reid's philosophies and methods before classes started in September. They were trained by Reid herself, who decided to personally help more quickly under Reid's system than using traditional methods.

School principal Roy Williams is as excited about the program as his teachers. He attended classes with the teachers to learn more about Reid's program and will participate in another week-long seminar, along with Novi but they are a beautiful group of teachers. They're great."

The sentiment runs both ways in a school that is so turned on to this new method of teaching that instructors can hardly believe it. After only three months of classtime, a number of Novi Woods teachers are convinced that their students have advanced much more quickly under Reid's system than using traditional methods.

Reid's reaction to the job Novi Woods teachers are doing teaching language arts with her program is a verbal pat on the back. In a word, "Wonderful."

"This school is working together terrifically," Reid notes. "This is a most unique staff. I really don't know why,

Woods' special reading instructor Ann Diebold.

Reid — and a host of Novi school administrators and building principals — observed Novi Woods teachers in action last week. She criticized their work and pointed out areas where they needed to improve. The teachers were not defensive in the least of their shortcomings, Reid remarked. Instead, they eagerly sought new ways of improving their techniques, she added.

For the teachers, having Reid back for conferences was like a homecoming. One teacher told Reid that after a few months of working with the program, she valued the reading expert's comments more than ever since she understood their meaning better than she had when teachers were trained last summer.

Reid's method focuses on individualized instruction techniques and positive reinforcement. She refers to it as "mastery learning," which means students move ahead in their lessons only after they demonstrate that they

classrooms, Anibal works with Lynn Secord and Mary Dawn Withers. Secord teaches the most advanced group of second grade readers. Withers the slowest. Anibal works with the intermediate readers, who can already read and understand such words as construction. Most of Secord's second graders have already mastered the spelling of astrophysicist.

In contrast, Withers' students are working on vocabulary words like butterfly. "I remember yellow was one of the vocabulary words when I was in second grade," Withers says. "And now Lynn's students are spelling astrophysicist!"

While Novi Woods teachers are happy to talk about the program, administrators are keeping a low profile on the program until spelling, writing and reading improvements can actually be determined.

But Ethna Reid is confident Novi's school administrators will be satisfied with her program.

"To go into a mastery program, you have to be committed to making it work," Reid says.

maintenance, electricity and material expenses of operating the system."

The city manager added last Tuesday that the budgeted electricity costs for operating the system had included "built in reasonable increases." But just six months into the 1980-81 fiscal year budget, Walled Lake had already accumulated a bill closer to a nine-month figure.

"This means we will probably go in the red in regards to electricity," Dorman said.

Council Member Walter Lewandowski questioned Dorman as to whether or not the city manager anticipated any increases in the water rates over "the next couple of years."

Dorman responded, "Hopefully, Mr. Lewandowski, we will not have to return to council for two years... maybe longer."

Another council member, Linda Ackley, informed Dorman that the comparison between Walled Lake and other municipalities' water rates "puts it in better perspective. It makes it easier to swallow the increase."

Dorman's report confirmed that the new figures were "a result of sharpening our pencils."

Police warn Novi parents

Novi police are seeking information about a man who has been approaching young girls and is accused of exposing himself to one of them.

Police have received at least two reports in recent weeks of a man in a black Camaro who has stopped teenage girls seeking directions to various places in Novi. The man has been seen primarily in various sections of an area from Grand River south to Eight Mile and Novi Road east to Haggerty Road.

The man is suspected of indecently exposing himself to one of the girls he has approached. Police reported that a young girl and her sister were stopped by a man in a black car when they got off a school bus at Pleasant Run on December 1.

He asked the girls for directions to Applegate Condominiums. When one of the girls gave him directions the man appeared confused and asked her to show him the location of the condominiums on a map.

When the girl approached the car and looked at the map the man began fondling his exposed penis. The girl then ran from the car.

Police believe the same man also has approached girls in the Village Oaks parking lot and at Novi Middle School South.

The man is described as a white male, 35-40 years of age. He is believed to have short, dark hair which is balding, police reported.

Police said that although the man has approached a number of young girls there has been only one reported case of indecent exposure.

Parents have reported the man has sought directions from teenage girls, telling them he was new to the area. The incidents have repeatedly occurred between 4 p.m. and 6 p.m.

Anyone with information regarding the man should contact Novi Police at 348-7100.

Rush then contacted the parents of the three boys and explained the situation to them. One of the boy's parents filed charges three weeks later and another boy's parents decided to press charges after they were contacted by Wixom police about the incident.

Wixom police received two other complaints about Reeves' disciplinary actions last year. One parent told Wixom police in February that her child had been slapped by Reeves. According to police, Reeves received a two-day suspension in March as a result of the incident.

In June, Wixom police received a copy of Herbert's letter detailing a series of incidents her son had allegedly witnessed at the school. According to her son, Herbert said, Reeves had allegedly hit several students and kicked one.

In her letter, Herbert stated, "I want this matter looked into before a student is seriously hurt. I want to go on record now so that in the future if a student is seriously hurt by Mr. Reeves, nobody will be able to say, 'I'm so surprised (sic) I wasn't even aware there was a problem.'"

Herbert also arranged a conference with Reeves and Moody to discuss the problems before she sent the letter to school officials and Wixom police.

Roseborough said Tuesday that Reeves will remain on suspension pending the outcome of an investigation by school officials. Roseborough refused to discuss specifics, but said the investigation would involve the "total perspective" of Reeves' performance.

Sheldon said Tuesday that Reeves was reinstated after the November 3-4 suspension, but was subsequently given a further suspension after allegations of another incident. Sheldon did not reveal details of the most recent alleged incident.

Reeves has been a teacher in the Walled Lake District for the past 26 years, Roseborough said. This is his first year as a teacher at Loon Lake Elementary.

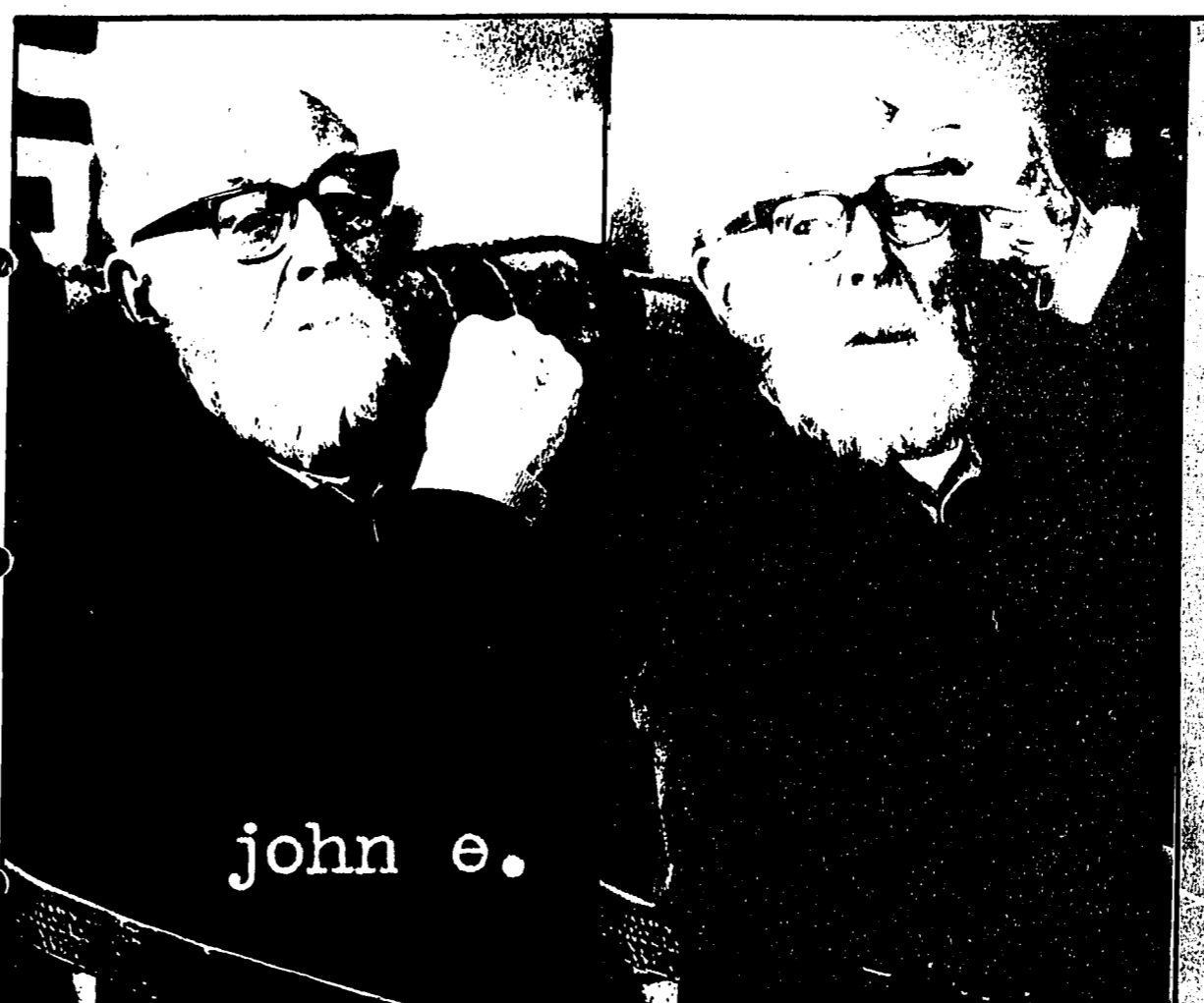

(EDITOR'S NOTE: When John E. Davis spoke to students at Walled Lake's Central and Western high schools, he prepared Davis wrote this story for them recalling a particularly poignant memory from his experiences in Europe as an ambulance driver during World War I. We think it's proof that old reporters never lose their touch.)

As high school students, I suppose you know that President Woodrow Wilson and both houses of the United States Congress declared war on the German Empire and Kaiser Wilhelm 11 in April of 1917. This was the First World War, known as "the war to end all wars." It took place because the German navy persisted in sinking American merchant ships in the Atlantic Ocean despite Yankee complaints.

When the declaration of war took place, I was on the staff of the Chicago Tribune, writing feature articles for the Sunday magazine of that paper. Within the hour I went to the local military headquarters and enlisted in the Army — along with uncounted thousands of young men, eager for action.

We drilled and trained for the next 12 months or more. Then one sunny morning, about a thousand or more got off a Dutch merchant ship at the docks in Liverpool, England, as U.S. Base Hospital Ten of Chicago, Illinois, where we paraded (doctors, nurses and buck privates) for two hours as the Liverpooleers whooped and English girls kissed us all.

About two weeks later, this Base Hospital One was established in a large park near the city of Nantes, France, operating as a section of the medical department of General John J. Pershing's Argonne invasion army of some 400,000 Yankee soldiers, mostly midwesterners.

We were not fighters, so we didn't carry weapons — just medical equipment of every kind. This writer was appointed sergeant first class and was put in charge of the ambulance drivers, with five assistants to help carry the wounded to the ambulances and then to hospitals for treatment.
