

State rejects foster care license request

A request for the licensing of an adult foster care home at the corner of Meadowbrook and Llewellyn has been denied by the Michigan Department of Social Services, but the administrators of the proposed home are appealing the decision.

The license was denied on the grounds the home would violate state laws regarding licensing of adult foster care homes, according to Genevieve Lopez of the State Department of Social Services.

Specifically, the home would violate regulations providing an adult foster care facility cannot be licensed when there is another similarly licensed existing facility within 1,500 feet—Section 5 of Public Act 218, Lopez said.

License applications have been filed for two homes located within 1,500 feet of each other.


The first application is for a "group home" where it is proposed six emotionally disturbed and developmentally

disabled adults currently residing in Clinton Valley will be housed. The group home is proposed at 41386 Llewellyn.

An adult foster care license application also has been filed for a home at 41386 Eight Mile where a mentally retarded man is being cared for. The home would be what is known as a "family home."

The appeal of the licensing decision means an administrative law judge appointed by the state administrative hearings bureau will hear the case. He will recommend whether or not the social services department followed proper procedures in denying the license. That recommendation will be forwarded to the office of the head of the state department of social services where a decision to concur or overturn the recommendation will be made.

The hearing proceeded as a result of action taken by Humanistic Services for the Developmentally Disabled, a non-profit corporation seeking licens-

ing of the home.

John Quarton, a co-director of the proposed home on Llewellyn, said the group's attorney is putting together a

case to be presented in the administrative review.

"We question the interpretation of the Michigan law that the Department of

Social Services used in denying our application. We believe they have an interpretation of the statute that is at odds with the letter of the law," Quarton said.

"As we read it, the letter of the law is 'a similarly licensed existing facility.' The second facility was never licensed, and we applied first. We're questioning the grounds on which our licensing was denied," Quarton said.

"We're questioning the legality of the denial. We hope they'll find we're on the right side of the law," he added. "We've got to have hope. If it boils down to we can't open the house at that address, we'll try again somewhere else."

Quarton said the city also has been notified that the co-directors object to the licensing of the family home on Eight Mile because a license application for the group home had previously been filed.

Roderick Krupka of the Clinton Valley community placement program further explained the matter is under appeal because "the city decided to

lend their approval to a home for one individual on Eight Mile, the Department of Social Services decided to go according to forms filed by the city and the license application was denied."

State law provides there must be at least a minimum of 1,500 feet between licensed adult foster care facilities, unless the local municipality should decide to allow the establishment of one another.

The city council refused to allow the licensing of two adult foster care homes closer than 1,500 feet of one another and recommended to the state that the "family home" be granted a license.

Krupka went on to say: "They objected that the license applications were taken out of order and one was given preferential treatment. As they read the law a license can only be denied if there is a similar licensed facility within 1,500 feet and there was not a similarly licensed facility. Consequently, the license can't be denied. We feel that once they get a hearing the denial will be thrown out."

Apartment fire could be arson

Fire officials are investigating suspected arson in connection with a New Year's Eve blaze at the apartment complex under construction behind the A&P plaza on Ten Mile.

Preliminary estimates show the fire caused approximately \$70,000 worth of damage to the apartment building which went up in flames, according to Novi Fire Chief Arthur Lenaghan.

Working with Oakland County Sheriff Department arson investigators on New Year's Day, fire officials dug through the rubble, created when the blaze caused the second floor and the roof of the building to collapse, to determine the fire's origin.

Investigators found two areas on the concrete which were "spalled," which Lenaghan said would appear to indicate "an accelerator" or a flammable liquid such as gasoline or alcohol may have been used.

After all other possible causes of the blaze were eliminated the case was listed as a suspected arson, according to preliminary findings reported by Lenaghan.

"We assume at this point the fire was perpetrated by an unknown individual since there is no indication the construction crew left it," Lenaghan said.

The case remains under investigation and there are no suspects at this time, Lenaghan said.

Lenaghan said the fire department received the call that the apartment was burning at 4:25 p.m. and extinguished the fire within 40 minutes.

Fire fighters contained the blaze to eight of the 16 units in the building at 41650 Manor Park Drive, but the eight units involved were destroyed, Lenaghan said. Aluminum windows inside the building also were destroyed, he reported. There was no fire damage to the second half of the building, he added.

When the fire department arrived on the scene there was smoke and visible flame. The fire had already spread to a portion of the roof of the two-story building, the fire chief said.

"It had gotten good headway before we were called," Lenaghan reported.

Lenaghan said the blaze spread rapidly because the dry wall had not been installed and all the wood studs were exposed.

Reportedly the construction company had just moved in to complete construction of the building which burned Thursday.

The building had been closed in. The heat was turned on and the electric and gas were connected. The building is part of a 10 building project which eventually was to have 128 units.

Lenaghan further noted the estimated damage figure was obtained from the development corporation Beneiche and Krue which has taken over the project.

The apartments have been under construction, off and on, since 1977.

The development was initially owned by Charles K. Barton. Barton filed for bankruptcy in July 1980 and construction was halted and the buildings were left open to vandals and the elements for some time.

In the past the city also has cited the development for litter, erosion, dirt in the street, noxious weeds and six alleged incidents of moving residents in before obtaining certificates of occupancy.

The troubled construction project was taken into receivership by Michigan National Bank earlier this year. A construction company was subsequently brought in to complete the buildings.

Pump station fails, water pressure off

Problems somewhere down the Detroit water line caused southern Novi residents to experience low water pressure and related problems Monday morning and late last week, according to Novi city officials.

Pressure problems occurred Sunday morning for approximately one hour and again Monday morning, city officials said.

"More problems may have occurred, we've been getting a lot of complaints," City Manager Edward Kriewall said.

Kriewall explained Detroit experienced "switching failures and a power failure" which resulted in water problems in Novi. "The problems people are experiencing are not in the local system," Kriewall said. "Detroit admitted it was a pumping station failure."

He went on to say the city is investigating the situation and intends to pursue the matter.

"We've had problems before, but not with the frequency we've experienced in the past week or so," Kriewall said.

Kriewall reported the city may use the water pressure problems as ammunition when it challenges proposed water rate hikes recently passed down from Detroit. Detroit has notified the city that water rates are to increase 82

percent in July.

"We're supposed to be getting maximum water pressure, we pay a premium for that. The past week demonstrates there have been failures," Kriewall said.

Department of Public Works Superintendent Edward Sniadak said residents experienced the most problems Sunday when a switch became stuck at the Detroit Water pumping station at Newburg and Eight Mile.

On Monday an electrical power line was down, causing the pumping station to malfunction for the second day in a row, Sniadak said.

Residents usually call the police when water problems occur while city hall is closed. But city officials recommend calling the Detroit Systems Control at 961-6132 instead.

Sniadak explained residents should be aware that when such problems occur "there's nothing the city can do to physically repair this."

Previous water pressure problems have been encountered when the pumping station switches from one pump to another. "Sometimes the second pump doesn't function right away," Sniadak said. However, he added the occurrence of such problems seems to have become more frequent.

Suspects face trial for taking blouses

A man and two women, all of Detroit, have been arraigned in connection with the theft of approximately \$400 worth of blouses from Hudson's at the Twelve Oaks Mall. Two of the suspects also face charges of carrying concealed weapons, according to Novi police.

Police said a 25-caliber automatic gun and a knife with a six-inch blade were found on two of the suspects after a scuffle broke out while they were being placed under arrest.

The three suspects were first observed by Hudson's security personnel as they were looking at blouses. The two women reportedly took a number of blouses into a fitting room where one of the female suspects began passing them to the other.

Reports indicate that the women stuffed the blouses in their underclothing, then dressed and left the fitting room where they met the male suspect. The three then walked to the door and attempted to leave without paying for the merchandise, according to reports.

The three suspects were apprehended by Hudson's security officers who were alerted by mall security and Novi police.

Police said one of the women began to "yell and scream" while officers moved in to make the arrest. The police officer, believing the woman was about to flee, turned and grabbed her, according to reports.

Meanwhile, the male suspect reached into his back pocket and pulled out a gun as he was being handcuffed by Novi police officer, according to reports. When a security officer yelled "he's got a gun," the suspect threw the weapon in the air and it landed under a car in the parking lot.

Police also reportedly found a knife with a six-inch blade while searching the purse of one of the female suspects.

Police allegedly recovered eight blouses worth a total of \$400 from the three suspects.

All three suspects — Paul G. Cook, Andrea L. Newsome and Ronda A. Thomas — were arraigned before 52nd District Court Judge Harold Bulgarelli.

Cook was charged with one count of carrying a concealed weapon, a felony charge with a maximum penalty of five years in prison or a \$2,500 fine; larceny in a building, a felony with a maximum penalty of four years or \$2,000; and carrying a firearm in the commission of a felony.

Newsome was charged with one count of carrying a concealed weapon, which is also a felony charge, and one count of larceny in a building, a felony charge of four years in prison or \$2,000. Bond for Newsome was set at \$5,000 and bond for Thomas was placed at \$2,500.

County Republicans seek Murphy replacement

Lyon Township Trustee Sue Knapp and John P. Calandro of Northville are the leading candidates for appointment to the 24th District seat on the Oakland County Board of Commissioners, according to County Commissioner Dennis L. Murphy (R-Novi).

Murphy announced in December that he will resign the 24th District post he has held since March 1976. He said Monday that his resignation will be presented at the January 21 commissioners' meeting and become effective January 31.

Murphy cited time constraints from both his personal and professional life as the reasons for his resignation.

"I like to think I've done a good job of representing the district over the past six years," Murphy said Monday. "But the time demands on both my professional and personal life have accelerated to the point that I did not feel I could spend the proper amount of time to do the job justice."

Murphy, a vice president of the Bank of the Commonwealth, also said he does not intend to seek elective office again.

Murphy said the vacancy from the 24th district will be filled by appointment by the board of commissioners.

"I expect my recommendation will be accepted and that individual will be appointed to the vacancy at the January 21 commissioners' meeting," he said.

Knapp, 40, is a New Hudson resident who has been active in Lyon Township politics for the past five years. She was elected to the township board in 1978, resigned that post and then was elected supervisor in 1978. She did not seek re-election to the supervisor's post in 1980 and was elected instead to another term as a trustee.

Calandro, who lives in the Oakland County portion of Northville, has been involved in Republican politics for the past six years, although he has not held elective office previously.

He is division manager of industrial relations for the No-Sag Spring division of Lear Siegler, Inc. Calandro, 35, has been a member of the Oakland County Executive Committee since 1978 and is a member of both the Novi and Northville Republican clubs.

He was an alternate delegate to the Republican National Convention in 1980 and served on the Oakland County Reagan-Bush Committee after the selection of the Republican presidential ticket.

Murphy is stepping down from the county commission after six years of service. Following the resignation of former commissioner Lew Coy of Wixom in 1975, he defeated Suelien Haas for the post in a special election in March of 1976. He then won election to a two-year term in November 1976, again defeating Haas, and subsequently was elected to a two-year term in March of 1978.

He defeated former Commissioner Lew Coy of Wixom in the 1978 election and William Brinker of Novi in the 1980 race.

Township okays library pact

An agreement for library service during 1982 has been reached between Commerce Township and three area libraries.

According to Commerce Supervisor Robert Long, pacts for service have been arranged with Walled Lake, West Bloomfield Township and Milford Village libraries. Although library representatives have not yet signed the contracts, they have been okayed by the township board.

Service is already in effect for 1982, Long said.

The majority of Commerce library patrons use the Walled Lake facility, the one library which has come under fire at township board meetings during November and December. Township resident Rusty Rosman told trustees at those meetings she felt Commerce was not getting its money's worth from the services Walled Lake was providing and requested board members consider dropping funding from the Walled Lake Library to invest in a future township library.

Trustees were reluctant to suspend the contract with Walled Lake but agreed to seek more services and programs from library staffers. According to Long, the Walled Lake Library has agreed to attempt to provide more services; however, that agreement is not part of the contract reached between Walled Lake and Commerce.

Commerce Township levies 3 mills for library services. During 1982, 27 percent of the \$88,800 raised will go to the Walled Lake Library, 20 percent to West Bloomfield and 19 percent to Milford.

A committee has been set up by Commerce trustees to consider whether the township should pursue establishing its own library. Among others, Rosman was named to the committee by trustees.

"Walled Lake is going to work to provide programs at Richardson Center where there is more room," Long said. "They are going to try to come up with something that will be very satisfactory to the township. We had a very, very good meeting."

Among the projects to be offered by Walled Lake, Long said, could be a quarterly calendar of events to be sent out to residents.

Cable bids offer more than rates

Professional consultants hired to evaluate three cable companies seeking a franchise to serve Novi, Farmington and Farmington Hills repeatedly stress the need to look at areas other than cost in deciding which offer is best in the long run.

The cost angle is already the subject of debate following a preliminary report by CTC Associates cable consultants which rates the proposals of Metrovision and United-Nederlander "better buys" than Omnicom's offer.

Omnicom is ranked last in a number of other key areas in the preliminary report by the cable consultant firm of Arlington, Virginia.

Rating firms on the basis of their initial responses to questions posed by CTC, Omnicom was rated behind both Metrovision and United-Nederlander in four areas: network coverage (the number of homes to be wired for cable reception), channel capacity, auxiliary services (such as home security monitoring) and satellite television access.

Omnicom was rated highest in a comparison of each firm's rate of return on their investment.

The company also got the highest marks for service reliability and the number of channels set aside immediately for institutional use such as local libraries and hospitals.

Omnicom's bid commits \$40 million in capital expenditures over the 15-year life of the franchise, a pledge more than \$10 million over the commitments offered by Metrovision or United-Nederlander. A large portion of Omnicom's financial commitment would be spent on "drops" of cable to connect homes and on converters designed to accommodate sophisticated two-way home security devices, said the consultants.

Defending his firm's offer in the face of the consultants' preliminary findings that Omnicom's offer was the worst "buy" of the three proposals, Peter Newell, president of Omnicom of Michigan, points to the \$40 million as an example of the company's long-term commitment to developing and expanding the cable system in the three cities.

However, the cost factor comes up repeatedly in the CTC report and Omnicom comes in third in most ratings.

Looking at satellite-broadcast television offerings, CTC notes that virtually the same satellite shows are available to all three of the applicants.

An area of concern equally as important as cost to residents of sparsely-

Township asks injunction in boundary suit

Commerce Township officials have filed a request for a restraining order against the Michigan State Boundary Commission in Oakland County Circuit Court. In the document, the township asks that the court overturn the boundary commission's decision to allow the annexation of about one square mile of Commerce land to the City of Walled Lake.

Judge John O'Brien signed the petition and ordered a show cause hearing at 9 a.m. today (Wednesday) in the county courthouse. The injunction requires the boundary commission to show why Commerce's petition, which asks for a temporary order staying all proceedings of annexation in Commerce to Walled Lake, should not be granted.

Filed December 30, the injunction charges the boundary commission with making an "arbitrary and capricious ruling" when it approved the annexation of land on the western boundary of Walled Lake to the city. The commission's decision "is not supported by competent, material and substantial evidence based on the whole record," township officials said.

In addition, Commerce contends the

boundary commission acted "in excess of its statutory authority of jurisdiction" because the township meets all requirements for exemption from annexation under Public Act 591, the petition stated.

The petition asks that the court declare the commission's decision unlawful and set it aside.

Commerce Supervisor Robert Long said Monday that while the boundary commission has previously faced charges from townships on other charges, it has never been sued on the grounds stated by Commerce.

According to Long, township officials wanted the court to review the boundary commission's decision to allow the annexation over Commerce's protests — which included a drive in the state legislature to establish a moratorium on annexation decisions in Oakland County.

Though the moratorium failed, the attempt focused attention on the situation in Commerce and throughout the county. A study on the annexation and the incorporation "as a result of annexation decisions against townships in the county is being conducted now by the Michigan Department of Commerce (see related story below).

If the circuit court issues a temporary restraining order against annexation proceedings in Commerce, among the actions to be put on hold are three questions currently slated to appear on a ballot sometime in 1982, probably August.

Two of the referendum questions — one directed at residents within the area affected by the annexation ruling and the other at residents in the balance

of the township — pertain to whether the land in question should remain in Commerce or become part of Walled Lake.

The third question relates to whether Commerce should incorporate as a city, a move township officials say is the only way they can protect Commerce from future annexation proceedings.

Township Supervisor Robert Long said he does not think Commerce

should be forced to go to the expense of holding a referendum election.

If the circuit court denies the township's request, the referendum call for a referendum are determined invalid and the court rejects Commerce's request for an injunction and reversal on the annexation decision, the annexation would go into effect immediately. The deadline for Commerce to file an appeal against the boundary commission's ruling expired December 29.

State examining annex effects

The State's Department of Commerce, at the request of State Senator Douglas Ross, is conducting a study to determine "to what extent are there likely to be defensive incorporations in Oakland County?"

Thomas Martin, an analyst with Michigan's office of community development, said Monday that the research is being done based on the question asked by Ross.

Martin claimed the study will attempt to discover the effects future annexations might have on Oakland County townships.

"We're looking at Oakland County townships from a number of different perspectives — how they spend money, where they get money, land use patterns, and what is the potential that these townships will incorporate into home rule cities to avoid annexation," Martin added.

Ross said, "The purpose for the study is to determine if the concerns of the townships is firmly rooted in reality."

The state senator added that the current study was merely a survey as had been previously suggested in connection with a countywide annexation moratorium. The State Senate approved a halt to landgrabbing for the purpose of a study. But Michigan's House of Representatives killed the concurrent resolution in committee.

Data for the study is being accumulated from several sources, according to Martin. Included in that list are the Local Units Fiscal Report, a questionnaire sent out annually by the Department of Treasury; Oakland County's Planning Division; and townships and cities.

Already Martin has met with townships and is set to meet with the cities sometime today.

"One of the reasons this whole issue

came up is because of the Commerce Township and Walled Lake annexation," Martin said.

But Ross said, "The purpose of all this is not related to any specific annexation question." Rather, he added, it is tied to predicaments townships are facing countywide.

Commerce Township Supervisor Robert Long and Walled Lake City Manager J. Michael Dorman were asked to invite whoever they wanted to the township and city sessions.

J. J. Hill's future and growth are looking up

(EDITOR'S NOTE: Today, we introduce a new addition called 'update' that will appear periodically in The News. Stories featured in 'update' will help our readers to catch up on single subjects that we have previously reported on. Last summer, staff writers Stephen Cvengros and Karen Rice told you about Walled Lake resident Heather Hill and her new son J.J., a blind Indian child she had adopted. In August, she had adopted another child, a blind Indian child, and she and J.J. are now together with Hill again in late December in our first 'update.'

J.J. Hill is getting to about the age when a child likes to play games. For the young Walled Lake resident, his favorite game may become "wait-and-see" as the child and his family must patiently await word on when special medical assistance may be available.

He's had his ups and downs. A cornea

transplant attempt in late August went awry. But the 21-month-old J.J. is still progressing nicely, according to mother Heather Hill.

J.J. has had his hands full since arriving in America last April. Abandoned, blinded at age three months from measles, malnutrition and vitamin deficiencies, and then placed in an Indian orphanage, the little guy was "a living pin cushion when he arrived," according to Heather.

"I'm worn out. He's very active," Heather said.

Efforts have been made over the past months to possibly offer some sight. To

date, they have been minimally successful.

"We did have a cornea transplant at the end of August on his left eye — that was the eye originally one of the doctors said would be removed," J.J.'s mother added.

Things were "going fine" until early November, Heather continued, "then it was rejected."

As a result, doctors reportedly "gave him a window."

"He can see more light," Heather explained, adding that J.J. remains on "stand-by" for tissue to conduct a similar operation on the right eye.

"Within 24 hours, he'll receive a (cornea) transplant. Then, we just cross our fingers and hope it's not rejected."

"Even if the cornea had taken in the left eye, he would have had to have some type of contact lens. He had an extremely thick cataract and the doctor put a hole in it.

"When he first arrived, the left eye had a tremendous bulge and white opaque over it. He had no lights sight. He had some light perception in his right eye. After getting him vitamins, he could see some light.

"If it were a sunny day, and we walked in front of the window, he'd see it. That's great. He didn't have it before.

"God willing, even if it's only one eye of sight, it would be exciting even for him to see shadows."

Despite his handicap, J.J. is growing. "His biggest priority in life is his light, which is just great," Heather said.

Area teen's death investigated by Detroit police

In Commerce

A 16-year-old Walled Lake Western High School junior died Christmas day from head injuries due to penetration of the eye, Jeffrey S. Rathka, of 2402 Pontiac Trail in Commerce Township, died in Henry Ford Hospital following an alleged argument in Detroit December 24.

According to a Detroit Police official, Rathka reportedly got into an argument "with some people he was with and a fight resulted." The alleged disagreement is supposed to have stemmed from over which individual would drive an automobile, police said.

Rathka's eye was reportedly punctured by an unknown object during the alleged incident, police said. The object, which punctured Rathka's eye, is yet to be determined by a medical examiner.

The Commerce Township youth's death "has not yet been ruled a homicide," according to Officer Wayne Roberts with the Detroit Police. The investigation is continuing, and as of Tuesday morning, no one was in custody in connection with the alleged incident.

A 19-year-old Union Lake man was charged with one count of larceny over \$100 and one count of receiving and concealing stolen goods over \$100 following a January 1 incident.

Oakland County Sheriffs reportedly stopped David William Pulley, of 4275 South Commerce, on Bluebird while he was driving a snowmobile on New Year's Day. Subsequent investigation resulted in the public safety officials discovering that the 1981 Yamaha snowmobile had been allegedly stolen from Lake Sherwood on December 26.

Pulley was arraigned Monday in the 52nd District Court, second division.

Gene Francis, 41, of Wixom was found guilty of assault and battery and placed on probation for one year by 52nd District Court Judge Martin Boyle, according to Wixom police.

Francis was charged in December with assaulting his wife, who told officers her husband had punched her in the mouth, police said. She was bleeding at the mouth, according to reports.

Two Wixom police sergeants and two officers searched the couple's apartment for marijuana, other controlled substances and paraphernalia after receiving information that the couple was involved in marijuana distribution. Police did not place a dollar value on the amount of drugs confiscated from the apartment, but said the search turned up a relatively small amount of marijuana. No other illegal drugs were found, officers said.

Samples of drugs from five plastic bags were sent to the Michigan State Police crime lab in Northville for tests, police said.

Residents in the 2000 block of Parkridge were awakened December 24 by two men climbing in their bedroom window.

The owner of the home reported his wife awakened him when she heard someone opening the window. The suspects were trying to enter the room when the man yelled at them to "get out," according to reports.

The suspects reportedly fled through the back yard.

The suspects were described as two large, white males wearing ski masks, jackets and gloves.

The couple reported window screens sustained \$20 damage in connection with the incident.

Two men reported they were attacked after they left a New Year's Eve Party by two other men who had been in attendance at the same party.

One man reported he had left the party to give a second man a ride home and they were followed by two others. The two men were then flagged down by the men who had followed them from the party. When they got out of the vehicle the windshield of his Saturn pickup was broken out. The attackers also reportedly proceeded to hit and kick the men.

The amount of damage to the truck was not given. The victims also indicated they wish to press assault and battery charges.

torney Phil Adkinson, West Bloomfield Township planner Frank Reynolds, and Phil Dondoro and Greg Gibbons from the county's planning division were present at the township meeting. Michigan Township Association officials were also present.

Dorman said Martin would be in Walled Lake today to meet with himself and any other council members interested in attending. The Walled Lake manager added that he would ask Martin to talk with Farmington Township officials also.

The survey is scheduled to be completed by Friday, but the late meetings with city representatives may set that back, according to Dorman.

"The state of Michigan is paying for it—it's out of our budget," Martin confirmed, adding, "The total cost is not going to be that significant."

He continued that the price tag for the survey would exceed \$50,000.

Despite the cost for a study on solely Oakland County being absorbed by state-wide taxpayers' funds, Martin said the logic of the survey would probably not justify the cost of the study, especially if the state's effects throughout Michigan.

"We might look at some patterns," the state analyst said. "This study certainly won't apply statewide."

"The feasibility of doing a study is always an issue," Martin continued. "You either answer the specific question that was asked or expand on it. In this case, we decided not to expand."

Upon completion, the survey will be sent to Director of Community Development Carol Hoffman, Lieutenant Governor James Bricker and Ross. Bricker will receive a copy because of his involvement in an Oakland County meeting with township officials last fall.

Martin declined to spell out what precisely would be done with the study following its completion.

But Ross said late yesterday that any ensuing action would be dependent upon the results of the study.

Bushnell services shift to Northville

Northville Historical Society has agreed to open the New School Church in Mill Race Village for regular Sunday worship services.

Beginning this Sunday, Bushnell Congregational Church will hold its regular services in the New School Church in hopes of "tightening the knot between the church and the Northville community," according to Bushnell pastor Dr. Robin Meyers.

While special services have been conducted in the New School Church including a bicentennial program, this is the first time that arrangements have been made to hold regular services in the building that has been restored to its original use. The building was used only briefly as a church in a Presbyterian split, 1845-49.

For most of its history, it served as the Northville library, being moved to the Mill Race Historical Village for preservation when the MAGS building was constructed in downtown Northville.

Bushnell Congregational, which has been meeting since last June at Village Oaks Elementary School in Novi, will hold its first service in New School Church at 9 a.m. this Sunday. Sunday School will be held concurrently in the Wasko Oak Schoolhouse.

Detroit Symphony Orchestra organist Ray Ferguson and Bushnell's 25-member Chancel Choir will be featured at this Sunday's service which is open to all residents of the community.

Last year the historical, one of Detroit's largest and most prominent churches, purchased a 14-acre parcel on Meadowbrook Road between Eight and Nine Mile in Novi with plans to construct a new church.

The dwindling membership in the Detroit church prompted the move to the suburbs, according to the Reverend Meyers.

Construction of the new church has been stalled, however, due to the inability to sell the Detroit church located at Southfield Road and Grand River.

Until construction of the new church gets underway, Bushnell will hold its services in the New School Church.

Meyers, a resident of the historic Bealton, said he hopes the move to Mill Race Village will help strengthen the ties between Bushnell and the community and extended an invitation to all residents to attend this Sunday's service.

Woman arrested for shop lifting

A 35-year-old Highland Park woman has been charged in connection with the theft of approximately \$1,600 worth of clothing from Lord & Taylor's department store at Twelve Oaks Mall.

Linda D. Flowers was arrested before Judge Michael Batchik Thursday on charges of larceny in a building, a felony carrying a maximum penalty of four years in prison or a \$2,000 fine.

Police said the woman was taken into custody after she was seen taking dresses from a clothing rack in Lord & Taylor's by security personnel.

A security employee told police she saw the woman run out of the store with the dresses allegedly taken from the rack. The security employee said she followed the woman into the parking lot before losing sight of her.

Flowers was observed re-entering the store approximately seven minutes later and taking more dresses off the rack, according to police reports. The security employee said Flowers appeared to have seen security watching her, threw the dresses on the floor and left the store.

The woman was next seen entering the mall and talking with two men. She was subsequently taken into custody. Police later located the vehicle Flowers was driving in the parking lot and obtained a search warrant and a set of keys for the vehicle.

Upon searching the car, police reportedly found seven dresses and one woman's suit from Lord & Taylor's. Police also said they found two loaded revolvers — a 44 special caliber and a 32 caliber — concealed in the arm rests of the front doors.

Police reported that investigation showed the Flowers has a history of prior arrests and has used approximately 26 aliases in the past. At her arraignment a \$5,000 cash bond was set. Examination has been scheduled for January 8.

Novi candidates would serve well

The decision of Oakland County Commissioner Dennis Murphy (R-Novi) to resign his position effective January 31 places the responsibility of naming a replacement squarely in the hands of county Republicans.

Since the next election for county commission will be held in November, the county board of commissioners is empowered to appoint an individual to fill Murphy's seat until the general election rolls around.

And, since the Republicans hold an 18-9 majority on the board, they undoubtedly will select a Republican to fill the vacancy.

Their thinking is clear. The individual who is appointed will carry the mantle of incumbent into the November election and thus have an advantage over any Democratic candidate for the post.

Being an incumbent and a Republican in the county's 24th district, which includes Novi, Lyon Township and South Lyon under the new apportionment plan, will be a difficult challenge for a Democratic candidate to overcome.

At the present time, just two individuals have indicated an interest in the appointment — Sue Knapp, a member of the Lyon Township Board, and John Callandro, a resident in the Northville section of Oakland County who has been active in party politics for the past five years.

We know Sue Knapp to be qualified and conscientious. We are not familiar with Callandro, although his credentials appear in order except for the fact he has not held public office previously.

From a purely partisan viewpoint, it must be distressing to

county Republicans that they have not located a suitable replacement for Murphy from within the City of Novi. A resident of the city which contains the largest number of voters within the newly-reapportioned 24th District would better serve the Republican interest of maintaining their control of the county commission.

From the City of Novi's perspective, it would be advantageous to be represented on the commission by an individual who is knowledgeable about city problems and concerns.

We suspect that one of the problems confronting Republicans in finding an appropriate replacement for Murphy among Novi residents is that partisan politics are of minor concern to those most involved in municipal government. We've always felt that was a major advantage. Individuals run for office in Novi because they're interested in the city as opposed to maintaining the interests of one political party over another.

Apart from the problem of locating a qualified successor to Murphy who has clearly established party ties, Novi has several individuals who would serve well on the county commission.

John Roethel, who does have strong ties with the Republican party, is one of those individuals. Martha Hoyer, who ran unsuccessfully for the commission as a Republican in 1980, is another.

Obviously, we're looking at the impending appointment very provisionally. Nevertheless, we feel it would be advantageous to Novi, the largest municipality in the newly-defined 24th district, for county Republicans to fill Murphy's position with another Novi resident.

John Chambers, a member of the Novi City Council and himself a Certified Public Accountant, refers to people in his profession as "bean counters." It is Chambers' contention that bean counters are not particularly popular because they deal with the often-tedious, detailed and highly technical matters of finances and budget preparation.





American auto industry ready to battle the imports

By PHILIP JEROME

is America's love affair with the automobile a thing of the past? Not by a long shot, according to Marty Feldman, owner of the new Marty Feldman Chevrolet dealership on Grand River in Novi.

But, says Feldman, the relationship of the extended slump in new car sales. "We allowed the excitement to get away."

"I remember when we used to make a big deal out of the new model lines. You remember, tarps over the cars while they were being delivered on the trucks to the dealerships...blinds over

the windows so nobody could see the new cars until they were officially unveiled.

"I can remember people following the trucks to the dealership or peering through cracks in the blinds on the windows — trying to get a glimpse of the new automobiles.

"But we stopped doing that. We unveiled our new lines without making a big deal about it.

"What we did is raised on our own parade; we took the excitement out of it."

"The only thing new and exciting was being offered by the imports. The domestic auto industry allowed the excitement to slip away from its own automobiles.

"America is still in love with the automobile. The love affair isn't over. We've just got to put the excitement back in the relationship."

Feldman and his new car sales manager, Joe Hood of New Hudson, are convinced the domestic industry has learned its lesson and the excitement will return in 1982.

The key, according to Hood, is getting the message about the new cars out to the public.

There has been so much emphasis on the imports, the state of the economy and high interest rates that people have developed pre-conceived notions about automobiles — pre-conceived notions that can be easily dispelled by taking

the time to visit a dealership and see what's available, says Hood.

"The industry has changed so much in the last three years that people just don't know what's available.

"People are walking around with the feeling that imports are a superior product to domestic automobiles, but it just isn't true any more," he continued.

"The whole domestic industry has been re-tooled over the past three years. All we have to do now is get people in here to see the mileage and quality available on domestic automobiles.

We have mid-sized family cars that will get 40 miles to the gallon.

"For people who like muscle cars, we have cars that look like muscle cars, perform like muscle cars and still get 25 miles to the gallon.

"People have been told the domestic auto industry is depressed for so long that they've stopped coming by the showrooms to see just exactly what's available.

"We have cars right now that don't cost any more than a garden tractor. Our new Chevy Diesel gets 55 miles to the gallon.

"The American auto industry has met the challenge. We've re-tooled and our new cars are every bit as good if not better than the imports. All we've got to do now is get the American public out in the showrooms to look at what's here."

Feldman's new Chevrolet dealership has been open approximately two months. The decision to open a new dealer point at a time when other dealerships across the country were being closed raised more than a few eyebrows, but Feldman still believes it was a wise move.

"We delivered 125 units — new and used — in November, but December has not been a good month for us or any other automobile dealership," reported Feldman.

"But I'm definitely optimistic about the future. We've met a lot of people from as far away as Brighton and Howell who are interested in new cars and I think they're going to move from being shoppers to buyers now that Christmas is over."

"There are a lot of old cars on the road — more cars are being scrapped right now than are being built — and more sense to purchase a new car than try to repair the old one.

"There's a real shortage of quality used cars right now, and people also are finding that dealers are willing to put a lot more money into trade-ins than they were previously. The fact of the matter is that we need good used cars."

"I think the first quarter of '82 will be better than the first quarter last year, and I look for things to start breaking

lose in the spring."

Feldman also believes that interest rates will not be a major problem to point at a time when other dealerships across the country were being closed raised more than a few eyebrows, but Feldman still believes it was a wise move.


"The American public has got to realize it's creating a lot of its own problems," Feldman continues. "They're a little uneasy right now because they don't know what the future holds.

"The longer they stay away, the worse it's going to get. They're creating their own unemployment and economic uncertainty."

"But I feel good about the future," he adds. "I think we're going to start seeing things break loose during the second quarter — not so much out of want, but out of need.

"But once things start returning to normal, it's going to happen fast. I'm definitely optimistic about the domestic auto industry and our new dealership."

"I've got a new and modern facility and a new and modern product line. That's why I built where I did, when I did and how I did. When it breaks loose, there won't be enough new cars to go around."

'Construction industry will be last to recover'

The construction industry will most likely be the last to pull out from under the recession's dark clouds, and it probably won't be until 1983.

"Our industry is in real trouble," said O.L. Pfaffmann, president of the Detroit Chapter of the Associated General Contractors of America.

"We've had unemployment levels of nearly 30 percent for all trades; dollar volumes are down some 25 percent across-the-board, and construction's share of the gross national product has declined from 10 percent to less than seven percent," he told the Detroit Economic Club recently.

While most industries are projecting better times for the second half of 1982, construction leaders are more pessimistic. "It is very questionable


that any improvement will be realized during the first half of 1982, and not much significant change is anticipated in the second half," Pfaffmann said.

Challenges which builders face in 1982 are high financing costs, needed legislative reforms and government spending for public roads.

"Next year's biggest loser will continue to be public works," Pfaffmann said. Michigan's Department of Transportation confirms our highways and bridges are in need of repairs and maintenance.

Michigan Road Builders Association has recommended some legislative action. By changing our road tax rates assessments systems, it would bolster sagging revenues caused by decreased auto usage and better gas mileage," he said.



Coach eyes title

Central skiers set for slopes

In his fifth year as the Walled Lake Central ski coach, Marty Neighbors reports his team's progress to be anything but downhill.

"I know it's a coach's cliché to say I'm optimistic," said Neighbors, "but I'm expecting big things out of this year's group."

"With two-thirds of the team back,

we're very experienced," continued the 31-year old Viking skipper. "And I know what (opponents) we're going up against."

"I expect we'll be the team to beat in our division."

The division of which Neighbors speaks includes Walled Lake Western, Lakeland, West Bloomfield, Waterford Township, Brother Rice—Marian and Central. Last year Brother Rice won the division and Lakeland finished second in the regionals and eighth in the state.

"But both teams lost many of their top racers while we return most of

ours," Neighbors asserted.

According to Neighbors, both Central teams (boys and girls) finished around the 500 mark last year. But that was a team which had some disciplinary problems with which Neighbors had to deal.

Of the 31 member team, 20 are boys. The boys' team returns last year's Turner World Cup winner, a trophy presented by Neighbors to the individual leading the team in points by season's end, senior Jim Adams.

Other top racers include Robert Hittinger, a senior who missed a portion of last year due to injury and a close second in points; senior Tom Tuson; junior Ted Salmeto; and the skier who Neighbors contends has the soundest technical form, Bob Shummin.

"Those five should have no problem making the 'A' squad," said Neighbors, a unit which unlike the 'B' squad competes against other teams. The 'B' squad, according to the Viking coach, continues to practice with the team and gets a shot at making the 'A' squad midway through the season.

Others competing for the final five 'A' spots, according to Neighbors, are juniors Mike Mairano, Dan Gilbert, Rich Beland, Sean Scott; sophomore Brian Beaver; and freshmen Greg Davies and Scott Adams.

For the girls' team, an 11-member unit with six returnees, Neighbors expects just as bright a season as the boys'.

Two seniors and a junior rank as three of the top girl skiers in Central's division, says Neighbors. The Central

coach says Margot Robb, Laurie Gustafson and Andrea Meenahan should keep the team in most races.

"They have 11 years of experience between them," noted Neighbors. "And any one of them could be our top racer."

Senior Kelly Stone, junior Wendy Williams and sophomore Sherri Strohs also return for another varsity season.

New to the team this year are freshmen Gretchen Hoffman, Lynne

House, Stephanie Scott, Karen Clark and senior Meg Guilfrida.
