Armed robbers strike four Novi businesses

. Armed robbers have hit a bank, a retail outlet, a restaurant and a gas station in Novi in unrelated incidents durg the last two weeks.

In the latest incident, the Video Wherehouse at 43737 West Oaks Drive in the West Oaks shopping center was struck Saturday night. Thieves escaped with nearly \$13,000 in electronic equipment and \$3,200 in cash.

Police said an employee was locking the store for the evening and activating the alarm system when a blue-steel hand gun was placed at his temple. His Cyes, ears, hands and feet were bound and he was left on the stockroom floor.

The thieves then had complete access to the store, police reported. The thieves stole \$2,700 from a cash register which they opened with a key taken from the employee as well as \$500 of the

employee's personal money. They also stole approximately 20 pieces of electronic equipment, including video cassette recorders, electronic cameras, television video games and miscellaneous cassette tapes,

Dolice reported. After the thieves left, the employee pulled a telephone from a desk to the stockroom floor, but could not locate it because of his bonds. The employee then snaked his way into the showroom where he located another telephone and dialed the operator with his tongue, police reported.


When police arrived the employee could give no description of his Assailants. He said the man who placed the gun at his head was wearing a dark blue, pullover ski mask.

In yet another armed robbery, nearly \$150 was stolen from the Kentucky Fried Chicken store at 41491 West Ten Mile on June 30.

An employee told police a black male entered the store and approached the counter. She asked: "May I help you?" The man responded: "This is a stick up. Open the cash register."

The man pulled a black, square-type gun which police believe to be a bluesteel hand gun.

The employee opened the register and the man reached in and took the money, which he placed in a small paper bag. He then ordered the clerk to lie down behind the counter for five minutes and left the restaurant.

Police are seeking a black male, 5-8 tall of small build, with a short Afrohair style and a thick mustache. The man is described as between 30-40 years old. He was wearing sunglasses and carrying a beige jacket.

Approximately \$300 was stolen from the Total Gas Station at 24141 West Ten Mile on June 20. According to reports, the robber entered the station, ordered a soft drink and then pulled a revolver as the attendant walked behind the

The attendant told police the man pulled a lunch bag from his jacket and ordered him to fill it with money. The robbery was committed by a white man wth black hair in his tate 20s. He was described as being approximately 5-8

.Cable plans proceed

Cable television subscribers in Novi may be "turned on" as early as November, but service more likely will not become available until sometime in January or February, according to one Metrovision official.

Delays in formally adopting an ordinance regulating cable television in Novi has had no effect on Metrovision's ability to proceed with wiring the community. In fact, the company is proceeding according to plans, said Tom Bjorklund, Metrovision general manager.

"It's not holding us up at all. They signed the contract and that's all we needed to get into business," Bjorklund

Novi entered into a contract with Metrovision May 24, but action on an ordinance which normally is enacted at the same time has been delayed to give City Attorney David Fried time to redraft the document. It already has been adopted in Farmington and Farmington Hills.

The ordinance to be drafted will regulate all cable systems proposed in Novi. The original draft named Metrovision specifically and Fried objected that the ordinance should not refer to a particular company.

Bjorklund said Metrovision now is preparing the technical design of the three-community system and applying for permits from other utility companies.



Officer Alan Blashfield of the Wixom Police Department has received one of the top awards in the field of law enforcement. Blashfield, a member of the department since 1973, was awarded the

Distinguished Service Medal at the Michigan Association of Chiefs of Police (MACP) convention recently in Traverse City. "The Distinguished Service Medal is one of the most prestigious awards in police work," said Wixom Police Chief Philip Leonard, who nominated

Blashfield received the award for acts of heroism in saving a man's life during a fire at the Village Apartments on July 15, 1981.


According to Leonard's report, here's what happened "Officer Blashfield and Richard St. John of the Village Maintenance Department ran to the scene of the fire.... After entry was made into the heavily

smoke-filled apartment, a quick search revealed that the unit was vacant. The origin of the blaze was established in the kitchen area with a working fire in the wall and cabinet area surrounding the stove and refrigerator. "At this time, Blashfield and St. John proceeded to use dry chemical fire extinguishers in an effort to contain the fire. Unbeknown to Blashfield and St. John, a defective gas line was feeding the rapidly burning fire. St. John proceeded to move the stove away from the wall to turn off the gas line. The gas line ruptured as the stove was moved, allowing additional gas to escape into the

room increasing the hazard. "At this time, Blashfield observed that St. John was coughing, gasping for air, and had started to stumble and fall due to the overwhelming smoke and nbxious fumes. Blashfield restrained St. John from falling and carried him out of the apartment and into the court yard.

"Blashfield re-entered the burning apartment and crawled across the floor to the fire extinguishers located on the wall and proceeded to spray the contents of the two remaining fire extinguishers on the base of the fire.

: "Once all visible flames were extinguished, Blashfield left the burned apartment and, with the assistance of maintenance personnel of the Village Apartments, evacuated the people that occupied the other 35 apartment units. "All tenants of the apartment building were safety evacuated from the apartments in the three-story structure with no serious injury."

City responsibility is drainage issue

Nobody really got what they had hoped for from the joint session between the Walled Lake City Council and the Novi citizens' drain committee last week.

Novi did not get a commitment — or even much encouragement — from Walled Lake to participate in the proposed lake level control project that would involve installing a wier at the south end of Walled Lake, the keystone of Novi's innovative drain program.

And although council members learned a great deal about Novi's drainage situation, Walled Lake officials did not hear the strong arguments for involvement needed to change their opinions on how the project will benefit Walled Lake.

But while it did not clarify as many issues as we had hoped, the meeting was not a loss. Novi City Manager Edward Kriewall put forward the only real arguments heard for Walled Lake's involvement, and his reasoning requires some study from Walled Lake officials — as well as Commerce Township officials, who will soon be asked to get involved in the project as well

In Kriewall's view, at the heart of the issue of joint involvement is not how it will benefit one city or another, but whether Walled Lake has a responsibility to participate. Kriewall feels Walled Lake should join with Novi in controlling the level of their shared lake simply because it contributes to Novi's flooding problems inasmuch as Walled

There is much to be said for Kriewall's arguments. One only has to look at the history of this area to see that municipalities have too often taken the position that they are not responsible for what happens downstream, while objecting to what their upstream neighbors are doing.

Certainly Novi would derive a greater benefit from the lake level project, since residents in Walled Lake are not in danger of being flooded due to problems with water flow from the north. If the project is debated solely on the grounds of benefit to Walled Lake, that city will probably never get involved. Lyon's concerns are not without justification. The annexation battle between cities and townships is being waged on several fronts across the state, including Walled Lake/Commerce and South Lyon/Lyon Township. Although Wixom officials have never discussed plans to annex portions of Lyon Township, the possibility exists and township of-

ly, Novi is much more concerned with establishing a citywide drain system at this point. With its major new developments, flooding problems in the south and a far larger area to maintain, Novi's has understandably made its drainage situation a much higher priority than it is in Walled Lake.

Kriewall is correct in maintaining that adjacent municipalities have obligations to control their stormwater run-off in much the same manner that one property owner is legally prohibited from dumping his water onto his neighbor's land.

Novi and Walled Lake have different problems and different views on how they should be handled. But, in relation to the lake level control project, that does not mean they can't find the common ground needed to resolve this issue.

> is expanded. Wayne Glessner, who is the Wixom council's representative on the Airport Plan and Review Committee, emphasized recently that Lyon's fears about annexation must be assauged so expansion plans can move forward.

Noting that the proposed expansion of Spencer field is a part of the state's Community Business Airport Program, which seeks to revitalize and diversify the Michigan economy by developing 71 airports throughout the state to business-jet standards, Glessner said the annexation issue must be resolved quickly because "too many things are happening or about to happen."

We concur with Glessner's assessment. Hopefully, Lyon's concerns over annexation can be resolved quickly so that both communities do not jeopardize a potential asset that will contribute to the area's economic health and stability.

I thought a financial crisis was being forced to buy something with my magic rubber checkbook.

It was realizing that you will have to be married by January 1984, when your automobile is paid off and can be expected to gasp its last, because you will never get another car with your credit rating.

It was deciding which bill you can put off the longest and what the telephone company really means when it says your service will be cut off in 10 days. It was carefully weighing when to mail the payment, in the name of

It was wondering whether the repossession arm of the collection agency would show up before the car payment makes it to the bank.

It was fretting over the unreasonableness of bill collectors who don't seem to understand that if I couldn't afford to pay their stupid bill in the first place it's ridiculous to expect me to pay the bill and a \$70 deposit.

A financial crisis was realizing that all this anxiety was generated by simply meeting my basic needs — a car, rent, insurance and food. Not by running up charges (I don't have any plastic) or extravagant living.

But I have since learned that living on the edge of a precipitating crisis is not the same as actually experienc-

My sister has first hand knowlege.

When she and her husband moved to California they packed as many of their worldly posessions as they could in their Capri. Three-quarters of them had to be left behind and my sister cried as they decided what would stay behind in Mom's basement.

Her husband left behind his cowboy hat, among other things. True, there would have been no trouble fitting a hat in the car - he could have worn it. But what can you do when your wife is crying?

They both got jobs within a week of arriving in the Golden State. But their funds also were depleted by the time they found an apartment, paid a deposit and paid off

One morning they woke up and their car was gone. They went to the police to file a stolen automobile complaint. They were embarrassed when the officer asked if they were behind on the payments.

The car was auctioned off and they were responsible for paying back the balance of the amount not covered by the auction price. That was two years ago.

They are still making payments on a car they no longer have, a car they get no use of.

In January they had twin daughters. Last Friday my sister was going to the doctor for a

pregnancy test.

She laughed when she told me, but it was one of those feeble things that sound closer to a cry.

When I asked how that could have happened she

But she will cope. Margie says someone is looking out for them. She believes the prayers my devout Wesleyan parents send heavenward work. She knew it the day she was sitting in her apartment, sweating in fear that her creditors were going to come and strip their apartment, taking all their furniture.

That day a check from the insurance company for an overpayment of a hospital bill turned up in the mailbox.

When her husband was worrying over the possibility of becoming a father of three or maybe four at age 22 and trying to figure out how they could afford it, Margie said: "You know you have gotten more out of those two little bundles than you could out of any material things."



The Peltos admit it was hard introducing new types of food to the area, but they now have a regular vegetarian clientele and have "won over" many former "meat and potatoes" people with items like the "avocado sub," which features avocado. onion. alfalfa sprouts, mayonnaise tomatoes and New York sharp cheese; "chapati" which is black and green olives, alfalfa sprouts, tomato, onion, lettuce, sour cream and mozzarella cheese in pita bread; and pizza toppings that in-
