Thinking out loud

By KATHY JENNINGS

I was thinking so hard I nearly put my car in a ditch.

After spending the day with a group which had taken on the task of encouraging Michigan's discouraged — the unemployed and those soon to be out-of-work — I almost wrecked my car contemplating: "Why do people have to be taught to think positively? Why is thinking negatively almost automatic?"

One of the seminar's psychologists explained it's difficult to fight negativism because "one drop of black ink can turn the whole pitcher black."

Another speaker told the group that if he told them nine positive things about themselves and one negative thing, they would remember the negative one because it gets blown out of proportion.

It may be childhood conditioning. The first word most kids learn is 'no.' Adults tell children they are cutting the paper wrong, rather than explaining there is an easier way to hold the scissors.

Yet the speakers at the seminar encouraged the belief that negative attitudes can be changed. In essence, what follows was their message.

A positive attitude starts with a smile, one speaker said. (This comes from the man who wants to die with the wrinkles on his face going up.) You should take an assessment of your life. By look-

ing it over, you can see if your life is more positive or negative. Your attitudes are formed by the people around you and your conditioning.

Watch who you associate with. They are very in-
