

## Bob Evans plan forces impasse

The site plan for the controversial Bob Evans restaurant in Novi's regional center area is headed for the city council "without recommendation" from the planning board.

After discussing the proposed site plan at length last week, the planners failed to reach agreement on whether to recommend approval or denial and ultimately decided to forward it to the council without recommendation.

The Bob Evans restaurant controversy already is in litigation and both Bob Evans Attorney Norman Hyman and City Attorney David Fried stated they were "making their cases" in proceedings before the planners last week.

In fact, the hearing last week was a direct result of the lawsuit filed against the city by Bob Evans, Inc.

The restaurant is proposed for development immediately in front of the Kroger store on the west side of Novi Road opposite Twelve Oaks Mall. Final site plan approval rests with the city council because the restaurant is being developed under the city's PD option.

The site plan was recommended for preliminary approval by the planning board last November but turned down by the city council in January on the grounds it was not in harmony with surrounding land uses.

Bob Evans subsequently filed suit against the city. The site plan was sent back to the planners last week by Oakland County Circuit Court Judge Fred Mester after Fried argued that

the suit was invalid because the council had only rejected the preliminary site plan and final site plans had not yet been submitted.

As a result, Bob Evans is now seeking final site plan approval. If the council denies that approval, the restaurant chain is expected to resume pursuit of its lawsuit against Novi.

Further complicating proceedings is the fact that Novi has amended its PD option since the site plan was first submitted. The amended option empowers the planning board and council to determine if the building's architectural design and facade materials are complementary to existing buildings in the surrounding area.

The amended ordinance states further that contrasts in building design and facade are not to be discouraged unless they can be shown to have an adverse effect on the surrounding area.

Fried advised the planners last week that the site plan should be reviewed under the amended ordinance, but Hyman made it clear that the interpretation will be argued in court.

Noting that the site plan was submitted under the original ordinance, Hyman argued that the restaurant chain is entitled to final approval under the original ordinance.

"But even if the new ordinance applies, we comply with all the technical standards," the Bob Evans attorney continued. "The amended ordinance states that contrast in design and facade materials is not to be discourag-

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## Novi park plans up for comment

One part of planning a city is making space for future recreational areas.

And a proposed parks and recreation master plan which does just that will come under public scrutiny at the November 10 meeting of the Novi Planning Board at 7:30 p.m. in the Novi Public Library.

Basically, the plan includes two citywide parks, six district parks, 12 neighborhood parks and bike/pedestrian paths routed between them and school facilities.

Residents are asked to attend and offer their ideas on the concepts put forward in the proposed plan, Parks and Recreation Director Thomas O'Branovic said.

For those who would like to review the plan before next week's public hearing, both the text of the plan and a map showing general locations for proposed park sites are available in the city clerk's office.

"We'd like input on the plan as presented and the approach we've taken," O'Branovic said. "We hope to find out what people think of the concepts presented and how the long-range future of recreation for the city looks."

As an example of citizens' impact, O'Branovic noted that input from residents when the plan was first unveiled before the city council demonstrated the community's interest in construction of pathways.

O'Branovic said the estimated 37

miles of pathways now in the plan are on major arterial routes. Bikers and pedestrians will take subdivision and connector streets onto the major traffic routes. On the major routes the city would "provide safe access," O'Branovic said.

"Our plan is to hit the population centers and connect them into as many recreational and school facilities as possible," he continued. "In the less populated areas our plans are up in the air."

He said the pathways, as well as other aspects of the plan, would be developed in phases.

O'Branovic explained one concept of the plan is that the city would provide fewer parks, but larger parks than national standards would ordinarily dictate. It is believed it will be easier to maintain and control the larger parks, he said.

The proposed plan designates three types of recreational facilities: citywide parks, district parks and neighborhood parks. Citywide parks generally are more than 50 acres, district parks are 15 to 50 acres and neighborhood parks are five to 15 acres.

One citywide park on Ten Mile would have highly active recreational programs, while the second on South Lake would be for passive recreation such as picnicking and hiking.

O'Branovic said he hopes Lakeshore Park and beach can be expanded and

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## Police report safe Halloween in Novi

"Calm and quiet" was how Novi police described Halloween 1982, nothing like the days when the entire police force was scheduled to handle juvenile pranks.

Police attributed the small number of trick-or-treaters and general lack of vandalism to dank weather and fear of tainted treats.

There were no trick-or-treaters in some areas of the city, while others said the number of children asking for treats was down at least 50 percent.

Lieutenant Robert Starnes said the extent of juvenile mischief amounted to "a couple of eggs thrown and one home sprayed with paint."

"We were ready for about any contingency; fortunately nothing happened," Starnes said.

He noted the normal shift procedure was in effect and REACT members helped police scout the city. "We were out in force Devil's Night and Halloween, but the wet weather and Halloween being on Sunday calmed it down."

There was more good news from the Providence Hospital Annex where approximately 400-450 bags of candy were checked for foreign metal objects without incident.

Cindy Panasiewicz, supervisor of the x-ray department, reported no evidence of tampering when candy was x-rayed.

"We were swamped from 6:45 to 9 p.m.," Panasiewicz said. She estimated that 130 to 140 families or groups came to the annex to have their goodies inspected.

The bags were placed on an x-ray table and a fluoroscope was run over the bag. Panasiewicz likened the x-rays to screening done in airports, since the hospital staff could see the candy and would have been able to find metal in it.

## Hilton may break ground soon

Joseph Gerak has not yet established an official date for groundbreaking. But the developer of the proposed Novi Hilton says he's shooting for December 1.

Novi's Planning Board cleared the way for construction to begin on the proposed seven-story, 250-room facility near the Eight Mile/Haggerty Road intersection by voting unanimously last week to grant preliminary site plan approval.

"We're really pushing hard to get underway this year," said Gerak, a partner in Orchard Hill Place Associates.

"Our goal all along has been to start construction this year and we're anxious to get going."

Orchard Hill Place Associates has proposed a two-phase construction program for the Novi Hilton. The first phase will consist of 250 rooms in a seven-story configuration as well as amenities (swimming pool, banquet rooms, convention facilities) for an additional 150 rooms.

The second phase is proposed to consist of 150 additional rooms, an office building and additional convention facilities. No timetable has been established for construction of the second phase.

Gerak said he currently is making arrangements for release of mortgage money and final drawings to obtain foundation permits from the Novi Building Department.

He said he hopes to obtain foundation permits next week and "be in the

ground" by December 1.

"After we get the footings in, we can erect structural steel during the winter and be ready to go with the outside trades at the start of the 1983 construction season," said Gerak.

It will take approximately 18-20 months to complete the \$17 million first phase of the facility which will provide approximately 250 jobs for area residents.

Site plan approval of the proposed Novi Hilton was delayed pending the granting of variances by the Novi Zoning

Board of Appeals (ZBA). Orchard Hill Place Associates applied for variances after the original site plan was turned down by the Novi Planning Board because it did not meet city zoning ordinance standards.

Specifically, the planners rejected the site plan because it proposed parking in the front and exterior sideyards and exceeded the maximum number of stories permitted in the OSC district.

Ordinances prohibit parking in both the front and exterior sideyards, while buildings in the OSC district are limited

to five stories and 65 feet in height. The proposed Hilton is seven stories high, but meets the 65-foot limitation on building height.

The ZBA granted both variances at its October 5 meeting and the planning board voted unanimously to grant preliminary site plan approval last Wednesday.

The only objections to site plan approval last week were expressed by Nancy Covert, a resident in the

## Drainage permits sought

Novi officials have taken the first step toward implementing a citywide drainage system by filing applications for permits from the Department of Natural Resources (DNR) to construct four regional drainage basins.

Plans are proceeding in accordance with the regional drainage system concept approved by Novi voters in August.

The city must obtain the permits from the DNR to build in wetlands and erect dams for the first four storm water retention areas in the system.

Specifically, the city has applied for permits to construct retention ponds in the following areas:

- the Levenworth Creek pond located between Eleven Mile and Grand River and between Talt and Lanny's roads;
- the city center detention basin located on city property off Ten Mile; and,
- a pond at the southeast corner of Grand River and Meadowbrook.

In Cedar Springs two retention basins will be eliminated and two other ponds will be joined to form a regional basin.

Additionally, the city is trying to obtain property or easements to an existing pond at the corner of Grand River and Meadowbrook.

Engineers also expect to seek DNR permits for construction of four storm water sewer mains by the end of this week. The city is hoping the permit applications will be approved within eight weeks.

It is not yet known which of the four proposed retention areas will hold water at all times and which will simply retain water during storms, according to Engineering Consultant Cliff Seiber.

Soil borings of the pond areas must still be completed before such determinations can be made, Seiber explained.

Calculations which show the impact of water which will flow in and out of the ponds during a 100-year storm have been made by the city engineers for the DNR application.

The calculations show the impact of the basins and their effectiveness in reducing storm water flows in the drainage channels.

The calculations also are necessary to properly size downstream drains.

Novi must obtain permits from the DNR before it can get the state finance commission for approval to sell bonds which will provide the financing necessary to construct the first phase of the citywide drainage system.

In August Novi voters approved the sale of nearly \$4 million in bonds for construction of six major drainage projects.

## Liberty Street gets special work

Motorists who've been wondering if they'll ever be able to drive down Liberty Street again, take heart.

The paving project is well on its way to completion, and the final result will be even nicer than originally anticipated.

The Walled Lake City Council recently decided to have decorative brick work installed near the sidewalks, and also that electrical outlets should be installed at the base of several planters, where honey locusts will be planted.

The improvements are possible because the road project, paid by the city's local road fund, came in far under expected cost estimates, according to City Manager J. Michael Dorman, who recommended the improvements be approved.

The \$7,000 project was awarded in September to Ben Fike and Sons, low bidders on a format requiring installation of an eight-inch bituminous layer on the street, curbs, landscaping and sidewalks.

Albert Dittori was the low bidder at \$6,400 on an alternate plan, which council members decided not to accept.

That plan would have involved gravel replacement and a three-inch bituminous overlay, in addition to the other improvements.

However, the city had budgeted \$65,000 for the road work and had also earmarked \$9,000 worth of Community Development Block Grant funds for landscaping and other beautification projects on Liberty Street.

As a result, Dorman recommended the city use a portion of the extra money in the major road fund to pay for 1,572 feet of decorative brick work in a basketweave pattern along Liberty Street.

Dorman said Fike and Sons had offered to lay the brick work for \$5.45 per square foot, down \$8 from other quotations.

The brick work was scheduled to start as early as this week, and contractors have already installed a "very fine and safe electrical system" that will allow the city to put up "twinkle lights" this Christmas, Dorman said.

The electricity also will be helpful for Liberty Street events like Market Days, the July Fourth fireworks festival and

other fairs to be held in the area.

Topping the improvements off will be planting of several trees along Liberty Street inside concrete planters. Ray's Landscaping of Walled Lake will install the honey locusts for \$215 each, which will guarantee the trees for one year.

The city council gave Ray's Landscaping the contract on the basis of its estimate because of its reputation, proximity to the area and its location in the city. Other estimates from wholesale landscaping firms gave similar prices, Dorman said.

Because bids came in lower than anticipated for the Liberty Street paving, Dorman recommended the council accept the eight-inch overlay plan offered by Fike and Sons rather than the more expensive road project on which Dittori was low-bidder.

He and Don Compton of Johnson and Anderson, the city's engineering consultants, said at the time that the work would probably make Liberty Street a higher quality road than the recently resurfaced Walled Lake Drive and would offer the city an opportunity to compare the two different projects.

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## Novi planners deny addition

Plans for a 30,000 square foot addition to Wisne Automation on Ten Mile will have to receive a variance from the Novi Zoning Board of Appeals (ZBA) before construction can begin.

The addition is proposed for warehousing.

Novi's Planning Board turned down a request from Wisne Automation for preliminary site plan approval after Planning Consultant Charles Cairns noted the proposed addition does not meet the requirements of the city's zoning ordinance.

Wisne Automation is located on the south side of Ten Mile, east of the Novi 26 Apartments.

In reviewing the site plan, Cairns noted that the building is located adjacent to a multiple-family zoning district and the city's ordinance requires setbacks at least equal to five feet of horizontal distance per each foot of vertical building height.

Since the height of the addition is to be 40 feet, Cairns said a 200-foot setback is required from the east property line and only 50 feet is provided.

The existing Wisne Automation building is 40 feet in height with a 50 foot setback but was approved prior to adoption of current standards.

"Thus, while the proposed addition has the same height and side yard setbacks as the existing structure, it does not meet the current standards," Cairns explained.

The planning consultant also said it is a virtual physical impossibility for Wisne Automation to meet the new standards on its existing site. "I think they have a true practical hardship," he said.

Support for a variance from the ZBA was expressed by Planner Peter Romanow who said it doesn't make sense to deny a 40-foot addition to the existing 40-foot building.

"I don't see how this addition will be any more obtrusive than what's there right now," he said.

The planners subsequently voted unanimously to reject site plan approval to give Wisne Automation access to the ZBA.

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## Vicary, other buildings receive rehab funding

After months of planning, the Vicary Apartments on Pontiac Trail in Walled Lake is about to receive a facelift.

Improvements to the building, the brown structure next to the Lakeshore Restaurant on Pontiac Trail, will include \$51,000 worth of work in the form of awnings, new windows, siding, a skylight, plumbing and electrical work and a new staircase.

The improvements are part of a package design put together with the help of the Oakland County plan division, which drew up conceptual drawings to help the owner visualize what could be done through rehabilitation.

The building is being rehabilitated through Walled Lake's rental rehab project, which involves \$86,000 in federal funds and is part of a program designed to provide low-cost housing to renters.

John Hazelroth, coordinator of the program, said repairs to the building should be "going full-steam" by the end of this week.

Hazelroth said by the time the Vicary Apartments work is done, the building will look quite different. Most of the money will be spent on sprucing up the outside, although some funds are earmarked to improve the individual apartments inside.

Other major beneficiaries of the rental rehab program are the apartments above Zayed's Party Store on Maple Road. Improvements will include installing cedar shake shingles on one side of the building, repairing the roof and installing insulated windows.

Maple Terrace apartments also will receive some weatherization work and improvements to the inside and outside of the buildings, Hazelroth said.

In addition, a rental home on Quinif also has received a number of repairs.

The commitments to re-do the Vicary, Maple Terrace and Zayed's apartments have used up most of the rental rehab funding, Hazelroth said. He noted that the money had to be allocated by next spring or the city would lose it.

## Barricaded man shoots deputy, harms self

A 21-year-old Commerce Township man, apparently dependent over the break-up with his girlfriend, fired seven shots with a .38-caliber hunting rifle, injuring an Oakland County Sheriff's officer yesterday.

Robert Daniel Eisenman, who barricaded himself inside his home Tuesday morning, was to be charged with "attempt to murder" yesterday afternoon following the shooting of Officer Charles Huggins, according to Oakland County Sheriff Johannes Spreen.

Eisenman reportedly broke up with his girlfriend Ann Kane, 18, "several days ago" and had attempted to commit suicide Sunday by taking an inordinate amount of drugs, according to several police sources.

Before eventually surrendering to police Tuesday afternoon, Eisenman reportedly still one of his wrists and was rushed by ambulance to Pontiac General Hospital. His condition was unknown late yesterday.

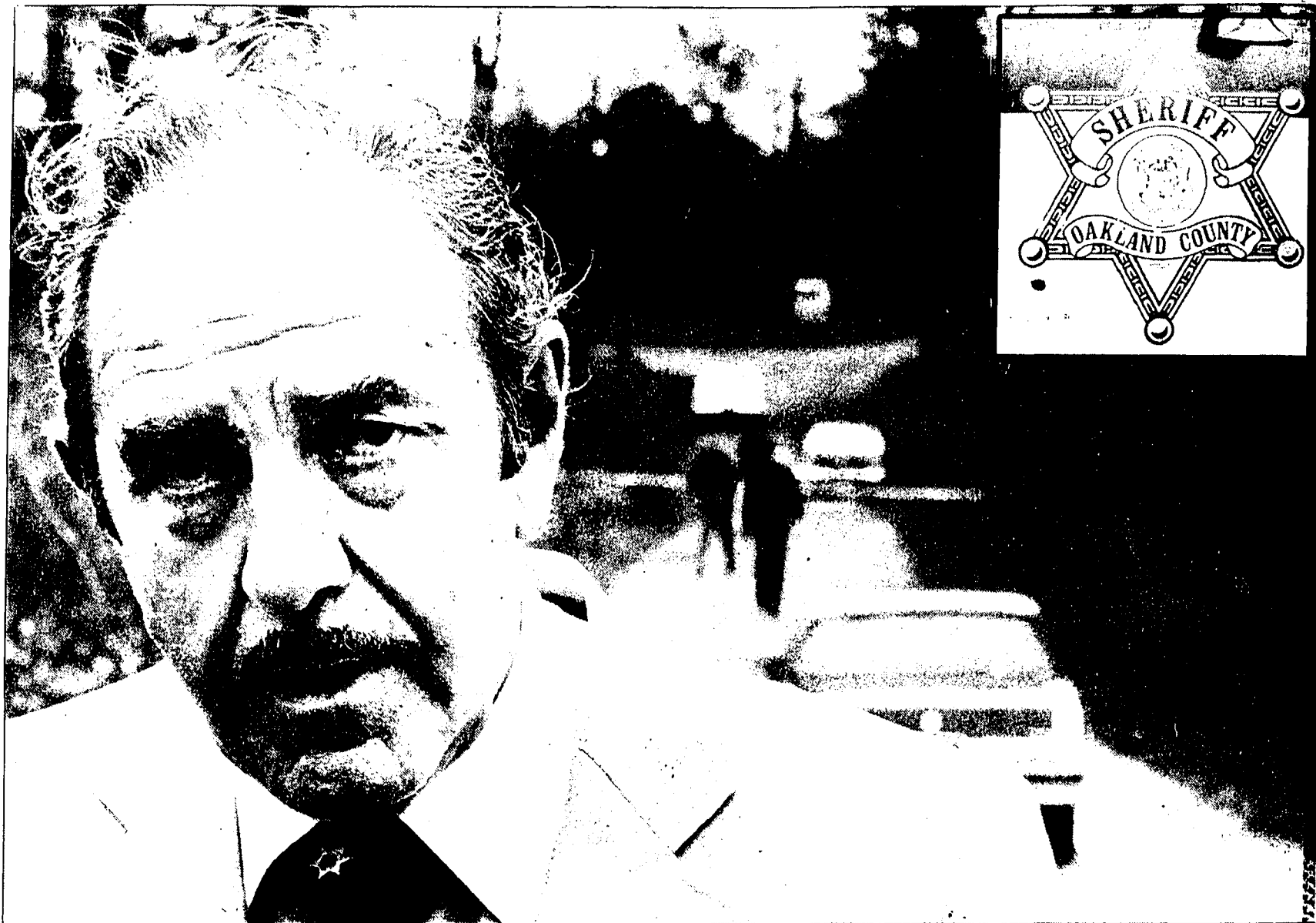
Oakland County Sheriff's received notice at approximately 11 a.m. from

Eisenman's sister that "he (Eisenman) was not acting normally." Spreen said yesterday outside the home. The county sheriff added that Eisenman was reportedly acting very violently and "starting apart" his parents' home at 3760 Bass Lake.

Police arriving on the scene were met by the unarmed sister at the top of the driveway, which runs about 100 yards west connecting the home and Bass Lake Road. Both Eisenman's sister and mother had left the home prior to police arrival without interference from Eisenman, Spreen said. Reportedly, his father, Robert Sr., was at work when the incident occurred.

Eisenman allegedly opened fire on five police officers who initially responded to the call. Huggins was struck in the leg, apparently by one of the shots, and fell about 30 yards west of the home.

Eisenman reportedly fired a shot "risking his life," to rescue Huggins, who had been trapped for 30 minutes, according to Spreen. Huggins was

## Police say woman killed husband, 84

A Walled Lake woman has been charged with first-degree murder more than a year after her 84-year-old semi-invalid husband died in a fire that destroyed the couple's Wanda Street home.

Dora Wood, 78, is facing felony murder charges stemming from the alleged arson that killed her husband, Harold, July 27, 1981.

Mrs. Wood stood mute at her arraignment October 25 before 52nd District Judge Harold Bulgarelli, according to Walled Lake police. She was released on \$100,000 bond. A preliminary exam before Judge Bulgarelli is scheduled for December 6.

She was unavailable for comment.

Mrs. Wood has not been charged with arson. However, Sergeant Roger Cote of the Walled Lake police said the fire was determined by investigators to be arson.

Police refused to speculate on a motive that might have led Mrs. Wood to allegedly murder her husband. They also are refusing to reveal what evidence from the investigations con-

ducted by the department and the Michigan State Police arson strike force led to her arrest on murder charges.

Cote said Mrs. Wood voluntarily went to the police station after she was informed the Oakland County Prosecutor's Office had handed down a

## Flyer: Ultralights make good neighbors

Is it a bird? No. Is it a plane? Yes, say the men who sell them and teach people to fly them.

Ultralight planes have been flying out of Wixom's Vernon M. Spencer Memorial Airport since midsummer.

They recently came under fire at a Wixom City Council meeting after a resident complained that the aircraft, then described as "hang gliders with motors" are noisy and a nuisance.

Wayne Schlager is part owner of Nebulon, Inc., which sells ultralight aircraft and gives classes in ultralight operation at Spencer Airport.

Schlager disputes the "hang gliders with motors" description of ultralight aircraft.

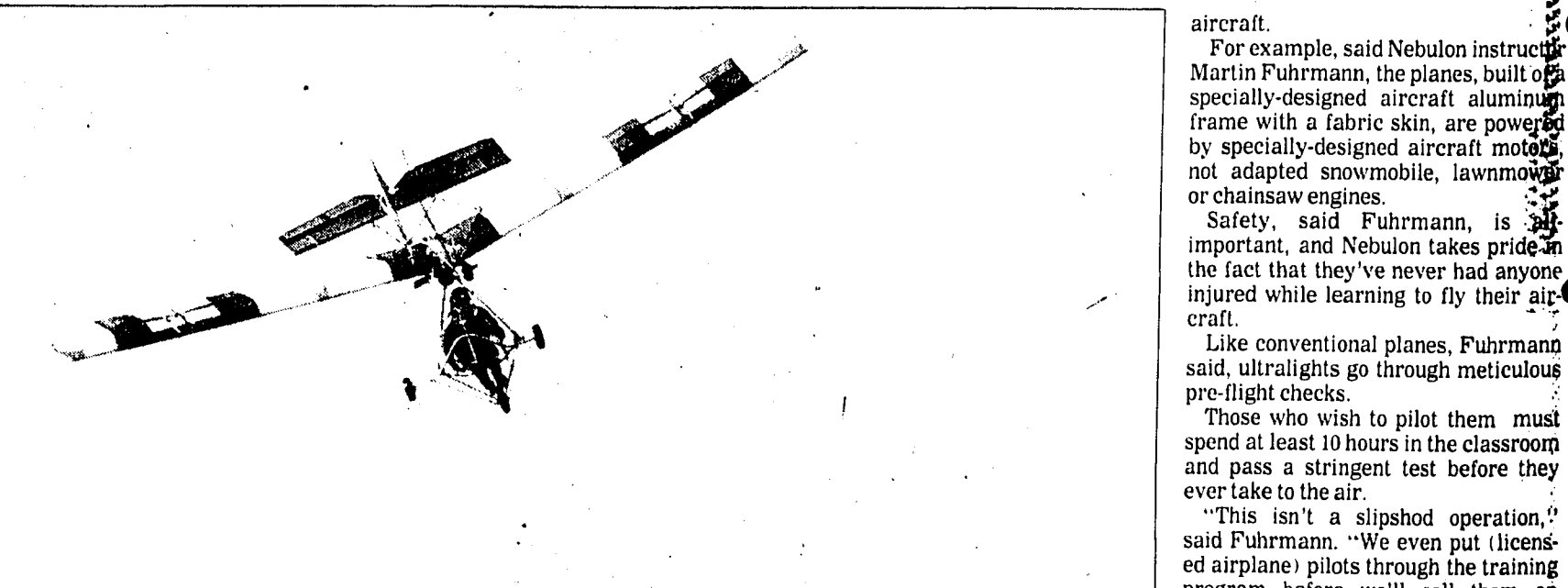
He also says his firm is willing to do "practically anything" to avoid bothering airport neighbors.

"It's imperative not to start out on the wrong foot (with the neighbors)," Schlager said. "This is the same kind of thing we had with snowmobiles 15 years ago. It is a new thing and people haven't heard of it yet. We're kind of the forefront of a movement and we have to break the ground."

"Practically anything" includes installing new "super quiet" exhaust systems on ultralights kept by the company at Spencer Airport.

It includes bringing in equipment to do a ground noise-level check on the aircraft.

It includes a plan to move the planes to the far side of the airfield for takeoff.

Even includes an open offer to nearby residents to visit the airport, inspect the planes up close and take a test ride in a two-seater training plane.

"We're doing the best we can," said Schlager. "We'd like to educate people about where we're going to be flying."

Ultralight flyers not obeying the rules set down by Nebulon at Spencer Airport will be asked to leave the airport, Fuhrmann said.

"I guess I did well enough that he said to me, 'Bill, I want you to be an aide to me,'" said Roberts. "I was glad to accept."

"I would call it a working vacation," the soft-spoken Roberts smiles. "I enjoy it very much... but it is work."

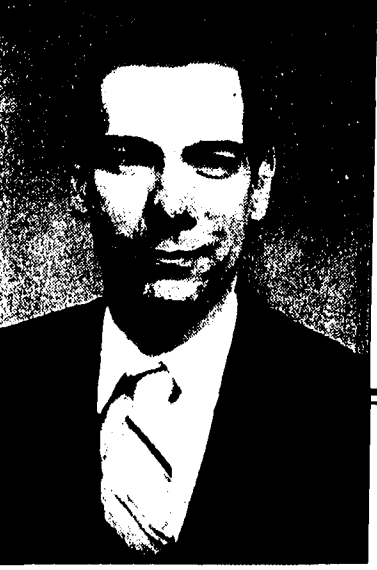

## Industrial reorientation begins on Grand River

Commercial property on Grand River which had been recommended for rezoning to a light industrial classification has been left intact by the Novi City Council.

In related actions, however, the council proceeded with the planned reorientation of the Grand River corridor by rezoning heavy industrial property to a light industrial designation.

The council acted on 11 rezoning petitions October 25 in a marathon session that lasted approximately five hours.

Apparently swayed by citizens who said rezoning their property from commercial to light industrial would rob them of the investment they had made in the property over the years, the council decided to retain commercial property on some parts of Grand River.

It also was suggested that the area may someday require services which could only be provided on commercial property.

At least 75 persons turned out to encourage the council to reject plans to reorient the current development along Grand River.

Rezoning from heavy industrial to light industrial land uses were approved in 14 areas including:

- four parcels of property abutting the Vicenti industrial park, one at the corner of Grand River and Meadowbrook and three others of Seley Road.
- property south of I-96 between the highway and Eleven Mile.
- property north of Grand River from Taft Road east to the C&O Railroad tracks.
- property south of Grand River which is the site of Vicete Engineering.

- property north of Grand River from Taft Road west to Campbells Machinery, including Kensington Corporation, Campbells and Starto Corporation.
- property north of Grand River from Beck Road and east one-half mile.

A proposal to rezone a parcel to rezone from commercial to light industrial several parcels on the north side of Grand River, including the site of the Fairlane Motel and a parcel owned by Margaret Johnson, a vocal opponent to the reorientation of the area.

Commercial property south of Grand River from Taft Road west to the Pit Stop also was not rezoned by the city council.

A proposal to rezone property classified for use as small farms to light industrial uses also was rejected by the council.

All 11 rezoning actions were initiated by the Novi Planning Board and had been recommended for approval by that group. Purpose of the rezonings was to bring the city's zoning map into conformance with the master plan adopted in December 1980.

Property owners have resisted the rezonings since planners began their discussion of the proposal.

Property owners have complained the rezoning would create a hardship since they believed it would prohibit expansion in most cases. Others objected that rezoning would reduce its value since it would limit the ways in which it could be used.

Planner Charles Cairns recommended the rezonings on the grounds they would create a continuity of land use as the Grand River corridor becomes more heavily developed.

# Sheriff deputy falls to gunman's shots

reported in "good condition" by Captain Jim Curtis, who was on the scene. Later Spreen said the officer was in stable condition after being operated upon at Pontiac Osteopathic Hospital. Eisenman also allegedly fired shots at Sergeant Stan Clark and hit one of the county sheriff's cars with the rifle. Spreen said the weapon was "evidently his (Eisenman's) gun."

The county sheriff added that Eisenman, reportedly a 1979 Walled Lake Western graduate, was moving from room to room during the barricade as police surrounded the home.

His girlfriend Kane, assisted by county sheriff officers, persuaded Eisenman to surrender to police after an estimated two-hour, 40-minute hold out inside the home.

A neighbor, Roy Russell, characterized Eisenman as "a good kid as far as we knew." And postal worker Barbara Warren of Milford, who was met by a waiting group of police and news media while making her Tuesday afternoon run to the Eisenman home, said, she

believed the Eisenmans were "a closeknit family."  
"This is a surprise to me," Warren added.  
Spreen called the incident "a problem of a boy and a girl and despondency over a break-up."  
Traffic was blocked along Bass Lake Road between Sleeth Road, where it intersects both east and west. And media and police officials milled around the beige tri-level home set back from Bass Lake Road in this rural section of Commerce throughout Tuesday afternoon.

Spreen also blasted the news media and specifically a local television crew for "interfering" with police action during an impromptu interview on Bass Lake Road in front of the Eisenman home.

"I think it's like the riots in the county jail, where television can interfere and it happened today," added the county sheriff, who had spent a few brief moments primping before stepping in front of the cameras.

"We could have had one of our officers shot," Spreen said emphatically. "I'm distressed at the media laughing in my face."

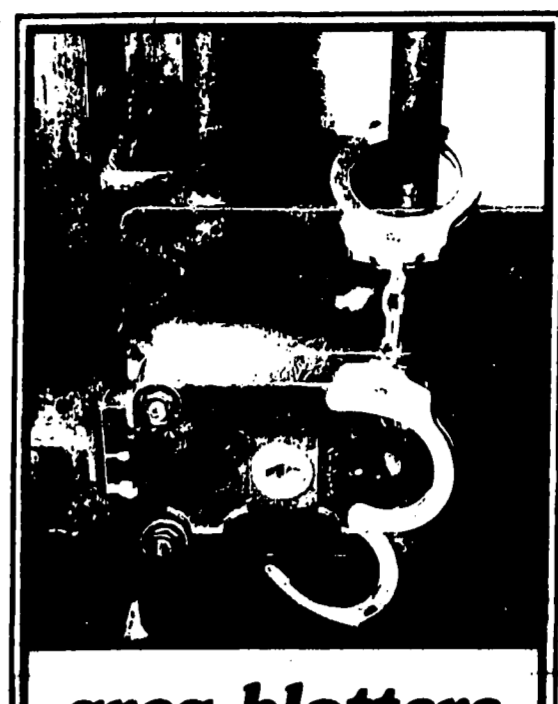

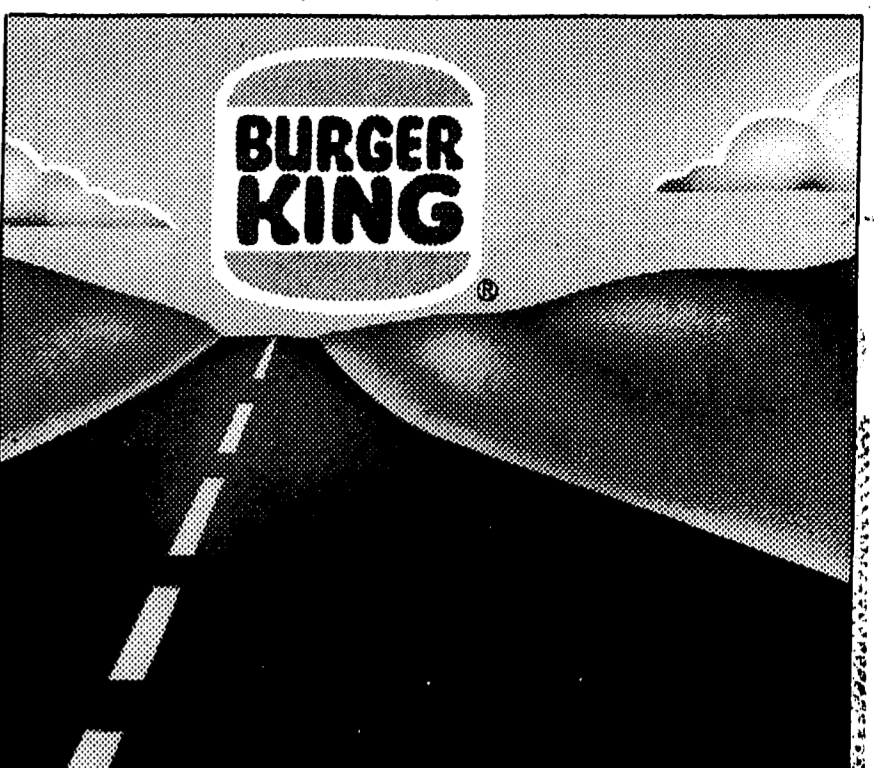

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# Woman arrested

first degree murder warrant. He said Mrs. Wood did not make a confession. The lawyer handling the case for the prosecutor's office was unavailable for comment before press time.

Prior to Mrs. Wood's arrest, police had been seeking a teenage boy whom they believed able to help them identify the person responsible for setting the fatal fire. He was never located.

The Wanda Street fire broke out in the early morning, allegedly as the result of a flammable substance on a downstairs floor of the Wood home.

Harold Wood, who had been suffering from emphysema prior to the fire, died of smoke inhalation and carbon monoxide poisoning, according to state police. His body was found in an upstairs bedroom of the small home, police said.

Mrs. Wood suffered first and second degree burns on 30-35 percent of her body. She was treated at the Ann Arbor Burn Center for seven weeks before she moved to the Walled Lake Villa.

A former Walled Lake elementary school teacher, Mrs. Wood is well-known in Walled Lake. Friends of the

family, who asked that their names be withheld, reacted to news of her arrest with shock and disbelief.

"We're just in a state of absolute shock," said one friend. "I've known her all my life. She is one of the most respected people in Walled Lake. It's unbelievable. None of us believe it."

Another close friend described her as a "fantastic teacher" who was devoted to her husband.

"It seems like they couldn't do one thing without each other," the friend said. "They were never separated. They were forever together."

The friend said Mrs. Wood said she had tried unsuccessfully to rescue her husband the morning their house burned down. Neighbors reportedly had to restrain Mrs. Wood from trying to re-enter the home to save her husband.

"We all know she isn't guilty," the friend said. "I would stake my life on it. They'll find out she's innocent."

One person said friends of Mrs. Wood were convinced the fire was accidental, despite police investigations classifying the blaze as arson.

"They were so afraid of fire," a friend said of the Woods.

# Walled Lake plan worthy of support

Walled Lake's new master plan has received much harsh criticism, most of it undeserved.

Some residents and business owners have chastised the city plan commission for trying to slide the new document through behind peoples' backs. For trying to "open the door" to acquisition of lakefront property to the Department of Natural Resources. For ignoring the best interests of the city.

It's time somebody said a good word about the plan commission, its new master plan and Consultant Tod Kilroy, who has worked with the city for nearly two years in preparing the document, up for review again next Tuesday.

Walled Lake's master plan appears to be a sound, well-intentioned plan with some interesting concepts. Should those concepts be implemented — and many will not be without a fight — the city as a whole could stand to benefit.

Among other things, the master plan speaks to defining lakefront property on Walled Lake as greenbelt, or non-developmental. The thought here is that the lake, the city's prime asset, should be given a proper setting to show off its quality — both to residents and passers-by.

Although residents are concerned that somehow this will provide a loophole that would make the area a massive public beach or DNR access point, we agree with the plan commission that designation of the area as land to be used for greenbelt purposes could help keep the land just the way many residents want to see it: green, private and a front yard to the lake.

Another problem may be creation of a neighborhood park on Leon Road, designed to serve the southern portion of the city. Property owners in the area may

not welcome the idea of a park next door, although the mayor has suggested a bird sanctuary and wildlife area might be desirable.

The master plan also suggests extension of West Maple Road, a major challenge considering the roundabout route one now must take in getting from Pontiac Trail to Ladd Road. That suggestion offers some interesting possibilities: it would almost certainly decrease traffic flow down North Walled Lake Drive and could bring in new business to the city. At the same time, it could prove detrimental to other businesses if traffic is diverted away from them, or if the route would be required to slice through a business's property.

The strong feelings of the community uncovered by public hearings and publicity have really proven beneficial in the long run. The commission has a better idea of the public's concerns, and found their objectives are compatible.

A sudden awareness of the new master plan also helped galvanize some activity in the business community, prodding some merchants to become more aware of and more involved in the city.

And the plan is a needed tool for the commission as it faces the task of trying to help steer development of the city — no small task.

A comment regarding Plan Consultant Tod Kilroy also is in order. Kilroy has functioned extremely well under unexpected pressure from several different camps as this plan has been reviewed. Kilroy has a knack of explaining complex situations in simple terms and of making people think he actually enjoys the rough-and-ready confrontations some public hearings create. He has been an asset to the city.

I went to the polls yesterday morning and spent my two minutes flipping levers in the voting booth.

And the funny thing is, I voted for some things I don't know too much about. And some people I know even less about.

What's worse is I suspect I'm part of a huge majority of voters who do the same thing.

You know, we've been hearing about the election for weeks on the radio, on television. We've been reading about it for weeks in the daily and weekly newspapers. We may even have gone to a candidate's night to try and sort out the confusion of which name goes with which platform.

But when it comes right down to it, it strikes me as virtually impossible to know enough about all the candidates in all the races, or even most of the candidates in most of the races, to be a truly informed voter.

The catch to that situation is that if you've spent weeks following an election and you're still confused about who to give your vote to, what do you do on election day morning when the choices confront you? Do you cross your fingers and pray before pulling the lever? Do you vote for a minor-party candidate you know won't win just to demonstrate your opposition to the whole selection of candidates? If you're like most of the people I know, you've probably done some of both — as well as voting for someone's rival because you can't stand the shoo-in candidate.

In our office, we have a philosophy: If you don't know anything about it, don't vote on it.

That means if you've never heard of any of the people running for county commissioner, don't vote. If you don't know who's running for board of regents of a particular university, don't vote. If you have no idea what Proposal A is, don't vote. Vote for governor or president, but not in races where you know none of the issues.

But who does that? I mean, you go into the booth, look at the race and see a name:

"Hmmm... I see Fred Mester is running for Oakland County Circuit Court Judge. I know that name from somewhere. Guess I'll vote for him."

As one man I work with said, you might just as well go into the booth and say, "Oh, look. Attila the Hun is running for Wayne County Commissioner. I've heard of him.

Sure, I'll vote for him."

While that's a bit dramatic, the point is a valid one. We as voters are frequently pulling levers for people we never heard of or whose names we happen to like. Or worse, for those whom we think must be "somebody" because we are pretty sure we heard something about them but can't remember what it was so let's hope it was good.

Now, I ask you. Is that any way to run an election? And when it comes to ballot proposals, the situation is just as bad. Trying to sort out who is on which side of the issue and which side's opinion you're going to trust is distressing, to say the least.

For instance, I was pretty sure I was going to vote against the utilities ballot proposals and I knew I was going to vote against the one for an elected public rate commission (because who needs another race filled with people you've never heard of).

Then I read a letter my dad got from his employer, Michigan Bell, telling all "Dear Managers" to vote against the three proposals and encourage their friends, families and employees to do likewise. Suddenly, I wasn't so sure I wanted to vote the same way anymore.

Not that Ma Bell has been good to me. It's just that I'm not convinced that what's bad for Bell is bad for me in the short run. Maybe in the long run if Bell is having trouble getting its rates adjusted, it'll just figure out another way to get its piece of flesh from my checking account. Like everybody else.

I ask you, what's a voter to do? Whose side do you get on? And if you don't know, should you vote?

Frankly, I'm not sure. I do think voting may be our greatest privilege and right and is something not to be taken lightly. There are a lot of people who believe that too: I saw them yesterday morning standing in line at South Lyon City Hall, where I vote. I saw them standing for hours in a snake-like ribbon that wrapped around Orchard Hills Elementary's gym during the 1980 presidential election.

But I also saw the campaign workers out there trying to win one more vote from someone who didn't know much about the race but might decide to vote for the guy who shook his hand in front of Precinct One.

Ahhh, free will.

Or, "Thanks for helping me pick out a shirt, Jim. Is 15 percent enough?"

Of course, the philosophy of tipping isn't practical in many applications. But it seems to me like it would be a natural for newspaper reporters.

Just think about it. "Hey Phil, really enjoyed your column this week. Here's a tip."

Or, "Great article on the school board meeting, Phil. Is \$10 enough?"

Good editorials probably ought to receive large tips. "Boy, you really hit the nail on the head this week, Phil. Here's a big tip."

Yep, the more I thought about it, ol' Calvin had a good idea about tipping.

Now I don't want anyone to think I'm trying to put ideas in their heads. Perish the thought. But, quite frankly, I strongly suspect tips for newspaper reporters may be tax-deductible. Maybe I should start carrying a receipt book.

# Drop-outs get a second chance

The New Potentials program that helps high school drop-outs earn their diplomas may be too successful.

"We've been turning people away," says Jerry Beers of Walled Lake Community Education, which runs New Potentials. "We don't have space in the program."

Mary Ellen Christiansen, counselor and coordinator of New Potentials, agrees. "We must have turned away 15 or 20 students this fall," she says. "In fact, we don't even have a waiting list anymore."

Beers and Christiansen are hoping this winter they will be able to open a second section of New Potentials, a program now in its fifth year that has helped 12 students earn their high school diplomas; seven of those students went on to college. Although this is a small program that many people in the school district are unaware of, New Potentials is becoming a quiet success.

New Potentials is part of Walled Lake's adult education program, with one significant difference. It is geared specifically to teenagers, high school drop-outs between 16 and 19 who want to earn their diplomas but who have a difficult time in a traditional school setting.

And while New Potentials concentrates exclusively on five academic areas, it is anything but a traditional classroom.

The program currently has 27 students. They come from the Walled Lake and Huron Valley school districts and as far away as Clarkston. The students meet daily in the Union Lake Jaycees' Paul Bunyan building, where they study English, math, American history, psychology and science in two-hour blocks from 8:30 a.m. to 12:30 p.m.

Now the program is financed with state funds through the Huron Valley School District. Because Walled Lake does not qualify for much of that state

aid, it belongs to a consortium with Huron Valley and together the two school systems run such programs as New Potentials, using state funds.

But state funding allocations are tied to fourth Friday counts of student population, and most state funds for this school year have already been allocated by school districts. Since New Potentials' funding is based on the number of students attending on the fourth Friday of the school year, the program could not receive new funds for winter term if a second session is created.

However, Beers says, Walled Lake and Huron Valley are currently looking over their adult education budget for the winter and adding a second program is "within the realm of possibility."

He said a few of the 87 adult education credit classes slated for winter term could be eliminated and the money used to help fund New Potentials — if the interest is there.

Interest in New Potentials seems to be picking up, a fact Christiansen attributes mostly to tough economic times in Michigan.

"Most of the kids who come here know they have to get a high school diploma nowadays in order to get any kind of a job," she says. "I think (interest has increased) because of the way the economy is. I don't think we have any magic touch, although we have learned a lot."

The program is limited to 25 students, but this semester there are 27 students signed up and none had decided to drop out by the sixth week of class. Usually if

The x-ray facilities were unable to detect drugs or chemicals, but would have identified foreign metallic objects.

Over at Village Oaks Elementary there was overwhelming response to a party from 6-8 p.m. Sunday planned as an alternative to trick-or-treating.

The event was paid for through ticket sales and some funds from the Village Oaks Homeowners Association.

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# Bob Evans site plan deadlocks planning board

I don't feel there's any suggestion that Bob Evans would adversely affect the surrounding area, we believe we comply with the ordinance and are entitled to final site plan approval."

City Planning Consultant Charles Cairns said the site plan conformed with the technical aspects of the ordinance but refused to make a recommendation on the compatibility of the building design to the surrounding area.

Cairns advised the board that there's little question "the western architectural design and wood facade materials are different from the contemporary architecture and brick facades of existing buildings near the site," but said he is not a professional architect and not qualified to render a professional opinion as to the architectural compatibility of the proposed restaurant.

The planners' discussion centered on the compatibility of the restaurant with the surrounding area.

Planner Joseph Brett noted that architectural compatibility is being used more and more frequently each year as a tool of planning boards to achieve objectives. "I think the key phrase with this plan is 'out of character,'" and I do believe it's out of character with the surrounding buildings in this area," he said.

Planners Kenneth Albers and Lee Mamola expressed similar thoughts.

Albers said approving the Bob Evans plan would set a precedent that "any type of architecture would be harmonious" in the regional center area. "If we approve this," he added, "we would be hard-pressed to say that anything which comes in is not harmonious."

Mamola suggested the site plan may create a potential traffic hazard on

Sheraton Oaks Drive and said the restaurant was incompatible in terms of building ratios and materials.

"Buildings in the area have a horizontal character of a 1:3 ratio but this restaurant is vertical in nature and has a 1:9 ratio," said Mamola.

He also said the restaurant is essentially clad in a wood product that is a cheaper application than existing buildings which have "brick-skin exteriors" and may be adversely affected.

Additionally, Brett suggested the entire restaurant may be a violation of the city's sign ordinance. Noting that Bob Evans representatives maintain the building design is "our logo," Brett said he believes there are merchants who would have liked to take advantage of "flamboyant materials" to draw attention to themselves.

"But they didn't," he added. "They chose to comply and I think this (Bob

Evans restaurant) will have an adverse effect on existing merchants if we allow the standards to be lowered."

Planners James Hoskinson and Peter Romanow took different positions. Hoskinson said simply that he had not heard evidence that the proposed restaurant would adversely affect the surrounding area, while Romanow said he did not think the restaurant would injure the existing buildings.

"There are places it would not fit in," said Romanow. "It wouldn't fit in next to the proposed (Novi) Hilton, but I think it's all right in this particular place."

Board Chairman Donald Gleason argued that the site plan application was incomplete, while Planner Philip Manning took the legal position that the site plan should have been reviewed under the original ordinance.

Hyman maintained that the board was dealing in areas of aesthetics and

subjectivity. He said seven different architects would probably have seven different opinions as to the quality of the building design and its relative compatibility.

"Many architects feel variety is important to the urban landscape," he said. "I don't suggest that Michelangelo designed our building, but if the Rome City Council had said the painting he was doing on the ceiling of the Sistine Chapel did not conform to surrounding buildings, the world would have been denied a great piece of art."

The board subsequently failed to approve separate motions to recommend approval and denial of the Bob Evans plans on 4-3 votes. Brett, Albers and Mamola voted consistently for a recommendation of denial, while Hoskinson, Manning and Romanow voted consistently for a recommendation of approval. Gleason took the position that the site plan application was incomplete and voted against both recommendations.

The board ultimately voted 4-3 to send the site plan to the council for final approval "without recommendation."

## Oldest Northville store changes with the times

The Dom Perignon champagne vintage 1928 displayed on the counter of The Liquor Shoppe at 115 East Main in Northville doesn't have a price tag on it because it isn't for sale.

Proprietor Jim Spagnuolo explains it was given to him by the grandfather for whom he was named before his death in 1961.

The elder Spagnuolo had bought the business in 1918. Known as the oldest in downtown Northville, it initially was a grocery store and later, under son Joe Spagnuolo, became a package liquor store known as Spagy's.

The fine champagne resting on the new brass-top counter is symbolic of the complete renovation of the 64 year old family business that Jim Spagnuolo is buying from his father.

When his grandfather bought the business, it was located at 113 East Main. Early this year the original owner's grandson made plans to move one

door east to a building the family also owns to gain added storage space. The move became a total renovation indicated in the name change to The Liquor Shoppe.

In addition to the gleaming brass counters, there is a tile floor and all-new display counters holding expanded lines of liquor and assortments of party snacks.

The renovation included a new back entry for both customers and deliveries as well as a redesigned facade.

"We're really pleased," Jim Spagnuolo said last week after the store's grand opening October 23.

He said that he and his father hadn't contemplated the expansion initially and, the year before, had been planning to "pick up and move."

It was the improvement the Mainstreet '78 renovation brought to the downtown that caused the Spagnuolos to plan their own remodeling. Jim

## Northville store keeps pace with times

Spagnuolo says. "We decided to flow with the town," he adds, saying he's pleased with the decision because "Northville's on its way."

Admitting the change was needed to be competitive, the younger Spagnuolo credits Northville resident Donald Fee for the redesigned exteriors and the new layout of the store, which includes a separate wine shop at the rear.

"Without his help, we couldn't have visualized this," he says. The work was done by Jack Scrivens of Oakland Hills Building Company. Scrivens personally built the brass-top counters, Spagnuolo points out.

Total cost of the renovation will be about \$80,000, says Spagnuolo.

He is the first local businessman to take advantage of the city's program to loan funds at low interest for facade improvements to businesses in the downtown development district. The project is part of the Wayne County Community Development Block Grant Program.

The interest free loans of \$2,000 are designed to help local businesses get started with facade renovations. They are being offered as a result of the block grant allocation for this use by city council. About 25 are available, but businesses must make application by December 3.

Jim Spagnuolo already has made application and

says City Manager Steven Walters reports it is in order.

"We're really pleased," he reiterates, pointing out that the expansion also is an upgrading. "We've been trying especially to upgrade the wines," he explains.

Jim's grandfather was born in Italy in 1887 and came to this country in 1903 at age 16. He came to Northville in 1915 and worked for three years for the Detroit Railway as a section hand.

He purchased the business from a second cousin, Frank Cascerelli, in 1916 and bought the building facing on an unpaved Main Street two years later from Frank Wilcox — at a cost of \$4,000. It is considered the oldest of all downtown buildings.

Before his death, founder Joe Spagnuolo reminisced, relating that the store sold candy, good

fruit and vegetables. It also had a soda fountain. During the remodeling, an early scale from the grocery operation was discovered. It now sits decoratively on the front counter.

The original Spagnuolo owner and his second wife Josephine, whom he married in 1934, lived in an apartment above the store. His widow still does.

Noting that there have been rumors that the expansion would include reviving the grocery business, Jim Spagnuolo is quick to point out it's not true.

His focus is on expanded liquor lines and good wines, he declares.

While the Dom Perignon of 1928 vintage isn't for sale, Jim does have French Bollinger champagne vintage 1964 available at \$190 a bottle as well as a gift package of Perrier Jouet champagne of 1976 — complete with two glasses for \$75.
