

Teacher suspended, court date adjourned

Novi teacher Russell G. Gardner, who faces criminal charges in connection with a fire at the school administration building, has been suspended with pay from all teaching responsibilities including extracurricular activities, according to Superintendent Robert Piwko.

Gardner is charged with the burning of real property and breaking and

entering with intent to commit arson in connection with the December 23 fire.

His examination on the two felony counts, scheduled for January 3, has been postponed until January 21.

Piwko said Gardner was notified verbally of his suspension December 24 and has since received formal notification.

The suspension with pay was carried out in accordance with provisions of the teacher tenure act which states the

superintendent shall "suspend for cause" and report that action to the board of education, Piwko indicated.

"Under the law this must be done with pay," Piwko said.

Regarding the possibility of further disciplinary action against Gardner, Piwko said, the teacher tenure act does not specify the length of a suspension or when the school board must conduct a tenure hearing.

"We're proceeding according to the

advice of legal counsel," Piwko said.

Although the Novi School Board will meet in a regular session at 7:30 p.m. Thursday in the school administration building, Piwko said he did not expect the alleged incident would be discussed.

"I would not anticipate any discussion taking place," Piwko said. "The board is not in the position to discuss this since tenure charges have not been brought (against Gardner.)"

Piwko also said there would be an in-

formational report to the board explaining the suspension with pay has occurred. "I anticipate that will be the extent of the discussion."

He said he further expects legal counsel will advise board members not to discuss the matter "in public or at any time."

However, parents and supporters are expected to turn out Thursday to urge the board to reinstate Gardner. Marlene Spielman reported petitions

have been passed through the community and will be presented to the board Thursday.

Spielman said the gist of the petitions is that: "although no one condones what he is alleged to have done, he should not be prejudged and should have his day in court. He should be able to teach until he has his day in court."

Spielman could not estimate the

Cause of van fire unknown

It was "just by chance" that Debra Meyers looked outside her home at 1275 East Lake Drive last Tuesday afternoon — and happened to see the 1973 Ford van in the driveway burst into flames.

"I was just looking out the window to see how the wind was blowing, it was such a windy day," she said. "I saw smoke coming from under the hood."

Meyers said she and her husband, David, who had returned from Detroit in the van about a half hour earlier, "heard a loud noise" and saw flames shooting out from under the van toward the house.

Fearing the van would explode or ignite their home, Meyers said she and her husband took their three children and family pet next door and called the fire department.

The van was "pretty well involved," by the time an engine from Novi's Fire Station 1 arrived 18 minutes later, reported Fire Chief Arthur Lenaghan.

Lenaghan admitted that the response time was "exceptionally long," but explained that a truck from the closer Fire Station 2 was unavailable due to the lack of a volunteer driver at that station.

"It's not consistent who we have at the station, it depends on the time of day and the day of the week," he explained.

Lenaghan noted that he and several other firefighters made it to the scene before the fire engine arrived.

The cause of the blaze is listed as "undetermined," but Lenaghan said it started in the van's engine area. "A major portion of damage is in the engine and cab area," he said.

He reported the van as "extensively damaged" by the fire.

Boat capsizes; man is missing

A 24-year-old Farmington Hills man is missing and presumed dead after the boat in which he was riding capsized on Walled Lake on New Year's Day.

A second man was rescued when neighbors heard his cries for help and rowed a boat through the icy water to pluck him from the bow of the capsized craft.

The search for the missing man's body, called off Monday due to freezing weather conditions, was expected to resume later this week.

The missing man, John O. Henslee and his brother-in-law, John G. Foley, 22, of Farmington Hills, dressed in heavy clothes and snowmobile boots, reportedly went fishing for approximately five hours in a small aluminum boat on the lake early Saturday afternoon.

They parked in the parking lot of World of Wood Heat and launched their boat from the shore.

After fishing all afternoon, Foley reported he was operating the boat at full throttle returning to shore when it tipped over for an unknown reason.

Police reported there were no Coast Guard-approved lifesaving devices on the boat and it was on the water after dark without lights.

When the boat capsized the two men tried to paddle it to shore with their feet, but Henslee apparently lost his grip and went under the water. Foley then climbed onto the bow of the capsized boat and continued his cries for help.

"Henslee was lost when he couldn't hang onto the boat any longer," Novi Police Detective Charles Brown said.

"Foley was rescued by an individual who plucked the man off the capsized hull of the aluminum boat." He had been hanging on the boat approximately 90 minutes, Brown estimated.

Kenneth Rozenboom, 35, rescued Foley after he and his wife Joette of 631 East Lake Drive, Walled Lake, heard cries for help.

After calling Walled Lake police, who notified Novi police of the incident, Rozenboom decided to row out on the lake.

Rozenboom said he had to push his

boat across 65 to 70 yards of ice just thick enough to support him and his boat before he could get the boat into the water and begin rowing toward the voices calling for help.

He said it took a "considerable amount of time" for him to reach the capsized boat.

"I live on the north end of the lake and they were down past Fourteen Mile," he explained. "I was halfway to them when I stopped hearing two voices. It was pitch dark and I couldn't see anything."

After finding the capsized craft, Rozenboom pulled Foley into his boat, wrapped him in his jacket and began to row toward the west shore of the lake, which was closest to where he found the capsized boat.

"I covered (Foley) up and started to row," he said. "About three minutes later he lost consciousness."

Rozenboom began signaling his position with a flashlight to police as he rowed toward shore. He estimates it took "15 or 20 minutes" to reach the west shore of the lake, where he was met by Novi police officers.

"There was a policeman there, I told him to call an ambulance," said Rozenboom. "I was in a state of shock myself ... I was exhausted. I couldn't even help them get (Foley) out of the boat."

Novi police responding to the scene called the fire department to bring flood lights to the lake to help search for the capsized boat. Wixom police also were contacted to obtain use of a helicopter owned by Richard Haggerty.

New program will help Novi's needy

If you've ever been hungry, even once, keep Saturday, January 15, in mind.

That day marks the first "major push" by the newly-established Novi Emergency Food program to collect food items for distribution to Novi's needy, according to Linda Crawford, committee member.

Crawford confirmed that Novi's Faith Community United Presbyterian Church has been chosen as central collection point for donations, and that the Novi Library also will serve as a donation drop-off point. "We'll be collecting non-perishable items like canned and boxed foods, and will also take cash donations," she said.

The Novi Emergency Food program is part of a county-wide effort to establish food relief centers coordinated by the Oakland County Emergency Operating Center.

According to an Emergency Operating Center spokesperson, the Novi food program and others in the county like it have come about as a response to former governor William Milliken's declaration of southeastern Michigan as a "financial disaster area," which has created a "food emergency."

Crawford said the food collection and distribution effort now under way will continue indefinitely, "until the emergency is over."

A committee of community leaders has been set up to steer the food program. Members include Chairperson Dick Henderson, Police Chief Lee

BeGole, Assistant City Manager Craig Klaver, Carol Ann Donnelly of FISH, Tom Sumiec of the Jaycees, Bill Charles of the Civil Air Patrol and Crawford.

"Anyone (else) who wants to volunteer, we'd be glad to take the help," Crawford said. Help is needed in sorting and delivering food and doing clerical work, she said.

The food program also will seek collection and distribution aid from civic organizations, schools and churches, Crawford said. "We're going to ask them to get behind this group and gather as much food as they can," she said.

Those who wish to donate food should bring it to Faith Community Church on January 15 or can drop it off Monday through Friday from 9 a.m. to 3 p.m., beginning immediately. Food can be dropped off at the library during library hours.

Those who wish to volunteer should contact Crawford or Dick Henderson at 349-5666.

Those who need food also should contact Crawford or Henderson.

Crawford said she hoped most people needing food can pick it up themselves at the church, but added that the Civil Air Patrol Cadets have agreed to help with deliveries.

Crawford noted that, if more food is collected in Novi than can be used here, it will be distributed to other, needier areas. "I don't think we'll have any problem getting food donations and community support in Novi," she said.

House sizes linked to interest rates

The fury regarding the downsizing of houses in Novi during 1982 may be resolved in part by a continued decline in interest rates and a general improvement in the economy, according to City Planning Consultant Charles Cairns.

"A decline in interest rates will do more to spur construction of larger-sized homes than anything else," observed Cairns at a recent meeting of the Novi Planning Board.

Inherent in Cairns' assertion is a fundamental belief that people generally prefer to live in larger homes on larger lots if economic circumstances permit.

As evidence, Cairns pointed to Novi's experiences with residential construction during the decade of 1970-79.

The first years of the decade were marked by construction of large homes in the Village Oaks subdivision. The

majority of Village Oaks homes were developed under the R-4 zoning district which requires 80-foot lots of 10,000 square feet. The R-4 district is now the smallest of the single-family zoning districts in Novi.

The advent of the oil embargo in the mid-70s had a significant impact on the housing industry in Novi, Cairns stated. Instead of single family homes, the city was beset with numerous requests for construction of multiples.

When the economy stabilized several years later, the single-family market came back strong and led to construction of such subdivisions as Turtle Creek and Whispering Meadows.

Turtle Creek and Whispering Meadows are primarily R-3 subdivisions with 90-foot lots of 12,000 square feet.

In many instances, Cairns observed, the first residents in those subdivisions

were families which originally had located in Village Oaks.

The reason, he suggested, was that the homes in the newer subdivisions were slightly larger and had slightly larger lots.

"People like larger homes on larger lots," he said. "That's what they're going to buy if they can afford to do so. The history of residential construction is intrinsically related to the economic climate."

Support for Cairns' assertion that lower interest rates will spur construction of larger homes was expressed by Planner Peter Romanow.

Noting parallels between the automotive and housing industries, Romanow said the major reason people are buying small cars instead of large cars at the present time is the economy.

"The only reason people buy small cars is they can't afford to feed big

cars," said Romanow. "It's the same thing with houses."

"People will sacrifice a great deal to get the type of house they want," added Planner Joseph Brett. "If they can afford it, they'll opt for a larger home almost every time."

Concern about the downsizing of homes in Novi during the past year has been spearheaded by Nancy Covert, a president of a small group of concerned citizens which calls itself PLAN (People Looking After Novi).

Covert told the planning board recently that the concept people will not buy large homes anymore is "ludicrous."

"The home is still the center for all family activities," she commented. "I don't believe people are willing to give up the amenities associated with a larger home which is a part of the American Dream."

News announces a price increase

"It's with reluctance, but we must cover our costs," said Jack Hoffman, general manager of Sliger/Livingston Publications, in announcing that the price of this newspaper was increased Monday, January 3.

"We recognize that people are being pinched financially," Hoffman said, "but we are feeling the same pinch and thus the need for the price increase."

Property study causes concern

Concerned that a study grant requested by the City of Novi might affect the school district's efforts to sell the Novi Elementary property, the Novi Board of Education has asked city representatives to explain the grant request to tomorrow night's (January 6) board meeting.

In December, school trustees learned the city was applying for a grant from the National Endowment for the Arts to study the Town Center area, how the property in the area could best be used, under existing conditions and how a possible ring road would affect land there.

The school district owns 11.3 acres of land there, which has been for sale for several years. Trustees recently stepped up marketing efforts in hopes of selling the property.

Community Development Director John Hazelroth had been slated to explain the city's request for a \$30,000 matching funds grant to trustees December 16, but did not arrive at the meeting. Hazelroth later said he thought the meeting was scheduled for December 17, the same day as the deadline for the city's grant application.

Because the board recently began a process of seeking marketing proposals and appraisal information on the Novi Elementary property, trustees were upset at the short notice given by the city and worried that they would be wasting time and money by following

through with the marketing attempts.

As a result of their concern, Trustee Robert Schram suggested the schools withdraw a letter of support for the city's grant request, but other board members felt that was not a politically wise decision. Trustee Ron Milam said it "wouldn't do any harm by supporting it," adding, "we've waited so long anyway" to sell the land.

However, like Schram, trustees voiced concern at what conducting a study stretching out for several months, possibly more than a year, would do to their efforts to sell the property.

Board President Joel Colliu said the possibility of the city obtaining a study grant, which would not be announced until next June, could provide a "significant impact" on the sale of the property.

"All the developers have said they would not guarantee purchase of the land without knowing they'd get an okay from the city boards (for the plans) first," he said.

Colliu suggested that the city undertake a study over the next year, the plan commission might be unwilling to approve any plans for development in that area while the study was underway — meaning no real changes would occur during that period.

Milam agreed, saying the city had "affected the appraisal process by this. Any developer has to base his recommendations (to the school board) on what the plan commission will do and

Walled Lake hires assistant super

The Walled Lake School District has gone to Rochester, New York, to find a new assistant superintendent for business.

Superintendent Don Sheldon reported last week that Russell B. Wright, 37, has been hired to take over as the district's chief financial officer.

The appointment is scheduled to be presented to the Walled Lake school board January 10 and Wright is slated to begin duties January 17.

Wright currently serves as assistant to the vice president for financial affairs at Rochester Institute of Technology in Rochester, New York. He also serves as business manager for Eisenhower College, a branch of Rochester Institute of Technology.

Wright was selected for the Walled Lake position from a field of more than 80 candidates, according to Sheldon.

He replaces Harry Carlson who announced his retirement in July after 30 years of service with the Walled Lake School District. Carlson's last day of service was September 30, Paul Martini

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Planned health facility fights for certification

Is there a hospital in Commerce Township's future?

The answer to that depends on who is giving out the information regarding the proposed \$44 million hospital on Steeth Road in Commerce Township.

Huron Valley Hospital, Inc. (HVH) the group behind the proposed hospital, said a local hospital is needed because acute, primary care facilities are 30 minutes away in Pontiac.

Several governmental health agencies oppose the plan on the grounds that existing medical facilities can adequately serve the area.

Opposition to the hospital began in 1977 when the Michigan Department of Public Health (MDPH) denied a certificate of need (CON) to the then \$14.7 million project. The project was turned down on the basis that it was not consistent with projections of the Michigan State Plan for Hospital and Medical Facilities Construction.

That state plan showed that Commerce Township, as a part of the Pontiac hospital service area, contained an excess of hospital services.

Ralph Wiese, chairperson of the board of trustees for the proposed hospital, said at the time that the decision was unreasonable because federal guidelines mandated reasonable distribution of hospital services and facilities.

The Michigan State Health Facilities Commission upheld the MDPH decision. HVH then appealed to the Oakland County Circuit Court which ruled in favor of the hospital.

Huron Valley Hospital Inc. has been involved in a steady parade of legal skirmishes since the denial of the original CON.

A petition to intervene to halt construction on the hospital was sought by the Comprehensive Health Planning Council of Southeastern Michigan, a federally mandated planning agency which seven county jurisdiction includes Oakland County.

The motion to intervene was denied December 15 by Oakland County Circuit Court Judge Francis X. O'Brien.

Terrence Carroll, executive director of the planning agency, said the agency has opposed construction of the hospital on the grounds that the proposed medical facility is not needed in that particular area.

Carroll maintains that the CON was granted to HVH by the courts based on a procedural error by MDPH.

"We have an obligation to plan medical care in such a way that will be done in the most cost-effective manner. What we have here is a group of individuals who believe that they should be allowed to flout the restrictions."

Carroll said that all the funds for the proposed hospital are slated to be borrowed. "I'm not at all confident that the whole operation will be viable. Medicare and Medicaid will eventually have to reimburse the project."

Jay Eldridge, a member of the board of trustees of HVH, said plans are progressing with the preparation of HVH. "We hope to break ground in spring. We are not surprised at the opposition, but we are disappointed. There is definitely a need for such a facility in the area and the preponderance of funds will come from bonds."

The latest legal battle involving HVH and the agency will be fought in the Michigan Court of Appeals. HVH has gone to the court to amend its original CON with a request for the addition of another 150 beds to the proposed facility. The health planning agency followed HVH to court with a filing to review the additional beds proposal.

Wixom police injured during domestic fight

Two Wixom police officers were injured during a domestic quarrel between a married couple arguing over the custody of their 18-month-old son.

Police Officer Bruce Kirby received injuries to the knee and lower back, possibly sustaining torn ligaments in one knee, police said. Officer James Osborne suffered a sore knee the following day but did not appear to be seriously injured, police said.

Wixom officers have requested warrants for assault and battery as well as disorderly conduct against a 20-year-old Wixom man in connection with the incident.

According to reports, police were called at about 2 a.m. December 31 at an apartment at the Town and Country complex (formerly Indian Lodge), where a man and woman were fighting. When police arrived, the man reportedly became very loud and stated he would not allow his son to be taken from him.

The man's wife said they began arguing earlier in the night and that her husband grabbed her son and walked out of the apartment, stumbling on the stairs and reportedly falling half-way, police indicated. At that point, officers arrived and a formal arraignment, police said.

While officers separately discussed the matter with the couple, a friend of the husband's gave the couple's son to the wife, which apparently enraged the man, police said. He lunged for his son, but officer Kirby stepped between the pair. The man then allegedly struck Kirby in the chest and pushed him backwards. Kirby restrained the man, who became quite violent, reports said, until Osborne was able to help him handcuff the suspect. The officers wrestled the man to the ground in order to handcuff him, reports said.

The man was then arrested and released pending issuance of warrants and a formal arraignment, police said.

Wood arraigned, trail date not set

Dora Wood of Walled Lake was arraigned December 29 by Oakland County Circuit Judge Robert Anderson on the charge of first-degree murder.

Police, who borrowed a boat from a Department of Natural Resources officer living on the lake, met Rozenboom returning with Poley as they began to row into the lake.

Police reported there have been no further breakthroughs in the ongoing investigation of the matter.

Residents warned of thin ice hazard

Unseasonably warm weather has made lakes and ponds hazardous to youngsters and others anxious to get on the ice this season.

Parents are cautioned that ponds in Village Oaks, Meadowbrook Glens, Stonehenge, Whispering Meadows, Meadowbrook Lake and behind Twelve Oaks Mall are deep enough to pose a hazard to youngsters if they fall through thin ice.

Special caution should be used on Meadowbrook Lake where water is constantly moving because the lake is part of a larger drainage course, making it likely there will be thin spots in the ice, according to city officials.

It takes several days with temperatures below freezing to freeze ice to a safe thickness. Through December and early January the ice may not be frozen to a safe thickness or may be frozen unevenly.

Experts report that ice less than two inches thick is unsafe. Those walking across a lake or retention pond should carry an ice spud—a pole with a blade or spike—which can be used to determine the depth of the ice.

Four to five inches of ice is needed to support small gatherings of people or fishermen on the ice. Experts also note that, although driving trucks or cars on ice is never recommended, those who do so should wait until there is at least eight inches of ice.

A heavy snowfall does not necessarily mean ice is safe. In fact, snow acts as an insulator for ice. The snow and ice also will begin melting when they touch each other.

Because of this melting parents should beware of putting large piles of snow around skating rinks. The melting of the ice and snow, together with the weight of the snow piles, makes the edges of the skating rink the weakest spots on the ice.

It further is recommended that if someone falls through the ice, rescuers should never approach the break. Any available item should be used to reach the victim. The rescuer should lie spread-eagled on the ice while trying to reach the victim.

Water rate hearing set

With three days remaining until a public hearing on water rates for 1983 proposed by the City of Detroit, Novi officials still have not received word regarding the city's position that rates should not be increased.

City Manager Edward Kriewall said he planned to contact Detroit water and sewer department personnel Tuesday before he determines the "posture" he will take at Thursday's public hearing.

"I'll contact them as a matter of procedure. If they are in a position to respond to our request it will determine our posture," Kriewall said.

For 1983, the Detroit Water Board has proposed an 18.8 percent increase in water rates—from \$8.25 per 1,000 feet of water to \$9.80 per 1,000 feet—to become effective July 1.

But Novi's consulting engineers have informed Detroit that according to their calculations water rates in Novi should drop to \$8.21 per 1,000 cubic feet.

The engineers have detailed objections to the calculations used in setting water rates for Novi and have been awaiting a response regarding those objections.

As of Monday neither the city nor the engineers had been contacted regarding Detroit's decision on the rates, although a public hearing on the proposed rates is slated for January 6.

Engineer bids reviewed

Proposals for engineering services for the City of Walled Lake will be heard by a committee of four individuals, who will make a recommendation to the city council on which firm should handle the city's engineering work.

Named to the committee were Council Members Dorothy Dingman and Walter Lewandowski, DPW Superintendent John Nail and City Manager J. Michael Dorman.

Dorman asked a committee be set up to screen proposals, which have been submitted following the council's decision to solicit bids from new companies.

Walled Lake's engineering consultants, Johnson and Anderson, recently filed for reorganization and the city council has been concerned about the quality of work the firm is providing. Council members questioned whether engineering errors were made when Liberty Street was repaved this fall, but decided to put off switching engineers until the roadwork was done. With the completion of Liberty Street (except for a two-inch surface to be applied next spring), council members asked Dorman to solicit bids from qualified engineering firms.

Dorman suggested the committee be set up to help "streamline the process so we don't have to hear an endless stream of proposals."

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Man charged with assault in bar

Wixom police are seeking warrants for felonious assault against a man accused of attempting to hit another man with a tire iron at the Red Oaks Bar December 29.

The accused man was struck by another bar patron with a pool cue stick and held until police arrived, reports stated.

According to witnesses' reports, the man allegedly entered the bar early in the evening and asked patrons if anyone wanted to play pool, but no one was interested, police said. The man then allegedly began talking to a woman at the bar and began arguing with her son, who told the man to leave him alone. The barmaid then advised the man to leave, police said.

According to reports, several bar patrons helped the woman's son push the man out of the bar.

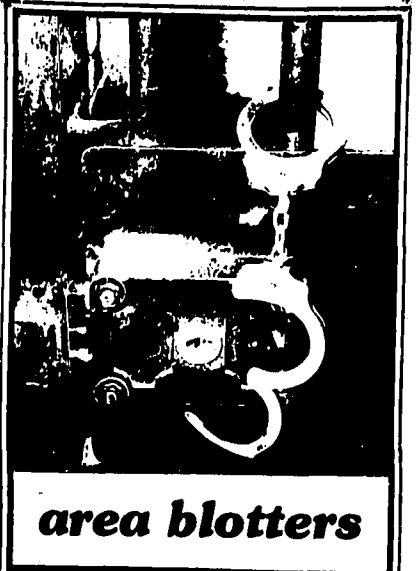
About 20 minutes later, witnesses said, the man re-entered the bar and again asked if anyone wanted to play pool. The man was asked to leave and refused service, police said.

Seventeen of the 93 existing businesses are in West Bloomfield. Clogged traffic, narrow roads, inadequate sidewalks and excessive signs, according to the plan, could be phased out over the next several years.

"Union Lake is essentially developed," observed Howard Dell, chairman of the West Bloomfield Planning Commission. "It's the desire of merchants to upgrade it."

West Bloomfield Planner Bruce Berghoff said the cooperation eventually could become a model for working with Keego Harbor, Sylvan Lake and possibly even Orchard Lake on areas adjacent to the township.

Bird hopes the amendment committee will have a preliminary ordinance ready for the full commission in March. "Developing in an irregular pattern," the 120-page study notes, "the district still contains vacant land parcels with strong retail or office development potential."

"As the residential hinterland continues to develop, it is likely the pressure for development will increase. Nearly 70 residences are located within the business district which should be phased out or protected from encroaching commercial uses."

Novi spikers shoot for KVC title

Can Novi make a serious run at the Kensington Valley Conference (KVC) volleyball championship with just eight players?
They can as far as Rick Trudeau, coach of the Novi squad, is concerned. "Winning the KVC title is one goal he believes can be attained this season."
"I'm looking for the best. I think we can possibly win the conference," Trudeau predicted.
"I base that on a couple of things. We ended up third in the KVC last year. Of course, Brighton and Howell will be strong. Near the end of last year, they were ranked ninth and 10th, respectively in Class A," he continued.

This year's Wildcat squad also has a lot of experience and has worked together as a team for a long time, according to Trudeau.
Two key players on the 1983 edition of the Wildcat team are senior Wendy Kaercher and junior Missy Halton, a KVC honorable mention pick last year. Trudeau believes they are the team's top two hitters.
"The 5-10 1/2 Kaercher has been on the varsity three years and has been a

starter for two years. The 5-6 Halton has been with the varsity since her freshman year.
Senior Carolyn Lowery is another varsity veteran. The 5-6 defensive specialist has been under Trudeau's guidance since her freshman season. "She makes very few mistakes. She's a good passer and she's aggressive," Trudeau noted.

"Beckman is another defensive specialist. She was our best server last season and plays well in the back row,"

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As We See It

Quality program is best P.R. tool

Walled Lake school board members will be sitting down with administrators later this month to develop a list of goals and objectives for the coming year.

One of the objectives that seems certain to develop out of the discussions is an increased emphasis on public relations.

Improved public relations has long been seen by administrators and board members alike as a primary need for the Walled Lake Schools and the fact of the matter is that a program to improve public perception of the district already is in place.

Sami Alam, director of planning and program evaluation, outlined a "Walled Lake Marketing Plan" at the December board meeting, noting that the time has come for public education to come to the realization that it has to start selling itself.

Although no one is suggesting that public education is an endangered species, it's also true that public education faces major threats at the current time.

Taxpayers across the country have been turning thumbs down on requests for millage increases with increasing regularity for the past five years. As unions continue to seek higher and higher wages for employees, the degree of resentment from individuals who have been laid off or have taken pay cuts in light of the current economic climate has increased, finding its logical expression at the ballot box.

The growth of private educational facilities and the possible advent of tuition tax credits for private schools will only add to the fiscal woes faced by public schools.

And, finally, the declining birth rate also has had a serious impact on public education. Less than 50 percent of the population now has school-aged children — and individuals who are already strapped financially will find it difficult to vote for millage increases when they can see no direct benefit to themselves.

Stick to standards

The best solution to concerns regarding downsizing of homes in Novi rests in economic recovery, according to City Planning Consultant Charles Cairns. We suspect he's right.

Concerns about the downsizing of residences was one of the major issues to develop in Novi during 1982 as residents of larger homes expressed fears that construction of significantly smaller homes in their subdivisions would have an adverse impact on the compatibility of their neighborhoods.

For the past two years now, we have received press releases from Realtors' associations regarding the need to downsize housing. The housing industry is just like the automotive industry, they argued — people currently can't afford to buy big houses any more than they can afford to buy big cars.

Although we have no quarrel with that argument, we also are convinced the current state of the housing industry is temporary and the demand for larger homes on larger lots will return with economic recovery.

Revenue shortages have already had a strong negative impact on the Walled Lake Schools. Counseling and library services have been cut severely, antiquated textbooks are still being used in the classrooms because the district is unable to afford more current books... the examples go on and on.

We offer the following thoughts for school officials to consider when they sit down in the weeks ahead to establish goals and objectives.

First, we concur with the need to improve public relations. Superintendent Don Sheldon frequently notes that many good things are happening in the Walled Lake Schools, and he's correct. Getting out the news about these positive achievements will create a more favorable impression about the district in the minds of residents.

Related to this is the need for school board members to take a long, hard look at the job they are doing to promote a positive image of the district. Despite some improvement in board relations over the past 18 months, there's much room for additional improvement.

All too frequently, board meetings give rise to petty bickering and grandstanding that reflect poorly on the district as a whole.

Finally, serious consideration should be given to establishing programs which will involve a broader spectrum of the community in the schools. If institutions of public education are to earn the support of a significant percentage of the population, they must develop programs which will provide direct benefits to those individuals.

There is no question that the Walled Lake Schools will benefit from improved public relations. But public relations are only part of the picture; equally, if not more, important is the need for the type of programming which will create "satisfied customers" in the community at large.

Trends in housing tend to be cyclical. Anyone who has followed housing trends for the past decade can attest to the fact that strong demand for single-family housing in the early 1970s was replaced almost completely by construction of multiple-family residences in the mid-70s.

The cry at that time was that condominiums are the wave of the future — the single-family housing market will never return to its former status. Those cries were proven wrong just a few short years later as single-family construction returned stronger than ever during the final years of the 1970s.

We are sympathetic with residents' concerns about compatibility of neighborhoods and believe the city should pursue measures to promote internal compatibility.

At the same time, the city should stick to its guns on housing regulations. Despite predictions to the contrary, we are confident the demand for larger homes will return with economic recovery.

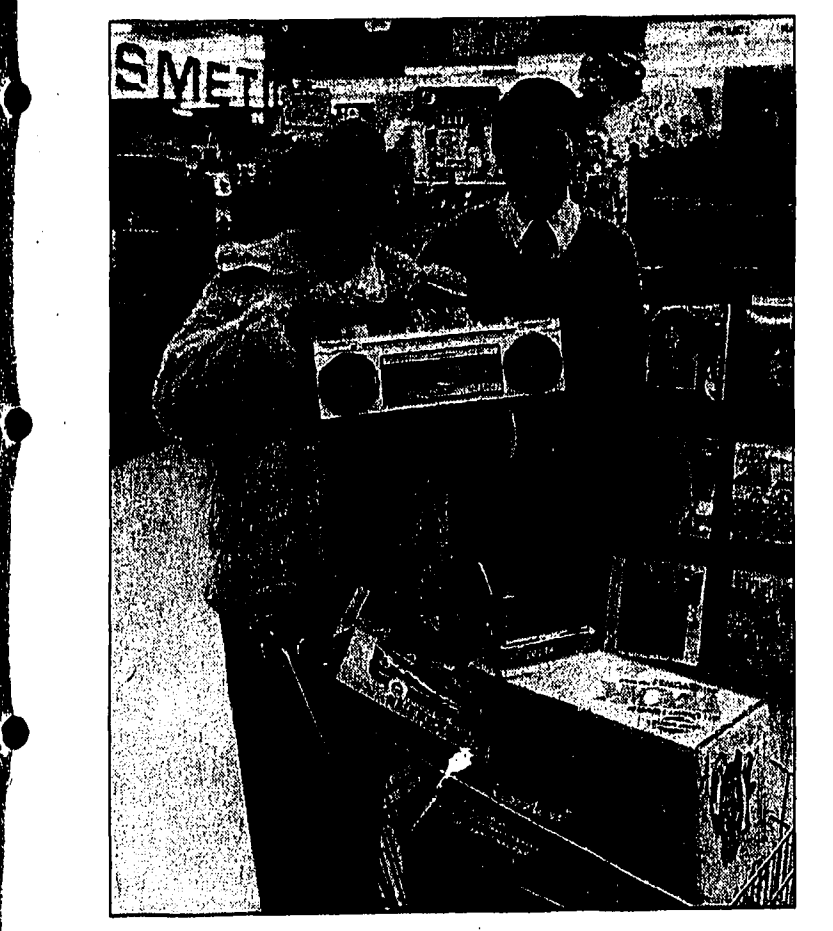

Food prices decrease

Declines in food prices are reported for November on the U.S. Government price index. The average retail price declined for 42 items, increased for 27 items and was unchanged for three items.

Transportation package hikes car taxes

Just as some people said it would be impossible in a lame-duck legislative session, the finishing touches were put on a transportation package that will raise \$875 million over the next three years.

The action was taken during the waning hours of the final days of the 61st legislature.

The additional revenue would be raised through an increase in the current weight tax on presently registered vehicles.

The gasoline tax provides for two years of gas tax hikes tied to the rise in the federal highway maintenance index.

Increases would be capped at two cents per gallon per year, meaning a maximum gas tax of 15 cents a gallon by 1984 compared to the current state excise tax of 11 cents per gallon.

The gas tax, effective January 1, will itself raise an estimated \$372 million over three years.

Passenger vehicle registrations will increase 15 percent on February 1 while commercial vehicles will see an immediate increase of 30 percent as of January 1.

For new vehicles, purchased on or after October 1, 1983, registration would be computed on a value formula.

The tax would be 4 percent on the purchase price of the vehicle with the registration fee being reduced by 10 percent each year for three years.

After the third year, the fee would be frozen at that amount.

As older vehicles are taken out of service, the weight tax would ultimately be phased out, but until then, the weight tax will be indexed to increase in the state personal income until 1985.

The registration adjustment is expected to raise some \$156.4 million over the three-year period.

To aid public transportation systems, changes were made in the allocation of the auto-related sales tax revenues and the amount going from the highway fund to comprehensive transportation.

Increases of the current 4.3 percent allocation of highway fund money to comprehensive transportation is 10 percent. The increased allocation would raise \$23.2 million for comprehensive transportation over the three-year period.

The comprehensive transportation fund would also receive an increased allocation from the auto-related sales tax that goes to the general fund.

Currently, the fund received 27.9 percent of the tax revenue. This would be increased to 53 percent in 1983, 46 percent in 1984, and 57 percent in 1985.

Any loss to the state's general fund as a result of the shift is expected to be replaced by federal funds under a congressional rewrite of the federal gasoline tax package.

The package was drastically reduced from the original recommendation of Governor William Milliken who originally proposed a program that would have raised approximately \$2 billion over the same three-year period.

That plan was compromised when it became impossible to gain legislative approval for new taxes on some services and amusements.

The \$575 million package will provide immediate money for the state to make necessary road and bridge repair and provide state matching money for federal funds for similar uses and public transportation systems around the state.
