A Novi teacher will stand trial in Oakland County Circuit Court on two ministration Building.

Once Gardner was apprehended he made statements to Hesse without being questioned, according to the officer. Hesse said he advised Gardner he would not discuss the matter until he had been read his rights.

Despite the warning, Hesse said Gardner continued to make statements such as, "Let's talk about this" and "I don't know why I did it." Hesse testified. "He kept apologizing for 'doing it."



Testimony in Thursday's examination came primarily from Phaffenhausen's father, Victor, who reportedly was in the home at the time of the shooting.

• The elder Phaffenhausen testified he and his partner, Martin, had been looking for materials for a construction job when they stopped at the home for lunch.

They heard music, indicating Jose was at home, the father testified, but his son did not greet them. They sat down at the kitchen table, with the father's back to the door and Martin

Police Officer Karen Smedley, who responded to the incident, reported when Jose was questioned he said he had "been playing with his father's gun and was not familiar with guns. I asked why he pulled the trigger and he said 'I was nervous I guess,"' Smedley testified.

Prosecutor Edwards attempted to show Jose was upset because his father had asked him to move out of the house.

The father indicated that during the second week of June he had given his son $2\frac{1}{2}$ months to move out of the house. But under questioning from the defense attorney, he said his son had moved out for two days and then returned home with his parents' permission.

After Sabota challenged the relevancy of Edwards' questions about windows found open in the home at the time of the shooting, the prosecutor explained she was pursuing a "transferred intent" theory.

Building moratorium considered

A temporary halt on the issuance of residential building permits is being considered by Novi officials at the request of residents living in partiallydeveloped subdivisions.

Council members voted Monday to send to the planning board for consideration a proposed ordinance establishing a three month building moratorium.

However, several council members cautioned residents that sending the proposed moratorium to the planning board should not necessarily be interpreted as support for the measure.

The residential moratorium would be in effect while planners and council members consider two amendments to the zoning ordinance drafted to deal with the resident concerns that incompatible housing will be built in their

As a result, Fried told the council if it decides to proceed with a building moratorium an ordinance should be adopted prohibiting the building official from issuing permits during the life of the ordinance.

One resident asked what the city had to lose in enacting a moratorium. Fried responded that the city could be liable for damages if a builder wants 10 building permits and he wins a court test on the matter. Damages would be paid from the general fund, he said.



Wixom's share of an "interim financing agreement" for the so-called "Super Sewer" project has gone up \$4,075 from \$133,000 to \$137,075. The increase was approved January 11 by the Wixom City Council. Mayoral Assistant Stephen Bonczek said the cost increase was created by a reduction in the number of communities participating in the \$461,000 interim financing agreement to cover engineering, legal and financial work. Walled Lake has decided not to participate in the project, while Livonia was dropped from the financing agree-

ment because of its nominal design and cost impact on the Super Sewer project. Duane Egeland, managing director of the Wayne County Public Works Department which has fostered the regional sewer system for years, said Livonia could be added to the project at a future date.

"Super Sewer" is the nickname of the Huron Valley Wastewater Control System, a \$210 million sewage treatment plant and interceptor running roughly parallel to the I-275 freeway from western Oakland County to where the Huron River flows into Lake Erie. Some 17 communities remain in the project, including Novi, Wixom and Commerce Township in Oakland Coun-

Meanwhile, efforts to push the project beyond the design stage have received a boost through the endorsement of newly-elected Wayne County Executive William Lucas.

In announcing his support, Lucas said he was aware of concerns that construction of Super Sewer might result in out-migration from older communities but was satisfied that this problem has been adequately addressed.

"The populations proposed to be served by the project are in conformance with moderate SEMCOG projections representing essentially inevitable population movement," Lucas said. Wixom's City Council decided to participate in the Super Sewer project in December. Wixom's sewage currently is processed at its Charms Road Wastewater Treatment Plant, but the city has been ordered by the Department of Natural Resources (DNR) to

upgrade the Charms Road plant due to hosophorous discharge into Kent City officials contend that participation in Super Sewer is less costly than

Village debates dispatch service

Midnight police dispatching: The issue is alive and kicking again in Wolverine Lake. Wolverine Lake Council President Tim Kozub has been conferring with officials in Novi and Milford on the possibility of obtaining midnight police dispatch service and other police support services.

 A special meeting is slated for 7:30 p.m. next Wednesday (February 2) to discuss police dispat-

Kozub's talks with Novi and Milford stem from a request by the City of Walled Lake to put an 11-yearold informal agreement to supply midnight dispatching into a legal and binding contract.

In December, the village council rejected on a 6-0 • vote Walled Lake's proposal to consolidate village and city dispatching. Geri Matkowski abstained from the vote.

The Walled Lake City Council, which earlier authorized City Manager J. Michael Dornan to make a proposal for combined dispatching, directed Dornan to have a contract drawn up to spell out the city's responsibilities and liabilities to the village for midnight dispatch. The city asked the village to comply with the contract request by February 5. That direction and subsequent talks between illage and city officials - including Kozub and

Dornan and police chiefs from both municipalities prompted Kozub to begin seeking information rom other nearby communities willing to provide midnight dispatch At the January 19 special council meeting, Kozub



be allocated to set up a second computer lab. They would then be used to teach basic and advanced computer and would give the high school an opportunity to schedule more computer classes, which are now overloaded with students. Adding a second lab would open computer classes to 10th graders, Piwko added, since the courses are now open only to juniors and seniors.

ninth graders face, Piwko added, administrators did not foresee the likelihood of opening the classes to freshmen. However, another seven computers would be used

throughout the school in individual teachers' classrooms. Using a technique known as computeraided instruction (CAI), teachers would be allowed to utilize the individual computers - and occassionally the computer lab - to help teach students such subjects as chemistry, math and drafting. Board members objected to Piwko's suggestion that the seven "floating" computers be assigned to specific subject departments, such as counseling, drafting and physics.

"I seriously question the validity of assigning computer to a particular group," stated Board President Joel Colliau.

He said if the computers were specified for use in the counseling department, for example, other staffers would find it difficult to check them out because the departments would feel the computers were theirs and not for general use.

"If we want to buy computers for that, fine, but I want to see it presented as such," Colliau said. "If these are to be used as computer-aided instruction, I want to know how.'

After conferring in a closed session, the school board voted 6-0 to hear charges filed against Gardner with the state tenure commission by Novi Superintendent Robert Piwko. Trustee Norman Miller was absent. The board's action means a tenure hearing must be held not less than 30 days and not more than 45 days after its decision January 20. The board will then have up to 10 days to decide if Gardner should be fired, as well as another five days to notify him of the decision. The process will likely be conducted in closed sessions, which may be done at Gardner's request under the Open Meetings Act. Last week's board decision to hear the tenure charges was made in closed session because Gardner requested it via a letter presented by Cal Schmucker, president of the Novi

Education Association. Gardner was unavailable for comment Tuesday on the charges and neither school officials nor teachers' union spokesmen are willing to divulge the nature of those charges

However, a spokesman for the Michigan Board of Education said a school board is authorized to dismiss a teacher for "just about anything" provided correct procedure is followed. Under the tenure act, a board can for "reasonable and just cause" dismiss a teacher, according to Lauren Harkness of the state board of education office. Most tenure charges then fall into several broad categories such as teacher incompetency, insubordination or conduct unbecoming a teacher,

Caution required on downsizing

A group of concerned residents has made it known they expect Novi officials to come up with an immediate solution to the problem of "incompatible" homes being constructed in partially developed subdivisions.

The number of residents who have filled council chambers recently shows the high level of concern. By all indications, their appearance was part of a well-orchestrated attempt to convince the council of the importance of the issue.

"Power politics," however, should hot be allowed to intimidate city officials into hasty action in an area of vital cončern.

The city attorney has repeatedly warned council that the restrictions requested by residents are of questionable legal merit — all the more reason for the city to act cautiously and deliberately as it considers two amendments to the zoning ordinance which would address some of the questions residents have raised.

Despite the call for immediate action, it is clear the Novi Planning Board has a great deal of work ahead of it before the ordinances are ready for adoption. Council members have asked them to address:

 floor size requirements and reasoning behind setting those standards; • a summary of house size controls

included in local subdivision convenants and restrictions • a survey of house size standards us-

ed in other communities;

red by the city if an architectural review being experienced. committee is established; • how adoption of an architectural

review committee can be accomplished without promoting proliferation of tract housing; and,

• the effect on building the enactment of such ordinances would have.

Simply answering those questions means consideration of the ordinances will take longer than residents hope. But those questions and other which arise as the process unfolds must be addressed.

Residents seeking a speedy resolution of their concerns should note that the standards being used to fight construction of a Bob Evans restaurant in the regional center area took at least 10 months to develop.

At the same time, it should be noted that efforts to uphold architectural standards in commercial areas cannot be related directly to the goal of compatible housing in existing residential areas.

Bob Evans site plans, for example, are being scrutinized under the Planned Development option available only in the regional center area. It is up to the developer to decide if he wants to use the option. If he decides to use it, he is required to submit to an architectural review process.

There are no "planned development options" in residential areas. And even though such an option may provide appropriate controls for future subdivisions, they could not be applied to ex-

an estimate of the costs to be incur-isting subdivisions where problems are

What has been proposed to deal with those concerns is a cumbersome process requiring not only homes, but all new buildings in the city, to be approved by an architectural review committee.

We can support review of commercial developments on the grounds the number will be limited and the wide range of architectural styles for commercial establishments could seriously alter the character of the city's regional center.

But the staggering number of residential architectural reviews which could be required under with the proposed ordinance amendments could make them unworkable. Additionally, the limited number of architectural styles for homes may well make such a review committee superfluous.

Since the city cannot and should not act in haste, however, other concerns can be pursued. One avenue open to residents on a private basis is to retain an attorney and seek amendments to covenants and restrictions, which can be altered, to provide strict limitations on construction.

We share residents' deep concern about the downsizing, and/or incompatibility, of housing. The city should pursue practical solutions with all due

At the same time, however, due care must be given to reasonable, hopefullyeffective solutions.

Dispatch warrants Framework a thorough study

More than a month after the issue had supposedly been settled, the Wolverine Lake Village Council again is addressing the subject of midnight police dispatching. After hearing liability questions raised by skeptical village

officials, Walled Lake officials wisely decided their informal agreement to provide Wolverine Lake with dispatching and other services should be transferred to a binding contract. Council members consequently directed the city manager to arrange a contract with Wolverine Lake's representatives by February 5 in effect, giving the village 30 days' notice to reach agreement or supply its own midnight dispatching.

Walled Lake's action obviously was more than the village bargained for when it rather reluctantly addressed the question of joint services late last year. But the city's move was justified considering the "what if" questions raised by opponents of the consolidation proposal.

The February 5 deadline, however, seems to be an attempt to pressure the village into action (ostensibly in return for criticism of Walled Lake's service to Wolverine Lake by defensive villagers supporting their jobs and dispatchers). After 11 years with nothing more formal than a memo between officials binding them, surely the city and village can give more than a month's time to drafting a contract.

In the meantime, the village council now appears prepared to give thorough and careful consideration to all its options. Not only is the village studying the possibility of continuing

its pact with Walled Lake - something the council publicly maintains is desirable, but it also is researching the feasibility of receiving police dispatch service from another municipality, including Novi or Milford.

We support this action initiated by Village President Tim Kozub, who notes that if Wolverine Lake doesn't investigate what other communities have to offer, it won't have any choice but to accept Walled Lake's offer. It's difficult to bargain when the other party holds all the cards.

It is difficult to understand comments of council members objecting to Kozub's attempts to gain more information about other dispatch contracts. Wolverine Lake certainly has nothing to lose by talking to Novi and Milford, and potentially has something to gain. This is the proper time to investigate what other police departments have to offer — although Wolverine Lake may well find Walled Lake has the best and least expensive dispatching available.

Wolverine Lake's other option is initiating its own midnight dispatch, undoubtedly the most expensive course and one, franklv. we don't think Wolverine Lake should follow without thorough study undertaken by a committee of officials and residents.

For the village to expand police dispatching to a 24-hour operation would mean more than the addition of one employee: It would also require addition of the basic services other departments provide, such as detention cells and breathalyzer machines. It would, in fact, require expansion of the village police department.

If that is the direction Wolverine Lake is heading, it should be faced and dealt with as such – not stumbled into.

It is not our intent to criticize the way Wolverine Lake is proceeding; actually, the council is moving in the right direction.

Kozub, for one, is taking a hard look at Wolverine Lake's options and seems prepared to make the best decision. Other council members should follow his lead. They should not moan about the "can of worms" they have to deal with, nor should they blind themselves to the possibility that other police departments may be able to provide them a valuable service.

This is a far-reaching issue and should be recognized as such. As has already been demonstrated, it will not go away quietly.



Edwards argued that the fact Victor did not hear his son advancing or the gun racked as he sat at the kitchen table showed Jose "was in effect lying in wait" for his father

"This is probably the only time in his life Mr. Phaffenhausen was glad he has a back problem," said Edwards. "He bent down to get an extra cup of tea. As he bent down instantaneously a rifle went off. (Jose) intended to kill his father and instead got an innocent bystander.

Said Sabbota: "If it's the prosecution's theory that this is first degree murder, it has to ask itself why did (Jose) even shoot when the other man was there, when there was a witness? Why didn't he shoot his father? I submit the shooting was an accident.... There is nothing to suggest that because he did not make himself known to his father that his father did not know he was in the house.... First degree murder has not been shown at this exam." In deciding to bind the case over to circuit court, le ruled there "is reason to believe (Jose) com-

mitted the offenses of first degree murder and ossession of fire arms in commission of a felony."

Farm scenes hold interest of local artist

Chuck Dubois likes to paint barns, but you won't find him on a ladder with a can of red paint. Instead, you'll find the Novi artist circling the barn with a sketch pad or a camera, looking for "angles" from which to depict the building.

The art-buying public evidently like the barns Dubois paints -14 of them were willing to pay \$150 to \$200 each to own one of his acrylic paintings of barns, depots, boats and other scenes at the most recent Farmington Artists' Club show and sale. Dubois can also boast that his paintings hang in

homes and offices in at least five states - and soon will in another one as Dubois, his wife, and son Carter plan a move to Massachusetts. Although he has been known to drive around Michigan to find subject matter, Dubois usually

concentrates his efforts on scenes in the area in which he lives. In fact, he gets tips on likely subjects from friends and neighbors in the area. ''There are lots of $\bar{p}eople$ in Novi who know what I

do and they will see barns and ask me to do them, Dubois smiles. "I've done a lot of them around here. Born and raised in the small Illinois town of


Auburn, one of his favorite paintings is one he did of that town's railroad depot, preserving a bit of that town's history. His pastoral upbringing and love of rural scenes

was no advantage to him in his first position as a commercial artist. He wound up painting simulations of a satellite shot to Mars for McDonnell Douglas corporation in St. Louis. After working in a variety of positions in between,

Dubois and his family came down to earth in Novi six years ago. Now self-employed as owner of the Dubois Agency, a firm that does advertising and promotional work for other companies, Dubois soon began prowling the area for "good barns" to paint. Technically known as an "acrylic dry brush"

painter, Dubois calls himself simply an "artist." He spends many hours developing and perfecting his technique "Every time I paint I refine (my technique,)" he said, "There is something different I do each time."

Dubois doesn't feel he has to sketch out a painting before applying acrylic. "You get going with the brush - you know what it is going to do and how (the scene) will appear on paper," he explained. "I don't make a big thing of it." Dubois spends a half hour to an hour on each pain-

ting, often finding himself doing three or four in a single evening. One thing he enjoys doing to keep variety in his work is painting the same scene from different angles.

"People will look at a painting and see the building and they'll say 'that one looks familiar.' It will be the same barn from a different angle," he

Though he admits to painting for "relaxation," Dubois says there is more behind his painting than just releasing day to day tensions. "What I want to accomplish in a painting is to

draw people into it and get them involved in it," he explained. "I want people to feel." He gestures towards a painting of a snowy barn. "I want people to walk into that barn and know it is going to be cold," he explained.

He points to another, two boats resting for the season under a tarpaulin. "I want (that painting) to make you know that it is the end of the season, that it's all over for this year." he explained. Though he enjoys all types of art, Dubois admits that his favorites are paintings that have that effect.

His favorite artist is "probably" Jamie Wyeth. though he likes Andrew Wyeth as well. Dubois' home is hung with his own work and that of other artists of his acquaintance. One thing he insists on is hanging up only art that he likes whether it is his own or someone else's.

Rather than keep a painting he has done that he doesn't like, Dubois will destroy it. "I will just tear it up," he said. "My wife yells at me for doing it, but if I don't like it nobody's going to see it ... I will not do portraits because I'm not good at it."


Dubois' other paintings are good enough, though, to make it into some prestigious juried art fairs, in-cluding one in Springfield, Illinois. Dubois was also once offered a contract with the Merrill Chase Gallery in Chicago. He refused it because he feared a contract would make him a "slave."

"I won't do it that way, I do it for enjoyment," he explained. "The income is a nice bonus but I will never make a living at painting. But that's all right because you have to be satisfied with what you're doing - and I a
