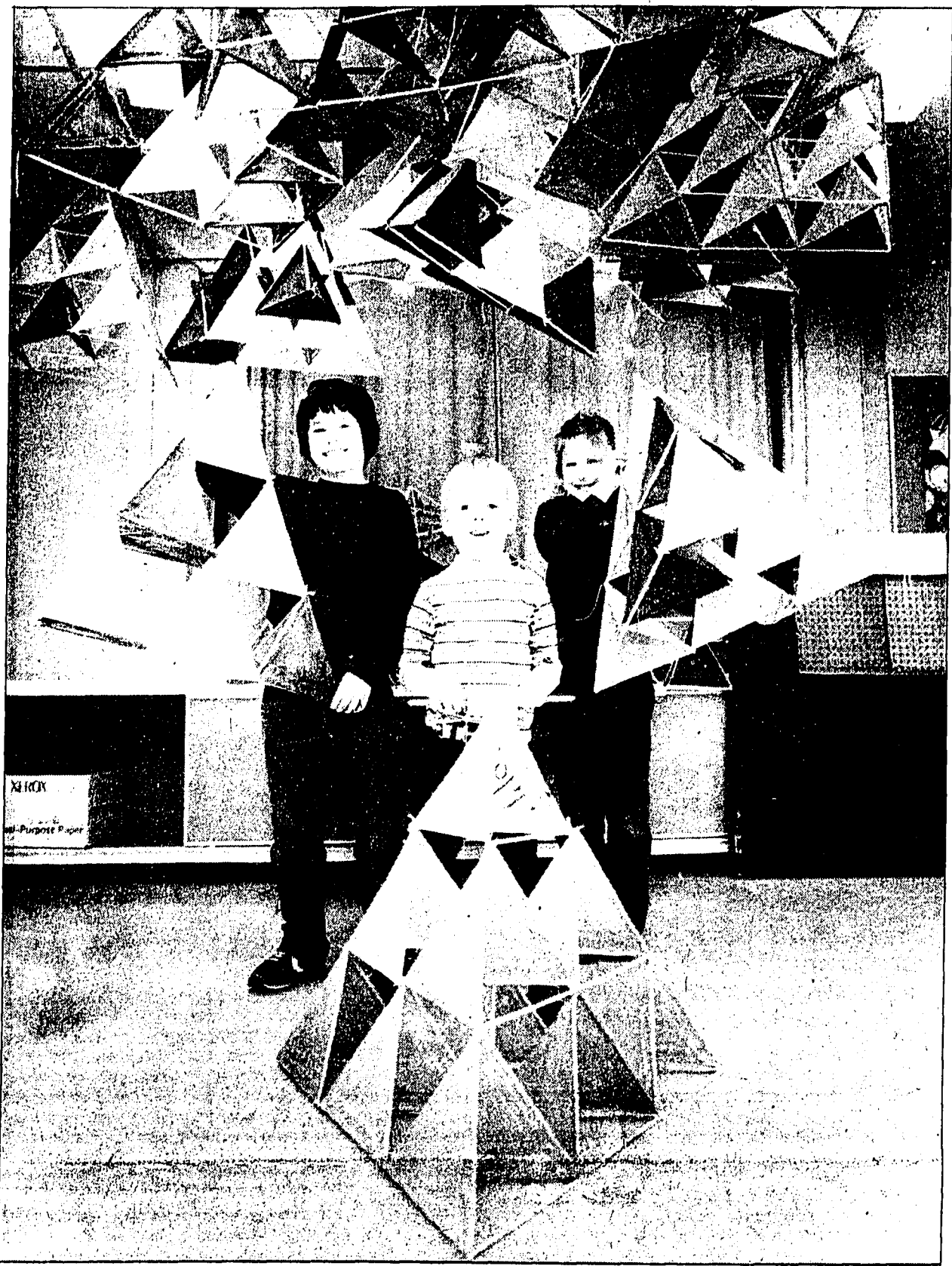

Family togetherness emphasized

Family activities create togetherness. That belief is at the heart of Fact Day, a special group of programs for the entire Novi community — from senior citizens to preschoolers, from adults and teens to single parents. In short, everyone is invited to participate in the series of workshops and programs to be held this Saturday at Novi High School. Sponsored by the Novi Community Education Advisory Council, the event is the second in Novi's history.

Fact Day gets underway at 8:30 a.m. with registration, followed by the opportunity to participate in two workshops.

Children can select from computer games, swimming fun, creative recreation, hair care and styling, bicycle safety and maintenance, crafts and "balloology."

Adults may choose between programs on tax preparation for two-income families, role reversals in the home, identifying stress in children and adults, pastry-making by chefs from Sheraton Oaks, prevention of athletic injuries, improving family communication, career change strategies and encouraging creativity in children, among other programs.

This year, Fact Day will feature P.M. Magazine's Gary Cubberley as the guest speaker. Cubberley, who lives in Novi with his wife and their three sons, will address adults at 1 p.m., while younger children are invited to take in special movies.

Following Cubberley's speech, a family square dance will complete the program. Callers Jim and Pat Tait will lead the square dancing from 2-3:30 p.m.

The cost of participating in Fact Day is only \$6 per family. Senior citizens will be admitted for \$2 each and lunch will be provided for \$1 per person. Registration deadline is this Friday. Call Clara Porter, 948-1200, to sign up.

Traffic back-up th... to convention cent... ?

Novi officials are working closely with the State Highway Department to resolve the deteriorating traffic problem in the Twelve Oaks/West Oaks area.

And the result of those negotiations may be critical to the development of Section 15, the 155-acre section of land on the west side of Novi Road opposite Twelve Oaks Mall.

City Manager Edward Kriewall revealed Monday that a proposal to construct a regional convention center in conjunction with the Sheraton Oaks may rest on the city's ability to resolve the existing traffic problems.

The Sheraton Oaks management has indicated that improved access to their hotel and the west side of Novi Road is mandatory," reported Kriewall.

"They have indicated that the convention center project is in considerable jeopardy without improved access."

Mayor Robert Schmid echoed Kriewall's comments, stating that the key to success in developing Section 15 may well rest with the city's ability to resolve traffic problems.

In essence, the problem is that it's difficult for motorists to enter Section 15 under the existing road configuration. All traffic attempting to reach Sheraton Oaks, West Oaks and other existing Section 15 uses currently must enter via West Oaks Drive, which is located directly opposite the main entrance to Twelve Oaks.

Since the highest percentage of traffic approaches from the south, it is necessary for motorists to make a left-hand turn onto West Oaks Drive. The results are difficult turning movements and frequent long waits at the traffic signal at the intersection.

To help resolve the problem, the city has retained the services of Barton-Aschman Associates, a firm of professional traffic consultants based in Illinois.

According to Rolf Kilian, a Barton-Aschman engineer, the most immediate solution to the problem is to modify the westbound entry ramp onto I-96 from Novi Road.

Specifically, Kilian has proposed that the entry ramp be modified by adding a second ramp that would enable traffic to enter Section 15 immediately in front of the Sheraton Oaks.

In his report to the city, Kilian said the second ramp would enable westbound traffic on I-96 to take the Novi Road exit ramp, drive straight across Novi Road and then enter Section 15 in front of Sheraton Oaks via the ramp in the northwest quadrant of the interchange.

Kilian said approximately 30 percent of the existing and future Section 15 traffic approaches the area from the east on I-96 and exits on Novi Road.

Of the 30 percent approaching Section 15 from the east on I-96, approximately two-thirds (or 67 percent) would take advantage of the new connection, Kilian reported.

Kriewall indicated that negotiations with the State Highway Department have been going on several months. "The feedback we get is that they're conceptually receptive to the design proposal from Barton-Aschman," Kriewall said Monday.

Kilian also called for the ramp modification to be carried out as soon as possible and strongly recommended continued monitoring of traffic generation.

"Development of the area, not only in Section 15 but in the entire area north of I-96, should be monitored closely on a continual basis to determine when and if traffic warrants additional improvements to the road system," said Kilian.

"This is not to say, however, that the proposed ramp modification should be postponed. Indeed, this modification should be implemented as soon as possible to help relieve an already deteriorating capacity condition at the intersection of Novi Road with Twelve Oaks/West Oaks Drive.

"These modifications," added Kilian, "coupled with the development of some internal roads within Section 15, will help to provide for the orderly growth of traffic and development of Section 15.

Planning team focuses on Lake Area programs

Northern Novi — otherwise known as the Lake Area — has an image problem. But things are not as bad as some have assumed.

That's the consensus of the University of Michigan Comprehensive Planning Team, which has been retained by the city to identify problems and propose solutions in the section of Novi surrounding Walled Lake.

In essence, the U-M study team has found that:

- Over the past decade the Lake Area has improved measurably on some fronts, and
- Some problem areas including poor housing conditions and the transient nature of the population do not seem to be as pervasive as initially believed.

The Lake Area study is being carried out by the U-M planning team in conjunction with Novi's Housing and Community Development Committee (HCCDC). The project is being funded with Community Development Block Grant funds.

Leslie Harding of the HCCDC noted that the purpose of the study is to give the committee direction on future projects. "The things we've accomplished in the Lake Area so far have been pretty obvious," said Harding, pointing to road improvements and housing rehabilitation. "We felt we needed a study at this point to tell us where to go next."

Harding added that the results of the U-M study have been revealing. "The report changes a lot of thought patterns about that area. It's definitely a growth area; a lot of good things are happening up there."

Similar sentiments were expressed by Donald Greengood, another HCCDC member. "The study changes a lot of myths about the Lake Area," he said. "In the past it's almost been like the expressway was a natural barrier between the North End and the South End. We want to change all that."

"The area has a great deal of potential; we need to develop that potential."

Thirty to 40 years ago, the Lake Area, one of the oldest in Novi, was primarily a summer resort community. With the expansion of the Detroit Metropolitan area and construction of the Wixom Ford plant, the community has changed in use from vacation cottages to permanent residences.

The transformation has been accompanied, however, by problems which include deteriorated housing, poor road conditions, environmental degradation and uneven growth.

On the positive side of the ledger, the U-M team found that considerable progress has been made during the past decade on alleviating some of the problems such as housing and water quality. The report also underscores the fact that additional work is still needed.

The first phase of the U-M study had two major goals: (1) to assess the structural condition of housing in the Lake Area and (2) to tabulate attitudes of Lake Area residents.

In compiling the attitudinal portion of the report, the study team conducted interviews with 99 percent of area residents. Those findings were then meshed with the responses of 35 officials in Novi and Walled Lake.

The findings of the U-M study team about the Lake Area include:

- The Novi Lake Area and all the City of Walled Lake have significantly lower per capita incomes and property values than the surrounding communities.
- Unemployment in the Lake Area

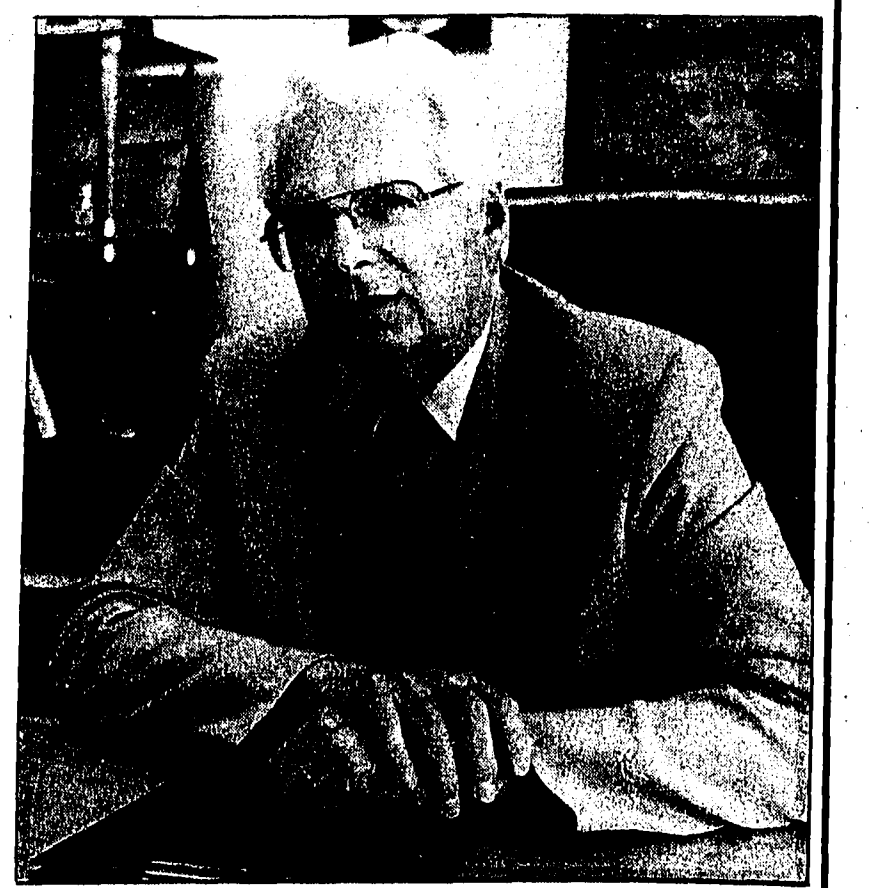
But doesn't Twelve Oaks have the potential for being a city unto itself? Sort of its own private entity in the center of the City of Novi?

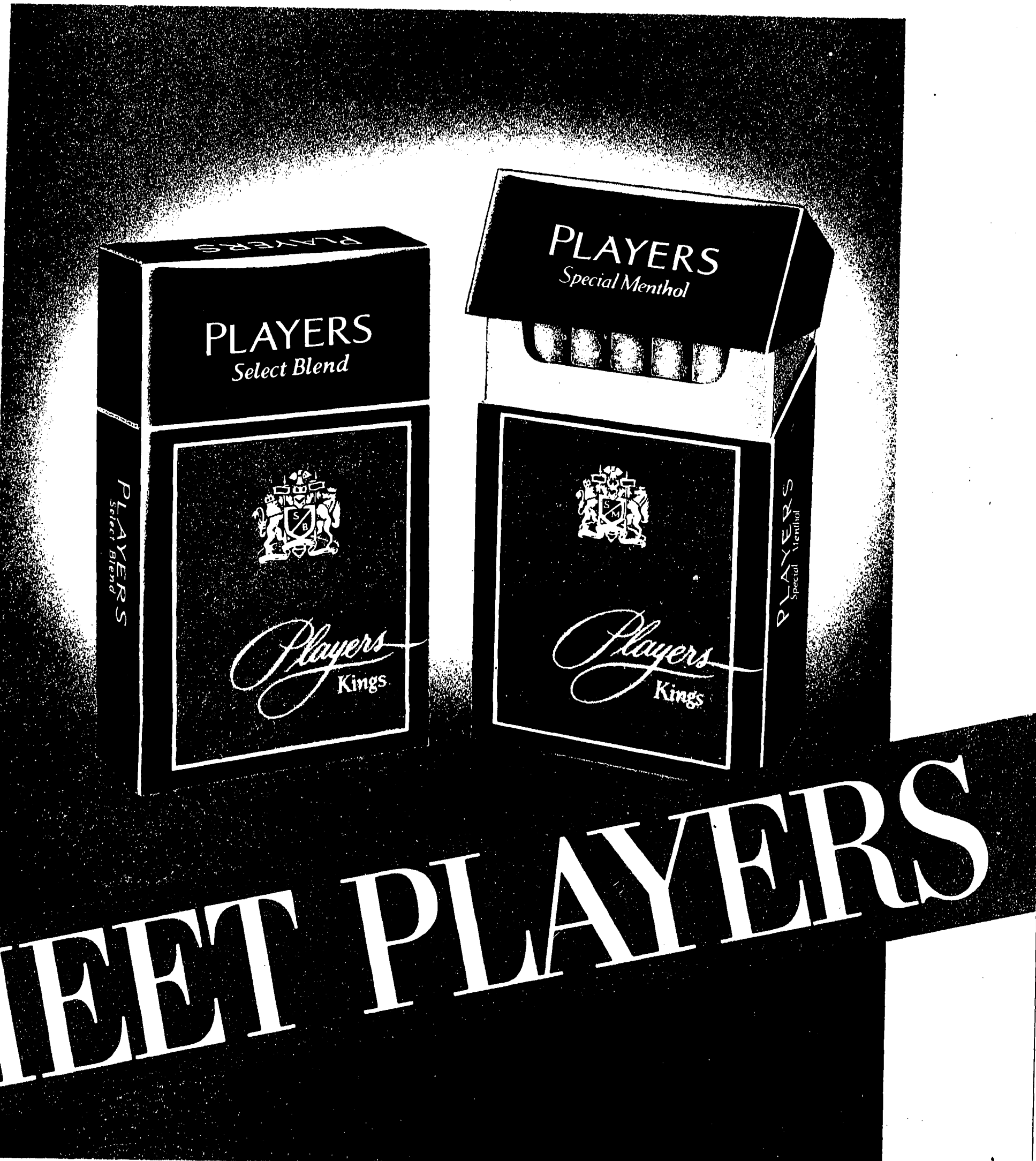

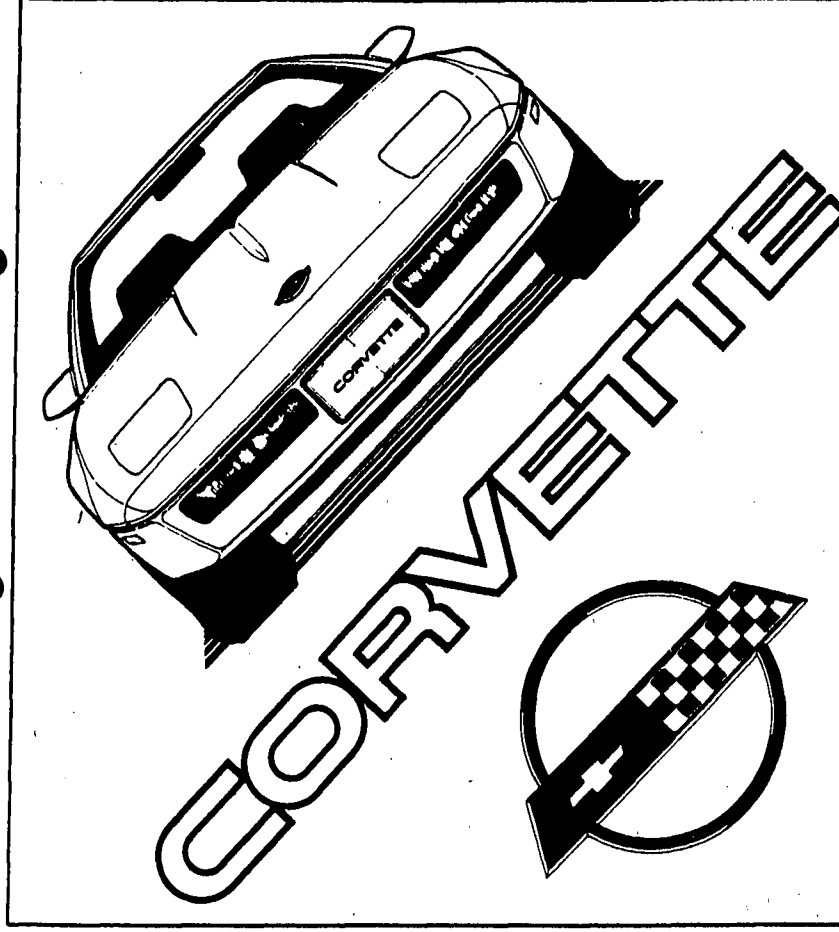

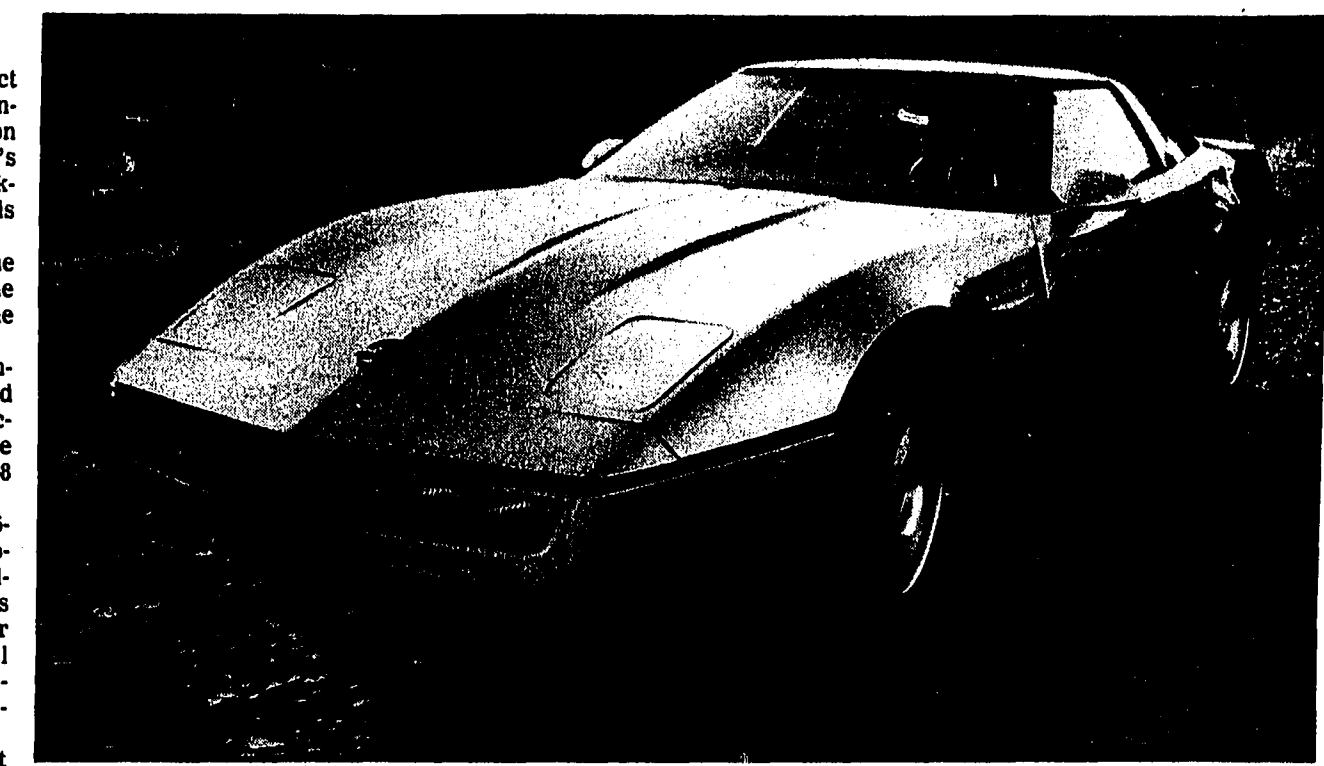

Sports car on fast sales track

Chevrolet's 1984 Corvette debuts Thursday, is already selling briskly

GM touts engineering in Corvette redesign

When Chevrolet says the 1984 Corvette is totally redesigned, there's more to it than advertising hype. General Motors is putting its reputation on the line with the Corvette, calling it a showcase of the best its engineering divisions can do.

From the tires up, the car is brand new, with the only carry-over item being the 205-horsepower, 350-cubic inch fuel-injected V-8 engine and standard four-speed automatic transmission — both introduced in their current form on 1982 models.

About those tires — with the optional wheel and tire package or 2-51 handling package (virtually all Corvettes have one or the other) each tire is unique to its corner of the car. Tire widths front to rear differ (8.5 wide in front, 9.5 inches at the rear).

Designed by Goodyear especially for the Corvette, the tires feature a "unidirectional" tread designed to perform best when the tire is rotating in one direction.

The vented aluminum wheels (also "one-way" designs that pump cooling air onto the brakes) are mounted to a four-wheel independent suspension whose most distinctive feature is a fiberglass composite single leaf spring at front and rear.

Chevrolet first started using these springs — which are lighter and more durable than the common steel coils — on the 1981 Corvette in the rear. Now used in front as well, the springs are cited as one technology pioneered by GM.

The entire suspension package, from forged aluminum linkage to tire treads, is credited with giving Corvette the best objectively-measured roadholding ability of any production car in the world. Skidpad tests show 5g cornering — just short of enabling the car to go around a bend so fast that the sideways force is greater than the weight of the car itself.

The engine feeds power into either

New car introductions don't attract as much attention as they did when annual model changes meant a crowd on every showroom floor, but there's something akin to that excitement taking place at Chevrolet dealerships this week.

Chevrolet officially introduces the all-new 1984 Corvette in this part of the country Thursday, having debuted the car in California March 24.

Three area Chevy dealers report intense consumer interest and increased floor traffic arising from the introduction of the first total redesign of the flagship sports car since the 1968 model.

Despite sticker prices in the \$25-\$28,000 range (base of \$21,800 plus options), Chevrolet dealers in Novi, Walled Lake and Milford all report orders approaching or exceeding the number of 1984 Corvettes they expect to get. All three are selling the car at manufacturer's suggested retail price — no discounting, no incentive plans.

While Chevy made a splash when it announced a base price about \$3,000 lower than many analysts had forecast, Marty Feldman of Marty Feldman Chevrolet in Novi said price is not a major factor in selling Corvettes.

"Loaded car to loaded car, they're up about \$6,000 over the 1982s," Feldman said, explaining that there was no 1983 model year Corvette.

"But selling Corvettes is not a problem, especially this new design," he continued. "We're really talking about the individual who would be interested in a Porsche or Ferrari — a real sports car person. And a Porsche (928, of comparable performance with the 'Vette) goes for more than \$40,000 and a Ferrari more than that."

Says Peter Van Camp, of Van Camp Chevrolet in Milford: "It's really an entirely different market — you're getting into the area where prices don't matter as much."

And Dick Morris, whose dealership is in Walled Lake: "You're talking a different breed of cat. We've been talking

to Corvette buffs for over a year, and started taking actual orders in January."

Feldman said he knows dealers in California getting more than \$3,000 above list price for the car, but "I don't expect I'd ever insult any of my customers like that."

While affluent enthusiasts may be the buyers, all three dealers agreed the Corvette, which Chevrolet is touting as a showcase of American automotive technology (see sidebar), is drawing interest from many who will never buy one.

"This car basically seems like a 'Star Trek' sort of car," Feldman said. "A lot of the people who come and look at it are really in the market for family-type cars, but they want to see the new Corvette."

The expected interest level is such that Chevrolet has supplied its dealers with an official, 58-page four-color heavy-paper brochure on the car — to be sold at \$6 per copy.

The three dealers reported different perceptions of how early publicity for the new car affected sales of the 1982 Corvette. Feldman said he sold out of '82s six months ago "so my salesmen were ready for this one."

Only Van Camp sensed some hesitation on '82s because of the publicity surrounding the 1984 Corvette. "I just sold the last one last month," he said. "They definitely went slowly."

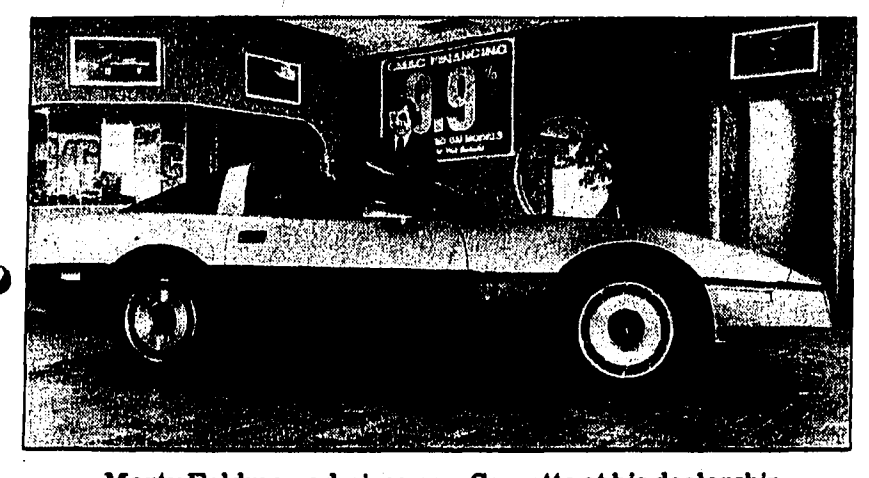

While car dealers don't have a public image as the most trustworthy of sources about the cars they sell, one has to admit the dealer generally knows something about the product. In the case of the 1984 Corvette, the dealers interviewed for the main article at the top of this page hardly have incentive to tell anything but the truth — they can sell as many of the cars as Chevy sends them this year, so give a listen.

— Marty Feldman, Marty Feldman Chevrolet, Novi: "I've always had Corvettes as my personal cars and I'll tell you this, the new one is a big improvement. I could get in both cars, in the passenger seat, blindfolded, and in a minute I could tell you which is which, there is that much difference."

— Peter Van Camp, Van Camp Chevrolet, Milford: "I've seen them around and at the (GM) Proving Grounds (in Milford) and I'm impressed. I think it's a definite improvement, there's a little more European flair. I've talked to some of the people who helped engineer it — one of my customers had a large part to play in the engineering — and I'm very impressed with what they've accomplished."

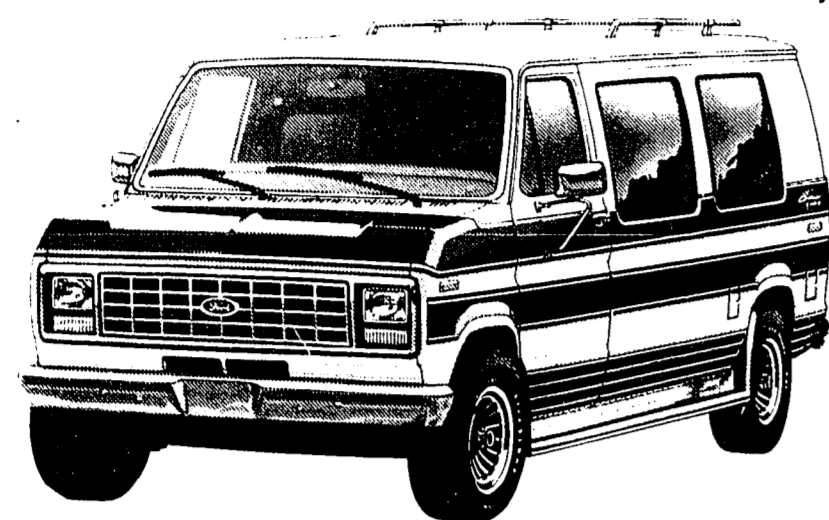

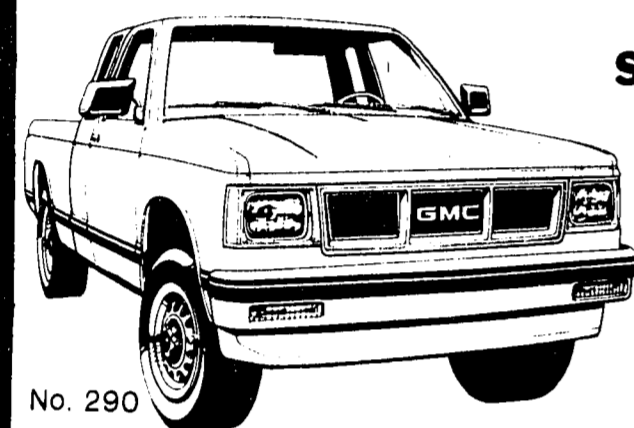

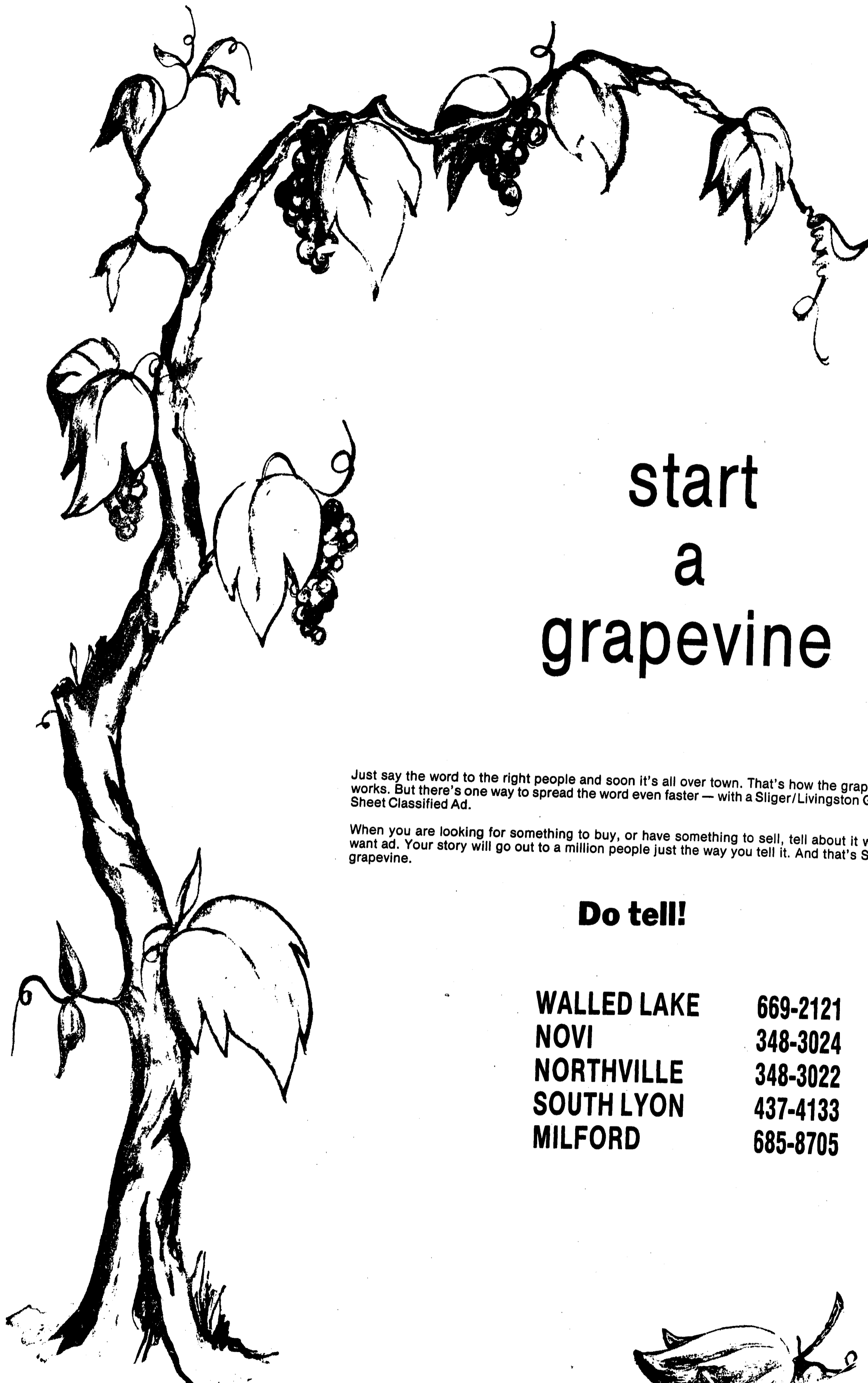

Novi nine sweeps twinbill to open season

After taking both ends of a doubleheader against Kingston to open the season, Novi's baseball team was derailed 2-1 by Oak Park in a classic pitching duel last Tuesday.

Schools face grim budget decisions

of such cuts in curriculum hours could lead to loss of accreditation by the North Central Association of Schools, which would severely impair the educational reputation of the district.

Under the bare-bones budget, special services would be forced to eliminate numerous social workers and school psychologists. According to the report, one position slated for termination is a special services secretary. In the opinion of the special services director "it would be most difficult to operate his office with one secretary (as planned) and comply with state and federal law.... It is doubtful that the present staffing level of the business office can accommodate this additional work load."

The second alternative proposed by the administrative committee would add another \$1.3 million to the bare-bones budget, bringing expenditures in at about \$200,000 under revenues. The additional funds would continue basic functioning of existing programs, although any programs would be maintained at levels somewhat below those of the current year. Administrators conceded, however, that operating on such a slim fund equity was potentially dangerous if unexpected expenditures should mount.

Left out of both alternatives are programs currently bankrolled by the general fund, including \$250,000 for elementary school programs, \$284,000 for secondary school programs, \$152,000 for special services, \$58,000 for plant operation and maintenance, and \$56,000 for cafeteria help.

Other miscellaneous expenses picked up by the general fund bring the total dollar amount of cuts that appear to be scheduled under either of the alternatives to \$1.2 million.

According to the report, "the committee members do not necessarily believe that those programs not included are unnecessary for our children's education." Nonetheless, the report noted, the need to cut back exists, barring an attempt to increase revenues by seeking to raise the school district millage rate—a tactic unlikely to succeed if district residents' opposition to twice-yearly school tax collection is any indication.

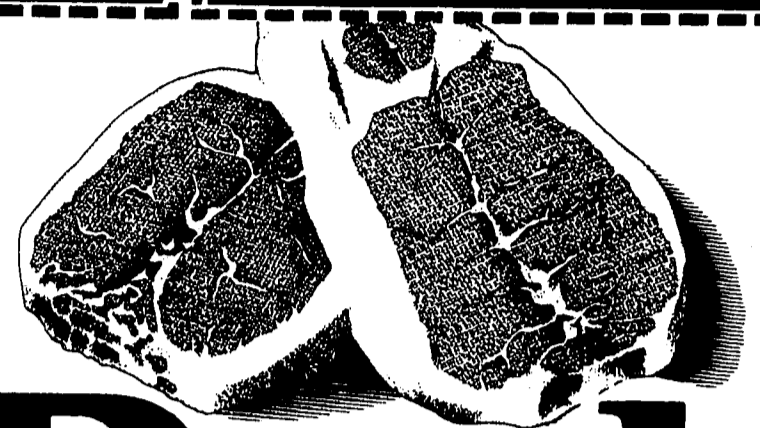
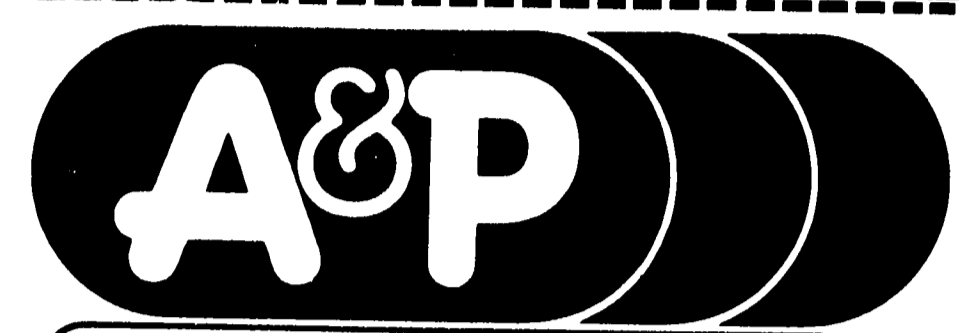
