



A majority of the Novi school board indicated its tentative support for budget changes proposed by administators in their latest attempt to meet the board's request to reduce the 1983-84 budget without critically affecting educational programs. In response to school board direction

With the support of the Jaycess, Sommerville started organizing a fund raising project to purchase the van and chair lift. Begun last September, the project raised just over \$6,000. With the money, partly from fundralsers and

"I was also on the board of directors of the

Far Conservatory," said Sommerville. The Conservatory is a performing arts center for handicapped children. Sommerville's daughter, Amy, attends the Conservatory and, according to her mother, is a fine plano player despite the fact that she can

only use one arm. 'Obviously, I'm involved for personal reasons," Sommerville said. "Fortunately, I have a good family structure with lots of support. But that's not always the situation. It's important for families to stay together no matter the problem, big or small."

Sommerville first met Edington when she worked for Easter Seals. A few years later she met Carol Pitcher and realized that Pitcher's foster son was none other than Dick. "Carol has helped a lot of people. She is somebody kind of nice to help," said Sommerille. "I enjoy what I do and have a very deep

A public hearing, held last week under Public Act 5, 1982, was the last chance residents had to voice their opposition to the increase, which includes nine tenths of a mill for operating costs. According to Village Administrator John Berchtold, the millage rate since 1971-72 was stable at an even eight. The new increase, up to 11 mills, includes a tax shift as 1.7 mills will be levied to replace taxes levied by Commerce Township for fire, library and parks. "Basically all that means is that we now have to collect the money and turn it over to Commerce Township," said

Meyer, Henderson tops in quiet field

In contrast to districts where issues have divided candidates and the community, contestants in the Novi school board election indicate there are few changes they would make in current operation. In fact, the quiet race seems to be between seven candidates who all want to be a part of the system because they perceive it is running well.

From this field of enthusiastic candidates we endorse MICHAEL MEYER and GILBERT HENDERSON for the two fouryear terms on the Novi school

However, the high level of community and school involvement of each of the candidates made that decision a difficult one. All of them sincerely voiced their concern for maintaining the quality programs for which Novi is known.

Meyer and Henderson stand out among the group largely because they appear to more fully understand the board's operations and have better grasps of a school board member's role than their op-

For several years the Walled will receive a good education. She Lake School District has faced serious problems, including shrinking revenues and declining enrollments. Persons serving on the board of education must be equipped to work together to deal with those problems.



Why would anybody wish to run for I've often wondered. And the question came to mind again recently when I was asked to moderate a Meet the Candidates activity. The candidates were running for a local

board of education. During their introductory statements, I listened to the reasons-concern for the school system, devotion and even love of community, interest in education, the simple motivation to become involved, the desire to see policies and procedures applied equally

Those, essentially, were the reasons articulated at that candidates' night. I'm sure there are other reasons why people seek public office and I'm not referring solely to seats on the board of educationremuneration, the challenge of a job, interest in public issues, satisfaction of ego, the desire to be part of a good operation or to improve an inferior one.

Perhaps these expectations will be satisfied. But I doubt it. They will at best be partially fulfilled.

Waiting to dash these high hopes, these lofty ideals, is the quite pervasive public attitude that all politicians are crooked or feeding at the public trough or seeking some personal gain rather than the public good. I contend the large majority (as high as 95 percent) of elected officials are honest. motivated by positive forces and doing a good job. The problem is the tendency of the public

to apply the egregious example to all governmental units. And I firmly believe the less local residents come in contact with local government, the more inclined they are to badmouth politicians. Distance, in this case, lends disenchantment. These people are always willing to believe the worst about

their local officials, whether the worst is rooted in fact or not. Some people, if not the majority, think it abominable that politicians should lambast a person or proposal. "They are always fighting," is the view. But debate, if not heated rhetoric, is inextricably part of our governmental system. Better open, heated debate than the ominous silence characteristic of autocratic societies.





The cost of liability insurance regulated by government accounts for more than half the top 10 concerns of small businesses nationally, according

to a recent survey. Respondents to the survey by the National Federation of Independent Business (NFIB) showed those liability costs the only ones among the top to not the direct result of an unhealthy economy. "Among the most serious problems small firms dentified were payroll taxes, which have been hiked twice in the last nine months," said Roger Haynes, spokesman for NFIB/Michigan.







Budget service expanding

Nancy Bonifield, who owns and operates Budgeting Systems, says she will work with the general public on a one-to-one basis, to assist them in meeting their current debt with their current in-

"Individuals who might need the new budget/service are those whose current income is not sufficent to meet their current needs," Bonifield says. 'Individuals who are laid off for example, may have bills they were able to pay when they were employed, and not know what to tell their creditors when they can no longer meet these payments. The same is true for senior citizens trying to live on

Bonifield acts as a mediator between her client and his creditor. "Sometimes," says Bonifield, "I will write a letter to the creditor and describe my client's specific problem, and how we are trying to correct it. I will offer the creditor some amount of money, even just a small monthly payment, in place of the client's regular payment.'' The pressure of a financial problem may be too

great for an individual to deal with, and it helps to have someone look at the situation objectively, says She claims there have been very few problems vhen dealing with creditors, and they are usually

willing to cooperate. Bonifield sits down with her client and helps them figure out an itemized budget that fits their current

Growth reported in solar energy

Savings of \$30 million will be accumulated by the year 2000 from investments in solar and other renewable energy systems installed in Michigan in

Joann E. Neuroth, director of the energy administration, Michigan Department of Commerce, said a report recently released by that agency highlights the status, impact and related issues con-cerning the state's residential renewable energy tax incentives through the 1981 tax year.

According to the report, 4,480 credited renewable systems installed in 1981 will result in utility bill savings of roughly \$800,000.

The number of tax credits issued by the state has tripled each year since 1979, according to he report. In the first year, it shows, 400 such credits were issued. By 1981, there were 4,000. Number and dollar amounts were expected to stabilize in the 1982 and 1983 tax years. The income tax credit is slated to expire at the end of the current tax year. In 1981, the report shows, the most frequently in-
