## Leininger tops council race, parks proposals

NOVI — Voters elected Edward Leininger, Arlen Schroeder and Martha Hoyer to four-year terms on the city council in Tuesday's general election, but turned down two ballot proposals to raise funds for parks and recreation.

Leininger, making his first bid for public office, was the top vote-getter in the council race as he was named on 810 ballots. Schroeder, another political newcomer, finished second among the six candidates for council with 1,759 votes, while Hoyer won the third spot with 1,662 votes.

Incumbent John Chambers finished a close fourth in the balloting, trailing Hoyer by just 94 votes with a total of 1,568 ballots. William Wineman finished fifth with 979 votes, while Michael Navetta came in sixth with 853 votes.

Mayor Robert Schmid, who was

unopposed in his bid for a second consecutive two-year term, received 2,543 votes.

The two ballot proposals were turned down by large margins of approximately 1,000 votes. Proposal A was rejected by a margin of 2,152 to 1,179, while Proposal B was vetoed on a vote of 2,197 to 1,144.

Proposal A asked voters to approve a \$4.3 million bond proposal to fund a four-part program implementing portions of the city's master plan for parks and recreation.

Under the estimated 1.25 mills to be levied under Proposal A, the city had proposed to spend:

- \$1.4 million for construction of 18 miles of bike-pedestrian paths;
- \$985,000 to acquire six parks;
- \$900,000 to develop the six new

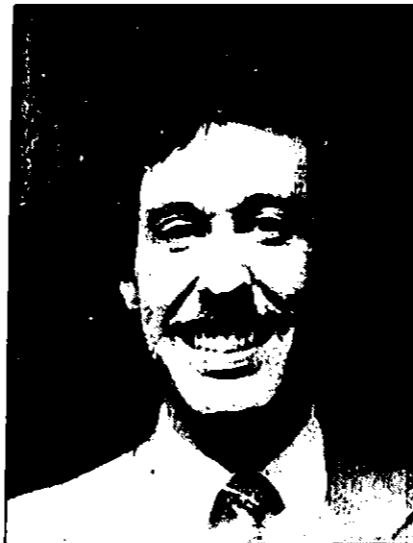
parks as well as five existing parks; and

• \$200,000 for the Parks and Recreation Department's share of a proposed city maintenance facility.

Proposal B asked voter approval to raise the operational millage for Parks and Recreation Department programs from its current level of .50 to .75. The millage increase would have generated an estimated \$105,000 in annual revenues.

Parks and Recreation Director Thomas O'Branovic said the increase in operational millage was needed to cover added costs incurred by the expansion of programs under Proposal A.

City Clerk Geraldine Stipp reported that 3,466 of the city's 14,783 registered voters showed up at the polls Tuesday — a voter turnout of 23.45 percent.

## Students set new highs in state testing program

NOVI — Students in the Novi Schools registered their best scores ever on the Michigan Education Assessment Program (MEAP) tests this year.

Leading the way were Novi's fourth graders, who registered dramatic increases in all-time highs in both reading and mathematics. Fourth graders scored 95.7 in reading and 96.7 in mathematics. Both scores were approximately 10 points higher than 1982 levels.

Significant increases also were registered by Novi tenth graders, who scored 91.4 in reading and 82.0 in mathematics.

Scores dipped only at the seventh grade level, where reading scores fell from 91.8 in 1982 to 88.4 this year and mathematics scores fell from 74.6 last year to 66.7 this year.

The 1983 MEAP results marked the first time in history that Novi students have scored in the 90th percentile in three of the six categories — reading and math at the fourth, seventh and tenth grade levels.

Novi students had just one score in the 90th percentile in each of the previous three years.

"Needless to say, we're extremely

pleased," said Superintendent Robert Piwko. "They're the highest scores we've ever had. They're a positive reflection on our whole educational program as well as the individual staff members at the building level."

Piwko said he was particularly pleased with the reading scores registered by Novi students. A strong emphasis on reading competency levels was established when Piwko became superintendent in 1980. That emphasis apparently has paid dividends as Novi students scored 95.7 in reading at the fourth grade level, 86.4 in reading at the seventh grade level and 91.4 at the tenth grade level.

"I think our emphasis on language arts is displayed in this year's reading scores," commented the superintendent.

At the same time, Piwko announced that new emphasis will be placed on mathematics skills in the months and years ahead, particularly at the fourth, fifth and sixth grade levels.

"We're going to take a long, hard look at what must be done to raise our scores in mathematics," said Piwko. "We need to look at specific objectives and make certain that we're teaching what

we ought to be teaching.

"I believe our efforts in mathematics will result in the same type of increases that we've realized in reading," he added.

The Novi superintendent also noted that high MEAP scores tend to be self-perpetuating.

"We receive calls almost everyday from people who want to know what our MEAP results were before they make a decision about moving into the community," he said.

"When MEAP scores are one of the determinants used in buying a home, you tend to find people moving into the community who are highly interested in educational standards.

"From an educational standpoint, it's easier to provide a quality education when the people in the community are interested in a quality education.

"Attitudes are hard to change," he added. "Once you get the ball rolling in the right direction, it's difficult to stop the momentum."

Piwko also noted that the MEAP is designed to measure minimum objectives at the fourth, seventh and tenth

## 'Grandfather' clause added to Town Center ordinance

NOVI — Proposed restrictions for the Town Center Area now include a clause which will allow existing businesses to remain in operation around the Grand River/Novi Road intersection while plans for the area move forward.

Without the clause, several existing businesses would be considered "non-conforming" and be prohibited from expanding after the ordinance is enacted and the district rezoned.

But with the language approved by

the Novi Planning Board Wednesday, November 2, those businesses would not be considered "non-conforming uses."

Any business that is considered a "lawful" commercial or industrial use at the time the ordinance is enacted can be continued and expanded, under provisions of the proposed ordinance.

Additionally, the proposed ordinance provides that property owners can sell their property to someone who will use it for the identical purpose. For example, a gas station could be sold to someone who would continue to use it as a gas station.

The proposed Town Center ordinance is under consideration as part of the city's short-term plans for the area. The regulations are designed to control the type of businesses going into the commercial area surrounding the Grand River/Novi Road intersection by preventing the development of businesses considered "out-of-character" with ultimate plans.

The language, known as a grandfather clause, applies to existing businesses that otherwise would not be permitted in the Town Center District.

The grandfather clause was added at the request of members of the business community. If a Town Center ordinance is adopted, they said, their businesses would be rezoned and become non-conforming uses. As a result they would be unable to expand and ultimately forced out of business.

Since industrial land uses are out of character with ultimate plans for the area, some planners expressed concerns with allowing them to expand onto adjacent property beyond the bounds of the property where they currently are located.

Planners discussed prohibiting industrial uses from expanding operations onto adjacent property, but ultimately a majority of the board supported a complete grandfather clause for industrial uses.

Board members noted the ordinance they are drafting is a compromise between what they want and what the business community feels it can live with. While they, as planners, may object to allowing industrial businesses to expand onto adjacent property, they

also believe it is necessary to the ordinance that the provision be included, said Planner Joseph Brett.

Planners also are looking at the possibility of establishing a date when the ordinance would no longer be in effect.

They have requested a legal opinion from City Attorney David Fried regarding the advisability of putting an expiration date for the restrictions in the proposed ordinance.

Putting an expiration date in the ordinance would require the city to proceed with professional studies of the area in a timely fashion. Business owners have expressed concern that without such a measure the ordinance which is intended to provide temporary regulations for the area, could be extended indefinitely.

An economic analysis and a physical design plan are to be undertaken to determine the proper type of development to be encouraged in the Town Center.

Meanwhile, the planning board's Town Center sub-committee and a

## Police unions file for mediation

NOVI — Negotiations between the City of Novi and two groups of police department employee groups have broken down and are headed for mediation.

Mediation between the city and the police department was requested in late September, but an additional bargaining session was scheduled in a last-ditch attempt to reach an agreement. No settlement emerged from that session, however.

"We have failed to reach a negotiated settlement and are pursuing mediation where hopefully we can unlock our deadlock," reported Assistant City Manager Craig Klaver.

"We had a sporadic schedule for negotiations — our last meeting was October 24. When we failed to reach an agreement the officers had requested mediation, but we had an additional meeting to see if we could reach an agreement prior to mediation. We were unable to do so," Klaver said.

The 22 members of the Police Officers Association of Michigan (POAM) decided Thursday to reject the city's latest offer and proceed with mediation, according to Local POAM President Robert Gatt.

Representatives of the 14-member clerks and dispatchers unit also said their group is seeking mediation after a final meeting with the city negotiators produced no results.

Regarding the outcome of the police

officers meeting, Gatt said: "At a union meeting (Thursday) to discuss contract negotiations, the city's last, best offer was revealed to the entire membership. The city's offer would have substantially altered the union membership's working conditions in several areas, including seniority and holiday benefits.

"The membership decided that the bargaining team should continue to try to obtain an acceptable offer from the city through mediation," Gatt continued.

"The union and city officials will meet with a mediator Wednesday, November 9," Gatt said. "It is, of course, our goal to reach an agreement with the city before it is necessary to journey through the long and costly arbitration process."

Clerks and Dispatcher representative Debbie Ruby explained the bargaining unit is ready to proceed with mediation after the last meeting with city negotiators produced no results.

"We had one meeting that did not pan out, nothing came of it," Ruby said. "We still have problems. We've sent a letter requesting a mediator and we're waiting to hear who the mediator will be. No other meetings are planned."

Salary is the outstanding issue with the clerks and dispatchers. POAM business agent William Birdseye said the dispatchers are seeking compensation for added responsibilities they have taken on as a result of Novi's contracts for regional dispatching services for neighboring communities.

"Since the city has contracted with other units of government the burden of

the dispatchers has increased over the past year," Birdseye said. "The dispatchers have received incremental raises, but we are looking for additional compensation for the speed up."

Birdseye added that clerical employees in city hall have received greater salary increases than the civilian police department employees have been offered.

"After three years the police clerical unit would be \$500-\$600 behind. We're not satisfied with that offer..." Birdseye said.

Klaver disputed Birdseye's position, saying: "I question the validity of those positions he considers comparable, in terms of actual work being performed. I feel these are issues best addressed to an outside party, namely the mediator assigned to this case."

Klaver stated further that the current tone of the negotiations doesn't truly reflect the bargaining process as it has proceeded thus far.

"It's unfortunate that as a result of our attempts to finalize the bargaining process we are necessarily focusing on the unresolved issues which have caused a negative attitude toward the process," Klaver said. "Prior to this stage, however, we have made a number of significant steps forward and will be implementing changes with this contract that are in the best interest of the association and will result in a more efficient department for the citizens."

## Roberts tops local vote, Ackley, Labadie elected

WALLED LAKE — Incumbents William Roberts and Linda Ackley, along with newcomer Cheryl Labadie were elected to city council in yesterday's (Tuesday, November 8) polling.

Voters also approved eight amendments to the city charter, including one which calls for the incumbent with the highest number of votes in the most recent election to be selected as mayor pro tem. The mayor pro tem assumes the position of mayor if the individual elected mayor is unable to complete a term.

Because Roberts was the top vote-getter, netting 385 of 566 votes cast, he will automatically become the mayor pro tem. There were 2,669 residents registered to vote in the November 8 election.

Ackley received 233 votes in winning

election to her second consecutive four-year term, while Labadie finished a surprising second in the balloting with 222 votes to win her first council term. Labadie replaces retiring Council Member Edward Horsman, who served two years on the council but was not a candidate for re-election.

Of the remaining four candidates, Parks and Recreation Commissioner Michael Hughes received 192 votes, Planning Commissioner Helen Foss was named on 165 ballots and Mahlon Green, in his second bid out for city council, received 89 votes. Michael Siltner received 115 votes.

Roberts, 37, now begins his fourth four-year term on city council. He was first elected in 1968 and served until 1973, when he was elected mayor. A resident of 1499 West West Maple Road, Roberts served as mayor from 1973-77 and was re-elected to the council in 1979.

Ackley, of 150 Angle, begins her second four-year term this month. The 30-year-old lifelong resident of Walled Lake has been active on the city's beautification committee and served as chairperson of the historical committee.

Labadie will launch her first four-year term on city council this month. A resident of the Lake Village Condominiums, Labadie, 31, has lived in Walled Lake three years.

A total of 566 of the city's registered voters showed up at the polls for a voter turnout of approximately 25 percent.

An organizational meeting of the council will be held at 8 p.m. Monday when the new members take the oath of office. The first regular meeting of the council is November 22.

## Lentz wins Wixom race

WIXOM — Gary Lentz made his second bid to be elected to the office of mayor a successful one as he defeated Council Member Wayne Glessner by a margin of 784 to 502 in Tuesday's general election.

Lentz succeeds Mayor Lillian Spencer, who decided not to seek re-election this year after having served three successive terms in the mayor's office.

Wixom voters also filled three vacancies on the city council by re-electing William Wylie and Nancy Dingley and electing Charles Craig to four-year terms.

Dingley was the leading vote-getter in the race for three four-year terms on the city council as she was named on 743 ballots. Wylie also was successful in his bid for a second consecutive term, finishing second in the balloting with 615 votes. Craig, who has run unsuccessfully for council in the past, won the third seat with 615 votes.

Lee Middlekauff finished fourth in the balloting with 563 votes, while Edward Salisz was fifth with 496 votes and Kevin Ayers finished sixth with 243 votes. Ayers had announced prior to the election that he plans to move out of the city and should not be considered a serious candidate, although his name appeared on the ballot.

The mayoral race was one of the most heated and hotly-contested in Wixom since the early 1970 campaigns in which Wesley McAtee and Gilbert Willis vied for the city's chief administrative position.

This year's mayoral race was a classic confrontation between an alleged "outsider" (Lentz) and a representative of the current council and administration (Glessner).

Lentz, an attorney with offices in Brighton, ran unsuccessfully for mayor against Spencer in 1981.

Glessner, on the other hand, has served on the city council for the past four years and was on the planning commission prior to being elected to the council in 1979.

Both Lentz and Glessner took widely divergent views on the major issues. Lentz expressed strong opposition to the proposed expansion of the Vernon M. Spencer Memorial Airport, while Glessner was a strong advocate of the program, serving as chairman of the Airport Board.

City Clerk June Buck reported a voter turnout of approximately 35 percent as 1,220 of Wixom's 3,600 registered voters turned up at the polls.



## Board alleges misconduct

### Second administrator fired

WALLED LAKE — The school board voted unanimously last week to terminate the employment of Community Education Department Director Robert Duff.

Duff was suspended with pay Wednesday, October 25, on charges of alleged misconduct. Gerald Sutton presently is serving as director of Walled Lake Schools Community Education.

Attorney for the school board, Dennis Pollard, confirmed last week that Duff's suspension and subsequent firing is related to the May 9 firing of Community Education Regional Coordinator Gerald Beers.

Beers was reprimanded by Superintendent Don Sheldon in March for allegedly using school district time to conduct a business of marketing computer software to other school districts. The software programs were developed as part of Beers' "regular job assignment" for the school district, Sheldon maintained.

"At no time did Mr. Duff lie to the (school) board," — Harvey Wax Attorney

Duff was implicated when Beers informed the school board that his supervisor had full knowledge of his activities. However, at the same time the board terminated Beers' contract, it voted to extend Duff's contract another year.

Pollard said "new facts were brought to light" recently, leading to the sudden termination of Duff's contract, which was renewed in May.

## Couple says 'It must be love' — after sixty years

WALLED LAKE — It hasn't all been peaches and cream, says Jennie Schueringer.

Married when she was 15 and her husband, Carl, was 17, the Schueringers have seen both good times and bad. This week the couple celebrates its 60th wedding anniversary.

"It must be love, I guess," says Jennie, now 76. "I don't think there's any other way we'd make it all these years."

The two met at a carnival in Detroit, where he was a mail boy for the Detroit News. Six months after their introduction on a streetcar en route from Pontiac to Detroit, he asked her to marry him.

"I was still in school. I skipped school to get married. But I never liked school too much," Jennie recalls. "I really didn't think much about it. I was just a kid."

At 15, going on 16, Jennie thought marriage meant having babies and being able to buy beautiful clothes. She did have babies — six of them — but married life was not always as glamorous as her teenage mind had imagined it would be.

"Life ain't all peaches and cream, especially when you have six children!" she says.

Carl, now 77, recalls times when he worked only one day a month during the Depression. But when those days were over and life was a little easier for a family of eight, Carl built the summer cottage near Wolverine Lake where the couple now resides.

"It was real nice when we lived in Detroit. But she liked this place and in 1949 we moved out here. There was nothing out here then," the retired Rockwell International employee recalls.

"It's too crowded here, now," Jennie adds.

Through 60 years, six children, 17 grandchildren, 18 great grandchildren and five great, great grandchildren, the couple notes that they have kept their sense of humor.

"We both laugh lots. We're always full of fun," says Jennie, while her husband agrees with a chuckle and a wry smile.

They both remember how Carl would never leave for work if they had had an argument. To prove the disagreement had ended, he would make her help him on with his coat.

"Life ain't all peaches and cream, especially when you have six children!" she says.

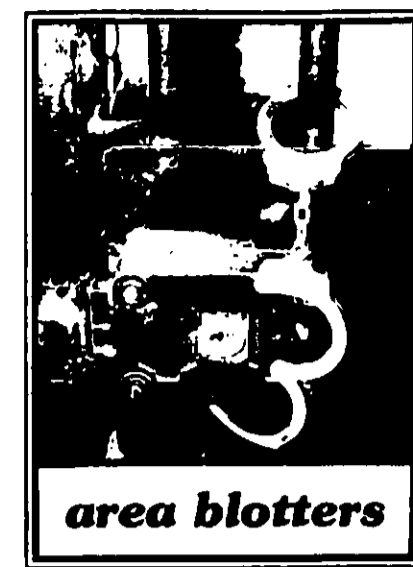
## Girl injured in home by vandals

### In Walled Lake

None of the injuries were reported serious.

An officer investigating the incident spoke with four boys on a nearby corner shortly after the rock was thrown. Although they said they heard a loud noise, none of the boys reported seeing anyone throw the rock.

A black-and-white portable television, \$1 worth of pennies and a parakeet and cage were taken from an apartment on North Pontiac Trail last week, police reported.

The tenant told police an unknown person pried the latch on the apartment door while he was on Saturday evening, November 5. Police reported no suspects in the theft.

A 56-year-old Walled Lake woman was injured Saturday, November 5, when she drove her car into a ditch at Penny Lake and South Commerce roads.

The woman, who allegedly was seen driving recklessly down South Commerce Road by patrons of the Big Apple Restaurant, was arrested for operating a vehicle under the influence of alcohol.

The restaurant patrons reported seeing the woman drive onto the lawn at Shuman Motors shortly after 8 p.m. The witnesses said the car got stuck in the grass and eventually spun free, colliding with a new vehicle on display in the lot.

The driver then left Shuman Motors, continuing northbound on South Commerce, where she reportedly struck a sandwich in front of the Plaza West shopping center. After attempting to turn left onto Penny Lake Drive, the woman reportedly drove into a ditch, where police found her at about 8:30 p.m.

The woman received cuts to her forehead in the accident.

A 29-year-old Wixom man was assaulted outside the Cloverdale Party Store at 1035 East Lake Drive, Friday, October 29.

Police found the man lying face down in the parking lot with injuries to the nose and face. The man told police he was jumped by two men who knocked him to the ground and beat him before he had an opportunity to defend himself.

Witnesses claimed the man was "carousing" at the Frigate Inn bar across the street before going to Cloverdale's police said.

### In Novi

Three break-ins at the Beachwalk Apartments were reported recently.

In an October 27 incident, 25 pieces of jewelry valued at approximately \$1,000 were stolen when a thief entered an apartment through an unlocked door, wall, police reported.

On October 28 two necklaces and a pair of earrings were stolen from the bedroom of an apartment after the thief apparently entered through a doorway with a defective lock. Upon returning home, the owner found the doorway open. The value of the stolen jewelry is undetermined.

In the third incident on October 30, a \$150 camera and a \$50 necklace were stolen from an apartment. The owner said the apartment had been locked, but police found no signs of forced entry.

Two malicious destruction of property incidents occurred at Novi schools last week. Windows on a 1979 Ford Mustang and an AMC Alliance were shot out, apparently by a BB gun, while the cars were parked in the Novi High School parking lot October 31. The driver's side window on both cars were broken.

In the second incident, the tires of five automobiles parked at Novi Middle School North were punctured with a sharp object, such as an ice pick. One rear tire was punctured on four of the cars, while both front tires were punctured on the fifth vehicle.

The damage occurred November 1.

Damage to the 18-foot Hobie Cat sailboat was estimated at \$300. Police report no suspects in the incident.

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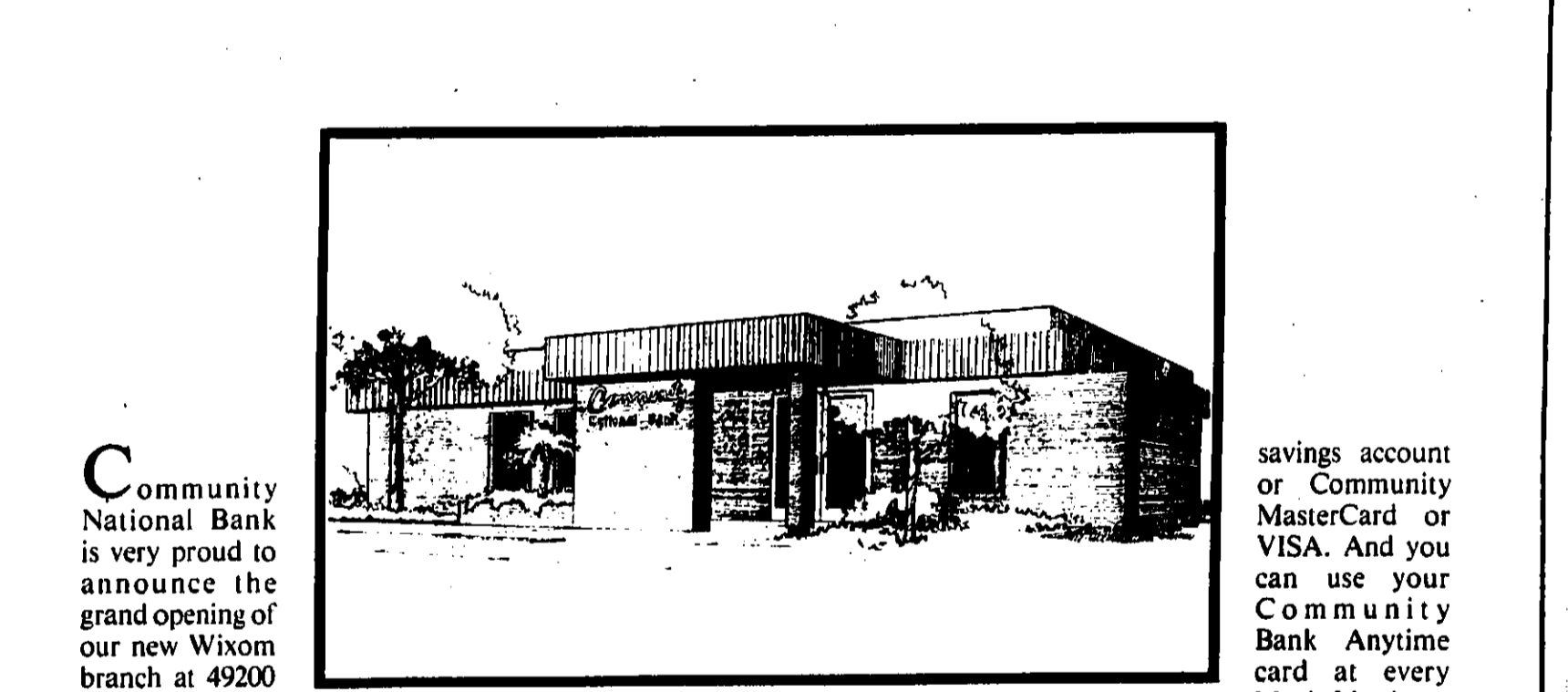
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### Thieves break into safe at Wixom grocery store

WIXOM — Unknown suspects broke into the Wixom Food Market early Monday morning and removed an unknown quantity of money from the safe inside the store.

Police declined to disclose how much money was taken, but said the amount was in excess of several thousand dollars.

The theft was discovered at approximately 7:19 a.m. Monday when Sami Poota, owner of the store at 31000 South Wixom Road, opened for business.

Poota told police the store had been locked and secured at 11 p.m. Sunday. Upon arriving Monday morning, however, he observed the safe door standing open and proceeded to summon police.

Officer Alan Blashfield of the Wixom Police Department reported that the store was subsequently cordoned off and experts from the Michigan State Police crime lab in Northville were called to assist with the investigation.

Blashfield said police estimate that at least two and probably three or more individuals were involved in the heist. Entry was gained through a front door and access to the safe was obtained by prying it open, Blashfield said.

The thieves had cut the wires to the alarm before entering the store, he reported.

In addition to the undisclosed quantity of cash, the thieves also removed a handgun from the safe and then broke into the office area where they removed a second handgun, Blashfield reported.

Reports indicate that the office area was ransacked, apparently in search of additional money.

Blashfield praised the work of investigators from the state police crime lab.

"They were there all day Monday, collecting all possible evidence," reported the Wixom officer.

grade levels. "Our goal," he said, "is to go far beyond those minimum objectives."

Here's a summary of Novi's 1983 MEAP results:

□ At the fourth grade level, 85.7 percent of the students mastered 75-100 percent of the reading objectives. This compares with 85.9 percent in 1982, 88.9 percent in 1981 and 76 percent in 1980.

□ Some 96.7 percent of the fourth graders mastered 75-100 percent of the math objectives. This compares with 84.3 percent in 1982, 89.8 percent in 1981 and 82.2 percent in 1980.

□ At the seventh grade level, 86.4 percent of the students mastered 75-100 percent of the reading objectives. The score compares with 91.8 percent in 1982, 86.5 percent in 1981 and 91.7 percent in 1980.

□ Some 66.7 percent of the seventh graders mastered 75-100 percent of the math objectives, compared with 74.6 percent in 1982, 71.8 percent in 1981 and 73.6 percent in 1980.

liaison group of businessmen are meeting to discuss boundaries for the proposed district.

Planners agreed to use boundaries identified by Planning Consultant Charles Cairns as a "working boundary." Cairns recently presented three other boundary lines for the Town Center district. The boundaries are not the final boundaries, but will serve as a tool to help describe the general area where the Town Center could be located. Final boundaries will be set upon rezoning of the property.

A map showing the smallest area and largest areas Cairns would recommend for the Town Center district, and a district falling between those extremes, have been presented. Cairns indicated that he probably will recommend a district that falls somewhere between the largest and smallest that are under consideration.

"Our concern was that the basic approach is pedestrian oriented and it fits into larger areas it will get away from pedestrian orientation; the distances will be too far and people will start driving again," Cairns said.

He noted that the largest area shown is the size of Twelve Oaks Mall. "We question how existing industrial uses, commercial uses and residential uses," said the planning consultant. "We may be asking more than could be supported, so we reduced the maximum boundary to an area that is walkable."

Cairns also suggested possible land uses for the southeast and southwest quadrants that could serve as a transition, such as a health club. "They are large, but would serve the area from a recreational standpoint," Cairns said. "They also would serve as a transition."

Cairns added that the proposed economic study may be the best way to determine which types of uses should be allowed.

"The biggest question is what the land is best suited for. We're not sure which way it will go," Cairns said.

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
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
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Vandals toppled several historic monuments in the Commerce Cemetery recently.

**Vandals scar old cemetery**

COMMERCE — Vandals severely damaged about eight cemetery monuments dating back to the 1850s. The vandalism is believed to have occurred Halloween night.  
 "Someone pushed the tops off the big family monuments and broke them," said Supervisor Robert Long. The damage was discovered by Oakland County Sheriff's deputy Stanley Clarke on Tuesday, November 1.  
 The cemetery, located on the north side of Commerce Road, contains the graves of early settlers. The large monuments mark family plots; there are smaller markers for individual members.  
 "The age and historic value of the monuments add to the concern over the damage," Long said. "The families that were here in the 1800s had these stones brought in by train and then by horse and wagon," commented Long. "When you see how hard they worked and sacrificed for their family monuments, this is just a real shame."

The monuments stand 10-12 feet, Long said, and are carved from white sand stone or marble. He said the cemetery contractor was to contact monument companies for information about repairing the damaged monuments.  
 "Vandalism at the cemetery has not really been a problem in the past," Long commented. "It's been a long time since there were any problems, probably back in the 1930s or 1940s," he said. "It was nothing like this."

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**Cable system angers residents**

NOVI — Farmington Hills residents are hopping mad with the cable television service area designed by MetroVision and local officials are working to make sure the same situation does not occur here.  
 Between 50-60 Farmington Hills residents recently attended a meeting of the Southwest Oakland Cable Commission to express their dissatisfaction with the manner in which service is being extended through their community. Apparently, the sparse population of some parts of Farmington Hills has caused the cable company, which holds the franchise for Novi, Farmington Hills and Farmington, to revise the cable system so that it no longer conforms with the design the company said it would provide when it bid on the franchise.  
 Novi City Manager Edward Kriewall said MetroVision "feels there is an economic problem in extending cable service to sparsely populated areas that don't have density levels of 30 homes per lineal mile."  
 As a result there are areas where portions of a subdivision have been wired for cable service, while others are not. Residents told the commission they would be willing to pay higher rates if the service were extended to their homes.  
 Kriewall said the matter is in the preliminary discussion stage. "MetroVision has not said it won't change the service area," Kriewall said.  
 The consultant has asked that the cable company prepare a financial analysis so the situation can be evaluated from a more objective standpoint, he added.  
 "The initial indication for Novi is that the impact is not that significant. We have smaller lot subdivisions and most of Novi's subdivisions will hit the 30-home per mile density without much trouble," Kriewall said.  
 Commissioners met with consultant Harold Horn of the Cable Television Information Center in Washington D.C. last week to discuss the situation. "He's of the opinion that they can't

 The MESC reversed its decision on July 11, and the school district subsequently appealed the reversal. McCall said the school board fired Duff at a special meeting Tuesday, October 25, one day before Beers' MESC appeal hearing.

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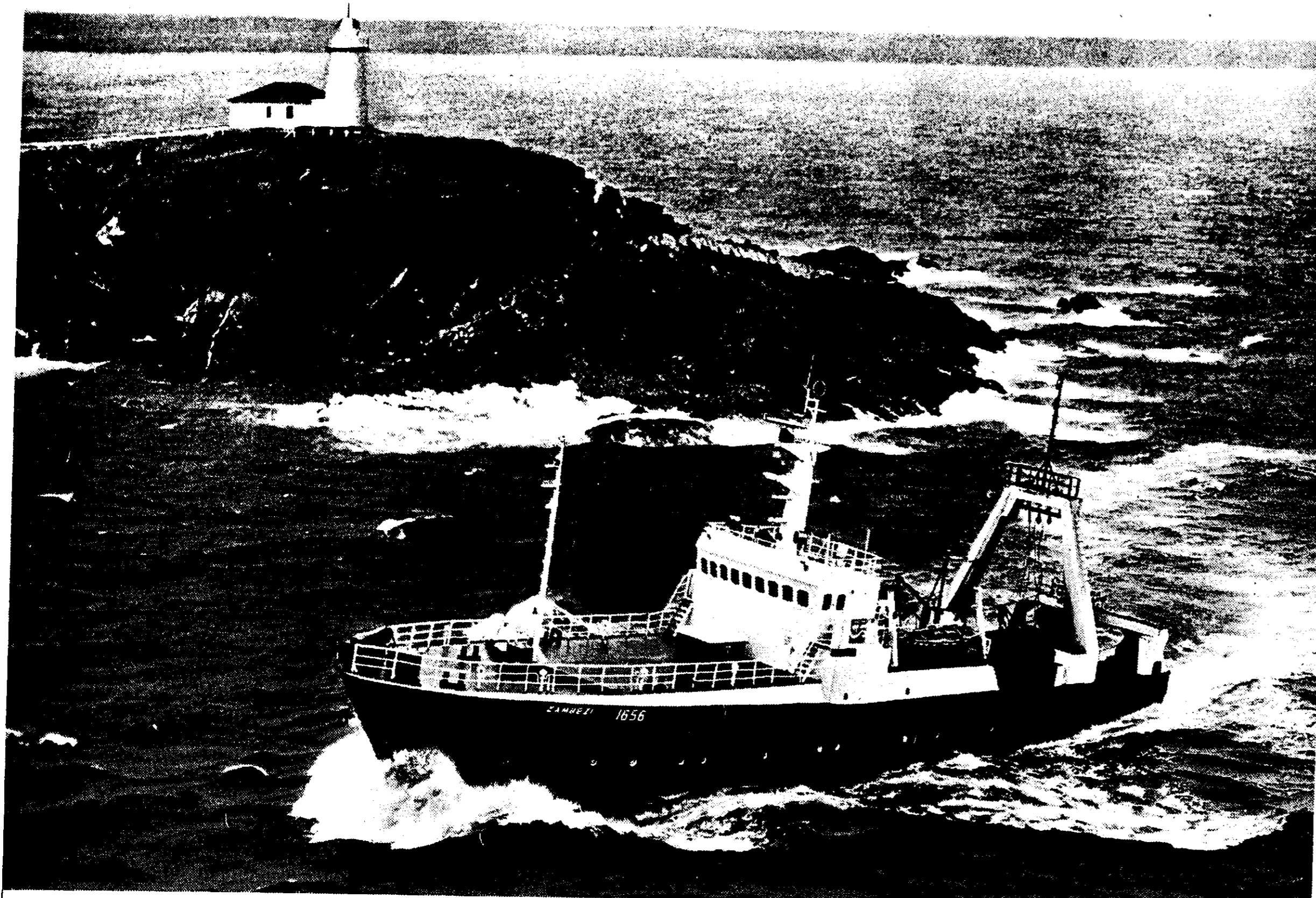

# Mays of Michigan strong after 100 years

It's been 100 years since Abraham May opened the first Mays of Michigan store in 1883. But a century of progress hasn't taken the company from its basic philosophy of dealing with people. "You've got to offer honest value for an honest dollar," said Norman Taimo, president of the company which has just opened a store in Novi's Twelve Oaks Mall.

"If you follow that kind of philosophy, you can stay in business a hundred years like we have."

The company has good reason to celebrate this landmark, which it calls its "First 100 Years. Since 1872, Mays of Michigan has witnessed an 800 percent increase in business, while opening stores in Breton Village in Grand Rapids and Boca Raton, Florida.

But it hasn't always been that way. The company was a family-owned business until 1967 when it was sold to an out-of-state, publicly-owned corporation that took just five years of poor management to undo much of the success achieved by the Mays families.

In 1972, Taimo bought the business and set about to restore both merchandise quality and image. He bought back Mays charge accounts, which had been sold to a collection agency, and began correspondence with Mays customers to let them know the company was back in local hands and their business was wanted.

"We knew we had to do more than just tell them what was happening," said Taimo. "We also had to get the garments on the people's backs so they would find out we had put the value back in our merchandise."

Despite the rough stretch of road for the company in the late 60s, Taimo had confidence in the true value of his purchase. Mays had built a solid reputation overnight volume in business, we consider it more important to provide our clientele with fashion that endures."



The company was called the Giant Clothing Company in 1903 when Meyer May, Abraham's son, offered another Grand Rapidsian, John Thomas Batts, a place to display his new invention — the wooden coat hanger. Until then, men's suits — the stylish ones that sold for \$2 — were stocked on shelved folded.

Batts came up with the piece of wood fashioned to fit under the shoulders of the suit, the famous Frank Lloyd Wright designed the glass cabinet to display the suits, and Meyer May gave them space in his store to exhibit the innovation.

In 1905, the company was incorporated under the name A. May & Sons and today there are five stores in two states known simply as Mays of Michigan.

The Mays of today is "a Michigan corporation, growing with Michigan," said Taimo. Mays employs over 150 people.

The Mays president has some definite ideas on what it takes to continue its success in a very competitive, demanding business. "Unless people are well-served, they're not likely to come back again," said Taimo, pointing to his people's ability to deal with the public.

"I think we generate an atmosphere in our stores, because our people are putting in a team effort to provide the best possible services to our clientele. The customer notices the difference."

Mays' buyers look for what they call the "classic fashions," clothes with a more conservative approach, but with some of the current fashion in them as well. "We don't usually get involved with fads," said Taimo. "While some stores look for fad items to give them overnight volume in business, we consider it more important to provide our clientele with fashion that endures."

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## Great Lakes leaders to convene in Detroit

Leaders in business, labor, government, agriculture, education and the professions from six Great Lakes states will meet in Detroit November 21 and 22 to discuss how the states can attack their mutual problems and exploit their common strengths.

Plans for the Congress on the Economic Future of the Great Lakes States were revealed recently by Walter J. McCarthy, Jr., chairman and chief executive officer of Detroit Edison, which initiated and will host the congress at the Westin Hotel. McCarthy will serve as general chairman.

Principal speakers at the congress will be Roger B. Smith, chairman and CEO of General Motors; Owen Bieber, president of the UAW; Frank W. Naylor, Jr., U.S. Undersecretary of Agriculture and Governor James J. Blanchard of Michigan. Detroit Mayor Coleman A. Young will welcome delegates.

McCarthy said the objective of the congress is "to identify goals, strategies and areas for cooperative effort to improve the economic future of the Great Lakes region, considering the impact of government policies and the considerable human, business, educational, natural and civic resources available."

"We believe the states need to have some long-term strategies and priorities to help them and business and labor organizations operating in the region plan intelligently for the future."

"The last thing we want to come out of this meeting is a new organization," McCarthy added. "There are plenty of those already as witness the large number of Great Lakes organizations helping sponsor the Congress."

Joining Edison as sponsors will be a large number of organizations representing Michigan, Minnesota, Ohio, Indiana, Illinois and Wisconsin. They include the Council of Great Lakes Governors; the Great Lakes Economic Policies Council; the Center for the Great Lakes; state AFL-CIO organizations from Michigan and the other states; NAACP and Urban League chapters in various cities; the National Association of Women Business Owners; New Detroit, Inc. the Northeast-Midwest Institute; the Great Lakes Commission; the President's Council of State Colleges and Universities and state chambers of commerce, farm bureaus, women's groups and manufacturers associations throughout the area.

"What we are trying to do," McCarthy said, "is provide a forum which will bring these and other organizations together — along with individual experts in many fields — to pool their intellectual and other resources in a search for ways to attack the Great Lakes state's common problems and to further exploit this region's enormous strengths — including a large and skilled work force, a strong industrial base, an excellent transportation system, a modern and balanced energy system, and many first-class universities and other educational institutions."

The Congress will open with a plenary session at 10 a.m. Monday, November 21, featuring Young's welcome, introductory remarks by McCarthy, and major addresses by Smith and Naylor. Bieber will speak at lunch the first day and Blanchard the second day.

The afternoon of the first day and morning of the second will be devoted to workshops on eight subjects: stimulating new investment, energy resources, human resources, natural resources, agriculture, the infrastructure, federal allocations and interstate teamwork.

Moderators and facilitators will be assigned to each workshop and background papers prepared by the Northeast-Midwest Institute on the workshop subjects will be distributed in advance to participants.

The Great Lakes Economic Policies Council will sponsor or co-sponsor a reception the evening of November 21. McCarthy said attendance at the Congress is by invitation only but that observers will be admitted with advance approval.

## RideShare computer open to public

For the first time, the general public in Southeast Michigan can take advantage of a computerized ridesharing service that can help them save up to \$1,000 or more each year by matching them with car-or-van-pooling partners. RideShare, a free service of SEMCOG (the Southeast Michigan Council of Governments) previously worked with employers throughout the region to match employees interested in sharing the ride to work. Making the service available to the public maximizes RideShare's ability to reach more of the 1.8 million commuters in the region to help them cut their costs, often dramatically.

For example, a commuter who drives 40 miles roundtrip can save over \$1,000 a year by joining a four-person car-pool or 15-passenger van-pool, and almost \$800 by sharing the ride with just one other person. Commuters who drive longer distances can save even more by ridesharing. By joining a car-or-van-pool a commuter who drives 80 miles roundtrip to and from work daily can save almost \$3,000 annually. The most economical commuting option RideShare offers is to become a van-pool driver. Drivers of the 12 or 15-passenger vans ride free and have use of the vans evenings and weekends. In return, they collect fares and work with RideShare to find and maintain the minimum number of passengers.

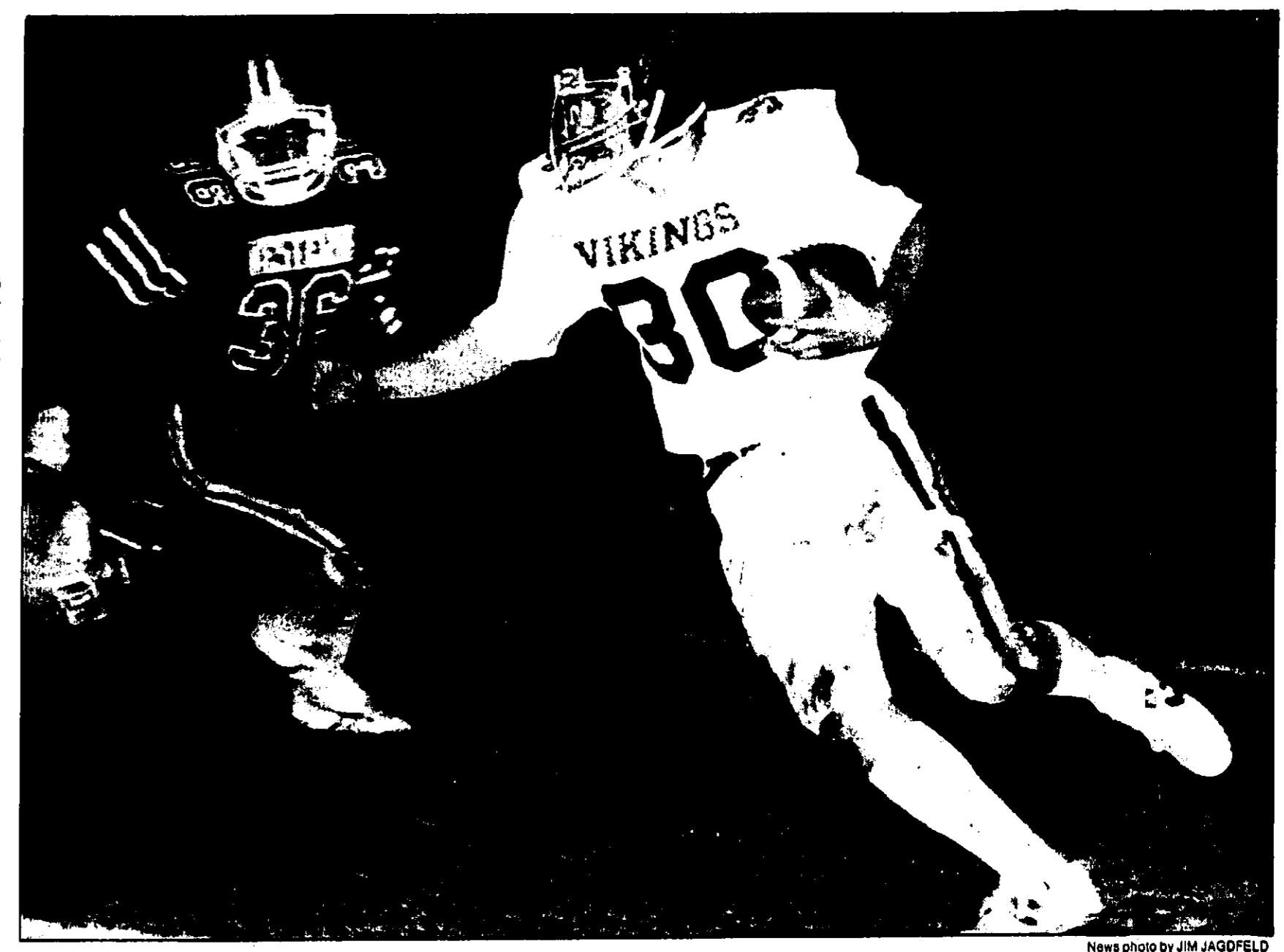

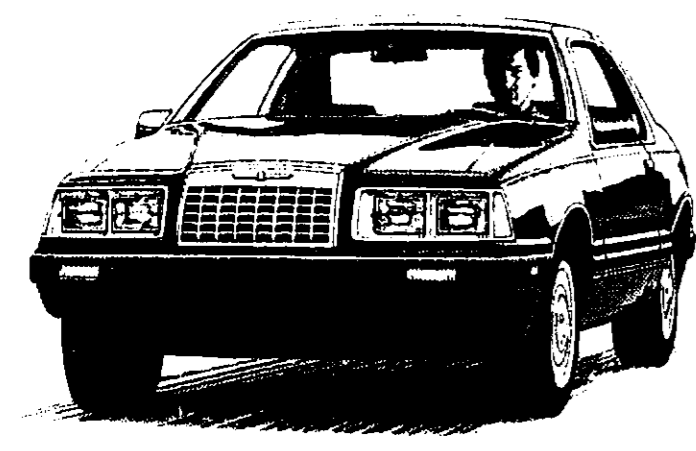
Central's Wayne Adams (30) finds running room against Western. News photo by JIM JACQUEL

Menard shines as Vikings rally to beat Western

If you're trying to be diplomatic, you could look at the annual football clash between Walled Lake Western and Walled Lake Central as a draw — Western won the first half, Central took the second.
But the truth of the matter is that Western won the first half 10-6, while the Vikings roared back with 22 unanswered points in the second half to claim a 28-10 victory.
It was the final game of the season for both teams. The injury-riddled Warriors finished with a disappointing 3-6 record, but the Vikings enjoyed one of their most successful seasons in recent years, posting a lousy 7-2 mark.
Both of Central's defeats were administered by the two-time defending state champions from Farmington Harbor. The Vikings finished 4-0 in the W.L.A.A. to win the Lakes Division championship.
"We played a very good first half on offense," reported Chuck App, coach of the Warrior grounds. "We moved the ball on the ground and through the air, but we lost our consistency in the second half and they broke a couple of big plays to knock us out."
Western scored its lone touchdown in the first quarter when halfback Rob Adams cupped a 70-yard, 11-play drive by scampering into the end zone from the six. Scott Wandelowski added the extra point to make it 7-0, but Central quarterback Tom Menard narrowed the gap to 7-6 by sneaking in from the

one after the Vikings had marched 85 yards. The extra point attempt was unsuccessful.
Western upped its lead to 10-6 with approximately three minutes left in the half as Wandelowski tied a school record by booting a 42-yard field goal. The kick tied the record for longest field goal set last year by Paul Imms.

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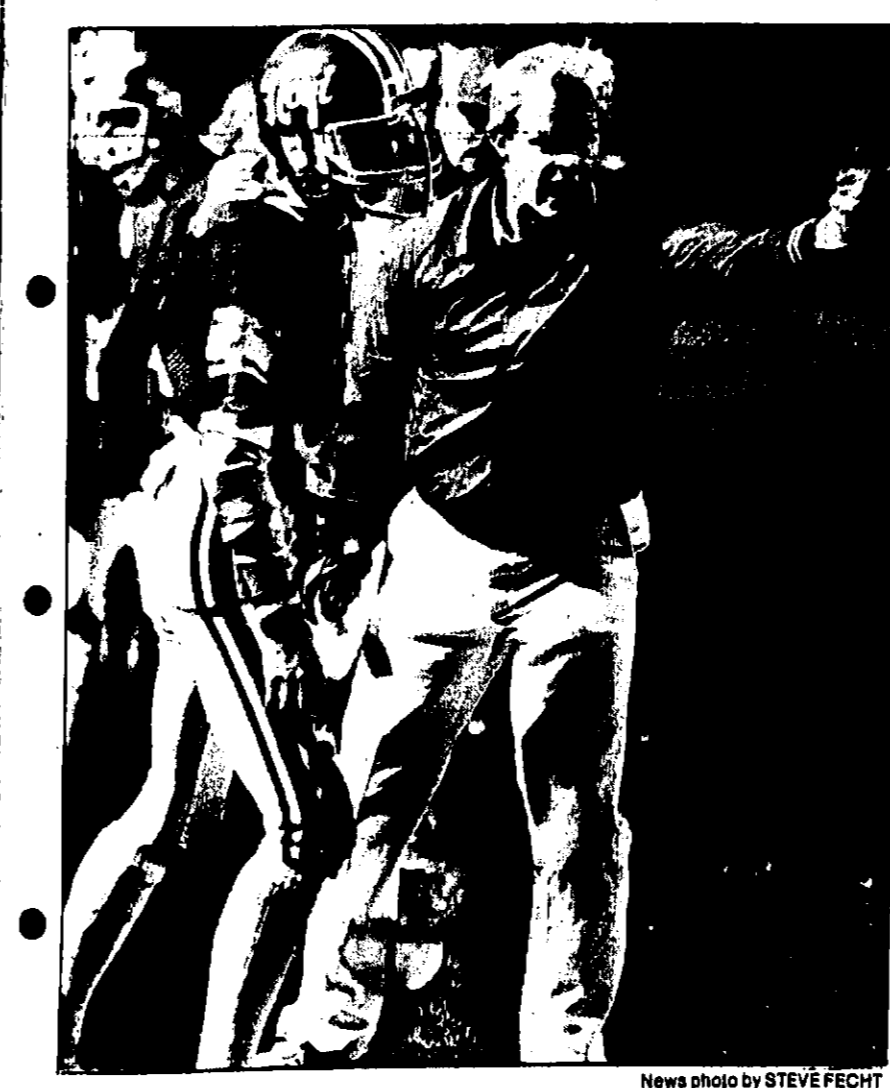

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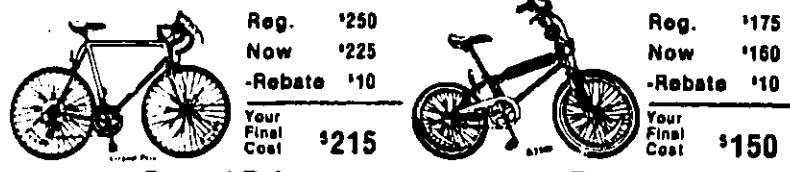
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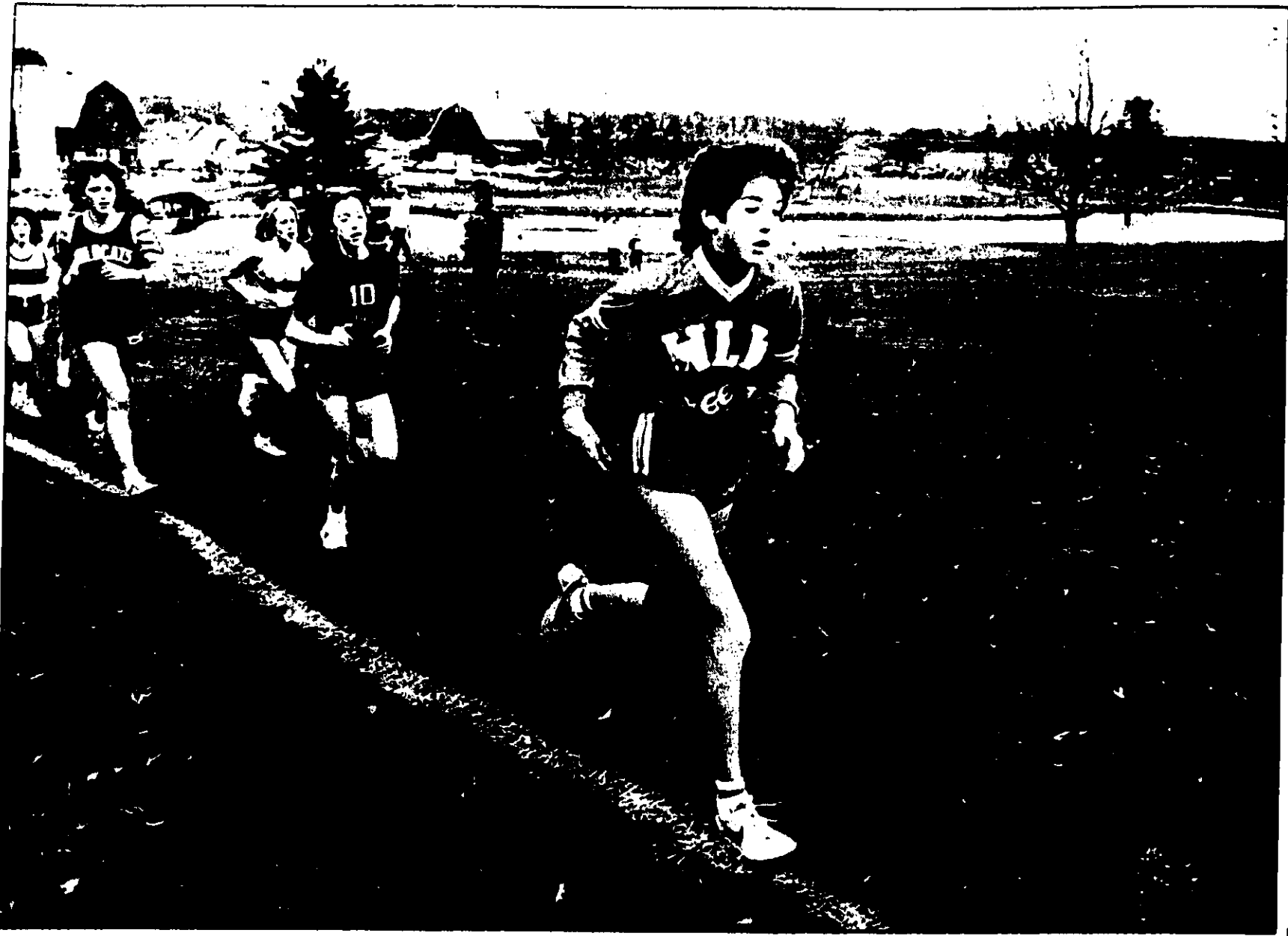

## Wildcat cagers take two as Ede returns to action

Novi's girls' basketball team bounced back in style last week, notching wins over league-leading Milford Lakeland and Hartland to snap a five-game losing streak and light back to a 6-4 Kensington Valley Conference (KVC) record.

On Tuesday, Novi avenged an earlier homecourt loss to Lakeland (8-2) by pulling away with a 13-5 scoring edge in the fourth quarter to claim a 51-40 victory. Forward Sue Rasinske, now averaging 20.7 points and 10.8 rebounds per game, hit for 25 against the second-place Eagles.

But there were two factors that at least helped with Rasinske's dominance — Lakeland's 6'0" center Therese Saulski, one of the league's most dominant players, was out for the season with pulled ligaments. The other factor was the return of 5'11" center-forward Barb Ede, who has now recovered from an appendicitis operation and is back to 100 percent effectiveness.

"We have a good bench," Novi Coach Bill Ayotte said, "but I was really wrong about how much we needed Barb. I thought we'd be able to get along without her, but I didn't see what she does for our inside game. We were 2-5 without her in the lineup. She complements Sue (Rasinske) really well, and we can now really dominate on the boards. She takes a lot of pressure off Sue. Nobody can really handle Sue with Barb in the game. She gives us a little more size underneath on offense, and they have to respect her. Teams can still get away with double teaming Sue, but with Barb in the lineup, they can't triple-team her."

Sherry Lawton added nine points, and Peggy Wilson controlled the game against the Eagles, despite an explosive first half. After one quarter, Novi held a 25-30 lead which they slowly extended throughout the game.

"Peggy was playing real good defense and Barb was, too," Ayotte said. "But with Peggy and Sherry controlling the tempo we were able to get the high-percentage shots we wanted. I'm really happy with the way we looked out there." Rasinske ran wild last Thursday, scoring half of Novi's points in a 60-36 runaway victory over the Hartland Eagles. Despite the Eagles' 6'1" center, Rasinske connected on 12 field goals and six free throws for 30 points and nabbed 13 rebounds in the process. Wilson added 12 points — 10 from perimeter jumpers — and Ede hauled in seven rebounds.

The game was never close after Novi ran off to a 14-6 first quarter lead, and the Wildcat reserves all were whisked into the ballgame. "They all looked pretty good, too," Ayotte added, noting that Novi continued to pull away long after the starters had left the game.

Novi goes back to work at 7:30 p.m. Friday night at South Lyon. The Lions beat Ede-less Novi on the Wildcats' homecourt in their last encounter, but Novi is looking to even the mark.

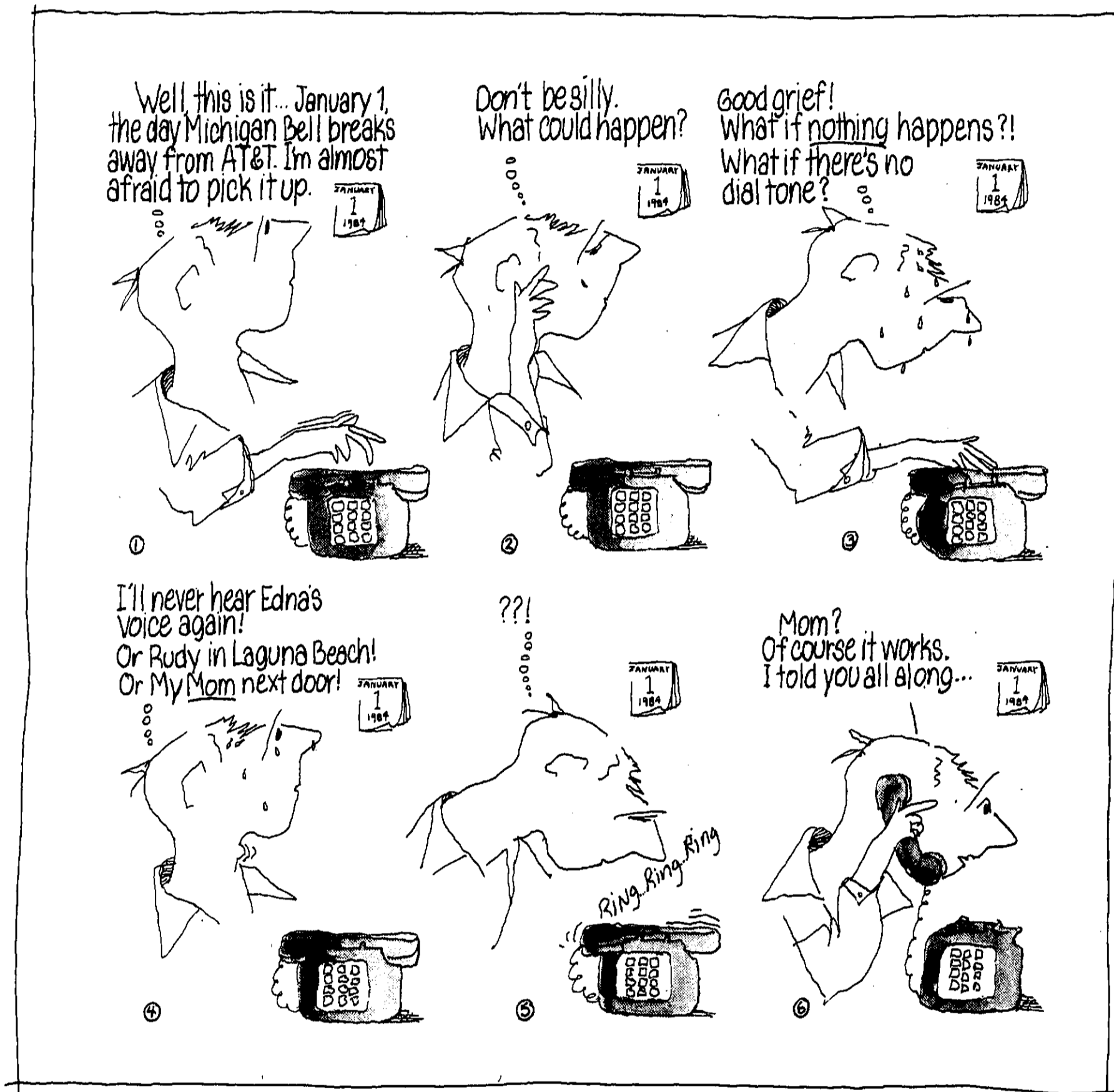

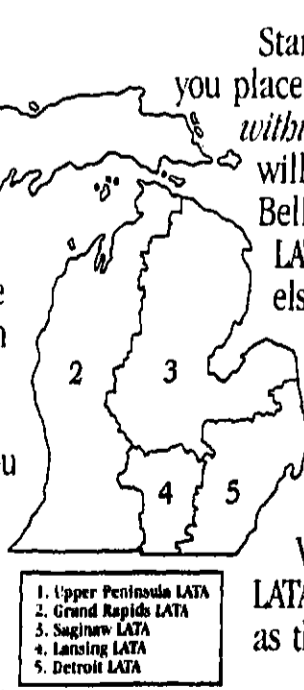
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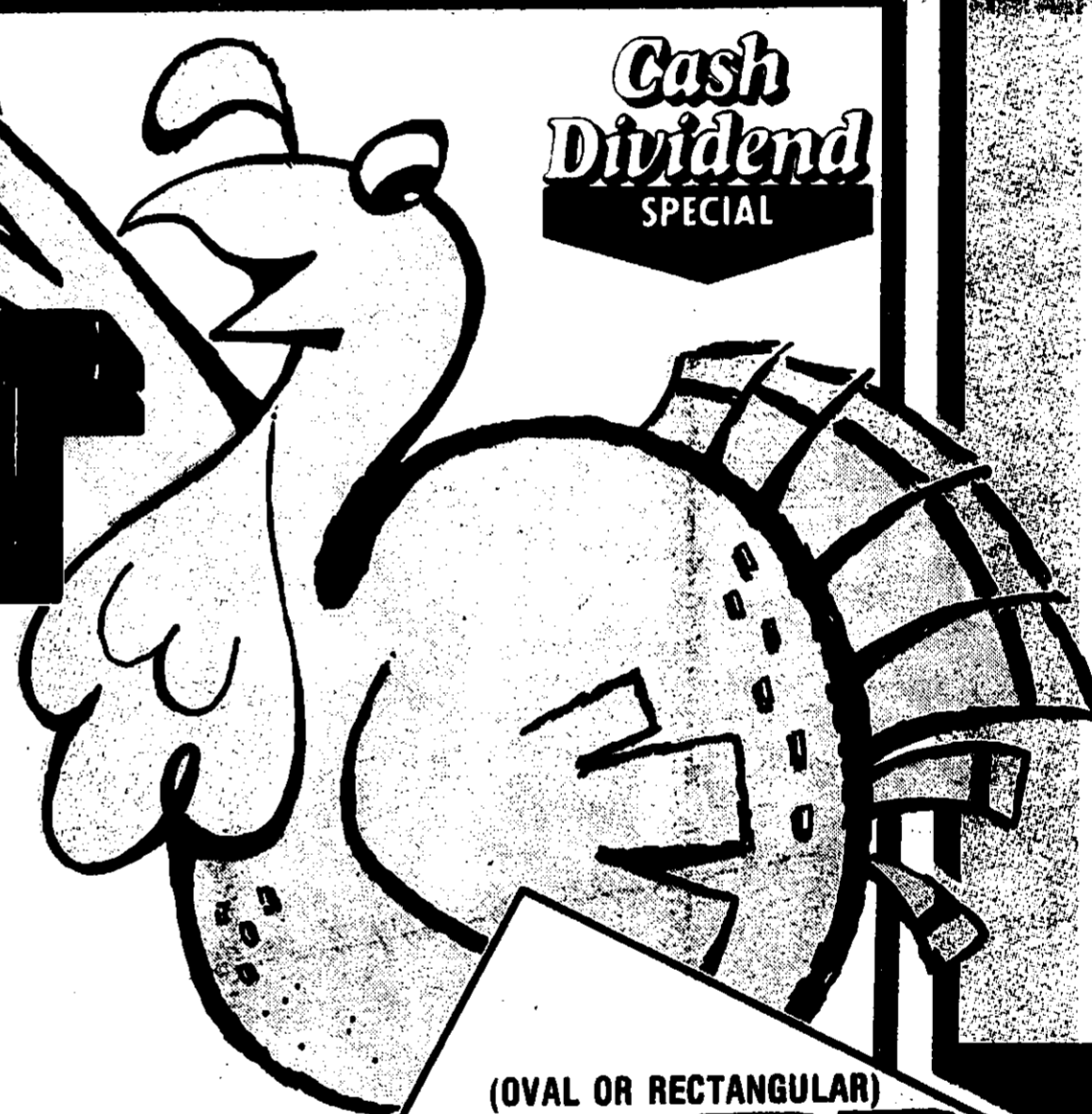
