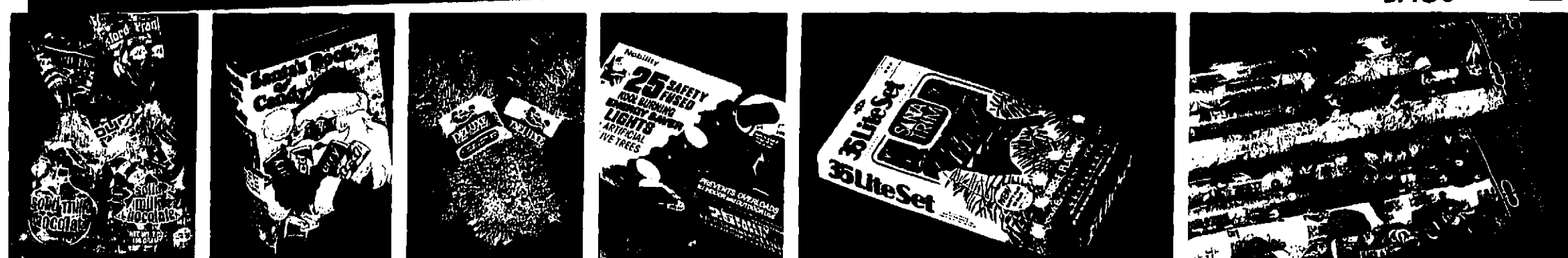

### Council debates DPW building

NOVI — Council members are wrestling with the question of the proper way to finance construction of a \$1.9 million Department of Public Works (DPW) maintenance facility. The council will renew debate of the issue at its next meeting on Monday, December 5, in the Novi Public Library at 8 p.m. One suggestion has come from City Manager Edward Kriewall, who has asked the council to consider borrowing \$883,000 through the 1983 Michigan bond fund loan program. The state has sold bonds and is making loans available to municipalities across Michigan in an attempt to stimulate public works projects and create jobs. But some council members have balked at borrowing money from the state, saying they do not want to incur the city with the annual payments of \$115,000 for 15 years necessary for retiring the debt. Some expressed philosophical objections to the proposal and others opposed the plan on the grounds repayment of the loan would delay road program projects. Finance Director Les Gibson recommended the city borrow the funds from the state, saying there will be enough fund balance in the major street fund to cover the payments for the first five years. After that, approximately 20 percent of the municipal street fund would be used to pay off the debt, as well as major street funds. Gibson has urged the council to move ahead with construction of the DPW facility in order to upgrade the current conditions for storing city equipment. Currently, equipment is stored in several locations throughout the city. Much of it is stored outside. Construction of a DPW facility, said Gibson, will extend the life of the equipment. Additionally, completion of the proposed facility will enable the city to sell the current DPW garage site on Grand River as well as the former police station on Novi Road where Parks and Recreation maintenance equipment is now stored. Kriewall also urged council to proceed with construction of the DPW facility since the city has outgrown the existing garage. "It's no secret we need a new DPW facility," Kriewall said. "In 1970 we invested \$45,000 in a pole barn and that's gotten us by, but we outgrew that facility six years ago. It's jam packed and the majority of the equipment stands outside in the weather." Kriewall said the council had recognized the need to replace the DPW garage five years ago, but the project was delayed because the city had more immediate priorities. Once the police and fire facilities were built, the city turned its attention to a new DPW facility. Planning was delayed by the fact there is little heavy industrial property left in the city and it proved difficult to find a site. One year ago the city spent approximately \$22,000 for 22 acres of property on Eleven Mile and authorized the drafting of architectural plans. Those plans have been shelved, however, as the council determines how the building is to be financed. Kriewall has advocated borrowing money from the state, while some council members have said that would represent a deviation from the city's past practice of asking voters to approve major expenditures for public buildings through millage requests. Others objected to incurring a \$115,000 annual debt, saying they feared it eventually would require the use of general funds for repayment. Council Member Martha Hoyer opposed the state loan, saying she "had a problem using road funds to repay this." Hoyer said she did not support "tunneling off" monies intended for road paving and repairs into construction of buildings. (Continued on 11)

### Standard, optional cable features sold

NOVI — It doesn't take a trip to Hudson's to shop for cable television service. Cable television is sold door-to-door by sales representatives who come into a prospective subscriber's home to give a presentation lasting between 10-15 minutes. Officials of MetroVision, the company that has received the franchise for Novi, Farmington and Farmington Hills, has made such presentations in approximately 2,000 homes throughout the city, according to company officials. "Our sales people go over the services, prices and any details the people want to know about," explained Bjorklund of MetroVision. "If people want to sign up they can." Bjorklund said the sales presentation is designed to give potential subscribers "an understanding" of available services. Sales representatives can answer questions regarding the three tiers, or levels of service, offered by the company. The first tier basically provides channels which most homes now receive with a good antenna. But the public access channel, which will show local programming, also is available on the first tier. The first tier of service costs \$2.45 per month and also contains Channels 2-22, including PBS stations from Toledo, Detroit, Indianapolis and Canada. The second tier includes channels 2-36. Those who select the second tier also receive access to some pay services. Stations WTBS, WOR, and public access channels are offered. Tier two sells for \$5.45 per month, while special paid channels can be added for \$7.50 per month. The third tier has channels 2-54 and includes optional paid services. Cable News Network, ESPN, USA network, Nashville Network, the weather channel, music television and public access are among the offerings on the third tier. Tier three costs \$7.25 and pay services are \$7.50 monthly. Options available to subscribers are a remote control device for \$3.25 a month, as well as a television/movie guide. "Most people want all three tiers," said Cable Consortium Director Lark Samuelson. The price compares to other cable companies in the metropolitan area is extremely reasonable. Additionally, an installation charge is sometimes waived if subscribers connect to the system while it is in "the initial build stage," according to (Continued on 13)



### Novi Schools to seek millage renewal

— A special election has been scheduled by the school board for Tuesday, March 6, to seek renewal of 10 1/2 mills for operating expenses. Specifically, voters will be asked to approve renewal of 10 1/2 mills. The 10 1/2 mills previously were approved for a three-year period in the March 31, 1981, election. Assistant Superintendent William Barr noted that the 10 1/2 mills have expired and cannot be levied again without voter approval. The 10 1/2 mills represent approximately one-third (35 percent) of the operating millage currently collected for the schools. The district currently levies 29.99 mills for operations. The millage renewal question will fall approximately one year after the last renewal proposal. Voters approved the renewal of 13 mills for operations by a margin of 504 to 383 in a special election on March 28 of this year. The 13 mill renewal last March raised the total authorized millage levy for operation of schools to \$3.03 mills, although the board is levying only 29.99 of those mills during the current school year. School boards may not levy more than the authorized millage levy, but they may levy less than the amount ap-

### Hearing sla on Town Ce...

NOVI — After nearly two months of meetings with members of the business community, the planning board is ready to present an ordinance to control the proliferation of businesses deemed "out-of-character" with plans for the commercial area around the Grand River/Novi Road intersection. A public hearing on the Town Center ordinance has been scheduled for Wednesday, December 7, at 8 p.m. at Novi Middle School South. When tentative plans for the area were presented to approximately 150 members of a liaison committee in mid-September, there was overwhelming opposition to the proposals. Business representatives complained they fell shut out of the planning process and asked the city to improve its communications with them. Since then city officials and planning board members have worked with members of a liaison committee in hopes of developing a proposal which will be satisfactory to local business owners and meet the city's needs as well. The proposed Town Center ordinance is under consideration as part of the city's short-term plans for the area. The regulations are designed to control the type of business going into the commercial area surrounding the Grand River/Novi Road intersection by preventing the development of businesses considered "out-of-character" with ultimate plans. An economic analysis and a physical design plan are to be undertaken at a later date to determine the proper type of development to be encouraged in the Town Center. The proposed ordinance now includes a clause which will allow existing businesses to remain in operation while plans for the Town Center move forward. Under terms of the ordinance as proposed, any business that is considered a "lawful" commercial or industrial use at the time the ordinance is enacted can be continued and expanded. Without such language several existing businesses would be considered "non-conforming" and be prohibited from expanding. Development of the Town Center is a long-range goal for the area. Ways of reaching that goal have not yet been determined or studied. In hopes of answering questions regarding the purpose of the plan, the planners adopted a working definition of the Town Center. They described it as a plan to develop the Grand River/Novi Road area, a long-range plan to place people in under-developed areas as delineated in the Master Plan. One of the methods to be used to place people in the area is multiple zoning (apartments or condominiums). The other method is office zoning. Multiples will provide a nucleus of people during the evening or night, while offices will provide them during the day. This basic nucleus of people is designed to attract additional people who will require the services of the business community, which ultimately should prosper by the development of the Town Center. Whether the city proceeds with those plans depends upon the outcome of professional studies of the area.

### Couple robbed at NBD branch

NOVI — A gunman took \$105 from a South Lyon man outside the National Bank of Detroit (NBD) branch on Grand River after the man made a withdrawal from the 24-hour teller machine November 22. Harold G. Ludwig, 64, reported he was robbed by an armed man at about 9:40 p.m. He told police he drove into the NBD lot to make a withdrawal and left the vehicle, while his wife waited in the car. As he was making the withdrawal, Ludwig said he noticed a man approach the 24-hour teller machine from across the north side of the darkened parking lot, but did not see the man until he was almost to the teller machine. Ludwig then noticed the man was carrying a two-inch steel revolver. After the man repeatedly told Ludwig to "give me that money," he handed over the \$100. The gunman then ordered Ludwig to put the card back in the machine and he could not make another withdrawal. The gunman then ordered Ludwig to turn over his wallet and subsequently removed five \$1 bills. He then walked around Ludwig as if to leave, but turned before going and struck him on the head with the gun. Ludwig told police he offered no resistance, giving the suspect everything he asked for. The assailant was described as a black male, 19-20 years old, about 5'10" and with a slender build. He has a medium complexion, no facial hair and was wearing a dark jacket with the words "Frankfurt, Germany" on the back. The gunman left the scene on foot in a northeasterly direction and fired a shot as he left the scene. Police later found the bank door was shot and a bullet was located near the door. A second man also was in the area during the robbery and a third is believed to have been waiting in a car, but the couple could not describe the other suspects. The Ludwig also reported seeing an automobile southbound on Eleven Mile with its lights off, which the men may have used to flee the scene. The vehicle continued eastbound on Grand River without turning on its lights. When the men left, Ludwig got back in the car and the couple left the parking lot, looking for the suspect vehicle. When they could not find the automobile they drove to the police station on Ten Mile. Ludwig was taken to Novi Providence Annex where he was treated for a blow to the head and released.

# Deadline nears for public comments on airport

WIXOM — Public comments and related information about the proposed expansion of Spencer Airport can be submitted to the Department of Natural Resources (DNR) through Friday, December 2.

Several hundred persons appeared earlier this month at the DNR's public hearing on the project. Comments from the hearing must be incorporated before the Environmental Review Board can act on the project's Environmental Impact Statement (EIS). "We need to get the transcripts of the public hearing and add them to the report plus any letters or comments after the hearing," said Robert Addy of the Michigan Aeronautics Commission (MAC). "The procedure then will be to send the report back to the locals for approval."

The EIS' preferred alternative calls for construction of a 5,000-foot primary east-west runway with a secondary 1,800-foot north-south crosswind runway. The construction of paved runways would allow jet traffic to use the airport. The report has to be approved by state and federal agencies, Addy said.

The next action is dependent on the local unit's interest in the project. "If the airport layout plan and EIS are both accepted, a sponsor will be named for the project — probably the city of Wixom," Addy commented. "After that they will apply for federal funding."

Less than 20 people spoke at the public hearing, which Addy described as having a "great turnout." Most speakers opposed airport expansion, he said, but letters supporting the proposal have been received since the hearing. "Sometimes there is a tendency for the negative side to speak at meetings rather than the positive side," Addy said. "We have to let the Environmental Review Board decide if the objections are significant."

Among those expressing opposition to the project were Lyon and Milford townships. Lyon Township is listed as a co-sponsor of the EIS and directly adjoins the airport. "Wixom may be able to resolve the conflicts with Lyon through an agreement. Part of their objections are over possible annexations," Addy commented. "If the project is to go I think the township needs reassurances that their contribution will not be lost. That is a real concern."

Wixom offered an agreement to Lyon and other area townships calling for a joint planning board and cooperation on adjoining projects. There is also a stipulation regarding annexations with the exception of lands for the airport project. Originally, the proposal included a provision for Wixom to pay Lyon a portion of the tax revenues. The payment would be determined by applying Lyon's millage rate to the annexed area, which would have a higher State Equalized Value (SEV) due to the development. The city council removed that provision from the agreement, however.

"I am not ready now to analyze the hearing results. We have to see if the problems are resolvable," Addy said. "Look at the objections to the ELP project in Upper Peninsula or the protests at Williams International. This is no where near the same level. The kind of intensity needs to be measured."

It will be at least January before the EIS is returned to the Environmental Review Board, Addy said. If the project is proceeding, he said, the application for federal funding would probably not be made until fiscal year 1985.

# Communities to enforce fishing shanty removal

NOVI/WALLED LAKE — Ice fishermen won't be allowed to let their shanties sink into Walled Lake this year.

In compliance with requests from residents in the lake area, Novi's City Council has voted unanimously to enact an ordinance making it illegal to leave fishing shanties on the lake after the ice appears unsafe for removal.

Meanwhile, the Walled Lake council this month established the registration and storage fees pursuant to its shanty ordinance passed in April.

Residents living on Walled Lake requested the ordinance because in the past they have had to remove the shanties which sank into the lake and created a hazard for boaters.

The ordinance approved by the Novi council requires anyone who erects a fishing shanty on the ice of Walled Lake to put the owner's name and address on the shanty in two-inch tall letters, which complies with state law.

The violation will be considered a separate offense. In Walled Lake, city council members set registration and storage fees pursuant to its shanty ordinance passed in April.


Before setting a shanty on the ice, fishermen must register it with City Clerk Ruby Lewandowski. The registration fee is \$5.

The Walled Lake ordinance requires shanty owners to attach a waterproof registration tag to the shanty while it is on the ice. All shanties must be removed from the lake by sundown on the last day of February. If weather permits, fishermen can move their shanties onto the lake during March but must remove them each night.

If a shanty is not removed from the lake by the end of February, a city ordinance enforcement officer will mark the structure, telling its owner the shanty must be removed. If the shanty is not removed within 48 hours, Walled Lake officials will confiscate it. A storage fee of \$10 for the first day of storage and \$3 each day thereafter has been adopted by the city council.

If the shanty is not claimed within 30 days, it may be sold by the city. Violation of the Walled Lake shanty ordinance is a misdemeanor, punishable by a \$50 fine or up to five days in jail.

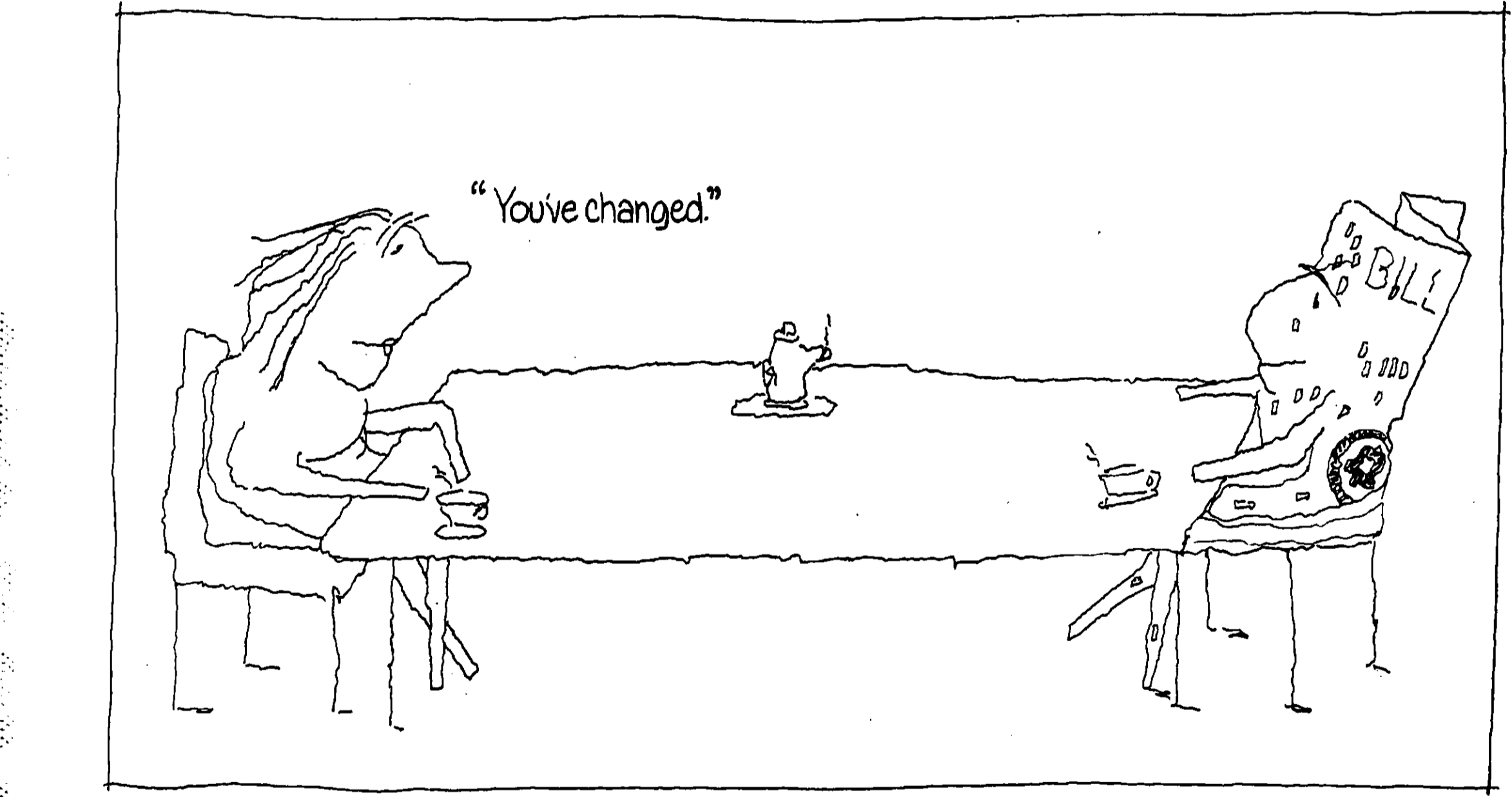

# The Protest's Fallout



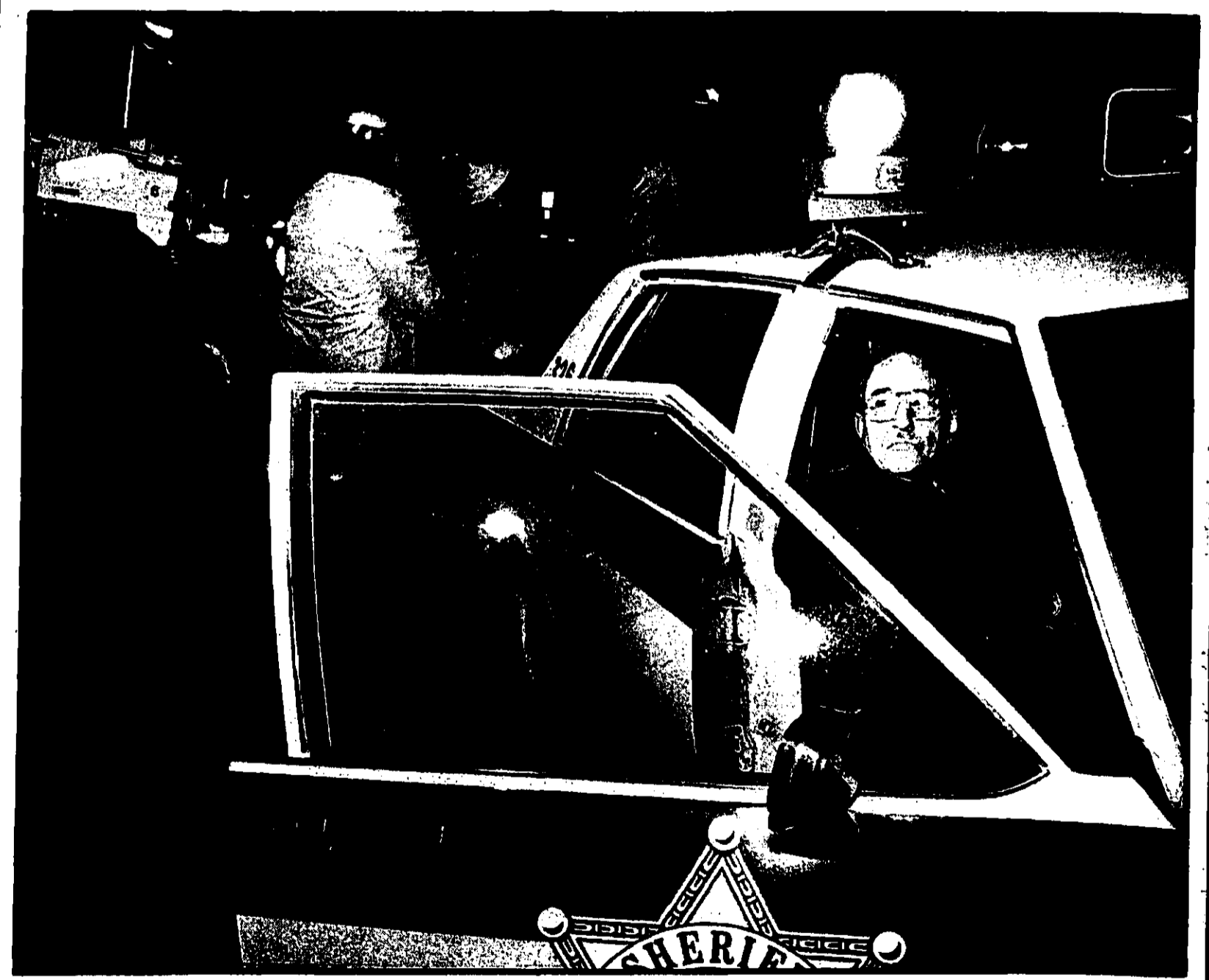
In the pre-dawn hours each morning this week, Oakland County Sheriff's deputies prepared for the crowds of protesters demonstrating against cruise missile production and attempting to blockade the entrance of Williams International near Walled Lake (upper right). The plant manufactures engines for cruise missiles and frequently has been the site of pro-arms reduction protests.

A selected few moved in front of the gates each morning, blocking incoming traffic. When they refused to move from the drive, they were arrested and led away peacefully or carried by police (left). Corrine Bruder, Vivian Kell and Patrick Bruder (lower left) were among those arrested Monday. Retired Pontiac minister Car-fon Foltz (lower right), also arrested Monday, sat quietly while others were directed to nearby sheriff's cars. By Tuesday,

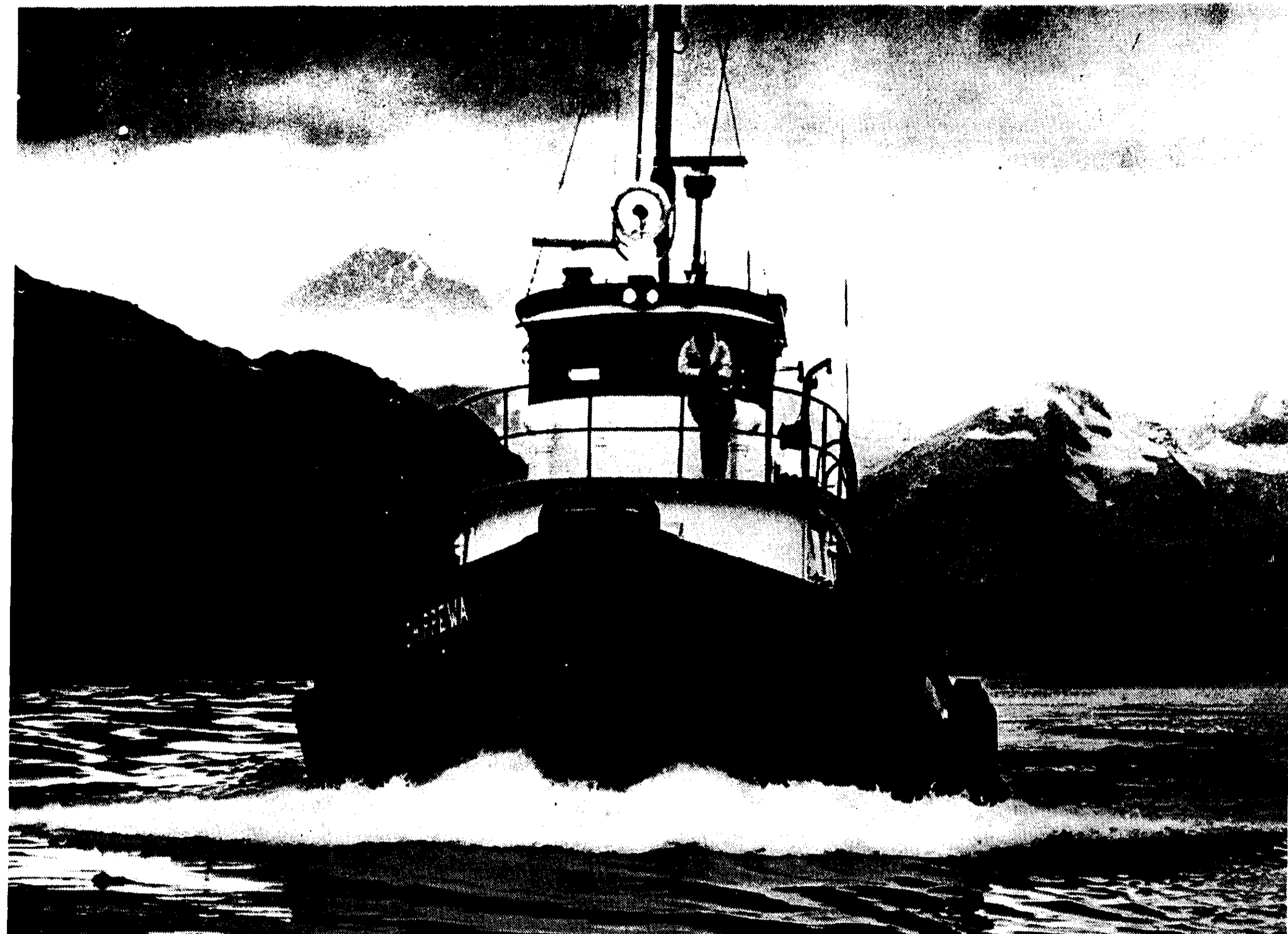
November 29, 13 people had been arrested. Meanwhile, those not participating in the illegal blockade held signs and hoisted banners calling for an end to the production of cruise missiles (upper right). There also were prayers and songs each morning, reminiscent of the interfaith prayer service attending by over 700 Sunday, November 27.

All those arrested this week face charges of criminal trespassing and civil contempt. If convicted of criminal trespassing, they could face up to one year in prison.

The seven-day protest, organized by Covenant for Peace, a mid-Michigan peace group, was to continue through Saturday, December 3.

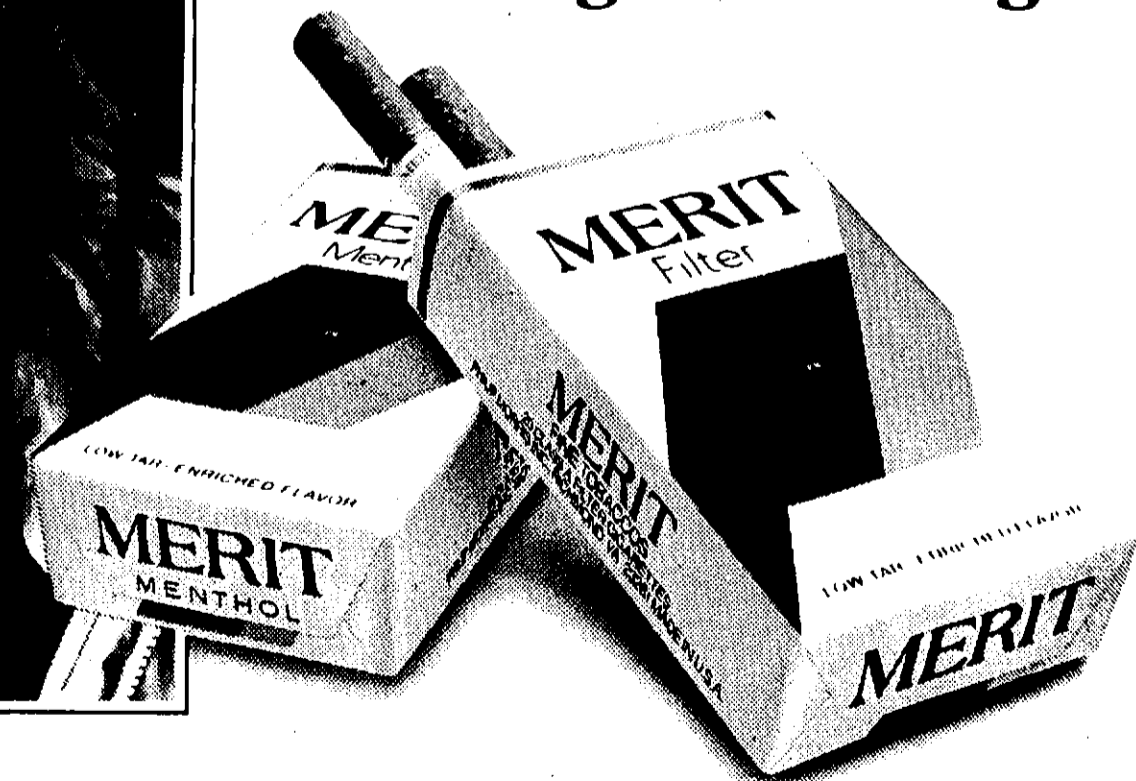

NOVI — The city has successfully defended another challenge of the single-family residential zoning classification on the southwest corner of Nine Mile and Novi Road.

In the latest test of the corner's single-family zoning designation, Delco Construction Company took the city to Oakland County Circuit Court, claiming the property should be rezoned to allow general business development.

Judge Frederick Ziem found that Delco "failed to prove the present zoning classification unreasonable..." and dismissed the claim.

"Unpersuasive" was the way Ziem described Delco's arguments that the property is not conducive to single family residential development due to traffic, proximity to industry, lack of proper zoning transition, topography and surrounding pollution.

Ziem said the fact that Novi Road is adjacent to the property does not necessarily mean it can't be developed residentially. "The property can be developed so that the building sites are oriented toward Nine Mile which is more attractive than Novi Road," Ziem found.

Ziem also found that the "gentle, rolling topography will protect most of the sites from the detrimental effects of the road." Trees on the property also will shelter it from Novi Road, the judge stated.

Ziem dismissed the argument that the property's proximity to land zoned light industrial directly to the east makes it unsuitable for residential development.

He noted the light industrial zoning is designed to protect abutting residential areas by separating them from manufacturing activities. The zoning district also is to "promote the manufacturing developments which are free from... offensive noise, vibration, smoke, odor and other objectionable influences."

Ziem further rejected the claim that nearby industrial land uses render the property unsuitable for single family residences on the grounds that "the existing facilities are attractive buildings."

Novi's zoning ordinance also provides sufficient stopping for the proposed neighborhood, Ziem found. He noted the property is near Twelve Oaks Mall and a shopping plaza at Meadowbrook Road and Ten Mile.

Ziem went on to explain the court can order the rezoning of property only in instances when "there is no room for legitimate difference concerning the reasonableness." But since testimony on the economic feasibility of developing the property residentially showed that expert witnesses had conflicting opinions Delco's claims were rejected.

Delco's expert witness claimed the company would lose nearly \$142,000 if it developed single-family homes on the property, while the city's expert witness stated the lots could be sold for \$207,000 in a normal market and \$155,000 in a depressed market.

"Based on the testimony of (the city's expert witness) this court finds that the parcel can be reasonably sold and developed as single-family residential," Ziem's opinion stated.

Despite at least four attempts in recent years to have the zoning of the corner changed, the city has held fast in its conviction the property should be developed with single family residences.

Requests to rezone the property have ranged from office to commercial. Design Center, Inc., requested the property be rezoned for office use in 1975. A request for general commercial zoning was made by Michael Allecia in 1976. A rezoning to develop the property as multiple dwellings was sought by Stein-Weiss in 1980. In the latest case, Delco Construction Company had requested the property be rezoned to allow a general commercial use.

their product line. They haven't even acknowledged our requests," explained Sister Elizabeth Walters of the Detroit Covenant for Peace. "As a result we now feel compelled to take non-violent direct action to stop the production of cruise missile engines," she said.

Ken Berger, who helped organize the week-long protest, said the group's action can be compared to warning a child who is approaching a hot stove. "First you attempt to reason with them," Berger explained. "Then you have to take some kind of direct action."

"We want to put ourselves between the machines that make (the cruise missile engines) and the people who operate the machines... We're trying to say 'Stop' in the most human way possible."

Berger said all people planning to participate in the blockade would be encouraged to take part in "non-violent training sessions" to avoid any type of disturbance during the week's demonstration. "We've been very emphatic about not being verbally or physically abusive," he added.

Four protesters were arrested at Williams in August after they poured red dye into a pond on company grounds. Each was fined \$250 and served a 30-day jail sentence.

A May 18 Oakland County Circuit Court injunction prohibits trespassing on the Williams International property, blocking ingress or egress to the plant, or inviting anyone to do such.

"We're aware that for even stating our intentions and for inviting others to join us we risk jail for violating the terms of the injunction," Walters said. "But that risk is minimal in comparison to the risk of nuclear holocaust which the cruise missile brings."

"We talked of a return on public investment. Some people have requested through abatements that they not be taxed a certain amount," Bonczek said. "As a result, we should get something like jobs or training programs in return."

Efforts to revitalize the downtown area date back to 1978 when the city council first approved the concept. The most recent efforts include installation of sidewalks, lighting and landscaping. Included in the district are 12 commercial businesses, one office and 25 single-family residential uses. The city annex, used primarily as a senior citizen center, and a temporary parking lot, the former site of the Coogan building, are also located in the downtown development district.

The overall proposed use for the district is commercial, while maintaining the existing office uses. The DDA goals are: to improve the district to enhance the visual image of the area; to improve the quality, organization and intensity of commercial uses; and to successfully promote additional business activity.

The DDA's role in the downtown revitalization is coordinating implementation of the development plan, working with the city's administration, council and planning commission.

Kriewall conceded some road projects would be delayed if local road funds are used to repay the loan. He said the extension of both West and Decker roads to Twelve Mile may be postponed.

Council Member Arlen Schroeder suggested the city would realize off-setting savings by moving DPW trucks indoors. Kriewall agreed there would be a savings, but said it would be hard to measure.

"There's two ways to build this — with a direct vote of the public or borrowing the money," Council Member Guy Smith said. "Borrowing would be a philosophical digression from the way we have been doing things." Smith also suggested the city has been accumulating fund balances so that there would be money to cover construction of the DPW facility. "All they're doing is playing with the funds," he said.

Council Member Patricia Karovich said that it has been council's intent to proceed with construction of the facility without going to the voters for millage if possible.

"If we could afford it we didn't want to go with a vote, because this is not one the community would feel a need for, even though we as a city know it is needed for our operations," Karovich said. "We've outgrown the existing facility, but it would be difficult to sell a DPW garage to the public."

Schroeder suggested the council should get input from residents who will be affected by the delay in road projects created by the need to pay off the maintenance facility.

**Low-cost storm windows boost growth of Novi business started two years ago**

By TRISH COATES

Now that winter has arrived, it's time once again to think about energy bills. Heat Check Energy Products in Novi offers one quick and relatively painless way to keep those ever-rising costs in line.

Heat Check manufacturers "Heat Savers," insulate storm windows which insulate and reduce heat loss.

"It's an inexpensive answer to a very expensive problem," said Nancy Bates, owner and manager of the company. "It's expensive to replace windows. This product is very cost-effective."

Each Heat Saver has a narrow aluminum frame. Glass is not used, but acrylic, which is stronger and has a higher resistance to heat loss. The insert is placed over the inside of the existing window. The bulb gasket weatherstrip forms a tight seal, eliminating drafts. The dead air trapped between the insert and the glass window acts as an insulator, reducing the heat loss.

The panels can be used in place of or in conjunction with storm windows. Vinyl handles and lightweight construction make them easy to install and remove.

Bates said the bulk of Heat Check's business is residential, but libraries, schools, banks and churches all have installed the panels successfully. "Virtually any place with conventional windows can make use of the acrylic panels."

One customer, a Michigan National Bank branch in Sterling Heights, boasted a 27 percent drop in fuel bills after putting in the panels. Bates reported. The cost of the windows was amortized in six months.

The panels also eliminate drafts. "When you stop cold drafts, you're more comfortable at lower temperatures," Bates explained. "For every one degree you lower it, it's three percent off your fuel bill."

Bates also cites a third benefit: "It stops the icy windows that people hate so much."

The company supplies a lot of inserts for door walls. "They're a major loss (of heat)," she said. "It's all that glass."

Senior citizens like the panels because they're light enough to lift in and out. People with central air conditioning can leave them in year-round because the panels keep the hot, muggy air of summer out of the house.

Bates said she believes that it's not only important to sell, but also to serve. She is attempting to see that more is done in the area of consumer education about energy. Heat Check plans to sponsor energy management seminars to discuss ways to reduce fuel bills. The first, on November 17, featured Princeton Energy Partners, Inc.

One of the problems Bates confronts is that people are spending money paying huge energy bills at the same time faced with spending more money to buy a product to save energy. She said people often say they have storm windows or thermopane windows so they don't need anything else.

She disagrees, arguing that storm windows don't seal completely around the edges and thermopane seals break in time.

Heat Check consists of Bates, six sales representatives and three-four men building windows in the shop. The main office and manufacturing shop are in Novi with another office in Farmington Hills.

Bates started the company two years ago. The original plan called for her to manage it with her husband, but his work kept him too busy.

"I'm proud our company is here in Michigan, making Michigan products for Michigan people," she said. "It's kept money here and that's important."

Bates said she was mildly surprised by the success of the fledgling business. "I didn't think it would take off like it has," she said. "It grew faster than I thought it would."

It may surprise some people to see a woman managing a manufacturing firm, but it doesn't surprise Nancy Bates. "I've always been a rebel," she declared. "I refuse to be locked into roles."

Bates' first business endeavor was installing a nursery school in Novi in which she focused on art, music and developing social and emotional skills. Her program, Artstart, helped children learn to deal with their fears and responses to problems, rather than learning the three R's.

After the school was running smoothly, she said, she needed to do other things. She first chaired a commission on aging, trying to install senior citizen housing in Farmington. She left the commission to direct a political campaign for city council. Then she directed educational programs for a mental health outpatient clinic.

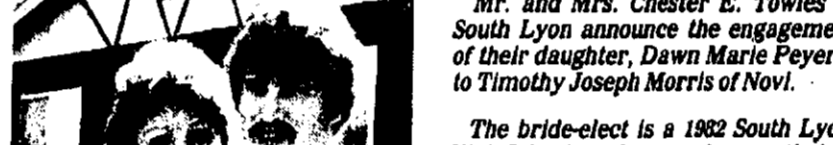
