

# Novi track coach sees Cinderella season ahead

It's no surprise Bob Smith is confident about the prospects for his Novi track team this season. He always is. Now in his fourth year as coach of the Novi track team, Smith upped the ante even more, announcing this week: "We're not just rebuilding, we're reloading."

A pretty good line, and it appears he has the merchandise to back the advertising. There are 30 new faces on this year's Wildcat squad and 60 participants altogether. To give you some idea of how Novi's track program has progressed under Smith, there were 48 on the team last year, 38 the year before and 25 in 1981 when he took over the coaching job.

"It's a great team," he says with a satisfied smile. "We've got a good shot at knocking off everybody (in the league). We could very well be the Cinderella team this year."

Smith will have to do without sprint specialists Paul Hoyt and Dave Williams, big guns on Novi's '83 team, which finished second in the KVC with a 6-1 record. But there's talent to burn with returning Wildcats and possibly some surprises among the new recruits.

Novi's strongest field event by far will be the high jump. Paul Moore has already flopped 6'2 inches without so much as a practice jump. Fellow seniors Tom Kee and Steve Korte have cleared 5-9 and threaten to sweep the event in many dual meets this year. Also working the bar will be freshmen Robb Wilson, Wes Webster, Tim McChirde and Jim Chasse, plus senior Mike McLaurin.

Senior weight specialist Kerm Stahr was third in the KVC in the shot last season and his discus distance of 124-8 placed sixth. Also expected to figure in shot and discus are senior football stragglers Steve Korte, Wade Webster, Larry Gaiss and Dave Gavalls; junior

Chris Pachana; sophomore Mitch Gordon and a slew of freshmen, including Kerm's kid brother Matt Stahr, Franz Samson, Dave Brownlee and Mark Bachan.

Steve James, still competing at 90 just percent due to an ankle injury during basketball season, should again vie for the top spot in the KVC in long jump. Sophomore Brian and senior Mike Serra (expected to clear 20 feet this year), plus freshman Marc Williams will also be featured in the event.

Senior Bill Chase, who missed all of last year with a broken ankle, is back to

full strength now and will lead the Novi pole vaulters. He has cleared 11-6. Senior Tim Miller returns from last year's team, while sophomores Steve Schaefer and Sean Rafferty, plus freshmen Wes Webster and David Bates will add depth.

Familiar names in distance events are Jim Kohli, who Smith thinks is Novi's most-likely-to-qualify for the state finals. He ran a 4:52 mile in swims and snow this spring. The Wildcats' iron man, Bob Peery, also returns as one of the league's top run-

ners from the 400 through the 3,200.

The remaining distance staff is pretty young, and makes Novi most vulnerable in the newly-added two-mile relay, which will now be the first event in meets this year. That complicates the use of Moore, one of Novi's best middle-distance men, since switching between high jump and the relay may be difficult.

Among Novi's substantial distance and middle-distance corps are: Dave Whitehead, Craig Warren, Paul Sumner, Mike Serra, Pete Schmetzer, Greg Prost, Greg Mowbray, Alex Milam, Mike McNutt, Tim and Steve McBride, Mike LaFalle, Kent Lunsik, Jeff Maggert, Tony Lai, Bruce Johnson, James, Bill Hutari, Chris Howard, Brian Martzoff, Pete Schmetzer, Matt Hammond, Klaus Hage, Pat Dulac and Mike Dillon.

Mowbray, Prost (fourth in the KVC 400 last year), Hutari and Howard will likely see the most relay work of that group.

Dave Black, a fine athlete who transferred from South Lyon, could be Novi's ace-in-the-hole in sprints and hurdles. He will bolster an already-strong corps of sprinters including Whitehead and James, big parts of last year's sprint troops.

Senior Craig Clary, who showed promise as a sophomore and sat out his junior season returns in the sprints, joining junior Jim Sinclair, Matt McNutt, sophomore Tom Marcus and freshman Marc Williams, Mike Swek and Joel Finzel.

In hurdles it will be Samson, Dan Senda (last year's number-two hurdler), Gene Dupras, Matt Stahr and Wes Webster.

The Wildcats' first two meets are non-conference dual meets against two teams from the Western Lakes Activities Association. Today at 4 p.m. Novi will host Farmington Harrison, and Monday the team will travel to Livonia Bentley.

## Bobcats swim in state event

NOVI — Novi's Bobcats entered just four swimmers in the Michigan swim championships at Oakland Community College recently. But the four swimmers more than held their own as they enabled the Bobcats to finish 22nd out of the 54-team field.

The Bobcats' best finish came in the 200 freestyle relay where Bryan Wohlfel, Jamie May, Derek Speerscheider and Michael Speerscheider finished third in an exciting race.

"We led all the way to the final turn,"

reported Manse Tian, coach of the Bobcats. "Michael (Speerscheider) was swimming anchor and turned in his best time ever, but it was a case of an eight-year-old swimming against 10-year-olds.

The same foursome also finished ninth in the 200 medley relay.

Individually, the Bobcats were paced by Bryan Wohlfel and Jamie May. Wohlfel finished fourth in the 50 breaststroke and ninth in the 100 breaststroke. His time of 38.15 in the 50 breast was a new team record.

May competed in six events, placed in six and set club records in five of them. He was seventh in the 50 freestyle; eighth in the 100 breaststroke; ninth in the 100 backstroke; and tenth in the 50 breast, 200 individual medley and 100 butterfly.

Wohlfel and Derek Speerscheider earned additional honors at the Junior Olympics meet at Chareneville High School in mid-March. Wohlfel finished first in both the 100 and 200 individual medleys and third in the 100 freestyle. Speerscheider finished third in the 50 freestyle.

## Haggerty takes state crown

WALLED LAKE — Haggerty Lumber has won the Michigan Parks and Recreation Association's state volleyball championship. The Haggerty Lumber Squad, representing the Walled Lake Community Education Department, captured the title at Schoolcraft College on March 24.

Bachelors I, the Walled Lake entry in the women's division, did not fare as well, finishing with a 1-2 record. The lone victory for Coach Cindy Long's spikers was a 15-8 verdict over Westland.

Things were just as tough in the finals. A strong Primo team from Troy captured the first game 13-15, but Haggerty again rebounded with 15-9 and 15-13 victories in games two and three to claim the state championship.

## Council to consider proposed \$5 million budg

NOVI — Early budget projections show the city spending plan for fiscal 1984-85 could be in the range of nearly \$5 million, city council members learned when the budget was unveiled Monday.

The budget is up nearly \$400,000 from last year's. The proposed budget, seen by the council for the first time Monday, calls for an increase of approximately \$2 million. There are no proposed increases in the number of city employees.

In his annual budget message, City

Manager Edward Kriewall described the spending plan as one which holds "status quo."

"The proposed budget can best be described as a continuum statement," Kriewall told the council. "Limited service expansion is projected as we continuously call upon existing personnel to meet the challenge of growth. To maintain existing full time personnel at its current level is becoming more difficult as we see expanding service demands."

Kriewall pointed out that although additional staff members were requested by the Building Department and the Police Department there is

no increase in staff proposed at this time.

However, as the year progresses the city may be required to add inspectors to the building department in order to keep pace with development, Kriewall said. City administrators will monitor the situation to determine whether such a move is necessary, he indicated.

Meanwhile, Kriewall said the emphasis of the 1984-85 budget is on community development and planning. This is the first year those areas are specifically delineated in the budget. The proposed budget also includes earmarking some federal

dollars for planning; one of a number points in the budget bearing out Kriewall's position that the budget recognizes the city's continued planning concerns.

"This is the reflection of a community that wants to change and reach for improvement. The emphasis is here and it will be for several years," Kriewall told the council. "The investment in planning is being realized at a stage in our development when it can make a difference. If there is an emphasis in this budget it is on planning."

While there are no new employees budgeted, there are three new pro-

grams proposed — beefed up community promotions, city beautification and a mid-decade census.

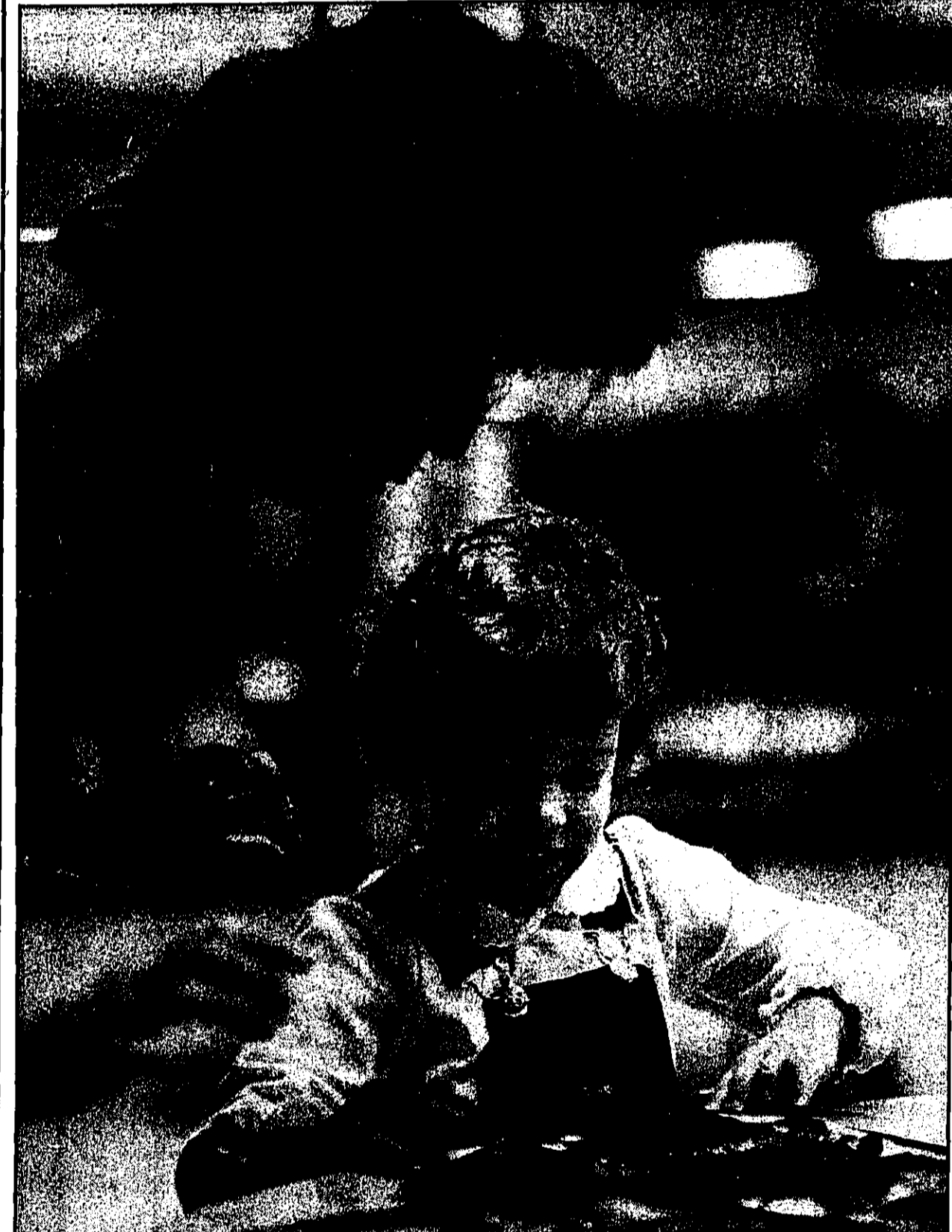
In order to get more media coverage through special advertising and similar exposure the budget proposes an increase in the community promotions budget. The increase will bring that budget from \$10,000 to \$20,000.

In the interests of city beautification it is proposed \$6,500 be spent to mow grass in highly visible areas. Grass mowing is proposed along commercial and industrial corridors. Properties on Novi Road between Ten and Twelve Mile roads would be

considered for inclusion in such a program. The 1-26 and Novi Road interchange is another area which may be included.

Kriewall went on to explain that the third new program — a mid-decade census — is needed if the city is to continue to attract quality restaurants and development. He said a likely census would make the city eligible for at least one, and possibly two, liquor licenses. Issuance of liquor licenses to a municipality is based upon population.

## Town Center consultant to be offered contract

NOVI — Zuchelli, Hunter and Associates have been chosen as the firm which will conduct a study of the commercial district surrounding the intersection of Novi Road and Grand River known as the Town Center.

Hazelroth said. He indicated planners were concerned that in order to accomplish its goals American City Corp would charge nearly \$250,000.

Under the Zuchelli, Hunter proposal the city would get not only the financial study it originally sought, but a commitment to seek out interested developers to assure the project moves forward. Hazelroth said planners viewed that positively.

Planners objected to two of the firms due to concerns they would not be able to follow through on implementation of the project once the initial market study, showing what could feasibly be constructed in the Town Center, was finished.

The fourth firm proposed a project that was too "high powered,"

But City Council Member Martha Hoyer objected she thought the Zuchelli, Hunter proposal went too far. "I think we are leapfrogging," Hoyer said. She explained that when the idea of an economic feasibility study was proposed it was not anticipated the firm would actually seek out a developer and move ahead to implement the project.

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## Three candidates compete for Novi school board seats

NOVI — There will be three candidates for two seats on the Novi school board when it is elected on June 11. William R. O'Brien, 4131 McMahon Circle, is one of the candidates.

O'Brien, a former Novi City Council member and incumbent, has been endorsed by the school board. He was a member of the first city council, serving from February 1980 to November 1978.

"I have no complaint with the school board; I'm not running because I'm angry," O'Brien said. "I've been a teacher for 21 years,

I've had four sons graduate from the Novi schools and I thought I could add something."

The retired school teacher said he believes he can add a different perspective to the board. "I think schoolmen can fit into the school board," O'Brien said.

O'Brien also said that as a "Jacksonian" he believes in the regular turnover of board and commission members in order to get new ideas and perspectives.

The candidate describes himself as a "positive type" who lived in Novi before there was a Novi Community School District. "We voted for consolidation and we've voted for every millage," O'Brien said.

O'Brien will compete with two incumbents in the school election. They each submitted petitions Monday before noon, school officials said. Petitions were signed by at least 20 qualified registered voters.

Miller is seeking his third consecutive four-year term. He was first elected in 1976 and reelected in 1980.

Miller is completing his sixth year as a board member. He was elected to the board in 1973 and resigned two years later when he moved from the city. He was again elected to the board in 1980.

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A home located on one of the area's earliest settled properties, that of Joseph Yerkes Sr., a Revolutionary soldier, will be renovated and converted to an office building if Daniel Williamson's plans come to fruition.

Williamson, a Novi resident and real estate executive, has proposed renovation of the post Civil War-era (1870) building known locally as the Yerkes house. The home has been entered on the federal, state and local historical registers as a building with historical significance.

The house located on the south side of Eight Mile east of Novi Road retains almost all of its original architectural features, both inside and outside, according to Williamson. On the interior there have been virtually no changes in its arrangement except in the kitchen wing.

The Yerkes house is the first Novi building to be placed on the national historical register.

A Novi ordinance establishing criteria for allowing nonresidential uses in historical buildings was enacted by the city after Williamson proposed using the home for offices.

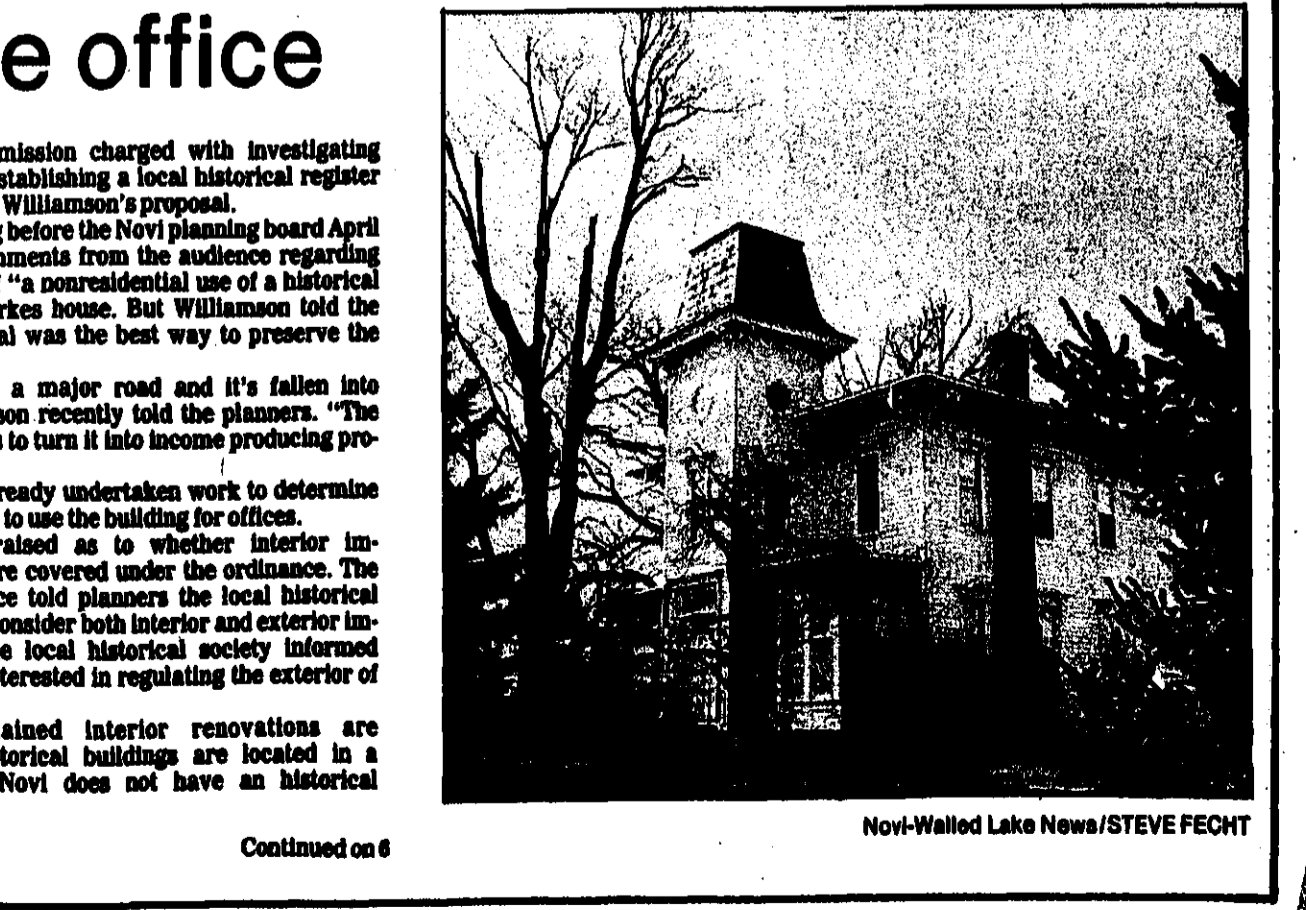
Under terms of the ordinance any exterior improvements to a historical building must be done in a manner that will not alter the period architecture of the building. If the period architecture is altered, the building reverts to a residential land use.

Williamson has already undertaken work to determine whether it is feasible to use the building for offices.

Questions were raised as to whether interior improvements also were covered under the ordinance. The City Attorney's office told planners the local historical commission should consider both interior and exterior improvements. But the local historical society informed planners it is only interested in regulating the exterior of such buildings.

Williamson explained interior renovations are regulated when historical buildings are located in a historical district. Novi does not have an historical district.

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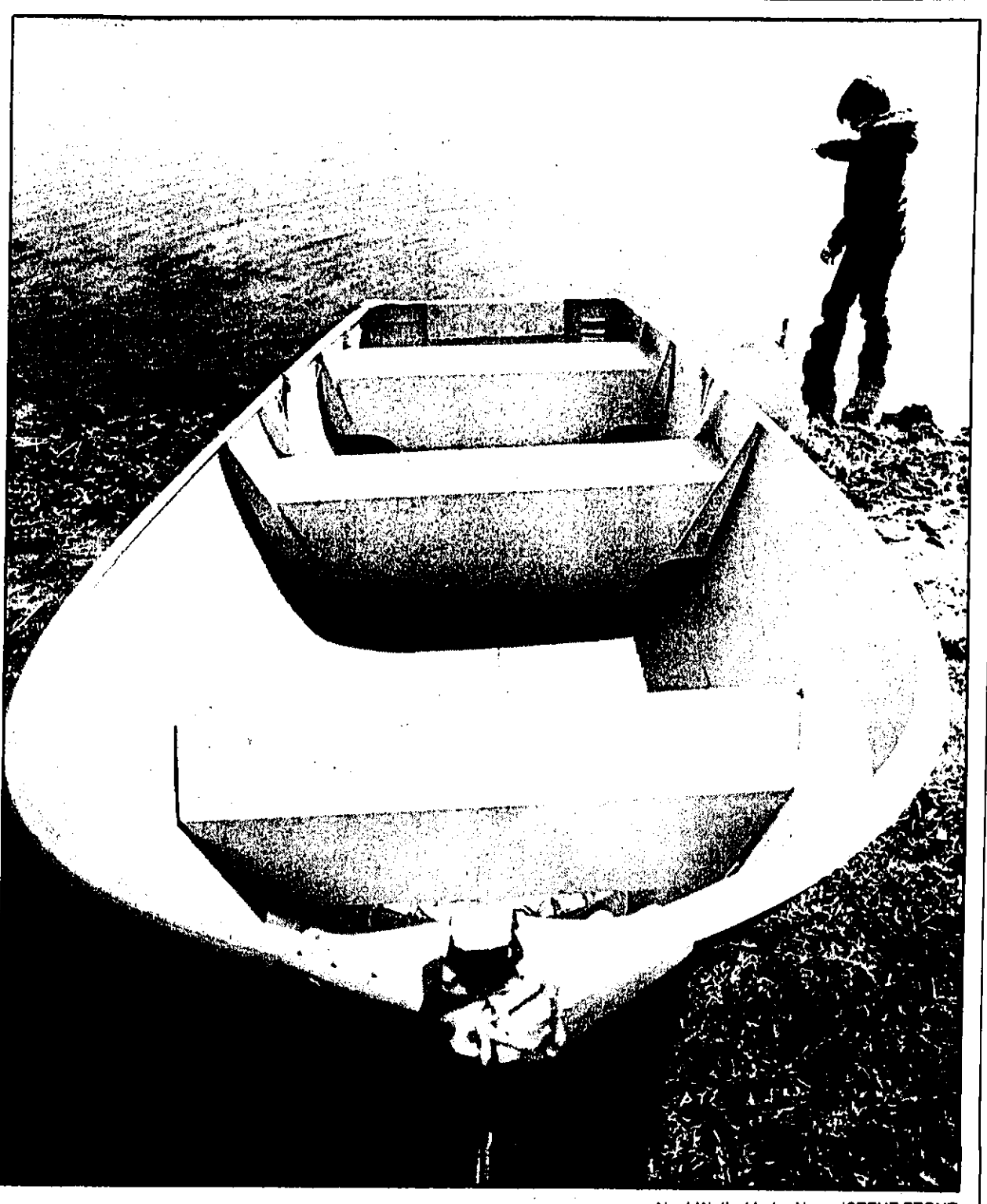

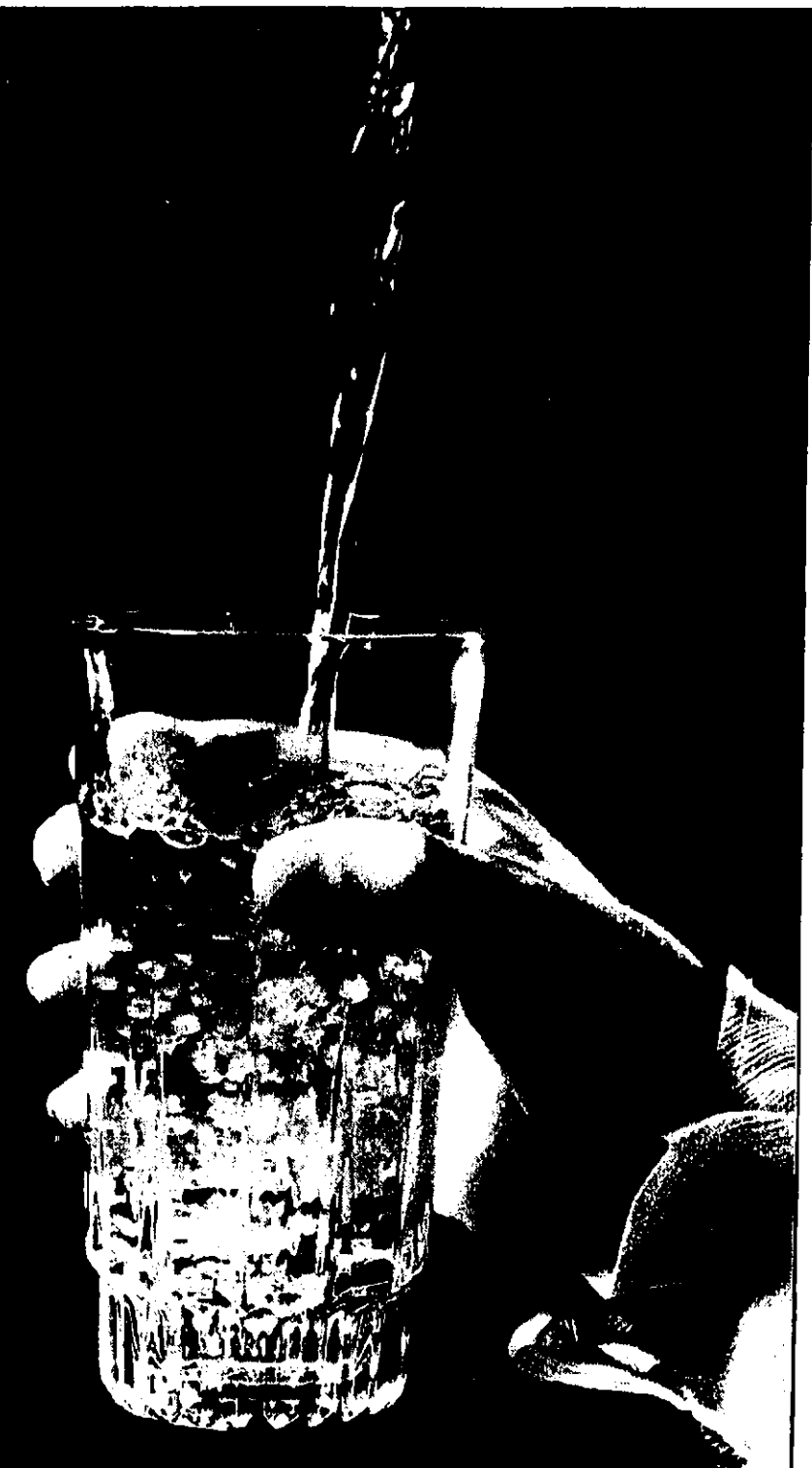

## Renovations eyed

"In a historical district interior renovations are restricted," Williamson said. "The restrictions deal with ceilings, stained glass, period plaster and similar features. But the historical designation is based on the exterior of the building. No more than 25 percent of that can be changed and still retain the historical designation. If I lose the historical designation, I lose it (ability to use it for offices)."

After considering Williamson's comments, planners went on to approve the application to convert the home from a residence to an office. Williamson must still present his site plan to the planning board for site plan approval.

Planners will review the proposed renovations for the home located on land belonging to one of the most prominent families among early settlers of the area.

The Yerkes' property was purchased in 1825 and settled in the following year, according to historical accounts in "Northville — The First Hundred Years" by Jack Hoffman.

Reportedly, a party of 14 followed William Yerkes and Thomas Pinkerton into Michigan. The group first journeyed to Buffalo traveling for days for the ice to move out of the harbor, they secured passage on a sailing vessel that carried them to Detroit in 10 days.

From Detroit the party of pioneers and their valuables traveled alone, drawn by their own oxen. The Yerkes party probably traveled also a northern route across Farmington, according to historical accounts.

"Northville — The First Hundred Years" says when the Yerkes arrived: "The country was heavily wooded and it was with considerable difficulty that the pioneers settlement was reached. The trail, which only by courtesy could be called a road, extending through a distance of some 15 or 18 miles from Detroit to a point on the river, where a little settlement had been made and a mill erected by Luther Lincoln.

The home being renovated was owned by Joseph D. Yerkes, one of the seven Yerkes brothers from the area.

## Students benefit from acquisition of equipment

WALLED LAKE — Roger Enyart, instructor at the Southwest Oakland Vocational Center (SWOVEC), says he could have as many automobiles as he wants at his fingertips.

"Every kid wants to bring in a car for work," he explains. But finding a kid with a rig or a van, now that's another question entirely.

And that, quite simply, is the challenge of teaching diesel mechanics. Offering practical, hands-on training in auto mechanics is as easy as bringing in the family junker. But construction and trucking equipment not only is hard to come by, it's cost prohibitive as well.

Enyart has maneuvered his way around these hindrances with the help of Oakland Intermediate School District personnel and SWOVEC Principal John Xenos. Major equipment acquisitions for the diesel mechanics program recently have opened new doors

for students with an inclination toward the trucking and construction industries.

Last fall SWOVEC acquired a 1978 International semi-tractor and trailer. More recently a John Deere Backhoe loader and a 1984 Chevrolet one-ton truck were added to the diesel mechanics training field. The truck, which was damaged on its way to a dealer showroom, was donated to SWOVEC.

"The more of this stuff I get, the better my students are going to do on their state tests," Enyart noted. About 40 of Enyart's 55 students already have passed state certification exams. The more practical experience he can offer, the higher the percentage of successful students will climb, he added.

The backhoe, which was purchased by the center for \$8,600, primarily will be used to teach students maintenance and operation. "They'll tear it down and put it back together," Enyart explained.

students plan to attend college, few have the skills to work through college, he noted. SWOVEC offers students the opportunity to receive training that provides the financial ticket for higher education.

As the need for vocational education has grown, so has the list of course offerings. Ten to 15 years ago, the voc ed roster consisted primarily of auto mechanics and machine trades for boys, and office procedures and cosmetology for girls.

Architectural drafting, engineering design and illustration, robotics, floral design, greenhouse management and landscaping are among offerings at SWOVEC not typically found in a high school vocational program.

The unique facility on Beck Road in

Wixom includes the Alpha Room restaurant where food service students serve lunch daily Tuesday through Friday. A dental clinic at the center operates in conjunction with the county public health department, giving students the opportunity to work with a dentist in chairside assisting procedures. A flower shop offers services daily on one end of the building, while diesel mechanic students work on a semi-tractor and trailer on the other end.

Many students supplement these high school training programs with course work at a community college. Others use their experience to work their way through a four-year college for a degree that may or may not be related to their vocational training. Either way, the hands-on experience offered by SWOVEC puts students on the inside track to employment after graduation.

## Ordinance regulates business

WIXOM — Beginning July 1 all businesses in the city must be licensed under an ordinance adopted by the city council recently.

The ordinance was proposed by Police Chief Philip Leonard, Fire Chief George Spencer and Building Official William Tyler. The officials indicated the ordinance was designed to help facilitate enforcement of state laws, city and state codes and standards.

The biggest advantage to the ordinance, Leonard said, was that businesses violating laws or codes could be shut down through a license revocation. "With people who are in violation now, it takes months in court," he said. "With this we could remove their license and shut them down."

But City Attorney Thomas Connolly said if business operators refuse to comply with a shut-down notice the city still would be forced to take legal action.

Council Member William Wyllie asked if the city might be legislating too much, making the ordinance unenforceable.

"The ordinance is fundamentally enforceable," commented Connolly. "The question is whether the council feels we need it."

The \$5 application fee was questioned by Council Member Nancy Dingeldey. "The fee wouldn't cover the costs of the inspections," Dingeldey commented. But the council did not decide to increase the fee, which officials said would cover the cost for printing the licenses.

To obtain the license, businesses would apply through the clerk's office. Persons in default in the city could not obtain licenses. All necessary inspections also would be for licensing.

# Commerce considers forming downtown district

COMMERCIAL — A Downtown Development Authority (DDA) is proposed to the township in conjunction with plans to provide a municipal water system for the primary industrial area. The water system would be used to provide fire protection, including sprinkler systems, needed by larger industrial operations. Smaller industrial users also would benefit in insurance savings by having the additional fire protection of hydrants.

The properties in the area are zoned for industrial, commercial or multiple residential use. One of the financing mechanisms of the DDA is tax increment financing. Although assessments rise as the property within the district is improved, the taxes collected by normal taxing jurisdictions remain the same as before the improvement. The difference in tax revenue between the original assessment and the assessment after improvements is captured by the DDA and funneled back into improvements in the district.

A hearing is scheduled for May 1 on the DDA and petitions are being circulated to establish special assessment districts, according to Berry. Both the DDA and a special assessment district could be used to provide municipal water to help industry remain in the township and to attract new businesses, he added.

"We have a pretty dense industrial area and fire protection is needed," Berry commented. "If Detroit water is extended to Maple Road we would need a main, a meter pit and other things."

Another option for providing water to the industrial area would include wells and a 3.2 million gallon tank owned by Detroit Edison. The tank is located along Haggerty Road south of Walnut Lake Road. Township officials are meeting with Edison to discuss purchasing the tank for use as a reservoir. It was originally built to store oil as an alternative energy form during the energy crisis, Berry said. It has only been used to store water as a test.

# Helipad sought

NOVI — City officials have received a request to locate a helipad in the Glen Oaks Apartments, near Twelve Oaks. A public hearing before the Novi Planning Board on the proposal is set for April 18.

Before scheduling the public hearing planners learned the police department has some concerns about the helipad. Detective Ralph Fluhart reported: "Since the proposed helipad is located in the vicinity of both a major shopping mall and a multi-story apartment complex, an aircraft accident here could result in a major disaster."

Fluhart recommended the proposal be referred to the Federal Aviation Administration. He also suggested that the helipad also would be 385 feet from the nearest existing Detroit Edison overhead wires that the utility company also should be advised of the proposal.

However, Police Chief Lee BeGole indicated that if the FAA had no safety concerns with the helipad the police department had no further objections. He further indicated the helipad would pose "no traffic or crowd control problems, and in fact we are of the opinion that such a helipad would be a valuable in-med-evac cases and other public safety uses as well as a convenience for Glen Oaks residents."

# Council considers \$5 million budget

Specifications of the budget show the city would receive 51 percent of its revenue to come from property taxes. Property taxes are expected to be collected in the coming fiscal year according to the proposed budget. State revenue sharing is expected to bring in \$1 million, while federal grants should generate \$224,000.

The city also projects it will be necessary to carry over approximately \$665,000 from the previous year's fund balance in order to balance the budget. During fiscal 1984-85 the city budget is approximately \$1 million fund balance. The fund balance would drop to \$482,000 after a portion is used to pay for city operations.

Council members will be reviewing the proposed budget in coming weeks. Budget sessions are open to the public. They have been set for Monday, April 16; Wednesday, April 18; Wednesday, April 25; Monday, April 30 and Tuesday, May 1.

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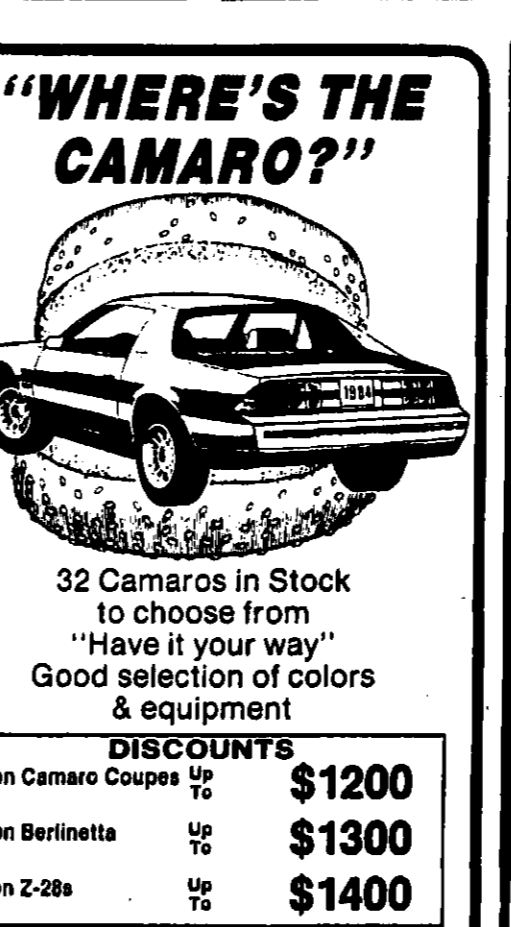

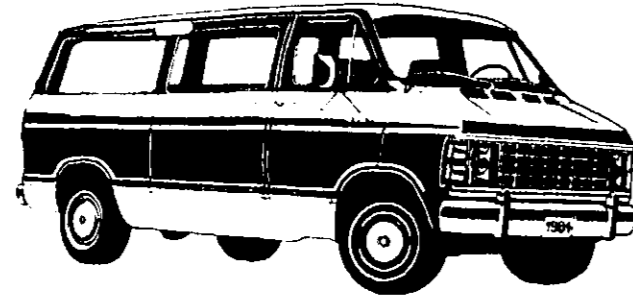

Dan Gabriele, last year's outstanding pitcher for Walled Lake Western, started the 1984 baseball campaign in near perfect form Monday as he tossed a no-hitter against Milford.

"We didn't come off as very strong (1983 season)," says longtime Walled Lake Coach Dave Haywood. "But we gained a lot of experience and we should be a contender, looking at the current season."

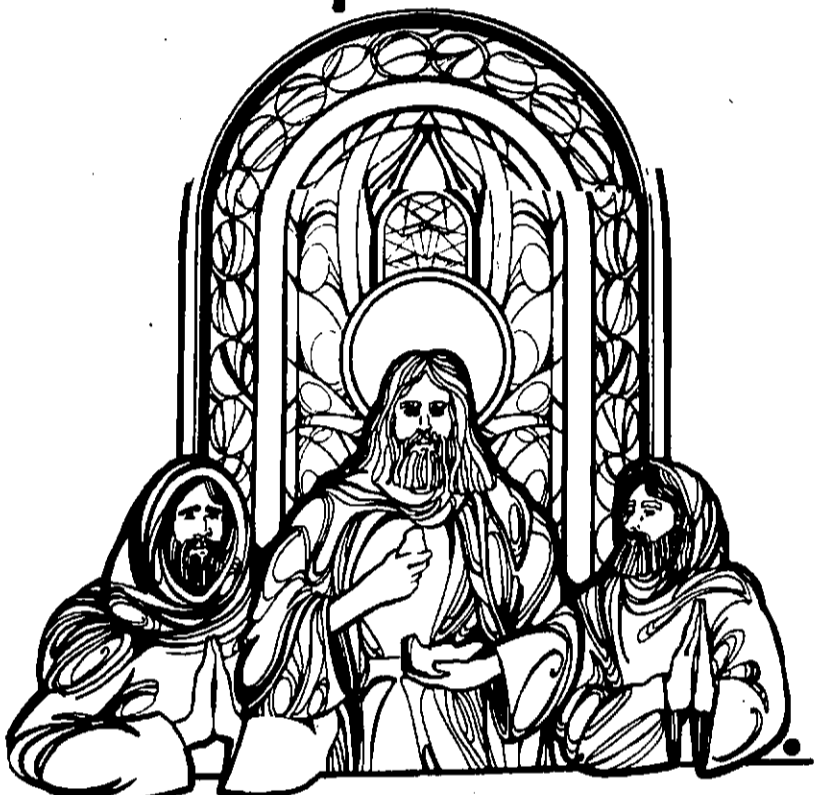

'Key for singles is self reliance'

Connie Mallett, married twice, knows well one of the worst parts of being single.

She felt the pain of it when her teenage son died.

Mallett's voice generally crackles with take-charge assertiveness. But now, remembering her son and his accident, her voice grows soft and distant.

"I would have to say the worst part of being single is having nobody to share intimately life's experiences with," said Mallett, a Novi resident and international president of Parents Without Partners Inc.

All her words of wisdom for successful singlehood can be boiled down into two key phrases — "learn to rely on your own resources" and "be your own best friend."

Some adults, Mallett said, readily adapt to being single and living alone. Others look on singlehood as simply a way station on the road to marriage.

She put many men and too few women in the first group. Her theory is that most men learn at an early age to be self-reliant, to rely on themselves. Boys grow up being told they are bright, capable and strong and in the process become confident.

"Are boys taught to be soft, caring, nurturing?" she asked. "Singlehood for a man only means his conveniences have been taken away. It does not shatter his identity. Men might be shocked, surprised, devastated, bitter, but they don't ask 'What do I do?' They say, 'Look what she did?' A man will look to others for help. A woman, on the other hand, is self-reliant. She sees her answer in getting a man and she is not worthwhile unless there is a male in her life."

Mallett pointed to her own life to buttress her arguments. For 16 years she had relied on her husband, a police officer, to provide for her. And then one day he left. She had no job

knocked on the floor, you look under the rug and find things there to build on. When you get thrown curves, you make them into opportunities.

Climbing up the Parents Without Partners ladder locally and then becoming international president have provided Mallett's resourceful, independent spirit. She now spends some 35-40 weekends a year talking to single parents across the country. And she knows what's bugging them, what's keeping them from enjoying their singlehood.

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Mallett pointed to her own life to buttress her arguments. For 16 years she had relied on her husband, a police officer, to provide for her. And then one day he left. She had no job

"Girls are told if they are attractive and loving, they'll have no problems. Girls get falsely influenced about their resources. And they keep doing the same thing over and over until something shocks them and they start breaking out, relying on themselves. She sees her answer in getting a man and she is not worthwhile unless there is a male in her life."

Mallett pointed to her own life to buttress her arguments. For 16 years she had relied on her husband, a police officer, to provide for her. And then one day he left. She had no job

skills and no work experience to fall back on.

"That's the greatest shock and jolt a woman can go through — at a time when life should be easier for them, their marriage terminates and the rug is pulled out from underneath them. I needed a job, any job. And that's one of the biggest obstacles to being a successful single. Men choose careers, but women just drop into a job."

With a low-paying job, she found herself on the road to self-sufficiency. But she didn't think she could do it alone. So she turned to

another marriage — and another police officer — as a way out. The rebound marriage never got off the ground.

Mallett sees self-reliant, self-confident singles as the perfect candidates for re-marriage.

"When they learn to rely on themselves, they learn how to select mates. We don't experiment enough in selecting a mate. I had a counselor tell me once it would take relationships with 35 men before I would know what I wanted. We rely on chemistry and emotion to pick someone to spend the rest of our lives

with. But you need to know who you are first. You're in the best spot when you don't need a man, but want him."

But even self-reliant, self-confident singles might never find a mate. For those singles, Mallett has some advice: "You might have to live out your life on your own, but don't pass it up. Do things, find ways to share with others. You might never find someone, but don't give up the cake in the meantime."

Glengary Elementary Librarian Assistant Bertha King notes the dogeared pages and marred covers of Beverly Cleary's books bear witness to their popularity among Glengary's students. As part of National Library Week (April 8-14) the third through sixth graders held an election this week to designate their favorite author, and early in the week, Cleary was promising to be a top runner.

In order to vote in the election, the students had to read at least five of the 10 authors on the ballot. Included in the listing in addition to Cleary, were Betty Byars, Matt Christopher, John D. Fitzgerald, Patricia Giff, Constance Greene, Edward Packard, Katherine Paterson, Bill Peet and Alfred Slose.

A group of Glengary third through sixth graders gathered in the library last week to talk about their favorite authors. Eight of the 11 students rated Cleary at the top of their list.

"She writes about things they can relate to," King explained. "I think that's why they like her."

Cleary was sure to get a vote this week from sixth grader Casey VanDeVenter, who favors Cleary's Newberry Award-winning "Dear Mr. Henshaw" over all the other books she has read.

"I like the story. It's about a fifth grade boy whose mother and father are divorced. The father has a diesel truck and the boy writes a story about a day on his dad's rig," Casey explained.

"I like (Cleary's) books because they're real. They make me feel like I could be there," noted Marlana Howe. "It seems like (the stories Cleary writes) could really happen," Marlana, a sixth grader, added.

Bridgette Spencer, also a sixth grader, likes a Cleary story about a 15-year-old girl with a crush on the new boy in town, while Christine Gardynik, a fourth grader, likes the series of tales about "Ramona."

"Ramona gets into all kinds of problems," Christine explained. For instance, in one book, Ramona misses the bus to school and hides behind the bushes to avoid getting caught. Christine explained that a similar incident happened to her when she got home from school late one afternoon and hid in the backyard until her mother left the house and she could sneak inside.

"Cleary's books are very family oriented," King noted. Although she has written over a span of years, she continues to publish stories relevant to children today. Her stories include families in which parents are divorced, fathers get laid off from work and sisters and brothers squabble.
