



## Police support unit agreement ratified

NOVI — A two-year contract that was "almost" settled six weeks ago was ratified by the city council Monday. Ratification by police clerks and dispatchers is expected to take place within the week.

Council members voted 7-0 to approve changes to the contract that were dubbed "insignificant" by the city's chief bargainer, Craig Klaver. Members of the 14-member clerks and dispatchers unit voted to reject the contract after it had been ratified by council when two language changes they had wanted were not included. Klaver told the council Monday there would be no repeat of the disagreement that had the council approving the contract and the bargaining unit rejecting it.

"I have received a letter from Bill Birdseye representing the police support unit guaranteeing the contract is pre-ratified with the inclusion of these changes. I have confirmed with Dennis Dubay (the city's labor attorney) that this letter is acceptable and binding," Klaver said.

The first change calls for increases in mileage reimbursements to be passed on to the bargaining unit. The plan is that employees will no longer receive holiday pay for their birthdays. The new language leaves the birthday as a holiday, but exempts it from holiday pay.

Council members approved the changes without dissent. However, Council Member Edward Leininger questioned the mileage provision, saying he did not think mileage should be included in a contract. Klaver agreed, saying it was a carryover from a time

when the city had a number of different mileage reimbursement rates. He said he believes it will no longer be necessary to include it in the contract as city employees become used to the policy of a standard mileage rate.

With the two changes approved by the council Monday, representatives of the bargaining unit said ratification of the contract is now merely a formality. "We've met on this and pre-ratified the contract," said representative Debby Ruby. "It's now a formality. The unit will review the language to make sure it's what we approved. But we consider it ratified and the final vote is being taken simply as a matter of following our bylaws."

Under terms of the agreement, dispatchers will receive a \$1,050 flat increase for both years of the two-year pact.

Clerks in the police department will receive a six percent salary increase in both years.

Clerks also received a disability insurance package covering injuries while on and off duty. The disability insurance is identical to the package police officers received in their contract earlier this year. The plan is employees to collect up to 60 percent of their gross salary for five years.

Other terms of the agreement include a reduction in the number of sick days from 15 to 12. The contract also awards a financial bonus for employees who do not use their sick days.

Salary was the initial stumbling block in the negotiations which have gone on more than a year. The city and police support group unit went to mediation, but failed to settle the dispute.

## Beware of phony solicitors

NOVI — Fire Chief Arthur Lenaghan wants local merchants to know that the Novi Fire Department is not involved in any solicitations at the present time.

"Three different local merchants have told us they've been solicited for donations by people saying they're representing the Novi Fireman's Association," said Lenaghan.

"Whoever is making the calls is passing it off as a solicitation for the local fireman's union, which is off-base because we're an all-volunteer department," he said.

"We want all local merchants to know that the Novi Fire Department does not have a union and that we are not involved in any type of solicitation whatsoever."

Lenaghan asked that anyone receiving a call soliciting funds for the Novi Fireman's Association contact him right away at 349-2162.

The group making the calls is using a local phone number, but they're located somewhere in Detroit," he reported. "They're telling people they're soliciting donations for some sort of carnival and all proceeds will be used to benefit Novi-area people."

"We don't know anything about it," added the Novi fire chief. "It's a private company that has been hired by someone to represent them, but they're not representing us and we don't know who they are representing."

## Planners approve new Digital office

NOVI — Plans for a second Digital Equipment Corporation (DEC) building in the Orchard Hill Place office park have received preliminary site plan approval from the Novi Planning Board.

The building, known as a media security center, will look like an office building, developer Joseph Gerak told planners July 18.

"The building will store tapes for Digital's clients. All the tapes have to have duplicates and this is where they will be stored," Gerak explained. He noted the tapes are used in cases where the original is destroyed. "With this system they can go into the vault, put out duplicate tapes and be right back in business."

He went on to explain that extraordinary measures are taken in the building to protect the tapes. The building has special fire security,

temperature and climate control, clean electrical service and a special gas used for fire protection. The building is also complete with an ionization shield to protect it during electrical storms.

The building will be windowless, except for an office, and will have the appearance of an office building," Gerak said. He added that it would follow all architectural standards used throughout the office park.

Gerak said plans currently call for a reduction in the number of sick days from 15 to 12. The contract also awards a financial bonus for employees who do not use their sick days.

Planners went on to grant preliminary site plan approval on an 8-0 vote. They also indicated the city administration can grant final site plan approval, providing Gerak returns with elevations for the building.

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## New dispatcher needed

WALLED LAKE — City officials are completing interviews for a new dispatcher this week, but the vacancy has created problems for the fire department.

Firefighters are filling in the vacant dispatching shift, Fire Chief Bill Friar told the council last week. If there is a fire in the city, a police officer is supposed to come in to relieve the firefighter.

But during last week's council meeting, Friar was informed that neither of the two patrolmen on duty that evening was trained to operate the dispatching equipment. "Last week I was concerned, this week I'm panicked," he told the council.

"If I had a house fire right now, I'd kind of like to roll someone with a fire truck... If the situation continues as it is, frankly, I'm in trouble," the fire chief said last week.

The city's fire department has one full-time firefighter on duty at all times. In the event of a fire, that firefighter responds immediately, taking the department's first truck to the scene within about three minutes, one said in response to Friar's expression of panic.

Dorman noted the dispatcher interviews should be completed by week's end. The city received 29 applicants for the position. Those now have been narrowed to 10 finalists who also will receive oral exams, he said.

Council authorized Dorman to hire part-time employees to fill the vacancy. However, if he decides instead to hire one full-time dispatcher he will have to return to the council for approval.

Friar told the council five or six minutes might be added to response time with the department's full-time firefighter tied up dispatching. "Frankly, there's nothing the council can do

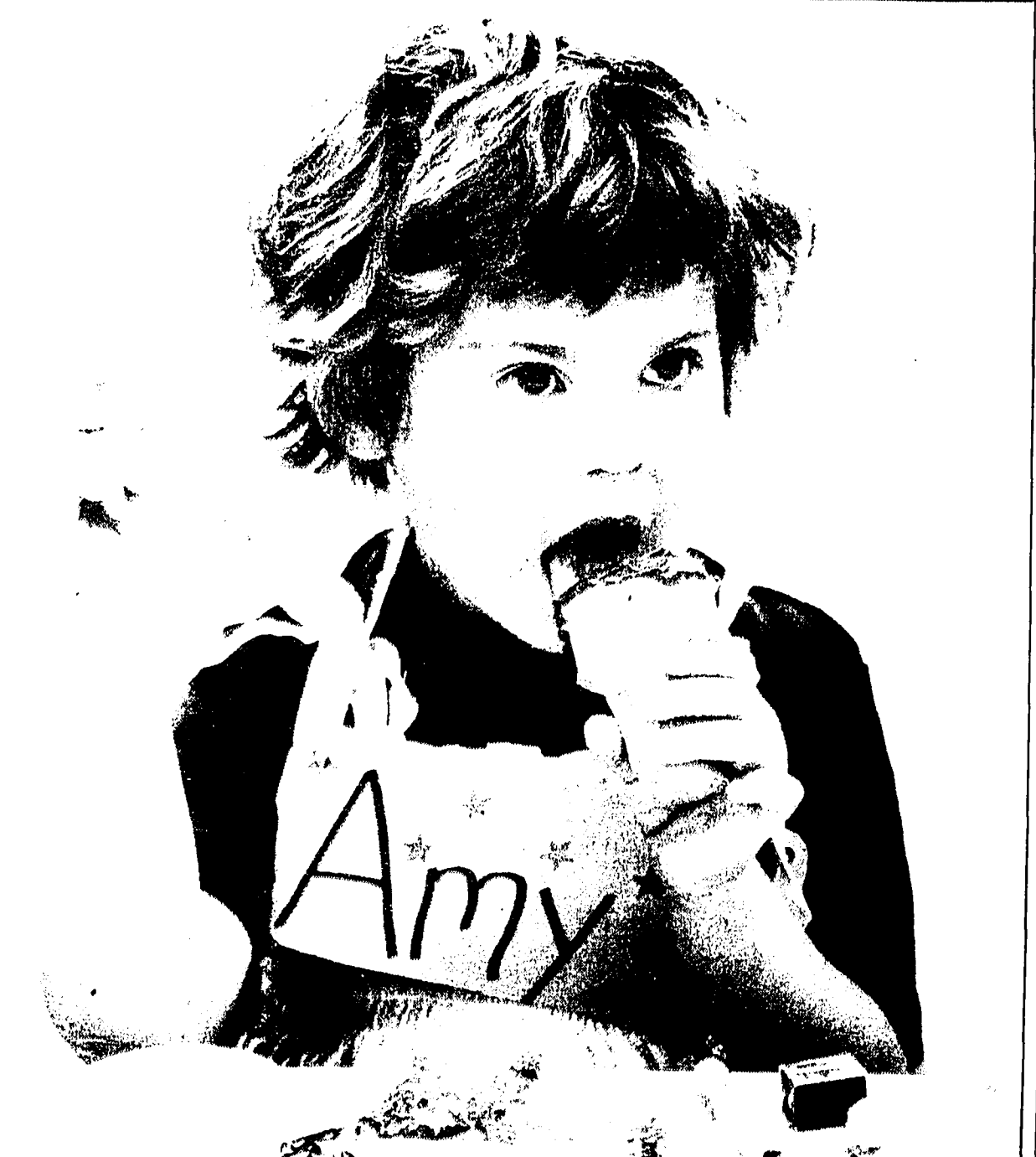

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# Citizens organize to back township incumbents

**COMMERCE** — A group of approximately 200 citizens has banded together to support the incumbents in the upcoming township election.

Karen Muir, an organizer of the group, said Citizens for Continuing Good Government (CCGG) will work to make sure all incumbents — Supervisor Robert Long, Clerk Deborah Gray, Treasurer Patrick Dohany and Trustees Bruce Enfield, Richard Higginbotham, Edward Holmes and Warren Williams — are returned to office in the August 7 primary.

"We believe in township government and the way our township is being run; we do not want a change," said Muir.

"We're raising money and planning strategy to educate the voters about the job the incumbents have done for our township. It's important for Commerce that the incumbents get re-elected."

Muir said Citizens for Continuing Good Government was formed specifically to combat Mario Tozzi, who is challenging Long for the Republican nomination for township supervisor. The winner of the August primary will

face Robert Kratage, who is unopposed for the Democratic nomination for supervisor, in the November general election.

Referring to an article in the Detroit Free Press Oakland edition which referred to Tozzi and Kratage as Commerce's "Care Bears," Muir said Tozzi and his campaign tactics have cast unfavorable publicity on the township.

"We've been respected by other communities for having good government," she said, "but I think they (Tozzi and his supporters) are trying to make us a laughing stock. We don't want a bunch of clowns running the township."

Muir, a member of the township parks commission, said she was upset by Tozzi's inferences that people who support various township boards and commissions are "cronies" who receive special favors.

"That's a total falsehood," she charged. "I really didn't appreciate that."

Muir denied that Long or any of the other incumbent officials were involved in formation of the group. "Mr. Long is a very sincere, quiet man," she said.

"Those of us who believe we have had good government in Commerce appreciate the opportunity to see if we can do anything to combat the campaign tactics used by Mr. Tozzi and his supporters. His (Long's) response that if he has done a good job and the people want to re-elect him, they will. It's taking a very low key approach."

"We decided to form CCGG because we're afraid Tozzi and his supporters may be able to put together enough disenchanted factions to make a difference in the primary if enough people don't get out to vote."

"That's all we want to do," she continued. "Put the people that the incumbents have done a good job and encourage them to get out and vote in the primary."

Muir said the 200 members of CCGG are raising funds and sending out postcards to help educate the public about the importance of voting.

"The incumbents have always had the best interests of the township at heart," she said.

# Walled Lake school board rates self 'adequate'

**WALLED LAKE** — Four of seven school board members rated the board's overall performance as "adequate" this year.

The remaining three pushed the rating one step higher, describing the board's performance in 1983-84 as "effective." Summing up their past year, no board members described the school board as "needing improvement."

The results of the board's self-evaluation were released last week.

The notion of a board "self-evaluation" was developed last year while completing Superintendent Don Sheldon's annual performance evaluation. While the categories are somewhat different, the format is essentially the same as that used for the superintendent.

The board rates itself in eight different areas, including orientation (how informed the board is about policies, procedures, current programs, etc.), meetings (attendance, scheduling, audience participation), policy and planning, school programs, relationship with the superintendent, staff relations, community relations and finance.

For each of several items in each category, the board assigns a numerical rating, with one denoting poor performance; two, needs improvement; three, fair; four, good; and five, excellent.

At the end of the form, each board member is given the opportunity to give the board an overall rating of "effective," "adequate," or "needs improvement."

A summary of the evaluation follows:

**ORIENTATION:** The board rated itself an average 3.82 in this area, improved slightly over last year's 3.23.

Board members said they did a better job of providing essential information

to new board members, but not quite as good a job of keeping up on current programs and the operation of the district.

**MEETINGS:** With an average score of 3.92, this was the board's second highest rated category on the evaluation. Items such as convenient scheduling of meetings, agenda preparation, providing background materials and availability of minutes were rated between "good" and "excellent."

Improved over last year were items such as keeping special meetings to a minimum and having staff members present background reports to the board. Board members said they did not do as good a job as last year in holding executive (closed to the public) sessions to a minimum. This item dropped from a 4.17 to a 3.71.

The board said it did a better job of treating members of its audience with respect this year, but still rated this

item slightly less than "good."

**POLICY/PLANNING:** In this category, keeping an updated policy manual was the only item to drop in the board's estimation. The average rating for policy and planning was 3.61, compared to last year's of 3.33.

According to the board, it did a particularly good job of setting priorities for the district and delegating responsibility for implementing policy to the superintendent and administration. It rated both these items between "good" and "excellent."

**SCHOOL PROGRAM:** While the board's curriculum decisions were only "fair" last year, they were "good" this year, according to the trustees. The average rating under school programs increased from 3.79 to 4.07. However, the board said it was not provided with curricular reports as often as last year.

**RELATIONSHIP WITH THE SUPERINTENDENT:** Of the eight categories, board members felt they improved the most in their relationship with the superintendent, which they rated better than "needing improvement" and "fair" last year (2.73). They rated their relationship with Sheldon as a "fair" this year (3.53).

The board said it did a "fair" job of providing for the superintendent's professional growth. It did a "good" job of evaluating him and a "fair" job of openly discussing controversy and conflicts with him. Board members also indicated they were doing "fair" at recognizing administrative duties which belong to the superintendent and at seeking a relationship of mutual trust, respect and honesty with the superintendent.

**PURPOSE OF AGREEMENT**

The Agreement has for its purpose and provides for the acquisition and construction of the North Huron Valley-Rouge Valley Wastewater Control System consisting of sewage disposal facilities at a total estimated cost of \$1,000,000 and for the issuance of bonds by the County of Oakland to defray the cost of acquiring and constructing the facilities. The bonds to be issued will be primarily secured by the obligation of the City of Novi, City of Wixom and Charter Township of Commerce to pay the principal of and interest on the bonds when due.

**CITY'S CONTRACTUAL OBLIGATION AND SOURCE OF PAYMENT**

The bonds to be issued by the County of Oakland will bear interest at a rate of not to exceed 10% per annum and will mature serially over a period not exceeding 40 years. The full faith and credit of the Charter Township of Commerce and of the Cities of Novi and Wixom have been pledged in the Agreement for the making of payments to the County in amounts sufficient to pay the principal of and interest on the bonds as the same shall become due and for the payment of bond service charges incurred by the County. Taxes levied by the city for the payment of its obligations to the county will be subject to applicable statutory and constitutional tax limitations.

**RIGHT TO PETITION FOR REFERENDUM ON AGREEMENT**

This notice is given by order of the City Council to and for the benefit of the electors and taxpayers of the City of Novi and any other interested persons in order to inform them of their right to petition for a referendum upon the Agreement. The Agreement will not become effective until the expiration of 45 days after the publication of this notice. If, within said 45-day period, a petition signed by 10% or 15,000, whichever is the lesser, of the registered electors residing within the city is filed with the City Clerk requesting a referendum upon the Agreement, the Agreement will not become effective until approved by a majority of the electors of the city qualified to vote and voting thereon at a general or special election.

**PROPOSED LANGUAGE**

"Section 3.17. Candidates for any elective office, to be voted for at any municipal election held under the provisions of this Charter, except as provided in Section 5.8 (c), shall be nominated at a primary election, and no other name shall be placed upon the election ballot for the election of such officers except those nominated in the manner hereinafter prescribed. However, whenever the number of candidates for nomination to any office does not exceed three times the number to be elected to that office, then in such case, no primary election for the nomination of candidates for such office shall be held, and such candidates shall be deemed to be nominated to such office. The names of such candidates for any such office shall be placed upon the election ballot to be voted for at the next regular municipal election, in all respects as though the said candidates had been nominated at a primary election."

## Trustees set goals for superintendent

**WALLED LAKE** — In a four-hour workshop this week the school board adopted a new set of goals and objectives for Superintendent Don Sheldon.

The goals, which have not yet been formally adopted, incorporate board concerns in the areas of district finances, community relations, board relations, staff management and new program development.

One of the superintendent's four goals in 1984-85 is to implement the "District Goals" adopted by the school board. Those goals included providing a preschool program and extending transitional first grade to all students; promoting an atmosphere of appreciation and high self-esteem among staff; promoting a positive district image by making the community more aware of the quality of the educational system; and mobilizing a "more efficient, effective, productive, innovative, creative, motivated and flexible management team."

To this the board added a recommendation for a long-range staff development plan, improvement of the staff evaluation process and a plan for facilitating internal promotion of staff.

A second goal for Sheldon in 1984-85 is to pursue the best use of the district's financial resources. To accomplish this goal, the board suggested the superintendent optimize district investments, explain to the board the impact of budget changes when they occur, develop a plan for equipment

replacement, develop an energy conservation strategy and review the purchasing process.

A third goal for the superintendent is to "solicit and respond to the concerns of the community." Trustee Patricia Jackman suggested that students be provided more opportunity to express their concerns. A comprehensive adult basic education program and a community outreach program also should be investigated, the board said.

The board concurred with a list of 12 objectives forwarded by Sheldon for improving community relations. Meetings with clergy, service clubs, realtors and business people; continued development of community reports and newsletters; at least one meeting a year with all PTA/PTO units; and development of a plan for a districtwide educational fair were among the superintendent's suggestions.

A fourth goal discussed by the board this week involved program development. The board was particularly concerned that the superintendent make progress on K-12 "articulation" this year — that is, program sequence and consistency between schools and between grade levels. Sheldon said there was "no way" to implement this in one financial year, so the board settled on this goal as an objective for 1984-85.

A final goal outlined by the board was continued improvement of the superintendent's relationship with the school board.

## Administrator hired

**WALLED LAKE** — The school board this week approved the hire of Dr. Carl Pacacha as secondary education director.

Pacacha has been the secondary education director for the Troy School District since 1977. He was previously the assistant superintendent for instruction for Lakeview Schools in Battle Creek (1970-77) and a teacher of English and social science (1954-70).

Pacacha received his doctorate in adult and higher education from Michigan State University. He holds an education specialist degree in second-

### Interest rates cut home sales

Rising mortgage interest rates are beginning to take their toll in the existing home market. Metro MLS reported June sales up only 48 units from a year earlier for a 3.9 percent gain. At 1,284, June sales were down 208 from the 1,492 recorded in May.

"For the 1984 first half, we are still running nearly 12 percent ahead of last year," said David Jensen, Metro MLS president. "This has slipped from the year-to-year increase of 26.9 percent reported in March."

"At this time last year, when record interest rates had declined to more favorable levels, we were able to report a 64 percent increase from 1983," he continued. "Now the opposite is true. Interest rates are edging back up, freeing more potential buyers out of the market. The sales pace will likely continue to slow unless the interest rate trend can be reversed."

"These circumstances are unfortunate because home prices continue to hold great advantage for buyers. At \$38,248, the average sale price in our territory is up only \$605, or one percent from last year. In many of our most active markets, average prices show a sharp drop. For persons ready to make the move, today's prices should still be attractive despite the increased rates."

Metro MLS figures for the first half show sales in northwest Detroit at 1,133, down 8.5 percent from 1983. Sales were up in many other markets in the portions of Wayne and Oakland Counties covered by the multiple listing service.

Sales increases were recorded in the Commerce/Wixom area, where 1984 sales of 261 were up 18 percent from the year-ago figure of 221. Other gainers were Westland (up 30.7 percent); Royal Oak (28 percent); Farmington/Farmington Hills (19.2 percent); Plymouth/Plymouth Township (15.1 percent); West Bloomfield/Orchard Lake (14.1 percent); Southfield (12 percent) and Livonia (5.8 percent).

## End of the line at Kroger

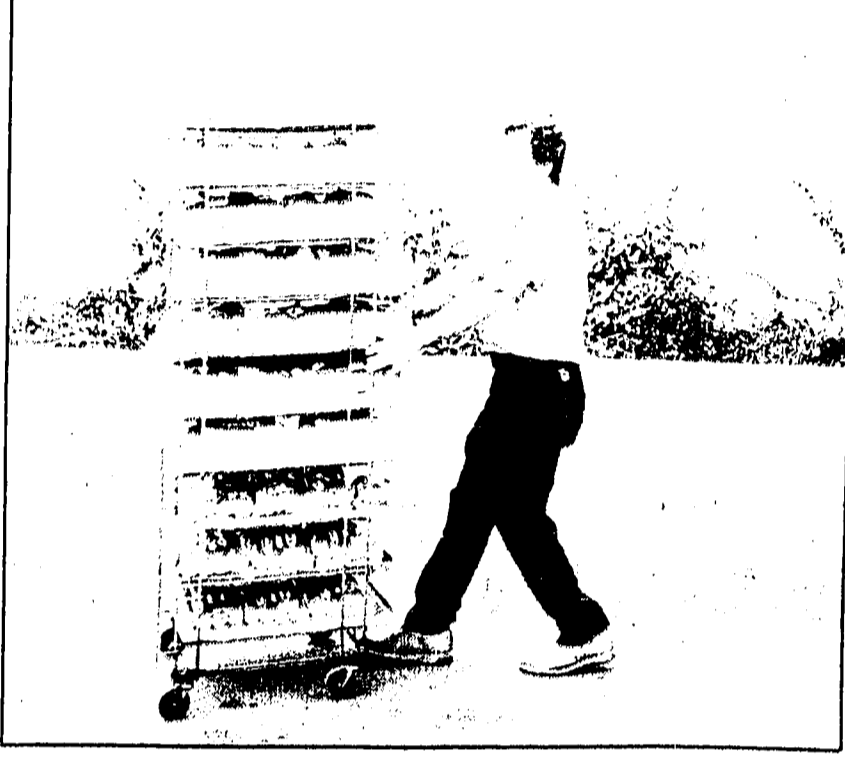

"Kroger is very unreasonable," stated Virga, a Highland Township resident whose husband also worked for Kroger. "The money they want us to cut back to, you can't even make a house payment with."

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# Guardian president offers \$24 per share

Guardian Industries Corporation president and chief executive officer William Davidson, a 42.3 percent stockholder in the company, has proposed a buy-out plan that would give him full ownership of the glass firm.

According to the proposal, set forth in a letter the company received July 19, each public stockholder would receive \$24 per share in cash, excepting for a group of individuals in the corporation holding approximately 4.5 million shares with whom Davidson has already conducted preliminary discussions.

This group, which owns slightly more than 20 percent of the outstanding

shares, would receive a combination of cash and debt securities with a combined value of roughly \$24 per share. The stock closed on the NYSE July 19 at 27 7/8, down 1 from the day before. Davidson's letter suggests the acquisition may be undertaken through one or more transactions, with possibilities including a merger, tender offer, negotiated purchase or some combination of these.

Several conditions are placed on Davidson's offer, including completion of a business and legal analysis regarding the acquisition structure and completion of an agreement for repayment

or restructuring the company's outstanding debt and for the purchase of outstanding shares owned by the group.

The Guardian board will consider the proposal at its next regularly scheduled meeting August 15, according to Oscar Feldman, secretary and counsel to Davidson. Feldman said there are no other purchase offers outstanding.

Davidson's letter states that further details regarding the structure of the acquisition should be made available to the board in early fall. He anticipates completion of the transaction by late this year or early 1985.

Kroger had asked that hourly pay rates be cut from \$10.37 to \$8.50. The company also demanded the union accept approximately 40 concessions, including no seniority, a cutback in paid sick and personal days, and pension plans, according to Beck.

"Basically, a lot of our rights as employees that we've had in the past would be taken away," said Beck. "We lost a lot more than just wages."

Kroger decided to close 70 of its southeast Michigan stores, including the one in Milford. Nearly 5,000 employees now find themselves without jobs.

Kroger Company has already launched into the food wholesaling business, with Weterau Incorporated of Saint Louis. The new venture will be called Foodland Distributors.

Meanwhile, Beck and his co-workers

voted themselves out of a job. "For right now I'm not quite sure," Beck said of his plans for the future. "I'm going to look around, collect unemployment for a while. A lot of us are young enough so that we can look for other jobs."

"I wish I knew," responded Larry Whitney when asked about his future. "I've lived in a nice little bubble for 30 years. Kroger treated me well. Now I'm gone."

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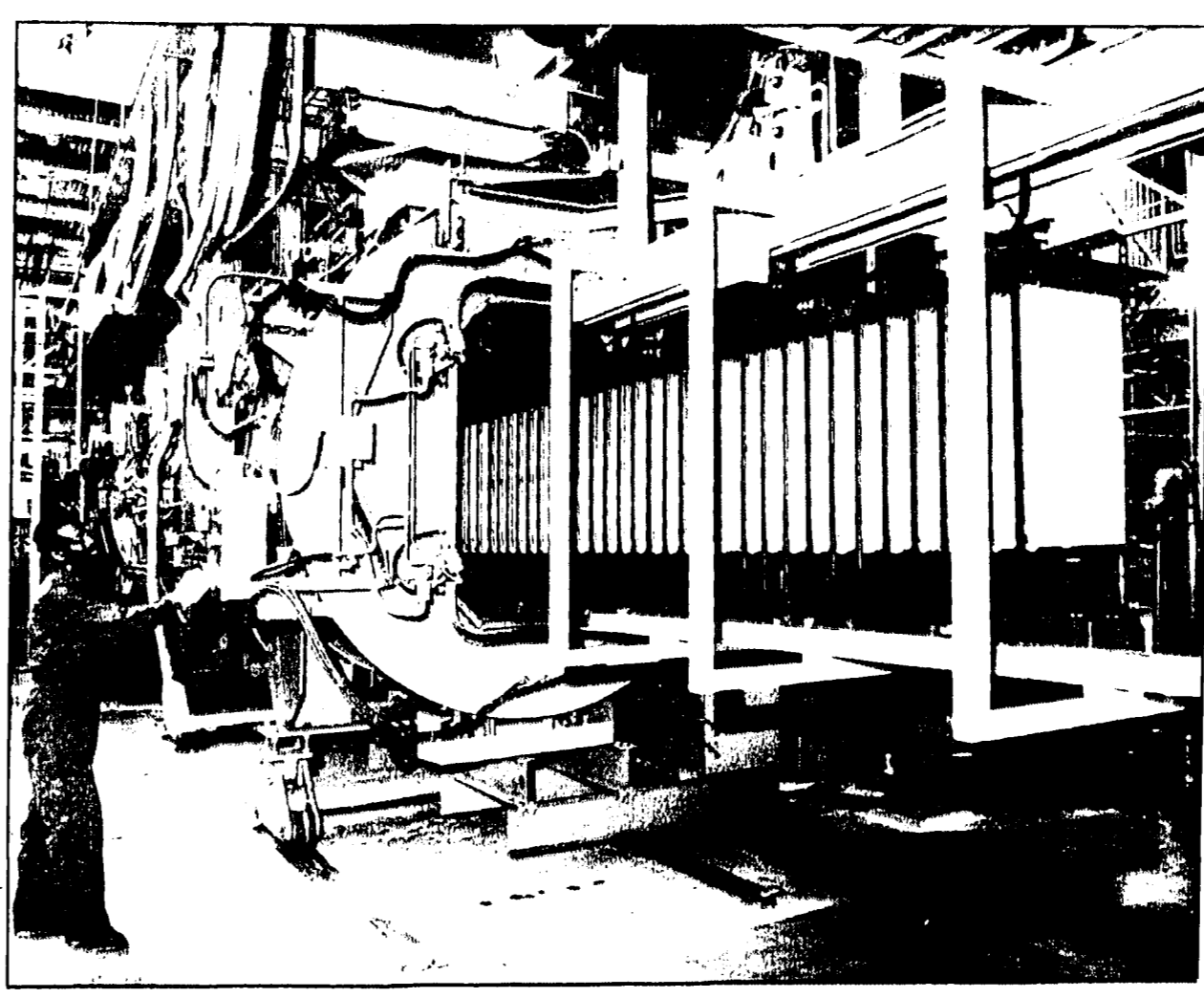
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Aluminum radiator cores enter preheat chamber of vacuum brazing furnace at Ford's Sheldon plant

# Ford shows vacuum-brazing plant

Ford Motor Company's Climate Control Division displayed a new \$38 million facility for vacuum brazing aluminum radiators at its Sheldon Road facility in Plymouth Township July 19. It is expected to generate an additional 200 jobs at the plant, bringing the total hourly labor force there to 1,100.

The new facility complements a similar one in operation since 1983 at a Ford subsidiary plant in Connersville, Indiana. Together, they are the latest step in a conversion by Ford to aluminum radiators.

Edward E. Hagenlocker, division manager, said the aluminum radiators are lighter, more efficient and more reliable than conventional soldered copper/brass units. Weight savings range from 20 to 40 percent, depending on size and application.

With the advantages come some manufacturing problems, however, which are solved by the computerized facility. In the vacuum-brazing process, aluminum radiator components are fused together in electrically heated furnaces at a temperature of 1,100 degrees Fahrenheit in a near-total vacuum roughly equivalent to that reached 100 miles in space.

Hagenlocker said the two facilities make Ford one of the world's leading manufacturers of aluminum heat exchangers. He said the vacuum-brazing process is one Ford pioneered and has used since the early 1970s to produce aluminum air conditioner evaporators at the Connersville plant.

The radiators have an aluminum core consisting of stamped headers and side supports, welded tubes and corrugated fins. End tanks and draincock are plastic (glass-filled nylon).

Aluminum radiators are currently used in Escort, Lynx, Tempo and Topaz car lines and in Lincoln Mark VII and Continental turbo diesel models. The radiators will be extended to F-series light trucks, Ranger compact pickups and Aerostar vans next year and to other car lines in 1986.

Plant manager Gerald J. Kania said the new 140,000 square foot vacuum-brazing facility has state-of-the-art equipment with a high degree of automation. Computers are used to control both the process and quality.

Key to the process is making core components from coiled aluminum flat stock clad with a brazing alloy. The high temperature of the furnace causes the alloy to flow on the core surface, creating a bond wherever parts make contact.

The vacuum eliminates the problem of oxidation in normal aluminum brazing operations — in the presence of air, aluminum oxidizes easily and will not braze properly without the use of a corrosive flux, commonly molten salt.

The non-vacuum process requires extensive washing to remove the salt and prevent continued corrosion of the aluminum. This washing process in turn requires further wastewater treatment, Kania said. "With vacuum brazing, the alloy on the aluminum surface acts as the flux and we have no waste products."

The core components are produced separately and assembled by semi-automatic equipment before being conveyed to the furnace area. There are at present two furnaces at Sheldon Road, with a third planned for installation later this year.

At the furnace, the cores are loaded onto racks, which are the brazing fixtures, each carrying 49 cores. The cores are locked in place and the rack conveyed to a bridge crane for loading into the furnace.

Each furnace has three chambers: preheat, braze and exit. Desired vacuum levels for each stage are controlled by three diffusion pumps and a series of mechanical pumps.

The preheat stage is conducted in a partial vacuum where the temperature is raised to 600 degrees F. Cores then move to the middle chamber where there is near-total vacuum at 1,100 degrees F. The mechanical pumps evacuate the chamber initially with the diffusion pumps completing the deep vacuum.

After brazing, the cores move into the exit area where partial cooling takes place in a partial vacuum. At the end of the cycle, the rack goes into a cooling chamber where ambient air flows through the cores to complete cooling.

The facility cranks out one rack of radiators every 13.5 minutes — more than 200 cores per hour. Each receives a corrosion-resistant chrome coating and is dried in an oven to eliminate residual moisture. Epoxy is applied to each header surface for additional strength.

Workers position inlet tanks and gaskets on the cores as they move on a conveyor to a crimp station, which automatically bends header tabs over the tank shoulders.

The cores are rotated 180 degrees automatically for a repetition of the process for the outlet tanks. At the stage, transmission-oil coolers are added for automatic transmission applications. The outlet tanks, oil coolers, fitting and draincocks were pre-assembled in a separate operation before the crimping stage.

# Computers play big role in facility

Computers play a large role in the new vacuum-brazing facility at Ford Motor Company's Sheldon Road facility in Plymouth Township.

The furnaces that do the actual brazing are computer-controlled for optimum operation — automatic operations are necessary since no worker could withstand the near-total vacuum and 1,100 degrees F. temperatures inside the furnace, nor could only one or two people monitor all the variables involved.

Quality control is also computerized. The system was developed for statistical process control (SPC), which requires real-time (instantaneous) feedback.

For example, a camera inspection system checks header ferrule sizes for 39 different truck radiators or 29 passenger-car radiators in less than a

minute. Manual methods used to take a full day.

Another example is a lower checker that verifies the angle of cooling fins in less than two minutes — this is a two-day operation manually, Ford sources reported.

Date collection is aided by computerized information systems throughout the facility. Computer vision-gauging centers are located in the press, tube, fin and final assembly areas. Critical dimensions are measured and the statistical results fed back to the operator. The information quantifies the quality of work being done and tells the operator if any adjustments are required.

One gee-whiz feature is a computer-based camera system that reads and records the serial number stamped on top of each radiator. A larger host computer then permanently stores measurements and serial numbers, giving the company a quality history for each and every radiator that comes off the line.

NOVI — The Farm posted four straight victories last week to win the play-off championship in the Novi Parks and Recreation Department's Women's Resident League.

The Farm moved easily into the championship bracket, disposing of RPM Auto Parts in their first game and then easing past O'Brien's Angels in their second encounter.

The route to the finals was considerably more circuitous for Woodland Medical, however. In fact, Woodland was knocked into the loser's bracket in the opening round as O'Brien's Angels posted a 4-2 victory.

Woodland managed to stay alive with a 5-4 win over RPM Auto and then advanced to the finals with a hard-fought 12-11 conquest of O'Brien's Angels in the consolation finals.

Needing just one more victory for the championship, The Farm battled to a 4-2 victory over Woodland Medical to avoid a climactic second game and claim the league title.

**Evans places 9th in TransAm race**

NOVI — Tim Evans, the Novi racing driver who was sixth in the Detroit Trans Am race, finished ninth in his second event of the season Sunday at Brainerd, Minnesota. He also drove the chase car for the Dallas Grand Prix July 8.

"It could have been better — it was one of those weekends," the Brookland Farms resident said of the Trans Am race. The Minnesota track boasts a mile-long straightaway where the Buist/Syfert Racing Pontiac Trans Am was underpowered last year.

It looked better this year, until just before race time. "We were doing okay on straightaway speed until just before the race," Evans said. "We adjusted our carburetor jetting, the weather changed at the last minute and that meant our adjustment was in the wrong direction."

Evans said he and David Hobbs got stuck at the start behind the slower car of Rob McFarlin. "Hobbs got by, but I didn't until (McFarlin) broke down."

An off-course excursion by McFarlin put some rocks into Evans' windshield, cracking it. "Every time I went down the straight, it cracked a little more until finally about three laps from the end, about a foot of it at the right end broke in," Evans said by that time he was easing off, since he could catch no one ahead of him and no one behind was threatening. "We wanted to make sure we finished."

The race was won by Willy T. Ribbs in a Capri, followed by the Pontiac of Detroit pole-winner Bob Lokenberg, and the Capris of Tom Gloy and Greg Pickett. Hobbs in his Corvette was eighth, one position ahead of Evans — the reverse relationship from their Detroit finishes.

Driving the chase car in Dallas was a last-minute deal, Evans explained. "They called me on the Tuesday and said they might need me, confirmed it on Wednesday afternoon, I hopped a plane Thursday morning and arrived during the first Formula One practice."

Mounted this time in a Porsche 935 ("We approved of the car," Evans laughed), he did more than a lap and one-half before leaving the course ahead of the Formula One cars. He and Grand Prix doctor Sidney Watkins watched the race from a tight bend where several cars hit the wall glancing blows and broke wheels or suspensions. Anyone who watched the televised broadcast would recognize the "parking lot" corner where several cars retired near race-end.

"I'm looking forward to the new experience," he said about attending Northwood.

## New pastor set at Novi church

NOVI — Reverend Charles Jacobs considered everything from truck driving to dentistry before deciding on the ministry.

"It was too easy for me to become a minister," said Jacobs, whose grandfather, father, three uncles, younger brother and brother-in-law are all ministers.

"I did everything possible to look at other vocations in high school and college," explained Jacobs, who attended Asbury College and Asbury Theological Seminary in Kentucky. "But I liked working with people and doing this (ministry) was the best way to do it."

Jacobs is the new pastor at Novi United Methodist Church. It is the fifth parish he has served in his 15-year career.

"Northern Michigan is nice — it's a whole different world, a much slower pace, up there," Jacobs explained.

He recalled his first trip to the Hancock-Houghton area. "We flew up and the flight took forever — we stopped six times. It was a real milk run," he laughed.

"When I looked out the window there were no buildings. It was mostly trees."

With the exception of the students and faculty of Michigan Technological University in Houghton, most of the people in the area were "copper people" — those who came up during the copper rush.

"It's a depressed area," Jacobs said. "When the recession hit downstate, they didn't understand the concern over the high unemployment rate. That kind of thing was nothing new to those people."

Jacobs found that few people were concerned with the lack of contact with the metropolitan areas of lower Michigan, especially Detroit.

"People either intentionally denied ties with the larger city or they felt more a part of Green Bay, Wisconsin," explained Jacobs. "Green Bay was closer and we were in their time zone."

Keeping ties open was important to Jacobs, however, and he served on church boards and agencies in Detroit, visiting the city every month.

Although Jacobs enjoyed the different atmosphere and people in Hancock, he and his family were glad to learn they were needed again in this area.

"It (Hancock) was a good experience," said Jacobs, but we're glad to be back — we're Detroit people."

Jacobs, excited about his new assignment and supportive of the city's expansion, is pleased with what he has seen so far in the church.

"The church is already growing — they just completed a new phase in the building and are doing a lot of remodeling," he said.

"I'm very impressed at the amount of community involvement and awareness," Jacobs continued, noting "the church is never not being used." Among the groups using the building are nurseries, exercise groups, scout troops, a food co-op and the Rotary Club.

Jacobs approaches his new position with anticipation. His first priority is to become acquainted with the people in the congregation.

"I like developing new friendships, finding out where the people and the church are going," explained the pastor. "That helps me to add my insight and encourage those plans."

"My job is exciting to try to find answers and the energy to solve problems," he said. "Whether it deals with finances, volunteerism or social issues, handling challenges is a part of my work that I enjoy."

Jacobs doesn't know how long he and his family will be in Novi, but says they would like to stay awhile.

"Moving around appeals to the gypsy nature in me, but we've never lived anywhere more than four years. Now we're like to see what happens after that fourth year," he said.

Whatever the length of his stay, however, Jacobs is happy with his job. "It's never boring because it's always changing. Ministry is so many different jobs tied into one — it never grows stale."

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According to the law, you are required to maintain detailed financial records for at least three years for ordinary tax audits.
