

Charter change okayed in light primary turnout

NOVI — A proposed amendment to the Novi Charter dealing with primary elections was adopted by voters in the primary election yesterday (Tuesday).

Voters approved an amendment to Section 3.17 of the city charter. Formerly, Section 3.17 required a primary to nominate candidates to all elective offices whenever the number of candidates was twice the number to be elected. The charter as amended requires a primary whenever the number of candidates is more than three times the number of vacancies.

The amendment was passed by a margin of 630 to 466. Some 1,395 of the city's 15,079 registered voters cast

ballots — a voter turnout of approximately 9.25 percent.

As a result, the city will be required to hold primaries in the future only when the number of candidates is more than three times the number of positions to be filled.

City officials decided to put the proposed charter amendment before the voters as a result of low voter turnouts in past primaries.

The question was placed on the ballot despite an opinion from the state attorney-general's office which stated the proposal is in violation of state election law. The attorney-general's office twice has ruled that the city can eliminate the primary

totally, but if a primary is held, it

must be held whenever the number of candidates exceeds twice the number of vacancies to be filled.

The attorney-general's opinion means that future elections could be subject to a court challenge. Anyone who believes they have been aggrieved by the new procedure may challenge the city's charter provision by filing suit before the particular election.

City Attorney David Fried has advised the council that he believes the attorney-general's opinion is incorrect. Fried maintains the attorney-general's office used the wrong section of state election law in reviewing the legality of the proposed charter amendment.

Parents to be given chance to pick elementary schools

NOVI — Parents will have an opportunity to select which elementary school their children will attend under a new policy approved by the Novi Board of Education.

Specifically, the board voted 4-1 last week to adopt a policy which states: "It shall be the policy of the Novi School District to allow parents the option of selecting the elementary building, other than the assigned building by attendance area, their child will attend at the time of entrance into the kindergarten program."

Board President Robert Schram and Trustees Joan Daley, Sharon Pelchat and Norman Miller voted to adopt the policy, while Michael Meyer cast the lone dissenting vote. Trustees Gilbert Henderson and Ron Milam were absent.

The new policy grew out of a recommendation from the Task Force on Excellence in Education and will be implemented for the 1984-85 school year.

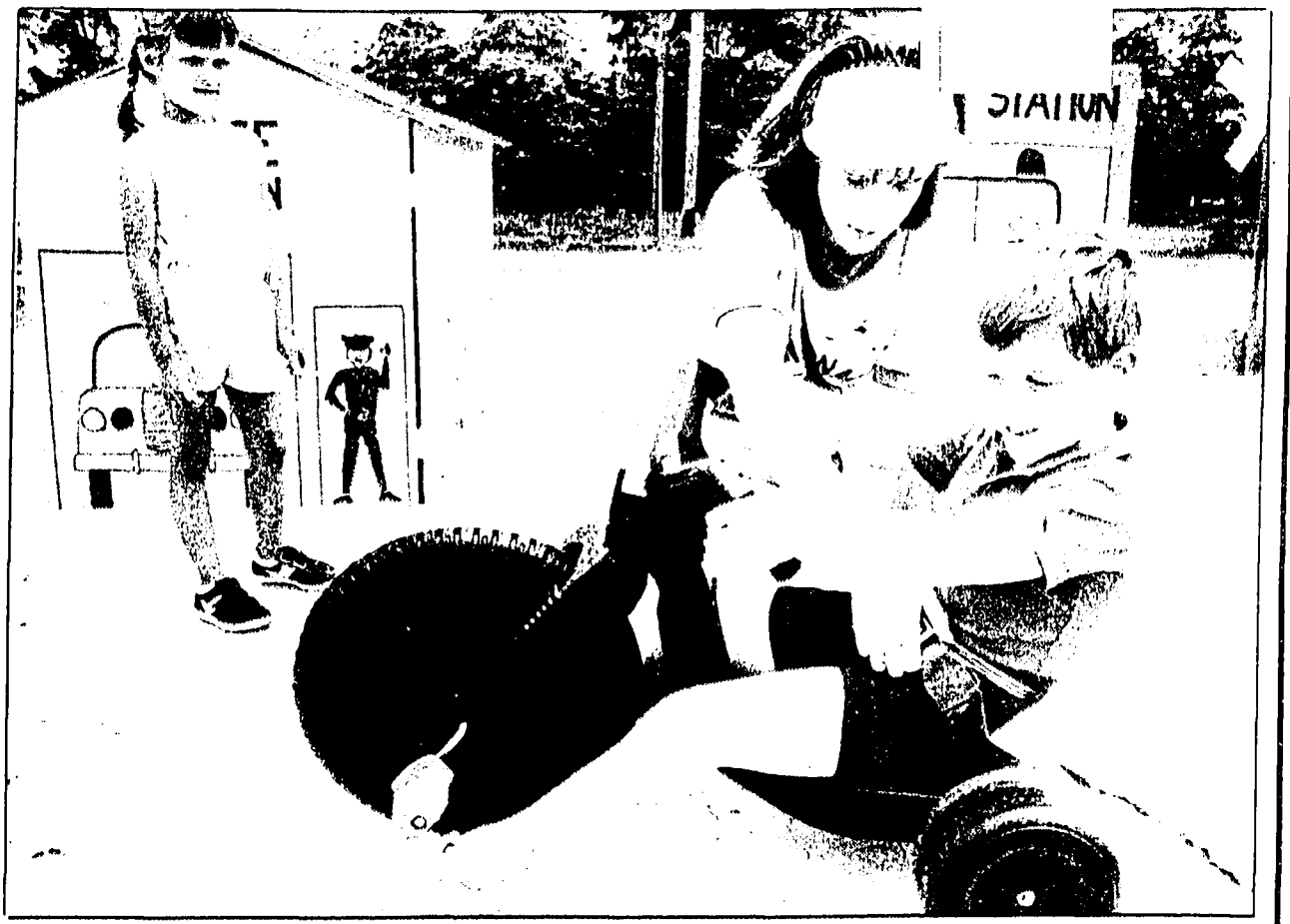
Under the new policy, parents may decide which school

their child will attend at the time the child enters kindergarten. During the 1984-85 school year only, however, a parent may request that any child in grades 1-4 be assigned to a different elementary school. Parents with children in grades 1-4 who would like their children to be assigned to a different school this year must send a letter to the receiving school by August 15.

Meyer said he opposed the policy because he did not understand the reason for it. "I think we have excellent teaching staff at all our schools," said Meyer. "I don't understand why parents wouldn't want their children to go to the same school as the other children in the neighborhood."

When Meyer asked about the possibility "for a run" on one specific school, Superintendent Robert Piwko said he did not foresee it.

Piwko graded 'outstanding' on annual board evaluation

NOVI — Superintendent Robert Piwko has received "outstanding" grades from the Novi Board of Education on his annual evaluation.

Although Piwko failed to earn "straight A's" in every category, the superintendent's annual evaluation was marked by ratings of "outstanding" in virtually every area.

Board members assessed the superintendent's performance in seven areas: relationship with the board, community relations, staff and personnel relations, educational leadership, business and finance, maintenance and personal qualities.

A grade of 5 was given for outstanding, 4 for good, 3 for average, 2 for needs improvement, 1 for unacceptable and NA for unable to evaluate.

Out of 357 total responses, Piwko received 248 "outstandings," 89 "goods," six "averages" and 14 NA's. There were no "needs improvements" or "poors" on his evaluation.

He received a grade of 4 or 5 on 50 of the 51 items rated on the evaluation and his overall evaluation was a 4.7.

Piwko received his highest grade

(4.87) in the area of Educational Leadership and his lowest grade (3.6) in the area of Maintenance.

Other grades on his annual report card were 4.77 for Personal Qualities, 4.74 for Staff and Personnel Relations, 4.62 for Relationship with the Board, 4.6 for Community Relations and 4.33 for Business and Finance.

Piwko said he felt "extremely good" about the perceptions of the board. "Overall, I'm very pleased with the process and the outcome of the evaluation," he said. "I feel we've made progress in addressing the goals we developed last year, and I think that's what the board was indicating on its evaluation."

Following is a breakdown of Piwko's performance in each of the seven areas on the evaluation:

- "Relationship with the Board" was evaluated with 14 different questions. Piwko received straight 5's on two of them: (1) maintains the confidentiality of discussions with board members and (2) refrains from criticism of individual or group members of the board.

- His lowest grades under "Relationship with the Board" were a 4.1 for

accepting constructive criticism of his work and a 4.0 for interpreting and executing board policy.

- "Community Relations" was evaluated with six questions. Piwko

Highway work will continue

NOVI — Motorists will have to grin and bear the construction on I-96 for at least four more months, according to Project Engineer Dick Kluck.

The project, which has tied traffic in knots all summer, is scheduled to be finished by November 15. Kluck said final clean-up and guard rail work will not be completed until next spring, but the part of the job which requires closing lanes will be completed this year.

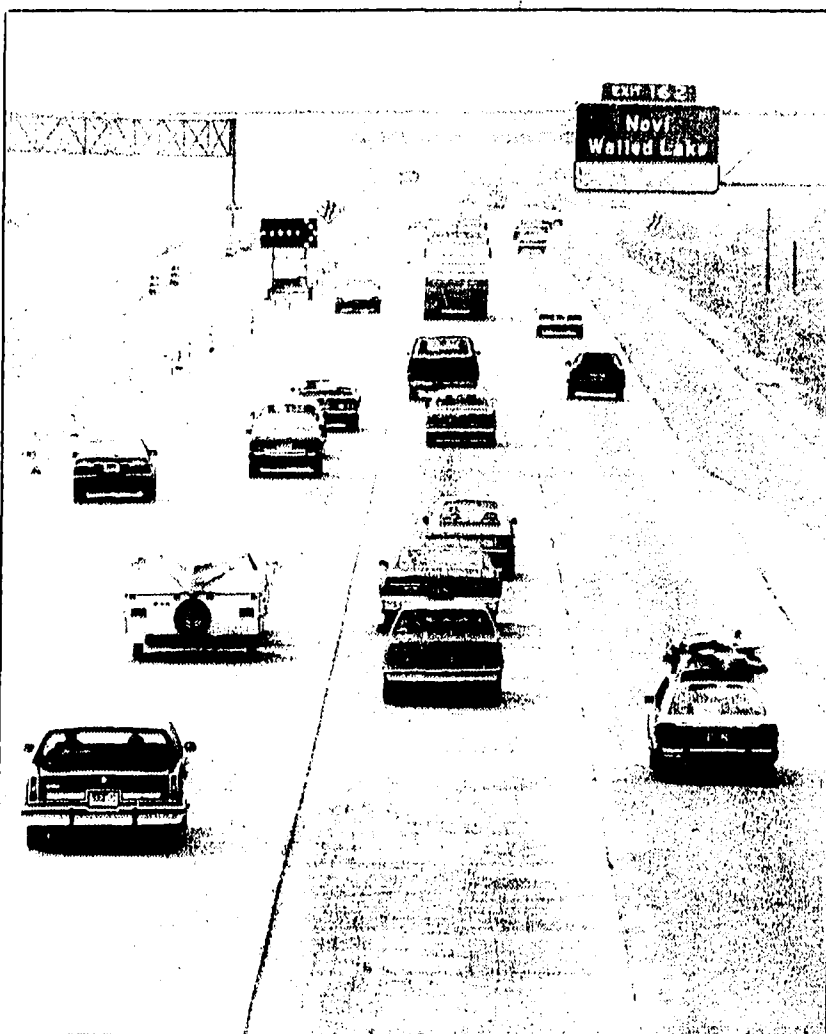
The Michigan Department of Transportation is overseeing three simultaneous construction projects, Kluck reported.

Within a six-mile stretch from one mile east of Wixom Road to the junction of M-102 and I-96, asphalt is being resurfaced, concrete is being replaced and concrete work underneath the Beck Road and Wixom Road bridges is being repaired. Total cost of all three projects is estimated at approximately \$4.7 million.

Depending on the work being done each day, the number of construction workers ranges from eight to 20. Motorists, especially truck drivers, have not been especially cooperative as they drive through the construction zone, according to Kluck. He said trucks travelling at high speeds through the construction area make the job hazardous for workers.

"We're concerned about the safety of the workmen," Kluck said.

So far workers have laid two layers of asphalt from one mile west of Wix-

om Road to Novi Road. A third and final layer is being laid in the east-bound lane, a project that Kluck expects to be completed this week.

Work east of Novi Road involves a

total concrete replacement.

"When we are finished, we hope to have smooth pavement from one mile west of Wixom Road to the M-102 and I-96 split," Kluck said.

McDonald's plans approved

NOVI — What a difference a day makes.

In the case of McDonald's, it means the difference between approval and denial of its plans for a restaurant on the city's southern border.

Plans for a McDonald's restaurant at Eight Mile and Haggerty Road, which had been shot down by the Zoning Board of Appeals (ZBA), received preliminary site plan approval from the planning board August 1.

McDonald's became eligible for site plan approval two days earlier

when the city council adopted revisions to the zoning ordinance. Under the revised ordinance, setback requirements for a freeway-service district were reduced, clearing the way for approval of McDonald's plans.

Planning Consultant Charles Cairns told the board August 1 the freeway-service district in the new zoning ordinance no longer requires 75-foot setbacks and now is similar to a general business district. "There is no longer a problem with the setbacks and the plan meets all other re-

quirements. Concerns regarding stacking space in the parking lot have been addressed; we're satisfied there is sufficient stacking space. The site plan is in order and can be given approval," he said.

Planners voted 6-0 to grant preliminary site plan approval. Planners Riley Richard, Gary Phillips and chairperson William Briggs were absent.

When debating zoning ordinance revisions last year, planners discuss-

August vacations are boom month for burglars

NOVI — The family, carrying suitcases, stands on the front porch while Dad turns the key in the lock. They are home from vacation.

As the door opens they are greeted by the sight of a ransacked home — the contents of closets on the floor, drawers rummaged and household items in disarray.

It could be a scene out of an insurance commercial. Unfortunately, all too often, it is real life.

With vacation season in full-swing, police note steps can be taken to

reduce the chance of a break-in that brings an unhappy ending to a vacation.

"A lot of things, like pinning the windows, are things homeowners can do themselves, and they are inexpensive," according to Al Rasmussen of the Novi Police Department. Do-it-yourself safety measures appear especially inexpensive in light of the cost of replacing stolen items.

Sometimes victims have ignored the obvious: close and lock all doors and windows, including those in the

garage. Rasmussen recommends single-cylinder deadbolt locks with a bolt that extends at least one inch from the edge of the door (a one-inch throw.) Both door and window locks are available at hardware stores.

Valuables such as jewelry, coins or stamp collections should be stored in a safe deposit box off the premises. Guns also are a favorite item for thieves and police recommend they be hidden or stored in a locked case.

"Tell one or two close neighbors you're leaving; limit it to that,"

Rasmussen warns. "Make sure you know who is watching your home." He also advises against asking a neighbor to house-watch who has teenage children with whom you are unfamiliar.

"Most break-ins are committed by people from the area, usually one or two young men working together," Rasmussen explained. "Most break-ins are committed by someone familiar with the people who live in the neighborhood."

Other burglars are those who

travel subdivisions looking for homes that are obviously vacant. "One of the people we recently apprehended was an individual living in Livonia who said he looks for houses where it appears no one is home," Rasmussen said.

Police warn residents that an empty house is a tempting target for burglars. Steps should be taken to assure your home does not look vacant.

Long whips Tozzi in primary

COMMERCER — Incumbent Township Supervisor Robert Long defeated Mario Tozzi, 1,391 to 622.

Deborah Gray won her first elected term as clerk with 1,012 votes. Opponent Nancy Sparks received 634 votes, while Becky Harkey received 284. Gray was appointed to replace Robert McGee as clerk when he was elected state representative in January 1983.

Bruce Enfield, Richard Higginbotham, Edward Holmes and Warren Williams retained their seats on the township board of trustees, defeating challengers Timothy Carpenter, Carl Kerr, Donald Phillips and William Senior. Higginbotham led the field with 1,064 votes, while Enfield was second with 1,012. Williams received 946 votes and Holmes was named on 859 ballots.

Carpenter was the closest challenger with 761 votes, followed by Kerr (702), Phillips (536) and Senior (453). Because there are no Democratic candidates for the clerk's or trustee's positions, the primary winners essentially have been elected to office.

Man flees police while waiting at district court

Walled Lake A man sentenced to 30 days in jail for larceny under \$100 escaped from the 2nd District Court last week while he was waiting for Wixom police to transport him to Oakland County Jail.

At about 11 a.m. Thursday, August 2, Judge Michael Batchik sentenced Union Lake resident Jeffrey Saukko to 30 days in Oakland County Jail for larceny under \$100. Batchik told police he ordered the defendant to wait in the hallway until Wixom police arrived to take him to the jail.

Over \$2,000 worth of items, including a .22 caliber Smith and Wesson semi-automatic pistol, were stolen from a home in the 1400 block of Oakgrove last month.

The theft occurred while the homeowner was away and a relative was watching the house. In addition to the \$390 pistol, over \$500 worth of camera equipment, three watches together worth over \$350 and miscellaneous jewelry worth over \$750 were missing from the home.

Entry was gained through a northwest window. Sergeant Roger Cote said the house was dusted for fingerprints. No suspects are reported at this time. The incident is still under investigation.

The owner of McDonald's Restaurant at 1212 East Maple reported the theft of a 50-gallon barrel of grease last week. The barrels, which contain grease

from the grills, are left by a dumpster where they are picked up and hauled away by a company under contract with the restaurant. The McDonald's manager told police he suspected the barrels were being stolen, so he waited at the back door of the restaurant last Wednesday, August 1.

Eventually, a man in a truck pulled up to the dumpster and loaded the barrel of grease onto the back of the truck. The manager approached the man, who said he was authorized to haul the barrels and then left.

A resident in the 900 block of North Wixom Road reported that vandals shot holes in a 24-foot trailer while it was parked in his backyard. The damage was discovered July 29.

Police said the trailer had been penetrated in five different spots. Investigation revealed that the damage was done with bb shot. Police said the shot appeared to have been fired from a shotgun.

Novi For the second time in two weeks jewelry has been stolen from Things Remembered at 27324 Novi Road, according to police reports. In the latest incident, \$1,266 worth of earrings, chains and bracelets were stolen. The jewelry was attached to a set of keys and was missing.

Police said it appeared the thieves unsuccessfully attempted to remove the wheels from the car. The hubcaps and rims were lying on the pavement. Two stereo speakers, worth \$400, were stolen July 31 from an apartment in the Westgate VI complex. Police said it appeared entry was gained by prying open a window next to the patio.

Nothing but the stereo speakers was stolen. A 12-foot aluminum boat worth \$800 was stolen July 28 from a car parked in at the Bob-O-Link Golf Course at 4755 Grand River.

A Detroit man told police he finished golfing and placed his golf bag and clubs in his car, locking the tailgate but not locking the car's doors. He discovered the theft upon his return. 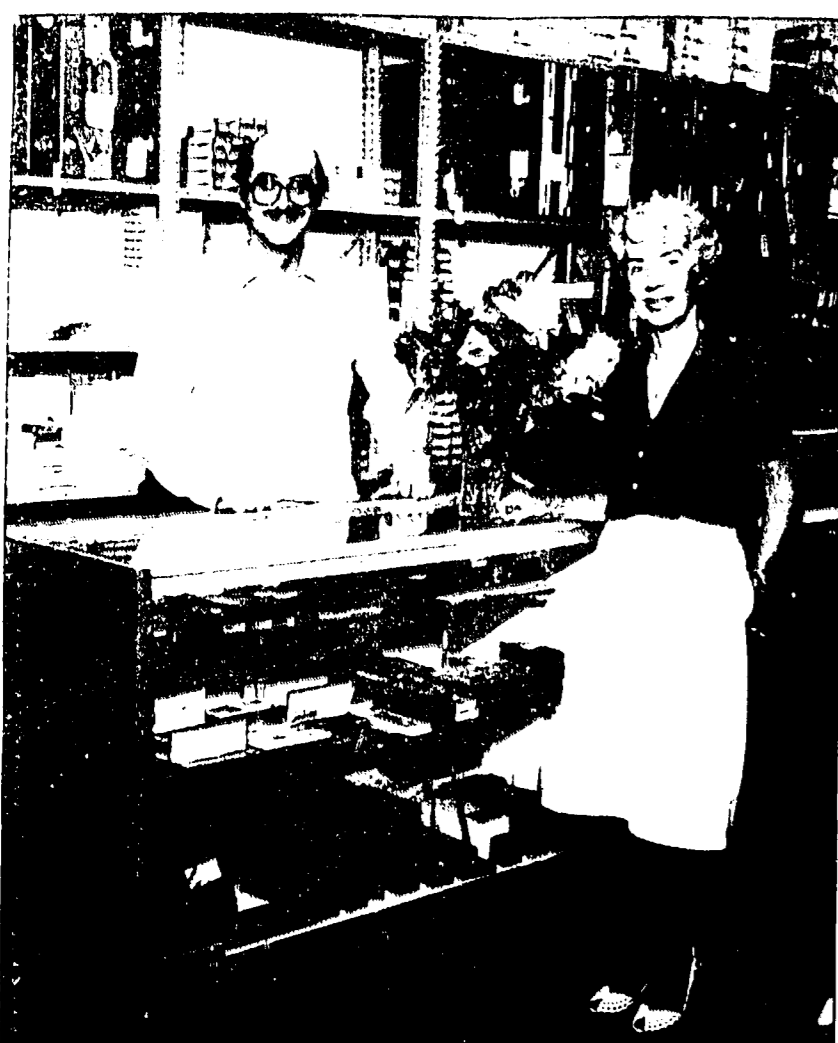



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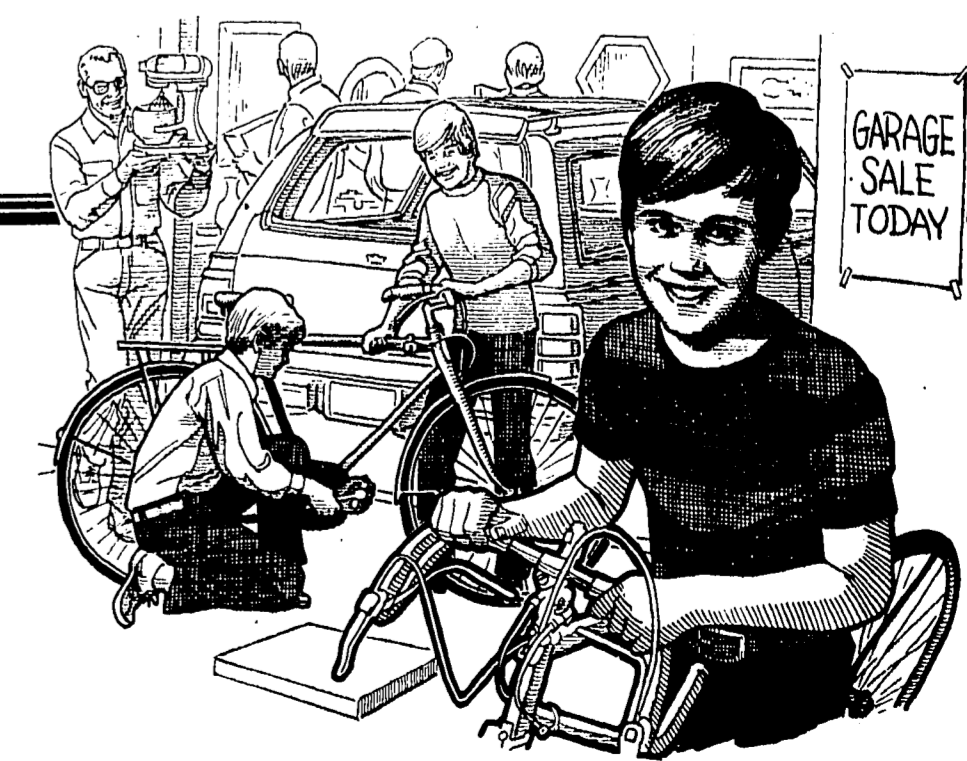
