## Lawsuits jeopardize status of convention cen

The convention center project in Novi may be in trouble, thanks in large part to legal action taken last week not in Novi, but in Farmington Hills.

The Farmington school board voted February 11 to authorize legal action barring Farmington Hills from establishing a Tax Increment Financing Authority (TIFA) along the Twelve Mile corridor in that city.

A TIFA may authorize freezing or restraining tax assessment increases on a private development project in order to divert the

funds for public improvements within a specified TIFA-administered district.

By a 6-1 vote the Farmington school board approved a motion to file suit in Oakland County Circuit Court to prevent the city from creating a TIFA to fund \$10 million in road improvements to Twelve Mile in that city.

While on the face of it, that suit involves Farmington Hills rather than Novi, it will affect all TIFA requests in the State of Michigan since the constitutional basis for creating a TIFA appears likely to be challenged.

What that means to bond buyers is that it probably will not be possible for TIFAs to issue bonds with an unqualified legal opinion until

the litigation is concluded — that probably will result in no sale for the bonds.

And the Dallas Market Center, a subsidiary of the Trammell Crow Company, has told city officials construction of a convention center northwest of Novi Road and I-96 depends on whether the city authorizes TIFA financing for public improvements — notably roads and sewers in an area extending from the convention center site all the way south to Grand River.

"The action in Farmington Hills and also in Beverly Hills very likely will result in unmarketability of tax increment bonds while the suits are pending," George Stevenson, the ci-

ty's municipal financing counsel, said Tuesday.

In a January 27 memo to city planner James Wahl, Stevenson had written: "If such litigation is commenced there is no predicting the scope of issues that it could raise. The issues, for example, could include a full range of questions relating to the constitutionality of tax increment financing."

Asked how long it could take for the legal action to run its course, Stevenson said: "If they go all the way to the Michigan Supreme Court, it could take two or three years."

Novi City Council is scheduled to conduct a March 12 public hearing on creating a TIFA for

the proposed convention center. He sees "no harm done" in proceeding with considering the TIFA and even enacting a TIFA. But, he added, the city may want to be cautious about making any financial commitments to back up bonds issued for the TIFA.

Assistant City Attorney Dennis Watson said the city may legally pledge full-faith credit bonds to circumvent the need for a private source. But even that risky move would be undercut if TIFAs are ruled unconstitutional.

Should the Dallas Market Center abandon its Novi project, the city will be forced to reimburse federal authorities \$400,000 for ramp construction at Novi Road and I-96.

## Arson 'unlikely' in school blaze

Oakland County officials say arson was not the cause of a Sunday afternoon fire at the long-occupied Novi Elementary School, currently under option to the Trammell Crow Company for its Town Center development.

Reported at 4:06 p.m. Sunday, the fire destroyed one classroom and extensively damaged several adjacent classrooms at the building, located on Novi Road south of I-96.

Sets, props and costumes belonging to Stage One Productions, a local theater group, were stored in the building and damaged by fire, smoke and water. Some smoke reached the inside of the then-occupied Novi Community Building, where Stage One presents its plays.

Two Novi firefighters sustained minor injuries

battling the blaze, and were treated and released by Novi Providence Hospital. Firefighter Dean Kalinovik was treated for debris lodged in his eye and firefighter Todd Henry required stitches after Henry cut his hand during a ventilation procedure.

It took about two dozen firefighters nearly an hour to bring the fire under control, according to Fire Chief Arthur Lenaghan.

"We had a hard time gaining access to the fire since all the exterior doors to the building were chained shut," Lenaghan said Monday. "Our people had to crawl over props, desks and other materials that had accumulated in the hallways."

"A lot of the interior doors also were chained shut," he continued. "We had to use bolt-cutters to get through. There were a lot of obstacles."

Lenaghan said no damage estimate has been prepared yet.

"Obviously, the building was going to be sold within a few weeks, and it's not likely there will be any reconstruction costs," he explained. "The theater group has to look at the stuff, and part of the damaged items belong to Parks and Recreation."

Arson investigators with the Oakland County Sheriff's Department remained at the scene until 10 p.m. Sunday to investigate the fire. While county officials have not yet filed their final report, the department informed Lenaghan that arson was unlikely.

## Novi's Kerr Co. cuts off Tylenol

While the most recent cases of tampering with Extra-Strength Tylenol capsules appear to be confined to the New York area, local distributors and pharmacies are taking no chances with the product.

"Rather than jeopardize the safety and health of the consumer, we have stopped distributing the product," said Ann Newman, president of Frank W. Kerr Co. of Novi, the state's largest pharmaceutical distributor.

Spokespeople for retail stores such as A&P, Perry Drugs, Arbor Drugs and K mart said their companies have voluntarily withdrawn the product from store shelves.

Newman said the firm had received its information on the suspected tampering from news reports, "the same as everyone else" and immediately recalled all shipments.

"We have none of the cited code numbers of the product in stock," Newman said. However, she would not comment as to whether the firm had distributed any of the products bearing the code numbers of Tylenol which New York authorities had cited.

Two bottles of Tylenol, bearing the code numbers ADF 916 and AHA 090 had been found to contain cyanide. However, both incidents occurred in New York state. No cases of tampering have been reported in Michigan.

"It's (tracking shipments) not like in the old days when you had to wait to reach someone by telephone. Everything is computerized, and all you have to do is check the distribution list from the computer," Newman said.

While Newman would not divulge how much money Frank W. Kerr Company lost during the most recent scare, she did say the financial consideration was secondary to the company's position of "doing our utmost to protect the consumer."

Providence Hospital in Novi does not prescribe Tylenol capsules for its patients, instead using Tylenol tablets, a spokesperson for the hospital said. "We have never used the capsules," she noted when asked if the hospital had used Tylenol capsules prior to the reported tampering in Chicago in 1982.

Leslie Kota, a spokesperson for K mart, said the firm had voluntarily removed all capsules from the 2,100 stores nationwide which have phar-

macies. Noting the company receives some of its pharmaceuticals from the Frank W. Kerr Company, Kota said K mart receives its Extra-Strength Tylenol directly from McNeil Laboratories in Pennsylvania.

Perry Drugs has removed not only Extra-Strength Tylenol from its shelves, but regular strength capsules as well, according to Bev Lyons. Lyons added that Perry also receives its Tylenol from McNeil, rather than from a distributor.

Johnson & Johnson, maker of Tylenol, has offered a \$100,000 reward for information leading to the arrest and conviction of the person or persons responsible for the latest "act of terrorism" against the firm.

"We are asking people not to use Extra-Strength Tylenol capsules bearing the codes ADF 916 or AHA 090," Elsie Behmer, a spokesperson for Johnson & Johnson, said. "Anyone who finds the product with those code numbers should return the unused portion to the point of purchase."

Persons with questions about the product can call a nationwide, toll-free hotline at 800-237-9900.

Behmer added it would be up to the consumers whether the capsules in question continue to be sold. "The company has made no decision to withdraw Extra-Strength Tylenol capsules from the market," Behmer said Friday. Monday news reports indicated, however, that Johnson & Johnson would no longer sell Tylenol capsules to the general public."

The New York incident, which left one woman dead, marks the second time since 1982 cyanide has been discovered in capsules of Extra-Strength Tylenol.

## New data revises dire traffic reports

The Trammell Crow Company's proposed Town Center project northeast of Novi Road and Grand River will cause fewer traffic problems than had been suggested in a report made earlier this month, a city consultant has determined.

Site plans for the 68-acre commercial center will be reviewed in a joint session of the city council and planning board at 7:30 p.m. tonight (see related story).

Trammell Crow representatives encountered a snag February 5 when Rolf Killian of Barton-Aschman Associates, Inc. told the planning board that some of the traffic projec-

tions supplied by Trammell Crow fell as much as 50 percent below his calculations.

Killian, the city's traffic consultant, further declared Novi Road would need eight lanes to handle the new traffic load immediately south of I-96 — a finding supported by Novi Planning Consultant Brandon Rogers.

But Killian revised his analysis in a February 14 memo sent to Novi planning and engineering department heads. Killian cited two major reasons for changing his opinion:



department by working weekdays, Fire Chief Arthur Lenaghan declined to give a definite yes or no answer.

## Council asks study on communication

"The city is at a crossroads in terms of its communications."

That assessment by Assistant City Manager Craig Klaiver led the Novi City Council to approve an administrative proposal to retain the services of a professional consultant to study the city's interior communications system.

On Feb. 10, the council voted 6-1 on February 10 to hire the firm of Omnicom, Inc., out of Tallahassee, Florida, to conduct the study at a cost not to exceed \$18,000. Funds for the study were included in the 1985-86 budget.

The lone dissenting vote was cast by Council Member Nancy Covert, who suggested the \$18,000 for a communications study might be better spent on a different type of study.

"I have questions about the studies we do in the city," said Covert, who was elected to her first term on the city council in November 1985. The 1985-86 budget was approved in June 1985.

"I have mixed feelings (about approving the communications study) when I think there's a greater need for a traffic study and an office study. I think we need to watch our priorities."

Council Member Donald Watson and Mayor Patricia Karchevich responded to Covert's criticism, pointing out that communications equipment has been a long-standing problem in the city.

"Over the years we've had some absolutely ridiculous conversations regarding police radios and other communications systems," said Watson. "It's (the study) not that much money if we can't afford to eliminate the problems we've had with police radios over the years."

Karchevich added that the city department, fire department and police department submitted requests to upgrade radio equipment during 1985-86 he said.

budget deliberations.

"We decided at that time that it would be wise to hire a consultant to examine all the systems to make sure they're compatible with each other," she said.

"We need a consultant to iron out the problems."

Klaiver pointed out that police and DPW crews are unable to communicate with each other during snow emergencies, for example, because their radio systems are not compatible.

"If the fire department wants to talk with the police department, the supervisor has to go back to the garage and call them on the regular telephone," said Klaiver.

The proposal to hire a communications consultant was presented by Klaiver, who reported that the city's request for proposals received a total of 10 bids. The winning bid of \$18,000 was from Omnicom, Inc., which Klaiver said was involved in the screening of consultants.

"While the quality of these proposals were such that any of the three (finalists) would have been acceptable, we felt that the experience of Omnicom was most relevant to our needs," said Klaiver.

"They also seemed to recognize and tailored their proposal to our specific needs in a more professional fashion. We also received the most complimentary reactions from their prior municipal clients," added the assistant city manager.

Klaiver also stressed that the city hoped to achieve a more cost-effective method of tying the various internal communications systems together as a result of the consultant's study. "We thought it would be more cost-effective to hire a professional consultant to study our communications systems," he said.

## Study advises changes in Grand River corridor

Novi Road predominantly for local commercial operations, offices and residential uses. West of Novi Road, much property is earmarked for light industrial and expanded NCC uses.

East of Novi Road, specific recommendations include:

□ Revising the Master Plan to incorporate existing and proposed uses of major industrial/business/residential (option) areas located south of Grand River and the intersection of Taft Road and Grand River as well as the intersection of Beck Road and Grand River.

The stated intent of the study is to bring focus to an improved visual entry and more cohesive blend of land use along the Grand River corridor in Novi. Businesses and residences which predate comprehensive planning in the corridor have resulted in numerous present uses which often are out of step with planned uses.

□ Redefining the Master Plan to reflect local business/office/multi-unit residential option (apartments) areas located on the east side of Grand River Avenue and at the northwest corner areas of Grand River and Meadowbrook Road. This should be accomplished by reclassifying proposed "light industrial" areas along the south side to permit this greater range of uses.

□ Redefining the Master Plan to include the Novi business zone and the Beck Road intersection and replacing with NCC zoning the general business-zoned property west of Beck Road at Grand River.

□ Changing the business-zoned property west of Taft Road north of Grand River to light industrial.

□ Encouraging high-density single-family residential (R-4) zoning along Eleven Mile.

□ Changing the business-zoned property west of Beck Road to unify the existing residential district for the golf course.

□ Extending light industrial districts south of Grand River between Taft and Beck to make more compatible uses of adjacent properties that are adjacent to Grand River.

□ Permitting zoning changes from light industrial to heavier industrial uses along property fronting the C-60 south of I-96.

In addition to the analysis, the report recommends some specific rezoning and other changes to the city's Master Plan map. Some of the rezonings already have been implemented or at least considered, but the proposed Master Plan revisions constitute the first significant challenge to the city's six-year-old guide to long-range development.

## Piwnko links commerce, schools

Since taking the helm as superintendent of Novi Community Schools in 1980, Bob Piwnko has overseen the district's greatest enrollment growth, watched test scores (most notably MEAP) escalate to the top of the scale and seen two of his six schools honored as among the best in the state.

While it hasn't all been smooth sailing during the past six years, there is little doubt the positive has outweighed the negative for both the district and its superintendent.

Credited with helping put Novi among the top school districts in Michigan, Piwnko's leadership ability has transcended the educational realm.

Since the beginning of the year, the former elementary teacher has been working two hats — one as superintendent of schools, the other as the newly-elected president of the Novi Chamber of Commerce.

It is a fitting role for Piwnko whose community involvement has been a strong focus of his superintendency.

"I think one of the things that makes Novi unique is that business people who

don't necessarily live in the community have a strong interest in it," says the new chamber head while sitting behind his desk in his Taft Road office.

Piwnko, who commutes to Novi from the outskirts of Brighton, credits local merchants and business owners for retaining a commitment to the community.

"We had an opportunity to reassess the business community a few years back," Piwnko notes. "Those were very difficult times."

"However, business owners never lost their positive outlook," he adds. "A sizeable number of people held together and many fine things have resulted from that."

Directing the chamber during Novi's current period of considerable growth and transition is not a task to be taken lightly.

Noting the organization currently numbers 165 members and growing, Piwnko says he is looking to continue the chamber's current goals and objectives.

"It is a valuable vehicle to discuss their concerns and keep them apprised of what is going on."

"I see my role as that of a facilitator," he notes. "The decision-

making process comes from the board of directors."

Piwnko, who was vice president of the chamber last year and served two years on the board of directors, says he feels his more than 25-year tenure in the educational field can be an asset in his new chamber post.

"I see businesses going through that same cycle," the chamber president adds. "You have to do long range planning."


Piwnko says he hopes his new role will help further develop the relationship between the school district and the business community.

"I see an opportunity for community resources to be more intricately involved in the schools," he says. "I think we have a great opportunity to ask students what we need to do to work with them on the change process."

"When I was a principal in Warren Woods it was a period of fantastic growth," Piwnko notes. "We were experiencing an incredible population boom."

"I watched that growth decline tremendously over a period of 15 years," he adds. "I think our district which has boosted 11 elementary schools now has only two."

Piwnko says the population decrease which has left many districts with vacant school buildings in the last decade is a result of poor planning. Most



## New art class inspires higher accomplishments

Room 411 at Novi Middle School is a somewhat atypical environment for budding artists.

There are no paint spills marring the polished floor; no smocks or splattered easels scattered about. Drafting tools are neatly hung from hooks on a pegboard. Pens and ink bottles are lined just so on the bare counters.

Boyer notes the class is completely different from any other art class currently offered at the middle school level.

"I'm an environmental artist," says teacher Gary Boyer standing in the center of his classroom. "I always organize everything."

A relative newcomer to the Novi school district (he began teaching last year), Boyer is the hawk behind a new art course implemented in September under the auspices of the gifted and talented program.

Boyer emphasizes the course is designed for students who are creative-

ly gifted. While some students naturally qualify as being academically gifted and talented, criteria for acceptance in the class is based on talent or interest in art.

"Students were invited to be in the class because they showed exceptional talent or wanted to put in the effort," Boyer explains. "I don't think you'll find a weak link in the whole bunch."

Novi Middle School South has never entered any competition," Boyer notes. "For eighth graders to do this well is tremendous."

The student works displayed throughout Boyer's classroom are evidence that his students indeed take their art seriously.

For subtle pen and ink sketches to watercolors splashed with effervescent yellow, the works reflect the varied talents of the school's young artists.

"I can honestly say their work went beyond my expectations."

The various mediums entered by

Boyer's students also impressed the judges in the Scholastic Art Awards contest.

"In the first six weeks we did a base review and fundamentals. From there we worked on specific projects."

Boyer notes that after the six-week course introduction, students selected their own medium to work with — whether watercolors, acrylics, oils, pen and ink or the like.

They spent the next six weeks (the remainder of first semester) working on a project to enter in the prestigious Scholastic Art Awards competition.

The national competition, in its 99th year, recognizes young artists in grades 7-12.

"I was super impressed with their first efforts," says Boyer. "These kids had only 12 weeks last year to work on this with no training whatsoever."

That these eighth graders have done so well in their first competition is a tribute to Boyer.

Boyer admits much of his own inspiration comes from his family. The

walls of his tiny office tucked in the back of his classroom are a gallery of family treasures. Along one wall are the ear renderings by his father Bill Boyer, a designer of the Thunderbird. The works of his two sisters, Nancy, a fashion designer, and Lynn, an illustrator whose work has appeared in publications such as The New Yorker and Reader's Digest, hold their place above his desk.

Another family memento, his great-grandfather's pencil sharpener (dated 1850) rests nearby.

Still in working order, the antique sharpener is used by Boyer's students to sharpen their colored pencils — which are too soft to endure the mechanics of the modern machines.

"I have a lot of my own equipment that kids use," Boyer notes. "I also buy all the best quality equipment for them. I figure they have enough problems to deal with without having to worry about equipment."

## Six Novi students' art works honored

Six Novi students were among the 1,000 regional winners in the Scholastic Art Awards competition.

The prestigious national contest recognizes the works of students in grades 7-12 in 15 various mediums. The national competition is sponsored by Scholastic Magazine, with local competition sponsored by the National Federation of Business and Professional Women.

At Novi High School, three ninth graders took honors. Seung Won Hwang was awarded a blue ribbon for an ink drawing with Laura Gray receiving a blue ribbon in watercolor. Scott Holbrack was given a certificate of accomplishment in ink drawing. The three competition winners are students of art teacher Laura Rosalik.

Winning it the first time the high school has had two blue ribbon winners. Middle School South entered the competition for the first time this year.

The 1,000 works selected from all entrants are awarded certificates.



According to official church records, the 10 founders "at once took steps toward the building of a house of worship and proceeded with so much of earnestness and energy that in less than a year they erected a suitable edifice 40x40 at a cost of \$1,000."

The building stood on the west side of "Walled Lake and Novi Road," just south of the location of Old Novi Township Hall. The one acre of land on which the church was built was donated by Daniel S. Lee. The church was dedicated "to God's service on February 3, 1847 and was the only church in the township of Novi."

date of the return and amended returns. You should seek professional assistance in these areas.

If any of your federal schedules show a loss either in business, farm, rentals or capital, or if you have made adjustments to income on your Federal Form 1040 then you must include a copy of these schedules with your Michigan return.

Before mailing your returns be sure you have completed the following items: The return must be signed by you and your spouse; your address in the related Schedule F must be listed; your W-2s must be checked; mathematical computations have been checked; a check is attached for any balance due and if you have an overpayment, it has been indicated whether it is to be refunded or applied to next year's estimated tax payments.

Individuals may be subject to other Michigan taxes in addition to the state income tax. An intangibles tax return (Form C-6006) is required of owners of certain intangible property (such as stocks, bonds and land contracts), if the total dividends and interest exceed \$5,000 in the case of a corporation and \$2,000 in the case of an individual. The tax is \$100 per \$1,000 of value.

Individuals who have signed an agreement with the Michigan Department of Natural Resources under the Farmland and Open Space Preservation Act may claim a special credit through the use of Form MI-1040CR-5. Copies of the property tax bills and a copy of Federal Form 1040 page 1 and the related Schedule F must be included with the tax return.



There was a time, not that long ago, when IRAs—Individual Retirement Accounts—needed both encouragement and explanations.

Those days are long gone.

IRAs are touted, with good reason, as a vital part of any portfolio. They provide instant tax breaks, deferred tax payments and, if used wisely, a secure retirement.

People have been urged to beg, borrow but not steal to come up with money to open an IRA. People have listened. Congress only made IRAs available four years ago and, according to Money magazine, about 40 million Americans have opened accounts. IRA assets have grown from \$26 billion at the end of 1981 to more than \$170 billion.

There's really no need to be surprised at the popularity. The \$2,000 an individual can contribute (\$4,000 for two working spouses) comes right off the top of your taxable income when it comes time to pay Caesar (or Uncle Sam) his due. Thus, if someone is in the 38 percent tax bracket, it only costs him or her \$1,240 to open a \$2,000 IRA since the remaining \$760 would have gone to the IRS if no investment were made.

The interest earned on the IRA investment deferred until it is pulled out at retirement age. Theoretically that means that you will be in a lower tax bracket than if you had to pay taxes on your interest earnings today.

The results is that IRAs encourage Americans to save, something they normally don't do very well. It also has provided lending institutions with a new and much-appreciated source of cash.

Banks and savings and loans, in fact, initially had somewhat of a monopoly on IRA investors. When IRAs first became available, interest rates were quite high. An investor could easily lock into a secure investment with, say, a 15 percent return. Who could ask for anything more?

But those CDs have dropped into single digits and many investors, both first-timers and those whose initial CDs are expiring, are looking for more.


And there are plenty of people out there to help them.

IRAs are big business. A single person contributing \$2,000 annually to his IRA has built up a healthy \$10,000 account or better by now. Double that for married couples. That music will catch the attention of investment brokers.

For the IRA investor, the music is played on a jukebox of choices. This year, the editors of Money magazine devoted an entire "Money Guide" issue to IRAs.

Their list of IRA options included: annuities, bonds, certificates of deposit, gold stocks, government issues, money-market investments, mutual funds, real estate and stocks.

There are limitations on some of these options; and some offer greater and

lesser degrees of risk and return. A knowledgeable investment counselor should advise you if you decide to invest in any area that you are not comfortable and familiar with.

The "Money Guide," in fact, suggests the following criteria be used to assess all IRA investments: Preservation of principal, liquidity, volatility, and inflation protection.

If the thought of losing some or all of your principal makes you queasy, stay away from such investments with

something as vital as your retirement fund. If, however, you have enough assets tucked away in secure investments, you may want to earmark part of your IRA portfolio for something a bit risky.

Cautious investing is safe, but it can be costly if not watched closely. If you invest \$2,000 a year for 30 years and average eight percent on your investment, you'll end up with slightly under a quarter of a million dollars. If you get 11 percent on your money, you would end up with nearly twice that much.

That's a lot of money. And the difference is even greater when you consider that inflation, which could average from five to seven percent a year, will eat into the buying dollar of your nest egg.


Finally, make your annual IRA investments as early in the year as you can afford to. The law allows your 1986 IRA contribution to be made as late as April 15, 1987, the IRS deadline. But if you make that your practice, it can eventually cost you big bucks—\$20,000 or more.
