## 'Miss Michigan' comes to Novi

One hundred pretty-to-downright-gorgeous young women swarmed into the lush facilities of the Novi Hilton last weekend, all with one goal in mind — the 1986 Miss Michigan U.S.A. crown.

The winner? By now, you may have read Carlton 23-year-old Lisa Bernardi was crowned Miss Michigan to earn a trip to the national Miss U.S.A. Pageant in Miami on May 20. But you might say the real co-winners were the City of Novi and the Novi Hilton.

Pageant Hostess Debbie Grant, a former Miss World USA and conference center manager of the Hilton, announced the state pageant will return to the Hilton next year, and added the Hilton may become its home on an on-going basis.

"I think if we can keep it here, it would be good for us and for the community," said Novi Hilton General

"I think this kind of event helps put Novi on the map," agreed City Manager Edward Kriewall. "It's another example of our new-found industry — the more major events we can bring to Novi, the better."

Three contestants hailed from the City of Novi, but were eliminated among formidable competition in

preliminary judging: Dawn Balaban, 18; Tina Thomas, 20; and Malisa Weimert, 18. Two area residents did qualify for the semis (final 15), but were passed over when judges nar-

rowed the field to five finalists: Northville's Heidi Schulz, 21; and Wixom's Colleen Doyle, 20.

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## County aff millage cla

To alleviate any confusion about the upcoming Novi school district millage election, the board of education Thursday reviewed an Oakland County treasurer's statement showing that the 13-mills up for renewal no longer are on the tax rolls.

Novi voters will be asked to renew 13 of the district's voted operating mills for a three-year period in a special election March 24.

The board and administration have voiced concern that voters may misinterpret the district's need for the renewal as a result of a conflicting provision in the 1983 ballot proposal.

The '83 proposition, which was approved by 504 of the 887 Novi voters casting ballots, stated the renewal would be effective for a "three year period." However, it specifically outlined the years "1983 to 1986."

School officials have pointed out the '83 proposal should have indicated the renewal was for the years 1983, 1984 and 1985.

The county treasurer's statement was presented to the board to assure voters that the district is not requesting an additional 13 mills.

School officials noted confusion over the proposed millage request was further compounded by a headline which appeared in the January 15 edition of The Novi News. The headline stated the conflicting provision in the '83 ballot request "forced" the upcoming election.

School Board President Robert Schram stated earlier that the March 24 election is "by no means forced" as indicated by the headline in the newspaper.

The upcoming Novi schools' election will coincide with Schoolcraft College's special millage election allowing the college and school district to share election costs.

Schoolcraft College (which serves a portion of the Novi district) is seeking an additional half-mill from voters to help defer rising costs.

The college currently has 1.77 voted mills, receiving the last voter approval in 1964. Four millage requests in the 1970s were turned down by voters.

If approved, the new half-mill levy would add \$1.7 million in new revenues for Schoolcraft College.

## Samelson pick for lakeside job

The Samelson Group Company of Bloomfield Hills is on the verge of being granted the right to develop 12 acres of city-owned property on the south side of Walled Lake.

After interviews with four leading development firms, the city's Shoreline Site Planning Committee has recommended the city work out a development agreement with The Samelson Group, owners/developers of Orchard Hill Place in Novi's south Haggerty corridor.

Novi City Council is scheduled to decide on the recommendation at its meeting Monday, March 10.

"We reviewed our notes and rating sheets after our interviews, and our decision was nearly unanimous," said committee chairperson Edward Kramer. Kramer explained the decision should not be considered as disfavoring Thompson-Brown, one of the other leading candidates for the project.

"Thompson Brown's a very qualified builder," he explained. "But everyone thought The Samelson Group had a slight edge in each area. The projects they have been associated with appear to have the quality we're looking for, and they appear to have a good feel for our objectives on the site."

Assuming council's acceptance of the committee's recommendation, Kramer said he expects planning of the project to begin March 20 when committee members and Samelson Group representatives are to meet to discuss objectives. It has not been determined yet whether the city will sell or lease the property to The

Samelson Group.

"We'd certainly like to see it progress as rapidly as possible," said Kramer. "Our first step will be to conduct a market analysis to test some different options for the project. It's within the realm of possibility to (complete the project) within a year."

The proposed project site, under study since creation of the Shoreline Property Site Planning Committee in January, 1984, contains 12 acres of property at Novi Road and Thirteen Mile on the south shore of Walled Lake.

Among the objectives committee members identified in seeking proposals to build were:

- A general upgrading of the lake area;
- A mixture of private and community uses;
- Allowing the city to retain control of at least the lake frontage; and
- Promoting enjoyment of the lake and surrounding natural resources.

The committee provided a list of preferred types of development for the property, listing as high-priority restaurants, a boardwalk, a community assembly room, small hotel, outdoor cafe, marina/boat launch with 15-25 slips, parking, dinner theatre capability, mini-conference center and pedestrian walkways.

Moderately favored developments included a moderate to large hotel, pier, specialty shops, outdoor plaza or mall or park area.

Developments committee members clearly do not favor include a casino, tennis courts, pier or floating restaurant, housing or condominiums and outdoor amphitheatre.

## City's after your blood tomorrow

Gerri Stipp is looking for volunteers who will roll up their sleeves and donate a pint of blood at the Novi Community Blood Drive tomorrow, Thursday, March 6.

The blood drive will be held at the Church of the Holy Family on Meadowbrook Road between Ten Mile and Grand River from 1-7 p.m. Appointments are not needed, but anyone who wants to schedule an appointment can do so by calling Stipp at 349-4300.

"Members of our community have an opportunity to contribute something so valuable that money cannot buy it and so important that somebody's life depends on it every 17 seconds in this country," said Stipp.

The goal for tomorrow's blood drive is to collect 125 pints. The city collected 104 pints at the last drive. The all-time record for a blood drive in Novi is 182 pints.

Donating blood is a simple, safe

and risk-free process that takes less than an hour from the time of registration to a post-donation snack of juice and cookies. Anyone who is in good health, weighs at least 110 pounds and is between the ages of 17 and 70 is eligible to donate.

American Red Cross officials emphasize that there is absolutely no risk to the donor of contracting any infectious disease by donating blood. A new, sterile needle is used for each donor and then discarded.

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## Residents stewing over Napier knocks

Doug Hull has had it. And the Old Dutch Farms resident says many other residents of the mobile home park on Napier Road also have had it.

"There are a lot of problems out here, but the biggest one is the road," said Hull, who is organizing a rent strike in an attempt to bring pressure on the Uniprop Corporation, owners of Old Dutch Farms, to approve a funding agreement to have Napier Road paved this spring.

The proposal calls for Napier to be paved from Grand River Avenue south to the end of the Novi Meadows Mobile Home Park, located immediately south of Old Dutch Farms.

But while details of the paving proposal are being hammered out, Hull and the other

residents of the two mobile home parks must still travel up and down Napier Road ... and that's what has them angry.

"The inconvenience of having to travel Napier Road is only part of the story," said Hull. "You also have to consider the expense involved in repairing damage to our cars caused by the condition. And then there's the safety factor."

"We've had two mobile homes burn down in Old Dutch Farms so far this year. And in one of those fires, The Novi News quoted the fire chief (Arthur Lenaghan) as saying response time was limited by the condition of the road ... that the road was in such terrible condition that the fire trucks could go no faster than five miles per hour."

# Council rejects zoning changes

Rejecting five rezoning proposals submitted by planning officials, Novi City Council members sent a group of Grand River Avenue property owners home applauding Monday night. But the struggle for control over development in the Grand River corridor appears to be far from over.

All five rejections were directly contrary to the recommendation of Planning Consultant Brandon Rogers. In four cases, council's rejections went against the planning board's recommendation favoring the rezonings. On only one of the proposals (containing several business and residential parcels south of Grand River almost halfway between Taft and Beck roads proposed for industrial zoning) had the board refused Rogers' recommendation.

After close to three hours of discussion and remarks from concerned property owners, council members voted 5-2 to turn down each of the first four rezoning requests. In each of those votes, council members Arlen Schroeder and Nancy Covert dissented and criticized the majority's action.

"Our planners have spent the last nine months updating the Master Plan," Schroeder said, referring to recommended changes outlined in the west Grand River corridor study Rogers prepared for council members two weeks ago.

"We're sitting here talking about alternatives (to the proposed zoning map amendments)," Schroeder continued. "Well, there will never be a time there aren't alternatives. . . This issue should be voted on its own merits."

In all of the five cases, property owners petitioned the council to reject the rezoning request and permit existing zoning to continue. The owners' objections centered on two claims: first, that some rezonings would render their uses of the property nonconforming; and second, that the current zoning allowed them a wider variety of development options. In case they wanted to sell their property.

Schroeder countered: "I don't see where we're doing any harm to these people. They can maintain and expand their businesses no matter what we do. They can be in Novi 100 years from now. As far as property values, that is not an issue when it comes to land use. If we started deciding land use according to maximum property values, we'd rezoned the whole city to office."

Covert agreed, adding, "I don't think these people should be left hanging for years and years. I think they have a right to know what direction we're heading in."

Rogers' plan for the Grand River corridor contradicts in places the Master Plan for the city drafted and enacted in 1980. But the consultant explained his proposed changes would fit in a more unified, logical pattern of uses and eliminate what he termed a "checkerboard" of spot zonings in the area.

In the west Grand River corridor, several of the most controversial pro-

posed changes would replace numerous business-zoned properties with light industrial districts, which permit "clean" industries, industrial parks and offices. Existing zoning permits certain commercial and retail uses — shops, auto service and high-traffic volume enterprises, for example — which are prohibited under industrial zoning.

"Our current zoning ordinance is much more restrictive with respect to landscaping in light industrial districts than it is with business," Rogers told council members. He noted that compared to business zoning, industrial zonings require greater setbacks and berms while restricting parking and driveway access to Grand River.

But Rogers said he might favor adding more flexible development options in industrial districts at some point in the future, or creating a different business district in keeping with serving the needs of neighboring industrial uses and permitted certain existing uses which otherwise would be non-conforming.

Some council members identified several areas they considered weaknesses in Rogers' series of proposed rezonings.

Council Member Edward Leininger listed objections to non-center commercial zoning at Taft and Grand River and to the elimination of so many business-zoned properties. Martha Hoyer agreed, saying she would not like to see a shopping center on the Taft/Grand River site. Hugh Crawford reiterated his opposition to "zoning out" existing businesses. Finally, Ronald Watson said he could not favor rezoning the property when Rogers himself admitted more flexible zoning restrictions than light industrial might be needed.

The final proposed rezoning on Monday's agenda contained residential/agricultural zoned property east of Taft between Grand River and Eleven Mile, including one large parcel used by a property owner to keep horses. Watson objected to the rezoning because he did not favor increasing population density without the owner's desire for the rezoning.

"We're trying to keep some low-density areas, open spaces," Watson said. "Why should we increase the allowed density if the owner doesn't want it?"

On that request, Mayor Patricia Karcovich, Leininger, Schroeder and Watson voted to reject the recommendation while this time, Crawford and Hoyer sided with Covert favoring the rezoning.

All the council members appeared to agree at least some zoning changes in the west Grand River corridor would be useful. With that in mind, they agreed to re-study zoning for the area with more unified, logical pattern of uses and eliminate what he termed a "checkerboard" of spot zonings in the area. # Novi man accused

A 28-year-old Novi man has been charged with three counts of criminal sexual conduct in conjunction with an alleged assault on an 11-year-old youth from Walled Lake.

Officer Al Rasmussen of the Novi Police Department said Wayne Barz, 28, was scheduled to face preliminary examination on the charges in the 52nd District Court in Walled Lake yesterday (Tuesday).

Barz is charged with two counts of first degree sexual criminal conduct and one count of second degree sexual criminal conduct, according to Rasmussen.

The charges stem from incidents which allegedly occurred between September and November of 1985. Rasmussen declined to release any further details regarding the case.

Barz was released on personal bond following arraignment on the charges. Rasmussen said the suspect surrendered himself to authorities in the presence of his attorney following issuance of warrants for his arrest on the charges.

# Terrorism may curb exchanges

In the wake of recent terrorist actions against Americans visiting foreign countries, Novi Community Schools is taking a closer look at overseas programs for students and staff members.

At its February 27 meeting, the school board debated a recommendation to curb foreign travel for Novi students and staff.

The issue was brought to the board table by Superintendent Robert Pwko who recommended the district support the position statement of the Michigan Association of Secondary School Principals (MAASP).

The MAASP recently issued a statement recommending school districts not send or sponsor student groups on foreign travel as long as there is a high risk of terrorist acts against Americans. "At least three groups from Michigan this (school) year did encounter difficulties," Pwko said. "They were in an airport or other areas where acts of terrorism occurred."

Raymond Byers told the board, "It's too broad. . . a foreign country is Canada and Mexico."

"I think we have to come up with something more definitive," he said. Recognizing that Detroit-area schools are in the position of traveling to Canada for school trips, several board members noted the phrasing of the statement as it pertains to "foreign travel" needs to be more clearly defined.

"I think the position statement of the MAASP is a very cold statement of fact," Trustee Michael Meyer noted. "I think we could come up with our own statement," he added.

While the issue was brought to the table as an information item, the board indicated it would consider taking a position on the matter at a future meeting. "I understand the concern for safety," Trustee Gil Henderson remarked. "However, I have problems when we restrict students from interacting in this world."

"I don't think we ought to deny families or staff members the opportunity to explore educational opportunities out of this country," Board members also voiced concern about the liability each of us face — both individually and collectively. "I happen to think the student exchange program

# 60-unit subdivision could go this year

The preliminary plan for an "upscale" 60-unit subdivision in southern Novi will travel from atop the drawing board to under the eyes of city officials in a joint city council-planning board meeting Monday, March 10.

But as with the Dunbarton Pines II subdivision also moving through approval channels, the Northville School District instead of the Novi School District will receive the property tax revenues from the site.

The subdivision, to be known as Willow Creek, will contain lots roughly one-half acre in size and contain homes of 2,000 to 2,300 square feet in the \$125-135,000 price range. Willow Creek will be located on vacant property south of Nine Mile and west of Taft Road.

Although the plat applicant, Singh Development Company of Southfield, plans to build a subdivision immediately to the south of the site, Singh representative Michael Kahn said Monday the two projects are not related. "We just happen to be developing them at the same time," he explained.

"We're looking for a sub with the kind of quality of Turtle Creek (in Novi) and Quail Ridge, which we've done in Northville Township," said Kahn. "We're really very positive about Novi. We think it's a good area, a progressive community."

Noting that the Willow Creek property lies in the City of Novi, but also within Northville school district boundaries, Kahn said, "I understand their school district extends all the way up to Novi High School," he explained. "I

# County backs up Haggerty request

PONTIAC — The Oakland County Board of Commissioners added 23 unanimous voices to the request for a highway in the Haggerty road corridor last week.

At the same time, however, the county board agreed that a wider Haggerty Road "does not by itself solve the north-south traffic problem in western Oakland County, nor does it address the need for a thoroughfare from I-275 in Novi/Farmington Hills north to M-59 and beyond."

Four commissioners were absent when the resolution passed through the board without discussion last Thursday. Prospects are dim that action on the freeway extension will begin soon, according to State Senator Richard Fessler.

"M-275 is dead," Fessler pronounced in an interview on the Senate floor last week. He said James Pitz, director of the Michigan Department of Transportation, did not include it in state freeway plans. Pitz and Governor James Blanchard's administration have emphasized improvement and renovation of existing freeways, shying away from new construction projects such as M-275. Oakland officials long have complained there is no four-lane north-south road in the 25-mile expanse between crowded Telegraph Road and the US-23 freeway in Livingston County. Despite some opposition from environmentalists, local and county officials have advocated M-275, which would link the stub of I-275 ending in Novi/Farmington Hills to I-75 near Clarkston. The former state highway commission shut down that project in the late '70s. The county board endorsed a plan by Fessler to widen Haggerty Road from two lanes to four and turn it into a limited-access parkway or "boulevard." Their resolution calls for entrance and exit ramps to I-496 as an "immediate action to relieve a localized portion of this traffic congestion."

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# Vandals tamper with car at mall

A Southfield woman might well have escaped serious injury because she realized vandals had tampered with her car while it was parked at Twelve Oaks Mall on February 12.

The woman, a J.L. Hudson's employee, told police she parked her 1984 Plymouth Horizon in the Red Lot upon reporting for work at 8 a.m. As she started to drive home after getting out of work at 6:30 p.m., she felt a wiggle in the wheels. Upon investigating, she discovered that vandals had removed three of the four lug nuts from the right rear tire.

A Farmington Hills woman reported that her wallet and keys were stolen from her purse while she was attending the Movies at Twelve Oaks on February 11.

The woman said she entered the theater at 9:15 p.m. and noticed the wallet and keys missing from the purse as she was leaving approximately two hours later. She told police the purse had not been left unattended at any time while she was in the theater. The wallet was valued at \$45 and contained \$25 in cash as well as numerous credit cards and personal identification items.

Tools and welding gauges valued in excess of \$700 were stolen from the Corvo Iron Works at 26700 Wixom Road during a burglarizing and entering which occurred over the weekend of February 21-24.

responsible parties gained entry by prying open a steel door on the north side of the building. The ashes from several rolls of large drafting-type paper were found immediately inside the door, and police theorized the thieves lit the fire to provide light. Stolen property included two acetylene gauges and two oxygen gauges, valued at a total of \$320. Also stolen was a burning torch valued at \$100 and numerous small tools.

# Haggerty Road: If there's a corner, build a hotel

While controversy continues to surround plans for a 12-story high-rise hotel on Seven Mile between Haggerty and Newburgh roads in Livonia, a number of other hotels and motels are not attracting quite as much attention as they move into the Haggerty Road/1-275 corridor.

First, in 1982, there was the Holiday Inn West in Livonia. Then, in 1985, there was the Novi Hilton. Now, it is very likely an unprecedented growth in the number of available hotel rooms along the Haggerty Road corridor between Five Mile and Twelve Mile will result in an additional 2,300 rooms by 1988.

There will be hotels and motels aimed at the business traveler, the commuter, the family, the weekend guest and maybe even the family pet.

There will be facilities with swimming pools and without, with food service and without, with attached restaurants and shopping centers and office buildings and some with just rooms and a bed.

The hotels will be run by such well-known names as Holiday Inn and Hilton, Sheraton and Red Roof, Marriott and Quality Inn. And other hotels and nameplates will be equally unfamiliar in this area such as Hampton and Dilton.

Developers of the office center/hotel complex on Seven Mile in Livonia are being very close-mouthed about which hotel chain will locate in the area.

"We have had discussions with a number of hotel organizations," said Manny Kniabnytsky, vice president of Victor International Corp., developers of the project. "We really do not know who will actually move in there."

Kniabnytsky said, however, he did not expect Marriott to locate on the site. "We have had serious discussions with them (Marriott) but as of right now, they are not among the two or three firms with whom we are holding very serious discussions."

There is a strong possibility, however, that Courtyard by Marriott, a subsidiary of Marriott, will construct at least one moderately-priced facility in the area.


"We have no firm sites selected in the area, but certainly we have targeted that area to develop on," said Craig Lambert, vice president for marketing and sales of Courtyard by Marriott.

Rumors also continue to circulate about the possibility of a full-service hotel located on Six Mile on a site being developed by Schostak Bros. which will include a Jacobson's full service department store. However, Jacobson's President Mark Rosenfeld referred questions about the possible hotel to Jerome Schostak, who was out of town and could not be reached for comment.

It is apparent that much of the hotel/motel development along the corridor will be so-called economy or budget hotels, rather than full-service facilities.

But each hotel will be reaching for the same dollar from the traveler, and each hotel will try to keep that dollar for itself.

"There definitely will be some effect on us with the number of new hotels already opened and scheduled to open by across the street has had an approximate effect on that rate.

In Livonia. It is that facility that has area residents up in arms since it will be built in what has been, up to now, primarily a residential area.

That hotel is described as "a high-end, full-service luxury facility that will contain an attached restaurant with a separate entrance." That hotel is expected to have between 240 and 300 rooms and cost in the neighborhood of \$25 million.

Selbert added the Novi Hilton expects to continue its aggressive marketing in an attempt to increase its share of the traveling and convention market.

While targeted at a different market, the Skylight Inn, currently under construction directly across Haggerty Road from the Hilton, may lure some business travelers and non-business travelers who can afford to sit back and wait for customers to come to them," he said.

Selbert added that he did not expect overstatement to become a problem in the near future, noting that while the Novi Hilton had not yet reached the state average in room bookings, it had surpassed earlier projections.

While the share of the market to increase. The Quality Inn caters to a clientele somewhat between the full services offered by the Holiday Inn West, which is directly across Six Mile, and the moderate-priced hotels which do not offer food service.

"We think the (Livonia, Northville, Novi and Southfield) area is one of the fastest-growing areas in the country and we want to be part of the action," explained Joseph A. Franko, director of marketing for the hotel chain.

The Skylight Inns do not offer a connected on-site restaurant nor do they have large meeting rooms. Franko said the motels cater primarily to the business traveler and offer such amenities as continental breakfast, computer links through the telephone lines and photocopying services.

"When we go into an area, we look to see if there is hospitality already available. In the area there are a number of restaurants (McDonald's and others) and we do not seem to be deterring anyone from plans to grab a piece of the pie."

There is a current need for additional rooms. No one is disputing that," says the Novi Hilton's Selbert. "What each hotel needs to do now is to aggressively lure the traveler into his facility."

However, Conner is not as optimistic. She said the Holiday Inn West already has received corporate approval to add 100 rooms, but the project is currently on hold.

"I really don't know where it (the increase in hotel rooms) will end," Selbert says.

Judging from the building boom, that won't happen anytime soon.

# Radar detectors easy to swipe

Novi Police Captain Richard Faulkner looked at the stack of reports lying on the table.

"Wait till you see the 'Larceny From Auto' (LFA) reports," he said, motioning to the stack of paper.

"There were lots of them last week, and the sad thing is that a lot of them could have been avoided," continued the veteran law-enforcement officer.

"Just the other day I was walking through a parking lot and saw cords hanging from the rearview mirrors of three different cars. You can just about bet those cords belonged to radar detectors. And if I can walk by and see them, you know that somebody looking to make a quick buck by ripping them off can see them, too."

"The thing that bothers me is that people are inviting thieves to rip them off. The cord hanging from the rearview mirror is a dead giveaway that there's a radar detector inside."

"It's just as bad as leaving an expensive 10-speed bicycle lying on your front lawn. People are making it easy for thieves to do their jobs, and it's being reflected in our crime statistics."

"If people would exercise a little common sense in taking care of their

property, we could make a significant dent in the number of larcenies in general and "Larcenies From Autos" in particular."

# Insurance law's effects unclear

Although insurance company officials say they have no idea whether rates will increase or decrease in suburban Detroit areas since Governor James Blanchard signed the amended essential insurance act, they do agree there will be a lot more competition for the market.

"Particularly those companies that have done a lot of business in Detroit will now be able to amend their rates in both areas to more adequately reflect the cost of doing business in specific territories," said Joseph Olson, vice president and general counsel of Citizens Insurance Co.

Under the previous restrictions of the essential insurance act, companies were prohibited from establishing more than a 45 percent differential between the highest and lowest rates charged for coverage. In addition, firms were prohibited from having more than a 10 percent rate differential between rates charged for adjoining territories.

The law also suspends existing geographical rating restrictions on auto

insurance until July 1, 1991, provides for an insurance premium discount for drivers who certify they wear safety belts while driving, and repeals existing provisions authorizing the insurance commissioner to order or develop plans guaranteeing market access to insurance customers.

"In effect under the previous restrictions, suburban customers were subsidizing urban customers," Olson said. "A company either had to set its rates too low in Detroit or too high in the suburbs to make any money."

Currently, four companies - Automobile Club of Michigan, Allstate, State Farm and Auto Owners Insurance Co. - write 80 percent of the insurance policies in Detroit.

"Now that the constraints have been lifted, we feel that with the natural competitive forces at work for AAA, our company will certainly be going after the Novi-Northville area," said Thomas Freel, public relations manager for AAA-Michigan. Freel said he "just did not know" what effect the changes in the law would have on specific areas of the state.

Under the provisions of the new law, once rates are competitively established, they could not increase more than 4 percent plus the consumer price index annually.

State Senator Robert Geake (R-Northville), who noted he voted in favor of the insurance reforms, said he is optimistic the bill will help curb automobile thefts, especially with the establishment of a seven-member

authority to look at ways to reduce the growing problem of theft. The automobile theft prevention authority would be comprised of two representatives of insurance customers, two members who represent insurance companies, two members who represent law enforcement agencies and the director of the state police or his designee. The board would be appointed by the governor.

Statistics bear out the concerns of legislators and insurance company representatives about the increase in thefts. During 1985, 160 vehicles were reported stolen in Novi, a 5.3 percent decrease from a year ago.

Robert Maynes, owner of Staman Insurance Company in Novi, said he anticipated more competition among insurance companies for the suburban customer, but added the 4 percent cap was not enough to make it worthwhile for companies to go after the urban insurance customers.

He would be much happier, however, if "we totally removed government from private business and this law doesn't do that."

"I like it because I like working with the public and being in the medical profession. You're able to do a big service for people. "It's an exciting time in dentistry. There are a lot of new things happening and I try to keep up with them. People seem to have a tremendous fear of dentistry, and we're trying to show things have changed in our field considerably. "The techniques are quicker - it's not like the days you'd be grabbing onto the chair and have nothing to say about how you were treated. "The high suicide and divorce rate among dentists? I don't think people realize it's very stressful. You're working in small quarters; some of the things you work on are measured in

millimeters - and dentists tend to be perfectionists by nature. Some can't adjust to the pressure and constantly working on somebody who's scared to death of you. "I've heard so many women say they'd rather have a baby than visit the dentist. I say, 'Are you kidding? You'd rather have a baby than get a tooth filled?' "People talk about our access to drugs, but we really don't deal in a lot of drugs... A pharmacist would call me if I prescribed any strong narcotic. There are some other medical fields more likely to be open to abuse. "The music! Nowadays a lot of people bring in their own headphones and tapes. We're from the old school - we play middle-of-the-road stuff. Obviously, you have different kinds of patients and you can't play too much rock and roll."

# Parks commission survey sets goals

PONTIAC - The Oakland County Parks and Recreation Commission has received a five-year master plan which includes several long-range goals and major capital improvements. "The master plan focuses on the open space and the recreational and leisure use of the Oakland County residents in years to come," said Lewis E. Wint, chairman of the Oakland County Parks and Recreation Commission.

"The goals and projects established in the long-range plan are designed to complement, not duplicate, what local communities can provide," he added. Input for development of the Oakland County Parks' master plan was compiled from several sources, including questionnaires and workshops with elected officials and municipal recreation directors.

Some 3,200 Oakland County residents were surveyed by mail in April 1985 to seek their ideas on existing and future parks, facilities and programs.

The Shell Environmental Group of Lansing served as consultant for the master plan, conducting research,

analyzing data and making recommendations. Among the goals suggested for the parks commission over the next five years were the following:

- Promote the continued financial stability of the Oakland County park and recreation system supported by user fees and perhaps a 30-year millage rather than the current five-year millage.
- Promote the visibility and image of the park system to existing and potential users. Research indicated that many county residents are not familiar with park locations and services.
- Participate in organized forums to discuss and exchange ideas relative to recreation on a regional scale.
- Promote acquisition of additional parklands to assist serving areas within the county that are under-served or deficient, including the southeast and southwest portions of the county.



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## Financing is key to hotel boom

Eisewhere in Novi, hotel business may be blossoming — provided some thorny financing problems can be pruned away.

Novi's first major hotel, the Sheraton Oaks northwest of I-96 and Novi Road, will become the tallest structure in the city if the Dallas Market Center succeeds in building its convention center project adjacent to the hotel.

The success of the convention center may depend on the creation and survival of a tax increment financing authority (TIFA) for the project, the

subject of a public hearing at 8 p.m., Wednesday, March 12.

A series of legal challenges in various Michigan courts has been mounted by school officials seeking to keep companies applying for TIFAs from capturing revenue which otherwise would be allocated to school districts.

Executives of the Dallas Market Center have told city officials they need a TIFA to proceed with construction of their facility and provide the needed network of roads and sewers.

Should the project succeed, the Sheraton likely would build an eight or

nine-story addition to its current two-story facility to accommodate visitors to the convention center.

Prior to the advent of the Sheraton, Novi's hotel needs were provided by the Fair Lane Motel at 45700 Grand River. The hotel, a self-proclaimed "Ma and Pa" operation owned by Henry and Sherry Hulsman, is one of the properties on Grand River city planning consultant Brandon Rogers has recommended be considered for rezoning to light industrial use.

The Hulsmans' interest in preserving the business zoning on their property

reflects their desire to sell the property, since their hotel operation and expansion rights would be preserved under the rezoning recommended by Rogers.

"There's a proliferation of hotels being built in the area right now," Henry Hulsman told city council members Monday. "Between the Hilton, the Sheraton, the Skyline, the Bargainette in Farmington Hills and the Marriott looking for a place to build, we're being surrounded by big hotels. The days of the Ma and Pa hotel may be over. We want the flexibility to sell our property as B-3," he added.

## Precautions may save you gas money

In today's automotive society, the purchase of gasoline has almost become a habit in our daily routine. These transactions are so commonplace, we usually take the accuracy of the weights and measures recorded at the gasoline pump for granted. Yet, carelessness or improper care can occur which may cause inaccuracy in the pump measures. Consumers can protect themselves against inaccurate measures by taking some simple precautions, according to Frank Nagele, a weights and measures

specialist with the Michigan Department of Agriculture (MDA).

Nagele recommends that consumers use the following guidelines when purchasing gasoline:

- Compare the price on the pump with the advertised price — they should be the same.
- Be sure the pump meter is clear and at zero until you begin to pump.
- Check the price before you begin, then again when the pump starts to run.
- While pumping your own gas, stop

at one gallon, then again at 10 gallons to insure the price is correct when compared to the number of gallons pumped.

□ When self-service islands are closed, prices at mini-service and full-service islands can cost up to 60 cents and more per gallon.

- Check your auto's gas gauge before and after filling to make sure the new reading corresponds with the amount of gas you purchased. Caution gasoline gauges and tank sizes are only approximate.
- Finally, if the pump and the office


console indication readings do not agree, the pump governs the correct amount of the sale.

Practicing these preventive measures can help reduce discrepancies while assuring equity and fairness in the marketplace.

Protecting consumers by verifying and enforcing accurate weights and measures of gasoline station pumps is a responsibility of MDA's Food Division and helps assure the integrity of the state's weights and measures, labeling and advertising laws.

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

"How do you think that makes us feel? If fire trucks have trouble getting down Napier Road, how long do you think it will take an ambulance to get down the road?"

As testimony to his assertion that the condition of the road is causing excessive auto repair costs, Hull waves a stack of bills he has collected for his own vehicle over the past eight months.

The total, he says, is \$1,339.58. "They're all related directly to the condition of the road," he asserts.

"Broken windows caused by flying stones, busted shocks, blown tires, repairs to shock absorbers and suspension systems.

"Everybody in the park has extraordinary repair bills because of the condition of the road."

As of last Thursday, Hull and his co-workers had collected 139 signatures on petitions calling for a rent strike. He estimates that the figure represents almost 50 percent

of the residents in Old Dutch Farms. "Not everyone's been asked to sign yet," he said, "but of the ones who have been asked to sign there have only been a few who refused. And some of those who refused said they're afraid of being evicted if their names show up on a petition of this sort."

Unless an agreement to pave Napier Road is reached soon, Hull claims he will follow through with his plans for a rent strike regardless of how many people agree to participate.

"If I can only get 40 percent of the people to participate, it will still put a big dent in their (Unipro's) pocket book," he said.

"They (Unipro management) don't have to drive this road. They aren't embarrassed to have friends come to their homes because the road is so bad. They don't have these huge auto repair bills. And they don't have to live in fear that emergency vehicles will not be able to get down the road."

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## Mobile park owner expects fixup soon

If George Majoris is concerned about the possibility of a rent strike in the Old Dutch Farms Mobile Home Park, he doesn't show it.

Why? Because the Unipro Corporation official doesn't think there's going to be one.

"We want to pave that road, we want to get it paved this year and we have every expectation that it will be paved this year," said Majoris.

"If they think a rent strike is going to put any more pressure on us than we already feel, it's a mistake. We're already committed to paving that road."

City and county officials met Tuesday morning with representatives from Cadillac Asphalt, Novi Meadows and Old Dutch Farms in an attempt to arrive at an agreement for paving the portion of Napier Road that services both mobile home parks on the east side of Napier as well as the Cadillac Asphalt property on the west side of the road.

Details of that meeting were not available at press time.

In the meantime, Majoris is somewhat miffed about suggestions that Unipro Corporation was the stumbling block which prevented Napier Road from being paved last fall.

In a February 21 letter to residents of Old Dutch Farms, Unipro Regional Supervisor Gil Opaleski asserted that Old Dutch Farms agreed last fall to participate financially with Novi Meadows to pave Napier from where the pavement currently ends just south of Twelve Mile to the Novi Meadows entryway.

"This agreement was reached in early November 1985 after receiving a written proposal from Cadillac Asphalt Paving Company outlining the cost of the project and payment terms," said Opaleski in the letter to residents.

"Unfortunately, cold weather set in before an agreement could be prepared for an attorney for all three parties to sign. It is still our intention to sign such an agreement in 1986 and we expect that the work optimistically scheduled in the fall of 1985 will instead be completed in 1986."

Majoris also said he believes an agreement has been reached with Champion Homes, owners of the Novi Meadows Mobile Home Park, regarding distribution of costs.

The proposal by Cadillac Asphalt called for Old Dutch Farms and Novi Meadows to advance half the initial construction cost in three equal payments before, during and after completion of construction and to pay the other half of the cost monthly within 2 1/2 years of completion.

Cadillac Asphalt agreed to pave the road "at cost," and the Oakland County Road Commission agreed to approve the paving of a county road in addition to agreeing to repair in 1987 any base failures that might occur. The Road Commission also agreed to contract for placement of an additional two-inch asphalt wearing course over the initial pavement.

Majoris: 'We have every expectation (Napier Road) will be paved this year. If they think a rent strike is going to put any more pressure on us than we already feel, it's a mistake. We're already committed to paving that road.'

Majoris admitted that Unipro was not pleased with the proposal because it called for Unipro and Champion Homes to split the construction cost on a 50-50 basis.

"They (Novi Meadows) have 400 lots and we have 300 lots," said Majoris.

"Why should it be a 50-50 split?"

"Their (Champion) position was that the road would extend the length of our property, while it would only extend just beyond the entrance to their property."

Majoris said he believes the two park owners have now reached tentative agreement on a formula which calls for Unipro to advance three-sevenths and Champion to advance four-sevenths of the cost. In addition, the paving will be extended to the end of the Novi Meadows property.

In the meantime, County Commissioner John Calandro (R-Nowi) is pushing hard to reach an agreement as soon as possible.

"I drove that road after the big rains two weeks ago and it was just awful," said the county commissioner. "As soon as I got home, I called the county road commission and got them to drop several thousand dollars worth of slag on Napier to make it more passable."

"It was as bad as everyone says it is."

## As We See It

### Napier Road part of broader issue

Residents in the Old Dutch Farms Mobile Home Park are up in arms over the condition of Napier Road — the only road into and out of the development between Twelve and Eleven Mile roads.

The road, they claim, is a hazard to life and limb. One resident, Doug Hull, is threatening to organize a rent strike in hopes of forcing the Unipro Corporation, owners of Old Dutch Farms, to come to an agreement with Cadillac Asphalt Paving and the Novi Meadows Mobile Home Park to pave the road.

Hull and the Old Dutch Farms residents have very legitimate complaints about the condition of the road. Novi Fire Chief Arthur Lemaghan reported recently that five trucks responding to a fire in Old Dutch Farms could travel no more than five miles per hour because of the condition of the road. How fast could an ambulance travel down the road?

Additionally, Hull maintains he has had to pay bills in excess of \$1,300 as a result of damage to his automobile created by the condition of the road. Everyone in Old Dutch Farms and Novi Meadows is also faced with excessive auto repair bills, he says.

On the one hand, we confess to a certain lack of sympathy for the corporations which developed the two mobile home parks on Napier Road. Old Dutch Farms was developed, for example, despite the city's objections to permitting a mobile home park to be built at that location. Among the city's objections was that Napier Road in its unpaved state was not suitable to handle the traffic generated by the park. The developers subsequently obtained a court order which permitted the park to be built.

Although Unipro officials state that having to pave the road puts them at a competitive price disadvantage with other mobile home parks in the area, we would suggest that the cost of paving the road was more than offset by the lower cost of purchasing property along an unpaved road.

Despite our lack of sympathy for the mobile home park owners, there's another, broader, issue at hand in the Napier Road controversy... an issue that has received considerable attention in this newspaper over the past several years.

The issue is that Napier Road is a "county road." It is under the jurisdiction of the Oakland County

Road Commission which is responsible for its maintenance.

When the issue is examined in light of the county road aspect, it is possible to summon up a degree of sympathy for the mobile home park owners. It is the county's responsibility for making sure Napier Road is maintained in a suitable condition. And, if some 700 mobile homes create a need for a paved road, then it is the county's responsibility for paving the road.

The mobile home park owners are not responsible for paving Napier. And that they appear willing to do so should be considered a significant gesture by the mobile home park residents.

The greater issue is, however, that the county road commission is not in a position to finance the paving of Napier Road. In fact, it is well known that the road commission is not in a position to finance numerous road improvement projects that are needed desperately across Oakland County.

When the need for improvements to Haggerty Road in Novi or Twelve Mile in Farmington Hills is considered, the need for paving Napier Road pales considerably. When the county cannot afford to improve Haggerty Road and Twelve Mile which handle thousands upon thousands of vehicles every day, it is ludicrous to suggest the county should come up with the funding to improve Napier Road which basically serves perhaps 1,000 residents in two mobile home parks.

County road officials in conjunction with a task force of city engineers which includes Novi's Edward Kriewall have been working for months to develop alternative financing methods for funding road improvement projects. Suggestions so far include a vehicle fuel tax, an automotive sales tax and a countywide property tax.

The need for additional financing for road improvements should be obvious to just about everyone who lives or drives in Oakland County. If anyone has any sympathy for the plight of Old Dutch Farms and Novi Meadows residents, they should be aware that it's a situation repeated time and time again throughout the county.

An official proposal for funding road improvements has not yet been set forth. But when it is presented, all residents must examine it carefully. The need for upgrading the road system is of high importance.

## Double exposure

We were slightly embarrassed when we looked inside the February 26 edition of The News and realized we had run two pictures of City Clerk Geraldine Stipp.

In what has been dubbed "The Gerri Stipp Edition," Novi's city clerk was shown singing a hymn with her two daughters during the 40th anniversary service at the First Baptist Church of Novi on Page 3A. And two pages later she was pictured again for donating a Saturday morning to help a local student qualify for his Eagle Scout Award by registering voters at city hall.

Stipp is back in The News again this week. This time she received coverage because she is

urging local residents to show up for the semi-annual Community Blood Drive at the Church of the Holy Family tomorrow (Thursday) from 1-7 p.m. Stipp has served as coordinator of the blood drive for the past several years.

With more than 20,000 citizens in Novi, you would think we could take pictures of someone besides Gerri Stipp. At the same time, the fact that we did run two pictures of her in the same edition is testimony to the depth of her involvement in the city.

We'll try not to give her quite as much exposure in the future, but the level of her community involvement is indeed something to be commended.

## We're showing our new style

Observant readers of The Novi News and Northville Record may be noticing some subtle changes in the way we write our stories, columns and editorials.

It's a matter of style, and style that brings uniformity to our newspapers is necessary to working journalists trying to put out the best possible product.

Several weeks ago the Slinger/Livingston Publications, of which The News and Record are a part, adopted the Associated Press Stylebook along with an addendum of specifics for our newspapers. The decision to adopt the AP Stylebook was made after a three-person study committee was formed to make a recommendation. It had been apparent for some time that the papers' own stylebook, adopted years ago, was not being followed and was not compatible with Associated Press or United Press International stylebooks.

The committee opted for the AP stylebook after going over it page by page (nearly 300 pages) and writing an addendum to cover entries we didn't like for our newspapers.

In one area the committee made a major departure from the AP. It was agreed that we will strive to use generic, non-sexist terms as much as possible. This means we will be using words like chairperson, council member, spokesperson, police officer, firefighter and supervisor, replacing chairman, chairman, councilman or councilwoman, spokesman or spokeswoman, policeman, fireman and foreman.

Of course, if the word chairman is part of a person's formal title, we won't change it. Northville Town Hall chairman still will be referred to in that way, for example.

The AP stylebook is more than a reference telling reporters and editors what to capitalize and what to abbreviate. It's also a well-designed guide for language usage and factual references. It explains the difference between affect and effect, and instructs on the distinction between differ from and differ with. The stylebook is a quick, accurate reference for reporters who

have to know what words are trademarks, like Styrofoam which must be capitalized when used.

In addition to the use of generic terms, most readers will notice that the newspapers are not using courtesy titles in news stories; however, in social announcements, such as engagements, weddings and births, the formal titles will be used.

Also, in obituaries Mr., Mrs., Miss or Ms. will be used on the second reference, but titles of physicians and clergy will be dropped on the second reference.

A change to abbreviations that affects The News and Record means that we no longer will be spelling out some of the months. When it's a specific date, such as Jan. 25 or Feb. 28, the month will be abbreviated. Similarly, we no longer will be spelling out state names. The stylebook gives specific abbreviations for states when used with names of cities. It now will be Tampa, Fla., and Macon, Ga.

All of us are in the process of learning the new style — readers probably still will see stories that use the former one as it is second nature to longtime reporters here. I keep the stylebook next to my Micro-Comp terminal and refer to it constantly as I edit copy. Hopefully, in a short time the new stylebook will be more familiar to us, and we will be achieving the goal of clearer, more consistent copy.

If there is so much concern among a council members regarding the economic realities of the Town Center, they might well start to explain why property in that area is assessed at an average of \$35,000 an acre while the true market value of the property has been for many years in the range of \$10,000 per acre.

There are two standards for property taxation in this city. All homeowners and condo owners have their property assessed to within two percent of fair market value and have had for the last 10 years or more. If the properties in the Town Center has been assessed on the same basis as subdivision homes have been assessed, the free economic

forces normally in play would have forced a clean-up of the area and have provided a much better climate for development.

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**Milford woman realizes  
dream of stitching shop**

By SUSAN KAUPPILA

Boredom. After 12 years of staying at home as a mother and homemaker, it was boredom that led Becky Halloran to open the Stitching Bee shop on Milford's Main Street.

Her husband was at work and her two youngsters were at school. She wanted something to do. And since she had a talent for counted cross-stitch, Halloran dreamed of having her own shop where she could sell all the items involved with the craft. When the family lived in Hudson, Ohio, a small, "old-fashioned" town in the northeast part of that state, Halloran became friends with a woman who owned a stitchery shop there. The Hallorans also lived in an old house and spent several years decorating it.

"But since we were from Minnesota, we missed living near water. When my husband suggested moving to Milford where water was abundant, we agreed that if I had to leave Hudson then I could have my shop in Milford."

"I read about a small shop for sale in the Green Sheet so I bought it. The owner had been open only two months when her husband was transferred," Halloran explained.

At that time the shop entry was at the ground level of the Cobb Agency off the west municipal parking lot. Because the shop contained only 300 feet of floor space, Halloran soon moved to the south end of the central business district between Little Caesar's and Huron Valley Furniture.

Today her 1,800-square-foot shop is overflowing

with materials, and shoppers come from as far away as Royal Oak, Bloomfield Hills and Novi. Shirley Wendyker also works full-time for Halloran in the busy shop.

"I love old towns, and I love what I am doing," said the amiable shop owner. While she admits to being afraid to open a shop initially, Halloran said her husband Pat and two offspring, ages 15 and 9, have been very supportive from the beginning.

Counted cross-stitch, she noted, is an old-fashioned 18th century craft. "It looks like a painting when completed and is very relaxing to do." Shoppers will find over 500 cross-stitch book titles and a wide selection of cross-stitch fabrics from Aida to linen and DMC floss.

In addition, completed framed models of cross-stitch line the walls, offering ideas and suggestions to shoppers.

"We get them (shoppers) from start to finish. They see a model, then buy the book, fabric and floss. When it is completed, they come back to have it matted and framed," Halloran related.

If customers want to make a keepsake of something special, such as their home, dog, cat or children, they can take a good photograph of it to Halloran. She will send the photo to a company which runs it through a computer and charts it for cross-stitch.

While cross-stitch supplies and custom-framing done by Lisa Heltsch are a big part of her business, Halloran also offers a complete line of stenciling supplies, needlepoint yarn, ribbon, quilting supplies

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

## Two Ways to FLORIDA

### Mai Tai Inn? Joe-Bob here, it's on my tab

First there was Alexis de Tocqueville. Then there was Jack Kerouac. And now, Leadfoot Martin, the ramblingstagger guy ever to cross the Maumee.

What's so special about one more person's Florida trip? Simple. Due to numerous circumventions, this literary was the first time I had ever escaped winter. That's right - I hold the state record for consecutive uninterrupted winters suffered. The observations I am qualified to make, therefore, are as scientifically significant as those of an aged Eskimo at his first haul.

The plan for my escape was the antithesis of the travel agent's windfall undertaken by my boss (her story is down there in the Gulf of Mexico). The recipe read like this: drive east to I-75 and turn right. Stay on the highway, stirring occasionally, gradually increasing the heat until brown.

"Packing? We're talking fundamentals. Personal hygiene items, shorts and a thin piece of plastic that could save me hundreds of dollars if the company whose logo appears on it really thinks my name is Earl-Bob Twitty from Macho Hombre Condominiums, Waco, Texas.

I now recount to you the thrilling experience of driving through Ohio. The snow melted by the time I got to Dayton.

You are now leaving Ohio.

Let's not be unkind to Ohio, much as the Buckeyes have it coming. None of the states really mattered until I got to the Real South, the land of plantations and Juleps.

It was in Knoxville, Tennessee (sounds like a country song, doesn't it?), where I stayed a night mulling over whether to follow my original plan of stopping in New Orleans for Mardi Gras or head directly for the Sunshine State. I clicked on one of the two stations received clearly on my COLOR TV! in my AIR-CONDITIONED ROOM! A news show was running a report from New Orleans showing revelers in fur coats fighting off snow and temperatures in the teens and twenties.

See you next year, New Orleans.

After Tennessee there is Georgia, which is sort of like a warm, flat Wyoming - unimaginably vast, with next to nothing to fill it up.

In fact, the vacant spaces of the southland surprised me a lot. It had been more than 15 years since I'd seen the sunbelt at all. From what the arrogant, braced, liberal, yellow-journalist American media were telling me, I had assumed every square foot had been developed during the great economic purge of the north's population and industry.

Not true at all.

A friend I visited during the trip pointed out, "In the north, everybody's whining about how all the jobs and development are heading south. It's like it hasn't even occurred to them to ask why they shouldn't. The south needs industry as much as the north, but the north is way ahead. Why shouldn't the south catch up?"

They're building, all right. In every major city some construction project is slowing traffic down. But significantly different from the north? With a couple exceptions, the difference is unnoticeable.

One striking thing about southern cities is that they are more colorful. Literally. Here in the north, cities are cement-grey and brown brick. Chicago, Detroit, New York. Any outbreak of color in these cities seems to get crushed like a slow mosquito.

In Florida, anyway, buildings look like a paint sample display. If a Michigan community wants to try something that will set it apart from other northern communities, I wouldn't take much more than a layer of bright paint.

En route to the keys, I popped in at my grandparents' place just south of Weeki-Watchee. That's right, the place that does the "exotic beautiful underwater mermaid" shows. Grandpa may be retired, but he's not dumb.

I mention this side-trip because it forced some off-the-highway driving, about 30 miles worth. On the west edge of Florida, it's possible to see what they mean when they talk about Big Bad Business chewing things up like a starving sumo wrestler. To the right, nonstop high-density housing. To the left, a steady stream of strip shopping centers relieved occasionally by a gas station or Burger King.

If you're headed for the keys, and are tempted to go off the highway for some local Gulfside color, better wait until you make the keys. Except for St. Augustine, highway 1A on the west side of the state is sort of like Telegraph Road in July with occasional palm trees.

The keys were far more pleasant. Sure, there were a lot of hotels with names like mixed drinks in a sleazy disco. This was Florida, not Yukon territory. You're supposed to have fun here.

Yes, I drove into Key West. It was the last key of what seemed like hundreds. What was I supposed to do, turn back after Sugarloaf, the next-to-last?

I was careful to grow enough stubble to out-macho Charles Bronson so some of the locals wouldn't get the wrong idea. To my surprise, the town and island offered a little of everything, a little downtown set apart from a neon-lit strip for tourists looking for action, and a nightlife area almost like a miniature New Orleans.

I stayed in southern Miami a few days, commuting up to Fort Lauderdale for R&R, and I have to admit I was surprised to find the area clean, hospitable and scenic. I want to assure parents whose children are spending some time in Fort Lauderdale this time of year that the temptations of the city are only as depraved as your children. Doesn't that make you feel better?

### Fight winter blues: weekend getaway

If one more prediction of snow brings the reaction that you must get away from the dreags of winter to sunshine somewhere even for a few hours, consider the Florida Keys.

Only along the 150-mile Overseas Highway southwest of Miami that threads together the series of coral islands and bridges from Key Largo to Key West can the sunseeker be almost 100 percent sure of basking in 80-degree-plus temperatures.

It might seem like a frivolous luxury to schedule a long weekend getaway to sunshine, but, if you dread the thought of another overcast day and suspect all too rightly that the first day of spring March 20 may arrive only on the calendar, the price might not seem steep.

On two previous, longer jaunts to Florida, my daughters and I shivered instead of tanned - we strolled the beach near Venice in sweaters and slacks because of "unusually cool" weather and, again, in Fort Myers, it never was warm enough to do a swim-suit.

However, on a stretched weekend that began after work on a Thursday night with a three-hour flight to Miami we warmed our winter-chilled bones for 65 wonderful hours recently.

The idea of a long weekend occurred to us as the perfect recuperation from pneumonia after hearing a tanned, local businessman describe the convenient flights he took to Florida to spend long weekends at his condo. From Detroit metro airport several airlines have direct flights leaving in early evening to Florida cities. We departed at 3:30 p.m. on Republic Airlines and arrived in Miami on a non-stop flight three hours later. In the airport bus taking us to the car rental at the edge of the airport we discovered we weren't alone - several couples were "flying to the sun" for the weekend.

It might seem like a "Yuppie thing" but consider that for three days almost anyone can "live like a millionaire."

In the keys, there's also the fascination of driving for more than a hundred miles with blue sea on either side and watching brown pelicans, great herons wading in shallow waters and egrets who build their nests atop utility poles along the highway. It's almost like taking a cruise - on land.

Most of the keys are small islands covered with brush rather than trees and dotted with villages that began their existence as fishing towns.

For seafood lovers, the dining is a special attraction with fresh seafood offerings ranging from turtle, shrimp, dolphin, grouper and other local fish to the stone crab - a delicacy, found, I'm told, only in the keys. Then there's that justly famous Key Lime Pie to finish a meal.

In towns like Marathon, where we stayed, it's possible to spend the day on a charter boat fishing for everything from dolphin, to tuna, snapper and tarpon. Some local restaurants will cook your catch for you. While charter boats aren't exactly cheap, they're a lot more reasonable than having your own boat docked at one of the many harbors.

For anyone who wants to "settle in" without driving too far, a luxury Sheraton opened last November in lower Key Largo with two swimming pools (family and adults-only), dining overlooking the gulf and landscaped, marked footpaths to explore the area. Rates run up from \$105 a night, but if this is a luxury weekend, that is not high for a top resort.

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

isn't any lower than 32 degrees."

A bucket of warm water is always kept next to the hole in the ice for the divers with wet suits. King also recommends that the oxygen tanks should not remain in the cold weather for too long. That way the air taken in isn't real cold.

"There are quite a few things you can do to keep comfortable," he said.

King and the others then shoveled the snow off the ice in eight rays extending outward from the hole. This is a safety measure in case a diver becomes disoriented and has trouble finding the hole. It also allows more sunlight to penetrate for better visibility.

A minimum of four people are always involved in each dive. For every diver under the water there is another "buddy" with him for safety reasons. And up above the ice there are two more "tenders" holding the rope and making sure everything is going as planned through a series of signals.

Most divers stay under the water about 30 minutes, but rarely longer for safety reasons.

"You want to surface when one-third of your air supply is still left in your tank," King said. "It is cold down there and we don't want to push our limits so we are very observant of time."

"We want a leisurely dive and to have fun. We are not there to take risks."

On Sunday, the dives continued until just after noon and everybody seemed to be having a good time. Gordon Polanski of Allen Park found an old anchor, while Greg Buell of Milford located a television set. Al Utter of Trenton used his underwater camera to take pictures.

"We have been going every weekend since mid-January," King reported. "Next week we'll be at Union Lake, but I think Orchard Lake is the most popular lake in this area for underwater diving."

Over 50 exhibitors will display everything from rare angling books to the most modern rods, reels and lines.

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

Paul Bauman wants to put the City of Novi up in lights.

No, Bauman is not a Hollywood talent scout, looking for a location for a new movie.

Bauman is manager of Reid Lighting, one of several new stores which have opened in Novi's Town Center area during the past year.

Reid Lighting is a subsidiary of Reid Manufacturing and Reid Glass and Plastics, both headquartered in Southfield and both owned by Johanna Cothery.

"About a year ago they wanted to diversify and thought a lighting store would go along well with the other companies," explained Bauman, who has 10 years' experience in residential and commercial lighting despite being only 27 years old.

"We looked at Troy, Rochester and Novi, but finally settled on Novi for a couple of reasons," he continued.

"First, we felt there was a greater need for our type of store in Novi than the other two cities. Plus, it's no secret that Novi is a city on the move."

Reid Lighting finally found a building that met its specifications — the former D&G Heating and Cooling Building at 4343 Grand River, just west of the Novi Road intersection.

"It was exactly what we were looking for," said Bauman. "It was a newer contemporary building, and it was extremely well-built. From the exterior it's an attractive building, and it also had a freestanding warehouse out back for our stocking needs."

Reid Lighting opened its doors in October 1985, and Bauman reports everything is going well.

"We've received an extremely nice reception from the residents and the other business people," he reported. "I was really amazed at how nice people have been to us. Other business people came in when we opened up to say 'hello' and tell us just to give them a call if we needed any help. And the people come from

all over, not just Novi, to say it's nice to have a lighting store in the general area."

While Bauman says he and Reid Lighting have been well-received in the community, it is also true that Bauman has demonstrated a willingness to get involved in and become a part of the community.



"We work hand-in-hand with decorators and builders to make sure the customer receives the best lighting value for his dollar," said Bauman, adding that the same services are provided for commercial lighting.

"We've done condominiums, apartment complexes and shopping centers," he said.

Another important consideration at Reid Lighting is the ability to provide on-going service to its customers. "We carry a complete line of light bulbs, incandescents and fluorescents — everything from high pressure sodiums to multi-vapors," said Bauman. "We do more than sell lighting fixtures here, we make sure we have the stock to meet our customers' on-going needs."

One of the most frequent complaints from business investors is government. Red tape. The maze of bureaucratic regulations and constraints on one's ability to earn a living.

The City of Novi's officials and the city's planning and development staff understand those complaints, complaints which seem to be among the necessary evils of a community interested in high-quality development.

But the City of Novi's desire for high quality doesn't mean meeting those standards has to be complicated and expensive.

The city's planning and development staff has written and designed a free handbook for developers wishing to build or move into Novi.

The handbook is thick, but there's no need to read it entirely. The sections pertinent to your project are easily identified and presented as simply as possible. In addition, the City of Novi employs full-time community development personnel and administrators who can make suggestions and help you find answers to questions about any aspect of locating in the city that may not be clear.

You may be surprised at what you'll find out from them.

"Sometimes I'm afraid a developer will look at our zoning ordinance and see some regulation or something that would prevent him from doing his project the way he envisions it," says Novi City Manager Edward Kriewall. "But those guidelines aren't really hard and fast."

"If there's a project that would be good for our community but doesn't fit every nook and cranny in our ordinance, it doesn't mean we automatically would reject it. Sometimes some of the best ideas that contribute to a city's character are ones that didn't fit preconceived molds. We have a lot of options, a lot of ways to find room for a good project."

The three main bodies controlling development in the city are the Novi Planning Board, the Novi Zoning

Board of Appeals (ZBA) and the voter-elected Novi City Council. City council currently is considering changing the planning board to a planning commission, expanding the board's power and autonomy. The ZBA, appointed by the council, has the right to grant variances from the city zoning ordinance under certain circumstances or hardships.

The planning board has approval/disapproval rights on most site plans involving construction. Some site plan approvals are granted by the city council after council members obtain the planning board's recommendations. The city's guidebook for developers explains which approval process applies to your plans to build.

Philosophically, the planning board and council are committed to supporting high-quality industrial/commercial growth in Novi whenever such growth does not adversely affect residential and environmental well-being.

That commitment is literal as well as figurative — that is, it is stated in black-and-white among the board and council's goals and objectives. If your development is good for the community, chances are pretty good the Novi City Council and Novi Planning Board will be on your side.

Some evidence of that can be seen in this excerpt from Mayor Patricia Karevich's "State of the City" speech to the Chamber of Commerce this year:

"All of our boards and committees have spent countless hours dedicated to helping Novi grow in the best possible way. Through this total effort and a sense of community spirit, we are realizing our goals and developing our community."

"Nineteen eighty-six will be a time for Novi to shine. It will be a year of ground-breakings and ribbon-cuttings. It will be a time for Novi to lead the state in economic growth."

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

## Novi Chamber: Business busy

It was a little more than a decade ago that former Novi City Manager George Athas decided the city's business community needed revitalization.

There had been previous efforts to establish a Chamber of Commerce, but none had survived... and the occasionally rag-tag assortment of businesses clustered primarily around the Grand River/Novi Road intersection lacked organization and cohesion, not to mention a viable voice on issues of importance to the business community in municipal government.

It was Athas who put out a call to form a Novi Chamber of Commerce, and on a bright spring day in 1973 an organizational meeting was held at the Saratoga Trunk restaurant on Grand River.

George Athas and the Saratoga Trunk are no longer around. But the Novi Chamber of Commerce has evolved from those rather humble beginnings to become an important force in the City of Novi.

Today, the Chamber has a membership of 165 and is growing fast. Membership is expected to reach 200 by the end of the year.

"I think it's true that the Chamber is playing an increasingly important role in the City of Novi," said Robert

Piwko, who, in addition to being Superintendent of the Novi Community School District, is also president of the Novi Chamber.

"And one of the primary reasons we've been successful is that we've been able to demonstrate the Chamber will take an active role on

issues of importance and interest to the business community."

While it may be somewhat unusual for the local superintendent of schools also to be president of the chamber of commerce, it is representative of the close interaction and cooperation between Novi's public and private sectors.

For example, it has become almost standard operating procedure for the city council to request that a Chamber representative serve on special city committees, i.e. the Town Center Steering Committee.

"That has been important to the success and growth of the Chamber because it demonstrates that we're considerably more than a group of people who get together to have lunch and hear a speaker once a month," said Piwko.

"The Novi Chamber is not a knife-and-fork chamber. We're actively involved in issues of importance to the business person and the business community.

"We have a voice in the affairs of the city and we use that voice. A new business person moving into town can see that joining the chamber will be a benefit because it gives him a channel into the operations of the city."

Representing business issues in local government is, of course, only one of the ways in which the Chamber attempts to service local businesses.

The Chamber also has a Political Action Committee (PAC) which raises money to support political candidates who have demonstrated support for issues of importance to

businessmen on both the state and national levels.

Another important sub-committee is the Retail Merchants Committee.

"It's important to realize the Chamber represents a broad variety of businesses," said Piwko. "The Chamber must represent manufacturing and service industries as well as retailers and the professional community.

"One of the problems in serving retailers is that many are small operations with only two or three people who can't get away from their stores to attend a noon luncheon meeting.

"One of our members (Tom Marcus of Marcus Glass) suggested forming a Retail Merchants Committee that could schedule meetings to address matters of specific importance to retailers and that retailers could attend more easily."

The Chamber is one of the co-sponsors of the Novi Business/Industrial Exposition Day that will be held at the Novi Hilton this Saturday.

It, too, is another way in which the Chamber attempts to serve the business community.

"Originally, the Business/Industrial Exposition Day was an attempt to showcase many of the outstanding businesses and services provided by the local business community," said Piwko.

"It still serves that purpose, but it has gone beyond that, too.

"I think the Exposition also serves as an opportunity for businesses looking for a new location to see that Novi is a growing, important city which offers the services that will benefit their particular endeavor."

## Marcus Glass and Novi: A love story

Tom Marcus saw it coming years ago... 16 years ago in 1970 to be exact — when he opened Marcus Glass at 25914 Novi Road, just off the Grand River/Novi Road intersection.

What he saw coming was the development boom which has encompassed the city... making it one of the hottest spots for commercial development in Michigan, if not the United States.

The Trammell Crow Company, the world's largest developer of commercial property from Dallas, Texas, has announced plans for a 51-acre commercial development containing some 400,000 square feet of retail space on the northeast quadrant of the Grand River/Novi Road intersection, just a stone's throw from Marcus' own glass company in the southeast quadrant.

"Sure, I saw it coming," says Marcus. "I remember Southfield when it was all farm country and trees before Hudson's built Northland. I saw what has happened to Farmington. And I knew it was just a matter of time before the same thing happened in Novi."

So what does he think about it? How does Marcus view the potential encroachment on his family-operated glass business by the giants of the retail industry.

The answer might surprise you.

"The future of this town is unbelievable," he says, "and I'm a big supporter of Novi. I tell people to come to Novi — I sell the city to other businesses and to people looking for a nice place to live.

"I'm around town promoting the business and the community so much that people wonder how I run the company. My wife is always here and I have good people working for me, so I find plenty of time just to go out and be a promoter."

At the same time, Marcus admits the growth potential is "a little scary."

"If they widen Novi Road, and that's a possibility," he says. "It could take the front right off our store."

One thing's for sure, however, Marcus Glass is benefitting from the construction boom in commercial and residential development.

"I have a 'Help Wanted' in the paper all the time," he says. "I need more and more people to

keep up with the work. We just can't handle it by ourselves anymore."

Marcus Glass specializes in all types of glass applications, including residential, automotive, commercial, interior and exterior.

"If you need a windshield replaced, we'll do it while you wait," he says. "We do a lot of industrial and commercial work and we also do a lot of residential work."

Although Marcus reports that his automotive work has almost quintupled in recent years, the real increase has occurred in

residential work.

"We handle all different types of residential screens and windows," he said. "We've found a lot of demand lately for such things as mirrors and glass table tops.

"Another thing that's really booming is shower doors and tub enclosures. With all the apartments and condominiums going up around here, we're hopping all the time," he adds, noting that he recently leased a 3,000 square foot warehouse just to maintain sufficient stock to meet the demand.

Regardless of what type of national retail chains move into the area, one thing's for sure. They can just about guarantee their commercial success by wandering down the street to Marcus Glass and picking up a few hints on how to treat customers.

And no matter how successful his company becomes, Tom Marcus maintains that he'll adhere strictly to the principles that have helped him survive and flourish over the past 16 years.

"You've got to treat people right," he says succinctly. "That's all there is to it. That's the principle on which we've built our business."

"I tell everyone who works for me that we have only one rule here — 'treat people like you'd like to be treated.' It's the way we treat our customers and it's the way we treat the people who work for us."

"Treating people right" includes having a dedicated staff

and providing customer service.

Marcus Glass is definitely a family-owned and operated business. Walk in almost any day and you'll find Tom, his wife Thelma (who he says is the brains of the operation) and his son, Tom, Jr. Even non-relatives at Marcus Glass seem to become part of the family. Tom Ford, for example, has been working for the company 12 years even though he's only 30.


"I used to watch him play on the high school football team and now he's an important part of the business," says Marcus. "Sometimes I think Tommy worries more about how things are going than I do."
