Firefighters survey what's left of a Salem Township man's 1975 Grand Prix after head-on crash

Northville Township police are investigating a March 12 accident which left a Salem Township man dead when his 1975 Pontiac Grand Prix reportedly crossed the center line of Eight Mile Road east of Llorac and was hit head-on by an unloaded gravel truck. Police say the driver of the Grand Prix was drink-

ing and had a blood alcohol level of .08, legally im-Donald Wittla, 24, was pronounced dead at the scene. The Northville Township volunteer fire department used the "Jaws of Life" to extricate his

body from the car. He was not wearing a seat belt. Clarence Howell, 49, of Lincoln Park, the driver of the truck, suffered only minor injuries. According to police reports, Wittla was driving westbound on Eight Mile Road when his vehicle crossed the center line and was struck by the truck,

which was traveling east on Eight Mile. The impact tore the front end of Wittla's car apart, separated the automobile's windshield from its frame and left debris scattered along Eight Mile Road. The truck reportedly traveled 150-feetagter the collision before it jackknifed.

The Novi Board of Education will have at least one new member in June following th resignation of longtime trustee G bert Henderson Thursday night.

the board in 1968, will be leaving a more than 11-year association with the district effective March 28. // "It's hard to walk out," Henderson

"I joined a group of dreamers in the '60s and '70s," he said, referring to his tenure on the school board as well as his term as mayor (1976-77). "The city and school district have gone beyond those dreams."

Board trustees expressed regret over Henderson's departure. "You're input has been extremely valuable — particularly this year," board president Robert Schram

"To me, he was the soul of the board," said trustee Michael Meyer who was elected with Henderson in 1983. "He's someone I truly admire.

I'm going to miss him." Henderson emphasized his resignation was not prompted by dissatisfaction or conflict with other board members

"I no longer have the enthusiasm or the same level of concern," Henderson said. Having taken an active role in the district's growth during the past two decades, Henderson expressed satisfaction with the out-

come of those earlier efforts. "I'm very pleased with the emphasis on improving the quality of instruction," he noted. "I'm pleased the staff is making an effort lo recognize student achievement in a

broad spectrum of subjects." Henderson said he believes the district's greatest strength is in the instructional program as evidenced by escalating test scores (particulary MEAP) during the past several years.

"I perceive that teachers and administrators have worked hard at genuinely deciding what they want kids to learn," he remarked. "The district has spent a lot of time improving instruction in the classroom."

He also credited school officials with hiring exemplary teachers. "It's easy to go out and hire graduates right out of college," Henderson said. "But we don't. We hire the best quality people regardless of price."



Detective Ralph Fluhart said the suspects range in age from their late teens to early 20s and all but two are Novi residents. At least one of the remaining two suspects is from out-ofstate, Fluhart added.

Fluhart said he doubts that charges will be brought against all 12 individuals. The involvement of some of the individuals was nothing more than knowledge of the existence of the incendiary devices, he reported.

No arrests have yet been made, but Fluhart said he will submit the findings of his investigation to the Oakland County Prosecutor's Office at the end of this week for warrant ecommendations

Millage renewal vote's Monday

Novi voters will head to the polls next Monday (March 24) to decide the fate of the school district's request for a 13-mill, three-year renewal

The millage request, last approved in 1983, represents the majority of the district's 23.5 voted operating mills. Polls will be open from 7 a.m. to 8 p.m. Voters will cast ballots in the

district's three precincts. Precinct One is located at Novi Middle School South, Precinct Two at Orchard Hills Elementary and Precinct Three at Village Oaks Elementary. In addition to Novi Community

Schools' request, some voters in Precincts 1 and 2 also will be asked to approve a half-mill levy for Schoolcraft College.

The Livonia-based community college is seeking an additional half-mill from voters in the college district to provide additional funds for general purposes.

Having lost four millage requests in the 1970s, Schoolcraft officials have taken a very low-key approach to the forthcoming election. Should voters approve the college's halfmill, it would provide Schoolcraft with its first millage increase since 1966 and approximately \$1.7 million in revenue.

School Superintendent Robert Piwko said Schoolcraft's half-mill request is likely to have little impact on the local election as very few Novi

few Novi voters bother to cast ballots when faced with a request from the college. Last June, fewer than 10 voters cast ballots in the Schoolcraft board of trustees race.

The Schoolcraft College district contains only a portion of Novi as well as Northville, Clarenceville, Livonia, Garden City and Plymouth Canton.

Novi school officials are confident voters once again will support the district's request. In 1983, 504 of the 887 Novi voters casting ballots approved the renewal.

While the district's total operating millage is 33.04 mills, 9.5 are county allocated with the remaining 23.5 voter approved. School district officials would not even speculate what would happen should the district's request be turned down by voters in next Monday's election.



Jaycees honor non-tired retiree

managing editor Ernie Aruffo retired in 1982. And that's when he got really busy. The 64-year-old Aruffo liquidated his own company, Aruffo's Custom Floor Coverings in the Northville Plaza Mall on Seven Mile in Northville, and

went to work on behalf of the City of Novi. And he's been going strong ever since. Aruffo was honored for his tireless contributions

to the city when he was named winner of the 1985 Distinguished Service Award (DSA) at the 14th annual Community Appreciation Breakfast sponsored by the Novi Jaycees at the Sheraton Oaks on Satur-

"I had no idea I'd receive the award," said Aruffo from the comfortable living room of his Country

Place home Sunday afternoon. "I was honored just to have been nominated. And when I heard the names and contributions of the other finalists, I knew I was in pretty select com-

"When they announced my name (as DSA winner), my heart was beating very fast and there were tears in my eyes. It was an exciting, remarkable, almost spiritual, experience."

Aruffo said his only regret about receiving the DSA were that he did not have an opportunity to make a few comments which he was piecing together in his mind as he walked toward the "What I wanted to say was: 'What is this mystery

about Novi? What is the secret of Novi's success? "The answer is volunteerism ... the spirit of volunteering to do something that will serve the community. The key to that spirit is the Jaycees who encourage and nurture it. "And I also would have mentioned the hundreds of volunteers who serve on boards and commissions

for both the city and the school district . . . so many people giving of their time and themselves to make this a better place to live, and without any kind of personal gain or financial remuneration.

"I've always been amazed at how opposition is handled in this city," he continued. "When people get upset about something, the city sends out its volunteers to work with the people. They don't fight the opposition. They just go out and sign up new volunteers to help develop solutions to whatever

"I came to the conclusion that reality isn't hard to live with set in? if you expect that it's coming," she adds. Since the publication of her book, Romney says she has experienced "a lot of growth in my life.

"I also have taught my kids to be more self-reliant," she says, particularly her daughters. "Boy, it's tough to grow up when you're a woman," Romney observes. "I thought I was a woman when I was 21

and having babies. "But it's not until you're 40 and older that you're really coming into your own as a woman." Romney said her new project - another book - has forced her to do a lot of research on women. Tentatively titled

"Women in Politics," the book is scheduled to be published sometime this year and features interviews with women such as Michigan Lieutenant Governor Martha Griffiths and former United Nations Ambassador Jeanne Kirkpatrick. "Freud asked the question, 'What do women want?" Romney notes. "I've concluded they want to be loved, pro-

ductive and respected all the days of their lives. "When you say, 'I want to do more, but I don't know what it is,' that's valid,'' she says.

Romney says age should never be a barrier for women seeking change. "There isn't anything wrong with wanting to be viable all of your life," she says. "It is never too late to make a difference.

"Have you given thought to what you're going to do when the kids are grown?" Romney asks her audience. "Vision is necessary to be alive. Without vision you're dead. "It's the saddest thing to say, 'if only ...," she notes.

Romney told her audience the only way women can gain influence is by getting involved. Referring to her role as co-chair of the Headlee campaign

in the 1982 gubernatorial race, Romney says "the only reason they asked me is because my name is Romney and I'm a "They didn't want me to be active," she observes. "But I

told them they needed money. They told me to go raise money. "I raised money - and a lot of it," she says of the \$1 million raised through her efforts. "In fact I raised more than the

other team "At the end of the campaign, I thought I was dead in the water," she notes. "But I found out that once you know how to

raise money, it doesn't matter." Romney says she believes more women will need to plunge into the political arena for their influence to be felt on a state and national level.

"Traditionally, women in this state give 200,000 to 300,000 hours of volunteer time each year," she notes. However, out of 435 members currently sitting in Congress, only 25 are women - and five of those are widows who took over their husband's seats.

Novi police subsequently called in agents from the U.S. Treasury Department's Bureau of Alcohol, Tobacco and Firearms (ATF) to assist with the investigation. Possession and/or detonation of an explosive device is both a state and federal crime. ATF agents working in conjunction with Fluhart and Detective John April were able to analyze the ingre-

dients contained in the pipe bomb that had failed to explode and thus provided the information which led to the alleged solution of the case. "Identification of the ingredients used to make the bombs was definite ly the big break-through in the in-

estigation," said Fluhart. "Once I knew the major ingredient. I was The primary ingredient in the pipe bombs was a substance known as "pyrodex," a specialized product sold primarily through gun stores. "It's a substitute for black powder," explained Fluhart. "It's main advantage over black powder is that it's not as corrosive. It's apparently used

The veteran detective also said the only motive for the two incidents ap-

pears to be "random." "All the information 1 have collected points to the conclusion that the bombs were placed randomly," he said. "The only motive seems to be curiosity or whatever thruis are involved in detonating an explosive device.'

Fluhart also praised information provided by two anonymous individuals over the police department's anonymous Tip Line. "The paper (Novi News) came out Wednesday afternoon and I received one anonymous tip Wednesday night and another Thursday night," he

"In this particular incident the tips were not necessary to solving the crime because I already had a very strong suspect as early as Tuesday night," said Fluhart.



The litigation stems from an incident which took place August 30, 1984. According to police testimony, Sinelli was driving north on Novi Road at 1:25 a.m. with his headlights off and weaving side-to-side within his lane.

He was stopped by Novi police just north of Twelve Mile, where the arresting officer administered several sobriety tests to Sinelli, including reciting the alphabet, standing on one leg, walking toe-to-heel and a breathalvzer.

According to the officer's testimony, Sinelli's inability to perform any of the tests suggested he was intoxicated, and the breathalyzer reading at the time of his being pulled over was .14 - well above the .10 reading indicating intoxication. Sinelli then was taken to Novi Police headquarters where he was this time "blowing" a .13.

past few years, Henderson said he anticipates that some of the biggest challenges still lie ahead. "One of the challenges this district will have to face is not to become

ty 30 years ago, Henderson said he has not been adverse to the changes taking place in Novi. "The commercial and industrial

development has provided services residents would not normally have,' Henderson noted. "When you're on Eight Mile Road in a traffic jam and cursing the office buildings, remember they are the reason you have quality schools."

A resident of Novi since 1966. Henderson has been among the community's most active public servants. He first ran for public office in the 1967 village council race.

"It's the only election I lost," Henderson notes. In 1968, he won his first seat on the school board and was re-elected in 1971 and 1975. His tenure on the board was interrupted in 1976 when he decided to run for mayor of the City of Novi.

In 1982, after a four-year absence from politics. Henderson returned to the board, winning the unexpired term of former trustee Ruth Walden-

He was elected to his current term in 1983. Board president Schram said the district will appoint a replacement for Henderson within the next 30 days and will be looking at canlidates previously interested in a board post.

The resident appointed to Henderson's seat is required by law to seek election to a one-year seat (the remainder of Henderson's term) in the annual school election June 9.

Deadline for Novi residents terested in filing nominating peti-tions for the three board posts is 4 p.m. Monday, April. In addition to he one-year post created by Hender-





IRAs can provide worthwhile tax shelter | Realtors report trends

As April 15 approaches, many taxpayers with available cash and a desire o reduce their tax liability contribute to an individual retirement account. Since IRAs became generally available o every individual with earned income in 1982, they have been popular as a simple way to save for retirement and reduce taxable income each year by as much as \$2,000 without complicated administrative concerns. An IRA is especially attractive as a tax device because one can be set up as late as April 15, 1986, to reduce your taxes for

Employees can avoid tax on part of their earned income by designating it to be contributed to the plan. Like an IRA, tax will be paid only when the contribution is eventually distributed. Employers often make matching contributions. The proposal before Congress would, first of all, limit an employee's annual contribution to a 401(k) plan to \$7,000 (a level few taxpayers reach at present).

Second, and more significantly, the \$2,000 annual IRA contribution limit would be reduced dollar-for-dollar by the employee's 401(k) contributions for the year. An employee who had \$2,000 employee could still make an IRA conhave to withdraw some or all of it (with April 15 to avoid a penalty if a 401(k) contribution was made.) The employee would still be entitled to contribute up to \$250 to an IRA for a non-working

A third proposed change would allow a spouse with no more than \$250 of earned income to be treated as a nonworking spouse for purposes of the \$250 spousal IRA contribution.

These proposals, in their current form, would be effective for 1986. There is a likelihood, however, that if and when these changes are finally enacted. they will be effective in 1987. While the possibility exists that legislation could affect your IRA contribution for 1986 if you also defer income in a 401(k) plan, you would be able to avoid any penalty by withdrawing your IRA contribution in early 1987. To be cautious, you may want to avoid putting your 1986 IRA contribution in an investment in which early withdrawal would be costly.

Other fresh herbs such as basil and tarragon are best used in vinegar or oil, she adds. "If you're going to put them in vinegar, you stick a sprig in a bottle, pour your chosen vinegar over it and store it someplace cool and dark for at least a month.

"Check it by tasting to make sure it is what you want. If it's too strong, dilute it by adding more vineger," she notes. "If it's not strong enough, start a new bottle with new herbs but pour the same vinegar over the top. Let it sit for a couple weeks." When using herbs in oils. Qualman recommends olive oil into the jar and seal. It should be kept in a

Do you know signs of heart attack?

Do you know the difference between the symptoms of a heart attack and the symptoms of nervous tension, muscle strain or indigestion? The difference is critical because every second counts in recognizing a heart attack and seeking im-

mediate medical attention: Andrew Hauser, M.D., president of the American Heart Association of Michigan (AHA/MI) states,

"These are the symptoms of a heart attack: 🗆 You experience uncomfortable pressure, fullness, squeezing or pain in the center of your chest, lasting two minutes or more; The pain may spread to the shoulders, neck or

Ýou may also experience dizziness, fainting, sweating, nausea or shortness of breath."

Not all these signals are present in every case. "If you feel you could be having a heart attack, don't

wait to get help," Hauser said. "Some heart attack victims would rather die than admit they're having a heart attack. They often hesitate, not wanting to admit that they're ill, or they decide that the symptoms don't mean anything."

If you or someone you're with is having symptoms, get immediate medical attention. "In fact, many people will deny they're having heart attack symptoms," he said. "Many people who suffer a heart attack will die before they reach the hospital because they wait to get help. That's 350,000 Americans a year or 14,000 in Michigan alone." Hauser pointed out one way to insure quick action is to have an emergency plan and tell your family and friends so they will know what to do. Find out which hospitals in your area offer 24 hour emergency cardiac care, and keep a list of emergency


"Not all pains in the center of your chest are related to a heart attack," Hauser said. "If the pains are sharp, shooting and last only a few seconds, then they are usually not related to a heart attack. If the pain comes with exercise or moments of excitement and goes away when they are over, then it is not a heart attack. It could, however, require medical attention. If the pain increases when you move your arms or legs, it is most likely the result of muscle strain.

The pain is also not heart attack-related if it is associated with tenderness or a sore area near the surface of your skin that's aggravated by touch.




The other Novi player to make honorable mention was junior forward Matt Kamish. He popped in 10 points a clip, but has been sidelined off and on all season with various nagging injuries.




"There is no doubt in my mind that Shankel was our most improved player," Cicchelli said.

become a source of stress. "You have to remember, there are parts of you that will always need work," she said, and that doesn't have to be a negative thing; part of the challenge of life is having

something to work towards. Yanofsky says she often asks her patients to keep a journal for a week or two, writing down all the events in their day, beginning with waking up

and getting dressed. She instructs them to mark a plus sign by the positive things, a minus sign by the negatives, and a circle by the neutrals. In that way, she says, they can begin to get a feel for how stressful their life is, and consequently, where they need to make changes.

In addition to understanding the psychological reasons for your stress, there are some purely physical techniques you can employ

to become more relaxed. Progressive muscle relaxation: Thumudo explains that this is a method in which you "become aware of how you tighten muscles in your body. You study your body and notice what hurts when you get uptight. The goal is to teach the brain to recognize when the muscles are feeling tight. With practice you can learn to recognize when you're building up to that state."

Eventually, she says, relaxation can become an automatic response. She will be conducting a workshop on this technique at the Womenfest


at Brighton High School April 12. Breathing: Take long, deep breaths when you realize you're becoming tense. This will slow the heart rate down and relax the muscles.

Exercise: Yanofsky says, "Health-wise, it's a positive thing. It also causes chemical changes which can be mood altering."


Also recommended are: eating a healthy diet, and avoiding certain foods and beverages if they contribute to your stress, such as salt, sugar, alcohol and caffeine; listening to tapes and records on relaxation; taking a bath; listening to music; learning meditation or yoga. The only thing not to do, they say, is nothing.

"The important thing is, make a point to sit down and get in touch with yourself," Thumudo says. "Find a (technique) that fits you the best.

 Importance of warm-up stretching for safe exercise, but there seems to be little consensus on the amount of limbering up that is required before a burst of physical activity. There is little doubt that carefully stretching the arm, leg, abdomen and back muscles prepares the body for physical exertion. Describing the U.S. Army Total Fitness Program, Lieutenant Colonel Robert E. Hales, M.D., likened the stretching to a "body yawn" to loosen up, soothe and relax the body. He said the safest stretching method is a passive, relaxed, gradual stretch that is held for only a 	buring exercise, muscle cells pro- duce lactic acid as part of a process that brings the increased supply of fuel and oxygen that the body needs. Initially acting as a muscle stimulant, lactic acid will eventually cause muscle soreness if the body goes abruptly from vigorous activity to complete inactivity. Feeling fatigued is the body's signal that this acid build-up has oc- curred. The third phase of exercise allows circulation to again stabilize. An additional exercise precaution is recognition of individual physical limitations. Every healthy person can stretch regardless of physical condition or athletic skills. However, as joints tighten up with age, Kava warned of the increased	It is better to understretch than overstretch, according to Bob Anderson, author of "Stretching." "Always be at a point where you can stretch further, and never at a point where you have gone as far as you can go," he suggests. Instead of stretching to warm up, many people do a stretching routine as a daily exercise in itself. Many stretches help relieve muscular ten- sion and tightness caused by every- day stress and strain. As stretching a muscle does not strengthen it, Kava said these routines may increase mobility but not strength. A combination of stret- ching and strengthening exercises is a more common routine, but the	sugar substitutes, or sugar itself, for that matter. As with anything, it's a question of not going to extremes. "I don't see risks at all In consum- ing sugar or substitutes as long as it is done in moderation," she said. 




