Woman injured in racial attack

Two white males, driving a pickup truck and hurling racial epithets, seriously injured a Novi woman outside the Mobil gas station on Grand River at Novi Road early Sunday, Jan. 31.

The injured woman was grabbed by the hair by the driver of the pickup truck, dragged approximately 25 feet and then dropped while the rear wheels of the truck drove over the lower torso of her body, according to police reports.

The incident occurred at approximately 2:05 a.m. when the 33-yearold woman and a male friend, who was black, stopped at the Mobil station to get gas for her car.

The male friend told police the woman went inside the station to

pre-pay for the gasoline. She then exited the station and stood on the driver's side of the car while he was putting the gas in the tank on the opposite side of the car.

While he was filling the gas tank, a "brown or possibly dark red" pickup truck occupied by two white males in their late 20s pulled into the station via the north driveway, the man reported.

The pickup pulled up next to the woman, and the driver stuck his head out the window and yelled, "Get back in the car, nigger."

The driver then reached out the window, grabbed the woman by the hair and started driving away slowly with the woman, still held by the hair, attempting to run alongside

Mayor of the mall

New manager patrols Twelve Oaks

Philip J. Morosco is sometimes called the "Mayor of Twelve Oaks

New Twelve Oaks manager Philip J. Morosco

As clusters of customers bustled along the Novi mall's well-lit corridors, Morosco stood on the sidelines, observing behind-thescene activities most of the shoppers didn't notice.

His watchful eyes noted that security personnel were on hand for emergencies, the decorative potted trees and plants looked healthy and well-pruned, the floors were shiny clean and the merchants were busy within their stores.

At the same time, his ears listened to the mall sounds, making sure the volume of Muzak was just right. He mentally took note of the temperature within the shopping center and glanced out a large picture window to see if exterior traffic was moving smoothly. He wanted to make sure customers were enjoy-

ing their shopping excursion.
While roaming the mall, Morosco often makes dozens of observations, some of them unconsciously or automatically, as he constantly evaluates and reviews the center's operation. He notices which stores are visited frequently and which services are used most often.

And if there are complaints or suggestions on how to make the shopping center better, he listens to them and takes the input seriously.

Morosco assumed duties as general manager of the Novi mall in November 1987, after managing Briarwood Mall in Ann Arbor for seven years. Twelve Oaks Mall has about 30 percent more square footage than Briarwood Mall does, but the size difference doesn't seem to matter much to Morosco, who began his new job in Novi at the height of the retail industry's busiest season.

As general manager of the mall, he is responsible for maintaining the 178-store shopping center, a job

that has many facets. "Sometimes we've been introduced as mayors," Morosco said with a smile, referring to general managers of other malls. "We're responsible for heating and cooling the building, maintaining our own security staff, maintaining the property, collecting the rent - I suppose there are some similarities

between us and actual mayors." Likewise, Morosco keeps himself in regular contact with Novi city and planning officals, as well as

· other community dignitaries so he always knows what's going on. As an example, he sits on the Central Novi Traffic Planning Committee to give input on traffic flow within the community.
"My predecessor (Bill Clogg)

worked very hard to alleviate traffic congestion in the mall area, a task I am ontinuing to work with." Morosco said. "I'm working with developers and the city to make it easier for surrounding residents and for visiting customers to adjust to the traffic flow."

Community input and feedback help Morosco identify needs and demands. Recently, a need for more parking areas prompted the mall management staff to add 750

more parking spaces to the lot.
"We saw the need and we reacted to it." he said.

Morosco and his staff also coordinate marketing and promotional activities for the shopping center. They are in close contact with mall tenants and with officials at Taubman Company, the shopping center's parent corporation. Managers from all of the companyowned malls provide corporate officials with information to assist them in decision making, Morosco

Novi's Twelve Oaks Mall is entering its tenth year of operation and because many of the tenants within the center signed 10-year leases, several leases will come up for review throughout 1988. Morosco expects there will be changes within the mall this year as about 10 new stores come into the center. He said some current tenants are planning to move to other locations, while others will remain within the

The lease review process will probably be one of the management staff's biggest challenges this year, and Morosco said they plan to be as sensitive as they can about changes that will take place in the mall. Shoppers who visit the mall are tending to be somewhat more upscale than they were in the past and, as the market changes, the center must change with it, Morosco said.

Since he began his career in the retail business, Morosco said he can assist mall merchants because "he's been there." The people he meets and works with are the most rewarding components of his job,

DNR may require building to slow

Novi and other communities involved in the Super Sewer project have passed one deadline on the long road to increased sewage capacity - barely, and that still may not be enough to keep development going at its current pace in the

All 10 communities involved in the search for a means of increasing regional sewage capacity through the North Valley/Rouge Valley Wastewater Control System (Super Sewer) have signed cost agreements that form the first step in getting the project started.

The cost agreements had to be signed by Feb. 1 for the project to

be eligible for federal grant funds that will pay over half of the \$60 million project's cost. The last community, Livonia, voted to sign the agreement during its Jan. 27 city council meeting.

For well over a year members of the Novi City Council and city administration officials have made finding additional sewage capacity their number one goal.

Without a way to increase the city's current sewage capacity growth could be stopped. That would mean an end to the plans for future residential and industrial growth in the city and an end to the growth of the city's tax base.





misson. Karp defined gross leasable floor area as: "the total floor area designed for tenant occupancy and exclusive use, including basements, mezzanines, upper floors and generally all that area on which tenants pay rent, expressed in square feet and measured from the centerline of joint partitions and from outside wall faces.'

Construction plans for the Karp said the basement area of the complex shouldn't be included when his company has been involved in

development and construction in many cities and has never found basement storage space to be included in space limitations. Commissioner Ernest Aruffo said he was one of the authors of the NCC

ordinance and that it was intended to apply to 10,000 feet above ground. "We hadn't addressed the baselanguage for the NCC." Aruffo said. Commissioner Charles Kureth said the basement will be used for.

"If it's used as office space, we have a problem," he said. Judy Johnson, chairperson of the commission, agreed. "We have a problem with our

definition of gross leasable floor area," she said. Kureth recommended rewording the ordinance to make its inten-

"If this was a residential building, there wouldn't be an issue," Consul tant Brandon Rogers pointed out. Assistant City Attorney Dennis Watson noted the city doesn't have a specific definition of "gross leasable floor area" and advised the commission to check the NCC ordinance to see if it uses that term.

Commissioners agreed to refer the matter to the implementation committee for further consideration . Johnson advised Karp to wait until language within the ordinance is amended or until a definition is written before taking further action.

Day care teacher etires with class

Wee arms reached up to hug her and tiny lips planted loving kisses on her cheeks as students at the little red schoolhouse on Grand River Avenue bid farewell to their teacher and friend.

Ruth Pawlowski, owner and director of Novi's River Road Children's Nursery, retired last week after 17 rears of service there.

Pawlowski opened the nursery in September 1970, the first one of its kind to arrive in Novi. Since then, 765 students have walked through the red schoolhouse doors to be enrolled in

Previous students, friends and relatives stopped by to visit with Pawłowski during an afternoon tea in the basement of the schoolhouse Fri-

Some were young and some were periodically lit up with delight as she recognized grown-ups she had cared for at the nursery when they were children. She greeted everyone fondly, her eyes often misty with tears. One former student, who lives out of state now, sent her a pink rosebud bouquets of spring flowers, balloons

and friendly smiles. A banner saying "Thanks for the memories. Mrs. Pawlowski," hung lives. from the ceiling, another gift from a student, who designed it on a com-

Dozens of snapshots of Pawlowski's students decorated bulletin boards at the schoolhouse, evidence of all the lives Pawlowski touched throughout her career. Those students were the most

rewarding aspect of her job, Pawlowski said. They made every day a new adventure; when asked what she'll miss the most after retirement, without hesitation she said, "The kids."

It's common for Pawlowski's "kids" to drop by for a visit or keep in touch with a phone call, even after their nursery school days are over. 

shortages or water boiler breakdowns. In those instances, the decision to close schools is made when the problems arise. The most unusual school closing occurred a couple of years ago when an ice storm hit the fringes of Northville, Knighton recalled. He said

Band boosters win equipment bus

A spirited green-and-white bus is expected to join the stock of commonplace yellow school buses at the Novi bus garage next September.

But it won't be an average school bus because a group of Novi High School Band Boosters plan to convert it into a band equipment vehicle. As proposed, the seats of the used bus will be removed and replaced by storage compartments for band equipment and uniforms. Students will

Novi Board of Education agreed to donate a used bus to the band boosters at its Jan. 21 meeting. The bus will remain property of the school district

its Jan. 7 meeting, asking the board to donate an out-of-service bus to the group. At that time, several board trustees expressed interest in the idea and asked school administrators to explore the proposal by reviewing the district's present

Superintendent Robert Piwko said the school administration hasn't picked out the specific bus that will go to the boosters, but the commitment to do so has been made.

"As spring approaches and we see which buses we're going to pull out of service, we'll be better able to make the determination about which vehicle will be turned over to the boosters," Piwko

In addition to constructing compartments in the donated bus, the boosters will be responsible for installing a new loading ramp and painting the exterior of the bus. They plan to paint it white with green letters and to include the school band insignia on the outside of the bus.

After construction and painting is complete, the vehicle will be returned to the school district and would be available to the school system for any transportation needs. Preference would be given to the band for its planned trips.

Piwko said the bus will probably be available for use during the beginning of the 1988-89 school year, enabling the boosters to work on converting the

The one-semester, elective course offered at the middle school is part of a several-state program cosponsored by Quest International and Lions Clubs International and called "Skills for Adolescence."

The program uses three components — a structured curriculum, teacher inservice and family participation — to focus on seven areas of need for middle-school-aged students: Understanding the changes of adolescence, building selfconfidence and communication skills, understanding and managing feelings, improving friendships and resisting negative peer pressure, strengthening family relationships. making wise and healthy decisions, and setting goals for living.

"The kids always say it's a fun program because it's so inventive," said Leslie MacDonald, one of three teachers of the class in Novi. "The (activities) are different from what they're used to in a regular class. Every day they're doing something

-A typical class will open with a quote about the lesson for the day, MacDonald said. Then comes discussion, or role playing, group work, reading or writing. Each day, the students get a few minutes at the end to write reflections on the day.

MacDonald and the two other teachers, David Hartman and Claudia Wiseman, use a 500-page manual to lead the class. "It is a really complete, comprehensive program," MacDonald said.

With the winter storm season upon us, it's a good time to think about what you should do if a nasty snowstorm knocks out your electrical service. Detroit Edison offers the following tips to help you deal safely with a winter power outage.

What to do in advance: ☐ Identify what your needs would be if your home were without electricity and heat.

☐ Put together an easily accessible "storm kit" consisting of basic emergency supplies including emergency phone numbers, battery-powered radio, flashlight, extra batteries, fuses, first-aid kit, fire extinguisher, food (including some that would not require cooking) and, if needed, extra medicine and baby supplies. If you have a backup heat source such as a generator, fuel-burning heater, fireplace or wood stove, keep an emergency supply of fuel or wood handy. The fuel should be stored in a dry place and away from the house.

What to do when the power goes out:

☐ Check your fuse box first for tripped circuit breakers or blown fuses. If there are none - and before you call Detroit Edison at the number on our hill — check to see if your neigh problem and already have reported it. ☐ Turn off most light switches and unplug all

Detroit Edison lines. Turn off all main fuses or cir-

cuit breakers. A fuel-burning heater requires an area with proper ventilation to prevent buildup of harmful fumes. A fireplace or wood stove should never be used unattended and needs to be vented through a suitable flue or chimney with the damper fully open. Never use a gas range for heating or charcoal as an indoor heating fuel.

☐ Dress warmly. A hat, in particular, is an effective way to keep warm since most body heat is

Housing demand to boost city's SEV

The total value of residential pro perty in Novi in 1987 was \$282 million. The 11 percent factor increase from the county would have raised that total assessment to \$313 million. The average 18 percent increase the city is making across the board will raise the total assessment by over \$50 million to approximately \$332 million

While many residents may automatically assume that the rise in assessment on their house will mean a like rise in their property taxes, Merrifield said the relationship is not necessarily automatic.

Assessments are one of two factors which determine how much propert tax each individual land owner will pay. The assessment is multiplied by the millage rate established by each individual taxing entity. The school district receives 62 percent of the total property tax dollars collected, the City of Novi receives 23 percent, Oakland County receives 13 percent and the community colleges receive 2

"The assessment process is badlymisunderstood." Merrifield said. "People are so frustrated with paying taxes and they don't understand how it's figured and where it comes

Merrifield explained that while the property owner's assessments may have increased that doesn't necessarily mean that his/her taxes will. In fact, the assessor said, the amount of money it takes to run the city is decided by the city council and administration during budget sessions. The millage is adjusted (within legal parameters) to produce the necessary money to run the city.

Merrifield said that if assessments did not rise with the influx of people into the city - the millage rate would go up. "The rising assessment rate really keeps the millage from running away," Merrifield explained. "In a community like Novi where the needs are being magnified by the amount of people the cost to run the city goes up," he said. Without the rising assessments the millage rate would go up to cover the costs, he







Rezoning decision needs timely action

in the U.S. Constitution is the right to a quick and speedy trial. Although trying to draw parallels between trials and rezoning hearings is a bit tenuous, a few of the basic principles appear applicable.

What we're referring to is the Government Novi City Council's apparent decision to accede to Providence Hospital's request to delay a final decision on the rezoning of a 90-acre parcel on the southwest corner of the Ten Mile/Taft Road intersection to permit development of a medical

Providence would like to have the property rezoned to a classification which permits such a complex. The Novi Planning Commission, which serves as an advisory body to the city council on rezoning petitions, recommended denial of the request at its Dec. 16 meeting.

The rezoning request has not yet been placed on the council's agenda for final dispensation. The delay in final council action came at the request of Providence Hospital officials who asked that a decision be withheld to give them time to complete their review of the situation.

We should note up front that there is nothing particularly inappropriate about Providence officials' request for a delay or the council's willingness to grant it. It happens all

By the same token, it is no secret that delays have been requested by some developers in the past with hopes that organized opposition among groups of citizens will die down and perhaps even dissipate all together. The planning commission's Dec. 16 public hearing on the Providence rezoning request drew a large crowd of residents who expressed strong opposition to the rezoning of the Ten Mile/Taft Road

There does appear to be a legitimate good-faith effort on the part of Providence officials to locate another site in Novi for the proposed medical facility.

In addition, residents opposed to the Ten Mile/Taft Road site have made it clear that they are opposed only to that particular location and that they believe the Providence facility would be a desirable amenity in the community at another, more appropriate, location.

Nevertheless, we would question the decision to postpone a decision on the Taft Road/Ten Mile site on the grounds that Providence officials need additional time to find a different location.

If city officials do not believe the Taft Road/Ten Mile site is not a good location for a medical facility, then they should reject the rezoning request in a timely manner. Denial of the rezoning might even spur Providence officials to place more importance on pursuing another loca-

If Providence officials announce that they have been unable to find another suitable location, will the council consider the Ten Mile/Taft Road rezoning in a different light? Will the desire to bring an amenity such as the proposed medical facility to Novi have a bearing on the decision to rezone the Ten Mile/Taft



Home Sweet Home:

Down-home good

Nobody can say that the new Novi restaurant "Home Sweet Home" hasn't caught on. Stop by on a Saturday night without reservations and you'll wait for a table — with, chances are, 20 or 30 of your neighbors.

"Home Sweet Home" is located on Nine Mile just east of Novi Road, right where the old White House Manor restaurant stood for years. But don't come to the new place looking for the old place. Things have changed at "Home

As you approach the beautiful Georgian manor that houses the restaurant, the bold black pillars and lighted windows attract your attention. Inside, it's the full-scale stairway that winds to the second floor of dining rooms that takes over the lobby. The current owner, Steve Romanik, has done some serious remodeling and the new look can best be

described by the catch-all word — eclectic. The restaurant has two small dining rooms on the ground floor, each decorated with whatever touches happened to catch the owner's eye. No set style describes the restaurant's theme as wicker chairs nestle comfortably next to solid oak ones, and turtle lamps stand beside busts of

frowning men. A cozy bar is attached to the back of a dining room with two bar tables and not nearly enough room for the patrons waiting for tables in the

Tables are placed all around the top of the staircase on the second floor where more small rooms await diners. Fresh flowers adorn the tables. The dress code is as eclectic as the furniture. On a recent Saturday night it was truly a mixed bag as fur-coated women and men wearing tennis shoes both traveled up the winding staircase to eat from the rather easy-

The food at "Home Sweet Home" is good, and it is priced reasonably. The menu offers a fair sampling of appetizers including a restaurant concoction known as Wiley's Spicy Chicken, a chilled garden platter and half

There is nothing fancy about the menu at "Home Sweet Home" - the offerings are straightforward and so is the cooking. Entrees start at \$6.95 for some "Down-home Specialties" like chicken and dumplings and meatioaf. These specialties include beef stew, baked chicken and a turkey dinner complete with stuffing and mashed potatos.

The "Down-home" servings are ample and the food is prepared simply and well - the platters live up to expectations. The highest priced items on the menu are a New York Strip steak at

\$13.50 and a slab of the "Home Sweet Home" ribs, also at \$13.50. The ribs may be the restaurant's most popular item. They're tender and wellcooked with a heavy smoked barbeque sauce that has found a stable of enthusiastic supporters from around the area. On a recent Saturday night

the management was importing the ribs from Romanik's West Bloomfield eatery just to keep up with the Novi demand. The menu also offers a catch-of-the-day. The pickerel choice was well-

cooked and simply prepared on the restaurant grill. All entrees include potatoes and vegetables as well as the house salad. The restaurant offers a limited selection of moderately priced wines

that complement the straightforward menu and preparation of foods. A meal ends at "Home Sweet Home" with cups of hearty coffee and good, sweet rich desserts. The restaurant offers a familiar staple brownies with ice cream and hot fudge, which is exactly what you expect. Fresh homemade pies and a fruity selection of cobblers round out the

dessert menu. All are well prepared. One of the best parts about visiting the new restaurant has to be the level of service. From the hostesses in the lobby to the waitress at the table the service is grade A. Despite the crowded nature of the weekend night, all were more than courteous and smiled more than circumstances would expect. The table service is prompt and good.

"Home Sweet Home" is located at 43180 Nine Mile Road in Novi. Reservations are accepted for about half the available tables. The restaurant is open Tuesday-Thursday from 5 p.m.-10 p.m. and Friday and Saturday from 5 p.m.-11 p.m. It is open Sundays from 4 p.m. - 9 p.m. Master Card, Visa, American Express and Diners Club are accepted. Good diet is key to good health

The medical profession is finally becoming realistic, at least as far as advice pertaining to special diets is concerned.

Kathleen Underhill, a registered dietician with McAulety Health Center's Nutricare clinic for outpatient nutrition services, said it is unrealistic to tell someone to eliminate red meat or salt totally from a diet.

"When people talk about red meat, they are talking about beef, lamb, pork, veal - anything from a cow or a pig," she said.

But, she noted, Americans are becoming more conscious of the need to cut back on red meat and salt for better health.

"If someone needs to cut back on salt or red meat, and has to do it all at once, we have found that it just isn't realistic and everyone involved the patient, the physician and the dietician - gets frustrated."

ly and learning some techniques to disguise the diet, usually works very

"One of the easiest things to do is to use the red meat, but buy a better quality meat. When you buy prime meat, the fat tends to be marbled throughout, rather than in chunks, making the meat more tender.

"And if the fat is marbled, there tends to be less of it," she said.

Underhill also recommends stir frying as a good way to cut down on the amount of red meat. "But with stir frying, you can also cut down on the amount of oil used and that's important, too."

She suggests using PAM or another vegetable coating, rather than coating the pan or wok with oil, or even using olive oil, which has less cholesterol than even the vegetable

"Stir frying, because you stretch the amount of meat you use by adding the vegetables, is a real good idea, but if you coat your meat and So what Underhill says she tells her vegetables in oil, you aren't cutting patients is that cutting back gradual- down all that much," Underhill said.

She also noted that using Teflon coated pans can help since that also cuts down on the oil.

Another hint that Underbill gives her patients is using only egg whites and milk when breading chicken or fish, and baking, rather than frying chicken or fish.

"Egg whites and bread coat just as well as using the whole egg and bread," she said, "but when adding up the cholesterol, there's a noticeable difference."

And she suggests that when selecting fish, to choose light fish such as light tuna, mackeral or salmon. "Of course, if you are buying canned fish, make sure that it is packed in water, and not in oil."

For fresh fish, Underhill recommends cold water ocean fish as the most healthy.

Cutting down on salt is another problem a lot of patients have, Underhill says, especially cutting down on table salt.

"Salt is a learned taste," Underhill said, noting that babies have no craving for salt.

"It (desire for salt) is something

Americans learn. In other cultures, there isn't the overwhelming need or even a desire for salt. And that's why, when Americans go on a saltfree diet, they really suffer from culture shock," she said.

"The first place people should cut down is in the amount of salt they use in cooking," Underhill said, suggesting that people experiment with other spices in place of salt when they cook.

Then, look at eliminating table salt. Experiment with Mrs. Dash substitutes and from there, gradually cut down further."

She also suggested cutting down on cheese, all cheeses, as a way to cut down on the amount of fat in a diet. "All cheeses are high in fat. In fact. 60 percent of the calories in cheese are directly from fat."

Underhill said that if one wants to keep cheese in one's diet, a good idea is to use a sharp cheese and a smaller amount, or, instead of cuting up

chunks of cheese, to grate it. "Grated cheese goes a lot farther than chunks," she said.



Fitness Tips

Children require healthy diets, too

Everybody is talking about modification of diet and the importance of exercise among adults to prevent heart disease. But what about children? Children don't get heart attacks. So should we worry about their diets? The answer is yes.

Fatty deposits have been seen in the arteries of infants; clogging begins early and gradually worsens over the years. The symptoms of heart disease do not appear until adulthood. The majority of children with high cholesterol have high cholesterol related to their diet.

Heredity plays an important role in coronary heart disease. Children with parents who have high cholesterol are 2.7 times more likely to have high serum cholesterol values as compared to children in the

general population. All children with a family history of hypertension, obesity, diabetes, high cholestrol and gout should be screened for serum cholesterol values. Also children with a family history of sudden death, stroke, heart

(including grandparents) should be everyone in the family except for screened. Screening is also recommended for diabetic, obese and hypertensive children. Screening for the first time should be done after two years of age and then every five

Prevention has to begin early in childhood, not only because the pathological process begins early, but because it is easier to form good health habits early in life. There should be an emphasis on a balanced diet (minimal fat and salt intake) and a regular exercise program which helps to maintain ideal body weight.

A prudent diet that is low in total fat but has adequate calories for growth is recommended for all healthy children over the age of two

The American Heart Association recommends everyone over two years of age obtain 30 percent or less of their total calories per day from fat and cholesterol (not more than 300 mg. per day).

Parents should be good role models. The eating habits of the entire family must be adjusted so that attack or peripheral vascular disease the recommended diet is available to

children under the age of two. The following are some examples

of how you can provide this prudent diet for your family: ☐ Use skim milk instead of whole milk or milk shakes

☐ Trim fat from fatty meats.

remove skin from poultry ☐ Reduce the amount of red meat and increase consumption of fish, chicken and turkey (try using ground turkey instead of ground beef in


