Ask them about the highlycontroversial, hotly-protested movie "The Last Temptation of Christ," and several local clergymen will express varied reactions.

But most of them agree that protests and widespread media attention is fueling public interest in a film that might not otherwise have fared so well at the box-office. It's uncertain if the film -

directed by Martin Scorsese - will

be shown at local movie theaters, and at least one Northville church is aiming to keep it that way.

Pastor Stephen Sparks of the First Baptist Church in Northville said most of the 250-300 members in his congregation have signed petitions and are planning to send them to theaters in Novi, Farmington, Canton and Plymouth, telling theater owners they won't patronize their businesses if the movie is shown there.

Sparks said he hasn't seen the film and has no intention of doing so. However, he and some members

of the congregation have read and reviewed the movie script detailing Jesus' struggle between spirit and flesh.

"It's an untrue depiction of Christ and it hits right at the heart of our faith," Sparks stated in an interview Tuesday afternoon.

"The Christian community has sat back too long ... we've let too much go by. We're not going to go out there and picket, but to ignore the film would cause just as much of a problem," he added.

The Rev. Richard Henderson of the Faith Community United

Presbyterian Church in Novi has a different view about the film. He admitted that he is disturbed by the fact that Fundamentalists are attempting to represent all Christian leaders in protesting the film.

"Basically it comes down to a conflict of two interests - the people's right of expression and their religious beliefs," Henderson said. "It's pretty clear that in this country people have a right to write and create a film, and if people don't like it, they don't have to go see it.

"With this movie, I feel like I'm a mature Christian who can make my own mind. I don't want Jerry Falwell to decide what's fit and not fit for me to see."

Henderson argued that no group has a right to remove the movie from any given viewing area. He pointed out that if he were to see it, he might be offended by its content, but at the same time he said he hoped film distributors have a strong enough belief in the First A mendment to uphold it.

Based on accounts he has read and viewed. Henderson said he interprets most of the controversy to be concentrated on Scorsese's portrayal of Jesus experiencing temptations.

"The problem is that the movie makes it too graphic," he said, referring to those temptations.

"If He (Jesus) was a man, as Orthodox Christians believe He was, He was tempted."

Henderson commented that the gospels portray Jesus' uncertainty about things in some instances, elements also brought out in the movie. But he also acknowledged that the movie isn't based on the

# Judge grants rezoning suit


> An opinion issued by Circuit Court Judge James Thorburn criticized Novi officials for "kneejerk" planning and approved a 7.5acre commercial development on Novi Road south of Nine Mile. Novi officials said the city would

Thorburn ruled in favor of "The Selective Group," which had sued the city in 1987 over the parcel of property. It was zoned industrial, although Selective had sought a zoning change in an effort to construct a convenience store on the site.

Attorneys for both sides wrapped up arguments in early July. Thorburn issued his order July 27. It was filed with the Oakland Couty Clerk's office August 2.

"This case involves the shocking departure from a Master Plan by a municipality," Thorburn wrote in a six-page opinion that was largely critical of the city's handling of the Novi Road strip.

It criticized the city for not following a master plan which was adopted in the late 1960s and ruled that the industrial zoning classification for the area was unconstitutional and confiscatory.

Visitors and employees entering Novi's Delwal Corporation will soon pass by a guardhouse on their way to the sprawling structure on the north side of Grand River A venue.

Novi Planning Commission approved plans for the installation of a 10-foot by 10-foot pre-fabricated unit that matches the company's existing that matches the company's existing facade at its Aug. 3 meeting.

Planning commission approval was required because the aluminum siding facade exceeds the 75 percent maximum allowable in the city's ordinance. Planners voted 7-0 to grant a Section 4 waiver of the ordinance to allow the structure to be built. Commission Chairperson Charles

Kureth and Commissioner Rico Digirolamo were absent. Commissioner Edward Kramer suggested that the building be set back 250 feet from the road and that the color of the guardhouse complement the color of Delwal's facade.

City Planning Consultant Brandon Rogers explained that the structure would not be visible from the road. It was also noted that the guardhouse is expected to match the exterior surface of the Delwal Company building.

## Van pool service offered

Commuters who travel from Novi to downtown Detroit or the New Center area each weekday can save more than \$1,000 annually by participating in a RideShare van pool sponsored by the Southeast Michigan Council of Governments (SEMCOG) Several van pools from Novi to Detroit, including the downtown and New Center areas, are now forming and need additional passengers. Fares for the van pools vary slightly, however, approximate cost per passenger is \$55 per month.

Actual costs are based on a fixed rate plus variables which include round trip miles, gasoline expense and number of passengers.

Nine or more passengers are needed to form a van pool and receive a fully-insured van from MichiVan, a van pooling program sponsored by the Michigan Department of Transportation.



Novi officials said this week that they are slightly disappointed and still hoping for a little more out of the Oakland County Road Commission's (OCRC) new proposed budget. That 1988-89 plan contains only one Novi project - restoration of a railway bridge on Grand River.

The OCRC budget, set to go into effect in October of this year, was the subject of a public hearing at the Oakland County Service Center in Pontiac Monday night. The budget will go up for adoption in late September — the last meeting before the start of the October fiscal year. Novi Mayor Matthew Quinn said he

was "disappointed." "I'm not happy with it," Quinn said this week. "It (the bridge project) wasn't really high on any priority lists that we had done."

Quinn said he has had several liscussions with County Commissioner John Calandro (R-Novi) in an effort to lobby for more money.

\$220,000 this year for bridge restoration at the decaying Grand River bridge, which spans the Chesapeake and Ohio railroad. The total project cost, funded through state and federal funds, according to Department of Public Services Director \$1.6 million.

breakthrough in the Ten Mile/Beck Road controversy. Oakland County Road Commission (OCRC) officials have apparently

agreed to place a stoplight at the corner within the next three weeks, speeding up their timetable by at least two months. OCRC officials are promising a

stoplight at the intersection "by Labor Day," according to Novi City Manager Edward Kriewall. The corner, a scene of approximately 20 accidents since January of this year, was slated to receive signalization in October at the

earliest, when the new OCRC budget is scheduled to begin. But three serious accidents in the last several weeks spurred city officials to lobby the road commission to move that date up substantially. Road commission officials also have installed warning signs at the intersection until the light can be installed.

Kriewall called the compromise a "minor miracle." "I think it worked out very well," Kriewall said this week. "Once everybody realized that it was turning into a very dangerous situation ... they were able to act on it." Kriewall said the major stumbling block for the signalization project


Novi officials are reporting a corner strung in time. Kriewall said he had assurance that the Ten/Beck problem would now become one of the road commission's top priorities. In the meantime, city and road commission workers have installed warning signs at the dangerous corner. One sign, about 500 feet away from the Ten/Beck intersection, warns of an upcoming stop sign for Beck Road traffic. Another, mounted on the Beck Road stop signs, warns that traffic on Ten Mile does not stop. Police officials have been forwarding all accident reports from the corner to Kriewall. Most seem to indicate that south and northbound Beck Road traffic are stopping, then advancing into the intersection under the incorrect assumption that Ten Mile traffic must also stop.

Police said that has been the cause of the last three accidents at the corner, including a serious accident three weeks ago between a garbage truck and a car. Two persons were hospitalized after that accident. Two other accidents in the last several weeks sheared utility poles at the corner and caused minor injuries

City officials are in a quandry over what exactly makes the intersection so dangerous, since Beck Road in-

tersections at Nine Mile and Eight Mile are laid out almost exactly the same way.

Sign suit dropped: A lawsuit against West Bloomfield Township's sign ordinance has been dropped following adoption of new guidelines for placement of political signs by the township board. The new guidelines permit placement of political signs in any zoning district where signs are allowed in general.

The suit was filed in Oakland County Circuit Court by Larry Friedman, a candidate in the five-person race for township supervisor. Friedman claimed the township's sign ordinance was unconstitutional when applied to political signs. He charged that his political signs in rights-of-way and private property were confiscated while real estate signs placed in similar locations were left standing. Judge James Thorburn ruled that no signs are proper in rights-of-way and

suggested that Friedman meet with township attorneys to solve difference on the interpretation of rules for signs placed on private property.

Garbage collection tax? West Bloomfield residents will be asked to vote in the Nov. 8 election on an advisory question to create a special tax assessment district to pay for garbage collection. Residents currently pay for their own trash and garbage collection. Contracting with a single firm would save residents about \$1 million annually, according to Trustee Dennis Vatsis, who said the proposal has been under study for several years.

Residents who want to retain private trash collection could continue to do so under the proposal without paying the tax. Under the plan, the township would contract with a private contractor to

collect garbage throughout the township on a single day. Currently, private contractors do the work on different days.

Too many false alarms: Farmington Hills officials have toughened the rules on residential and commercial security and firm alarms in an attempt to cut down on the number of false alarms and reduce the expense of police officer time.

which businesses no longer can ignore, according petitive edge in attracting new workers. to a report issued recently by the House Republican Task Force on Child Care.

The "Michigan Employers' Guide to Child Care" is a comprehensive study, documenting the force found. A recent study by the American system, or company contributions to a child care need for quality child care, interpreting tax rules and listing various options available to employers. "We started with the premise that parents are in child care services - including 37 Michigan care program supported by a group of companies paying as much as they can afford and providers are charging as little as they can and still exist, said State Representative Lyn R. Bankes (R-

Livonia) in an introduction to the report. Bankes chaired the committee which also included State Representatives Judith Miller (R-Birmingham) and Susan Grimes Munsell (R-Fowlerville).

"While other individuals have called for increased governmental control in the form of mandatory benefits or government funds to solve the child care problem, the task force focused on the need of working parents for child care and how employers might benefit by recognizing that need and responding to it," wrote Bankes.

"We were concerned with how to encourage employers to respond to this need without placing additional financial burdens on businesses and organizations in Michigan."

Prompted by a U.S. Chamber of Commerce prediction that child care will be among the fastest growing benefits in coming years, the task force prepared the 28-page booklet on employersupported child care. The task force provided statistics showing that

employer-sponsored child care (which includes various options on or off the job site) reduced absenteeism, lowered staff turnover, enhanced an up-to-date listing of existing child care care arrangements.

# Tips given to prevent dog bites

readers, newspaper carriers and mail persons, can be prevented if dog owners follow some helpful hints from Consumers Power Company. Edgar L. If a customer's dog attacks an employee, the customer is responsible for the damages and legally liable, according to Doss. He said reimbursement to the company for the full cost of damages suffered by

an injured employee is expected. La In addition, an injured employee may sue a dog owner for damages.

# Radio pen pals Novi club attracts amateurs

"They work with the police, the Red Cross and other emergency care agencies. They provide an opportunity for international communication. and they exist right here in Novi.

They are the members of the Novi Amateur Radio Club which meets the first Tuesday of every month, except July and August, in the Novi Civic Center The club was started officially just a short time ago, but members of the fledgling organization have been

## about notification process Are Novi residents receiving proper notification of public hearings?

A handful of residents attending recent Novi Planning Commission meetings have complained that they received insufficient notice of a proposed project for special land use, rezonings or other planning matters. Their complaints didn't fall on deaf ears. Planners discussed the issue and ways of solving the apparent

problem at their Aug. 3 meeting. Planning Clerk Karen Tindale explained that for any proposed special land use, subdivision or woodlands/wetlands permit the planning commission is required to publish notices in the newspaper and to notify residents living within 300 feet of the project at least five days prior to a public hearing.

Therefore, Tindale said she is required to have notices ready by 9 a.m. on Tuesdays for publication in The Novi ct is scheduled for a publi hearing on the following Wednesday, its appearance in the newspaper would allow five day's notice. The same notice can usually be mailed to affected

residents and is normally done so a week prior to a scheduled public hearing. In a memo to the planning commission, Tindale stated

that the planning department's current procedure is to wait until the consultant reviews are favorable for a proiect and to schedule a public hearing for the next available planning commission agenda.

Public hearings dealing with proposed rezonings and zoning ordinance amendments require at least 15 days notification. When rezonings are city-initiated, residents owning property affected by the rezonings must be notified by certified mail. Property owners within 300 feet are sent notices by regular mail service. Tindale pointed out that complaints are rarely received about insufficient notification on these types of hearings.

Commissioner Gary Phillips suggested that the time period for notification of special land use and related public hearings be increased from five days to 10 days.

In the past, residents also have suggested that the notification distance be enlarged from 300 to 500 feet. However, it was noted that additional areas could result in mailing hundreds of additional notices at the city's ex-

In the latest ordinance amendment revisions, additional consideration was given to establishing flexible ide yard setbacks, establishing side yard setbacks based upon housing types such as ranches two-stories or split-levels, allowing architectural rojections into required yard setbacks such as chimneys, bay windows, cornices or roof overhangs and grandfathering approved but unbuilt

# Legal judgments harm city planning

There's no question that cities have a great deal of power over development through the processes of master planning, zoning and site plan reviews.

But it's also true that councils and planning commissions are not the final arbiters of what will and will not **Development** be developed. That distinction belongs to the courts.

That's all well and good. Cities cannot be permitted to act arbitrarily and capriciously. It's the system of checks-and-balances ... the American way.

Hopefully, the courts will rule wisely. Unfortunately, however, there's not always the case.


We refer specifically to judicial findings which were critical to the outcome of two legal judgements against the City of Novi in the past three months.

The first case involves the judgement against the city in a lawsuit against the Novi Pallet Company on Grand River. The city brought suit against the company in an effort to stop Novi Pallet from using its outside storage area as an alleged junk yard. Novi Pallet had a number of restored and partially restored pallets stored outside its building and was cited by Novi enforcement officers over the years for various ordinance violations.

The city won its case in circuit court, but Novi Pallet attorneys prevailed on appeal to the Michigan Court of Appeals. The Court of Appeals found the city's definition of "junkyard" could not be intended to include outdoor storage incidental to manufacturing. The second judicial finding against the city which contains some questionable reasoning is Oakland County Circuit Court Judge James S. Thorburn's finding that The Selective Company can be permitted to construct a convenience shopping center on the east side of Novi Road, opposite its Timber Ridge Estates subdivision.

In ruling against the city, Thorburn makes several references to the Master Plan and General Development Plan Map adopted by the City of Novi in the mid-1960s, saying "variations from the Master Plan have been on a knee-jerk basis and innumerable." Nowhere in Thorburn's opinion is there any mention of the 1980 Master Plan, which was the governing document at the time The Selective Company made application for the convenience shopping center.

Worse yet is Thorburn's finding that: "The convenience shopping proposal is a reasonable use in light of the fact that there are no commercial neighborhood convenience shopping centers on Nine Mile Road, whic runs for six miles through the City of Novi.'

The opinion overlooks the fact that two convenience shopping centers — the Breckenridge Plaza the center proposed by The Selective Company. How many convenience centers does the area need anyway?

Even more alarming is that statement that there are no convenience centers on Nine Mile in Novi. So-

If the movie is shown, people may choose not to see it. If it is not consistent with their religious views, they simply do not have to attend a showing of the film. And if they feel strongly about its content, they are free to express their opposition, within reason. Whatever the choice, they should be offered the options of doing SO.


Last Saturday the three of us went to find the garden. It was early and the August dew hung heavily on the grass. We told ourselves not to hope. But we brought a hoe, just in case.







She began freelancing, first at weddings and then at another studio where she met the woman who would become her partner. Gracon Studio was opened April 1, 1982, and the women worked together until Zimmerman's partner retired two years ago and she became sole proprietor. "You have to have a feel for

photography, an eye for composition," said Zimmerman, who added that the technical skills fall into place with some practice. Her skills, she pointed out, were all acquired on the job from experts and professionals she worked with.

The hard part, she said, was learning to wear "all the hats" in the studio after her partner left.

"Most photographic businesses the Detroit Professional Photographers Association are run by couples. The man is the master artist doing the photography, and the woman is running the office," Zimmerman, a divorcee, pointed out.

Despite occasionally feeling pulled in every direction, Zimmerman feels very fortunate to have a creative and dedicated staff she can depend on. She also credits the professional

"Photographers are a different breed, and are very close-knit if they are not in direct competition with each other," she said.

Because of early yearbook deadlines for both Milford and Lakeland high schools, all seniors must be photographed by Sept. 1, which is before school even begins this fall.


Many students and parents are unhappy with the arrangement, particularly because the portraits taken almost a year before graduation may not resemble the student by the time spring rolls around.

# 'Rebellious teen' theory a myth Weddings

The belief that teen-agers mature and become adults through a process of rebelling against their parents is even older than the clasic film "Rebel Without a Cause."

But most often, the reality more closely resembles the happy family scenes depicted in "Leave it to Beaver," according to a University of Michigan social scientist.

Martin Gold, professor of psychology and research scientist at the U-M's Research Center for Group Dynamics, said the vast majority of teen-agers get along well with their parents and those who do not are more likely to have trouble forming intimate relationships with their

"In reality, it's not natural for adolescents to be rebellious, and in fact, most are not. They love their parents, and they still think parents are the best source of advice about anything important in their lives. The image of adolescence as an especially troubling time just doesn't turn out to be true," Gold said.

"If there is no close relationship with a parent, the teen-ager may never learn how to have close relationships with others." he adds.

According to traditional "compensatory" theories of adolescence. teen-agers are inherently rebellious. Like James Dean in "Rebel Without a Cause," they compensate for alienation from parents and other

In a survey of 134 adolescent girls at a suburban Detroit high school, Gold and Denise Yanof, a former U-M honors psychology student, found that those who considered their mothers to be appropriate role models were most likely to be highly intimate in their relationships with their peers. Girls who perceived their mothers as "democratic" and affectionate also tended to have the closest relationships with friends. "The closer the teen-age girls said

they were to their mothers, the more likely they were to say they trusted their friends and had warm relations with them." Gold said. "When girls identify with their

mothers, feel that their mothers treat them democratically and feel that their relationships with their mothers are affectionate ones, then the girls have had the opportunity to develop the adequate levels of interpersonal trust and personal autonomy that Erickson asserts are prerequisite to the capacity for intimacy," he added. # Local equestrian team must pay its own way

Everybody knows Northville High School has a football team, baseball team, basketball team, track team and a tennis team. What most people don't know is that the list of high school athletic

a new coach, Kristi Collins, an equestrian for 10 years and a former member of the Northville High School team for two years. She has a sister who is also a team veteran. And her mother, Judy Trexler, is helping her coach the

Collins said she volunteered for the job as a way to help the community. "I just thought it would be a nice

way to help out the school," she said Since the Northville team is

classified as a Class B squad, the team cannot have more then 10 members. There are currently six members on the team, five of whom are returning.

The team competes against riders from many area schools including South Lyon, Hartland and Brighton. The schedule consists of three meets, held on consecutive weeks in the fall. Collins' ultimate goal is to be able to travel to the state meet held at the Ingham County Fair Grounds in Mason, Mich. Although she has high hopes for the team's future. Collins realizes there is room for improvement

The most important prerequisite for joining the team is a basic knowledge of riding skills. Surprisingly, it is not required that a member own a horse suitable for competition. According to Collins, some team members rent or borrow horses for the season


"I think this will be a rebuilding vear for the team." she said.

As coach, Collins' duties will be largely as a coordinator of team activities. She will set up practices which concur with each member's schedule, attend interscholastic sports meetings and organize clinics to teach members more about their horses. "At competitions, I'll just make sure everyone is where they're supposed to be and not running around somewhere," she said.

During qualifying for the 1948 Indy, Hep-burn was tragically killed when he lost control of the car in the northeast turn, and talk of the Novi jinx surfaced. In 1949, the Novi Special grabbed the pole position, but a snapped rear axle ended its run. Driver Duke Nanion also grabbed the 1951 pole at Indy with a run of over 136 mph, but an ignition problem forced the car to retire on lap 151.

It was the same story in 1952. The following year, driver Chet Miller was flirting with the illusive 140-mph barrier in qualifying when he lost control in the southwest turn, hit the barrier head first and died of a broken neck. By this time, rear-drive racers were the wave of the future, and the Novi Special faded away for several years.

It made several encores in the late 50s and early 60s in rear-drive racers at Indy, but never saw the winner's circle either.

Throughout its years at Indy, the Novi name was used to refer to the whole car, not just the engine. An original Novi Special is still around today. 

# Olympic hopeful Muzbeck a 'natural' gymnast

It's not unusual for 12-year-old girls to want to be just like their older sisters. For most girls, however, being like their older sister does not include international gymnastic competitions and hours of exhaustive training But Susie Muzbeck is different

Muzbeck, a Novi resident who will be attending Walled Lake Junior High next year, recently won two titles at the American Athletic Union's National Junior Elite Championships in Casper, Wyoming. A member of the Jaguar Tumbling Team, she placed first in the minitrampoline and power tumbling events and is the only athlete ever to win both competitions in the same cham-

She has traveled all over the United States, entering gymnastics championships in California, Texas and Hawaii. All of this - in the interest of sibling imitation? "I always wanted to be like my sister, but I do it because I like gymnastics, too," Susie said.

Susie's sister, Barry Muzbeck, is a talented gymnast who has competed in the Pam American games and is currently attending Ohio State University on a full athletic scholarship. At 13 Barry was the artistic gymnastic champion of the United States.

Because of her sister's involvement with gymnastics, Susie has been interested in the sport all her life. The gymnast's mother, Nancy Muzbeck, has memories of a her parents. This problem necessitates a need for what three-week-old Susie being walked down a balancebeam by her older sister.

"I've been a gymnast since I was born," Susie said. Like all successful athletes Susie practices several hours every day. Monday through Thursday she works out for four hours - three hours during the school year. Usually twice a weekend, Susie also practices with the Jaguar Tumbling Team in Freeland, Mich.

Because practice leaves little time for anything else, Susie's social life and extracurricular activities must sometimes suffer. Since most adolescents are only supposed to be interested in boys, make-up and braces, it's hard to believe a 12-year-old girl is capable of that level of commitment. Muzbeck does not seem bothered by her exhaustive schedule.

"I don't get home from practice until 10 o'clock and if I have homework I have to do it then. "I usually don't get to bed until 11," she said. But international competition takes total commitment said

and that means Susie must be driven to and from Freeland - a four-hour trip - twice a week, and somebody has to pay her traveling expenses to and from California, Hawaii, etc.

Then there is her schedule. Susie has several coaches and practices at two different gyms every week. Who is going to coordinate a schedule like that? Last but not least, every athlete needs emotional support in the midst of cut-throat competition. All these responsibilities fall into the hands of Nancy and Clayton Muzbeck - Susie's parents.

Although this seems like a tough job for even the most dedicated mom and dad the Muzbecks do not complain - they have been making these sacrifices for at least 10 years and it's a way of life for them now. "I have a 1985 car with 125,000 miles on it . . . but we do

One of the hardest sacrifices to deal with, according to the Muzbecks, is the large amount of money required for Susie to compete on the international level. Since an athlete does not receive funding from the Olympic Committee until they become part of the United States National Team, Muzbeck is totally without financial help. "But to be on the National Team an athlete has to be - known, so even though she won't be competing Susie should go to (The World Gymnastic Championships in) Belgium just to be seen." Nancy Muzbeck said.

The funding for her trip to Belgium must come from Nancy Muzbeck calls "grassroots funding." Although private funding is available, according to Clayton Muzbeck, it's just about like "pulling teeth." "You're almost reduced to begging to get money from

private corporations," he said. Despite their sacrifices, the Muzbecks are supportive without being pushy. According to the Muzbecks, young athletes who are pressured into winning by their parents eventually suffer "burn-out" and never compete on the

The Muzbecks believe Susie must make her own decisions concerning her athletic career. "I do this because I like it . . . my parents never say 'you have to win,' " she said.

The Muzbeck's ultimate goal is to see Susie compete in the Olympics. Platform tumbling was recently recognized by the Olympic Committee as an exhibition sport for the upcoming games in Seoul, South Korea. The event is scheduled to become a competitive sport by 1992.

# Mall draws summertime walkers


Kah said the number of walkers, which usually dips during the summertime months, has been steady due to Michigan's heat wave of 1988.

# New concerns about genital cancers

The 1980s have brought some new concerns for the many men and women who are sexually active. The advent of AIDS, pencillin-resistent strains of gonorrhea and other types of sexually-transmitted diseases have caused many individuals to reexamine their attitudes toward intimate encounters.

Where once a simple shot may have cured a sexually-transmitted disease, the sequelae today can be chronic pain, infertility, extreme disability and death.

One such genital infection which has been on the rise in the 1980s is the venereal or genital wart. The medical name for this condition is condyloma acuminatum and it is caused by the human papillomavirus. It has become the subject of increasing attention because of its increasing frequency, association with abnormal Pap smears, potential relationship to genital cancers and its difficulty to treat.

The human papillomavirus (HPV) is a group of DNA viruses that cause a variety of skin diseases. There are more than 46 different types that can be associated with different disease states

While it is possible to identify the specific sub-group of HPV in a lesion,

The genital HPV is primarily sexually-transmitted. Infected patients usually have a wartlike lesion outside the vagina, near the anus, on the penis or in the vagina. Lesions can also occur on the cervix, in the urethra and rectum, as well as in the mouth and on the vocal cords. They may be asymptomatic except for the presence of the wartlike growth or cause itching, burning, pain, tenderness and discomfort with intercourse.

If they involve the cervix, they may be asymptomatic except for an abnormal Pap smear. The HPV virus has been associated with Class II, III and IV Pap smears, in addition to cancer of the cervix, vagina and vulva (the area outside the vagina). An exact cause and effect relationship between the virus and cancer has not been established.

The presence of venereal warts in pregnancy can cause special problems. They often are more difficult to treat and tend to recur. They are capable of growing large enough to obstruct the vagina necessitating a Cesarean delivery.

In addition, the virus has been reported to be transmitted to the newborn, producing warts on an infant's vocal cords. Vocal cord lesions

presence of the virus.

The incubation period for the virus is not known. On the average, there is a three-month interval from exposure to the development of lesions. This, however, can be much longer in some individuals. Recurrence is also quite common and can be a special problem for immunosuppressed patients, diabetics and pregnant women.

Diagnosis of genital warts is usually performed by clinical examination alone. If a physician is unsure or the lesion fails to respond to therapy, a biopsy may be taken. Flat wart-like lesions can be difficult to see with the naked eye. A dilute vinegar solution and magnification can often help identify these lesions. This is especially true in examining the male partner.

If a Pap smear is abnormal, a physician will usually use a colposcope to examine the cervix. This instrument is similar to a microscope and allows the physician to view the cervix under magnification. A biopsy may then be taken to rule out a premalignant lesion.

As mentioned early, treatment of the HPV infections can be difficult because no specific antiviral therapy is widely available. Topical agents such as podophyllin and tricholoroacetic acid are frequently also have been identified in in- used. These may require several ap-


plications.

Another topical treatment is 5fluorouracil. Cryotherapy (freezing therapy), electrocautery (burning therapy) and laser therapy are also common treatment modalities. Interferon is also being investigated for use in particularly difficult cases to treat. The reoccurence rate of these infections is an especially troublesome problem that often proves frustrating to both the patient and physician.

As with any sexually-transmitted disease, if you are concerned that you may be affected, it is important to be examined. This can frequently be an embarrassing and anxietyproducing situation.

A physician should be sensitive to these feelings. If you are the sexual partner of someone who has been diagnosed as having an HPV infection, it is equally important that you be examined, as there is a relatively high degree of contagiousness. Your physician should be helpful with any additional questions you may have.



Because our district transports a large percentage of our students, the safety of the students while riding the buses is one of our prime concerns.

Aside from the mechanical condition of the bus fleet, the drivers are key factors in transporting students safely to school and home. It is their responsibility to maintain order on the bus, while at the same time watching the road and traffic in every direction and maneuvering the bus through busy rush-hour traffic. This is an impossible task for bus drivers to accomplish alone.

The responsibility for the safe transporting of students must be shared by students, parents, and school personnel.

Therefore, we urge you to share the following with your children:

### School District:

- 1. Operate transportation service in accordance with the laws and regulations of the State of Michigan.
- 2. Employ skilled bus drivers.
- 3. Educate pupils regarding traffic and transportation safety.
- 4. Deny students who willfully disobey bus safety rules the privilege of riding the bus.
- 5. Make periodic surveys of bus equipment, bus routes, and the observance of safety practices by drivers and students.

#### Students:

- 1. Be on time at the bus stop.
- 2. Stay off the roadway.
- 3. Always obey the driver.
- 4. Stay in seat while bus is moving.

- 5. Do not throw objects either on the bus or out the windows.
- 6. Keep hands and head inside bus at all times.
- 7. Keep silent while crossing the railroad.
- 8. Use only the front door of the bus.
- 9. When crossing the road: a) Walk in front of bus and wait for driver's signal to cross; b) Look both ways before crossing; c) Walk - do not run.

#### Parents:

- 1. Keep an eye on the children.
- 2. Support school authorities in demanding proper student conduct at bus stops and while on the bus.
- 3. Review and discuss with your child the importance of safe conduct.

#### Discipline Procedure:

- 1. Unsafe behavior is cause for a driver to issue a "Bus Safety Violation."
- 2. FIRST TICKET: Student's copy must be signed by parent and presented to the driver before child will be allowed to board the bus.
- 3. SECOND TICKET: Parent must arrange a conference with the child's principal and ticket must be signed before child will be allowed to board the bus.
- 4. THIRD TICKET: Parent must arrange a conference with Dr. Barr, Assistant Superintendent, before student will be allowed to ride the bus again.
- 5. FIGHTING ON THE BUS: The "Third Ticket" procedure will automatically be followed before student will be allowed to ride bus again.
- 6. APPEAL PROCESS: Student or parent may appeal to the next highest authority.


By working together, parents, students and school personnel can make every effort to maintain safe bus standards for the continued safety of all children.

## **District Immunization** Guidelines

Exclusion Date: October 1, 1988

The law in Michigan requires that all students be adequately immunized. Records for all entering kindergarten students and students enrolled from outside the district will be assessed. Notice will be sent to parents or guardians if there is no immunization record upon school entry, or if records are incomplete.

Students not in compliance with Michigan immunization requirements will be excluded from school on October 1, 1988 until documentation of immunization is presented. Parents may sign a waiver if they have a religious or other objection to immunizations, or they may provide a statement of objection for medical reasons which has been signed by a physician.

Michigan law requires that all students be immunized against the diseases listed below:

# Novi Project Find



The Novi Project Find is a cooperative effort involving school personnel and the Special Education Parent Advisory Committee. Project Find provides information to parents about early warning signs of possible handicaps in seeing, hearing, walking or talking. Early identification and assistance to children with special needs is especially important to help all children benefit from the quality education program in Novi.

Services to referred preschool children (birth-age 5) also are provided by the Special Services Department. These include speech and language evaluations and social and intellectual assessment.

Other special evaluation services for preschoolers can be arranged through the Special Services Office. Speech and language therapy and parent counseling are provided to eligible preschoolers at their neighborhood schools. Special preschool program placements, when needed, are coordinated through the Special Services Office.

Additional information about the Project, or how to refer a child, can be obtained by calling the Special Services Department at 348-1200.

## Michigan Freedom of Information Act

Under the Michigan Freedom of Information Act, all persons are entitled to have access to public records. The act defines "public records" as any writing prepared, owned, used, in the possession of, or retained by a public body in the performance of an official function from the time it is created.

Requests to inspect, copy, or receive copies of public records may be made orally, or in writing, during business hours Monday through Friday. All requests should be made with sufficient detail to enable the School District to locate the documents.
