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## Town Center expansion meets opposition

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A move to expand — nearly double — the size of Novi's Town Center District ran into opposition from council members and planning commissioners Monday night. That proposal seeks to add five major properties to the 157-acre parcel, which is intended to serve as Novi's "downtown." The Town

Center located at the Grand River/Novi Road intersection, occupying all four quadrants of the intersection and encompassing a wide variety of new and old structures.

The move also would amend the Town Center Ordinance in an effort to encourage more residential development in the Town Center area.

Those proposals were expected to

go up for a public hearing Wednesday night. Results of that hearing were not available by press time Wednesday.

The proposal for expanding the district came out of the Novi Town Center Steering Committee, which held 26 meetings over the course of the last year to work out the details. (See related story)

The Town Center Steering Committee has been overseeing

development of the area since its inception in 1985. The committee is made up of several council and planning commission members, as well as local business representatives.

The proposed expansion basically adds more largely vacant properties to each of the district's four quadrants. It would total 126 new acres — in parcels of 15, 4, 42, 11 and 54 acres.

In those districts — like all Town Center properties — regular zoning controls are relaxed, allowing owners to develop their property along a new set of guidelines, supposedly encouraging development of a pedestrian-accessible downtown area.

Those properties which are proposed to be added currently range from multiple-family residential to light industrial in zoning.

The steering committee is currently trying to encourage more residential uses in the district. So far, in the first phases, office and retail have made up the brunt of the district.

"One of our major goals was to have a mixture of commercial, residential, and retail..." said Council Member Joseph Toth. "I

## Board selects Julie Abrams to fill seat

Julie Abrams has been selected from a field of four candidates to fill a vacancy on the Novi Board of Education created by the resignation of longtime board member Sharon Pelchat.

Saying it was a "difficult decision," school board members selected Abrams following three hours of interviews last Thursday.

Abrams, 44 and a Novi school lunch aid, expressed more "depth and caring than any other candidate" during the 45-minute personal interviews, said Board Vice-president Raymond Byers.

Abrams was the first choice of five of the six board members.

After hearing the other five board members express their opinions, Board President Michael Meyer said he thought candidate Craig Foreback was best qualified. He later changed his vote to Abrams, saying the board should "work

together" on such matters. Foreback, who ran unsuccessfully for a seat on the school board last June, said he had "every intention of seeking election to the board" even if he were not chosen for the appointment.

A secret ballot vote designed to narrow the selection revealed Foreback, director of the chemistry lab at Henry Ford Hospital, was a finalist along with Abrams.

John Streit and Michael O'Connell were the other two candidates personally screened by the board. The four were selected as finalists last week from 10 applicants, who submitted applications and letters of intent.

Streit also ran unsuccessfully for the school board in June.

Ironically, Abrams did not even make Trustees Byers' and Sandra Thornton's narrowed list of applicants, they admitted just prior to voting.

## City lacks funds for road projects

Novi residents may be looking at a special millage election for roads after the defeat of Oakland County's \$25 vehicle registration fee question, according to City Manager Edward Kriewall.

Kriewall said Monday that the city will need to raise a "substantial" amount of money to pay for various road projects, especially the widening of Twelve Mile between Haggerty and Novi roads.

Widening is currently being planned there to anticipate the development of M-9, a large north-south trunkline fashioned after I-275. It is designed to run from Twelve Mile north through Oakland County, relieving intense traffic flows on Haggerty and other local roadways.

Should M-9 show signs of progress at an environmental impact public hearing (tentatively scheduled for December or January), Twelve Mile widening plans will have to be stepped up, Kriewall said.

"It's absolutely essential that it

be done," Kriewall said. "We're watching... we expect it to come to a head in the next three or four months."

"If the state says 'we're ready to roll' on M-9, they'll be looking to us for a plan on local road improvements," he said.

"We feel that the state has some kind of obligation to make some of the local road improvements themselves, and we'll be negotiating for that. But we can't really do much more until we see what they want."

Kriewall said a special election may have to be held in 1989, asking Novi voters to approve a multi-million dollar bond issue for roads — if no other funding mechanisms surface before then.

Twelve Mile widening, at a cost of \$8-\$10 million, was expected to be funded by a state grant, with additional monies — the local share — coming from the City of Novi.

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## Son of Swami sounds off Residents ired by McCabe's remarks

Detroit Free Press sports writer Mick McCabe was called a lot of things around Novi this week, but "Son of Swami" appeared to be relatively low on the list.

The veteran writer immersed himself further into controversy this week by picking the Novi Wildcat football team to lose in the state playoffs for the second straight week in a column laced with perceived nasty comments about the city and Novi football.

"No-way, No-vi," McCabe wrote in Friday, Nov. 11, editions of the Free Press. The Wildcats then defeated Monroe 16-15 the next day at Withington Stadium in Jackson.

Sunday, he appeared on WXYZ-TV's "Sunday Sports Update" predicting that Novi would lose to the second-ranked Traverse City Trojans in a clear and decisive defeat. That game is scheduled for Saturday afternoon in Grand Rapids. The winner advances to the state finals.

McCabe, in a "Swami" column format made famous by the late-Free Press sports writer Hal Schram, also picked Novi to lose to Okemos in the opening round of the state playoffs and South Lyon in the second-to-last regular season game.

The Wildcats beat Okemos 22-14 in overtime and beat South Lyon 21-14 to capture the Kensington Valley

Conference (KVC) title.

McCabe's column is titled "Son of Swami." Novi football players, fans, local officials and residents have been critical of the remarks.

"All I have to say is that McCabe

was wrong about South Lyon, he was wrong about Okemos and now he's wrong about Monroe. It doesn't say much for his predictions," said Todd Gronowski, a senior and a starting lineman on the Novi football team.

"I don't think he knows what he's talking about."

"He (McCabe) upset a lot of people in our area with some of the things he's been saying," said Novi football coach John Osborne. "We've been using his comments as a motivational tool."

Novi parents Thomas and Barbara Daniels — whose son Brian blocked a punt in the Monroe game Saturday — have logged the strongest reaction to date.

"We are very proud of our city and our schools," they wrote in a letter to the Free Press, which was also sent to The Novi News last week. "After 20 years of subscribing to the Detroit Free Press, we feel we no longer need to receive a paper that staffs such an obnoxious sports writer(?)."

Thomas and Barbara Daniels urged other Novi residents to drop their subscriptions as a protest, calling McCabe "unprofessional and totally rude."

The fallout also made it into the Novi City Council chambers Monday night. In a resolution honoring the Novi football team, the council scorched McCabe.

"It doesn't take a Swami to realize that the Novi Wildcats are for real..." the resolution read in part.

The council passed it unanimously and presented it to Novi players in a brief ceremony at the Civic Center Monday night.

## Zip code change for township?

Novi Township area residents have apparently struck a deal with the U.S. Postal officials and may soon be going back to their Northville 48167 Zip Codes.

Township Supervisor Ray Schovers this week said the township received a letter from postal officials giving residents "essentially what we wanted."

Zip Code changes went into effect for much of southern Novi in August of this year. Approximately 30 households north of Nine Mile (and between Eight and Nine Mile east of Meadowbrook Road) were changed over from the Northville 48167 code to Novi's 48050 code.

For those residents, it meant having to file change of address cards with the post office, and changing driver's licenses, credit cards, magazines and stationery. Township officials also have questioned what impact the Novi mailing address might have on local property values.

"They have been pushing to go back to the old code, holding meetings with postal officials over the past several months."

"We've been associated with Northville for many years," Schovers said. "We have Northville schools, Northville Parks and Recreation."

"There are a lot of people who have been here for 30 years — before Novi was a city — and frankly they don't want to change over."

Schovers said the township also has collected data showing that homes retaining a Northville mailing address sell for as much as \$20,000 more than similar homes in the Novi 48050 area.

"There's emotional and there are also economic reasons for wanting to go back," he said.

Novi Township is recognized as an official unit of government in Oakland County. It is actually no larger than a portion of the Brookland Farms subdivision (near Nine Mile and Novi Road), which fought to retain township status when Novi was incorporated as a village, then city, in the 1960s.

Schovers said the Postal Service agreement might also take into account non-township residents, although the details haven't yet been finalized. The township board is expected to meet later this week to consider the agreement. Novi Township

voters may see an advisory question vote early next year on whether or not they want to go back to 48167, Schovers said.

Postal Service Spokesperson Susan Gillespie said they implemented the changes since Northville and Novi letter carriers were duplicating a lot of work and "criss-crossing" while delivering mail in southern Novi.

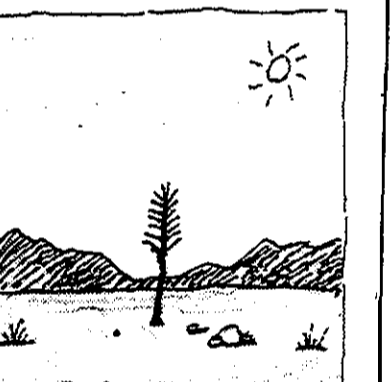
"It all really goes back to all of the growth out in that area," she said.

"With the new growth, that area has been handled by Northville, even though many of the newly developing areas are Novi (48050)."

"When our people went out, many of them were crossing paths," she said.

Residents in those areas which haven't changed over to the Novi 48050 zip are still having their mail delivered, she said, and will continue to get it delivered until August, 1989. Mail is currently collected at the Northville Post Office and sent to the Novi Post Office every morning for delivery in those areas.

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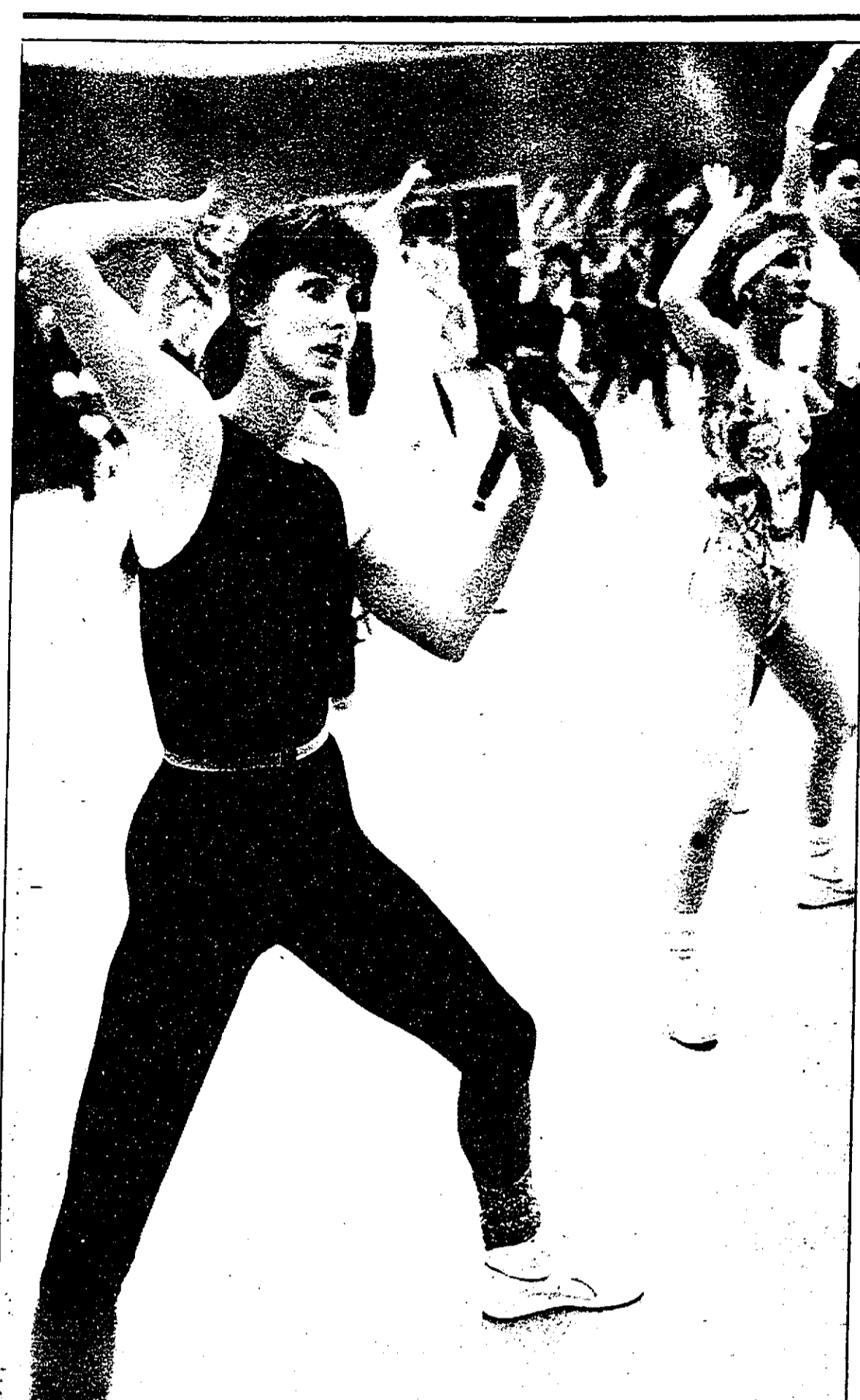

## City seeks 'new blood' for Historical Society

City officials are hoping to liven up the Novi Historical Commission with a set of new appointments later this month.

Novi Mayor Matthew Quinn and Council Member Hugh Crawford, who have both voiced varying degrees of displeasure with the group over the past several months, are currently in the process of seeking out new people for the commission.

"Perhaps there are many men and women out there who aren't doing," Crawford said. "I'd like to see more from them."

Crawford said there has been little progress on new projects and few new ideas from the commission. "I don't know what the problem is... I hope they don't take it as a negative. It's really constructive criticism."

Novi Mayor Matthew Quinn said the commission needs "new blood."

"The eight-member commission is separate from the Novi Historical Society, which is a private group, although many members serve on both panels. The commission is the appointed arm of the Novi City Council, funded with the city dollars. The distinction between the two groups — the Commission and the Society — isn't made clear enough, Crawford

said. Council members have been suggesting that the commission come forward with ideas for enhancing city cemeteries, such as the small city-owned cemetery on Nine Mile. The council has been looking for — and willing to fund — historical markers or plaques for those cemeteries or informational brochures on the history of Novi. Specific proposals have been slow in coming, Crawford said.

"Their September meeting was eight minutes long," Crawford said. "I don't see these things getting done, not in eight minutes."

During budgeting sessions earlier this year, Crawford led a move to get additional funding for the Historical Commission, though the commission took several weeks before putting together what amounted to a list of partial demands for funding. The council later opted to allow the funding and let the Historical Commission set priorities later.

"I think we would like to see them come up with the ideas," Crawford said. "Let them come in here and say we need \$10,000 for this or \$20,000 for that. At least we can take a look at it... we can prioritize the projects."

The Historical Commission Chairman William Gladden said he was satisfied with the progress the commission has made on various projects, such as the old Town Hall restoration. The building's new roof was recently completed.

"The Old Town Hall is progressing along nicely," he said. "That's taken up a lot of our time."

Two spots on the commission become vacant this month with the expiration of the terms of Ruthellen Crawford and Mary McDonald. Gladden said both had considerable time obligations in the upcoming year and wouldn't be able to continue serving.

Both have served the commission well," he said. "I had really anticipated that more people would get involved and help with the projects we're working on."

Gladden also said there was a fundamental difference between the commission and society. "Some people have the impression that the historical commission should be out there digging in the dusty books," he said. "Well just like Parks and Recreation, commissioners shouldn't have to research how to build parks."

Applications for the Historical Commission positions are available at the Novi City Clerk's office (347-0650).

"It's an excellent opportunity to get involved in the community," Quinn said. "It's not a lot of work, and the results of some of your actions can be fairly immediate."

The two-member panel currently has two vacancies, since members Mary McDonald and Ruthellen Crawford decided not to apply for re-appointments.

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# Vandals smash car windows

Only one incident of vandalism was reported in Novi on Devil's Night Oct. 31, but the vandals made up for it on Friday, Nov. 11, by throwing pumpkins at three vehicles parked on the streets in Novi subdivisions and breaking the windshields in the process.

All three incidents occurred between the hours of 9 p.m. and 1:15 a.m. the following day, according to police reports.

Damaged were the windshields on a 1983 Ford pickup parked outside a residence on Jamestown in the Jamestown Green subdivision, a 1980 Honda parked on the street outside a residence on Hickory Grove in the Orchard Ridge subdivision and a Ford pickup truck parked on Greenway, also in the Orchard Ridge subdivision.

Damage to all three vehicles was estimated at a total of \$900.

**THIEVES BROKE** into Primo's Pizzeria at 2430 Meadowbrook Road during the night of Nov. 10-11 and stolen cash and property valued at a total of \$225.

The responsible party apparently gained access by using pieces of cement to smash the glass in the front door. Investigating officers reported that the glass was broken sufficiently to allow a person to walk through the door.

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# It's not too late to declare party

Party preference cards — the little cards voters put at the polls Nov. 8 and probably buried in a pocket or threw away — are currently only trickling in to the Novi city clerk's office, or at voting places through February 1992.

The clerk's office also appears to be in no great rush to accept them, since it will likely be some time before the information can be entered on computerized city election records.

Only about 60 cards were turned in the day of the election and another 20 to 30 have come in by mail since then. Over 15,000 people turned out to vote in the City of Novi two weeks ago.

Voters must declare a political party preference by Feb. 17, 1992, in order to vote in the presidential primary in March, 1992. The preference cards have no effect on August or November voting that year, according to City Clerk Geraldine Slipp.

"It's not mandatory, but if people want to vote in March, they'll have to have the cards in," she said. "A lot of people just won't vote in it. A lot of people think it's none of our business."

The preference system has no effect on the voter's ability to vote in August or November elections, she said.

The presidential primary was put back into effect last year.

It creates a "closed" primary system, which allows voters to actually cast ballots for a preferred candidate. In the last election, Democrats used an open caucus system to pick a presidential

favorite, while Republicans used the confusing and controversial precinct delegate system.

Voters can register by filling out a card at the city clerk's office, providing information to the Michigan Secretary of State during voting registration, address or name updates; or at voting places through February 1992.

Voters can declare Democrat, Republican, or "No Party Preference." Voters declaring no preference will not be allowed to cast a vote March 1992.

Voters filing "no preference" will be required to come forward with a preferred party at least 30 days before the election.

The system has many critics. "The state is doing this rather stupidly," Slipp said. "The cards will continue to come in a little bit at a time over the course of the next year... we'll have a lot of duplicates and we'll never really know if everyone got a chance to get one."

"I would have preferred that we just mail one to every registered voter," she said.

The program has been run through the Secretary of State's office, implementing the law created by legislators last year. The State Department provides the cards and other materials for the preference system.

It will also require Novi to change various computer programs and filing procedures that deal with the election records at a yet unknown cost. City personnel time will also be needed to enter data.

The clerk's office hasn't yet come up with the programming necessary to enter the information.

## Female imposter sought by county

**PONTIAC** — A woman, going door-to-door in Rochester Hills is masquerading as an employee of the North Oakland County Health Division.

The woman describes herself as a representative of a group called "Peers Counseling Peers" and says she is collecting donations for the group.

She also carries counterfeit pamphlets which describe the association.

However, the imposter does not carry an identification badge which is required of all Oakland County Health employees, said Dr. Tom Gordon, manager of the Oakland County Health Division.

The woman is described as a white female in her early 20s, approximately 5'4" tall, with collar-length blond hair. She is slender, has a neat appearance and is said to be articulate.

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## Census Bureau readies for count

An army will soon be mobilizing locally as the U.S. Census Bureau begins the mammoth task of finding every person in the country and then counting them all in a single day — April 1, 1990.

Outposts already have been established — the three-state regional census headquarters opened in Southfield last November and now has a staff of 125 — with plans well under way to hire 11,000 temporary employees statewide.

Three more census offices will open in January at undetermined locations in downtown Detroit, southeast Oakland County and Lansing.

Fourteen more field offices will open in the state next fall, with one expected to be located in western Wayne County near the Oakland County border, according to Dwight Dean, director of the Michigan-Ohio-West Virginia region.

Up to 700 people will be employed in the western Wayne office with most of them earning about \$5.50 per hour, Dean said.

The highest paid of the temporary employees will make about \$14 an hour for managing district offices.

The Census Bureau will begin heavy recruiting for employees next fall through ads, fliers, brochures and local civic groups. Dean said applicants will be tested to see if they can read and do simple math, and they must have transportation.

Applicants must be at least 18 years old or high school seniors. There is no upper age limit.

"We've got people in their 80s now, who are doing field surveys, and they'd run me into the ground," said Dean.

Most of the jobs will last three to six months, although some will last longer. The bureau will need computer data-entry personnel, clerical staff, office supervisors, field supervisors, crew leaders and, in the largest numbers of all, enumerators who will go door to door trying to

reach those residents who do not return surveys by mail.

Dean told a gathering of local municipal officials recently that the census bureau will be seeking their input more than it has in past head counts.

He said in a follow-up interview that local officials will be asked for advice on where to open offices, where to publish hiring notices and which local groups to use to get the word out on hiring. Local officials also will be furnished with pre-census population estimates and post-census preliminary figures to help eliminate some past problems with undercounts.

"You have to be able to rely on local knowledge and leadership," said Dean. "And we're obviously not local."

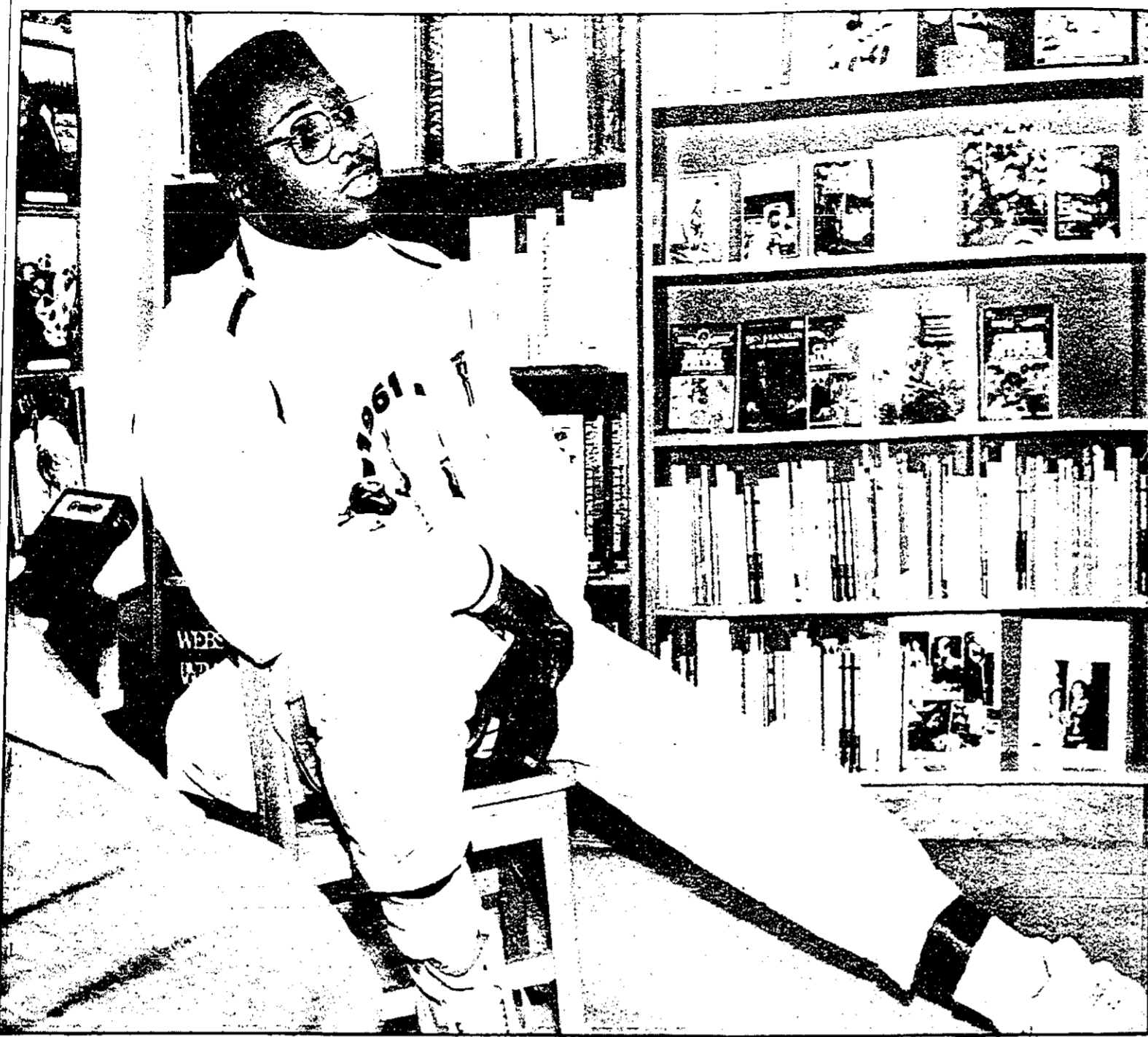
The cost of the 1990 census — including years of planning, forming mailing lists, hiring 300,000 employees nationwide and mailing out more than 100 million surveys — will be \$2.6 billion, according to census officials.

The number of temporary employees will make census bureau employment larger than that of all but two corporations in the United States.

In 1980, about 83 percent of the households returned a completed survey by mail. Officials hope to match that figure in 1990 with much of the manpower used to track down and interview residents of the other 17 percent.

To reach minorities, who historically have been undercounted, the bureau has hired black, Asian, Hispanic and Native American advertising companies.

The bureau is in the process of compiling a list of about 1.1 million rural households that currently don't appear on purchased mailing lists and another list of about 2 million urban households that don't appear on mailing lists.

### Warner visits Novi to talk about book

A shiny black limousine slithered up to the curb outside Novi's Borders Book Store.

It was a regular Saturday afternoon in November. An ordinary-looking guy stepped out of the limo, casually dressed in jeans, a white sweat-shirt and tennis shoes.

Necks craned to see just who this ordinary guy was. Curious spectators caught a glimpse of Malcolm Jamal Warner, better known to millions of Americans as Theo Huxtable on the Cosby Show.

Warner was in town to talk to fans and to sign his recently published book "Theo and Me: Growing Up Olney." He stopped by Borders Books in Novi Town Center on Saturday (Nov. 12) as if he were dropping by to visit familiar friends.

Dozens of young fans anxiously clutched copies of Warner's book and stood in line to wait for a chance to see their favorite star. Giggles escaped their mouths as he walked past them.

"Oh my gosh! There he is!" a trio of girls gasped in unison. Warner smiled at them, creating more ecstatic giggles and shrieks.

Most of the younger fans on hand at the book store were accompanied by their mothers, sug-

gesting that they approved of this personable young fellow their children had chosen as a role model.

Warner, 18, has played the role of Theo on the Cosby Show for four years. His book describes experiences he's had growing up as a teenager. It focuses on questions Warner is frequently asked in hundreds of fan letters he receives every day.

"A lot of times teenagers think they're alone and that nobody understands them," Warner commented in a soft-spoken voice.

Rather than offering counseling or giving advice, Warner's book is "about being a friend." It deals with growing up and making choices about such topics as school, sex, depression, drugs, love and friendship.

"I never really thought about writing a book," Warner remarked. "Someone approached me with the idea, and it went from there."

Despite being a well-liked young television personality, Warner said he hasn't had to drastically change his life to fit Theo's image when assuming the role of the Cosby Show character.

"I'm not too much different from the image," Warner said, his conversation enhanced by frequent wide smiles.

Of particular importance to Warner are gaining a well-rounded education and fostering a good

relationship with his family. Warner's mother often escorts him on book-signing tours and public engagements, acting as his manager.

"I had a good foundation on which to build," Warner said about his family. "We understand each other."

Enrolled in school by correspondence, Warner graduated this year with honors. Although his life is drastically different than most people his age, Warner said he hasn't missed out on many regular teen activities.

"I went to basketball games. I went to the prom... I've had the best of both worlds," he said.

Warner's work on the Cosby Show keeps him busy from August until April. Meanwhile, he said he's "always looking at scripts."

The Cosby Show star is also learning about directing and has used his knowledge to direct two music videos. Warner has taken his talent to the stage, where he recently took part in an off-Broadway production, "Three Ways Home."

As Warner continues to explore different facets of his acting and directing career, he said he's "taking notes" and may someday write another book.

"You're going to see one busy individual during the next year," he said to the delight of his adoring fans.

**About those burning leaves:** The Michigan Air Pollution Control Commission has adopted a resolution which strongly encourages residents and officials of all Michigan townships, municipalities, counties and other local units of government to ban the open burning of leaves.

Burning leaves causes air pollution in the form of particulates, carbon monoxide and various hydrocarbons. It also can cause respiratory problems, especially to people with asthma and other chronic respiratory diseases.

The resolution urges communities to support and implement an environmentally safe method of leaf disposal such as composting. The composting of leaves is a solid waste management technique which produces a valuable humus product with little adverse effect on the environment.

Burning leaves is permitted in most areas of Novi, although some subdivisions have restrictions against it. Residents must first obtain a burning permit from the Novi Fire Department before burning leaves.

## Novi student test scores down

This year's college entrance exam scores show a sharp drop for Novi High School students in some categories, and district officials are seeking ways of improving them.

For the first time in four years Novi's mean verbal score on the Scholastic Aptitude Test (SAT) registers lower than both the state and national averages, according to results just released by the district.

Novi's mean verbal score is 453 compared to 457 for the state and 428 for the nation.

This year's verbal scores also show a 22 point decline from last year's figure. Up until this year, the verbal scores had climbed steadily.

"The board is more than concerned about the verbal scores being below the national mean," said Board President Michael Meyer on Tuesday. "We need more written hands-on experience for our students."

"The SAT test, which students traditionally take to enter high-powered

schools in the East, is comprised of a math and verbal portion, the latter testing reading comprehension and vocabulary. A perfect score for each part is 800, or 1,600 total.

Meyer said the board will expect a follow-up report in the spring to a test score presentation given by Novi High School counselors at a recent board meeting.

While Novi's SAT math scores fared no better, concern was not as marked because that mean still remains higher than both the state and national averages. However, the mean math score this year fell 24 points from last year to 527, making that also the lowest math mean in four years.

Math means for the state are 513 and 476 respectively.

Typically students nationwide fare better on the math portion of the SAT.

Scores for a second college entrance exam, the American College Test (ACT) were also released, showing only a slight decline in Novi students' mean from last year. In that time the mean dropped from 18.7

to 19.4, the current figure.

Novi's ACT mean score continues to remain higher than the state and national means, both of which are 18.8. This follows a three-year trend.

The ACT tests students in more areas than the SAT, covering English, social studies, natural science and math. A composite score is drawn from all four categories in which highest scores possible are 33, 34, 35 and 36 respectively.

Most state colleges expect students to take the ACT as an admissions requirement, while the SAT is usually taken if a student knows it is required for a specific school.

One suggestion to improve verbal scores which might come out of the follow-up report, said Meyer, could be integrating test preparation study into the existing curriculum. After the counselors' presentation, the board "was leaning toward some test preparation," he said.

Currently students who want test preparation can take SAT and ACT workshops several times a year through the Novi Community Educa-

tion Department or at Oakland Community College or Schoolcraft College.

Another method of improving the scores is by practicing with the Preliminary SAT (PSAT) and P-ACT, said High School Counselor Rose Riopelle.

PSAT scores for juniors and seniors reflect a similar pattern to the official scores, with Novi students falling just below the national college-bound math and verbal means.

Scores for the P-ACT, which was a pilot program in Novi last year, are unavailable.

Also helping to raise test scores is going through the motions twice, added Riopelle. In Novi students take the P-ACT in their sophomore years, followed by the PSAT, then the SAT and/or the AC in their junior years. And then they can repeat both the SAT and ACT in their last year of high school.

"It stands to reason that anything you repeat you'll do better on," said Riopelle.

## Entrance exams: What's the beef?

Are top scores on college entrance exams really that important?

Well, yes and no. "It depends on what kind of school you're planning on attending," said Novi High School Counselor Rose Riopelle. "It's more important for the prestigious schools," she added, meaning Ivy League and other East Coast schools.

But test scores are not the only factor to getting in the school of your choice, she added. There are grades and the kind of classes taken to be considered also.

Remarkable Novi School Board President Michael Meyer: "Hopefully a student knows a 'B' in an AP (advanced placement) class means more than an 'A' in an easier class."

And that's the kind of academics that wins admissions, said Riopelle. "But you can't judge the credentials of a student just by the college they

end up at," she added, saying many students are accepted into Ivy League schools but choose a state school instead.

"We have a lot of students with high grade point averages and high test scores at OCC (Oakland Community College). In the end it comes out of the pocket."

Besides not being able to afford some of the "better-name" schools, some students may not be "ready to go 1,000 miles away from home," she said.

Of Novi's nearly 300 graduates this year, most are expected to go to Michigan State University, Central Michigan University and OCC, Riopelle said.

And it is the state schools that do not typically require the taking of the Scholastic Aptitude Test (SAT). Instead, students take the American College Test (ACT) as an entrance requirement.

To the notion that some think the ACT is easier than the SAT, Riopelle said "only in a certain respect, because it (ACT) tests more areas." Some students may have an advantage on that

type of test because there is a greater chance that they could be especially knowledgeable in one of the categories. The SAT tests only English and math, while the ACT tests English, math, social studies and natural sciences.

"The ACT tests more of the person," she said. "In her role as counselor, Riopelle tells anyone who is considering going to an out-of-state school, or who thinks they might move, to take the SAT."

Also, students should be aware of what the requirements are for any school they might consider. "Otherwise, we recommend that everyone else take the ACT."

And taking the preliminary SAT and ACT tests is a must, she said. "It's only for some practice."

Also, any preparation classes could be helpful. Students not only learn test-taking strategies, but also gain an idea of the types of questions which will be on the test, she said.

Should college-bound students go through the anguish of such test-taking again? "Yes. At least twice," she said.

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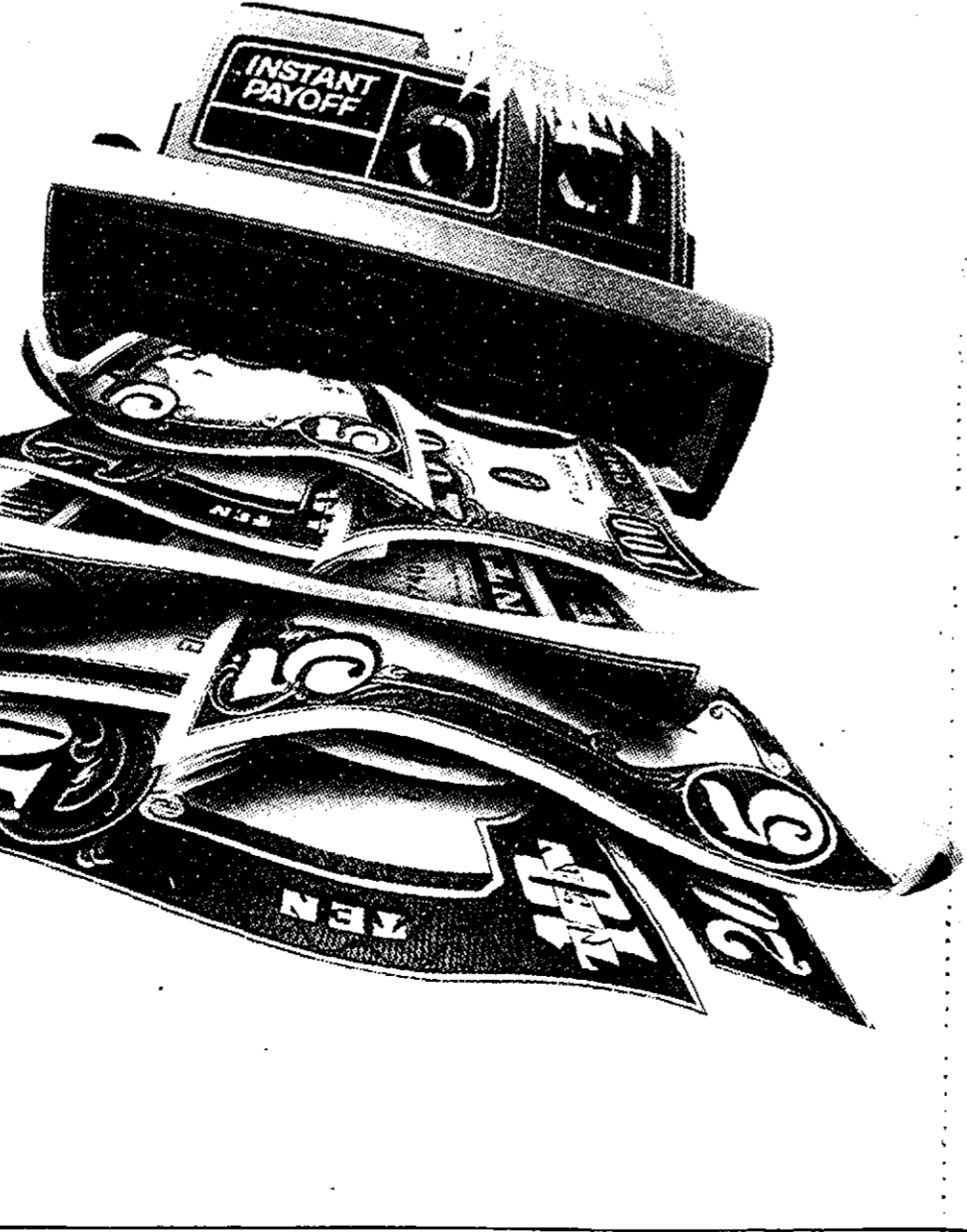
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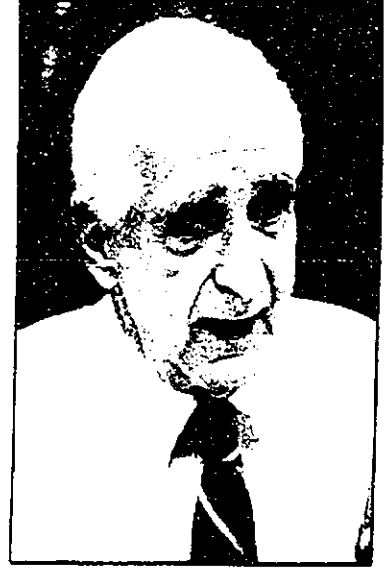
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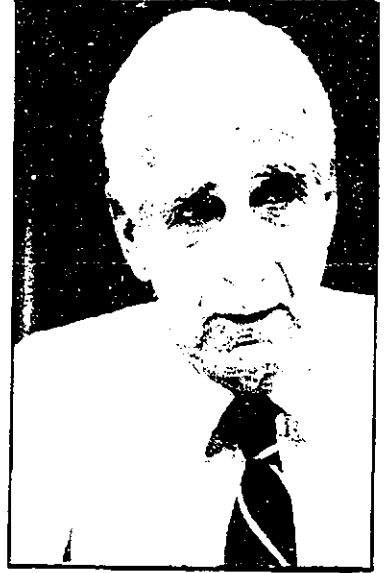

# Attorney discusses challenges faced by cities

Veteran City Attorney David Fried has been around long enough to watch Novi go through some changes. As legal council since the day the city was incorporated, he has seen the city change from a semi-rural suburb to what it is today.

He took time out recently to answer questions about legal challenges associated with running a city — modern planning, liability risks — as well as a variety of other topics.

How has this business changed over the years? First, with liability. Are we in the middle of a liability crisis, or has it showed signs of letting up?

in the courts in the next decade?

FRIED: "Zoning is probably the largest challenge. There have been several U.S. Supreme Court rulings in which the court is groping to balance the rights of the property owners and the municipalities in regards to planning and zoning.

"Until this is resolved, there is going to be substantial litigation in that area.

"The Supreme Court, as it is constituted right now, is very property-oriented. It is very protective of the rights of property owners. As distinguished from prior courts, they have not held rights of the public — the public's right to legislate — as highly as the rights of the property owners.

"There will be some problems in this area."

courts take over control of a certain area or strip of land?

FRIED: "I don't think the courts have ever totally taken over control in regards to zoning. The courts have said municipalities can or cannot do this. Then, based upon that determination, then they seek to give a remedy. Sometimes that remedy is beyond what the municipality thinks should be given, but it's up to the courts to eventually determine what that remedy is.

"That area is still open. The courts, within the last three years, have held that where a municipality has zoned properties — where the zoning is arbitrary and capricious — that the courts can then hold that the zoning is unconstitutional. They can order that a certain use be allowed for that property. The court hasn't yet determined what control the municipality has in regards to that use."

Please explain the process of trying to reach a settlement with a developer, short of a full-blown trial or a court decision?

FRIED: "Let me give you the ordinary situation, and I'm not referring to any one case here.

"The municipality will zone a certain piece of property — let's assume industrial. The owner of that property, even though it's correct, might believe that the property is more valuable if it is used for commercial purposes. The city, in rezoning that property for industrial purposes, has to rely on its master plan, it's various consultants, the input of the planning commission on whether the master plan is proper and the zoning is proper.

"Does it have in mind the best interests of the community? Does it reflect orderly growth?"

vice of the planning consultant, and any advice they might get from administration.

"The council will then review the same area, look at all the input on it, and make a determination of whether or not it should be rezoned.

"If the property owner feels that he has not been given his full rights under the law, he'll go to the courts, and say 'Look, the zoning of my property is arbitrary and capricious,' and there are many reasons why a zoning can be arbitrary and capricious.

"If an offer is made to settle the litigation, council will then take whatever information is available from its city's attorney, the consultants, review the decision of the planning commission, and consider what the developer wants to do with the property — then make a determination of what serves the best interest of the city.

"Council may decide that 'No, cost is not the most important factor in settling this case,' and may decide to uphold the integrity of its master plan.

"If the court finds that the city zoning is arbitrary and capricious, the developer isn't free to develop it as they see fit. The developer must develop it in a way that the court finds as reasonable.

"The question that is now before the courts is how much further control over the development of that property does the court have outside of the mere use.

"Do they have the right to determine setback? Greenbelt? Parking? That issue has not been decided.

In any regard, most municipalities will not be coerced into settling litigation based on the expense of the litigation. They don't like to spend that money on litigation, but they will do what's best for the community.

"In that formula, the attorney has a responsibility to indicate to the city, whether or not the city will prevail in that litigation. By being familiar with the facts of that case — the information from the developer's experts, the information from our own experts — that recommendation will be made.

"Oftentimes, the city does not — and should not be required to — follow the recommendations of the attorney. The attorney might weigh into the consideration of the settlement the factor of cost. Most city attorneys are very conscious of budget of the budget they are required to live by. They might feel that it is less costly to settle the litigation.

"You cannot be forced by large developers — or small developers for that matter — into developing your community on what is the best interests of the developer. You have to consider what is the best interest of all of the property owners.

FRIED: "There has been substantial changes — both by legislation and by the Supreme Court's rulings.

"Within the last five years the courts and the legislature have limited — substantially limited — the grounds upon which liability can be based.

"There has been a great movement on the part of the courts and the legislature to relieve the municipalities of the burden of these types of suits.

"It's in response to what is being called an insurance crisis and what has been picked up as an insurance crisis by the media."

Do you see a continuing erosion of a local government's controls over development?

FRIED: "Until this question of what the individual property owner's rights are — as distinguished from the municipality's right to legislate — until that question is resolved in court, it'll go on.

"This is an ongoing thing. It's a living organism. It keeps on changing as time goes on. As the mood of the country changes, the courts will render their decisions in that fashion."

How would you assess Novi's status with litigation in comparison with neighboring communities?

FRIED: "Novi is excellent shape. Novi has planned its community. They've had a basis and reason for all of their decisions. That doesn't mean that some of their decisions might or might not be found to be arbitrary as determined by the courts.

"The municipality will have to just deal with what it thinks is best for the community and await the court's decisions on whether or not that conduct is arbitrary and capricious."

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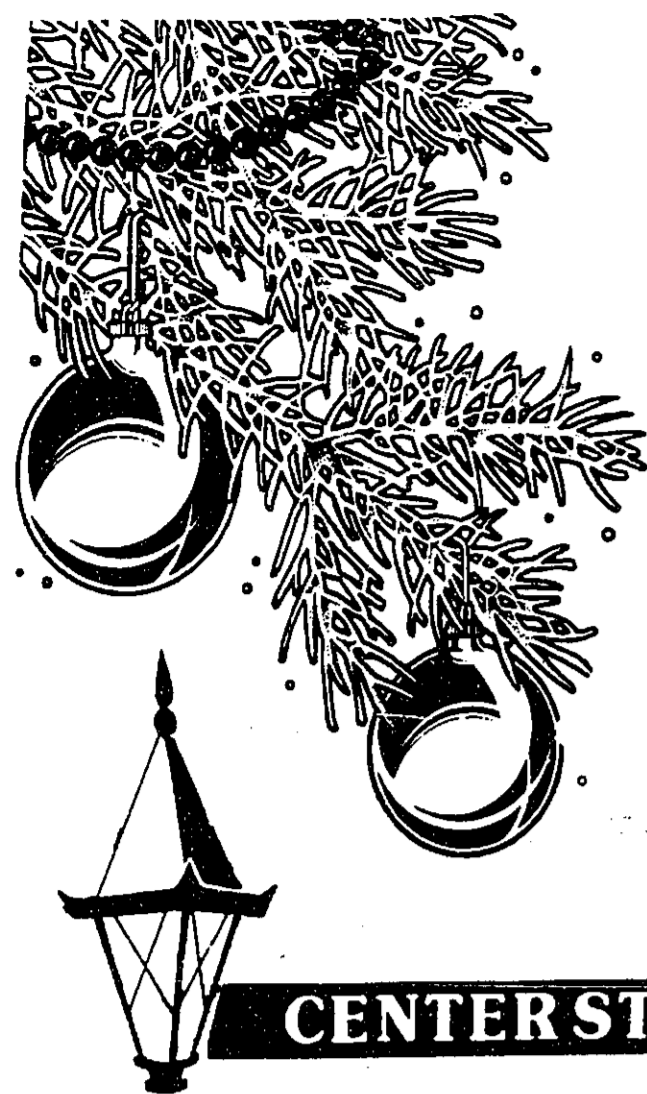
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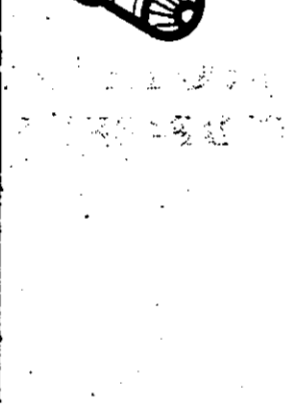
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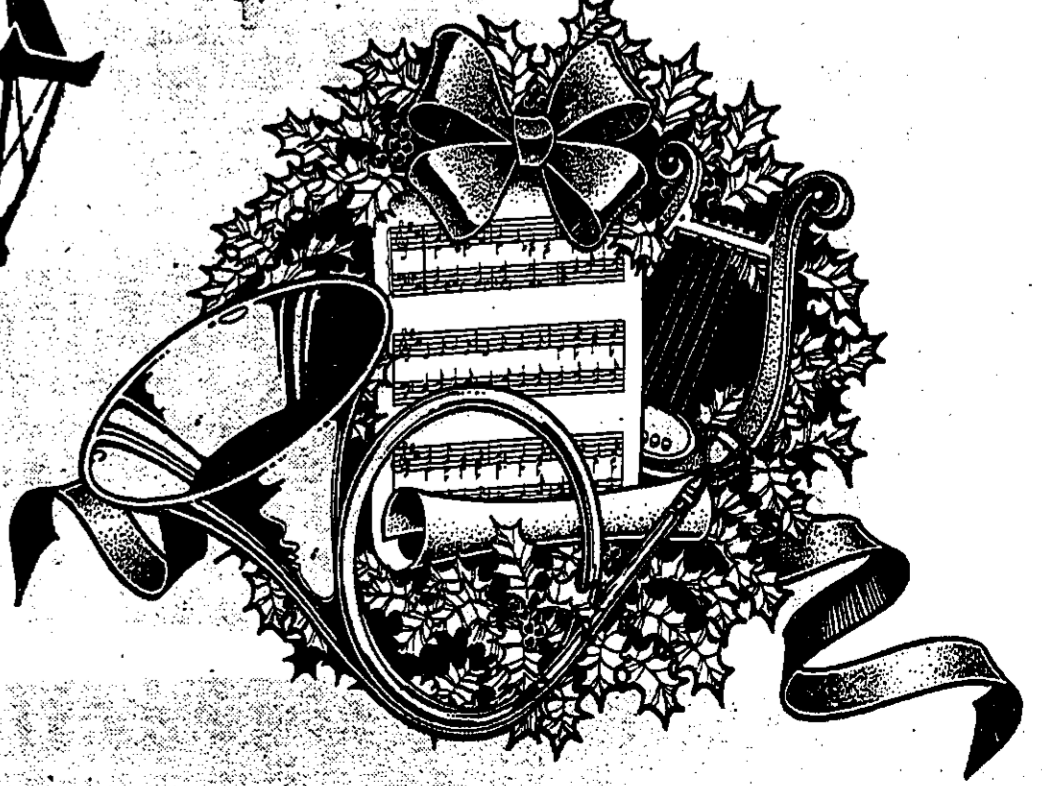
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## Demand for car phones causes increase in towers

The number of towers to handle car telephone conversations in Metro Detroit has increased from 11 to 58 over four years, and more are on the way as more people opt to buy cellular phones to either chat with their friends or make business calls.

In the Detroit area, there was a 156 percent increase in cellular phone use this year compared to 35 percent nationwide, according to Ameritech Mobile, which considers Oakland County one of the fastest growing areas.

West Bloomfield Township is working on a zoning ordinance to cover the location of cellular telephone towers, while other communities have systems in place to handle their location.

But for the cellular firms there's a contradiction in the locating of a tower.

"It seems like where we get the most demand, we also get the most

opposition," said Bob Brown, an Ameritech Mobile manager who oversees the Detroit market.

"I just wish the people who use the service would go to the public hearings," he said.

"We need a lot of support from the people who use the phones to get the towers in," confirmed Tom Adams of Ameritech's Southfield office.

The number of towers needed depends on the density of use and not just distance, said Brown, who added that each tower can handle only a certain number of calls.

"We're monitoring them all the time," he said. "As we see them getting busy, we start looking for a new site."

He said finding a site usually takes about a year.

Adams said the Detroit Ameritech system covers about 5,000 square miles and is broken down into a grid system, where a tower is needed

about every 10 miles.

He said the company splits cells when the demand in an area becomes great. Splitting a cell improves service and is done in two phases — first by adding capacity to the existing tower and then by building a new tower.

Bloomfield Township has about six towers in place, said Supervisor Fred Korzon, adding that the township's zoning board of appeals has handled the construction and it "has worked out pretty well."

The City of Farmington Hills was approached by Ameritech Mobile about building a tower, but the city asked them to try putting their equipment on an existing tower, said Ed Gardiner of the planning staff.

"They put it on a tower at Twelve Mile and I-96," he said, adding that there was no objection from the community.

He said the township has a 50-foot

height limit on towers, and that further requests will be handled by the zoning board of appeals, which will have to rule on requests for higher towers needed by cellular firms.

Cellular towers must be at least 120 feet, he said.

"There are only two firms, Ameritech and Cellular One," he said. "We've satisfied Ameritech and we expect to hear from Cellular One."

He said that a couple of years ago there were no such requests.

In Birmingham one tower went up about a year ago at Maple and Eton roads, but the 100-foot plus structure didn't generate any community opposition.

Rochester Hills doesn't have any cellular towers yet, and doesn't have any requests for them.

"I don't even think they could put them up here," said Jim Schmidt, Rochester Hills community relations officer. "We've got a height limit, and we don't even have a two-story building here. It would require a

Novi and Farmington Hills had applied for an Economic Development Grant to raise most of the funds. The \$25 vehicle registration fee monies were earmarked to supply the rest.

"Conceptually, that's what we had planned," Kriewall said.

But city officials got word in October that the grant was turned down. And the \$25 vehicle registration fee was soundly rejected by Oakland County voters Nov. 8.

Novi residents voted 9,699-2,434 against the registration fee question. The road fee would have raised

about \$500,000 per year for 10 years in Novi, enough to cover about \$4 million in local costs associated with Twelve Mile widening.

Kriewall said Novi is also waiting for progress in Lansing on other road funding strategies, such as developer impact fees or possibly a two-cent Oakland County gas tax. The gas tax would likely raise the most money for the project, Kriewall said.

The state may not be able to put the vehicle registration fee question before voters again until 1990, he added.

Twelve Mile widening plans are currently at a halt until alternative

funding can be figured out.

Preliminary plans call for Twelve Mile to be made a boulevard from Haggerty to Novi Road. It would start out at six lanes near Haggerty and taper off to four lanes near Meadowbrook Road. From Meadowbrook to a point just west of Novi Road, Twelve Mile would be four lanes.

Plans currently on the table call for the project to be completed in five to seven years, although that will probably be delayed.

Property acquisition alone is expected to cost about \$2.4 million.

# Mackenzie credits win to work

Judge Brian Mackenzie is crediting a good organization check full of hard-working volunteers and an extensive walking campaign for big victories in a number of 52nd District communities.

Mackenzie, who took the bench by gubernatorial appointment in March, re-affirmed his spot with a general election victory Nov. 8.

Although he lost the City of Novi — his hometown, Mackenzie won virtually every other major community in the 52nd District Court area and swept to a victory by approximately 1,500 votes.

Unofficial results, not yet certified by the State Board of Canvassers, show Mackenzie collecting 19,872 votes. Challenger Terence Jolly, a Novi attorney, recorded 19,137.

"I'm glad it's over," Mackenzie said. "The experience was really worth it."

"I think in a lot of ways it made me a better judge. It certainly made me more knowledgeable of the district."

"Part of it, clearly, was walking," Mackenzie said. "We could see the differences in the areas we walked heavily. It showed up."

The exception, Mackenzie said, was Highland.

He won a victory there largely on the strengths of mailings and the endorsement of Judge Martin Boyle, who he replaced on the bench.

"There were people there who received six, seven, even eight pieces of mail," Mackenzie said. "That certainly was a goal."

Mackenzie picked up his first convincing victory in Highland Township (2,334 to 1,921) and that alone supplied a margin Jolly was unable to overcome.

Mackenzie also posted victories in Commerce (3,655 to 3,458), Milford (1,926 to 1,666), White Lake Township (2,644 to 2,482) and South Lyon (945 to 927).

He also won Walled Lake (897 to 821), Wixom (1,122 to 927) and Lyon Township (1,046 to 778).

Jolly posted victories in Rose

Township (627 to 487), Novi Farmington (38 to 27) and Novi (5,063 to 4,628).

Mackenzie gained similar wins in absentee vote counts — still a bitter bone of contention between the two candidates.

Jolly, as late as Friday, was critical of a Mackenzie mailing targeted at absentee voters, which he called misleading. The relationship between the two has shown few signs of thawing.

"Brian (Mackenzie) sent out literature to little old lady absentee voters that just wasn't true," Jolly said last week.

"I would hope that time is going to heal any hurt feelings from the campaign," he said.

The 52nd District Court, 1st Division, serves the cities of Novi, South Lyon, Walled Lake and Wixom; the townships of Commerce, White Lake, Highland, Milford, Rose and Novi; and the villages of Wolverine Lake and Milford.

Mackenzie will serve the remaining term of the retired Judge Boyle. That term runs until January 1, 1991.

## Area Briefs

**New school in Farmington?** A new elementary school is already under construction in Novi. And now the Farmington Public Schools are looking to get into the school construction act as well.

Farmington school officials will ask for an estimated \$7.3 million to build a new elementary school when they return to voters this winter for a second time. The anticipated election date is Jan. 31, 1989.

A \$27.25 million bond issue was defeated by voters in September. The bond issue would have given the district \$5 million for a new elementary school and additional money for renovation and safety concerns in school buildings.

**More office construction?** Everyone knows the Haggerty Road corridor is gaining a reputation as a "professional office" corridor. And additional office construction could be under way in the near future.

The Selective Development Company is attempting to purchase 28 acres of land owned by Canton Township on Haggerty Road near I-275. The company wants to construct approximately 12 buildings containing 300,000 square feet of offices and light assembly or robotics plants.

The Selective Company is the developer of the Timber Ridge subdivision on Novi Road, south of Nine Mile, in Novi.

Negotiations for the Canton township parcel have been delayed by a dispute over the cost of the property. Canton Township officials are seeking \$85,000 per acre. The Selective Group wants to buy the 28 acres for about \$1.4 million — or, about \$50,000 per acre.

**What to do about roads?** With the defeat of the \$25 vehicle registration fee proposal in the Nov. 8 election, West Bloomfield Township is looking at the possibility of a local road millage to raise funds for road construction.

The township board had considered placing a road millage question on the November ballot, but dropped plans when the county proposal was added to the ballot.

"We'll probably go back to a township millage to raise money for roads," said Clerk Sharon Law. She also said a March election has been scheduled and a road millage proposal could be placed on it. No millage rate has been proposed, she added.

## Novi Town Center to undergo study

Plans to revise Novi's Town Center District are two tiered — adding new space to the district and also changing the types of uses which are permitted within it.

The 157-acre Town Center District, expected to be Novi's "downtown," was conceived in the 1960s and put into action in 1984. The ultimate goal of the district is to provide the development pedestrian-accessible district, containing retail, commercial, office, civic and residential uses.

But the amount and interest for residential development in the area has lagged, with little hope of residential foreseen. The area has attracted mostly commercial and retail uses, including the Trammel Crow Company's shopping development in the northeast quadrant of the district.

The district encompasses most of the four quadrants of the Grand River/Novi Road intersection. Plans currently call for the addition of new property and revisions to the Town Center Ordinance.

The new property proposed to be added includes:

□ A large tract of vacant land north of Grand River, south of the Mohawk Liqueur distillery and a small parcel south of Grand River near the Chesapeake and Ohio railroad tracks. It is now currently zoned light-industrial. It totals 15 acres.

□ A smaller section of property near Novi Road and Flint Street. Most of the property is city-owned (The Novi Cemetery). It is located south of the cement plant on Novi Road. It is currently zoned commercial, containing about four acres, three of which contains the old Novi Cemetery. The other acre is made up of an adjoining piece of property and

a small parcel across from the Aladdin buildings.

□ A tract of land south of Grand River behind the city Fire Station No. 1. It is a mixture of multiple-family residential and business zonings, containing approximately 42 acres.

□ A large section of property near the Town Center shopping mall development and office complex. It is currently zoned for office uses. It includes the Novi Wyndham Hotel, the Lakepointe Office Center and a city storage yard. It contains 54 acres.

□ A set of properties on the north side of Grand River (the coin-operated car wash, a construction company), containing about 11 acres. The ordinance revisions would seek to do the following:

□ Encourage residential use in the district by requiring new commercial developments over 3,500 square feet to provide 50 percent residential components. That means a business coming in with plans for a 6,000 square foot office building would have to provide 6,000 square feet of residential development within the complex or elsewhere in the Town Center district.

□ Pay more attention to the Novi Riverwalk project during site plan submission.

□ Establish a 400-foot buffer district to areas where the Town Center district backs up against existing residential development. If the large section behind Fire Station No. 1 is added to the Town Center district, it stands a chance of backing up against the Meadowbrook Glens subdivision.

□ Add the Town Center design study to the city's ordinance book as a reference — meaning many of the theoretical goals of the center would actually be founded.

residential development less likely.

"When we change this from (multiple-family residential to Town Center District) we will make the value higher and make it more expensive for residential development," she said.

"What we're hearing from the people of this community is that we have a terrific overabundance of commercial in Novi," she added. "We're lending a greater opportunity for commercial development in the Town Center District."

Novi Community Development Director James Wahl said the purpose of coming forward with the changes to the district was to attempt to take an active approach in planning the area.

"There is a lot of Sharon (Peichat) in her," said Byers. "I came away very impressed with her."

Thornton agreed, praising Abrams for her comments about realizing there would be much to learn with the new post, "as opposed to thinking you have all the answers from day one," she said.

Meyers' major concern with Abrams' appointment was her seemingly limited knowledge of school finances. He said Foreback was the only candidate who had a "real grip" on that issue.

When asked by Trustee Stephen J. Hitchcock what she thought about current state school funding proposals, Abrams responded, "I'm not familiar with it. Finance and budget are something I hope to learn."

But apparently it was Abrams' honesty and comfortable attitude toward board members that weighed in her favor. When asked her views on prayer within the schools, Abrams said she is opposed because it is "a private thing to be observed elsewhere."

Regarding the moment of silence that students in other districts might observe, she said, "I think a lot of kids say 'Please God, let me pass this test,'" which brought a round of laughter from the board.

"I think she's fair and exercises good judgment," said Trustee Joan Daley. "I would like to see her appointed."

Abrams also seemed to have a jump on the other candidates because of her involvement with the school district. She has been a volunteer noon aid almost 10 years.

"She probably knows the schools better than the other candidates, and maybe even better than some board members," Trustee Robert Schram said. "I see that as an asset."

Addressing a question about a possible conflict with her noon aid position, Abrams said she didn't feel it would be a problem. She said she was told by Superintendent Robert Piwko that she could retain the job upon appointment "if all parties were comfortable."

In addition to attending board meetings Abrams has served on the committee that compiled the Novi Meadows Evaluation Report. She also tutors students in grades K-9.

Abrams and her husband Leonard have a daughter, 22, and two sons, ages 19 and 8. Both the elder children attended Novi schools after the family moved to the community in 1977. Their youngest child is in the third grade at Village Oaks.

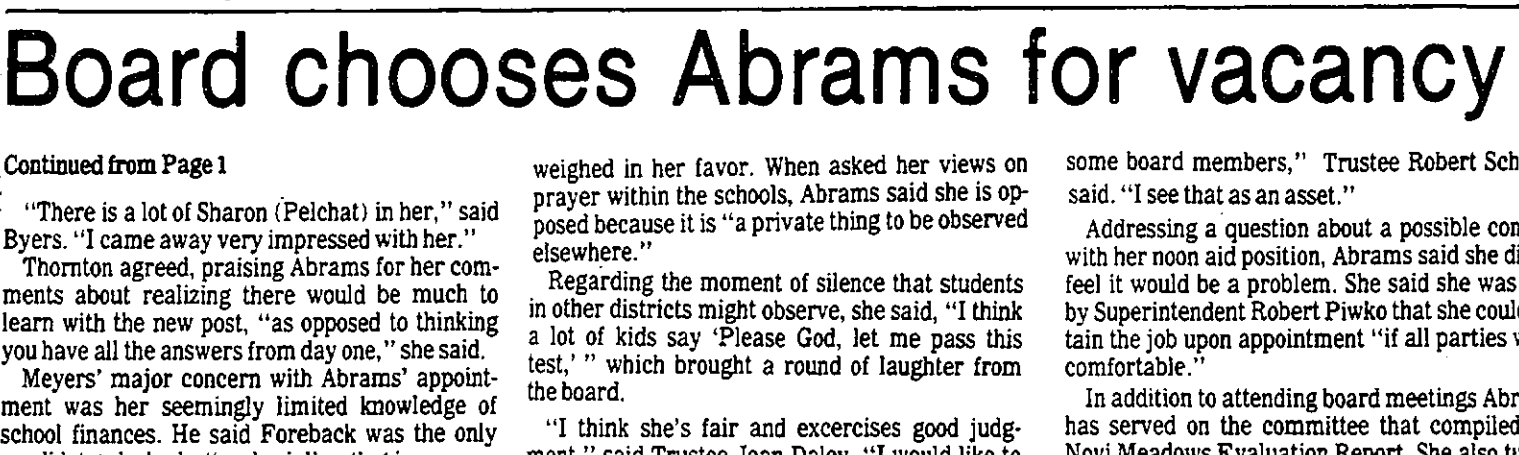

don't want to see all commercial ... and that's what we're getting.

"You're not going to get one-acre lots or two-story colonials, but there is the possibility for ... some sort of multiple residential use, like luxury apartments or senior citizen housing," he said.

City planners have expressed some disappointment at the lack of residential development within the Town Center. They also point to few prospects for future residential use.

Council Member Martha Hoyor said she was opposed to adding any properties to the district, since it was likely to cause those parcels to climb in value, making the possibility of

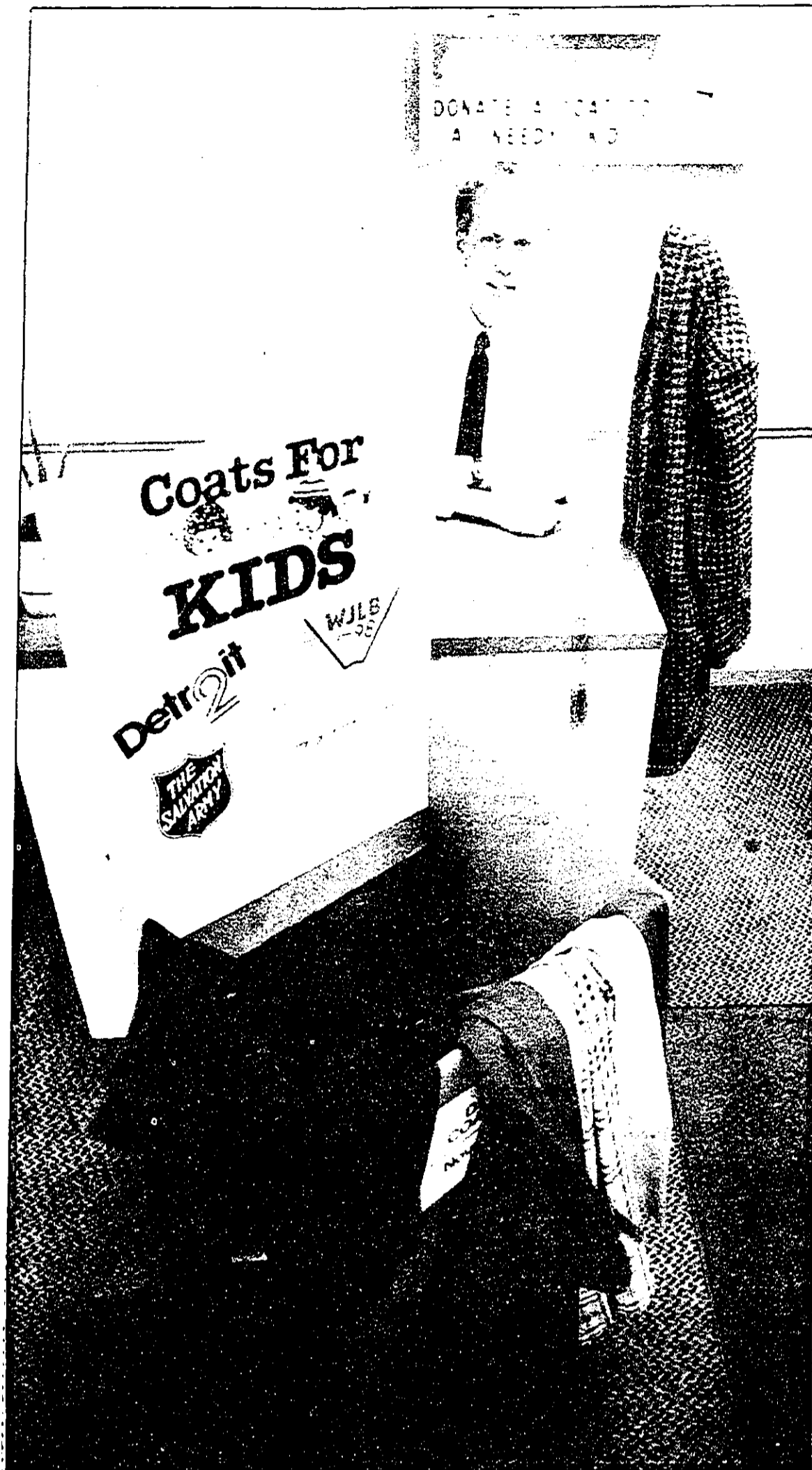

## Coats for kids Residents asked to donate

Thanks to area residents and a chain of local dry cleaning stores, fewer Metro Detroit students will miss school this year because of a lack of warm clothing. And there is still time to contribute, as the annual "Coats For Kids" campaign heads into its second week. For the sixth consecutive year, Metro Detroiters are donating coats their children have outgrown and making cash contributions to purchase new coats.

The used coats are dry cleaned for free by 56 One-Hour Martinizing Stores, which serve as the drop-off sites. Distribution then is handled through participating school systems by way of the Salvation Army.

Other sponsors of "Coats For Kids" program are WJLB radio, whose parent company American Booth started the program seven years ago, and WJKB-Channel 2.

This is the second year the Martinizing stores have been participants, said Henry Kraus, who owns eight stores including one on Novi Road at Ten Mile in Novi and another on Seven Mile in Northville Township.

"There aren't many community projects that a dry cleaner can be involved in," Kraus said, calling the stores' donation an "institutional advantage."

Last year the stores cleaned 6,000 coats in an untold number of manhours.

He added, "You get a good feeling from this. It's good for everyone. It's good for us, too."

And it's good for the at least 10,000 children project officials hope to clothe this year. According to WJLB marketing services manager and station project overseer Bernadette Banko, 10,000 is set as this year's "standing goal."

Although 11,000 children received coats in 1987, "there's definitely a greater need for coats than what we can deliver," she said. Last year many school districts put in requests the project just couldn't cover, she added.

Most of the coats will go to youngsters in Wayne County, with Detroit, Highland Park and Hamtramck being heavy recipients, said Banko.

In Oakland County school districts in Royal Oak, Berkley and Hazel Park will also get a portion, along with a couple of areas in Macomb County.

Detroit may have the largest official "Coats For Kids" campaign anywhere, said Banko, adding that several other Booth American stations are sponsoring similar programs in Ohio and Indiana.

Project officials say the campaign was created by Booth American in 1981 when economic conditions throughout the country had given rise to a new group of needy tagged "the new poor."

These people were products of massive layoffs and plant closings in the industrial cities, and, Booth realized, added to the group of youngsters who missed school days during winter's bitter months because of a lack of warm clothing, especially coats.

The campaign was brought to Detroit in 1982, when WJLB adopted "Coats For Kids" as its annual major community service project.

"What we really need is cash donations to buy enough coats to make up the difference," Banko said, adding that the dry cleaners will be accepting coats through the end of November.

## As We See It

### New citizens group offers opportunity

North end Novi residents have agreed to form a residents association — specifically called the Lakes Area Residents Association — and it appears to be a positive step.

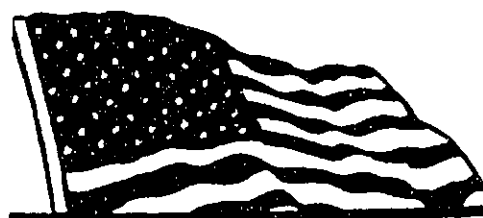
The problems of the area, ranging from heavy traffic and poor roads to pockets of blight, are definitely somewhat unique and perhaps more intense than in other areas of Oakland County. Group organizers also level the somewhat accurate criticism that Novi government treats them as something of an illegitimate child and is slower to respond to their needs.

The group has been formed, according to organizer Sarah Phelps, to deal with local issues ranging from environment and development to the quality of life in the region.

While we have reservations about the group's political agenda and the possible goals of its actions, there certainly are some positive signs in this coalition.

For starters, the group plans to be taking concerns to both the City of Novi and Lake and Novi. It's a good approach. Cooperation is something that is currently lacking between local units of government in Oakland County and, hopefully, the association can add some focus to regional issues which may straddle city boundaries.

Such coordination has also been urged by environmentalists, who have long maintained that ecological issues must be handled on a regional basis. From this group, insights to the true concerns facing the lakes — Shawood and Walled Lake — could be garnered.



Government

We hope the leadership of the Lakes Area Residents Association takes a moderate approach to issues and shies away from extreme points of view. It must first get an understanding of the fact that the wheels of government work slowly at times. Group members also stand a great chance of having their arguments and lobbying efforts rejected out of hand if they take a confrontational, extremist point of view on issues — like development.

City officials, on the other hand, must take this group seriously. We were a little disappointed when Mayor Matthew Quinn at a council meeting several weeks ago skipped over a letter from Phelps to the council about the organization. But Phelps did have what was termed a "positive" phone conversation about the association with the mayor in the weeks after the idea was conceived.

Nevertheless, council members seem to have little to no reaction to this group being formed, and granted, that's probably due more to the bulk of work being done in the council chambers lately, rather than a lack of interest.

City officials should encourage this group and establishing a cooperative approach now. It could turn out to be a positive communications tool in the future.

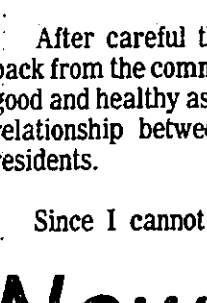

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## Substantive issues

In endorsing State Representative Willis "Bill" Bullard Jr. for reelection in the Nov. 8 election, you chastised him for spending too much time on relatively unimportant matters.

Noting that Bullard listed "dangerous animal" legislation as one of his most significant accomplishments during the most recent legislative session, we said we hoped he would "present a little more substance" during his next term of office.

The latest news release from the House Republican Press Office holds a glimmer of hope that the message may have gotten through.

Specifically, Bullard (R-Highland) and Joanne Emmons (R-Grand Rapids) are co-sponsors of a House resolution urging the Michigan Department of Civil Rights (MDCR)

to reconsider its findings that the use of Native American names for sports teams is demeaning and inappropriate.

Bullard and Emmons agreed that issuing an exhaustive report on the names of sports teams seems to be a misdirection of attention and suggested that the project was not the wisest use of resources and energies at a time when such basic human needs as housing, nutrition, employment and education need to be addressed.

Although we agree in principle that the MDCR could be using its time more appropriately, we also believe that Bullard and Emmons could find more constructive uses of their time and energies. What we'd really like to see from our state legislators is some concrete proposals on more substantive issues — not the least of which is road funding alternatives.

## Keep it up, Swami

Detroit Free Press writer Mick McCabe, a veritable guerrilla warrior of sports journalism, ruffled a few feathers in Novi this week.

Boldly, he predicted Novi's football team would lose in the first two rounds of the playoffs, and he was wrong. Now he's predicting another Novi loss in the semi-finals this Saturday, against Traverse City, a twice-crowned state champion. Here's hoping "the Son of Swami" is wrong again.

His remarks about Novi have been somewhat disparaging, but that's no surprise. McCabe's articles are, at worst, amusing. "The Swami's" remarks have always been somewhat tongue-in-cheek and sometimes intentionally inflam-

Let's hope he has a chance picks the "Cats to lose again — a week from Saturday in the Pontiac Silverdome.

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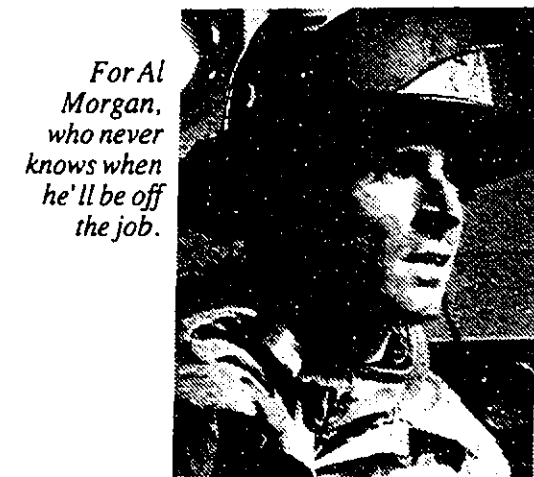

## Merging interests Bed-and-breakfast complements consulting service

Don Mroz and Susan Sommer are not your ordinary nine-to-five workers.

They have taken two distinctive careers and molded them into a life and workstyle that suits the energetic twosome.

First the husband-wife team created its own organizational development consulting firm — Atchison House Consultants.

Second, they recently opened a bed and breakfast inn in downtown Northville — in a completely renovated Victorian home.

At first look, the two businesses seem entirely unrelated. The Atchison House, the name of the new bed and breakfast inn, would appear to be enough of a challenge for any couple. All summer long the house was the site of busy work and design crews as the home, a former residence and doctor's office, was transformed into a cozy, antique-filled get-away in the heart of Northville's historic district.

But Mroz and Sommer had further dreams. Once the house was successfully launched, they returned to their first business, the consulting firm, Atchison House Consultants has as its primary goal helping organizations, both large and small,

become more effective. The two work at integrating people and systems into organizations in such a way as to help the overall effectiveness of the business.

To do this, Mroz and Sommer work at opening communication lines between employees on all levels of the business. They work at devising systems that can help the communication process and break down barriers between departments.

"Organizations can be paralleled with the human body," Mroz explained. "We try to maintain our bodies as well as we can. We try to do preventative maintenance such as running or swimming to keep it in shape. Organizations should do the same thing. They shouldn't wait until a crisis situation occurs to call in a consultant."

To help a business the couple begins by doing overall organizational diagnosis. This can be interviews and evaluations "to get the pulse for the organization," Mroz said.

From there they begin to work at getting a business plan for the organization — finding out what its goals are and how that translates to the employees and how the company is operating.

"The single biggest problem in any organization is communication," Sommer said. The consultants work at building methods of communication and at team-building and strategic planning.

"We start with 'What is our (the company's) mission' and go through the whole organization to see and show how everyone is a part of that mission — how each contributes," Sommer said. The couple also engages in executive coaching for CEOs of businesses to help them understand that the people who work for them are the company's biggest resource.

The consulting firm works for both large and small companies, and both Mroz and Sommer noted that even the smallest firms can benefit from increased communication and better goal planning.

"All companies have the same problems. It's just a matter of degree," they said.

So how does the Atchison House

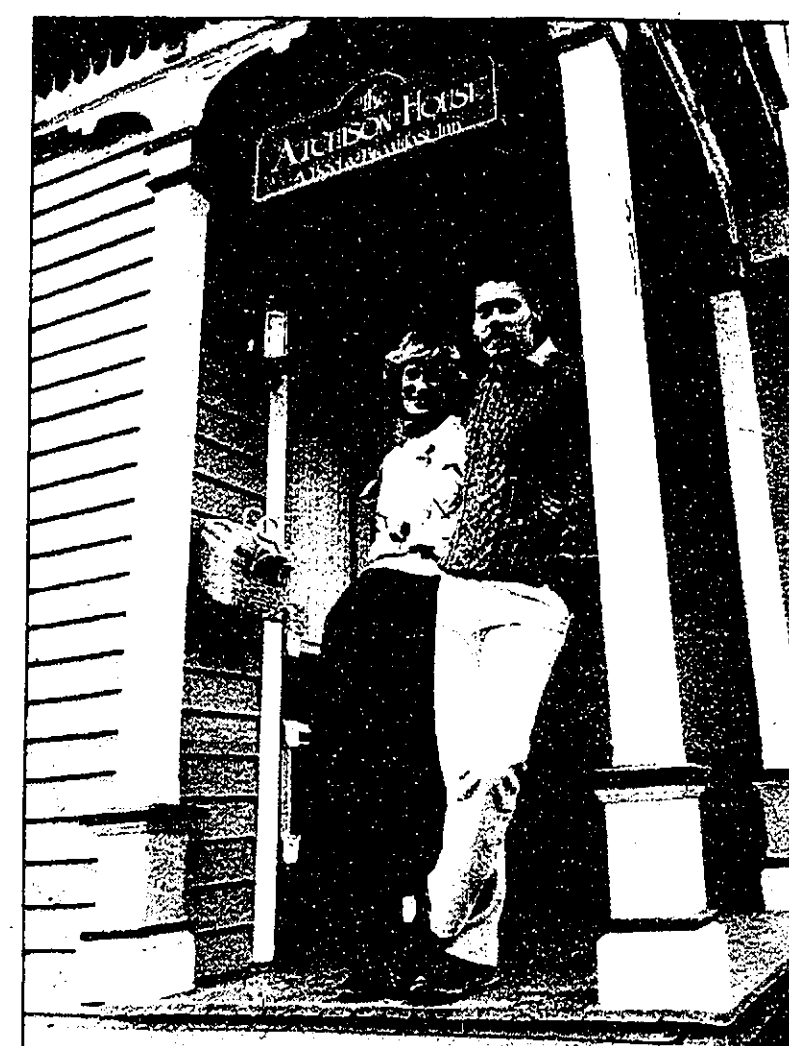
Consultants firm fit in with the Atchison House Bed and Breakfast Inn? Perfectly, according to the couple.

They have found that many businesses need to get "off-site" during seminars to open communication lines and learn about organizational patterns. Sitting in the office in traditional roles can sometimes be a hindrance to solving problems. So the relaxed, gentle ambiance of the Atchison House in Northville has been used — successfully — by the consultants, they said.

"We work toward developing business relationships in non-traditional settings," Mroz said. Seminars on effective meeting skills or time management can be held in the comfortable confines of the inn, where normal relationships may be bypassed and new communication lines forged, they said.

Mroz pointed out that the value of having an outside consultant working

## Catered Thanksgiving

Turkey time is upon us. Visions of a butter-basted turkey chock full of herbed stuffing, steaming turkey gravy, mounds of mouth-watering mashed potatoes and hot spiced wine garnished with cinnamon sticks, flood your memory.

You find yourself licking your lips in anticipation of the big meal.

Then the anxiety sets in. It's your turn to fix the Thanksgiving meal this year.

Suddenly your schedule of fast-paced, tension-filled days make the festive holiday seem more like a nightmare than the carefully cultivated old-fashioned tradition you remember from your childhood.

What to do?

Don't panic. There's a man who can help you.

Edward Postiff, co-owner of Edwards Caterer in Northville, offers a service that may prove to be a godsend to harried families who want to preserve the tradition of Thanksgiving.

Edwards Caterer, 116 East Dunlap, provides a complete Thanksgiving menu featuring homemade food dishes ready for you to reheat and serve at your family table.

For the second year, the caterer is furnishing a full Thanksgiving menu — tasty appetizers, side dishes, pastries and desserts, right down to the turkey itself.

If you choose the catered route, place your orders by the Tuesday prior to Thanksgiving, the earlier the better. Edwards will be open Wednesday, Nov. 23, till 5 p.m. for pick-ups. Call 344-1550 to place your order.

Postiff said four people have ordered turkeys from his establishment this year, compared to only one request for a turkey last year. More common are orders for side dishes and desserts.

"For the most part, Mom and Dad are still cooking their own turkeys," Postiff said. "But they may decide to order side dishes or desserts so they don't have to take the time to make them."

One of his customers — an elderly woman who is serving a holiday meal for two — selected a full Thanksgiving spread from the Edwards' menu, including a turkey, two side dishes and dessert. The meal will cost her about \$60 and will provide her with plenty of leftovers for the day after Thanksgiving.

An onion sage stuffing is available,

as well as a mushroom, apple and onion variety and an old-fashioned stuffing version.

After popping a turkey into the oven, you can look forward to tempting side dishes — butternut squash, twice baked potatoes, brussel sprouts with garlicky sauteed almonds, scalloped potatoes, sauteed garden vegetables with fresh herbs and mushroom pie (the newest addition to the menu).

Top it off with a delicious dessert such as pumpkin cheesecake with a gingersnap crust, apple cake with caramel/pecan sauce, key lime cake, a parisienne gateau (also a new menu selection), deep-dish granny apple tart or a chocolate Kahlua terrine.

Breakfast muffins in a variety of flavors — cranberry apple, granny apple or pumpkin nut — are favorites. Sticky pecan rolls, croissants and strawberry, blueberry or cherry scones also are available. Coffee cake lovers can choose from caramel apple or blueberry lemon varieties.

Postiff said delivery is becoming a big part of his business. Delivery service must be requested and an additional fee is charged for delivery outside of Northville.

Postiff said most of his customers hail from Northville, Novi, Plymouth and Farmington Hills. He is also drawing interest from Ann Arbor, Brighton, Milford and Birmingham. His patrons tend to be in their late 30s or older, as double income families find it harder to make the time to cook elaborate dishes.

Appetizers on the Thanksgiving menu include mustard-carmelized bacon with waterchestnuts, phylio tartlets with mushroom filling and red-skin potatoes with garlicky spinach and Jarlsberg swiss cheese.

After appetizers, you may choose to serve a salad. Edwards Caterer offers a spinach salad with poppyseed dressing, a wild rice blend with spinach, vegetables and sesame dressing and a romaine version sprinkled with green beans, red grapes, red onion and raspberry mustard dressing.

Fresh turkeys are priced at \$34 each and are cooked just under the correct doneness for easy reheating on Thanksgiving Day. Most of them are about 12 pounds and will serve eight to 10 people. A turkey order is accompanied by giblet gravy and stuffing.

The spirit of giving is best recognized during the holiday season.

However, throughout the year at least one Northville merchant spreads good tidings by donating to a west side Detroit church.

Edward Postiff, co-owner of the Northville-based Edwards Caterer, donates leftover baked goods to the soup kitchen at St. Leo's church at the corner of Warren and Grand River Avenue in Detroit.

Organizers of the soup kitchen, coordinated through Our Lady of Victory Church in Northville, explained that Postiff has been supplying them with baked goods — muffins, breads and scones — since last March.

Freezers are stocked full of the tasty donated morsels until they're ready for use.

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## Hollywood critic shares stories of childhood life

She broke into movies at the age of 3, when her character was stabbed in the back by a soldier and thrown out a window.

She was friends with actresses Margaret O'Brien and Marilyn Monroe.

As a "tall, lumpy teen" she was kissed by Errol Flynn — the "most handsome man she had ever seen."

And as a magazine writer she has lunched with Nancy Reagan, who is also a friend of hers.

Who is this illustrious lady? None other than entertainment critic Susan Granger.

Granger was the guest of honor at the Northville Town Hall Series last Thursday. She chatted with a receptive crowd of local residents at the Plymouth Hilton, offering stories about her childhood in Hollywood and personal glimpses of stars she is acquainted with.

Dressed in a smart yellow-and-black suit complete with color-coordinated shoes, Granger spoke to her audience unpretentiously, sharing her stories as if she were confiding in long-lost friends.

The daughter of a movie director, Granger grew up on the "back lots" of sprawling studios during the Golden Era of Hollywood, when movie stars were considered princes and princesses.

"America has always yearned for royalty, wealth and style," Granger said. "There was no central focus for glamour until Hollywood."

She spoke of rags to riches stories, citing Shirley Temple (now Shirley Temple Black) as an example. On her eighth birthday, Temple received 135,000 gifts from well-wishers all over the world. She was marketed on 164 different products, including the infamous Shirley Temple cocktail, a children's soft drink garnished with a maraschino cherry.

Now that Temple (Black) is a wife, mother, grandmother and successful career woman, Granger predicted that recently-elected President George Bush would appoint Black to a governmental post.

Granger also remembered the influence of newspaper columnists and Hollywood gossips Louella Parsons and Hedda Hopper. She suggested that the two women were responsible

for making the public aware of the extravagant lifestyles of the movie stars — a fascination that still lingers, leading to the popularity of TV's "Lifestyles of the Rich and Famous."

Parsons and Hopper were women to be feared, Granger explained. Both had the power to destroy a person's career by what they wrote in their columns.

As a child, Granger appeared in such movies as "Son of Lasseie," "Abbot and Costello in Hollywood" and "The Fuller Brush Man."

However she quickly acknowledged that she was not a child star, referring to herself as an "and also," because her name appeared in movie credits under the "and also featuring" category.

Life as a child star was difficult, a fact Granger became acquainted with because many of her friends were child actors and actresses.

"Most child actors were the main bread-winners," Granger explained. "I wasn't. It was fun for me — I

worked sporadically. "On the way up in Hollywood you're clawing, and scratching all the way up. When you get to the top, it's even more desperate . . . Hollywood children were expected to be perfect."

Granger recalled some of the children of movie stars who were unable to live up to their expectations, ultimately resulting in suicides — children of Gregory Peck, James Arness, Mary Tyler Moore, Paul Newman and others.

On the same note, Granger said everything in Christina Crawford's well-publicized book *Mommie*

Dearest was probably true. Fortunately, Granger said she never felt the pressures experienced by most children who grew up in Hollywood. However, she did witness the tragic effects Hollywood movie moguls had on the lives of their stars.

These moguls shaped women and men into stars, but the stars were forced to live by their rules, Granger remembered. When screen star Kim Novak was seeing Sammy Davis Jr., the affair caused such an uproar that Columbia Studio tycoon Harry Cohn is thought to have arranged an accident that resulted in the loss of Davis' eye, she said.

"Conventional movies reflect American culture," Granger said. "Hollywood's job was to make you believe what you saw on screen. Hollywood has always sold illusion — I tend to think it disappeared with the advent of the computer age and special effects."

"Today, Hollywood is more concerned with man's weaknesses. I believe it has lost some of its appeal. When the public was able to look behind the scenes, movies lost some of their magic."

"The only thing constant about Hollywood is change," Granger con-

tinued. Granger is an entertainment critic for WICC in Connecticut and WMCA in New York. She has also written articles for *Redbook*, *Family Circle*, *Cosmopolitan* and *The New York Times*. She is in the process of gathering research for her first non-fiction book, which she plans to title "Gossip."

"I've had a wonderful life," Granger told her audience during a question and answer session following lunch at the Hilton.

"It's a wonderful boot camp," she said about Hollywood.

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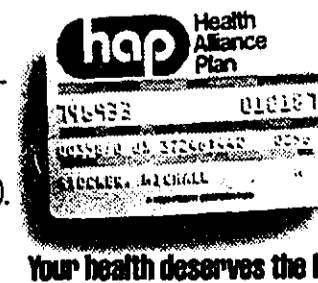

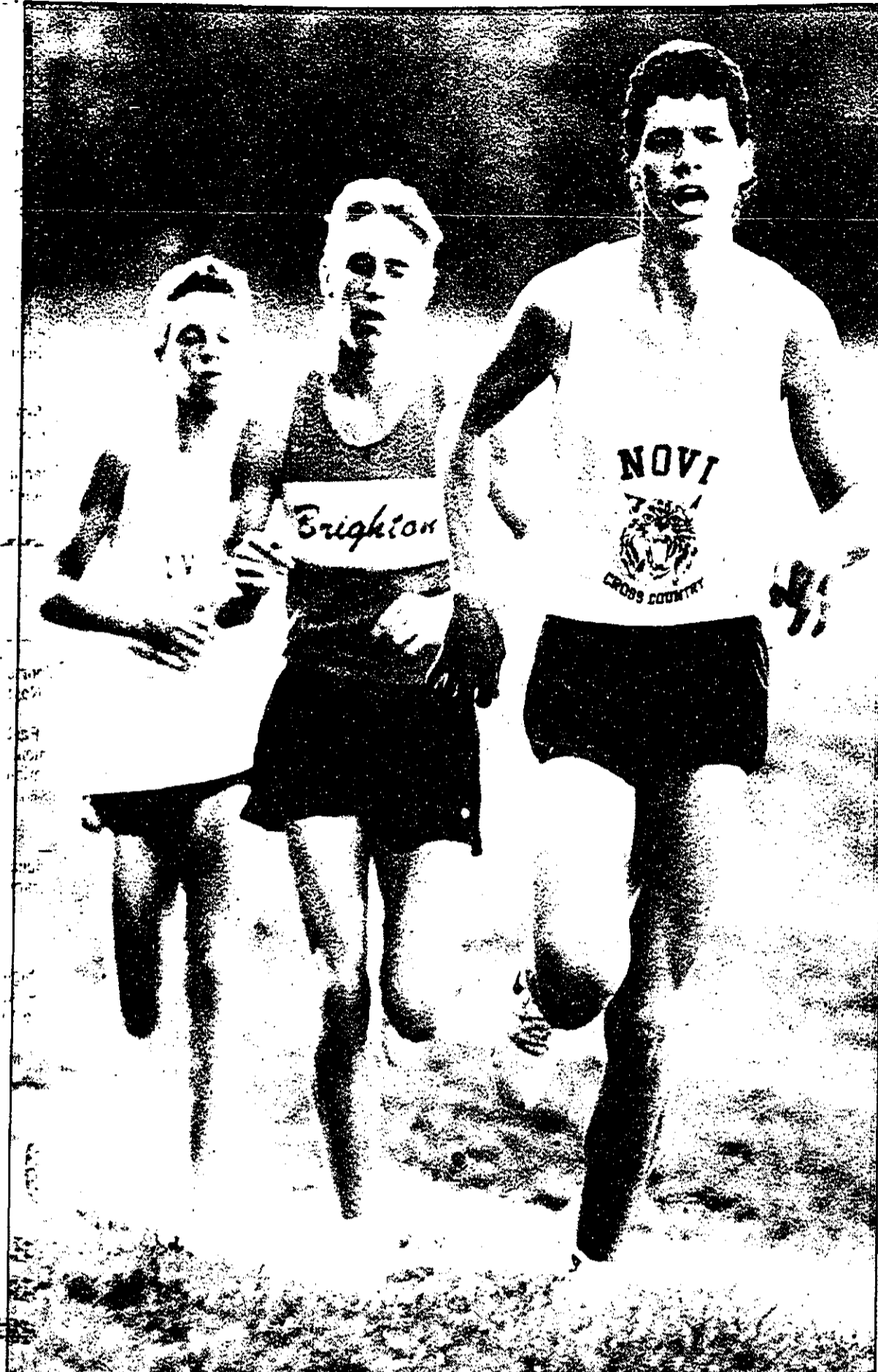

## Surgery benefits active seniors

Dr. William Myers knows that seniors today are more active than ever.

An ophthalmologist, Myers is director of the Michigan EyeCare Institute. He earned his medical degree from the University of Michigan; cataract surgery is one of his specialties.

And one of his professional objectives is to help seniors maintain active lifestyles. So far, the oldest patient he has seen for cataract surgery is 106. Another patient was 70 years old and active in a bowling league. "Chronology has very little to do with it as far as I'm concerned," he said. "Seniors are the kind of people who benefit the most. Their expectations are greatly increased in terms of what they want to achieve in life."

When Myers was a resident, "magic numbers" were used to determine when cataract surgery was needed. "The concentration now," he said, "is on something called visual needs."

Myers uses several criteria in determining whether surgery is called for. The first is that there be a cataract. A second or third opinion can be called for to determine that.

At birth, the lens in each eye is clear, except for those with congenital conditions. As some people age, the lens becomes cloudy. That is a cataract.

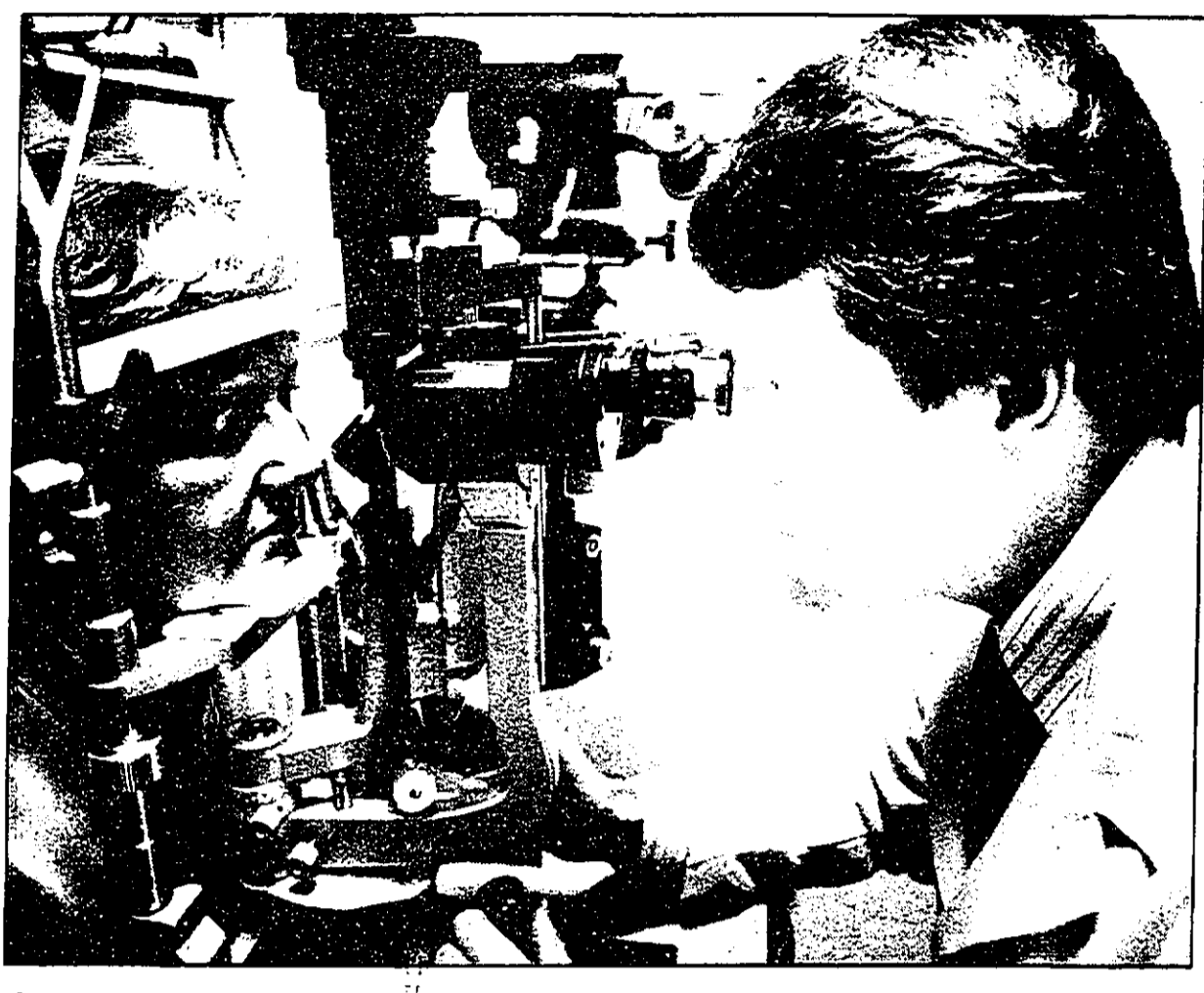
In deciding whether to perform surgery, Myers determines if the cataract is causing the problem. A visometer test — in which light is projected onto the back of the eye on the retina — can assess beforehand the outcome of the surgery.

Myers also asks if the patient is bothered by the loss of vision. "That's where this tremendous variability comes in," he said.

Cataracts are more common among older adults, although they can affect younger people as well.

"The method of removing the cataract has changed a great deal," he said. Myers and his colleagues prefer ultra-sound removal — a procedure in which a tiny incision is made and the cataract is dissolved with sound waves and removed.

From the doctor's standpoint, cataract surgery has become increasingly complex and difficult. "The equipment is tremendously expensive and complex, and requires a support team (including nurses and technicians)," Myers said.

and complex, and requires a support team (including nurses and technicians)," Myers said.

But for patients, the surgery isn't at all difficult, he added. "From the patient's standpoint, it seems tremendously simple. And they're seeing very quickly."

After surgery, patients can do pretty much what they want. Myers has had patients go bowling or golfing the day after surgery.

Indicators of cataracts include a general blurring of vision. Some patients don't have that problem, but are bothered by glare from sunlight or headlights.

Those patients are often able to read the eye chart in the doctor's office, but have vision problems elsewhere.

Cataract surgery is done one eye at a time instead of both eyes at once.

Myers said he generally waits four to eight weeks after doing one eye before operating on the second, although surgery is sometimes done sooner for those who have traveled a distance.

"He said complications are rare, but advised that it's best to wait and be sure the first eye is perfect before operating on the second eye."

Cataract surgery, which has made great progress in recent years, goes back centuries. A technique used many years ago known as "couching" involved poking a sharp instrument into the eye to push the cataract back.

More than 50 years ago — in the pre-surgery stage — cataract surgery involved extensive bed rest for the patient. A patient was surrounded by sand bags on the bed to keep him or her from moving. After sutures came

about, that was not necessary. Myers calls the early 1970s the "golden years" of eye surgery. Lens implants were worked on, as were other areas. "A whole host of lasers have come out in the intervening time," he said.

Myers also said the field of eye surgery will continue to be refined. It is possible that an injectable lens will become available. The procedure currently is being studied with animals.

Another type of lens being developed allows the patient to focus on objects both near and far away, but it isn't something you can ask for right now, said Myers.

If approved by the Food and Drug Administration, that lens, which works similar to bifocals, could become available in a year or two, according to Myers.

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## Trackin' the 'Cats

When Novi takes on Traverse City in the MHSAA Class A football semifinals this Saturday (Nov. 19), the Wildcats will be going up against one of the state's top grid programs.

The site of the match-up — originally scheduled for Jackson's Whittington Stadium — has been switched to Grand Rapids' Houseman Field (capacity 10,000) because of travel considerations. Game time will be 1:30 p.m.

Under coach Jim Ooley, the Trojans have a stellar 196-31-4 record in 22 seasons, including a pair of state titles in 1985 and 1992. This year the squad is 11-0, ranked number two in the state and in the top 20 nationally.

Traverse City has the third largest enrollment of any high school in the State of Michigan with 2,918 students — nearly three times the size of Novi. And that means the Trojans should be in much better shape depth-wise.

Offensively, Traverse City is led by fullback Mike Nadlicki, a 6-foot-2, 215-pounder who has gained over 1,000 yards this season despite missing one game. The team's number two runner Bill Cannon is injured and questionable for the game.

Defensively, Ooley relies a lot on a trio of seniors who have two years of starting experience. They are nose guard Nathan Alger (5-5, 165), tackle Mike Springer (5-9, 170) and back Kelly Clark (5-11, 165). As a unit, the Trojan defense is a lot like Novi — small but extremely quick. In a four-game span late in the season, Traverse City allowed just 10 total points.

"(Traverse City) has a great reputation and they platoon their players — nobody plays both ways," Novi Coach John Osborne said. "We're up against great tradition and a force in high school football in this state."

**INJURY REPORT:** When giant two-way lineman Bob Ahrens (6-foot-3, 245-pounds) was injured late in the second half against Monroe, Novi's chances against Traverse City this weekend may have suffered a blow as well.

Ahrens' injury was diagnosed as a severe shoulder bruise and even though X-rays didn't indicate a separation or a break, his status for this weekend remains day-to-day.

In the meantime, fellow two-way lineman Darin Johnson, who suffered a severely bruised hip against Okemos in the first round of the playoffs, will be back. Johnson didn't even suit up for the Monroe clash and even though he is expected to play, his effectiveness remains a question mark.

Sophomore defensive back Jason Wladischkin, who started the first seven games of 1988 but has missed the last four with a broken collarbone, may be back as well. According to Novi Trainer Randy Perrin, Wladischkin was fitted with a special pad and is expected to suit up Saturday.

LET IT RAIN: The Wildcat gridder has now staged three dramatic victories in the rain. That's why nobody could blame Novi Coach John Osborne if during halftime he tried to coax Mother Nature for some moisture with a little rain dance.

If he did, it worked because a steady stream of rain started to fall early in the second half, helping the 'Cats rebound from the 15-0 halftime deficit.

"I don't know what to say about that except we seem to play better than our opponents in the rain," Osborne said. "When we were down by 15 at the half and it started raining, I knew we had (Monroe) where we wanted them," he laughed.

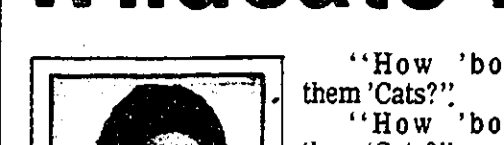

Novi football mentor John Osborne kept saying it over and over again after his team had stunned Monroe 16-15 to advance to the Class A semifinals.

To get an idea just how massive the Monroe team is, 13 players on the roster weighed in at 200-pounds plus. Novi has four in that category and just one starter. At first glance, it looked like a college team against a high school team, but the Wildcat players were never intimidated, even when they fell behind by two touchdowns.

Heading into the game at Jackson's Whittington Stadium Saturday, nobody gave the 'Cats much of a chance. One KVC coach said privately that they couldn't win, and a Detroit Free Press writer called the team "No-way Novi." At first glance, many Novi backers probably thought the same thing because the huge Monroe players dwarfed many of the Wildcats.

Trojan coach Rich Jeric really believed his team was good enough to take its first-ever state football title back to Monroe, and nobody was arguing with him prior to the game. Jeric was overcome with grief as he talked to the media after the game while choking back tears and stumbling on every word.

"We talked about not having a let down in the second half, but obviously (Novi) found something in our defensive line and they exploited it," Jeric said. "Their backs — particularly Scott Wladischkin — ran very hard. I think John Osborne did a fantastic job of preparing for us. They shut us down in the second half."

The victory gave the Wildcats 10 wins on the season — the most in school history. Osborne's troops are now just two victories away from a state Class A title — another first. By advancing to the playoff semifinals, Novi is now one of just two Kensington Valley Conference teams to get this far — ever. Lakeland went to the semis in 1982, but never to win just one game to do it back in the old playoff format.

Jeric probably said it best — "Novi's little guys sure do a good job."

the game," Osborne said. "They don't size up a team before hand. It doesn't matter to them how big or how fast the opponent is."

"But we're a better team than people give us credit for. We're a good team, and we play well together."

The Monroe wishbone offense opened the game in high gear, putting two quick touchdowns on the board. One came on a 57-yard run and the other followed a costly Novi turnover. The 'Cats threatened just before the end of the first half but came away empty-handed and thoroughly dominated.

But the second half was a complete turnaround as Novi started to control things. Superstar runningback Scott Wladischkin broke loose for two 50-yard plus runs. And also helped the 'Cats tally a pair of two-point conversions to cap the victory.

The Trojans managed just four first downs in the second half and never really threatened. Amazingly, it was another second half shutout for the Wildcat defense in the MHSAA playoffs.

"It's just a matter of persevering and having faith in each other on defense," Osborne explained. "These kids don't know how to give up. It was another great, great effort."

After receiving the opening kick, Monroe started at its own 35 and needed just five plays to score. Runningback Rod Purkey went off tackle for a 57-yard touchdown, and then ran in for a two-point conversion and an 8-0 lead.

On the first play of the second quarter, a bad snap on a punt gave the Trojans possession at the Novi 14. Three plays later Purkey made it 15-0 from a yard out. Monroe had another prime opportunity to add to the score when fullback Joel Scheffer coughed up the ball inside the Novi 25. When the defense stiffened, Lee Baird attempted a 23-yard field goal which was blocked by Ahrens.

Novi's only scoring opportunity in the half came with less than a minute left. Brian Daniels blocked a Monroe punt setting the 'Cats up on the nine, but four plays netted just seven yards before time expired.

In the first half, Novi had just one first down and 36 yards of total offense.

The same two teams came back on the field for the second half, but the results were entirely different. Maybe the Wildcats made the correct adjustments in the locker room or

maybe the Trojans were overconfident and suffered a let down. For whatever reason, Novi started to control the line of scrimmage and get back into the game.

A 32-yard run by Wladischkin was the key gain in a four-play, 77-yard drive that was capped off by quarterback Ken Hendrian's one-yard sneak. Wladischkin then hit tight end Mike Yankowski on a halfback-option pass for the two-point conversion.

The score remained 15-8 until Wladischkin reeled off another stunning run early in the fourth quarter. The senior speedster broke through the line on a counter play and raced 57 yards for the score. He then added a two-point conversion run with 11:51 left on the clock to add what proved to be the margin of victory.

"What a great one Scottie is," Osborne said. "He's got to get a (college) scholarship. He's a great kid and a great player."

Monroe moved into Wildcat territory two more times in the game, but came away empty-handed both times. With about eight minutes left, the Trojans failed to convert a fourth-and-one situation at the 47. The game ended with Monroe inside the Novi 40.

"We wanted to run wide in the game and try to spread (Monroe) out defensively, but we kept slipping on the turf," Osborne said. "At halftime, we decided we needed to counter them — aim one way and go back the other. That's the way to handle big physical teams. We've never seen size like that."

For the game, Wladischkin carried the ball 15 times for 142 yards. He outdukked Purkey (123 yards on 22 attempts). On the other hand, Hendrian had a rough day with one complete pass in five tries for two yards — and that surprised even Osborne.

"I thought, we'd need to pass some to stay in the game, but our defense hung tough and gave our offense a chance," he said. "In the first half, our defense was on the field too long and that takes its toll. You take away the 80-yard run and the punt snap error and we shut them out."

Defensively, five 'Cats had at least four first hits. Tackle Todd Gronowski led the way with five solos and seven assists, while Ahrens had five solos and four assists before he left the game in the fourth quarter with an injured shoulder.

"I thought the second half would be ours because of our size advantage," said Monroe Coach Rich Jeric.

## Fitness Tips

### Colds are nothing to sneeze about

As the gentle breezes of fall give way to the more ornery winds of winter, more and more of us are faced with the most common of villains — the cold.

Myths abound about the whys and hows of the common cold, and, of course, about what to do to prevent it, how to treat it once you have it and why it is you're never safe from this ubiquitous invader of our bodies.

**CAUSE:** Curiously enough, the agents of cause for most colds are called rhino viruses (perhaps because they make you feel 50 pounds heavier than that beast itself.)

Transmission of these viruses can take place through a variety of avenues, but according to a recent study from the University of Wisconsin, the most common cause in adults is a result of airborne transmission. Children, on the other hand, tend to be more susceptible to direct contact.

**PREVENTING COLDS:** Since there is little we can do about it once we have a cold, the sensible thing is to try to prevent those "rhinos" from trampling us in the first place. Precautions include the following:

□ Wash your hands frequently, especially if you are around a carrier, and avoid touching your nose or eyes.

□ Dispose of used tissues properly. □ Don't share objects that may come in contact with your face (utensils, phones, etc.) with someone who has a cold.

□ Tea with honey, which may bring relief to a sore throat; □ Saltwater gargles (¼ teaspoon of salt in 8 ounces of warm water) may also be soothing to a sore throat.

**COMMON MISCONCEPTIONS:** When should I see a doctor? There is nothing a doctor can do for a cold virus. Some symptoms, however, indicate the necessity of professional help: an oral temperature above 103 degrees or a fever above 100 degrees that lasts more than three days generally indicate that something other than just a cold is involved.

Should I increase fluid intake? Fluids may ease a dry throat and make you feel better but drink only as much as you want.

Do wet feet, drafts and overexposure cause colds? No, in order to catch a cold you must come in contact with a virus. There may be some connection in susceptibility to viruses and the role of drafts, chills and wet feet but nothing has proven this to be the case.

Should I continue to exercise if I have a cold? Listen to your body, if you feel up to exercise, go ahead. However, it is not possible to "sweat it out" of your system as many people believe. A break of two or three days in your program will not significantly set you back if you're not feeling up to it.

**COMMON SENSE:** In the long run the best approach to dealing effectively with a cold is to use common sense. There are no cures for it and the remedies available may help relieve symptoms but the virus itself must run its course. If you are able to function quite normally with minor irritation, great.

If, on the other hand, you feel miserable and cannot bear to face the world, then stay at home.
