## School earns state honors

Novi Middle School is one of only 10 middle schools in the state to receive a 1988-89 Michigan Exemplary School Recognition award. School officials will receive the award during a ceremony in Lansing next month.

Middle School Principal Charles Nanas, who had known his school was a finalist in the program, said he learned of the award last Thursday morning.

But because he had heard nothing about winning the previous day — the day on which all winners were to be notified — he thought the school hadn't placed.

"No news is bad news, I thought," Nanas recalled.

Adding to his temporary disappointment was finding out Wednesday that Walled Lake's Clifford H. Smart Junior High also had been designated as one of the state's top middle schools.

"When I heard that, I just went into my office with a cup of coffee. I was really down," said Nanas. "Then about 10 minutes later I got the call."

He said the state official in charge of notifying the winning schools had not finished contacting the list of winners the previous day.

Not only was Nanas pleasantly surprised by the turn of events, but he was also pleased to learn that the team of educators who had evaluated the school two weeks ago found Novi Middle School to be an even better school than its application seemed to indicate, Nanas said.

All schools in the state may apply for the honor by completing a comprehensive self-evaluation form. As a result, it is necessary for the state to send a team of evaluators to the participating schools to verify the application's facts.

Nanas said the on-site visitors stated his school to be much stronger than at first implied, saying the application "didn't do justice" to the real thing.

## 'Dear Mikhail' Students write Soviet leader

Somewhere halfway across the world in a place called Armenia, there are tens of thousands of children suffering in the wake of one of this century's most devastating earthquakes.

Here, in the City of Novi, a group of children are asking why, and want to know how they can help.

At Novi Meadows School there is a lot of concern and sympathy for the current Armenian situation, especially in Laura Clamin's fifth grade class.

Two weeks ago, when reports of the quake — which by latest estimates has taken 55,000 lives — were first known, the youngsters had a lot of questions about the tragedy that was so hard to fathom.

And as the story became clearer to the world, it became clearer to Clamin's students that they must do something. It was decided they would write to Soviet leader Mikhail Gorbachev, and take up a money collection. Through the letters they hoped to learn of other avenues of support the Soviet people need.

"When my teacher told me about it, we really looked into it," said Carrie Sheridan, a student who admitted to watching television coverage of the event. "Several towns were destroyed. I didn't know earthquakes could do that."

John Weaver was upset to see on the news that people were found dead under the rubble, and asked in his letter what Gorbachev was going to do about it.

Another, Denise Race, was more distraught over the fact that people were still alive underneath the destruction, and that thousands were left homeless. She, too, wanted to know what Gorbachev was going to do about it.

Ironically, the seven students had been studying earthquakes as part of their science class. But when the tragedy in Armenia struck, there was little else they would talk about. The students felt so strongly, said Clamin, that they spent the better part of two days writing the letters and printing them out on computers.

## Novi woman kidnapped and raped

A 33-year-old Novi woman reported that she was abducted by an unknown assailant as she was entering her car in the Goat Farm parking lot Sunday night, robbed, taken to a rural Oakland County area and raped repeatedly.

The woman was released by her assailant on Beck Road between Pontiac Trail and West Road in Wixom on Monday, Dec. 19, at approximately 8 a.m.

According to reports, she walked to a residence on West Road where she telephoned a friend who took her to the Novi Police Department to file a report.

Novi Police Captain Richard Faulkner said the woman arrived at the police station at approximately 9:49 a.m.

The incident is being investigated

jointly by Novi police and the Oakland County Sheriff's Department. Faulkner said the abduction and robbery are being investigated by Novi police, while the sheriff's department is investigating the rape because it is believed to have occurred outside of Novi's jurisdiction.

Faulkner said the woman told police she had left her car in the parking lot of the Goat Farm Tavern on Novi Road to go shopping with a friend. They returned to the parking lot between 8 and 8:30 p.m. Sunday, where the friend dropped her off and drove away.

The woman said she was approached from behind as she was walking to her car by an unknown male who placed a hard object in her back and forced her to get into his vehicle. The victim described

## Council rejects auto dealership

No Christmas present for Joe Dwyer — not from the Novi City Council anyway.

Council members Monday turned down a request for an ordinance amendment that would have paved the way for a new Dwyer Volvo dealership to be located at the southwest corner of Grand River and Meadowbrook Road.

After a lengthy debate that involved dozens of speakers from the audience, the council voted 4-1 to deny a vital amendment to the Non-Center Commercial (NCC) zoning classification. Had the amendment been approved, Dwyer could have proceeded with the reasonable expectation that the project could get approval.

Dwyer acknowledged after the meeting that plans for the corner are now "dead," though he may come back with a similar proposal in a different district. (See related story.)

Residents from the Meadowbrook Glens subdivision, adjacent to the corner, were countered by several Dwyer supporters, who voiced their approval of bringing the dealership here.

"Novi has been very generous in the way they have encouraged small entrepreneurs and strip malls," said Ron Ward, a local automotive consultant. "Novi needs core businesses... the Dwyers are a core business."

"We're small enough to be a good neighbor," Dwyer said during his presentation to the council.

Other speakers complimented Dwyer on his corporate citizenship and integrity as a small businessman. Dwyer's current business, on Seven Mile and Grand River, has been in operation there

for over 30 years. He was named a "Dealer of Excellence" in 1987.

Residents opposed to the dealership said that Dwyer's reputation was not the issue.

"Joe Dwyer and his family are fine people," said John O'Brien, owner of the O'Brien Funeral Home, near the proposed development. "But we serve a lot of families in Novi at very sad times... we don't want to hear a loudspeaker calling for someone's used car."

"I would like to have Mr. Dwyer as a neighbor, but I don't want his dealership as a neighbor," said Meadowbrook Glens resident Micki Juip.

Residents objected to the potential traffic, light and noise problems the dealership could cause near Meadowbrook Glens.

## Merchants report double digit increases

Local malls could close out one of their most fruitful shopping seasons ever in 1988, as the Christmas rush winds to a close over the next few days.

Twelve Oaks Mall officials are predicting "double digit" increases over last year, while similar performances are expected down the street at the Novi Town Center.

Specific figures probably won't be available until January, said Twelve Oaks Mall General Manager Phil Morosco.

"It appears to be better from what we had last year," Morosco said. "Depending on the last week, we're looking at double digit increases."

Morosco said that's due to an extra shopping day, in addition to increased consumer spending and relatively stable economic conditions. Christmas falls on a Sunday this year, opening up an extra shopping Saturday, plus an extra Friday night.

A Taubman Company study released in early December found that the average Twelve Oaks Mall shopper allotted \$709 in Christmas

cash, for an average shopping list of 13 people.

Taubman Company is the firm that operates the Twelve Oaks Mall. The survey was based on 569 responding shoppers at metro-area Taubman malls — with 133 coming from Twelve Oaks.

The study also found that:  
□ Almost one-third of those polled said they wouldn't be finished until Christmas Eve.

□ About 41 percent said they were putting their emphasis on "fun" gifts this year. Only 32 percent of the Detroit-area shoppers polled felt that way.

□ The average number of people on the gift list for Twelve Oaks shoppers was 12.6. The area average was 13.1.

□ The average gift amounted to about \$61 per person for Novi mall shoppers, while the areawide average was slightly less — \$54.96.

□ The number of shopping trips for the Novi and other shoppers was about the same — 5.7.

The survey also found that shoppers who made out lists were more likely to overspend their budgets and that women had a harder time shopping for their husbands than their mothers.

Town Center officials are predicting heavy sales throughout the Christmas season — their first real season since a restructuring of the mall with an emphasis on upscale tenants has been completed.

Trammell Crow Marketing Consultant Linda Anderson said the Town Center is offering advantages over enclosed malls because there is a higher turnover of parking spaces and more readily accessible, diverse stores to choose from.

# School officials stress 'holidays'

According to local school officials, your child may or may not have had a "holiday" party before the December break.

But one thing is for sure — regardless of your child's faith, he or she shouldn't feel left out of the festivities — that is, whatever festivities there are.

In a policy move that isn't exactly engraved in stone, Novi schools have been toning down the emphasis on "Christmas" per se. Instead officials are focusing on a "holiday" theme with perhaps some "winter" angles thrown into parties, celebrations and presentations of the season.

All of this is an effort, say educators, to recognize and respect the fact that not all the district's children celebrate Christ's birthday.

"We call ours a 'holiday' break, not a Christmas break," said Novi High School Principal Robert Youngberg. "We're careful not to offend anyone as best we can."

Assistant Superintendent William Barr agreed, saying that since there is no official policy on the matter — except for a ban on live trees because of a fire hazard — each school uses its own judgment. And that often means avoiding parties altogether.

"Many people would not consider (parties) a learning experience," he said.

Novi Middle School has one of those no-party policies, said Principal Charles Nanas. "We lose precious instructional time, and there's not enough time as it is."

If parties occur, they happen after school, he added.

Christmas trees are also not allowed inside the middle school, he said, although seasonal decorations are found throughout the building. Nanas said the practices have come from a

lot of "soul searching" and input from staff.

"The staff recognizes that we're not a 100 percent Christian community. We try to be fair and sensitive to the fact that we live in a pluralistic society," he said.

He cited one Michigan school district — in the city of Okemos where officials prohibited any reference to Santa Claus. "They caught a lot of grief for that," he said. "Eventually it (the policy) got revoked."

While Nanas says school officials have no intention of eliminating Christmas from the environment, "We don't play it up big either." He said the school's vocal and instrumental bands playing Hanukkah songs is an example of trying to include more than just one faith in the holiday spirit.

One school which does allow parties is Orchard Hills Elementary. Principal Paul LePae said his staff "doesn't go heavy on Christmas or Santa" either, but they do have "holiday" parties for the kindergartners through fourth-graders.

LePae, like the other school officials interviewed, said he had never encountered any religious problems during this time of year.

Neither have Novi High School's Claudine DeLazzer, 16, and Jennifer Warnick, 15, seen any such problems. They said that although students aren't really supposed to have parties, they do anyway.

"They're called 'educational experiences,'" said DeLazzer. She continued, "But kids love any kind of party. It doesn't matter what religion you are."

"A lot of Jewish kids celebrate Christmas anyway — it's so commercial," she added. "I sit by a Jewish boy in class, and we talk about Christmas all the time."

# City stands fast against charges of discrimination

Several city officials have been subpoenaed to give depositions in the Karen Koester lawsuit, with both sides saying they won't accept a settlement.

Assistant City Manager Craig Klaver and Police Captain Richard Faulkner are both scheduled to give depositions Jan. 17 in Livonia, as fact-finding in the five-month-old case continues.

Koester gave birth to a nine pound, six ounce baby girl Nov. 4. She is suing the city and the police department for several counts of alleged sexual discrimination, after a dispute over maternity leave.

Koester, a seven year veteran of the force and second-ever female Novi police officer, is due back to work in early January.

Koester sued the police department and Chief Lee BeGole in Oakland County Circuit Court July 27. She has alleged that police officials ordered her to take an unpaid leave of absence during her pregnancy and refused to allow her light-duty assignments instead of the time-off.

Koester's attorney, Jamil "Jim" Akhtar, said she has suffered loss of wages and benefits, plus loss of seniority and promotional opportunities because of the alleged forced leave.

"We don't burden the public with frivolous lawsuits," Akhtar said. "That's why we're going ahead with it — we feel she has a great chance of winning."

Akhtar estimated damages at about \$15,000 for Koester's time off. He said Koester was forced to secure her own health insurance during the duration of her pregnancy — which normally would have come with her patrol officer's benefit package.

Klaver said the city is unlikely to make any settlement offer before Koester comes back to work.

"We wouldn't even entertain an offer," he said in an interview last week. "We don't feel there is much of a case there."

The lawsuit alleges Koester was "summarily" ordered to take a leave of absence when informing her superiors about her pregnancy. The suit alleges that it is a "custom" for male officers in the department to receive light-duty assignments after injuries.

The city has denied both of those charges.

The suit charges BeGole and the police department with violations of the Michigan Elliott-Larsen Civil Rights Act, which is designed to prevent employers from discriminating on the basis of sex. The suit also charges a violation of the Michigan Handicappers Civil Rights Act.

The city has also denied those charges.

City attorneys have also charged that Koester failed to exhaust her union remedies before taking the leave of absence. The city response said Koester voluntarily went off the payroll in July, after her accrued vacation time was used up.

The case has been assigned to Circuit Court Judge Gene Schmelz.

# Novi set to mark birthday

City officials may plan a 20th birthday party for the City of Novi next year, when the city reaches a historical milestone.

Feb. 12, 1969 is officially the city's 20th "birthday." Council members discussed such a party Monday night, at the recommendation of Council Member Joseph Toth.

"It would be nice to let some people in on the City of Novi," Toth said. "We've had such an influx of people in the last 10 years, and I don't know that a lot of them have had an opportunity to find out much about Novi."

Toth recommended a birthday party and open house early next year, the creation of a city history book and taped interviews with some of the "old time" residents of the community.

That list includes Police Chief Lee BeGole, Captain Richard Faulkner, Leo Harrawood, Tom Marcus, City Attorney David Fried and Asa Smith.

Mayor Matthew Quinn said the idea had been considered for a few weeks.

"We're going to have a real shindig," Quinn said. "We haven't really looked at any firm dates... but it looks as if we could do something special for the 20th birthday."

Toth recommended that the city hold the birthday party/open house on a Saturday at the Novi Civic Center. Quinn said more details will probably be available in the next few weeks.

Novi became a city Feb. 12, 1969, when voters turned out to approve a city charter by a 629-283 margin. City officials actually didn't replace Novi Village officers until Feb. 24, when they were sworn in at the first official city council meeting.

# Dwyer to seek another location FYI

Detroit car dealer Joe Dwyer said after the Novi City Council meeting Monday that his plans for the Grand River Meadowbrook Road corner are "dead," but that another Novi location isn't yet out of the question. Dwyer said he may attempt to locate in an industrial-zone section, or may simply take his proposal to Wixom or Commerce Township.

"If the people of Novi don't want me, then I don't want them," Dwyer said in a brief interview after the marathon council session. He later said he would consider a move into an industrial area, which would require a similar ordinance revision — like the one that failed Monday — or a substantial variance from the Zoning Board of Appeals (ZBA).

"Novi, on Grand River, is a natural for car dealerships," Dwyer said. "All small dealerships in Detroit are now locating out in the suburbs."

The Monday denial caps over one-and-a-half years of wrangling over whether or not car dealerships should be allowed in the Non-Center Commercial (NCC) district. That district was designed in 1985, in part, to combat a slew of new strip mall developments throughout the city and place emphasis on smaller, less intense types of commercial developments.

After the Monday meeting, Dwyer charged that certain city officials gave him assurances that the project could be located at the corner.

"I was led to believe that it could go on that corner," he said. "Your mayor, your planner and your city manager told me that."

Mayor Matthew Quinn said he never told Dwyer that, although he said he did inform the car dealer of the specific process he would have

to follow.

"I never made such a representation to him and I doubt very seriously anyone else did," Quinn said.

Quinn also denied claims that the city council was attempting to "push" through the car dealership provision. The council had sent the proposal back to the planning commission three times and each time planners flatly rejected it.

"The idea that council was trying to 'push' this through is an untruth," Quinn said. He said the city council sought the "highest ordinance possible," which was the reason for shipping it back to the planners three different times.

The Novi Planning Commission rejected Dwyer's plans by an 8-0 vote Dec. 7, while criticizing the council for continually sending it back to them for reconsideration.

The bottom line is that they haven't demonstrated that there is a need for change," said Meadowbrook Glens Homeowners Association President-Elect Susan Goers.

Several council members concurred.

"I'm not going to support it and it's not from a NIMBY (not in my backyard, you don't!) approach," said Council Member Edward Leininger. "This is a paper thin or-

inance. (City Planning Consultant Brandon Rogers) did a good job with it, but there are still too many things allowed."

"The basic intent (of NCC) was for a low intensity use — get rid of the strip malls," said Mayor Matthew Quinn. "We want a low intensity use."

Quinn said a revision to the NCC classification could open up additional properties to potential car dealerships — including one across the street from the Grand River/Meadowbrook Road site.

"I'm not sure that this policy-making body would commit to the possibility of that — another dealership across the street," Quinn added. "It's going to create problems for us."

After a motion by Council Member Joe Toth to table the request to Jan. 23 failed to garner a second, the request to amend the ordinance was denied by a 4-1 vote.

Quinn, Leininger and Council Members Nancy Covert and Ronald Watson voted to deny the amend-

ment. Toth cast the lone dissenting vote. Toth said he feared a more intense usage at the corner in the future.

Council Members Hugh Crawford and Martha Hoyer — thought to be supporters of the Dwyer project — were both excused from the meeting Monday.

Crawford had a family matter to attend, while Hoyer was excused early from the meeting under doctor's orders, Quinn said.

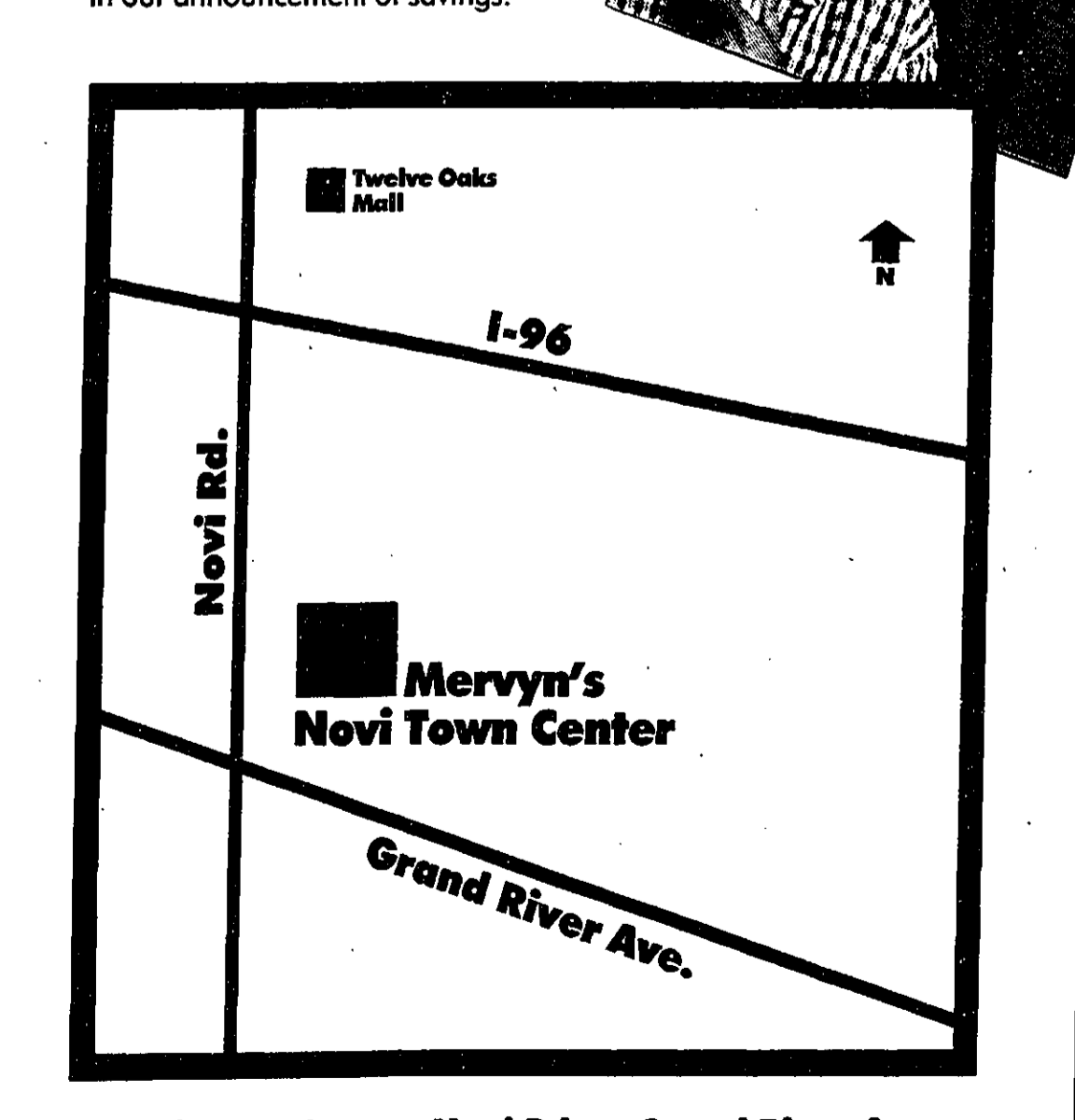

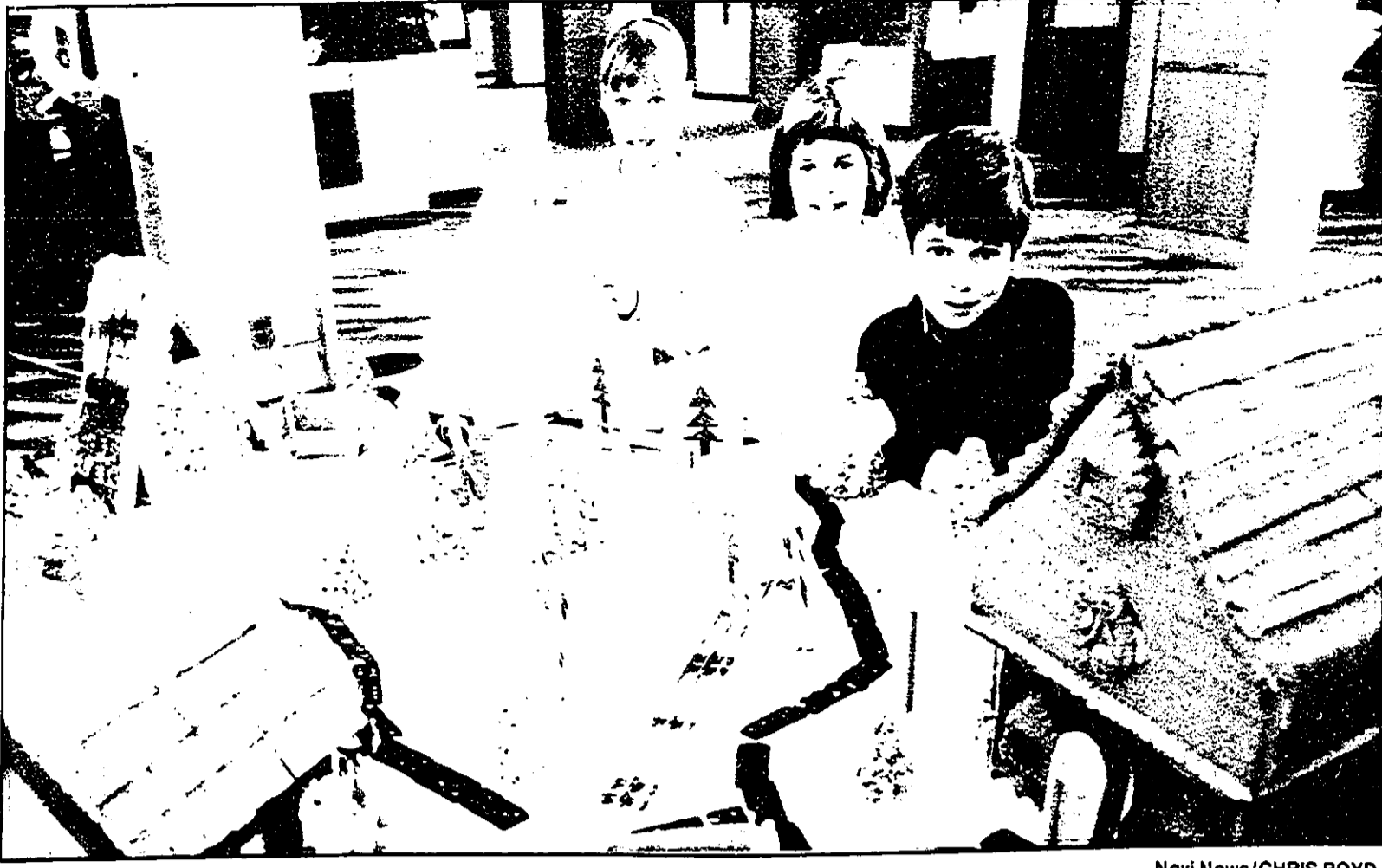

# Three Novi sites on state contamination report

Novi has three sites of environmental contamination, the Michigan Department of Natural Resources (DNR) has announced. The DNR publishes a "proposed" list in the fall, takes public comment, then comes up with a final listing in the spring. That listing is forwarded to the governor and state legislature for funding recommendations.

The sites are divided into "Group 1" and "Group 2" sites. The Group 1 sites are judged to be more seriously in need of attention. They are scored between zero and 2,000 — with 2,000 being in the most urgent need of care. The Group 2 sites are scored from 1-15, based on possible risk to the environment. Group 2 sites scoring "9" or over are re-evaluated, given a new priority number, and included on the Group 1 listings.

The Munn's landfill site is located north of Ten Mile and west of Meadowbrook Road, under the Meadowbrook Glass subdivision. There are actually three landfills located in the area, some of which accepted refuse in the 1950s and '60s, before many more stringent landfilling laws were put in place.

Problems were last recorded at the site in 1981 and 1982, when materials

Environmental Response Act (MERA) — which requires identification, risk assessment and prioritization of the sites.

Problems were last recorded at the site in 1981 and 1982, when materials

bubbled out of a portion of the old landfill and collected in a roadside ditch.

One resident also recorded a "gassy smell" in his basement around the same time, although no other complaints are on record in DNR files. That smell turned out to be a small concentration of methane gas, which is a by-product of trash decay.

The DNR last evaluated the site in August, 1984. It was given a "7" rating, with "air" as the potentially affected resource.

The Anderson landfill site on Eight Mile between Napier and Garfield Road accepted trash between 1966-70, according to DNR files.

The 31-acre landfill was cited for a number of violations in its four-year history, according to the DNR. In 1968 it began accepting liquid wastes, paint residues, thinners and solvents. There are conflicting reports over whether or not the landfill was ever actually capped when it ceased operations, though no groundwater contamination has been detected.

The DNR listed the site as capped for several years, although Novi officials insist that proper closure was never performed.

The site was given an "8" rating, and was last reviewed by the DNR in October 1985. The DNR views the site as a strong candidate for future contamination.

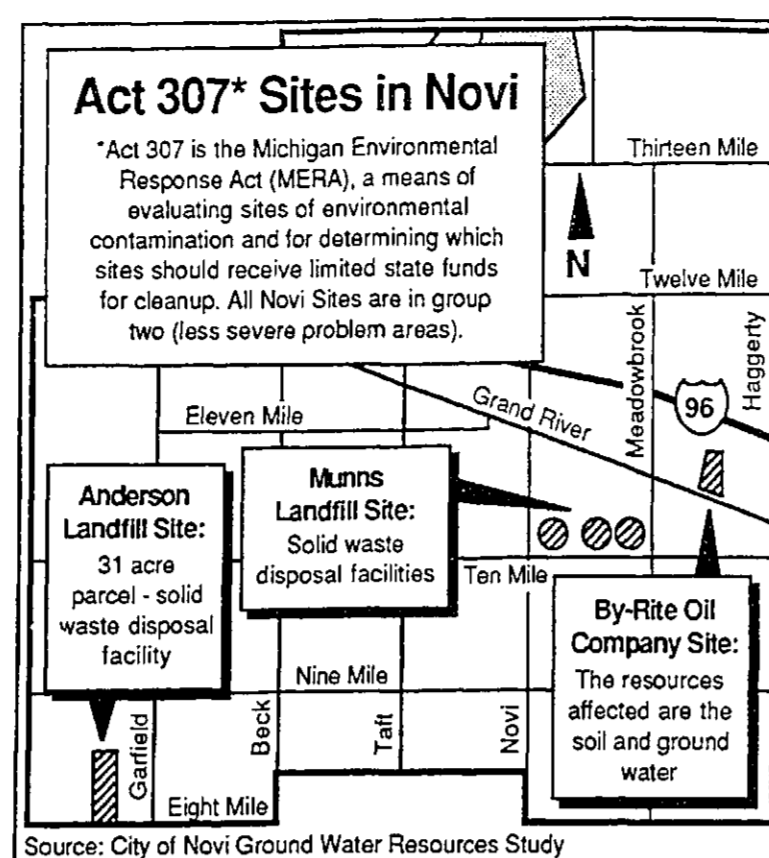
The By-Rite Oil Co. on Grand River is also on the Group 2 lists. The site is listed for possible soil and groundwater contamination, though research work is still ongoing.

The site was scored as an "8," with the last DNR action occurring in August 1986.

A landfill at the Ford Wixom plant was listed as a Group 2 in October 1987, for possible groundwater contamination. The old landfill contained barrels of paint residues possibly left over the 1950s, according to Ford spokesman Jerome Amber. The barrels were discovered during construction of an improved waste water treatment system, he said. It was scored as an "8." Ford has been cleaning the area up since 1986, Amber said.

Files weren't available this week on the Wixom Unocal station, which was added this year as a Group 1 site. DNR officials did not return phone calls about the Unocal site.

The gas station scored a "730" on the lists.

## Developer finds waiting market for retail space

When Ralph Stoy and his partners in GDR and Associates considered creating new retail space in Milford Village, they followed their gut feelings that the area was on the leading edge of development.

Those hunches panned out, and how.

By May of this year, just one month into construction of the 2,800 square foot, four-unit retail operation at 155 E. Commerce in Milford all of the units were leased.

Although Stoy frankly admits the primary motivation for the project was "obviously to make money and create a real estate investment," he also enthusiastically endorses Milford as a great place to live and work, with a personal emphasis on the combination of the two.

"I hope the people of Milford know how lucky we are. The downtown area development is so unique. When you think about it, most areas are so nondescript.

"We are fortunate to have a town center that is visually nice, very pleasant, and a residential area beautifully mixed with older homes plus a somewhat rural area that people can enjoy. We're really in-between rural and suburb, and I like that."

When Stoy, who is a general contractor and has an office in Suite 102 of the building, and his partners, Dave Gramlich and Gary Anderson, decided to buy the vacant property (which was formerly leased by Milford Standard Station and used as a parking lot), he began to consider what type of building would best fit the streetscape of the village.

"I wanted it to look new, but I also wanted it to be in harmony with what was there. There are ways you can

create a contemporary look that is harmonious with older structures — the lights, for example, or awnings and the type of wood that is used."

Stoy maintains that the area will continue to expand, but hopes that the growth will continue to be strictly controlled.

"I hope we never lose this identity. The small town atmosphere, combined with the charm of the buildings and homes and our proximity to Detroit are all so important."

Besides R.B. Stoy and Company, two other tenants occupy retail space in the building.

A: The network was formed in 1984 just prior to the start of Lotto game play.

**Q: Why are some stations different now?**  
A: The lottery recently asked TV stations throughout Michigan to submit bids for a new network contract in order to provide the best possible coverage for players at the lowest cost. As a result, some changes were made.

**Q: Are drawings also now being aired by radio stations?**  
A: As a service to players not always able to watch the drawings on television, the Lottery has also formed a statewide network of radio stations to carry the live drawings.

**Q: Which stations are included?**  
A: Network radio stations include: WJZF-FM in Cadillac; WVAW in Detroit; WZZZ-FM in Flint; WLAZ-FM in Grand Rapids; WMLP-FM in Ironwood; WBRW-FM in Jackson; WJZZ-FM in Kalamazoo; WJQP-FM in Marquette; and WGER-FM in Saginaw/Bay City.

## Machine workout is 'no sweat'

At last! A method of exercise for people who hate to exercise — and you'll hardly sweat a bead.

Sound too good to be true? Well, believe it or not there are machines out there that will actually do exercises for you, and you can pay for the luxury. "All you have to do is the breathing," said one worker in such an exercise haven.

The concept evolved from therapy equipment originally used to treat polio victims and involves workouts on a series of tables with motorized machines. The machines produce high-repetition movements of the various muscle groups.

In essence, "No huffing and puffing. No strained and tired muscles," as one advertising brochure puts it.

Apparently Californians weren't the first to use the machines for vain purposes; it is thought that years ago "a few places in the southern states had them for wealthy people," said Linda Gorlitz, owner of California Toning of Plymouth.

Gorlitz's is one of several such exercise facilities in the area which have sprouted up in the past year and a half.

Another is Slender You in the Pineridge Shopping Center in Novi. Manager Betty Boss says clients who use her facility complete a workout in an hour, using each of six tables for 10 minutes.

One part of the no-sweat Slender You workout includes lying flat on the "sit-up" table, while the table actually lifts your back throughout the 10 minutes. This helping hand allows you to do 90 sit-ups during that time, Boss said.

A second table which concentrates on the legs, simulates a walking movement that approximates a two-mile walk in the 10-minute period.

And another table, called the "sandbag" table supposedly breaks down cellulite on hips and thighs with its rhythmic action across the buttocks.

The advantages seem obvious. Advertisers claim you can get the

muscle toning associated with a full-fledged workout, but can escape the tired and out-of-breath feeling.

And the bonus, say the sellers of these programs, is that you actually lose inches while firming up.

And for the bulk-conscious, they say you don't build up muscle (like some forms of exercise, they add), but simply tone what's already there.

But the workouts do absolutely nothing for the heart rate, said the two managers, each being careful not to misrepresent what the workouts can do. They both suggested coupling the program with some form of cardiovascular activity, such as walking, running or aerobics.

And of course, just because you

might lose inches with the program, it doesn't necessarily mean you'll lose weight, too. "We have to watch what goes in our mouths if we want to do that," said Boss.

At Slender You, clients are routinely measured and weighed, and given help with a diet plan if desired.

But the workouts aren't just for the weight and figure conscious, explained Boss. She said she has many clients who are referred by their doctors, such as one 81-year-old man sent by his chiropractor. Also, the machines are particularly beneficial for those having arthritis and circulation problems, she added.

With the managers boasting average inch losses of 10 after eight visits, does it still sound a little too

good to be true?

Well the only way to decide if it is right for you is to try it out, they say. Slender You gives a free first workout.

And there are no obligatory contracts to sign; you just pay per visit. The cost ranges from \$7 to \$8 per session, depending on where you go. And check for special discounts which may be in the offering.

Of course there will always be the old standbys who prefer to jog, jump and pump their way to a better physique. As an assistant manager of Novi's Vic Tanny put it, "These people like what they're doing. They don't have a lazy attitude toward exercise."

And then came the inevitable cliché: "No pain, no gain."

## Fitness Tips

## A quick guide to designer waters

These days there are many ways to get water other than from your faucet. Being promoted as the "drink of the 80s," an alternative to soft drinks and alcohol, bottled waters are being swallowed in greatly increasing quantities.

Americans drank more than 280 million gallons last year. A quick walk down the beverage aisle in your supermarket will convince you how confusing all the bottled waters available can be. The following list will help you understand the differences between "specialty" waters:

**CLUB SODA** — Filtered water (usually tap water) with added carbonation, minerals and mineral salts.

**DISTILLED WATER** — Water (usually tap water) that has been turned to vapor, then condensed back to liquid form. In the process, the water loses its minerals and its taste.

**DRINKING WATER** — A term used by the bottled water industry to refer to non-carbonated bottled water that may have come from a spring, well, municipal supply or a combination of sources. Minerals may be removed (a process called purification), then re-added to achieve the desired com-

position and test. **MINERAL WATER** — A vague term, as all water except distilled water contains minerals. The U.S. Food and Drug Administration (FDA) has no formal definition of what constitutes mineral water. But some states and the International Bottled Water Association require that water sold as mineral water contain more than 500 milligrams of dissolved solids per liter of water. The kinds of solids vary depending on the water source.

**NATURALLY SPARKLING WATER** — Carbonated water. Its carbonation comes from the same source as the water, rather than from the injection of manufactured carbon dioxide.

**NATURAL WATER** — Comes from a spring or well and contains only the minerals present in the water as it comes from the ground. The water may, however, be filtered and disinfected.

**SELTZER** — Filtered, carbonated water (usually tap water). No minerals or mineral salts are added.

**SPRING WATER** — Comes out of the earth under its own pressure. It may be taken from a natural opening in the ground or from a hose bored nearby. Water labeled "spring water" must come from a spring. However, bottlers may use the word "spring" in the company's name, no

matter what the source of the water. **STILL WATER** — Water without gas bubbles.

**WELL WATER** — Comes from a hole bored into the ground that taps the water of an aquifer (a water-bearing layer of permeable rock, sand or gravel). Wells that flow without pumping are called artesian wells.

There are 450 brands of bottled water sold in the United States. Federal and state regulations on bottled water try to insure that it is at least as good for you as tap water, but the question remains: Is it better?

You would have to drink more than a quart of Perrier to get the same amount of calcium found in a half-cup of milk. Bottled water companies are careful not to make direct claims about their product's health benefits. But they have jumped at the opportunity to expand in a market where there are concerns about sugar, salt, alcohol and contaminated water supplies.

Government regulators assume we consume bottled waters as a soft drink alternative, not as a substitute for tap water. The Environmental Protection Agency does not regulate seltzers, club sodas, mineral waters and sparkling waters as strictly as drinking water.

Some mineral waters have been

found to contain high levels of naturally occurring arsenic and fluoride. Bottled spring and well waters must meet FDA quality standards, which set limits for pesticide residues, toxic chemicals, radioactive substances and microorganisms.

Bottled water, like anything else, is fine in moderation, but don't substitute it for all your water intake. Virtually all water contains some minerals. Hard water has a greater content of calcium and magnesium, while soft water has these minerals removed in exchange for sodium. Check with your local water company to find out how hard your tap water is and what possible contaminants it may hold.

Bottled water, tap water, well water or any other water is generally an improvement over alcohol, diet pop and a number of other thirst quenchers. Think about it next time you decide to quench your thirst, and grab a quick glass of water instead.
