

BeGole rescues man on bridge

Novi Police Chief Lee BeGole is looking a little battered and bruised

There are long scrapes along his left arm and a scar from a cut on the top of his head.

But the scrapes and bruises are badges of courage ... earned by the veteran Novi police chief when he and a Michigan State Police (MSP) officer combined efforts last week to save a man apparently at-tempting to commit sulcide by jumping off the Grand River overpass in Farmington Hills into rush-hour traffic on 1-275 below.

The rescue effort, which was aided by numerous pase(s) by who stopped to assist BeGole and Trooper Judy Anderson of the Michigan State Police Post in Northyille, occurred at approximately 3:15 p.m. on Wednesday, July 5. BeGole said he was driving east-

bound on Grand River when he noticed the MSP car parked on the north side of the I-275 overpass and Trooper Anderson running next to the wide concrete barrier that


borders the edge of the freeway.
"My first thought was that there must be an accident down on the freeway, so I decided to cross into the westbound lane and stop in front of the state police car," said

BeGole. By the time he completed the maneuver, BeGole said Trooper Anderson was lying on her stomach, crawling through a onefoot high opening underneath the concrete barrier.

BeGole said he leaned over the top of the barrier, expecting to see an accident on I-275. "But there was no accident; just five lanes of rush-

"Then I saw Trooper Anderson with both arms and shoulders pro-truding over the edge of the freeway and a white male hanging by both hands from the bridge, shouting 'I want to die.' "

City promoted ballot question

Novi officials spent an undisclosed amount of money for advertising and used a city-owned machine to produce buttons promoting s citizen housing questions on the June 6 ballot.

According to a statement released last week by Public Information Director Cindy Stewart, buttons that said "Happiness is affordable senior citizen housing" were produced on a machine in the Parks and Recreation Department offices. Stewart said she and Special Recreation Coordinator Kathy Crawford produced about 50 of the buttons "on our own time," with materials

The buttons were worn by a variety of city officials, residents and senior citizens in the days before the June 6 special election.

Crawford also wrote a "City Hall Commentary" that appeared in the June 1 edition of The News. promoting the June 6 vote.

The City Hall Commentary urged voters to 'Vote June 6" and contained statistics and data showing the difficulty that senior citizens will face furnishing their own housing in the future.

Stewart's statement came in response to a

Freedom of Information Act (FOIA) request filed last week by The News, after requests to examine the documentation involved were delayed. The News will file an amended FOIA request this week, since city officials have not yet disclosed documentation of the cost of the City Hall Commentary advertisement.

The News is also requesting city officials to estimate the costs involved with using the Parks and Recreation button machine for an hour.

State law prohibits municipalities from using tax dollars to promote a certain type of vote on an election question. However, since the June 6 question was an "advisory question," meaning the out-come doesn't hold the force of law, no law was likely violated, according to Secretary of State, Elections Division spokesman Bradley Wittman. Wittman said no law actually speaks to advisory

One asked "Should the City of Novi pursue the development of senior housing for Novi senior citizens?" The second asked "Would you as a tax-payer be willing to pay additional tax dollars to support senior citizen housing for Novi residents?"

Question one was approved by a 2,099-977 vote. Question two was defeated 1,591-1,354.

City studies changes to oil ordinance

City officials said this week that they plan to remove a controversial portion of an amendment to the Gas and Oil Drilling Ordinance from the July 24 council meeting agenda.

Meanwhile, there were some in-dications this week that the Southern Michigan Oil Company (SOMOCO) appeared to be ready to move on two proposed new wells near the Echo Valley subdivision.

While amendments to portions of the Gas and Oil Drilling Ordinance could still be introduced at the July 24 council meeting, the most controversial amendment - one which would have allowed oil storage tanks in residentially-zoned areas tanks in residentially-zoned areas

has been removed from consideration, according to Mayor
Matthew Quinn.

Essentially, it means SOMOCO would be allowed to drill on residential property to the west of Enha

tial property to the west of Echo Valley, but would then have to pipeline the oil north to an existing works on Wixom Road between Eleven and Twelve Mile.

SOMOCO reportedly has an

agreement worked out with Detroit Edison to allow a pipeline to pass through Edison property, up to Cor-

Currently, state law allows well drilling on residentially-zoned land. The ordinance amendment, which was worked out in Ordinance Review Committee meetings for the last six months, would have allowed the storage tanks and other rently, the storage tanks are allowed only in certain types of industrially-zoned lands by Novi Cicontains the proper zoning to store materials pumped from the site.

Quinn said there was little hope of the ordinance amendment passing. "It has effectively been withdrawn," Quinn said. "I think everyone could see that there was very little chance for something liberthis the beautiful the country of the cou

"They (SOMOCO) basically feel
that there is one site left in the City of Novi," Quinn said. "But they have indicated that they would be able to work something out to use the Edison easement."

Officials from the Olney, Ohio-based firm could not be reached for comment by press time. Planning department officials said SOMOCO hasn't yet submitted a formal re-quest to drill west of Echo Valley, but that such a request is forthcoming. SOMOCO will also be required to submit an application to the Michigan Department of Natural Resources (DNR).

Quinn said the Oil and Gas Drilling Ordinance will still sustain some "technical amendments," possibly at the July 24 city council

meeting.
Assistant City Attorney Dennis
Watson said the purpose of the
technical amendments was to clarify a number of areas that may not be in conformance with changing state laws, and don't represent a significant change in the city's handling of oil drilling permits.
SOMOCO is believed to be in

terested in mineral deposits near Echo Valley. They could drill at two locations west of the Echo Valley subdivision and angle a well underneath the subdivision, according to plans discussed this past

City man charged in theft

A Novi man has been arrested on charges related to auto theft by members of the Oakland County Auto

Ronald Bert Coop, 34 of West Lake Drive was arrested June 28 on the basis of evidence obtained when ndercover police officers exercised a search warrant on April 17.

Coon waived pre-trial examination before 52nd District Court Judge Michael Batchik on July 10 and was bound over to Oakland County Circuil Court to stand trial on three counts of concealing and misrepresenting the identity of a motor vehicle.

The charge is a four-year felony meaning Coon could be senienced to up to 12 years imprisonment if found guilty on all three counts.

Detective Ron Roy of the Oakland

County Auto Theft Team said Coon owns three Chevrolet Corvettes which contain engines which have had the serial numbers removed. It is illegal to remove the serial numbers rom engines, Roy said. Coon is currently free on \$3,000

Roy also noted that the Auto Theft Team has "tip" money for informa on charges related to auto theft or in anonymously, and it may not be necessary for the informant to testify in court, he added.







School lunches rise for 89-90 year

The Novi Board of Education has approved an increase in the cost of school lunches for the 1989-90 school year, but the increase will be dif-

ferent than originally proposed.
Board members voted July 6 to
raise the price of lunches at Novi
Meadows, Novi Middle School and Novi High School by 15 cents. There will be an increase of 25 cents at all four elementary schools, and the cost of adult lunches will rise by 35 cents. As a result, all students will pay \$1.25 for a school lunch, while adults will pay \$2 for a school lunch.

Previously the board discussed raising prices to \$1.20 for younger students and \$1.30 for older students. But Trustee Sandra Thronton suggested the money combination for younger students — a dollar bill plus two dimes, was harder to deal with than a dollar bill and a quarter. Similarly, Thornton said, adults would find it easier to pay 32 than \$1.95 for a school lunch; as was

previously suggested. That way, she added, schools would not have to keep large amounts of nickles on hand for making change. Thornton's proposal, which passed by a 6-1 vote, was not without some controversy, however. Board Member Robert Schram,

who cast the lone vote against the proposal, said he wanted more justification for raising the prices igher than was expected. Although the net effect between the two pricing proposals is not great, the single 5-cent increase is still an is fair for elementary students to sub-sidize the program for older students. He explained that the size of servings for elementary and secondary lunches is different even

though the price will be the same.
"The reason for the difference in price is that the porportions are significantly different," said Assis-tant Superintendent William Barr about the current pricing policy. Barr added that the increase necessary to keep the program sel



At the board's June 29 meeting Food Service Director Pat Hill told members that the lunch program lost \$22,000 last year and would lose the same amount in 1989-90 if prices are not raised. Hill also said a 9 percent salary and fringe benefit increase contributed to the need to raise



NOTICE IS HEREBY GIVEN that the Novi City Council has adopted Ordinance 89-141, an Ordinance to add Section 18-66 to the Novi Code of Ordinances to regulate the storage of firewood and the clearing of brush within the City of Novi. The Provisions of this Ordinance become effective fitteen (15) days after adoption. The Ordinance was adopted July 10, 1989, and the effective date is July 25, 1989, a complete copy of the Ordinance is available for public use and inspection at the office of the City Clerk.

REFUSE ORDINANCE

TO: All owners, occupants or possessors of subdivided lands or lots:

NOTICE IS HEREBY GIVEN that in accordance with Section 21-20 of the Novi
Code, all noxious weeds or other weeds, grass, brush or deleterious, unhealthy
growths exceeding a height of twelve (12) inches, or any refuse or debris growing,
standing or lying upon any proporty in the City of Novi; shall be cut down, destroyed
or removed as the case may be at least thrice in each year, once during the last hall of
the month of May and again during the last half of July of each year and more often
as may be necessary.

In the event the owner or occupant, or any person or persons, agent, firm or corporation having control or menagement of any subdivisions has a zoning classification that is "recidential," shall fall, refuse, or neglect to compty with the above
mentioned Ordinance, the City shall cause said weeds, grass, brush, deleterious,
unhealthy growths, rubbish or debris to be cut down; destroyed or removed. Previded, further, that any lands which are situated within the flood plains or any natural
streams or water courses, or any area between the lower or upper banks of such
streams or water courses shall be exempted from the provisions of this Ordinance.
The expense incurred by the City in the cutting, destruction or removal of same
together with a ten (10%) percent administrative charge will be levied and collected
against such property in the manner provided by law.

Failure to comply with the requirements set forth in Section 21-20 of the Novi
Code may also result in the prosecution for same, and liability to the extent of the
penalty therein provided.

Nursing home memories

The ladies sat in a cozy living room, three friends gathering for friendly conversation and steaming coffee

They also gathered for an nterview with me, to talk about a group they are involved in. The ladies — Marjorie Dabney, Julie Woodard and Jo Crause — make monthly visits o the Novi Care Center, where they talk with elderly residents and help them create crafts.

Each of the ladies talked enthusiastically and fond about visiting the home. Through the Northville Branch of the Woman's National Farm and Garden Association, Dabney, Woodard and Krause formed a subcommittee called the Horticulture Therapy Group. As members of this group, coordinated by Krause, the ladies visit the Novi Care Center every month except July and August. They try to use natural materials when helping the residents do projects.

When listening to the women talk about how much they enjoyed their work, I remembered my visits to nursing homes as a child. Our school choir sang Christmas concerts for elderly residents at nursing homes in Grand Rapids. And we often visited convales cent homes as Bluebirds, younger versions of Girl

I also remembered visiting my great-grandfather and grandma in care centers several years ago. In places where they really didn't seem like my relatives, but slight ghosts of them. I recalled most vividly the smells of the facilities - scents of apple juice and over cooked peas, burnt coffee and ammonia. And I remembered their eyes — the wide, terrified glances

Dabney told me that some women don't enjoy visiting nursing homes and for a moment I understood why. It was sometimes frightening as a child to see sickness and the effects of old age on my greatgrandfather's body - frightening because I had never been exposed to it before. In my childhood I thought ! would live forever and I didn't understand how and why sickness struck some people but not others.

But as the afternoon progressed and the ladies told me how much the residents enjoyed working with dirt, singing old songs and completing projects with their

I remembered the sheer delight on my grandma's face when I visited her, bringing flowers or delicate figurines of young girls holding tiny ceramic puppies or kittens. I remembered how I wanted so desperately to help her escape from the facility, to bring her home and happy to visit her and to bring her some of her favorite

Suddenly, out of nowhere, visions of laughing, smiling elderly residents floated into my memory as I sat in Woodard's living room. They were singing Christmas earols, laughing and clapping. And our school choir was leading them in song. Later, all of us — young and old — gathered around an artificial Christmas tree to decorate it in holiday splendor.

Then it all made sense. Everything these three ladies were telling me rang true - I understood their satisfaction in visiting the Novi Care Center. There is nothing better than spreading happiness to those who have forgotten what it's like to smile

Those are the memories I always want to keep with





Group closes in on landfill site

PONTIAC - Oakland County's Landfill Siting Advisory Committee (LSAC) moved one step closer to fin-ding a home for a new county landfill, after a marathon meeting Saturday.

Committee members met for 10 straight hours at the county complex in Pontiac, attempting to iron out the final details of their lengthy siting criteria. They didn't complete the task, but they did make headway and elected spokespersons, said Novi area representative Charles Kureth.

"There is still a lot of work to be done," Kureth said. "It's hard to say what the ranking of the criteria is going to be at this time."

The 25 committee members are expecied to come to a consensus in the next few weeks, ranking the most important criteria involved with siting a new landfill somewhere in Oakland County. That criteria will be applied against a list of sites compiled by a consulting firm — Rogers, Golden, and Halpern, of Philadelphia. The committee is using a "blind draw" process. They won't know which site is selected until it is actually unveil-

Curently, LSAC is working on a timetable that would call for the site to be unveiled July 27. The top few sites would then be forwarded to the Oakland County Board of Commissioners Aug. 3 for a joint meeting

Committee members elected officers, met in subcommittees, and worked out several initial details of the siting criteria Saturday. Kureth said there was some agree-

ment over the top few criteria, though they haven't yet been placed in order of importance.

They include protection of groundwater resources and protection of floodplain and wetland areas

"There are also a number of health, safety and welfare type issues," Kureth said. "You may see them moving around a little bit before it's complete."

The group nominated Holly Village Presdient Ardath Regan chairperson of the committee. Kureth; Charles "Chuck" Cubbage, a Milford-area representative and current Secretary of the state Toxic Substance Control Commission (TSCC); and Collin Walls, Springfield Township Supervisor, were elected vice-chairs of the committee.

LSAC also designated a pair of sub-committees Saturday. One subcommittee was formed to begin finalizing assumptions and comments made about the siting process, while the other will take up actual design standards of the new landfill.

LSAC was formed earlier this year to give an objective evaluation of a

number of possible sites for a new county landfill. The 25-member committee is made up of representatives from all geographic regions of the

county. Individual members range from a housewife, to geologists, to waste haulers, or wetlands and water-

course experts. The group is charged with siting a new 460-acre landfill which would be a part of the county's solid waste plan. The landfill would accept household and commercial wastes, as well as incinerator ash and construction debris. It is designed to have a useful life of about 30 years, according to current estimates.

Oakland County is estimated to produce about 2.5 million tons of solid waste yearly by the year 2032. That compares with a 1992 figure — the first year the landfill is expected to be up and running - of about 1.5

In response to Byers' announcements, Board Member Sandra Thornton reminded Byers and the board that, although some headway is being made to improve communications, there is still a host of suggestions remaining in the board's communications report, which was compiled to find ways of improving community relations.

Thornton and Byers compiled a

communications report in April, which included suggestions like tap-ing meetings, providing a lectern and microphone for audience participation and making the minutes of meetings more detailed and reflec-

Some of the report's suggestions have already been implemented or were cited for implementation by Byers. Among those items were providing early agendas, holding meetings at administration offices plus meeting once at each school building per year, providing an audience microphone, adding citizen written comments to the official minutes, and establishing audience speaking guidelines.

Despite those improvements, Thornton said she did not want the rest of the suggestions in the communications report to be forgotten. Byers said he planned to address other items on the list by summer's

Also in concurrence with the communications report, Byers announced intentions to appoint a citizenboard committee to deal with the

district-wide busing policy. The committee which Rvers said would cover a wider range of issues than this year's busing committee, will be comprised of trustees Thornton and Craig Foreback, Assistant Superintendent William Barr (chairman) and one community member at

Byers also appointed a board member-only budget review committee comprised of Trustees Robert Schram, tephen Hitchcock and John Streit. Their purpose will be to investigate improved methods of presenting the budget in the future The 1989-90 budget presentation was criticized by some residents for being





Gas grills growing in popularity for backyard barbecues

By Dawn Riffenburg

One of the sure summertime pleasures has got to be barbecuing. Just about every home has some type

of grill in the backyard.

Grills are literally available in all shapes and sizes: from the \$5 hibachi you can purchase at Meljer to a \$700 deluxe Weber gas grill you can buy at specialty stores.

Emerging in popularity — although not really an innovative item — are gas grills. Today's fast-paced world seems to demand relief from the long arduous wait for the charcoal to turn white.

Enter the gas grill: five minutes following a flick of the switch the grill is hot and ready to go.

"The popularity of gas versus charcoal has really boomed in the last few years," said Ron Bechler, assistant manager of Northwest Propane in Brighton.

'Gas grills have actually been around for years but more and more people are getting away from charcoal. Just about everybody has a gas grill or is thinking about buying one.

In recent years, nutritionists have warned consumers about possible dangers of barbecuing. However, Bechler said that grill sales are really up this summer - perhaps ending

"The barbecue scare started in the 1970s when people started hearing about grilled foods being bad-foryou," he said. "That may have been a deterrent for a while. But I think that trend's over.'

For those who wonder about the "authentic" flavor that may be miss-ing with a gas grill, Bechler pointed out that the coals themselves actual ly have very little to do with the

flavor.
"There's no such thing as a charcoal flavor," he explained. "The flavor comes from the hot charcoal bed in a way. As grease drips out of the food and hits the hot coals underneath, it smokes and that's where the flavor comes from

"A gas grill has the gas burner under a bed of rocks or a 'flavor bar', " he continued. "As the gas heats up either the lava rocks or the flavor bar, grease drips down from the food and smokes. The charcoal itself doesn't have any flavor. The grilled flavor comes from the

The attraction of gas grills is found in the convenience. You can light up a gas grill in five minutes. Charcoal can take anywhere from 20 minutes to one-half hour before the coals are

ready to cook food.
"Just about the time you're finishing dinner, the coals are now perfect to cook on," Bechler said. "You should really wait until they're white all the way through, but people get impatient and rush it."

Another plus is the portability of

gas grills.
"You can put a 20-pound tank on a cart and move it to any location in your yard," Bechler said.

There are a number of different models in different sizes. The price varies from \$129 for a small gas grill to as much as \$700 for a deluxe model

Bechler estimated that the store fills about 200 tanks with propane each week - most of them on the weekends.

"We have an answering machine, and when we're closed we'll get 15 to 25 calls from people needing a refill,"

For those who like using different kinds of wood chips for different flavors, you can use the hickory or mesquite chips on gas grills as well. Some models even come with a wood chip soaking container.

Another benefit for the backyard barbecuer is the ability to control the heat of the fire. A thermometer on the lid keeps the cook aware of the cooking temperature at all times.

"We even sell a grill that has a meat thermometer right in the grill," Bechler said. "You can roast a roast or slow cook a turkey. You just close the lid and control the cooking temperature just like you would in your oven.

The Michigan State University Cooperative Extension of Oakland County warns gas grill owners not to store a spare propane cylinder near or within the gas grill.
This creates a serious fire hazard.

The problem is not limited to any particular make of grill or cylinder and does not involve a product When the grill is in use, the heat

from the gas burners could significantly raise the temperature of the area underneath the burners Normally, a safe temperature and pressure are maintained in the operating cylinder because of the flow of propane through the valve and components. However, heat may cause the pressure inside the cylinder to in-

crease and propane gas could escape from the saftey valve into the area. The flame of the burners could ignite the propane, resulting in a fire.
The MSU Cooperative Extension

offers the following safety practices

· Immediately discontinue the storage of spare cylinders on or near a gas grill;

Store propane cylinders outdoors

and away from direct sunlight;
• Store in areas that are not used for recreation, especially away from areas where children play;

Be sure the supplier does not overfill a propane gas cylinder;

 Whenever a cylinder is diconnected from the grill, always insert a safety plug into the outlet. These plugs are supplied with most gas grills or can be purchased from propane gas dealers.

Defoliators follow bloom and bust cycle

The infamous gypsy moth is a member of an ant insect group called hardwood defoliators because they eat the eaves of deciduous trees and shrubs.

Fortunately for the woody plants they feed on, weather, parasites and predators usually keep populations at

tolerable levels most years.

When these natural controls fail, we see a population boom that lasts about three years, followed by a population crash that reduces insect numbers to non-destructive

Gary Smith, entomologist at Michigan State University, says the gypsy moth in Michigans hasn't settled into a regular boom and bust cycle because it was only recently introduced in Michigan—in 1972—and it is still increasing and spreading.


"It has now been trapped fairly consistently in all the counties of lower Michigan and some in the Upper Peninsula," Simmons reports. "Significant defoliation, mostly in forestlands, has occurred in about 10 to 15 counties. The gypsy moth is also causing problems in a few citiesincluding Midland and Harrison-and some recreational areas, where it's having a decided economic impact on outdoor recreation and tourism.

Though the gypsy moth is getting most of the media attention these days, it isn't the only forest and landscape defoliator in Michigan. The tents of the eastern tent caterpillar are a frequent sight in roadside trees in spring, and eak skeletonizers, red-humped oakworms, aspen leafrollers and other insects periodically strip the foliage from sizable tracts of forestlands.

Fortunately, healthy trees can usually suffer major defoliation for one, two or even three years without suffering any lasting injury," Simmons says. "Trees in the landscape are often under stress from low soil fertility, compacted soil, drought, or attack by other insects or disease organisms, however, and homeowners may need to give trees some extra attention to keep them healthy or help them recover from defoliation."

Annual fertilization, regular watering during drought, proper pruning and thinning, and protection against mechanical injuries will help keep trees healthy and able to withstand occasional insect attack, he says.
























t's been fun getting to know you.

Athletes must avoid heat stress

courage us all to start on an exercise program, or to stay on a program already started. But when the weather turns hot and humid, even athletes at the peak of condition should take precautions.

That's when heat stroke or heat exhaustion – a medical condition called hyperthermia – can strike, regardless of age or physical condition, warns Dr. Larry J. Sell, senior vice president for Health Care Affairs at Blue Cross and Blue Shield of Michigan.

Here are some tips Self suggests you follow when exercising during heat spells:

☐ Exercise during the morning or evening hours

□ Wear a hat because as much as 30 percent of body heat is absorbed through the head. Cotton clothing is best because it absorbs water and helps cool the body. Loose clothing lets air flow through.

☐ Before exercising, drink at least a pint of water even if you're not thirsty. Drink more as you exercise. Cold water is easier to drink and helps bring body temperature down.

During the hot weather, sweat glands secrete moisture that evaporates from the skin and cools it.

A trip to the beach is one way to beat the summer heat

Most people can maintain normal temperature in the face of very hot external temperatures. But sometimes the regulatory system of the body simply doesn't work and body temperature rises out of control, causing hyperthemia. When

body temperature rises to 105 degrees, a true medical emergency exists, and immediate professional medical attention is required.

These are warning symptoms of hyperthermia to look for, according

Agitation, confusion, seizures. ☐ Faintness, dizziness, lethargy

Headache, nausea.

☐ Rapid pulse and heartbreak. Slow deep breathing if the vic-tim is still; rapid, shallow breathing if the victim is moving about.

If any of these symptoms appear, a doctor should be called immediately since not all victims will have all the

Those who haven't been exercising regularly shouldn't start on hot, humid days, says Sell. Even those with a good training base should proceed slowly during a heat wave or when the waether suddenly goes from warm to hot.

Seniors, and those with chronic diseases - particularly heart ailments - or persons on drugs that reduce the ability to sweat, such as diuretics, should not excercise when it's very hot.

Pay attention to body signs during hot, humid weather, Sell suggests. When you experience discomfort — stop. Otherwise, regular exercise in the summer, done moderately, can contribute to physical and emotional

Fish diet helps prevent heart disease

It has not been so long since scientists first discovered that Eskimos and Japanese fishing villagers and farmers have virtually no heart

The reason for this lies in their daily diet. These people have only one thing in common; they both consume 90 to 319 pounds of fish per year. Researchers found that fish and

other marine life contain highly unsaturatad Omega-3 oil, which may protect us against heart disease in three major ways.
First, Omega-3 fatty acids in the

diet may lower total blood cholesterol and change the levels of high-density lipoproteins (HDL) and low-density lipoproteins (LDL) in the blood. The low-density lipoprotein cholesterol is decreased. This decrease is a good sign because high LDL levels are associated with a

buildup of fat on artery walls.

The other cholesterol component HDL cholesterol, may be increased on an Omega-3 rich diet. The HDL cholesterol has been called the good cholesterol from blood vessel walls.

Secondly, Omega-3 oil decreases the total triglyceride levels in the blood. Triglycerides are the most common form of fat in the body and have been implicated in the develop ment of heart disease.

Third, Omega-3 oil alters platelet function. Platelets are important

clotting agents in the blood. They make blood less "sticky" or less likely to clump. This anti-clumping function is important because more fluid is less likely to clot, which may prevent a stroke or heart attack.

Now that you know the benefits of eating fish rich in fat, Omega-3 fatty acids, how much and what kind of fish should you eat?

Even though more Americans are ecoming "health conscious," according to the Department of Agriculture, we still only eat approx imately 14.5 pounds of fish per person per year. (Compare this to 144.5 pounds of red meat and 69.7 pounds of

The nutrient composition of fish may vary within a species as well among different species. The highest in Omega-3 oil is Chinook Salmon which contains approximately 3.6 grams per 4-ounce serving. On the lower side is haddock, cod, northern pike, tuna in water and clams which contain about .2 grams per 4-ounce

What about taking fish oil supplements? All the evidence on taking supplements is not in yet. Omega-3 capsules are being used in ex-perimental studies under the guidance of medical specialists. The appropriate dose has not been determined and scientists do not recommend that supplements replace good eating habits.

Cod liver oil is a good source of Omega-3 fatty acids. However, ex-cessive amounts can be dangerous.

(Cod liver oil contains vitamins A and D. These are fat-soluble vitamins which are toxic in large doses.)

Selecting, Storing and Cooking:

 $\hfill\square$ The odor should be mild and subtle rather than "fishy."

☐ Look for translucent flesh that is consistent in brightness and color. with tight scales and red or pink gills.

□ Live lobster or crabs should be

lively, not sluggish.

If lobster or crab is cooked in the shell, the shell should be red and the

meat white with a red tint. □ Shrimps and scallops should be firm with a sweet, mild odor.

☐ Clams, mussels and oysters in the shell should be alive. You can tell if you tap them and they are tightly closed. If you buy them shucked (out of the shell), the meat should be plump and covered with a clear

□ Frozen fish should have been flash-frozen at sea.

 \square Fresh fish should be wrapped in an airtight package and kept in the coldest part of the refrigerator

Eat fresh fish within two days. ☐ Frozen fish should last many months in your freezer.

☐ It's best to broil, bake, peach or stream fish. Frying, breading and using heavy sauces adds calories and esterol to fish

☐ Don't overcook. Fish is natural-A good rule to remember is to

cook it for 10 minutes per inch of thickness. (For example, if salmon steak is %-inch thick, broil it for 71/2

☐ Test with a fork. Make sure it is thoroughly cooked and no longer

☐ Don't thoroughly thaw tish before cooking; cooking it just before being totally thawed will make it more moist.

□ Rubbing your hands with lemon

juice will help remove odors.

□ Eating more fish can't hurt. But,


as with any food, moderation and variety are important. Vary the type of fish you eat: eat fish at least two to three times a week, and keep portion sizes at about three to four ounces

The many benefits of fish rich in Omega-3 fatty acids makes it very good for you, so make it a choice on your weekly menu.




