Racers join fund-raising drive for kids

Several area residents recently participated in a three-day road raily to raise money for an organization that benefits Michigan's troubled children and families.

The Grand Tour for Children raised more than \$30,000 to benefit the Michigan Association of Children's Alliances, according to preliminary estimates.

The MACA is a non-profit organization committed to improving and protecting the quality of life for children and families, according to Steve Purdy, organizer of the raily.

The association is based on the belief that all children and families have the right to opportunities and services which strengthen and encourage a child's physical, social, emotional and intellectual development.

To this end, the group provides training and other programs to public and private member agencies. and individual members throughout the state, explained Barbara Steencken, a Northville resident and rally

Thorton House needs a home

With any luck, the pioneer-era Thorton home may be entering another phase of its nomadic existence. Or 1990 could be the end of the line for the 150-year-old structure.

Novi Historical Society president Kathy Mutch is hoping that members of the community will care enough to join her newly-organized "Friends of the Sally Thorton House." The group's first meeting is on Thursday, June 28, at 7:30 p.m. in the Novi Civic Center.

When I think about the Yerkes house - so many people passed by and said something should be done - if the Thorton house is ultimately saved, it could be the oldest existing

house in Novi," Mutch said. The elegant late-Victorian era Yerkes house fell prey to an arsonist in fall 1989.

Built circa 1838, the two-story frame farmhouse now sitting behind Home. Sweet Home restaurant was owned by Sally Thorton, a widow who came to Novi in 1827 with her five teen-aged children. The house, apparently located at the northeast corner of Novi and Nine Mile Roads, was an

upscale move for the family, who previously lived in the frontier settler's standard log cabin. A hundred years later, the house

was moved for the first time - several hundred feet south - to make way for the construction of the Rogers mansion, now the Home Sweet Home restaurant. Owner Charles Rogers was married to Harriet Thorton, great-granddaughter of Sally Thorton.

In 1988, it was transfered from its location behind Arkin Distributing Company at 43100 Nine Mile Road closer to the corner of Novi Road to clear space for the company's expansion. Today, the small building stands to the left and rear of Home

Sweet Home.

Two years ago, company president Irwin Arkin sought to sell the house but with no offers coming in, he relocated rather than razed the 2,000 square foot structure.

Now Arkin said the land the historic home sits on is needed once again. But it seems as if he can't give the house — which is in sound condition - away.

"I'd like to see the city use it somehow. I'd like to see it be saved, in a park as an office building. I just hate to see it destroyed," he said. "It can't stay there.

"All they have to do is pick it up and take it away."

While Arkin declined to say what

the land the Thorton house is sitting on is needed for, he'd like to see the home moved "as soon as possible" or ple passed by and said something should be done — if it will be leveled. However, Home, Sweet Home has been meeting with the Thorton house is ultimately saved, it could be the the city's planning concepts committee to discuss a proposed banquet and catering addition to their building, as well as a parking lot to the west of the site.

But Novi City Manager Edward Kriewall said that at present the city has no plans for the house.

Arkin has unsuccessfully offered the Thorton home to neighboring historical groups. Livonia's Greenmead won't accept structures from outside that city. Northville's Mill Race Village also has refused custody of the quaint building but will strip it for doors and frames to use to repair houses already in place in the village, Arkin said. But that's a last resort, he

added. And the most logical choice, the Novi Historical Society, simply doesn't have the funds to take over and restore the Thorton home. Mutch said, or for that matter any available land. Mutch also serves on the Novi Historical Commission,







Fire hits kitchen at Crawford's Suspect charged

A kitchen fire at Crawford's Restaurant, 160 E. Main St. in downtown Northville, cleared the restaur ant and closed Main Street late Thursday morning until firefighters succeeded in stopping the blaze.

The fire was apparently caused about 11:25 a.m. when a propane gas line to a kitchen stove ruptured. Firefighters wearing oxygen tanks and masks quickly entered the restaurant to battle the blaze.

Fire and police officials finally shut the gas off to the entire building, a procedure Patrolman James Marks described as "customary in any fire."

Tim Goxem, a dishwasher who was in the kitchen when the stove ignited, said the staff's own attempts to put the fire out met with no success. We tried to put it out with two fire extinguishers and it wouldn't go out."

Sue Poster, one of the restaurant's owners, was working across the street at Crawford's Bakery Connection on Mary Alexander Court when the fire first began. "We'll be open again in a couple days, I'm sure," she sald. "Maybe we'll get a new stove out

I want some cheesecake. Ah, but before you get all fired up thinking that these pages will be filled with gooey, creamy, New York style varieties of cheesecakes, look again. Savory cheesecakes are a whole new variety of exclusive cheesecakes that seem to be gaining in popularity in the Detroit area. Perfect for lunch, brunch, casual suppers or buffets, these doahead treats combine a creamy taste with a smooth, velvety texture. They take the same form as their sweet counterparts, but the flavorings are

a real surprise. From the exterior, they look like cheesecakes. Instead of a graham cracker or cookie crust, these crusts are formed by combining toasted breadcrumbs, grated cheese (which helps the crust

brown and crisp) and melted butter. The essential filling remains the same: cheese. Soft and delicate cream cheese is the common denominator in these cases. Fresh cream cheese, which has a slightly tangy flavor and contains no preservatives, is preferred, but the packaged bricks available at the supermarket are acceptable. (Fresh cream cheese can be purchased at specialty food stores and cheese shops.) Cottage cheese and ricotta can be added to lighten the

taste and calories. Other than a melange of fresh herbs, filling and great cheese, the only other staple really necessary to prepare these delectable goodies is a good quality springform pan. If you have yet to invest in one, it can be purchased at all gourmet and kitchen shops, with the lesser-quality pan coming

out 10 cents each, and you will never have to worry or Swiss cheese, half-and-half, and salt. Mix well. about leaving the bottom of your springform pan in someone's kitchen again. To my friends: I think I have about eight

different-sized bottoms in my cellar. Call me if you want them. All the recipes call for pretoasting the breadcrumbs. If you have never toasted breadcrumbs you can use fresh or prepacked varieties. Sprinkle them on a cookie sheet and toast them in a moderate (350-degree) oven for 5-10 minutes, stirring

occasionally. Contrary to popular belief, you cannot toast breadcrumbs from crumbling toast. Of course, if you thought that, you really have no reason to even try to attempt these recipes.

These cheesecakes can be made as much as two days in advance and then refrigerated. Before you start, be sure the springform pan has a tight lock and seal to avoid water leaking into the cake. The finished cakes are at their peaks within 24-36 hours of baking. If you must refrigerate them, allow plenty of time to bring them to room tempera-



By gouging into the bark, vandals crippled the tree's vascular system. So, like thousands of other innocent victims each year, the tree slowly died.

But the fight against vandalism is gathering strength from the example of Lynn Brauer and Carol Eichling.

When vandals girdled a 300 year old Chinquapin Oak near their Marthasville, Missouri home, they wrapped the wound in sphagnum moss and tended the tree daily, despite blizzard conditions.

If not for the severe winter, arborists feel the Chinquapin might have survived.

We believe miracles can take root. When people care enough.


