

Harness racing gets underway at the Northville Downs

Harness racing action returned to Northville with the opening of the winter season this week.

The racing meet, conducted by Jackson Trotting Association, will span 66 programs, on a Mondaythrough Saturday basis concluding Monday, Dec. 31. Matinee racing will begin on Saturday, Dec. 1 with post time at 1 p.m. and the evening program following at 7:30 p.m. Mattnee racing then continues every Saturday (Dec. 8, 15. 22. and 29), post time 1 p.m., evening program follows with the

first event going postward at 7:30

Post time will remain the same this season, with the first race going postward at 7:30 p.m. Daily Double wagering will take place on the first and second races and perfecta and trifecta wagering on every race. Tri-Super wagering takes place on the fifth and seventh races and consists of picking the first three finishers in the fifth races and the first four finishers in the 7th races (with a mandantory payoff after the Trisuper pour reaches \$25,000). Four-year-old standardbreds will take center stage during October and November in the Michigan Bred Pari-Mutuel. Four-yearold colt trotters go postward on Saturday, Oct. 27 and four-yearold filly pacers on Saturday, Nov.

A 'basically illegal' alternative

The public school system has faced a lot of criticism in recent years. Some parents have decided to stop complaining and start trying to do a better job themselves despite the fact that they may be breaking the law, or at least the law as the Michigan Department of Education sees it.

Today, several area parents have foined the ranks of homeschoolers in educating their children at home doing what one mother said is "basically illegal" in Michigan.

Whether legal or illegal, about 80 home-schoolers from around the state attend weekly gatherings at the First Baptist Church in Novi.

Novi Community School District officials have no knowledge of any home-schooling families in the district. Northville Public Schools knows of two home-schooling families in its district.

But many more families could actually be schooling their children at home without informing the state or the school district because of confusion about the law or an inability to meet the state's

requirements. Nearly one year ago on Nov. 6. 1989, a Michigan Court of Appeals ruling found the state's requirement for all teachers to be certified was a "minimal infringement" on religious freedom justified by the state's compelling interest in educating its citizens.

The state requires parents who

have a teaching certificate, but the requirement is not a hard and fast rule, said Chris Klicka an attorney for the Home School Legal Defense

Association in Virginia. The association has asked the Michigan Supreme Court to rehear the 1989 court case to clear up some of the confusion.

"Anybody you talk to (in Michigan) will give you a different answer," Klicka said. "The state of confusion we call it."

Gary Elfner, an administrator for the Novi First Baptist Church school, said home-schooled children are not "as socially stunted" as students educated in mainstream schools.

Court adjourns for wetlands discussion

Pre-trial proceedings on two misdemeanor wetlands violation citations against the Northern Equities Corp. and developer Neil Sosin were adjounred for 90 days to allow time for a negotiated settlement of the case.

Novi ordinance enforcement officer Steve Babinchak said the case was delayed until January 10 after the developers agreed to work with city officials on a proposal for restoring wetlands areas that had been altered and after the developers agreed they would follow formal permit procedures for any further work to be done in the wetlands areas, including possible restoration work.

Environmental technician Susan Tepatti, of the JCK engineering company, said city officials and developers had agreed the best solution would be for them to walk the site together in order to determine

the wetlands areas and what the most reasonable solution would be for restoration.

No time for that walkover has yet

If the two sides can agree on a settlement, the plans for restoration and for any further work in the wetlands area would be formally reviewed by the Novi Planning Commission, Tepatti said. If no agreement is reached by January 10. Babinchak explained, the city will proceed with criminal prosecution of the alleged violations.

Sosin and Northern Equities were issued two citations in April for the construction of drainage ditches on two parcels near the intersection of Beck and West roads. The ditches extended up to 300

Control of diabetes depends on careful ittention to diet; prevention of infecion, such as through proper care of the feet; using insulin and oral medicine when indicated; and frequent testing o

made possible the self-testing of blood glucose by diabetics. Simple-to-use monitoring kits can be purchased for use at home or at work. The diabetic takes a finger prick device from the kit and sticks the end of a finger. A drop or any of blood is placed on a test strip for two of blood is placed on a test strip for evaluation. Evaluation of blood glucose ests may be based on color changes or the test strips as observed visually or as

read by the kit monitor. Some monitors provide a digital readout of the actual blood glucose level. some newer monitors have memory storage that can produce several readings for later evaluation. According to a recent issue of the journal American Druggist, at least one company makes a monitor that can be hooked up to a diabetes management system. The system will display up to 250 test results by date and time and provide information about insulin design.



Elected official acted on rights

Not only do Novi's elected officials have the right to actively campaign against city council decisions, they are charged with upholding the U.S. and state constitutions, including freedom of speech provisions. City Attorney David Fried determined

Fried was asked Sept. 29 by Council Member Joseph Toth if council members in the minority could actively campaign against the majority


The council without comment Monday approved on the consent agenda his written opinion that: There is nothing in the charter, oath or other laws to preclude such conduct by a council member. In particular, the oath calls upon the member to faithfully discharge the duties of the office, and to support the state and federal constitutions. The oath does not preclude a council member from opposing a campaign question endorsed by the rest of the Council. nor do the charter or other laws. A council member does not relinquish First Amendment rights by acceptance of the position."

Fried further found that: "A council member may not violate a valid ordinance adopted by Council based upon opposition to its enactment.

OCC narrows field of chancellor candidates

Board of Trustees may narrow the field to three in its effort to pick the school's next chancellor.

A closed-session meeting was held earlier this week, after which the board was scheduled to announce its selection or at least the next course of action to fill the vacancy created last May when R. Stephen Nicholson

"The board has several options," said George Cartsonis, OCC director of college communications. "It could name a successor, or it could start over in the quest to find a new chancellor.

While the board could announce its selection, at least one OCC trustee said that is not likely.

"We've got at least three weeks of hard work before us," said Margaret A. MacTavish, secretary of the board. "I can only speak for myself," said the Rochester Hills resident. "But I haven't had time to fully evaluate all the candidates."

The board finished interviewing the sixth and final candidate last week when J. Michael Meade, acting president at Henry Ford Community College in Dearborn, visited OCC and went through a public interview. trustees haven't had the chance to Gulf.

"On-site visits would take two or three weeks. So, speaking for myself, we're about a month away."

Elfner said although he believes home-schooling is the best option in education today, he knows it is not always possible.

After home-schooling his children for four years, he had to begin sending his children to the regular school at the First Baptist Church. When he became an administrator for the school, his wife was needed to

> The state requirement that home-schoolers be licensed by the state also bothers Boswell who is not certified. "Ninety-eight percent of home-schoolers don't have a teaching certificate

and don't want one," she said, "A home-schooling parent is self-educated," Many parents seem to think the law requires only that a certified teacher work with the home-schooling parent. The Michigan Department of Education said the law requires that students

receive instruction from a certified teacher. "Infrequent visits to a teacher do not fill the minimum requirement," said Jean Shane, nonpublic schools liaison for the department.

The confusion comes from an ever-changing interpretation of the law by the Michigan Department of Education, Klicka said.

"There are no particular requirements throughout the state," he said. The rules parents are required to follow are basically determined by the superintendent in their school district, Klicka said. Some superintendents only require a certified teacher come to the home a few hours a week, while others require a full-time teacher to work in the home for 180 days a year. Michigan and Iowa are the only states to require certification at all. Klicka

Thirty-three states specifically define home-schooling in their statutes. For home-schoolers this is the best situation, Klicka said. About 12 states classify home-schools as private schools. A home-school

situation is often challenged by school districts in these states. Klicka said. Michigan falls into the last group, which are, according to Klicka, the "worst" states. These states allow district superintendents to decide what con-

stitutes a private school, he said. "It's one of those things where no one knows what the law is, but we know that home-schooling is constitutional," Klicka said.

The Home School Legal Defense Association provides unlimited legal representation for members. The membership is \$100 a year and includes representation as far as the U.S. Supreme Court if needed. About 18,000 families are currently members of the association.







The report concluded that: "If this well is successful, and the likelihood of this is typically 50 percent, it will only flow for part of its productive life. Novi City Assessor James Klausmeyer. In his report to council, Klausmeyer concluded that property values in Echo Valley would not be adversely impacted if the well head were no more than five feet high, no noise or odor was emitted from the site and no external pump jacks or storage was placed there.

Because the existing well in Novi is not near residential land, comparisons are based on a site in Lyon Township at Martindale Meadows Subdivision, near the corner of Martindale and Pontiac Trail. The well and storage tanks were installed prior to the 160-lot subdivision's 1988 development. Lots sold for \$16,900 in 1988 and went up to \$25,000 in 1989. A remaining vacant lot is now listed for

While the well area is bermed, the storage tanks are visible from some homes.

"Since 1988, the market value has continued to increase. This would indicate to us that even though this particular development is encumbered with a producing oil well and storage, it does not seem to affect the market value of properties in the area," Klausmeyer wrote. In addition, he was advised by Northville Township's Manager Richard Henningsen that \$300,000 homes were unaffected by a gas well 1,000 feet away on the Northville Township state grounds.

The assessor's office concluded that the well head would not be visible from Echo Valley Estates subdivision. A quarter of a century later, the name of Ford once again became the focus of a major news item in The Record. When Ford Motor Company announced plans in the mid-1950s to establish a new Lincoln plant along Wixom Road in what was then Novi Town- for the past 100 years.

In 1925, Henry Ford again made news in the ship, the community looked forward to what would

This turned out to be just the incentive, however. that the unincorporated community of Wixom - just west of Novi's limits - needed in order to apply for incorporation as a village.

In doing so, the location of the highly prized industrial plant would be a part of the tiny village of Wixom instead of Novi, causing considerable rift between the neighboring towns. After winning a successful lawsuit against the

township of Novi, Wixom became a village in 1957,

and the diminished Novi decided to follow suit. A year,

later, Novi became the largest village in Michigan. In 1969, Novi became a city, and the community has been growing by leaps and bounds ever since. all thanks to Henry Ford. For, who knows - if it hadn't been for the Ford Plant providing the incentive for Wixorn, and then Novi. to gain municipal status. Novi might have remained the quiet little town it had been

Voters in the South Lyon Schools district go to the polls Tuesday, Oct. 23, to decide a controversial one-year, 2.3 mill request. The fate of the financially beleaguered district's transportation program hangs in the balance. In addition, continuation of current programs rests on the outcome of the election; a \$611,000 loss in state aid has resulted from an unexpected shortfall in student po-

venture called the Ford Academy of Manufacturing Sciences. Meanwhile, the Northville Public Schools this year launched an ambitious program called Partnerships in Education, along the lines of similar ventures around Michigan and across the country. Both programs spring from similar visions.

Schools and businesses do have a natural, vested interest in each other. Schools hope to prepare their students to someday enter and succeed in the world of business. Companies hope to hire educated people who are ready to do the things the companies need to accomplish their goals. So why not get together and help each other

That's just what's happening locally, and it's fun to watch. In the interests of full disclosure, I ought to say that our office here is participating in the Partnerships in Education program, so I'm kind of biased in favor of the idea.

At the first meeting of the Partnerships in Education Advisory Council last week, the excitement level was high. It was mostly a get-acquainted session, with everyone talking a little about their individual partnerships. The companies are large and small; from giants like Meijer,





Children of ages 5, 6 and 7 just can't weigh the slim risk of getting AIDS during medical treatment against the much riskier prospects of not getting medical treatment at all. So raising the issue with them would seem to be

Family affair

Compos collaborate on 'American' dream

The fall Homearama near Brighton is a family affair for Jim. Janet and Christopher Compo, principals of a Farmington Hills building

The three have a hand in two of the 10 luxury "idea homes" on display at the fall Homearama in the Pine Creek Ridge subdivision, south of Brighton Road and a mile west of Grand River.

The houses, priced at \$500,000 to \$875,000, will be open from 3 p.m. to 10 p.m. Monday through Friday, and noon to 10 p.m. Saturday and Sunday through Oct. 28.

James D. Compo, a Farmington Hills resident and president of the company that bears his name, has American tradition and with Ameribeen in the building business more than 30 years.

Christopher Compo, a Northville resident, is also a vice president of the company.

Janet Compo, Compo's wife and a vice president of the company, is involved in architectural design and interior decoration in the houses. She was the first woman to receive the Builder of the Year Award from the Builders Association of Southeast Michigan.

James S. Bonadeo, president of the BASM and Bonadeo Builders Corp. in Plymouth, says the homes at the Homearama are based on the same concept as the special "show cars" that Detroit automakers build every year for the auto show.

The homes we are displaying at our eighth annual Homearama contain some of the latest concepts in both architectural design and interior decoration," says Bonadeo. "To make it convenient for anyone who wishes to see these innovative homes, we are keeping them open as long as possible each day.

Each home has been created by a separate builder in conjunction with an architect, an interior designer and landscaper. The result is 10 highly individualized homes, each with a laundry list of custom features suited to the lifestyles of the rich and famous, or maybe just the rich.

Witness the first of Compo's creations, "The American," a Cape Codstyle home built entirely in the can materials.

Visitors to "The American" are greeted by a stone entrance with a mammoth triple-panel oversized oak door and sidelights featuring beveled glass. The garage on the left is canted at a 45-degree angle from the home for security and privacy.

The two-story circular foyer allows access to all parts of the home, and is graced by stone columns and angled tile. The circular theme is carried through to the astounding six-level deck which provides a view of the unspoiled woods behind the home (the

site is on a former boy scout camp). The huge living room also features columns. They are structural - not just for looks - because of the massive open space of the room.

## The Murphy Mountain hideaway economizes space and design

Elk nibbling clover in the front yard at dawn. Trout broaching the lake's surface in shimmering contortions. Home owners bedding down to a duet of hoot owls and crickets.

These are a few sights, sounds and smells of the wilderness brought to you compliments of the no-nonsense Murphy, a practical mountain hideaway designed by guest architect George Bunzer of Murphy,

From its living room and dining room to its screened front porch, the Murphy blends urban comforts with wilderness musts. This city-country mix makes it a cinch for any city slicker to slip into a Jeremiah Johnson alter ego every weekend.


For a retired couple with more time, this weekend getaway easily ranks as a permanent address, owing to its three bedrooms and ample living space for two. Creature comforts like washer-dryer, and eating bar and twin kitchen sinks, help seniors call

this place home. The no-frills exterior belies the economy of space inside. Outdoor enthusiasts, who, of lucky, are often laden with the catch of the day, take heart in the Murphy's entrance—it leads right to the kitchen. Dripping trout quickly become sauteed amandine with little mess or fuss. Meanwhile, wet fishing gear and other messy outdoor trappings-like skis- are left on the screened front porch before entering the house.

The simple rectangular layout makes for an easy guided tour. All shared areaskitchen, bathroom, living and dining rooms-occupy the middle. Nearly equal size bedrooms line either side like bookends. In a touch of tasteful discretion, the master suite sits by itself on the right side.

Also, guests do not need to disarm themselves, piling all hunting, fishing or skiing gear into one heap on the screened porch. That is just begging for a mix-up. Instead, each bedroom sports big closets, capable of storing any matter of gear, from fly-fishing poles to bird-watching telescopes.

Then at night, when the fish have been fried, the ski slopes have been conquered, or only if another chapter has been read, relax on the deck and talk of tomorrow's plans.

raig Lundquist, 31, of South Lyon has always been fascinated by chimney sweeps. In 1983, Lundquist turned his

fascination into reality when he left his cashier job at Kroger and opened White Wolf Chimney Sweep. He's been happily sweeping chimneys ever since.

Lundquist conducted a lot of research before opening White Wolf. He combed through trade magazines and studied at the library. During his research, Lundquist discovered a company in Massachusetts, known as August West, that was a supplier of chimney sweeping equip-

With an investment of less than \$2,000, he purchased the tools of the trade - brushes, a vacuum, and a top hat and tails and White Wolf Chimney Sweep was born. Lundquist decided to incorporate some of the myths and legends surrounding chimney sweeps while pondering over a name for his chimney sweeping business.

"I wanted a name that was unique," he explained.

Chimney sweeps are thought to be omens of good luck, so Lundquist started with that idea. While studying another interest of his, the white wolf, he discovered a French legend which said that if a white wolf crosses your path, you would be blessed with good fortune. Lundquist combined the two omens and came up with White Wolf Chimney Sweep.

The history of chimney sweeps dates back at least 200 years. During Lundquist's research, he discovered many different tales regarding the origin of chimney sweeps.

For example, the Irish used to take a live goose, tie a rope around it, and drop it down the chimney. As the goose got frightened and started flapping its wings, it would be pulled back up, cleaning the chimney with its flapping wings. As the story goes, the blacker the goose that arose, the cleaner the chimney would be.

The chimney sweep's attire, a top hat and tuxedo tails, also has an interesting origin. As the legend goes, original chimney sweeps were rotten guys. They would "adopt" young boys from orphanages and send them up the chimneys to clean them - often with their bare

In order to upgrade the image of the chimney sweeps, one sweep stole a top hat and tails out of the local undertaker's garbage and began wearing them. From that point on, chimney sweeps good and bad started wearing top hats and tails.

Although the history of chimney sweeps is full of myth and silliness, the job that they perform is as essential today as it was 200

Lundquist recommends that fireplace chimneys be inspected and cleaned at least every one to two years, depending on how often they are used. Fireplaces with inserts need more frequent cleaning than traditional fireplaces.

"There are a lot of different factors that determine how often a chimney should be cleaned the type of wood that is burned, the size of the fires, and the size of the chimney," Lundquist explained. He encourages a monthly visual inspection of any chimney that is used often.

Lundquist charges about \$55 to sweep a standard fireplace and approximately \$75 to sweep a fireplace with an insert.

Sweeping chimneys is not a pleasant job. Lundquist wears a special respirator to protect himself from the dust and fumes. By the end of the day, his appearance is similar to Dick VanDyke in Mary Poppins.

Lundquist's job is seasonal with his busiest months occurring August through January. He works part time as a mail carrier for the U.S. Postal Service when he's not sweeping chim-

His wife. Michele, takes care of the bookkeeping for White Wolf. She also takes care of the Lundquists' three children (number four is due any day). Lundquist would like to include the entire family in a float for the South Lyon Pumpkinfest next October.

If you are presently cleaning your own chimney, you will probably agree with Lundquist. "It's a nasty job," he said. "If I weren't a chimney sweep, I'd hire one."

Added Lundquist: "I get to do the dirty work. It's a good feeling to know that I did a good job and that I may have helped prevent a chimney

In fact, we have a warrant out for his arrest. Because no one should be able to do things like this to an animal and get away with it.

On December 15, in response to an emergency call, Michigan Humane Society (MHS) cruelty investigators arrived at a house that had been abandoned by its former, tenant for over a month. There, among the trash and other garbage the owner had no further use for, they found Ike. A fivemonth-old puppy lying huddled behind a locked bathroom door. Lying because he was too weak to stand. > hey were your pride and joy — your huge collection of record albums. You stored them carefully - standing upright

and never, never at an angle. You held each vinyl LP gently, delicately in your hands. You touched only the edges, for only a barbarian would do otherwise. Sometimes you balanced one of them deftly with three fingers, like a waitress carrying a tray of coffee, touching only the paper-covered center.

There was a ritual to removing them from their protective covers. You would slide the inner sleeve from the jacket and hold it by the very edge. You allowed gravity to pull the vinyl disk from its paper shell, then you performed your carefully practiced balancing act, easing the record onto your expensive turntable.

But wait — it wasn't time to play the record just yet. First you would purify it with three drops of a mysterious liquid and a special cloth or wooden-handled sponge known as a Discwasher.

They were your record albums, and they were your connection to your inner self or to a world beyond your own. They brought you more than music - they were the background of your youth. Deep down, you believed that a person's record collection said more about him than astrology, diaries or SAT scores could hope to prove.

Perhaps your collection was in alphabetical order, or maybe it was arranged by musical style. Maybe you had one

of those semi-rare, somewhat valuable LPs, like the Beatles'

"white album" on white vinyl. Maybe you believed that there was one - and only one way to correctly position the inner sleeve in the album cover. Most likely you believed the opening of the inner sleeve should be facing north, while the opening in the outer cover

should be facing east. But none of that matters any more. Your albums are dead.

Or at least it seems that way. It's tough to buy them any more. And if you have a compact disc player, you don't want to buy them anyway. You don't play them any more. Like

dinosaurs, they are going the way of the eight-track tape.
It was hard to believe at first. When the eight-tracks went out, you scoffed at those who complained. They should have invested in vinyl, like you.

You tried to rebel by refusing to buy a CD player. But the recording industry marched on without you, and one day you walked into a record store only to find all of the album racks replaced by CDs.

"It's true," said Roger Craig, manager of Harmony House record store in Novi's West Oaks shopping center. "Vinyl is a thing of the past. Probably 90 percent of new titles do not come on vinyl."

Craig is one of millions of baby-boomers who feels a bit sorry to see record albums go. He's quick to point out that it's not stores like his that are phasing out records - it's

the manufacturers. There are still some die-hard vinyl fans, but they don't yell any more. They've pretty much accepted the fact that it's

"It's kind of sad. A lot of manufacturers took the vinyl off the market prematurely. If they would still manufacture it, people would still buy it."

But it's hard to deny that CD's are . . . better than LPs. Basically, it is a superior way to listen to music," Craig said. There are no pops and ticks like on vinyl. And a CD is more durable — it will last virtually forever, while vinyl or cassette tapes will eventually wear out.







Grinold has been fishing since the salmon were first

planted in the Great Lakes in the early 1970s and he is now working with the Lake Michigan Task Force and Lake Huron Task Force to learn why the Chinook salmon have been dying the last few years.


wives are disappearing and the salmon must now The task forces also are exploring a European water flea brought in through the ballast discharge of ocean freighters. "I started fishing when the salmon were first planted and I bought a boat to fish with my four child-

ren. When they grew up, I bought a charter boat. The charter was a way to feed my fishing habit; I can go fishing, meet nice people and still have fun. What I like about fall is that you don't have to dodge all those summer boats; you might be one of only a few boats on the lake. The color is beautiful.

The weather can be a problem, because it gets very

windy and cold, but there is a great window of good weather when Indian summer starts. I think we're into that now, and we can fish well into November. "I keep a list of fishermen, and I call them when the fishing and the weather looks good." "Small trailered boats can go into the lake in November and December but they can run into rough weather. It's best to go on weekends or sometime when there are people out there to help you if you run into trouble. You don't want to be the only boat in sight during bad weather."





# Schram, Krause lead Novi to key road win

The Novi football dynasty is still alive and well after all.

Brighton wrapped up the Ken-sington Valley Conference title with a win over Lakeland last week but the Wildcats kept their MHSAA playoff hopes alive with a thrilling 28-21 road win over a talented Hartland squad on Oct. 12. With the score knotted at 21-21, Novi marched 77 yards for the gamewinner in the final 2:39 of the game. Quarterback Jeff Schram found a wide open Darnel Krause at the goal line with 1:28 remaining and hit him for a 37-yard scoring strike. "We showed a lot of character in this game," a jubilant Novi Coach John Osborne said. "Hartland has a real nice team and we knew we'd be in for a challenge. On paper, they look better than us, but we played our best game of the season. The Brighton coach (Bill Murray) told me that he thought Hartland had the best talent in the

For the second straight week, the Novi offense shifted into high gear. After stumbling through the season's first five weeks, the 'Cats have combined for 63 points in the last two. # Slow and steady is key to dieting

Every year millions of people across the nation decide to go on a

Many of those people try to starve themselves or turn to fad diets in an attempt to shed excess pounds that have been gained over a period of sev-

And that's unhealthy. According to Jean Egan, a nutritionist for the Oakland County Health Department, such tendencies create the famous "vo-vo" syndrome that eventually results in additional pounds. leaving the dieter heavier than

Putting yourself on an extremely ow-calorie diet is a dangerous thing to do. "Very simply, if you're on a very quick, very low-calorie diet, the body will burn whatever is available to it to keep it going - not just fat, but

muscle tissue," Egan said. She explained that autopsies done on people who have died from such drastic dieting pinpoint where the muscle tissue of the heart or other major organs had been metabolized

In other words, the body had been diets in such a manner to lose weight,

These are people who don't look at changing their eating habits," Egan explained. "An extremely low-calorie diet doesn't involve healthy eating, so it doesn't teach the person how to keep the weight off." When people go off the diet, they go

back to their old habits that caused them to gain weight in the first place, should look at the credentials of the

the body's metabolism has slowed down from the drastic dieting in defense against starvation. So, when the dieter goes back to his old eating habits, the metabolism stays the same and the dieter gains even more

The best way to lose weight, Egan said, is to maintain a moderate exercise program and an appropriate fat intake. Men should have no less than 1,400 calories each day and women should have no less than 1,200. "Maybe 1,000 for very small people,"

But what about people who just can't stick to a diet? The weight-loss industry is a billion-dollar business, and the Detroit area is filled with ex-





# Northville falls to 5-2 following Canton loss

Hindsight is always 20/20, especially when it comes to secondguessing a coach.

Last weekend in Ann Arbor, Michigan Coach Gary Moeller spurned an opportunity to tie Michigan State, but the move backfired and the Spartans won 28-27. Less than 24 hours earlier. Northville Coach Darrel Schumacher was faced with a similar decision against Plymouth Canton and he elected to go for the tie in hopes of winning in overtime. Again, that moved backfired and the Chiefs pulled out an exciting 24-21 win over the Mustangs.

The loss drops Northville to 5-2 overall and 3-2 in the WLAA Western Division. Canton improves to 6-1.

"Both sides played a great game, but somebody had to lose." Schumacher said. Our biggest problem is we have to learn how to win the close ones like this."

The Mustangs almost pulled it off. With 2:20 remaining against Canton on Oct. 12, senior linebacker Bob Holloway scooped a fumble out of the air and rambled 51 yards for a touchdown to narrow the gap to 21-20. Schumacher then elected to kick the point-after and knot the score at 21-21 rather than go for a two-point conversion and a one-point lead.

We kind of played for the overtime, but second-guessing myself, maybe we should have played for the win," he said. "We felt our defense would hold and we coulld have a good shot at winning in overtime — but it didn't work out that way."

As it turned out, that decision hardly mattered because the Chiefs drove nearly 60 yards and kicked an 18-yard field goal with seven seconds remaining to pull out the victory. With two losses and just two games remaining, the Mustangs will probably need victories in their last two outings (against 5-2 Plymouth Salem and 5-2 Novi) to have an opportunity to make the program's first-ever appearance in the MHSAA playoffs.

"We've played two very good football teams in Canton and (Farmington) Harrison, and we've been poised for a win heading into the fourth quarter only to come up short both times," Schumacher said. "We thought we could have won either

game." Northville found itself in a 14-0 hole at halftime, but dug its way out with an inspired third quarter. Canton scored midway through the second quarter on a 33-yard toss from Karl Wukle to Brett Howell and then added another touchdown with just 34 seconds remaining before halftime. Wukie ran 11 yards for the score which capped off a nine-play, 77-yard drive. A 25-yard run by Wukie and a 21-yard pass to Mike

ence for us," Schumacher said. "It's very tough to give up a score with just 34 seconds left."

But the Mustangs bounced back at the start of the second half like they've done so many times this season. Ten plays and 69 yards after taking the kickoff, quarterback Ryan Huzjak ran it into the end zone from five yards out, and Brandon Hayes' PAT made it 14-7.

"I don't know what it is, but the third quarter has been our best quarter this season," Schumacher said. We really come out after halftime and play well."

On the Mustangs' next possession, a costly and controversial clipping penalty negated a 40-yard-plus screen pass to Bill Kelley, but on the next play. Kelley broke loose on a draw play for a 47-yard touchdown to tie It at 14-14.

Late in the quarter, Canton forced a Northville turnover (on a tippedball interception) and needed just two plays to turn the mistake into points. Wukie again found Howell, this time for a 40-yard passing

Neither team threatened to score again until Holloway nabbed a fumble in the air near midfield with nothing but the goal line in front of him. It was a play widely known in football circles as a "lineman's dream."

*Bob's been something else for us all year and if anyone deserves to have something like that happen to him, it's Bob," Schumacher said.

Unfortunately, Holloway's heroics weren't enough as Wukie guided the Chiefs 59 yards in eight plays -- including a 19-yard pass to Jason Riggs and a 24-yard pass to Chris James — to set up Jeff Nafe's 18-yard

Canton had a 321 to 220-yard advantage in total offense, and Wukie was a big factor.
