### Suspect arrested in Novi murder

By CRISTINA FERRIER

One of two suspects in the Nov. 9 murder of Dorlando Kenney in Novi was arrested Thursday night in Kalamazoo Township.

Nelson Cobas, 27, was arrested one day after the Oakland County Prosecutor's Office issued a pair of three-count felony warrants for Cobas and one other suspect. The second suspect remains at large.

Said Novi Detective John April, who has been working on the case, "Right now we have no idea where the second individual is."

Police are withholding the identity of the second man until his arrest has been made.

"We think he might flee if he knew we were looking for him." April said. However, he said, with Cobas' arrest it is likely that the second suspect might already know police are looking for him.

The body of Kenney, 33, of Detroit, was discovered at 8 a.m. Nov. 9 along an isolated portion of Twelve-and-a-half Mile Road in Novi. Police said evidence indicated that Kenney had been murdered at the site after being driven there against his will.


Cobas was charged Friday morning in Walled Lake 52nd District Court before Judge Michael Batchick with one count of first degree premeditated murder, one count of first degree murder, and one count of kidnapping

He is being held in the Oakland County Jail without bond and faces a Dec. 21 preliminary examination before Judge Harold Bulgarelli.

Kalamazoo Township Police Sergeant Tom Brockway said Cobas was arrested when he was leaving his apartment building with six other individuals.

Cobas' arrest led to the immediate seizure of an undisclosed quantity of suspected crack cocaine, Brockway said. Following the arrest, they obtained a search warrant and found "three pounds of an unidentified controlled substance and an unregistered handgun" in an apartment that Cobas frequented.

Kalamazoo Township Detective Sergeant Dave Caswell said Cobas was arrested without incident.



#### False alarm

### **Group selects** another site for waste facility

The Resource Recovery and Recycling Authority of Southwest Oakland County (RRRASOC) decided to say no to Haggerty Road -and Novi.

Southfield is likely to be home to a materials recovery facility (MRF) serving at least eight communities, RRRASOC general manager Lenora Jadun announced Dec. 13. Two Novi sites, one at Haggerty Road and the other at Wixom Road, have been pushed down from their top spots on the candidate list.

The authority anticipates saving \$10 million by redeveloping a seven-acre complex of three empty industrial buildings at the northeast corner of Eight Mile and Evergreen roads, rather than starting from the ground up on vacant land. Purchase of new equipment and updating the structures - some dating to the 1920s - is expected to cost \$12.5 million.

"Because of the economic situation, with gas prices up and the potential for a recession in the future, we think a rehabilitation in that area might be economically better for the community. We said take another look, otherwise we'll stay with the Novi site," Jadun said.

"We could have gotten through the Novi process. Based on economic reasons, we decided to take another look again." Operations are scheduled to be-

### Chinese are awed by Parkview

The design of award-winning Parkview Elementary School received further accolades Thursday when a group of Chinese educators visited the school. "A paradise for the kids" and "a

dreamland for the children described the impression the building left on Jim Weixian, a district superintendent in Tianjin, China. Tianjin is the third largest city in

China located to the southeast of The 18-month-old Parkview Elementary School building won a national award for design on its

opening from the American Association of School Administrators. Weixian agreed, speaking through a translator, that the building is well designed, and said the school's unique style makes the building conve-

nient and practical. School superintendent Cut Fuhong has 1.4 million students filling 4,000 buildings in his Tianjin school district. Fuhong would have to see a different school in his district every day for 12 years if he hoped to see all the buildings.

None of the 4,000 schools in his district are like Parkview, at least not yet, Fuhong said. He praised the design of the building as practical. The five-member delegation came to the U.S. as part of an ongoing edu- Jordan said. cational exchange program. They



### Glut halts hotel construction

Experts predict occupancy will remain low for three years

daily room charges for hotels in metro Detroit are expected to decline during 1990 for the third year in a row, according to a study compiled by the accounting/consulting firm of BDO Seidman.

That's good news for business travelers heading here and locals who enjoy getaway weekend packages. Oversupply generally leads to competition and top value for the

But the decline isn't especially good news for hotel operators and, perhaps down the line, for those who work in the hospitality industry. As revenues shrink, profit margins tend to decrease and belt tightening could lead to job cutbacks. A mediocre market has evolved at the dawn of a new decade due to tremendous overbuilding in the tri-county suburbs and Ann Arbor/Ypsilanti.

Since 1986, according to the BDO Seidman report, available hotel room nights here have soared from just under 5 million to more than 10.2 million annually.

"Probably for a good three to four years, at least, there won't be any substantial new development of hotels," said Wanda L. Spencer, senior manager for the hospitality consulting group at BDO Seidman.

A look at Seidman's numbers tells
