# Janitors seek apology from school board

Five janitors who were searched following an alleged theft last November brought their grievance to the Novi school board Thursday asking for a public apology and the establishment of a written policy regarding searches.

Their grievance was declared invalid by the board, although the innocence of the crew was recognized in a board resolution.

On Nov. 7, five night janitors were called to the main office in Novi High School after assistant principal Jennifer Cheal discovered a \$20 bill was missing from the counseling center around 11:15 p.m.

The money had been dusted with green powder by police at the request of school administrators.

Novi police also had trained school administrators to use a black light to search the hands and pockets of suspected thieves.

Prior to the November incident, Administrators suspected that someone had been stealing money from student activity accounts since the spring. Money to be deposited in the accounts regularly goes through the counseling center be-

Cheal called secondary administrator Charles Nanas. Together they checked the hands and clothing of the five night custodians.

Cheal reported the results were difficult to read. They had been trained to use the light on a clean, dark suit and smooth hands.

Hand callouses and lint had a "strange cast" when placed under the light, according to Cheal's written report on the incident. The Novi police were called in to counsuit with the administrators.

Each custodian was asked to present any cash they had for a search. No \$20 bills were found.

At Thursday's hearing, Cheal and Nanas testified that the custodians volunteered to submit to the tests, and they were informed of their right to refuse.

The custodians all disagreed saying they did not feel the blacklight test was voluntary. They said they presented the money in their wallets at the administrator's request. They agreed they had not been forced at this point to submit to the search of their money.

The custodians also claimed Cheal required them to stay past the end of their scheduled shift. They generally work until midnight, but stayed until after 12:30 that evening. Cheal said she informed the custodians they could leave earlier, but they would be paid for any overtime worked on the evening of

Both parties agreed that Cheal apologized that night for the inconvenience.

The custodians said the apology became valueless the next day some of them found their lockers and work closets had been

"What provoked this whole problem was the next day. It could have ended that evening," said Phil Schloon, business man

custodian's union. Schloop represented the custodians at the board hearing

Thursday. There is an assumption of guilt here which has demeaned our membership," Schloop said

The custodians' grievance said on Nov. 7 we were forced to take a black-light test regarding an alleged theft. This violated our rights and was an illegal act."

The grievance requested a written public apology and a promise to cease and desist such actions. The grievance also requested that any

# Family mourns loss of 2 children

Three people, including two children of a former Novi resident, were killed as the result of an accident involving a motorcycle and automobile Wednesday night in Commerce Township.

The vehicle driven by Patricia Loder, a former Novi Deputy Clerk and longtime resident, was struck in the passenger's side by motorcyclist James E. Bondie, of West Bloomfield Township. at 6:05 p.m., according to Oakland County Sheriff's Sgt. Bruce Naile. The accident occurred at the intersection of Half Penny Drive and Sleeth Road in Commerce Township, just yards away from the Loder home.

Stephen Loder, 5, was pronounced dead later that evening at nearby Huron Valley Hospital. according to hospital spokesperson Susan Happel. Stephanie Loder, 8, died at the University of Michigan's Mott Children's Hospital in Ann Arbor Thurday morning, Naile said. They were the most wonderful children in the

world," said Wayne Loder, the children's father. "Both of them were very special."

Bondie, 26, was also killed in the accident. An autopsy revealed that he died of multiple

Naile said the West Bloomfield man and two others were riding their motorcycles at a high rate of speed on westbound Sleeth Road when Loder attempted to turn left onto Half Penny

Drive from the eastbound lane of the road. The other two men, he said, sped past Loder's vehicle, but Bondie slammed into the passenger

Wayne Loder said his wife believed the motorcyclists where far enough away to make the turn

Witnesses estimated that Bondie was traveling at 80 miles per hour or more at the time of the accident, Naile said. He added that Sleeth Road

is zoned at 45 mph at the intersection. An investigation of the accident is currently under way. Naile said a finding of fault, if any, would be determined by the investigation.

Robert Farris didn't get what he bargained for when he left Canton

Township to move into Timber Ridge Estates, one of Novi's priciest subdivisions. What he was hoping for was a custom-built dreamhouse sur-

rounded by tall trees. What he ended up with was a nightmare and a money pit. 'in a nutshell, we've moved in

and we've had flooding problem after flooding problem. JCK (Novi's consulting engineers) and the city say it's the builder's fault. The builder says it's not. I'm kind of caught in a quandary," Farris said.

Everybody wants to pass the buck but no one wants to pass the

responsibility . . . It's an unbelievable continuing saga."

Yard flooded over 40 times

Now, he's waiting for an answer from the state attorney general's office, which Farris has asked to investigate his complaint.

The cause of the flooding according to reports from Novi's consulting engineers JCK & Associates, is that the home is built about a foot too low. The driveway is higher than called for in the plot

Instead of flowing to drains in the street, rainwater is directed across the front yard of the residence, which has a city assessed market value of \$278,000.

This has happened over 40 times, Farris says.

The family moved into the home in December 1988. Following four rejections, JCK approved the property's grade level in August 1989 after the landscaping had gone in.

The first deluge happened the following June. A city stormwater catchbasin in the street became clossed with debris, aggravating the aituation.

For the next few months, Farris and his wife, Diane, alept in shifts any night there was a rainstorm.

"She'd get up at one. I'd get up at three. She'd get up at five. I'd get up at seven. We've done that 10 to 15 times at least. We'd be out with another couple and a rainstorm would start and we'd say, 'let's wing by the house so we can clean out the storm grate," he said.

## Providence proceeds ahead

Providence Hospital is moving forward with development of facilities at its 153-acre site at the corner of Grand River and Beck Road in

According to Gregg Kneppley, vice president of planning and marketing for the hospital, construction began late last week with the pouring of foundations. "Phase one" of the development will include a medical office building and ambulatory diagnostic treatment center. A 200-bed inpatient hospital,

diagnostic and long-term care facilities are slated in later phases. Development will not likely be complete until after the turn of the century.

Representatives of the hospital were before the planning commission Wednesday for a request to rezone nearly two acres adjacent to phase one of the project.

"We are approaching you tonight to rezone that small parcel from R-3 (residental) to OS-2 (office service district)." Kneppley told commissioners.

Planners voted unanimously to recommend the rezoning to city

council. A final decision by the council will likely be made by the end of the month or early April.

Novi Planning Consultant Brandon Rogers favored the rezoning. "I whole-heartedly recommend this rezoning," he said, "to eliminate spot zoning."

Providence bought the 153-acre Westbrooke Golf Course in January of last year for the development of a new hospital and other facilities. Just more than 95 acres of the site was rezoned to the office service dis-

## Novi News price rises

The cost of an annual subscription to the Novi News will rise from \$18 to \$22 effective April 1. The \$4 annual increase is the

first since 1987.

Philip Jerome, executive editor of the News and HomeTown Newspapers, said the price increase is tied directly to operating costs, including an 11 percent hike in the cost of newsprint and a 19 percent increase in postal rates.

The newsstand price will remain at 50 cents.

Jerome emphasized that the current rate of \$18 per year will remain in effect until April 1. Anyone wishing to take out a new subscription to the News or renew a subscription can take advantage of the opportunity to beat the increase by plac-



# Activities fund theft has been mishandled

Almost a year ago, Novi High School administrators began to suspect that money had been taken from a student activities fund kept in the building's counseling center. And when suspicions were again raised this past November that money was missing, the administrators decided to see if they could catch

At the request of school administrators, the police department sprinkled a powder on the bills which would later show up under a black light, and waited to see whether any money would go missing again. Shortly later, a \$20 bill was apparently lifted from the drawer and administrators called in the five night janitors on duty in the building at the time to check them out. It should be noted that others were in the building that night. There had been a school concert and it is quite possible there had been some stragglers in and around the building, after the money had last been

It is not clear at this point whether the janitors submitted voluntarily to the search, but the administrators checked them and the money in their pockets under a black light. What they found was that the custodians had no \$20 bills. Because of the chalk and lint on the janitors' clothes and because of callouses on their hands, administrators also had a hard time telling what they were seeing under the black light. But the final result was that administrators could not spot any of the powder which had been placed on the bills.

The administrators apparently apologized to the employees for the inconvenience, and perhaps that would have been the end of it. But the next day, administrators also searched the lockers of at least some of the janitors. As a result, the custodians filed a grievance. the police.

Last week, the grievance came before the school board for review. The have been an overreaction. Yes, theft is board concluded the grievance wasn't valid, that no contract wording had been violated, and then it declined to issue a formal apology to the employees. It did, however, concede the innocence of the five fanitors.

In the meantime, the administration has addressed the problem in another way, through the addition of new locks at those locations in the building where money is kept and by reducing the amount of money kept in the building.

So now, what has all this accomplished. The money is still missing. The administrators still do not know exactly how much is missing from the fund overall, only that at least the \$20 was taken. And the thief has not been caught.

Additionally, the administration has damaged — perhaps irreparably its relationship with a number of employees, who are understandably upset that they have come under this kind of scrutiny. Most people don't mind giving an accounting of themselves when a crime has been committed, but once they've vindicated themselves, they reasonably should be able to expect to hear an apology.

There is also a question as to whether the rights of the employees were violated when they were subjected to this

#### Education

To our minds, this matter has been mishandled from the start. And the mishandling seems to be continuing.

For one, we find it disturbing that no one knows for sure how much might have actually been taken from the account. Now, we can understand that the money was handled in a loose, informal fashion in the beginning. But from the very first suspicion that money was missing, the administration should have clamped tighter controls on the account. New locks should have been installed

Additionally, a single person should have been put in charge of keeping the account, noting on a ledger sheet what comes in and what goes out of it. Only tight accounting would insure that no money went missing and, if it did, at least administrators would be able to tell for sure how much was gone and when it was lost. If only a few dollars had been taken and it only happened once, those tightened controls could legitimately have been the end of the whole issue. Only further purloining of cash would reasonably require more investigation.

Certainly, school district officials should not be running criminal investigations, much less "sting" operations. If matters are of such a serious nature that they require this kind of action, the whole matter should be turned over to

But in this case, it would appear to theft. It's wrong and we do not condone it. But let's also face it, thefts of a few bucks will happen occassionally in any large organization. And the managers of that organization should be first attempt to deal with the matter in less severe manner. If the amount is small, merely explaining to employees that money has been taken and, therefore, tighter controls on the account will be necessary might just resolve the problem. Only if problems persist should the matter be turned into something more serious.

The school board's decision to do nothing more than affirm the employees' innocence also doesn't really begin to address their concerns. It would be, in our opinion, very appropriate for the board to issue an apology, since the administration represents the board when it deals with employees. Or at least, the board should order an apology from the dministration.

But most importantly, the board needs to take some action that will clarify what the school district's policy is to be when and if a similar situations arise in the future.

And finally, both the board and the administration need to put themselves in the place of their employees for a few minutes and think about how they would feel if accused of a crime they didn't commit, or worse if they felt they were not believed once they've been vindicated.







### Cognac can put you in the spirit

The French district of Charentes, an hour's drive northwest of Bordeaux, on the Atlantic, is known for butter, cream, shellfish, casseroles and

Cognac produced from grapes grown on chalky soil, double pot-distilled, and aged in oak, has the elegant, delicate aroma and smooth, silky taste of the finest distilled spirits," says Benedicte Hardy, international export manager for A. Hardy cognac.

Hardy, the great-great granddaughter of the founder Antoine Hardy, whose cognac house has borne his name since 1863, is on a mission to seli America on the pleasures of sipping cognac. Hardy received great attention in the United States last year because her family-operated firm offers the world's most expensive spirit - Cognac Perfection, retailing for \$3,500 per bottle.

For full enjoyment of a fine cognac, practice the following techniques when you taste.

The glass: The glass to be used is not a snifter but one that is tall and slim on a short stem. The bowl is 3 % inches high by 1 % inches in diameter with a total volume of 4 % ounces. This tasting glass allows the cognac to present its perfumes in waves — the very volatile first, followed by less volatile components. A 1-ounce pour of cognac is ample for a thorough evaluation. In the case of cognac, tasting requires less drinking and more attention to aromas, flavors and sensations.

View the cognac against a bright, white background to observe its color and brilliance. It should have a golden hue without being too dark.

Cognac's aroma can be evaluated in two steps. First, hold the glass at waist level and swiri it vigorously. Then, very slowly, raise the glass toward your nose. Breathe in deeply to determine at what maximum distance you can perceive the first perfumes of the cognac. This will help you determine the vitality of the cognac, which is controlled by the more volatile elements of the spirit.

Repeat the process of swirling and inhaling while holding the glass a few inches from your nose. This "second nose" allows you to discover a new level of perfumes that are part of the less volatile components. This step helps assess the length of the cognac.

Raise the temperature of cognac by hand. Do not waste money on a warmer. Cognac is 40 percent alcohol and many desirable components are volatile. Heating the spirit only serves to evaporate volatile elements before you get to enjoy them.

Taste is best appreciated in two steps also. Take a little drop of cognac on your tongue and let it disfuse through your mouth. Swallow it very slowly, detecting whether there is any bitterness or acidity. Note too the smoothness, roundness and

Next, take a bigger sip. Rotate the cognac in your mouth so that your tongue is coated and simultaneously circulate air through the liquid. Your entire mouth and nasal passages will overflow with the aroma.

# Passover: A symbolic repast

The holiday of Passover begins at sundown on March 29, which corresponds to the 15th day of the Hebrew month of Nisan. And while you may hear of, and even take part in slight variations of the holiday, the main elements of the celebration have not changed in thousands of years: the Paschai lamb, the matzo and the bitter herbs.

The Passover Seder is one of the most universally observed of all Jewish ceremonies. All over the world, families and friends join together and reinforce the ties that bind them to past generations.

Everyone eagerly sits down at the table and amdously waits as once again the youngest child asks, "why is this night different from all other nights?"

We have heard the story retold year after year, but the words of the Haggaddah are charged with new meaning this year be-

cause of the recent Middle East crisis. .The Seder celebration revolves around special, carefully chosen foods that are to be eaten and those that are forbidden. It is through this ritual meal that the story of the exodus is repeated. Each dish holds a special meaning which will be explained before it is eaten.

All leavening, flours and grains are forbidden. Only the special flours used for baking maizo may be used and that flour is strictly

Research has proven that soybeans produce 33 percent more protein from an acre of land than any other crop and 20 times as much protein that an acre of land used to graze cattle or raise their fodder.

Tofu contains all of the eight essential amino acids needed by the body to use protein making it an equal substitute for other protein sources. In addition tofu is lowcalorie, low in sodium and cholesterol free. Eight ounces, which is a glant portion, contains only 150 calories. As a comparison, an equal amount of meat contains up to 800 calories depending on the cut.

The Chinese people have a lower incidence of heart disease and much of this can be attributed to the lack of meat and cholesterol in their diets.

It is not necessary to eat meat to get your allotment of protein. Tofu is safe for persons on a restricted sodium diet, or those just watching their salt intake. Also, tofu is rich in calcium, iron, phosphorus and vit-

amins B and E. Like any other food it is important to follow a few simple rules. Tofu should always be immersed in water and stored in the refrigerator. Change the water at least every other day to prevent spoilage.

Most stores offer a choice of firm or soft tofu, the difference being the water content. Soft tofu is good in soups and gravy dishes, while the firmer can be crumbled and added to dishes or fried. Generally they are exchangeable in any recipe. Dishes containing tofu are best served hot and rewarm easily.

Because tofu requires a short cooking time it is excellent for use when you are in a hurry. Tofu can be frozen but the texture will become spongy. Simply squeeze out the excess water and proceed as usual. Another alternative is to "dry" the tofu

by wrapping in cheesecloth and weighing it down to remove the moisture before

Tofu is inexpensive, nutritious and provides a high quality protein with a low number of calories. An excellent cookbook and information source is "Nutritional Cooking With Tofu" by Christine Y.C. Liu. She is a nutritionist as well as a cookbook author, and has broken each recipe down into calories, carbohydrates, protein, fat, cholesterol and sodium. The book is available at the Kitchen Witch in Northville.

# Give leftover eggs some egg-citement MONDAY

Long before Christian times, eggs were decorated and exchanged as one of the yearly rites of spring. Later the egg, long a symbol of rebirth, became important to the celebration of Easter, representing Christ's resurrection from the tomb.

Modern kids love to color hardcooked eggs for Easter. I still think it's great fun, messing around with those little plastic bottles of food coloring and dipping eggs into a rainbow of colors. The only problem is, after they're all decorated, who wants to eat them? One or two, and you're pretty much "egged out." Although, chocolate eggs are a different matter

What to do if you have extra Easter eggs? Chopped hard-cooked eggs make a tasty and attractive garnish for salads, soups and casseroles. And today's recipes should give you a few flavorful alternatives to egg salad sandwiches.

Eggs that crack while being hardcooked are still perfectly fine to use (though not to color.) Refrigerate promptly and plan to use within a day or two or the eggs may dry out. Hard-cooked refrigerated eggs with shells intact will stay fresh for more

than a month. Sometimes hard-cooked eggs have a greenish tinge between the yolk and white. This is caused by a chemical reaction during cooking, between the sulfur in the white and the iron in the volk. The color does not indicate spoilage. It may look unattractive,
