Novi trades rezoning for **Amoco land**

Novi city council voted Wednesday night to enter into a contract with Amoco Oil that would give the city an option to purchase the com-pany's downtown gas station and

aquire several key rights-of-way.

The giant oil company also agreed to vacate and clean up contaminated soils and groundwater at its Grand River and Novi Road station in the deal. In exchange, the city agreed to help Amoco set up two service stations on Twelve Mile

The council voted 4-2 to enter the agreement with members Tim Pope and Nancy Cassis dissenting. In addition, the coucil voted to rezone the two Twelve Mile sites to allow for operation of the gas stations.

The theory behind the agreement is that the city would spend money for preparation of plans and consultant reviews," Novi City At■ The Cooker Bar and Grill was given unanimous approval Wednesday for preliminary site plans and a wetlands permit. The restaurant, to be located just west of Haggerty Road, is being developed in conjunction with an Amoco gas station. The story is on page 3.

Tax base sharing put on 'fast track'

State Rep. Jan Dolan, R-Farmington Hills, wore a black arm band on the House floor Thursday.

The second-term lawmaker held up a black bandit's mask and offered it to Rep. William Keith, D-Garden City. There should be give and take. There's only take. That's not fair," she said.

'Fantasy' manager defends agency

The manager of "Fantasy Dancers" defended the Novi-based erotic dance outcall agency as a legitimate business, and insisted the agency does not provide massages.

The Novi News reported that the business offered a "full body massage" after a caller to the agency's two phone numbers was told so last

Outcall massage, except for clients physically

unable to travel to a massage business, is a violation of a Novi City ordinance.

Manager Susan Garcia said she had no knowledge of massage services being provided by her company. To the best of my knowledge, it hasn't been being offered," she said. "However, if it has been or is being said, it will not be said in the future. It was done completely without my

knowledge." Carcia said that receptionists at "Fantasy Dancers' misspoke if they offered massages. "Our phone girls do work on a commission basis," she said. "This has prompted questions in my mind that perhaps I should restructure the payment plan. If they are saying more than they should be saying or doing more than they should be doing to make that booking, then by golly I want it stopped, because that's not the type of

business that I want to operate." As for the erotic dancing, Garcia insisted that the agency operates aboveboard. "We're running a legitimate business, we are not offering any-







In any case, it will count a loss for the Novi district. Piwko has been a solid. stable leader who has done much to help the district progress over the years.





School board okays power boost for radio station

Novi High School's broadcast students most likely will be broadcasting to 80 percent more people when WOVI, "Novi's Wild Side," goes on the air next fall.

Last minute details

WOVI, 89.5 on the FM dial, applied for a power increase from the Federal Communications Commission in February 1990.

The FCC approved the increase, but until Thursday the cost for new equipment was not approved.

At a regular meeting Thursday, the Novi school board voted unanimously to allow administrators and WOVI staff adviser David Legg to move ahead on the expansion. New equipment needed to expand WOVI's signal is ex-

pected to cost \$18,445.45 not including labor. Trustee Raymond Byers suggested approving a motion to accept bids rather than a motion to approve the expenditure.

But that is in essence what the board would be doing by approving the expenditure, said board President Robert Schram. Bids must still come back to the school

board for final approval.

"My only concern is we need to show support for it, . . but we also need to know what it costs," Schram said. At the board's request, Legg provided information about underwriter programs at Novi High School and two other high schools.

WOVI's license does not permit it to sell advertising. but it can receive contributions from underwriters. In exchange, the station can offer on-air recogition of the donation but may not endorse a company or product.

WOVI, a 10-watt station, receives \$470 from 19

Broadcasting at 200 watts, Plymouth-Canton Schools receives \$1,200 from 12 underwriters.

Warren Consolidated Schools receives \$6,000 from 13 underwriters. Warren schools broadcasts at 100 watts. Legg said he expects the cash amounts and numbers underwriters will increase with WOVI's expansion. All changes and expansion at WOVI must be complete by September 1992 when the FCC permit expires. The station provides sports, entertainment, news and

children's programing during the school year.

Novi DPS negotiates hauling

Novi's Waste and Recylables Collection Committee has been given the go-ahead to talk trash with Waste Management Inc., a major hauling company.

Anthony Nowicki, Novi's Director of Public Services, told the city council June 17 that the disposal corporation contacted the committee earlier this month to see if they could arrange a contract with Novi similar to those Waste Management has with the cities of Farmington, Farmington Hills, Southfield and Wixom.

At present, Novi is the only one of eight members of the Resource Recover and Recycling Authority of Southwest Oakland County (RRRA-SOC) not to have community-wide

trash collection. With curbside recycling in the near future, the committee, created in December, has the mandate to study how Novi will meet this challenge.

"Their intention is they would want to extend the Farmington Hills and Southfield contracts to us at the same rate and their indication is they would come in higher if they have to go through traditional bids," said City Manager Edward Kriewall. "On

the surface, it makes some sense." The city council gave the nod to discussions with Waste Management, but Council Member Tim Pope urged that other waste hauling companies also be alerted to the local opportunity.

At present, Novi subdivisions contract individually with a number of different trash hauling services. Some council members aren't necessarily thrilled with the idea of one major corporation taking on the job.

"I do not like the idea of the large businesses like BFI and Waste Management taking over everything," said Council Member Joseph Toth. *Five years from now, I could pay \$500 per month for trash pick-up. Waste Management and BFI seem to be heading down the road to kill all competition."





Wine grab bag yields pleasant Calif. surprises

We are introduced to new wines in restaurants, at wine tastings, at interviews and while traveling to wine country. The number of ways we become aware of new wines is sometimes surprising. People know that we delight in discoveries and frequently introduce us to wines they have enjoyed.

Recently, while planning a party for some friends and neighbors, we called our wine retailer and asked that he put together a mixed case of value-priced chardonnays - four different producers, three bottles of each. We agreed on a price range and left it up to him. He knows what we like, but also knows that we appreciate a surprise or two.

Among the mixed case was the J. Lohr Estates Riverstone Chardonnay (\$12). Our friends liked the full aromas of tropical fruit and buttery, toasted oak. It disappeared fast. For the money, the wine is uncommonly lush with abundant flavors of pear and apple, featuring 📇 a long, lingering finish.

After our experience we were very happy when J. : Lohr winemaker Jeff Runquist came to Detroit. We had . the opportunity to meet him and discuss his wines at the Rattlesnake Club where sommelier Madeline Triffon was featuring the Riverstone Chardonnay at a byhathe-glass pour.

Rundquist explained that to achieve full, lush chardonnay flavors he harvests the grapes when they are fully mature. He judges this by walking the vineyard and tasting the berries. The grapes are machine harvested at night, when the fruit is cool. They are pressed immediately in the vineyard within one to two hours after picking.

Runquist introduced us to the 1987 J. Lohr Estates Seven Oaks Cabernet Sauvignon (\$12), a wine with distinctive blackberry and cherry aromas followed by fresh fruit flavors and a rich, velvety texture. "We are very proud of the cabernet fruit we get from our Seven Oaks Vineyard located in Paso Robles," Runquist emphasized. "Napa Valley cabernet sauvignon is reminiscent of caseis and black current, Alexander Valley exudes plum, Santa Barbara has an olive note, but Paso Robles boasts intense black cherry character."

Paso Robles has a climate similar to that of the Alexander Valley in Northern Sonoma County. The main difference, according to Runquist, is the soil. Paso Robles boasts a rich clay-loam topsoil over a sub-soil of limestone and slate.

We harvest cabernet in the warmth of the day to aid in extracting flavor and color from the skins," Runquist said. "We age the wine in small American oak barrels which contributes a delightful cinnamon, vanilla bouquet. The wine has sufficient tannins to give structure and ageability, but not so much to interfere with the

J. Lohr Winery was founded in San Jose in 1974. The original winery now produces only white wines. In 1988, a new red wine facility was built adjacent to the Seven Oaks Vineyard in Paso Robles. Here, Runquist is armed with the best winemaking equipment and technology available. This allows him to produce an attractive, fruity. Beaujolais-style red wine, J. Lohr Wildflower Gamay (\$9), which reminds us of a cru Beaujo-

Runquist also introduced us to the Cypress Brand of affordable varietal wines produced by J. Lohr Vineyards. These wines are handcrafted by blending estate grapes with fruit from selected coastal vineyards.

The following Cypress brand wines are produced by J. Lohr and represent excellent values in their price range.

1990 Cypress Fume Blanc (\$6) excides fresh honeydew melon and grapefruit aromas in the style of a clean, summertime refresher.

1989 Cypross Chardonnsy (\$9) showcases apple and pear aromas highlighted by a bouquet of toasty oak and vanilla. Oak and fruit flavors are wellbalanced in a stylish presentation.

1988 Cypress Meriot (\$9) is made from Washington State fruit. Dark cherry aromas introduce flavors of cranberries and spice in a supple style that is readily accessible.

1987 Cypress Cabemet Sauvignoz (\$9) features soft cassis and cherry aromas and flavors in a silky. California style.

Suited to a tea New tea room is perfect fit in Northville

Sue Baker, part owner of the Rose Cottage Tea Room in Northville, wears a countrifled print dress to work, but it's teamed up with running shoes.

Well, they say if the shoe fits . . . And those shoes definitely fit the energetic Baker as she darts around the restaurant, answering the phone, tending to customers in line, checking things in the kitchen. Her eyes flash like lightning as she ex-

plains how she started the Rose Cottage Tea Room.

"I've been in the food business for 20 years," she says. "I loved doing food, but I needed something more stimulating."


She decided a tea room was her goal, but needed a place to do it. At just about that time, neighbor Tony Rizzo had a vacancy in the building he had been leasing. He offered her the space, and the two teamed up as business partners.

And the Rose Cottage Tea Room is definitely the shoe that fits Northville, too. "You know, the thing I hear most often from people is, 'Northville needed this,' "

she savs. Open for just two months, the tea room is a new concept in Northville. Places like the Townsend Hotel in Birmingham and the Sweet Afton Tea Room in Plymouth have offered proper afternoon tea, but the Rose Cottage seems to fill a niche between those two.

In the proper British tradition, tea is served with separate pots for water and tea. In addition, the guest may dine on a platter of nine assorted finger sandwiches, two pastries, and fresh scones with fruit preserves. Devonshire cream and fresh fruit are also included.

The pastries are made fresh daily by

stomach to handle, there's a light after- they're gone. It may be 15 or 20 minutes noon tea available with a smaller pot of tea and a smaller assortment of goodies.

Rizzo, co-owner of the Rose Cottage with Baker, manages the business end of the operation, and he likes the way the tea room has grown rapidly.

"We've had days where we've had to turn people away," he says.

He also points out that the informal atmosphere at the Rose Cottage is slightly different from a place like the Townsend

> before they get back to you. "Here, for \$12.50, we place a huge dish in front of you, and we'll let two people split

The light tea, which is for one person only, goes for \$7.50.

The decorations give the Rose Cottage a true Northville feel. From the minute you step up to the building, you can smell the rosebushes growing in the front yard. Entrance is in the back, as the front porch is used as a seating area.

Inside there is plenty of print wallpaper and clean linen tablecloths, and pastel hues abound. Lace curtains adorn the windows.

Each room of the converted frame house has its own flavor. One is large and bustling, another small and intimate. In the near future, upstairs rooms will be open as well. Smoking is prohibited everywhere, even on the porch.

What sells the place is the decoration and the ambiance, "says Rizzo, "We get lots of compliments on the decorating. We used all local people where we could."

The clientele isn't entirely local, though. Wise customers call ahead with reservations for the lunch hour (11:30 a.m. to 2:30 p.m., with tea being served from 3-5 p.m.), and they've been known to call from Mt. Clemens, Troy, Birmingham, Trenton and Grosse Pointe. That people will drive an hour to do afternoon tea is not surprising to Baker, a confessed flend for teas and tea sandwiches.

"I know I'd drive across town for tea." she says. "I've always loved tea and tea sandwiches. Ive gone to places on the East Coast that served tea, and Canada has some great tea rooms.

"But I always thought, if I had one, what would I do? Now I can do it."

Though the afternoon tea has its following, the real smash hit has been the lunch menu. Baker planned all the menus herself, and while flavor and elegance abound in items like a Londonderry Grill (slivered beef tenderloin with ham, turkey, Jarlsberg cheese and pepper chutney on eggdipped rye) or the non-dessert streudels (chicken or mushroom, with risotto), nutrition is a big factor as well.

It's our berry favorite time of year

Every year when my friend Roz picks her first batch of strawberries we celebrate with a fresh strawberry daiquiri. It is tradition.

One usually leads to two and the afternoon is spent reminiscing and relaxing. When it is time to leave I am presented with a bag of berries large enough to use on cereal, eat "straight" as a low-cal snack, or to bake a batch of biscuits and whip some fresh cream for shortcakes. There is nothing quite so wicked as a couple of shortcakes spread with butter, amothered with crushed fruit and slathered with fresh cream - for dinner. I have been known to do this.

Sometimes I'll have an ear of fresh corn and a few sliced tomatoes first. Sometimes

Strawberries are taken for granted because of their availability. However, they have only been cultivated for a short peried. They are a recent development resulting from the cross breeding of small wild American strawberries with a juicy Chilean variety.

Strawberries have multiple uses. Pureed as a sauce, blended with yogurt for a cold soup, mixed with salad greens, in a souffle or crushed, their fragrant essence is prized the world over. The prime season for strawberries is now, late spring to early summer.

Choose berries with a uniform red color and green, moist hull. The larger the container, the more chance that the berries will be crushed by their own weight and damaged.

Strawberries are high in vitamin C and low in calories. a 31/3 -ounce portion contains only 30. Do not wash berries until you are ready to use them. Washing ahead of time is asking for mold. Remove the stem unless it is needed for decorative

Strawberries provide, in my estimation. the most dramatic presentations. A huge glass bowl filled to the brim accompanied

with a honey-cream cheese dip, brown sugar and whipped cream is a simple, delicious and elegant dessert. A silver tray filled with white and dark chocolatedipped berries is another suggestion. For a sumptuous cocktail, add a strawberry to glass of white wine or champagne.

Strawberries are very rarely cooked except for preserves. There is nothing that compares to homemade strawberry jam freshly baked bread and creamy butter.

Blueberries are likely the next most popular berry. They are commonly eaten raw or baked in pies or turnovers. Blueberries, like strawberries, make a wonderful cold

Raspberries and the not-so-common blackberries are classified as multiple fruits. They are made up of many tiny segments, each of which contains a seed. These berries are at their best plain or with just a sprinkle of sugar. All share a com-

mon peak season, summer. Choose fruit that is vibrant and deep in color. Small containers will assure a lessdamaged product. Check for mold or rot. The berries should be dry and fairly firm. Avid mushy or too-soft fruit. Wash berries just prior to service. Refrigerate loosely wrapped for up to three days after purchasing.

All berries freeze well. Wash and dry well. Place on a cookle sheet in one layer and freeze until solid. Package in plastic bags. Remove and use as needed.

Berries that are frozen are primarily good for sauces as their structure changes after freezing. The following recipe can be used with any berries. The fruit vinegar and liquor may be omitted, but they are flavor enhancers. The soup is low calorie and low fat. Serve as a first course or a main light meal. If made ahead of time, store in the blender cup and reblend just before service. Enjoy berry much.


