State report on July storm zaps Edison

The public service commission (PSC) reviewed the performance of Detroit Edison and Consumers Power following the July 7 super storm and found it came up lacking.

A staff report released August 30 by the commission confirmed what Novi officials charged earlier — that Detroit Edison cutbacks in its treetrimming program led to thousands of storm-broken branches disrupting power lines.


The report underscored statements made by hundreds of customers that the reliability of the service — especially in Oakland County - has declined drastically over the last few years.

One solution to the power distribution problem proposed by the PSC staff is an incentive system of rewards and penalties to make sure the companies spend the funds

Compost fertilized new city ordinance

Gripes from neighbors about the not-so-gentle but ever so ecologically-sound aroma of back - and front - yard compost piles have led Novi to develop and adopt its own possibly groundbreaking

composting ordinance. Until Sept. 10, composting will continue to be technically illegal in Novi, as the piles of grass clippings, vegetable scraps and coffee grounds could be considered in violation of Novi's littering ordinance, Assistant City Attorney Dennis Watson said. After this time, the practice will be legal but controlled.

Ordinance Enforcement Officer Steve Babinchak said he requested the ordinance after receiving at least one complaint a day about compost piles over the last two

years. As part of the popular movement towards recycling waste materials, composting practitioners prefer to return nutrients from decomposed materials such as a grass clippings, vegetable scraps and coffee grounds to the soil for fertilizer rather than to a landfill.

If not done properly, the results can be a little gamey — especially during hot days and at night after the dew falls.

*People were just throwing together food scraps and other things and calling it a compost pile. The odor would get so horrendous,

neighbors began complaining. We don't really have an odor ordinance," said Mayor Matthew

"We started from scratch." The problem is not composting but composting done improperly, Babinchak explained. He's found items such as cooking grease, chicken bones, sardine cans and a dead cat tossed on a rank heap described as a compost pile by the

The new ordinance which was drafted with the advice of the Michigan Department of Public Health should have educational merit, he

Another touchy situation has been that residents tend to place the piles as far as possible from their own homes - and as near as possible to their neighbor's windows.

Under the previous city code, Babinchak said he was obliged to ticket properly maintained backyard operations.

"I had to issue violations to the people who were being environmentally aware. Personally, I'm in favor of composting. I wanted to see a way people could do it," he said.

Watson, who drafted the ordinance adopted by the city council on August 26, said his research has found no other community in Michigan with similar regulations.

Candidates will run first lap Tuesday

If any Novi voters suffer from a chronic inability to make decisions, they'll find plenty to stump them at Tuesday's primary election.

Nine are running for city council but residents are asked to whittle this down to six for the Nov. 5

Novi regulations only allow two candidates per council vacancy.

Three seats are available. Hoping to take on the job for the next four years are incumbent

If Wayne County hotels are forced to help pay for a new Tiger Stadium through higher room taxes, the effects will reach into Novi, according to city hotel operators,

As part of a financing package for the new sta-dium, Wayne County officials have bandied about the idea of raising the tax by five percent. Revenues from the tax would help pay for the stadium and keep the ballteam in Detroit, officials have said.

Novi hoteliers worry that an already sluggish market would be further cut into.

You just can't add taxes on the back of hotels and not feel that there wouldn't be an impact," said Novi Hilton General Manager Conrad Wangeman. "It would hurt all the hotel community."

In the short term, he said, a tax increase would likely boost business for his hotel. But, down the road. Wangeman said occupancy would be hurt by business people staying away from the Detroit area in general.

The image of paying higher taxes will be associated with Detroit," he said.

Business people likely wouldn't distinguish between Wayne and Oakland counties. Nearby convention areas, such as Flint, Lansing and even Chicago would pick up the lost business, Wangeman commented.

"It would give our competition more fuel to add to the fire," he said, adding that metropolitan hoteliers can't afford to lose more business. "Nobody is making a lot of money. We are all eking out a living."

Rooms at the Novi Hilton are currently taxed at 11 percent. Wangeman said that includes four percent sales tax, two percent tax from the Hotel

Association of Greater Detroit and a five percent Cobo Hall Tax.

A \$100 hotel room in Wayne County would cost cost customers \$116 if such a jump were approved. Pat Kilner, general manager of the Sheraton Hotel in Novi, said she believed it would be a matter of time before such a tax would be implemented in Oakland County if it's approved by its southern neighbor. We wonder how soon it becomes Oakland

County (imposing the tax)," she said.

Kilner agreed with Wangeman that benefits to Oakland County hotels would be short term.

The county would likely pick up convention business from Detroit if the tax is approved, she said. Some of that business would stay with Oakland hoteliers, Kilner said, but not all of it.

types like to portray what we do. If you doubt me on this, check out the Channel 7 news promo ad which shows reporter Mike Holfeld rushing to his news van - microphone in hand, a very intense look on his face - as he heads off to cover some nighttime breaking news story.

Now, most of us in the news game enjoy what we do and we often feel like we're rushing about covering one hot breaking story after another. But I think in the end it does a disservice to readers, to our customers.

Why? Because the result is that often they can work effectively with us to get their information in the paper, information about their activities and the events of the groups they belong to, information the community really should

It takes time to write stories and get the photos to go with them. It takes planning to get them done right, to make them most effective, on the one hand to give readers the news of the community and, on the other, to promote the activities of community and civic organizations.

The Novi News this week begins an effort to improve the flow of information and communications from local community and civic organizations to the newspaper and ultimately to the public. It begins with a story on the front page of Living section, providing tips to publicity chairpersons in local groups on how they can be most effective at getting their stories in print, not just with us but with most all medla. Check it out.

We will also be sponsoring an open house here at the offices of the Novi News from 4 p.m. to 8 p.m. Thursday, Sept. 26 in which we will be able to meet and plan the best procedures possible for getting information into the paper about these civic organizations.

The system will never be perfect. And some items will I think some readers will be surprised to learn that that fall through the cracks. But hopefully we can devise some ways of to get as much of the information in the paper as

And they were. Led by budget director Dave Stockman, former Michigan congressman, the administration prop-

osed the largest single tax rate cut in American history. Democrats rushed to submit their own cuts. Stockman himself later admitted the new tax law guaranteed the largest growth in national deficits in American history. Two consequences: First, the federal government systematically sloughed off responsibility for all kinds of programs, from education to housing, onto the states and local periodically.

Today's result: Chronic, severe financial crisis in states like Michigan and evn a city bankruptcy in Bridgeport. Conn. Second, equally important, was the budgetary straitiacket into which virtually all government programs were jammed. Want to build bridges? Educate poor kids? Provide another 13 weeks of unemployment to workers laid off during the recession? No money. Sorry. Later it became clear that some canny folk on the

political right had this outcome in mind all along. They reasoned, correctly, that if the country could be thrown into a large and persistent deficit through excessive tax cuts, there would be no money left for activities of government, both useful and not so useful. Last year the price to achieve a (read my lips) modest tax increase and a palanced budget was an agreement between Congress and the White House that new spending would have to be accompanied by specific increased revenues. Could some clever people around Gov. Engler have devised the same strategy for Michigan? Rush to compete with Democrats in pandering to middle-income taxpayers, they reason, because at day's end no money will be left to drive state?


No doubt Michigan's tax structure relies too heavily on the property tax.

No doubt a lot of state spending is either wasted or vields dubious outcomes. But does it follow that nothing done by government is useful? Are good schools a waste? is job training for our workers useless? Should state colleges be ignored? Is it pointless to clean our lakes and preserve our woods?Not at all.

To ask these questions is to answer them. People ought to ask the governor and those around him what they have in mind when theywant to cut state revenue by more than \$1 billion a year for the next five years.

You've been voted publicity chairperson

Congratulations! But you may find the job isn't all it's cracked up to be

By MICHAEL MALOTT Managing Editor

You've just been appointed publicity chairperson for your civic, community or charitable organization. This is surely an honor, you must be thinking. It is a testament by those who know you to your communications skills, your ability to motivate others, your ability to get things done. You have a right to be proud.

The coming year could also be a real eye-opener. Little did you know when you accepted the title you'd have to spend your year-long appointment haggling with that ink-stained curmudgeon of an editor down at the local newspaper as to what is and isn't newsworthy. You never suspected it would be so difficult to attract the attention of the larger media outlets.

Nor in your wildest imagination did you believe the number of things that can go wrong, that there would be so many little problems — missed deadlines, typos in what appears in print, photos lost irrevocably in the newspaper offices, getting blamed for miscommunications.

The next year, you may hand off this thankless job to some other poor, unsuspecting soul, knowing full well that the sense of pride that person feels for having been appointed will surely be dashed with the very first phone call.

But as is true with most all endeavors, learning a few tricks of the trade will help things go more smoothly. And while many of the tips that follow on how those in charge of publicity for community organizations can be more effective are specific to the Novi News, most should hold true with other newspapers and most broadcast outlets as well.

Of course, the Novi News emphasizes local coverage exclusively and, for the most part, can carry more information about your local civic organization on a regular basis than can any other media. We attempt, albeit not always successfully, to carry all the local news gener-

ated by the local organizations. It is in our interest to publish as much information about the activities of local groups as possible, since readers clearly are interested and no other news outlet can supply that information in such depth and detail.

Still, those responsible for publicity in local groups may find it difficult to compete with the hundreds of other press releases, phone calls and messages that funnel into the newsroom each day.

The Michigan Press Association, in a brochure especially designed to assist publicity chairpersons in their jobs, offers a few of the following tips:

Your job will be to present the news of your organization to the public. All the information you give out should be accurate, complete, brief and timely. You . . . will soon develop a talent for discriminating between routine club affairs and newsworthy events. Both are your concern. Routine meetings call for routine publicity. Unusual events and special projects merit publicity in depth."

■ "Be business-like. Never try to obtain publicity by

pressure of friendship or business connections." ■ "Be brief. Newspaper space is costly." Be accurate. Double checkdates, names, and places

before you submit your copy." ■ "Be legible. Type your press releases. Erase and cor-

rect errors." "Be prompt in meeting deadlines."

For the Novi News, the deadline for the Thursday edition is 4 p.m. Monday and for the Monday edition is noon Friday. Keep in mind that a deadline is the latest possible

moment a release can be turned in. The earlier the information is submitted, the more likely it will be able to appear in a given issue of the paper. "Be the only person in contact with the news media.

Two members from the same group calling on the same newspaper editor are bound to bring conflict or confusion."

This a common error, even for professional public relations types. Apparently, the belief is that if several releases are sent or several contacts are made, chances are better that the news item will be picked up. Rosemarie Evenhuis, former publicity director for

single contact person is best.

You need to develop a procedure or protocol for getting the information in. And that works best when you have one person making the contact. Otherwise, it just creates confusion as to who is doing what, who is handling what.

"You also need to develop a bond, an ongoing working relationship with (the reporter). If you have a couple of people contacting different people at the paper, that doesn't happen," she said.

They need to put it in writing. And they should come right to the point at the beginning. They need to start ho, what, when, where, how and why. They can embellish later on, but that information should be right up top. There is nothing worse than having to read through four pages of copy to find the who, what, when and where, and then not being able to find the phone number for the contact," Horwatt said.

It is more than just matter of convenience. The reporter or editor may miss the point of the release and throw it away, resulting in no publicity for the group.

Writing good releases One need not be an English Lit major to write a good. effective press release. In fact, eloquent writing is downright discouraged by many public relations experts.

"I tell my clients that I don't write for publication. I ite to get (journalists) interested. I write turn phone call. Most papers aren't going to just pick up what I write anyway. They may use parts of my release. but for the most part, they'll be calling to verify facts and get additional information and write their own story."

For the most part, the most effective way to write a press release is to use the who-what-when-where-howwhy list as an outline. If writers simply follow that list, answering the questions in order, they will come up

with a very good release. (See related story, this page.) "They can add at the bottom, that this is the 15th year and give some history of the people involved," Horwatt

For most purposes, and certainly for most meeting announcements and event notices, a one-page press release is more than sufficient. In general, there is almost never a reason to go over two pages.

One critical point is to give the name of a contact person and provide a phone number through which more information can be obtained. Public relations convention is to place that information at the top of page one of the press release.

"I once told (an entertainment beat reporter) I wanted to start my own PR firm and I asked what he believed was the most important thing I should do. Be there when I call, he said. Horwatt related. He explained that when a number is given on the release for more information, either it should be a phone at which someone is usually there to answer, or times should be given.

Prenatal fitness begins early

If you're hoping, planning and praying to get pregnant, you need to start preparing yourself physically.

Prenatal fitness begins before you conceive. If you smoke, make every effort to stop. Tone and trim your body, and take a long, hard look at your eating habits.

If it helps to tell yourself you're doing it for the baby, fine. But what many mothers-to-be don't realize is that feeding a fetus puts a strain on their hearts and circulatory systems, and that good diet, nutrition and healthy exercise ensure their own well-being.

CONFIRM THE PREGNANCY

The sooner you know you're pregnant, the better. You'll want to avoid any substances that might harm the baby - particularly alcohol, artificial sweeteners, casseline and drugs of any kind (check with your doctor).

At-home pregnancy tests are increasingly accurate, but you'll want to go in for a lab test as soon as possible. If you're over 35, your doctor may recommend ultra-sound or amniocentesis to make sure fetal development is normal.

If you fail to conceive after trying for one year, it's time to have a fertility evaluation — one that includes both you and your husband. With numerous methods of reversing infertility available today, there's every reason to be optimistic.

MONITORING YOUR WEIGHT

Like it or not, gaining weight is normal during pregnancy. The average healthy woman will gain about 25 pounds; less if she is petite, more if her frame is large.

Women who get the right nourishment during pregnancy stand to gain more weight if they were thin to begin with, less if they were overweight (because of body reserves available to nourish the baby).

Don't underestimate the benefits of active exercise during pregnancy and the postpartum period. To name a few: control of excess weight gain; improved appearance and posture; less water retention; improved selfimage and mental outlook; increased energy; tension relief; improved

The American College of Obstetricians and Gynecologists guidelines for pregnancy/postpartum exercise include:

• Exercise regularly (three times a week) rather than intermittently, and avoid competitve activities.

 Don't exercise if you don't feel well or if the weather is hot and humid. • If your lifestyle has been sedentary, begin slowly and gradually increase the level of physical activity. · Avoid jumping and bouncing: exercise on a wood, carpeted or padded flooring for sure footing and to reduce shock.

 Spend at least five minutes warming up muscles prior to exercise; five minutes cooling down (slow wallting and gentle stretching).

 Watch your heart rate, and make sure it doesn't go beyond limits set by your doctor.

 Rise gradually after sitting/lyingdown exercises to avoid a sudden drop in blood pressure.

• Drink plenty of liquids before, during and after strenuous activity to prevent dehydration.

 Stop exercising and consult your doctor if you have any of the following symptoms: breathlessness, chest pains, dizziness, difficulty walking, uterine contractions, decreased fetal activity, vaginal bleeding or leakage of amniotic fluid.

Expect the benefits of good nutrition and regular exercise to extend into the postpartum weeks, when hormone-triggered emotions run high. 

Vacation and second homes gain in popularity

A second or vacation home has become the dream and goal of an increasing number of families.

A vacation residence on or close to the beach, by a lake or in the mountains holds great appeal to families who can afford it, according to several brokers. An increasing proportion of brokerage business now involves second homes.

"When we're contacted by an out-of-town family, often referred by other brokers, we 'smooze' them with information, giving them an overall perspective on our area and a realistic view of secondhome opportunities," one broker


The kitchen, living room and dining area all are combined in one informal great room, giving a spacious feel to what is basically a







Effects of Advertising on

Return-On-Investment

UNTIL NOW, THE VALUE OF ADVERTISING WAS SOMETHING EVEN ITS STRONGEST SUPPORTERS COULDN'T PUT INTO NUMBERS.

They could cite success stories of advertising going into a market, how this was followed by a shift in purchase patterns, in market share, in immediate sales.

But no one expressed the value of advertising as return-oninvestment until The Strategic Planning Institute did its study* called PIMS (Profit Impact of Market Strategy) with the Ogilvy Center for Research and Development.

The study found that advertising nearly doubled return-on-investment! The graph on the left makes it perfectly clear.

Brands that advertise much more than their competitors enjoy an average return-on-investment of 32 percent. Brands that advertise much less than their competitors average 17 percent.

The PIMS study provides the first systematic evidence that links advertising, profitability, and growth. It draws on more than 700 consumer businesses in North America and Europe, spanning the years 1970 to 1986-years of both rapid and received to the order of th slow inflation, both good and bad years of the business cycle.

The graph on the lower right shows further evidence. It represents the competitive performance of two actual

brands over a 10-year period, as analyzed by Robert M. Prentice, a management consultant in advertising and marketing. He distinguishes between consumer-franchise-building (CFB) activities (whether advertising or

promotion) and non-CFB activities. Brand A used predominantly priceincentive promotions. Brand B spent approximately the same amount. However, most of the money went into consumer-franchise-building activitiesparticularly advertising and promotion.

In the first year, the two brands were nearly even in their category. But after 10 years in which they took dramatically contrasting approaches to the spending of marketing funds, they ended up in remarkably different positions.


Brand B had become a resounding success, not only in terms of its sales performance versus Brand A, but also in terms of its contributing profits to the

For brand franchise owners and managers, the insight into how advertising contributes to profitability will be as interesting as how much it contributes.
