Ex-mayor finishes 2,000 mile bike ride

Here's what former Novi mayor Gil Henderson did on his summer vacation.

He took a bike ride. A 2,910 mile, six-week solo bike ride.

All the way from Everett just north of Seattle in Washington to his home here — on less than \$40 per day.

No mean feat for a 55-year-old retired middle school principal — but absolutely not out-of-character for Henderson, a self-described natural-born nomad.

"You talk to my dad, he'll tell you I always was a wanderer, even when I was 2 to 3 years old. They put me in a harness and tied me to the clothesline when I was 4 to 5 years old. I came into this world with a need to see the world," he said.

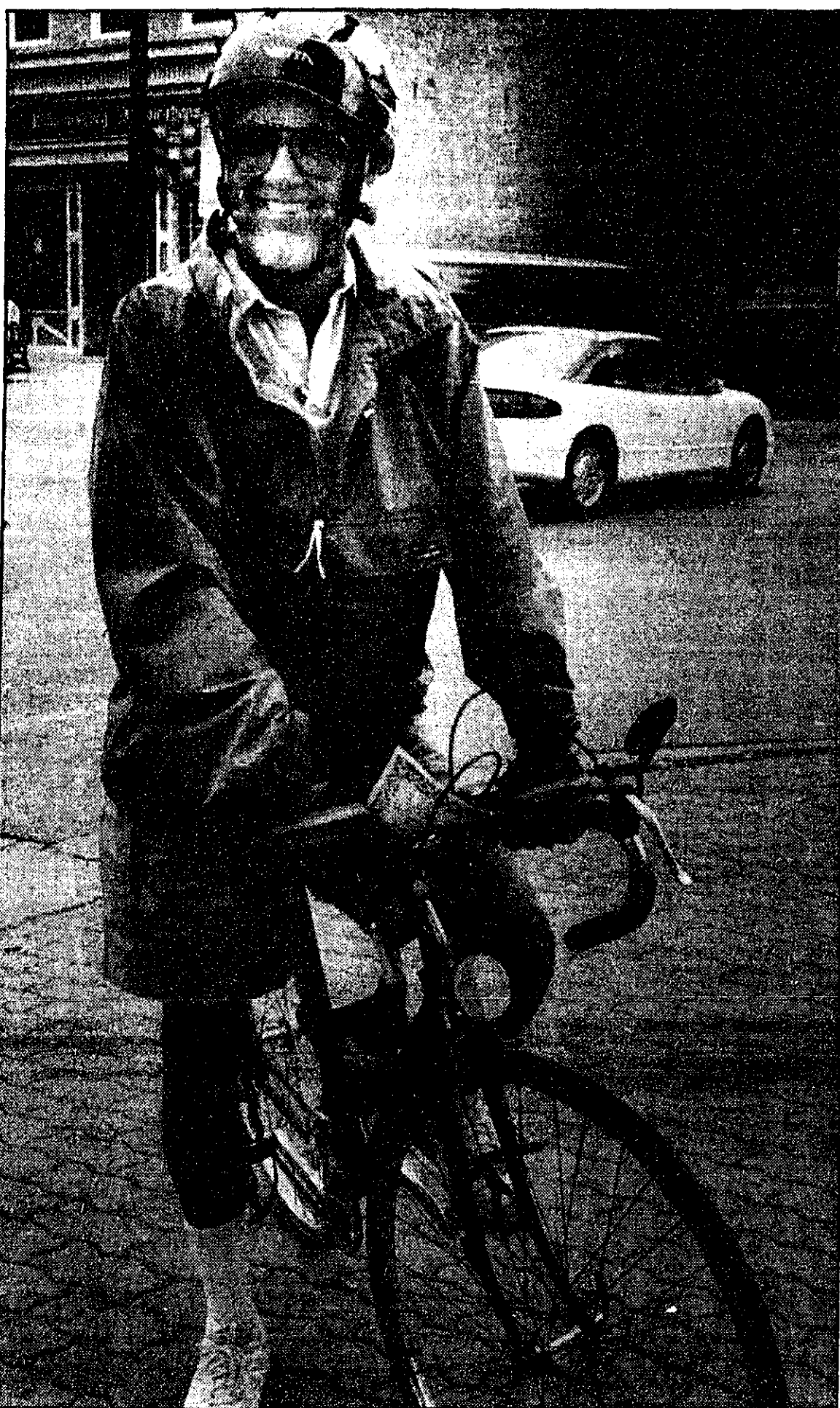
"It helps to have a wife (Myrna) who's tolerant and understanding."

Bike touring is the best way to really get out and meet America close up, according to Henderson, who was mayor here from 1975-77.

He hopped an Amtrak train in Ann Arbor on July 16, was on the road July 18 and was back in Novi Sept. 1. The trip began on Washington State Highway 20. After he reached Glacier National Park in Montana, Henderson traveled U.S. Highway 2 all the way to the Mackinac Bridge.

"I was in towns smaller than New Hudson. The ethics and the honesty that I grew up with in the 1940s are still alive and well in smalltown America. I would see people in grocery stores and little restaurants just put everything on their tab. When they ate breakfast they'd write down their name and leave the paper at the cash register," he said.

Not until a few weeks before the trip did Henderson beef up his typical exercise routine of weightlifting at Novi High School three times a week and biking about 30 miles weekly. To improve his conditioning, he began sprinting up the hill at Northville High School five to ten times in a row each session.

Meijer zoning denied, store looks to Novi

Meijer Inc.'s bid to move into Wixom was shot down Tuesday when that city's decision makers voted a rezoning request.

Wixom City Council voted 4-2 to deny rezoning of a 34.5 acre parcel at the northwest corner of Grand River and Wixom Road. In voting against the rezoning, the council cited adverse road and downtown development impacts.

"Meijer will jeopardize development of downtown," said Wixom Councilman John Lee, who motioned for denial. "I don't see this as a total benefit to the city. I see spot benefit."

The Grand Rapids-based company sought to rezone the parcel from industrial research office and freeway service districts to general business designation. Jennifer Downs, a spokesperson for Meijer, said the company hasn't given up on the site at this point.

"We hope to have open communications with the Wixom council."

Some issues just seem to keep resurfacing, like the construction of a proposed new Meijer store in Novi. If the city wants the project back, now is the time to grab it. But the city should also consider a number of items about Meijer. An editorial is on page 5.

she said, "to see what alternatives we have."

Meijer originally planned placing a store on Novi's side of the Grand River and Wixom Road intersection. The company made that decision in early March of this year after rezoning requests for a 28-acre parcel in Novi were denied.

Escaped convict captured in Novi

On June 15, 1960, Richard Lee Blackwell began a life sentence for murder in South Carolina. He was 17 years old.

In 1969, at age 26, he decided he'd had enough. After ten years in the Columbia, South Carolina State Penitentiary, he managed to escape.

Blackwell changed his name to Eddie Lemar Barnes and fled to Detroit, where he began a new life. He married and had two children. He worked to support his family.

Last March, he began working at Charter House of Novi. And on September 8, he was heading home from work when a Novi Police officer pulled him over for an obstructed rear view mirror.

Blackwell, a.k.a. Barnes, now 48, was arrested on a 22-year-old warrant. He is currently in Oakland County Jail, awaiting extradition to South Carolina.

Novi Charter House administrator Sandy Spiro was unaware Friday that his employee had been arrested.

"I just talked to him yesterday," he said. "He called and said he couldn't come in to pick up his check, and wanted to know if his wife could pick it up. I had absolutely no idea. That's incredible."

Spiro said he was "flabbergasted" by news of the arrest.

"He's a very nice man," he said. "He's pleasant. He communicates very well. He works hard. He's a very good employee. He worked in the dietary department as a dietary aide."

"He came to work, he did his job, he did not complain, and he went home."

Spiro added that he had talked to Blackwell, whom he knew as Eddie Barnes, "at least 5,000 times."

"We kidded around together," he said. "I only had cause to reprimand him one time, and it was on something very minor. I can't even remember what it was now... He was always very kind and courteous to all the residents here."

According to Novi Police reports, Blackwell was heading east on Ten Mile around 3:45 p.m. September 8, when Officer Terry Whitfield stopped him for a vision obstruction on his rear view mirror.

Although Blackwell's driver's license identified him as Eddie Lemar Barnes, a computer check revealed his real name and the July 12, 1969 warrant from South Carolina.

His date of birth was listed as March 17, 1947 on his Michigan driver's license, but South Carolina State Penitentiary public affairs director Robin Zimmerman said his actual date of birth is listed as March 17, 1943.

Man renews old ties with friends

In July, while much of the city was partying at the Michigan '50s Festival, retired Texas "roughneck" David Spisak began his quest to touch base with the Novi he's kept in his memories since the Eisenhower years.

It took two months, but he's half-way there. Spisak — who with his brother William spent his childhood here from 1953 to 1959 — has been trying to track down their adopted father, Daniel Spisak. The two have not met in 24 years.

Spisak, 43, wasn't sure if his father was dead or alive. The family drifted apart after his parents divorced in 1959.

With the help of Spisak's adopted uncle Edward Bundoff, Daniel Spisak's Palmetto, Fla.,

address was phoned to Texas Sept. 6. The southern residence was a surprise. Spisak thought his dad lived in New York.

Waste hauling bids under review

The future of trash collection in Novi may lie with one of five haulers who have placed bids for a citywide contract.

Browning Ferris Industries, Waste Management Inc., Laidlaw, City Management and Duncan are the firms vying for the job, Director of Public Services Anthony Nowicki said Thursday.

Novi is expected to begin the move to citywide garbage disposal — including mandatory curbside recycling — by July 1, 1992. The subdivisions will be the first to make the switch, followed by multiple-housing complexes and the business community.

At present, homeowners' associations contract individually with waste haulers.

The bids are currently under review by a city council-appointed citizens' committee.

All but Duncan — which currently picks up garbage in Novi — are large-scale operators.

Waste Management, one of the biggest disposal corporations in the nation, had earlier promised cheaper rates to Novi if the city did not pursue competitive bids. But the council in July opted for an open-to-all process.

Nowicki said that the bid review will not just look for the lowest prices. Factoring in the decision will be the companies' ability to meet Novi's requirements, which include mandatory curbside recycling, yard waste collection for composting and twice-annual household hazardous waste pick-ups, as well as public education.

"It's a complicated process with the number of different bid items. You don't just look down the list. We have various things we're requiring them to do. Somebody may be a low bidder, but they may not be a quality bidder," he said.

A review committee has met twice and will be

holding interviews Sept. 25 with the interested companies.

Novi, as a member of the Resource Recovery and Recycling Authority of Southwest Oakland County (RRRASOC), will follow the lead of other member communities who have already made the leap to curbside recycling, including Farmington, Farmington Hills and Southfield.

The conversion to recycling is not expected to be cheap. RRRASOC's executive director Lenora Jandun has said that it may increase a household's annual trash collection bills by 30 to 40 percent.

The Farmingtons moved to the trash separation system this summer. Green collection bins for mingled recyclables such as glass jars, newspapers and plastic bottles have now become a familiar streetside sight in the cities.

Gov. Engler unveils his state education plan

Everyone saw something different to applaud or criticize in Gov. John Engler's "Michigan 2000" plan for achieving excellence in the \$8 billion public school system.

"It is a plan that gives people — parents, students and educators — the freedom, the power and the options to achieve excellence," the Republican governor told the Legislature and State Board of Education Wednesday.

Engler's most-used words: "Teachers" and "parents." His least used: "administrators."

Engler's emphasis on new kinds of publicly-funded, competitive schools was criticized by Sen. Jack Faxon, D-Farmington Hills, whose district includes Novi. He called charter schools and federally-funded "new American schools" just a proliferation and expansion of an already inefficient system. He'd allow individuals to organize their own schools, pull in the ones (students) they want, take the money and leave the residue.

Faxon blasted Engler's failure to achieve consolidation of the smaller of Michigan's 562 districts.

But Sen. Robert Geake, R-Northville, said charter schools "are probably the most dramatic idea and could do a lot for low-income areas of the state, though they wouldn't do much for western Wayne County."

Under the plan, groups of teachers or a university could receive a charter from a local school board to start a school with emphasis, for example, on phonics in reading.

Sen. Lana Pollack, D-Ann Arbor, gave Engler "credit for raising standards and quality and saying we don't make the grade internationally. But he gets a failing grade for how we're going to pay for it."

Although Engler proposed \$300,000 for 200-day school years in 12 pilot districts, Pollack said the total cost of providing 20 additional days of schooling statewide will be upwards of \$200 million. Pollack, an Appropriations Committee member, called for an alternate revenue source to get more money out of the state general fund because "the rock just won't yield."

Serving her first day in office, Rep. Georgina Goss, R-Northville, said "charter schools sends alarm bells ringing. I agree with competition in schools. But it's such a new concept that I'd have to see more." Scholarships for potential teachers are "a wonderful idea," said Goss, who also liked the idea of having high schools warranty their graduates to employers.

"I agree 100 percent with his emphasis on parents and teachers," said Rep. Barbara Dobb, R-West Bloomfield. "Our system is not working. We need drastic change."

Engler underscored his values not by introducing an outstanding scholar or favorite teacher, as his predecessor, James Blanchard, might have done, but by introducing "two very special teachers — my mom and dad."

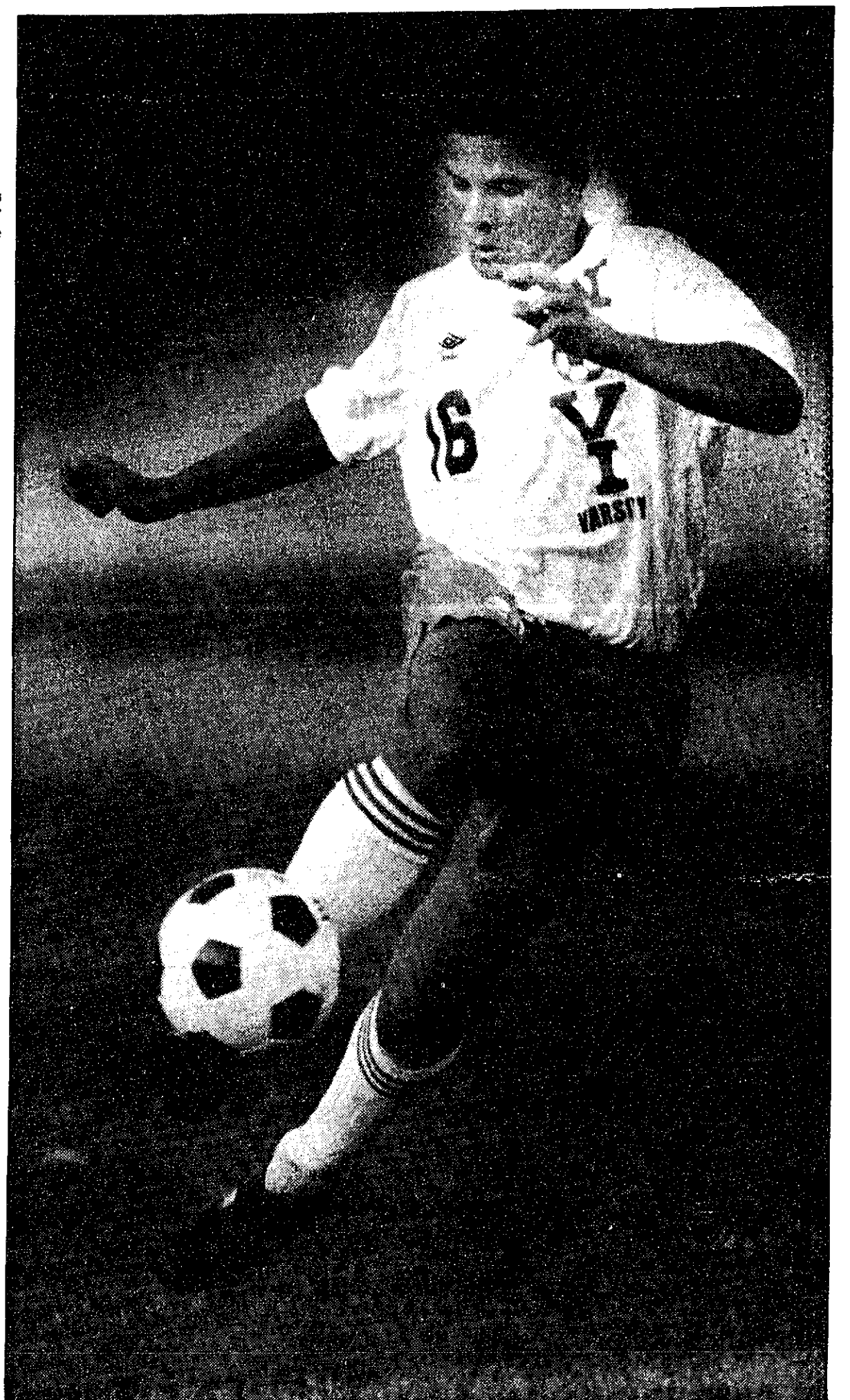
His message: "Parents must be the guides, the homework helpers, the role models and the decision-makers that motivate Michigan's students."

Engler's proposals covered five main areas:

- **Quality** — optional new schools, countywide schools of choice and 200-day school years in pilot districts.
- **Equity** — tax base sharing by richer districts — extremely unpopular among most area lawmakers except for Rep. William Keith, D-Garden City, its architect.
- **Teacher improvement** — doubling aid for professional development, bonuses, easier certification for professionals with non-teaching backgrounds.
- **Job skills** — guarantees to employers of graduates' competence, school-employer partnerships with state aid to businesses who promise to provide jobs to graduates, more math and science centers.
- **Pre-school** — tutoring and extended kindergarten hours for at-risk youngsters.

Dorothy Beardmore, R-Rochester, president of the State Board of Education, "liked his focus on parenting" and "the recognition that children need to be ready for school." She praised Engler's emphasis on teacher development and tenure reform.

Annetta Miller, D-Huntington Woods, 20-year member of the State Board, found nothing new. "I personally don't see the 'charter school' can work," she said of Engler's plan, borrowed from Minnesota, to let local school boards grant charters to a certified faculty that would determine curriculum.

Troopers react to shooting

Reaction to the death of Det. Sgt. Janace Vortman was one of shock Friday at Northville's Michigan State Police Post.

"It's a surprise," said Lt. Richard Duthler, a longtime colleague of Vortman's alleged killer, retired State Police Lt. Joseph Kresse. "I suppose everybody has got the capability to do something like this."

Both Vortman and Kresse worked at the Northville post, which covers Novi.

According to state police records, Vortman, 46, worked in Northville from 1984 to 1988 as a detective sergeant. She was stationed at the Ypsilanti post prior to her death.

Kresse came to the Northville post in 1973 and stayed until his retirement in 1989. In that time he was promoted from detective sergeant to detective lieutenant.

Vortman and Kresse met at the Northville post and subsequently dated for several years, beginning in the mid-'80s. Vortman's shooting is thought to be a result of the breakup of that relationship.

Duthler said state police are working in conjunction with the Farmington Hills Police on an investigation of the incident.

The 46-year-old was shot to death in her car at her Farmington Hills apartment Thursday morning. Duthler said it appears that Kresse waited for Vortman in the parking lot of the apartment complex.

After allegedly shooting Vortman, Kresse turned the gun on himself. As of Friday morning, Kresse was in critical condition at Boisjoly Hospital with a wound to the head, according to a hospital spokesperson.

"There are no winners in this situation," Duthler said.

Vortman handled general field investigation of criminal matters for the Ypsilanti Post. Duthler, who was Vortman's supervisor, described her as a dedicated detective.

"She was very proud to be a member of the Michigan State Police," he said. "She reflected that in her daily work."

Vortman was good at what she did, Duthler added.

"She was very capable of handling everything that came up," he said. "She did the whole gambit, from simple larceny to first degree murder."

Duthler said he has known Kresse for more than 20 years. He said Kresse was a "methodical" detective and worked on many important cases, including the Oakland County child killings of the mid-'70s.

"As an investigator he was very well respected," Duthler commented. Funeral arrangements for Vortman were being made Friday. Duthler said the state police will honor Vortman at the ceremonies.

Auto theft program targets new crime wave

Since the outbreak of armed robbery car thefts in metropolitan Detroit, HEAT, Help Eliminate Auto Theft, has experienced an increase in the number of calls it receives on its statewide hotline. Some of the tips may be related to an RA UDAA, (robbery armed, unlawful driving away of an automobile.)

HEAT Spokesperson William Lid-dane said, "Whenever a situation such as this occurs, you are bound to experience increased activity. Our hotline has been ringing off the hook with information on auto theft activity."

Citizen involvement is the key to the program's continued success. Lidane encourages anyone with information on any type of car thefts to call the HEAT hotline at 1-800-242-HEAT. All tips are confidential.

So far this year, HEAT has awarded \$109,725 in rewards for tips received on its hotline. Through the program, 162 vehicles have been recovered with an estimated value of \$1,867,722.

Since the program began in October of 1985, HEAT has logged 2,820 tips calls, leading to the arrest of 891 suspects and the recovery of 1,192 vehicles estimated at \$13,700,162. Rewards given total \$824,705.

Funded by every auto insurance company in the state, HEAT allows citizens to report information about stolen cars and suspected their activity confidentially. Rewards of up to \$1,000 are paid for the arrest and prosecution of car thieves, and up to \$10,000 for the arrest and trial of suspected their ring members and/or chop shop operators. Rewards are paid even if those arrested are not convicted.

Tips calls are monitored from 8 a.m. until 4 p.m. Monday through Friday by the Michigan State Police.

to examine the possibility of adding classes onto Parkview Elementary. But acting Superintendent William Barr is not quite ready to make a call for bids on a new building.

Two of the new classrooms at Novi Woods, a building used for preschool and pre-primary classes that could be housed elsewhere. And the district has traditionally bused students from one building to another to help alleviate overcrowding, he said.

"I can't get that excited, and I'm talking me personally, about figures because they change," he said. And preliminary enrollment figures can change a lot depending on how many of the enrolled students actually show up on the first day.

More recent enrollment figures are expected to be presented at a Thursday school board meeting held in the Educational Services Building, 25345 Taft Road. Barr also will discuss predictions for future enrollment in Novi schools.

Barr said he expects the recent figures to more accurately reflect the population the district will find on its fourth Friday count. All school districts must report enrollment figures as of the fourth Friday of classes. This year the fourth Friday for Novi schools is Sept. 20.

The Michigan Department of Education uses the figures in determining state aid for in-formula schools. Novi is considered property wealthy by the state's funding formula and receives little state aid.

The number of students enrolled in Novi schools will affect the amount of state aid money recaptured from the district. Novi schools lost close to a million dollars last year when the state stopped funding social security payments and other programs it had traditionally paid for in out-of-formula school districts like Novi.

As We See It

Require security, if Meijer wants back in

In every community, it seems, there are certain issues that never go away. They keep resurfacing, in one shape or another, every few months.

Take Meijer, for example. Just when you thought it was gone forever, banished to our neighbors to the north, it's back.

Maybe.

Wixom City Council voted 4-2 Tuesday to deny rezoning of a 34.5 acre parcel at the northwest corner of Grand River and Wixom Road. In voting against the rezoning, the council likely ended the possibility of Meijer placing a store at the site.

Meijer spokesperson Jennifer Downs said Friday this wouldn't necessarily be the case. She said Meijer would keep "open communications with the Wixom Council to see what alternatives we have."

Downs said those other alternatives would include a search for a new site in Wixom or Novi. She maintained that the company still wants a store in the area.

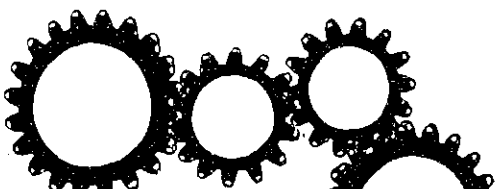
As part of the Grand Plan, Meijer originally was to place the store on Novi's side of Grand River and Wixom Road. Even after the death of the Grand Plan a year ago, plans for the Novi Meijer didn't collapse until late March this year when the city failed to rezone a 26-acre site near the intersection.

That site, owned by Milford Campbell, won't likely be reconsidered, Downs said. She added that Meijer hasn't selected a new site in Novi or Wixom.

Thus far Meijer hasn't contacted the city about bringing plans back to Novi.

And, we aren't sure the city should reconsider allowing Meijer in Novi. While it's clear that the giant retailer would add to the city's tax rolls, it isn't clear if it would be worth it.

Consider the Meijer store at Eight Mile and Haggerty Road in Northville Township. In 1989, the township police answered 402 phone calls at the store from larceny and fraud to accidents and injuries.



Development

A study of the police department revealed the calls cost the township \$45,828, or \$114 per call. By contrast, the township collected a total of \$23,829 in taxes from Meijer for 1989.

Northville Township lost nearly \$22,000 that year for having had Meijer within its border.

Rick Morgan, with Meijer's real estate department, told Wixom council members more than \$300,000 of tax revenue would be generated by a new store, which they planned to open in 1993.

Based on those figures, Novi City Manager Edward Kriewall said Meijer would be a good development. He said the extra revenue would be enough to pay for seven more police officers. Kriewall added that besides beefed up police patrols, Meijer would place very little extra burden on the city and that it would be "a good trade off."

Financially then, if Meijer's tax calculations are correct, it would be a good trade off, as Kriewall suggests. But what of the question of safety?

As the figures from Northville Township indicate, hundreds of criminal incidents occur each year at Meijer. This past April, for example, a suspected drug dealer was gunned down by police at the Meijer parking lot.

If and when Meijer does bring plans back to Novi, we believe the city should mandate that the company provide a stronger security force for its store. Frankly, Meijer's current policy of training employees in safety techniques and calling that security, just doesn't cut it.

The city's number one priority is the health, safety and welfare of its residents. We think those considerations must come first in any future dealings with Meijer.

"I don't suppose the fact that the USTA men's finals are on television this afternoon has anything to do with his alleged injury," said Cheryl, ignoring my remark.

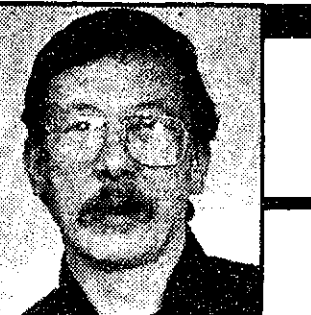
"Either that or the Bears-Tampa Bay game," said Diane, the two of them glaring at me across the room.

Enrollment up in district, again

Enrollment is up in Novi Schools — again. A total of 4,102 students enrolled in the school district this year, up 179 from last year. This year's increase continues a five-year, 3-4 percent growth trend.

Novi High School reported 1,092 students enrolled. The middle school expected 614 students on the first day and Novi Meadows had 642 students enrolled.

Novi elementary school classrooms are filling up to numbers topping 400 at every elementary school. Village Oaks has the highest enrollment with 492 students enrolled. Orchard Hills has the smallest enrollment with 407 students signed up for school in the building.

Four new classrooms at Novi Woods Elementary were opened for use this fall, but even so, some school board members are beginning to worry about space.

President Stephen Hitchcock expects the board to examine the possibility of adding classes onto Parkview Elementary.

But acting Superintendent William Barr is not quite ready to make a call for bids on a new building.

Two of the new classrooms at Novi Woods, a building used for preschool and pre-primary classes that could be housed elsewhere. And the district has traditionally bused students from one building to another to help alleviate overcrowding, he said.

"I can't get that excited, and I'm talking me personally, about figures because they change," he said. And preliminary enrollment figures can change a lot depending on how many of the enrolled students actually show up on the first day.

City eyes Owani for sister program

Novi City and school officials will meet Sept. 18 to decide the future of a sister city link with Owani, Japan.

For several years, an Owani elementary school has had a sister school program with Orchard Hills Elementary.

Last January, Novi High School hosted students from Owani High School in Owani, Japan.

Following the exchange, the mayor of Owani and the superintendent of Owani schools have written to the city and school district in hopes of establishing a sister city program.

Former Superintendent Robert Pwko and Mayor Matthew Quirin decided to form a committee to implement the sister city program.

Public information director for the City of Novi Cindy Stewart and assistant superintendent for instruction in Novi schools Rita Traynor will lead the committee in its first meeting.

"We need to see if all the people still want to do it," Traynor said.

Board President Stephen Hitchcock said Owani schools plan to send another group of students on an exchange in Novi this year. But Novi is unsure if it will be able to send students to Japan, and that has at least one board member concerned.

"My concern is if it can't be a reciprocal agreement maybe we shouldn't get involved," Vice President Robert Schram said.

"I felt it needed to be said that maybe we can't afford this rather than offending people we like very much."

The district is considering asking corporate sponsors to fund the exchange in Novi this year. But Novi is unsure if it will be able to send students to Japan, and that has at least one board member concerned.

In the long term, Hitchcock also hopes to set up a sister-school program with a district outside of London, England.

Exchange programs for Novi students may be sponsored by corporations or parents, but they will not be funded by local tax money, Schram said.

"The government is subsidizing Owani sending their students to Novi. We don't have that luxury, would cost us a ton of money," he said.

"I'm not sure that this would be an appropriate use of taxpayer funds," he said sending a group of students to Japan once a year may be "out of reach" for the community.

The emphasis of the convention is on education. Seminars are being presented on professional communications skills, on-court strategies and tactics, sports science and sports medicine and junior development, to name a few.

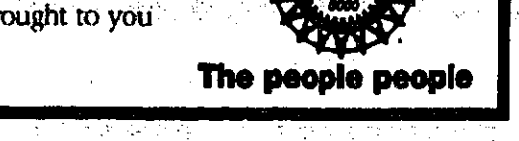

Henderson wraps up cross-country bike trip

"I guess it's kind of like climbing mountains. It's something some of us like to do and see if we can handle it. I have never biked in mountains before. In the state of Washington I went over five mountain passes with grades of six percent, 15 to 26 miles up. You just put your nose to the handle bars and instead of doing 15 miles per hour you break your tail doing four or five," he said.

Beyond the physical challenge, there's a psychic one. A solo traveler is thrown into the world on his or her own resources.

"It depends on the person, specifically on their ego. This can be a plus or a minus. Everywhere you go, you have no identity. You're nobody's boss, nobody's neighbor, nobody's employee, nobody's dad," Henderson explained.

"The main advantage is you don't have to mesh your style of living with anybody. When you're alone and you're on a bike, people want to talk to you more than they do if there are three or four of you. You have limited responsibilities. I never had to feel responsible for somebody else's pleasure and contentment."

"On the flip side is if you're seeing something that's beautiful, you have nobody to discuss it with."

Henderson's had past experience of going it alone. In 1989, he biked from Tampa, Florida back to Detroit, taking a circuitous 2,000 mile route to avoid the hills and hollers of Tennessee and Kentucky.

The first 10 days of that trip were emotionally rugged ones. As a teacher, principal and mayor, Henderson said he was used to having an audience.

"I kept wanting people to recognize me and say there goes Gil Henderson. Eventually I got over that and it doesn't bother me as much. Occasionally, I wish I could see family or friends, but it doesn't become an overwhelming need," he said.

Henderson took up bicycling 20 years ago as a sport he could enjoy with his son Philip, then 12 years old. One day, on a whim, the pair and a friend biked 50 miles to Williamston.

From there, he took off on 200 and 300 mile bike trips, sometimes with his wife. In 1984, the couple spent eight weeks wheeling through Europe.

Henderson left home this time with a 10-year-old Austro-Daimler bike, three changes of clothing, a lightweight tent, a sleeping bag, a windbreaker suit, cold weather lights, an 8 mm Camcorder, a 35 mm camera, a spare tire, spare tube, extra cable and wrenches for re-

pair work.

He ate out while on the road, because he doesn't enjoy "messing" with cooking over a campfire after a long day on the road.

Sometimes, he stayed in \$10 hotels with connoisseurs of the street and bottle. Other times, he pitched his tent wherever he could find the room—at a park, a campsite, a field or someone's backyard.

Frequently, smalltown America opened its hearth, home and heart to the long-distance biker. He hitched a ride with a log-hauler in Montana, joined a farmer and spent a day working on his combine.

Overhearing Henderson talking to a repairman in a North Dakota bikeshop, a North Dakota man volunteered the use of his truck.

"There's the pick-up, here's the keys. When you get done, come back tonight." He made his transportation and his house available to me without him ever being there," Henderson said.

These friendships of a moment are Henderson's strongest memories of his travels. Everyone had a story to tell, including a former Nazi bomber pilot and a young biking couple from New Zealand.

"I find the typical middle-class suburbanite to be afraid of their fellow Americans and distrusting of them. My bicycling around the country has not led me to conclude that you can't trust Americans or other people," he said.

"Every time I take a long trip, I always come home with more faith in people than when I left."

Whitfield reportedly asked "Eddie" if he ever had another name, and he said "no," but finally admitted that his name was once Richard Lee Blackwell and that he was aware of the warrant for his arrest.

Blackwell reportedly told Whitfield that he thought Michigan would not send him back to South Carolina. South Carolina extradition officer

Bill Mahoney said Friday that Blackwell refused an extradition hearing, so an extradition order from South Carolina Governor Carroll A. Campbell, Jr. was in process.

Detailed information about Blackwell's original crime was unavailable at press time. The murder occurred in rural Chesterfield County, where there is no local newspaper. Records at the Chesterfield County Sheriff's Department indicate only that Black-

well has a criminal record including the January 15, 1960 murder conviction carrying a life sentence.

The Columbia, South Carolina daily *The State Newspaper* carried only a short paragraph about Blackwell's escape.

"It appears to me that a young man made a mistake 30 years ago," Spiro said. "It doesn't erase that mistake. It doesn't bring back that person's life, but... he's a very nice man."

Elegant wine-dining at home prepared in 15 minutes. Sound too good to be true? A current product promotion at local grocery markets and wine outlets links the wines of Beringer Vineyards and Contadina Fresh pastas and sauces to make it all possible.

Generally, we don't bite when we see these marketing gimmicks. Beringer wines — OK, they're consistent top quality. Packaged pasta and sauces? Not for these two purists who make them at home from scratch using authentic Italian recipes.

Since they were introduced, we've pushed the shopping basket right past the Contadina Fresh pastas and sauces. We've resisted the convenience because we "knew" they wouldn't be at all similar to homemade.

A wise man once said, "Don't knock it 'til you try it." The current promotion caused us to do just that. We were more than pleasantly surprised.

The store displays of Beringer wines attract attention with eye-catching neckhangers. Some stores couple this with cross-merchandising displays in the refrigerated section near the Contadina Fresh pastas and sauces. Whichever you find, do capitalize on the mail-in, \$2-off coupons good on the Contadina products and the wines.

Featured wines include Beringer Chenin Blanc, White Zinfandel and Gamay Beaujolais. Since sweet-edged wines (chenin blanc and white zinfandel) don't pair well with red sauce, you need to consider your purchasing choice in advance for a proper food and wine harmony.

A white sauce such as the Contadina Fresh Alfredo Sauce will work with the off-dry chenin and the slightly sweet white zinfandel, if you want to keep it light and white.

We concentrated on the red sauces with various pastas since this is our preference. Following the package directions, we prepared the Angel's Hair pasta and sampled it with each of four sauces (Plum Tomato with Basil, Fresh Garden Vegetable, Bolognese and Marinara), heated according to the microwave directions, and a slightly chilled bottle of Beringer Gamay Beaujolais.

The best wine and food harmony was achieved with the Fresh Garden Vegetable and the Bolognese sauces. The first sauce should please any vegetarian. The vegetables are crunchy and the sauce is piquant, enhancing a slightly spicy element in the wine.

The Bolognese meat sauce is richly flavored and sticks to the pasta — a sign of quality. The balance between the wine's fruitiness and the richness of the sauce is a tempting taste treat.

Part two of the taste test consisted of preparing both the Contadina beef and chicken ravioli and sampling each with the same four red sauces evaluated previously with the Angel's Hair pasta. To introduce a note of creativity, we added a bottle of zinfandel to the taste arena.

The Gamay Beaujolais stood up to the challenge, but the zinfandel was a clear winner. Again, our preference was the Fresh Garden Vegetable sauce with the chicken ravioli and the Bolognese sauce with the beef ravioli.

Zinfandel served with the Bolognese and beef ravioli enriched the taste experience. The sauce's richness was complexed and the beefy flavor of the ravioli came forward.

What's been discussed so far is an under 15-minute dinner preparation. Buy the pasta and sauce of your choice, prepare according to package directions, open a bottle of wine and you're done.

Grate some Parmesan cheese and assemble a fresh green leaf basil garnish while the pasta is cooking. No more prep time is added, but a note of elegance is.

Being vegetarian requires a change in lifestyle

Eating healthy may be "in," but like most things that are "in," it doesn't require a long term commitment.

There are lots of good reasons to consider a vegetarian, or macrobiotic, lifestyle (see sidebar), but if you really want to make the lifelong commitment to eating healthy, it's the way to go.

When most people think of vegetarians, they think of emaciated earth mothers (and fathers) in sandals. That stereotype is nowhere near the truth. Many professional athletes and high-powered corporate executives have recognized the energizing effect of eliminating meat from their diets. Heck, we even know vegetarians with weight problems.

Dave Scott has won the Ironman Triathlon six times, making him the only person to win the event more than twice. He adopted a vegetarian lifestyle, with the competitive motto, "Outsmart him. Outrun him. Outlive him."

Of course, before you make any changes in your diet, radical or not, the Oakland County Department of Health strongly recommends that you consult your regular physician.

The biggest roadblock to adopting a vegetarian lifestyle is often not knowing what to cook.

A good health food grocery store can help you get started. Most offer high quality and good-tasting products from meatless hot dogs (made from tofu) to chocolate chips made with no animal products (such as butterfat).

Up-to-date methods for old fashioned canning

Whether it's fresh picked from the garden, or bought at a farm market, there's nothing tastier than locally grown fruits and vegetables. You can't stop the temperatures from falling, but you can save some of the harvest for later by canning or freezing.

Home food preservation is again gaining popularity with consumers concerned about sugar, salt and additives. Canning is not a time to express your creativity, however. Set methods and procedures must be followed to ensure a safe product.

The first step is to buy a new canning book. Don't use a book that is older than five years. If you're using grandma's 100-year-old pickle recipes use the same ingredients, but update the preserving method and procedure.

Foods fall into two categories, high acid and low acid. High-acid foods are generally all fruits plus tomatoes, sauerkraut, and pickled vegetables. Acid in these food products guard against growth of bacteria, and can be safely canned using the hot water

bath method.

Use any kettle large enough so the jars are completely immersed and surrounded by water. The jars should be held off the bottom of the kettle to prevent breakage and so the heat can thoroughly penetrate the product.

Low acid foods are all vegetables, meats, poultry, seafoods, soups or combination foods. These must be processed in a pressure canner. Harmful elements of certain bacteria thrive in low acid and cannot be destroyed at boiling temperature of 212 degrees Fahrenheit. Low acid foods must be superheated to 240 degrees. Botulism is the deadly food poisoning caused by the clostridium botulinum. If the spore of the botulism is not killed by a high temperature, the risk of fatal food poisoning is very great.

Many people who do not want to deal with the pressure canner opt to freeze their produce. Freezing is probably the simplest and least time-consuming way to preserve foods.

Freezing retards growth of microorganisms, slows down enzyme activity, and

oxidation. However, there are some other food spollers to be aware of in freezing.

Formation of ice crystals can be prevented by drying food better before freezing, and freezing food quicker. Freezer burn is caused by improperly packed foods. Packaging is very important for good results.

Blanching vegetables before freezing stops the enzyme action, locks in color, flavor and nutrients. Blanching does not mean cooking, it means giving food a short heat treatment. It can be done in the microwave; just follow the directions in a microwave cookbook.

For top of the stove blanching, have a large kettle of water boiling, add the prepared vegetables, count the exact time of starting when the product hits the boiling water. When the time is up, quickly submerge the product into cold water to stop the boiling action. The quicker this can be done, the better product you'll have later.

Blanching times vary, depending on the amount you want to freeze. Follow the direc-

tions in your favorite cookbook.

There are certain vegetables that are best completely cooked before freezing. These are beets, pumpkin, winter squash and sweet potatoes. Cook as you would to use; then cool, package, and freeze.

Cooked or raw tomatoes can be frozen. Core tomatoes for freezing. Freeze raw tomatoes whole or cut in pieces. Pack into containers leaving one-inch head space. For cooked tomatoes, peel, cover, core and cook till tender. Place pan in cold water to cool. Pack into containers and allow one-inch head space, label, and freeze.

Fruits and flavoring products such as pepper, onions, horseradish, mint and other herbs do not need to be blanched before freezing. Cut into desired sizes, package air tight and freeze. Spread packages out in single layers to freeze quicker.

There is no need to can or freeze with salt or sugar except when making pickles or jams and jellies. The teaspoon of salt added to a jar of vegetables does not help preserve the pro-

duct, it only adds to the flavor. Sugar can also be deleted from the canning of fruits.

Cut fruit into desired size, put in a kettle, add a little water and heat slightly before filling the jars. The heat activates the natural sugars in the fruit so the product ends up tasting very natural, and very sweet.

Ascorbic acid or lemon juice added to the product before canning or freezing will help keep the light color.

The keys to safe food preservation are to follow up-to-date canning and freezing procedures exactly. Don't waste your time, money and energy having to throw out food that has spoiled. Just think how good that food will taste when the snow is piled up to the windowsill.

New recipes for cooking vegetarian

You'll also need to learn some new recipes. It's really not that hard. If you're a good experimenter in the kitchen, try using things like beans and tempeh (a bean by-product) where you once used meat.

Tofu (bean curd) is an excellent meat substitute, and comes in consistencies from soft to firm. The firm variety can be sliced and substituted for chicken breasts or veal cutlets in most recipes.

If tinkering with your old recipes doesn't work, you'll have to pick up on vegetarian cookbooks. Bookstores and health food stores stock plenty of good ones.

One of my personal favorites is called "The Gradual Vegetarian." Each chapter is another step toward vegetarianism, and is packed with appropriate recipes. The first chapter eliminates red meat from your diet, the next poultry, the next fish, the next dairy products, and so on. The final chapter is for total vegans.

You can stop at any chapter you like. Vegetarianism—and all healthy eating in general—is not just something you do. It's a lifestyle that requires you to make a choice and a change. No one makes choices or changes unless they're ready to.

So whenever you're ready, start taking the steps toward healthier cooking.

VEGETABLE PITA
This is a fun, flavorful lunch that even kids can enjoy.

4 pita bread
1 tablespoon plus 1 teaspoon safflower mayonnaise (Kraft cholesterol-free, fat-free mayo)
2 teaspoons Dijon mustard
16 slices fresh tomato
4 thinly sliced zucchini
8 lettuce leaves
Punch alfalfa sprouts

Slice each pita in half. Spread each pita pocket with mayo and mustard.

Layer with tomatoes, zucchini, lettuce and sprouts. Yield: 8 half-pita sandwiches.

HINT: If you're having a hard time opening the pita pocket without tearing it, microwave it on high for about 15 seconds.

SPANISH BULGUR
Talk about easy, just dump it all in the pot and cook it. Bulgur, by the way, can be found at ethnic and natural food grocery stores, or you can substitute your favorite rice (in which case you may need to add some water or tomato juice).

RICOTTA LASAGNE SWIRLS
This is an attractive dish which is much lighter than most Italian fare you may be used to.

8 cooked lasagne noodles
2 cups tomato sauce
2 cloves garlic, minced and sautéed
½ cup onions chopped and sautéed
¼ teaspoon basil
Salt and pepper to taste

Steam spinach until it is quite limp, but not mushy. You don't need any water to do this. Just put the washed spinach in a pan with a light-fitting lid and cook over low heat for about 7 minutes. Mix the spinach with the cheese, nutmeg, salt and pepper. Coat each noodle with 2 to 3 tablespoons of the mixture, spreading it along its entire length. Roll up the noodle and turn it on end so that you see the spinach and place in a shallow baking pan.

Mix all of the sauce ingredients together and pour over rolled-up noodles (or substitute your own favorite meatless tomato sauce recipe). Bake at 350 degrees for 20 minutes.

Variation: You may want to use part of the spinach in the filling and part in the sauce.

Makes 4 servings.

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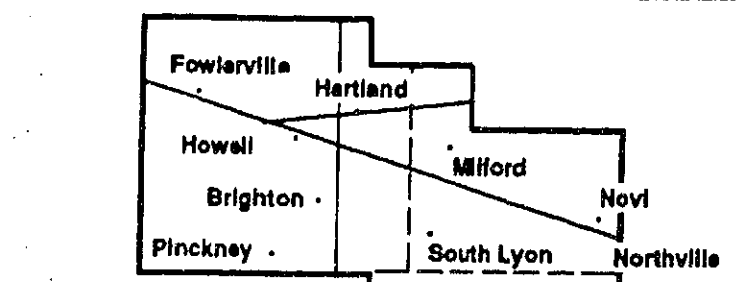

Before undertaking his role on *Law & Order*, Noth decided to get the facts about being a cop by observing detectives of New York City's 34th Precinct, which has the highest homicide rate of any precinct in Manhattan, N.Y.

Michigan State fans remember "the catch" all too well.

The Spartans, looking to knock off Notre Dame for only the fourth time in 21 years, took a 19-7 lead into the fourth quarter of last year's game against the top-ranked team in the country.

But, the Fighting Irish scored early in the quarter to cut the deficit to 19-14, then pulled off their second, last-minute comeback over a Michigan team in two weeks when quarterback Rick Mirer's long pass was deflected into the waiting hands of Adrian Jarrell at the Michigan State two-yard-line with 45 seconds showing on the clock.

Notre Dame scored seven seconds later, leaving the Spartan fans staring in stunned disbelief at a scoreboard that read Notre Dame, 20, Michigan State, 19.

Saturday, Sept. 21, the Spartans, who went on to finish the season with an 8-3 record that included a 17-16 Sun Bowl victory over Southern California, travel to South Bend, Ind., to play the Irish in a game to be televised live on NBC's *Notre Dame Saturday*.

Michigan State, led by all-American receiver Courtney Hawkins and running back Tico Duckett, is looking to overcome the "Luck of the Irish" and break a three-game losing streak at Notre Dame Stadium. The Irish should contend for a national title.

Strange bedfellows make TV magic in 'Eerie, Indiana'

Film's Joe Dante directs pilot

Each fall, there's at least one show that's the darling of the critics. Even in uninspiring TV seasons, one or two gems somehow find their way to the air. Such is the case with "Eerie, Indiana," a Sunday-night series debuting on NBC this season.

At first blush, the premise for "Eerie" seems too glib. An adolescent boy moves with his family from the comparative normalcy of New Jersey to a suspiciously perfect Indiana town that's half "Donna Reed," half Amityville. It's a cute piece of shtick for National Lampoon, but is it a series?

The show's mongrel bloodlines offer no guarantees, either. "Unsolved Mysteries" producers John Cosgrove and Teri Meurer, who have no apparent experience with comedy (unless you take your humor very black indeed), are executive producers of the show, which Meurer says means they read scripts and show up at tapings. More

to the point, "Eerie" is the co-creation of writer/producers Karl Schaefer and Jose Rivera. Three years ago, Schaefer produced the clinched "TV 101" (forerunner of the clinched "Hull High"), a mediocre effort at best. Playwright Rivera's resume is more promising and includes the provocatively titled "Each Day Dies With Sleep," a grant from the National Endowment for the Arts and a stint as playwright-in-residence at London's Royal Court Theatre. To this spark is added the wicked genius of director Joe Dante, who leavens "Eerie" in a limited role as creative consultant and occasional director.

As Marshall Teller, the series' main character, 15-year-old Omri Katz moves from the adult dream world of "Dallas" (where he played J.R. Ewing's son) to a fantasy land kids can appreciate. Marshall loves his cookie-cutter-generic family — a mom, dad and teenage sister — but can't help thinking they're a little naive about Eerie. After all, where else does the mailman carry a sidearm or Elvis Presley live on the paper route? Marshall and his younger friend Simon (Justine Shenkarow) are collecting evidence of the town's abnormalities (watch closely for props from Dante's films), which they keep locked in Marshall's attic. (For your own evidence that "Eerie, Indiana" is a hit, listen for kids to start quoting Simon's signature battle cry, "I was BORN for this!")

Whether in spite or because of its premise and pedigree, "Eerie, Indiana" delivered a strong, memorable pilot episode — a tough assignment that's rarely completed. Full of satire, sight gags and just the right amount of tension, the episode found Marshall's mom being wooed by one of Eerie's most enterprising

housewives, a widow with twin sons who supports herself by peddling Foreverware, her late husband's invention, to ladies in the neighborhood. With his reliably sloppy mom in a defrosting frenzy and about to mortgage the house to a woman in a pink shirtwaist dress and a flip, Marshall discovers the twins are trapped in a time warp that has kept them in the seventh grade for 30 years. Anyone with any sense of justice — or any experience with the seventh grade — would be sympathetic to their plight. And thereby hangs a tale that, if you missed it in the premiere episode, should be saved and savored in a repeat.

The second episode, airing Sunday, Sept. 22, involves another eerie, or rather, Eerie event. One of Marshall and Simon's chums is fitted for a retainer that picks up sound waves in the dog spectrum. From this, he learns Eerie's canines are plotting to take over the town... just as soon as they can figure out how to work a doorknob. Future shows include "The Jolly Rogers," in which Marshall meets seventh-generation pirates who've become landlocked in a Winnebago, and "The Lost Hour," in which Marshall rescues himself and a lost girl from a parallel Daylight Savings Time universe. Eventually, there must surely be an episode featuring the Eerie raven, who appears in the show's opening plucking out the eyeballs from postage stamps.

NBC deserves credit for putting "Eerie, Indiana" on the map this fall; the series is strong enough to overcome its ill-advised lead-in, "The Adventures of Mark and Brian," and entertaining for quick-witted viewers of all ages. It may even change the way you look at your own hometown.

The concern networks have is just one — money. ABC, CBS and NBC tend to cancel a program if it looks like it will slow them down in the ratings race and, therefore, lose their money. So far, Fox seems to be less apt to do that. They tend to keep shows on to see if they can build an audience. The other networks, while claiming to be trying to put "quality programs" on the air, seem to measure quality by how much money it makes. And who really knows what quality shows are? Look at PBS; they're constantly asking for money to put educational, documentaries and how-to shows on the air. In one day of viewing PBS, you can pick up a few Spanish phrases, hear what it was like to be in World War II, make dinner using a recipe you got from a cooking show, and serve it all on plates you made from wood while watching *New Yankee Workshop*.

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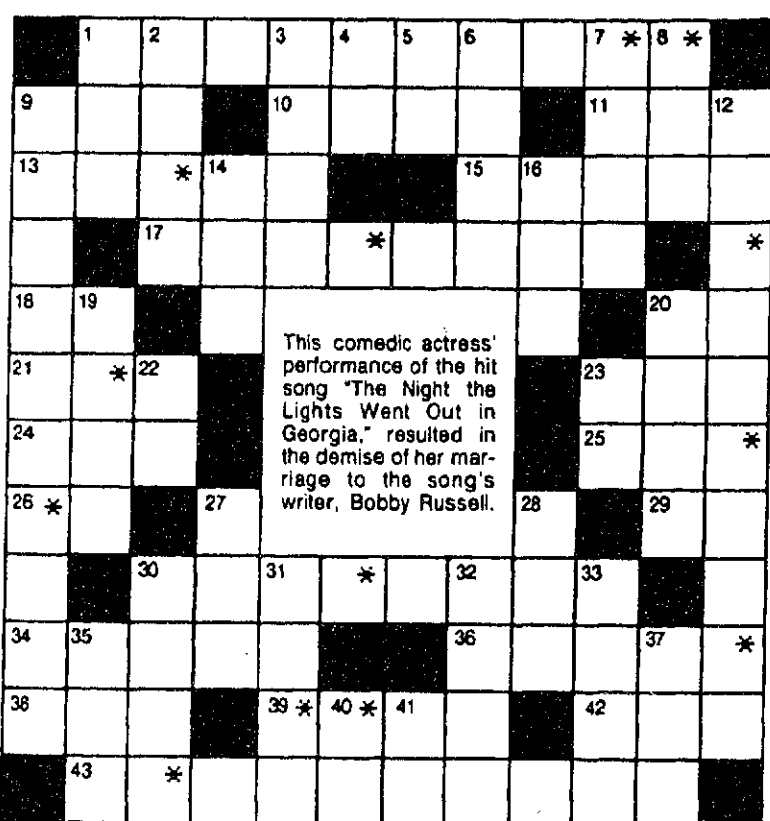

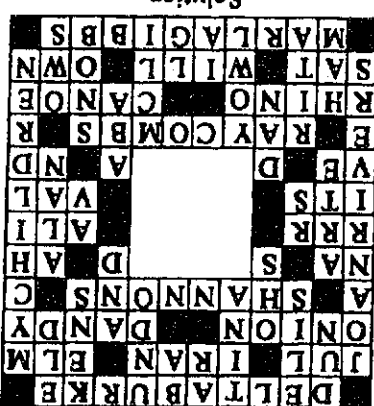

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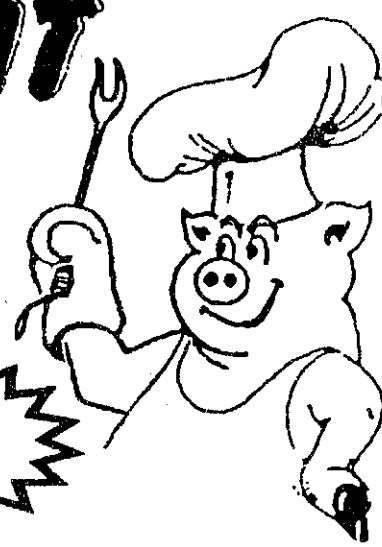
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
