### It's legal reform or insurance rate hikes

Auto owners in many suburbs face big insurance premium hikes Jan. 1 if state lawmakers continue to deadlock on lawsuit reform.

"The two chairs have taken rigid positions, at least in the tort area," said Sen. William Faust, D-Westland, a member of the Senate-House conference committee. Its negotiations broke down Thursday morning.

"Suburbanites will be subsidizing reductions for the city of Detroit," said Doug Cruce, president of the Michigan Insurance Federation and former state senator from Troy.

"The current law surisets Dec. 31. Then we'll go back to the old law before 1986," Cruce said in an interview as he shuttled back and forth between leaders' offices.

The result would be territorial

ratings: the rate in a zone next to Detroit could be no less than 10 percent below the Detroit rate; the rate in the next zone, 10 percent below that; and so on.

"The overall state variance (for any one company) can't be more than 45 percent," Cruce said.

Detroit has the highest rates, he said, "because in Detroit you're eight times more likely to have your car stolen. The costs of repairs and hospitals is 50 percent more."

Some suburbs actually would benefit from territorial ratings. But insurers broke down rates by legislative districts to show that Democratic lawmakers close to Detroit would see fairly big hikes.

"A lot of Democratic lawmakers are in favor of what we have now," said Cruce.

Here are AAA's (1) current annual rates and projections of (2) 1992 rates and (3) the increase for a 45-year-old male driving a 1990 Ford Taurus LX three miles to work:

Southern Nov! — \$677.80; \$713.40 — up \$35.60.

■ Salem Township — \$761.60; \$778.60 — up \$17. ■ Howell — \$731.80; \$757.60 —

up \$25.80.

■ Plymouth — \$706.80; \$713.40 — up \$6.60.

Those rates are for Michigan's largest auto insurer. Charts were unavailable for Allstate, State Farm and other companies but were said to show even larger hikes.

Faust said Sen. Paul Wartner, R-Portage, and Rep. Mary Brown, D-Kalamazoo, deadlocked on the question of tort reform.

"Mary didn't want to hear of it. Paul said you had to have it." Faust said. Brown and Wartner chair the committees handling insurance legislation in their respective chambers.

Tort questions include: a cap on "pain and suffering" damages in lawsuits; caps on attorney fees in "contingency" cases; liability limitations for emergency room personnel; and consumer-chosen limits on coverage, among others.



### Superintendent selection on hold

Anyone who expected to learn on Saturday the identity of Novi's new superintendent was in for a suprise.

A meeting to select the new superintendent was scheduled for Saturday at noon.

But the school board decided to allow both candidates the opportunity to review the proposed contract before moving on in the selection process, said school board Trustee Raymond Byers.

The final selection meeting was cancelled and has not been rescheduled, Byers said.

Board President Stephen Hitchcock, who is an attorney, helped rewrite the superintendent's

ontract.

The new contract is quite a bit different from

former Superintendent Robert Piwko's contract,

Byers said.

"We're just trying to polish the new language (in the contract)," he said.

Emmett Lippe and Jon Reynolds are the two finalists.

Lippe has been superintendent in the Williamston school district since 1976.
Reynolds has worked as superintendent in Waverly schools since 1983. The Waverly school

district is on the west side of Lansing in Delta Township.

The two candidates were selected from a field of 87 applicants.

Both Lippe and Reynolds received high praise from people interviewed last week who have worked with them in their current school district

Lippe was said to be a hard worker who gets

along well with others.

Reynolds, who was also well regarded by his colleagues, was a finalist in the 1980 search for a superintendent that ended with the board hiring

Piwko.

Board Vice President Robert Schram said Reynolds was not in the top two candidates 11 years ago. But Schram added that Reynolds has grown as a superintendent.

"I could see either man as superintendent," Schram said.

### DNR ponders two views of M-5 wetland

In February, the Michigan Department of Natural Resources (DNR) is expected to rule on the controversial plan to replace near Algonac most of the 46 acres of wetlands which fall in the path of the Haggerty Connector.

As part of the wetlands permit process, the DNR held a public hearing Dec. 12 in a Farmington Hills public library.

Officially, Farmington Hills backs the Michigan Department of Transportation's (MDOT) proposal. That city will only host a part of the Twelve Mile Road Interchange ramp that would link M-5 with the freeway system.

"Our city council on numerous occasions endorsed this project. The project is necessary for the good of the community. The good of the metropolitan area," said Thomas Biasell, Director of Public Services for the City of Farmington Hills.

"It's our belief the Michigan Department of Transportation has done everything that is possible to mitigate here. The fact that approximately 30 acres will have to mitigated off-site is an intention in our mind to improve the quality of wetlands in the State of Michigan."

The City of Novi—which as the

The City of Novi — which as the home of the majority of the boule-vard stands to lose the most marshlands — is on record as opposing the plan, as is the East Michigan Environmental Action Council (EMEAC), the Detroit Audubon Society and Concerned Citizens For West Bloomfield. Novi's engineers have found local sites which they suggest might be suitable for the mitigation.

"It is our belief mitigating wetlands lost in Novi in St. Clair County is inappropriate when potential wetlands mitigation sites exist within and around Novi," Anthony Nowicki, Novi's director of public services, said.

So were split the 16 speakers who addressed the DNR Thursday night. While seven M-5 supporters said the boulevard would provide much-needed traffic relief, arguments presented by nine opponents to the plan included a questioning of the wisdom of spending \$78 million on the project when the homeless walk the streets of Detroit and social services are facing drastic cutbacks. (See related story.)

The DNR will examine the issues raised, said Barry Horney, district supervisor of the land and water management staff in Livonia — especially the suggestion that an alternate route skirting the sensitive wetlands could have been chosen.

"These hearings are basically to hear facts. Anything but facts doesn't have any bearing." Horney said.

"A lot of the information was extraneous to the wellands issue. The valid questions will be looked into, hard."

The decision will be based on how well the mitigation matches the requirements of two state laws regulating wetlands, the Inland Lakes and Streams Act and the Gomaere Anderson Act, Horney said.

Opponents to the plan questioned if the DNR could be objective when the department owns the St. Clair County land which could be the beneficiary of the project.

# Pop bomb leaves police guessing

Was it someone playing with chemicals? Or was it something

Novi Police are attempting to identify a liquid substance found in the remains of a 16-ounce Mountain Dew bottle that exploded on the front porch of a home on Serenity.

Police said the homeowner reported that he heard a loud bang shortly after 10:30 p.m. Dec. 7 and searched all over his residence in an attempt to locate its source.

Finally, police said, he found the damaged plastic bottle on his front porch. The bottle appeared to have been ripped apart by the explosion. Police found the unidentified fluid inside the bottle.

In addition, police discovered two small, ball-shaped pieces of aluminum foil. The foil, which appeared to have been darkened by the explosion, was about two feet away from the bottle.

Novi Police Chief Doug Shaeffer said he did not know what the discovery meant.

Although the Mountain Dew bottle exploded, police said there were no visible scorch marks on the porch of the residence. In addition, they reported the bottle appeared to have been placed on the porch, and not tossed from a distance.

Neither the homeowner nor his 15-year-old daughter had any idea who might have left the device on their porch.





Rick Byrne Let me tell you about the first and last time I drove drunk. All in all, the outcome was pretty tame, but it scared me enough that I can say I'll never drive if I've been

I was a sophomore in college. Forget for a minute that I wasn't of legal drinking age in Michigan. I was still listed as a full-time resident of New York where the drinking age was 18, so I had this cockeyed notion

that local laws didn't apply to me. There was a Friday afternoon happy hour in someone's room in my dorm. It was the weekend of the Michigan-Michigan State football game, so everyone was getting an

early start on their attitude adjustment. I'd knocked back about three or four healthy-sized concoctions in under an hour when Jill came to me asking if I would drive her to the bus station to pick up her friend from MSU. With my resistance at a low ebb and Jill smiling

sweetly, the word "no" vanished from my vocabulary." I drove across campus, and through downtown Ann Arbor, picked up Jill's friend, and returned them both to the dorm safely. Parking being at a premium around U-M dorms, I considered myself lucky to find two open spaces right in front of the building. So lucky, in fact, that I parked in both of them.

I'm not telling anyone to turn down a drink this holiday season (I'm a journalist, remember). If you do drink, just don't turn down any offers of a ride home. Accept my wishes for a safe and happy holiday.





"If you move the wetlands, you're losing groundwater recharge for people who have wells. It's a unique ecosystem," he said.

But John Marshall of Commerce Township reinforced Whitlock's point that traffic in the area is out-of-control.

"I know subdivisions, condominiums and apartments that have taken up far more wetlands than this road's going to take up. . . I-275 (extension) was shot down by a small vocal group. We've done some surveys ourselves. The residents that are out there say we need some relief," Marshall told the DNR.

Novi resident Jim Bundoff's Twelve Mile Road property will be in the middle of the M-5 cloverleaf. He's now in court with MDOT over the property condemnation. Bundoff said he supported the

Also lining up with the Summit Drive residents are the East Michigan Environmental Action Council, the Detroit Audubon Society and Concerned Citizens of West Bloomfield. Representatives of these groups argue that more far-reaching issues are at stake.

Loran McEwen, board member of Concerned Citizens of West Bloomfield, says M-5 will lead to more urban sprawl and the further deterioration of the metro area's core cities.

"This project has taken on a life of its own. As the economy in the state and the nation steadily worsen, decision makers at both levels appear to be proceeding with this project, which will drain away more than \$78 million in tax dollars with

absolutely no thought to other priorities for this money," she said.

McEwen suggested as an alternative that the present Haggerty Road be upgraded and the remaining tax dollars be shifted to aid the homeless, hungry and sick Michigan residents.

Detroit Audobon Society Executive Director Jack Smiley called the project "reckless development.

"It is not in the public interest to construct the road. The no-build alternative is the best alternative, followed by a possible widening of Haggerty Road," he said.

The people in the urban center are homeless and have Third World living conditions. It is foolish to even consider any expansion of a highway system when we can't take care of what we have. Reasonable people realize this will lead to future road





# Alsace region

Alsace is the most beautiful wine region in France. Almost isolated, Alsace is situated between the Vosges Mountains on the west and the Rhine river on the east.

The best-kept secret in wine is the dry, fruity. long-lived white wines of Alsace. They accompany the great cuisine of 36 Michelin-starred restaurants in Alsace - a greater number than anywhere else in Europe

Recently, we discussed Alsace wine with Etienne Hugel, whose family has made wine continuously

"We have produced Alsace wines in Europe's favorite battlefield for over 350 years," said Hugel. "Imagine our task. Each time the Alsace region exchanged its relationship with Germany and France, we had to start over.

"As a consequence of having our boundaries changed so often, the wines of Alsace lost their identity. We sell dry, French wines in a Germanstyle bottle made from grapes that sometimes sound French (pinot blanc) and sometimes sound German (gewurztraminer)."

Most French wine regions use two or three grape varieties planted on a single soil type. Alsace has seven wine grape varieties (sylvaner, riesling, pinot gris, gewurztraminer, pinot blanc, pinot noir, and muscat d'Alsace) planted on a patchwork of granite, sand, clay and chalk soils that allows each variety to be appropriately matched by type.

Hugel emphasizes that to appreciate Alsace wines, the consumer must understand the grape varieties, the unique northern climate and the region's extended growing season.

"The best introduction to Alsace wines is pinot blanc," said Hugel. "It is versatile and affordable, great with food and is styled like a chardonnay without being too aromatic. Pinot gris is more complex - a step up. This wine shows exuberant fruit, not wood. Gewurztraminer has lively spice aromas and flavors that complement smoked salmon and oriental cuisines. Ultimately, people the el riesing the king of Alexce varietals.

Hugel insists that the key to producing fresh, balanced Alsace wines is the long, cool growing season. Grapes can hang on the vine until biological maturity is attained. This slow ripening explains how Alsace wines maintain crisp acidity. retain fresh fruit and achieve the body of world-

The wines of Hugel are bottled by increasing quality and labeled "Hugel," "Cuvee Tradition" and "Jubilee." The day-to-day process of vinification and maturation is undertaken entirely by family members. Contrary to popular opinion, the aging potential of the great Alsace white wines is limited only by the lifespan of the cork.

#### WINE SELECTIONS OF THE WEEK

The Alsace wines of Hugel are served in every Michelin three-star restaurant in Germany, Italy and France. That is just about the best recommendation a wine producer can have. The 1989 Pinot Blanc "Cuvee Les Amour" Hugel (\$15) shows lively fresh fruit qualities with an attractive steeliness. The 1988 Tokay Pinot Gris "Cuvee Tradition" Hugel (\$22) boasts a touch of spice in the nose and a rich palate impression backed by solid fruit. It was an excellent accompaniment to Pike Quenelles with Craylish Sauce served at the Golden Mushroom. The 1989 Gewurztraminer, Hugel (\$20) has typical aromas of spice and lychee fruit complemented by good balance and body. This Alsace wine is particularly adaptable to oriental cuisines.

They are known for their fine line of chef's uniforms, made from the finest Egyptian cotton. They fit like a glove. A frog could pass for a prince in one.

The cost? \$125 for the low-end jacket. I certainly wouldn't cook in one of these; they are for dress-up. His son, Eric, the main cook, wants a professional

Restaurants are getting into the act too. Les Auters in Royal Oak features Master Chef Jeff Gabriel as its instuctor. Kathie just finished one and gives Jeff an A-

In January I will begin teaching a few classes that will feature hands-on experience in a professional kitchen. The classes will be limited to 10 so that individual attention can be given. Menus are designed according to the wishes of the students. Pupils then prepare a five-course meal and invite "company" to dinner.

### Florida fish are for those with a 'sweet' tooth

I have spoken of Foley's in Boston, the wonderful fish house, on several occasions. It is so much fun to order from them. I feel like a kid in a toy store.

Well, there is now another toy store to go to. Mr. Seafood, located in sunny Pompano, Fla., has been added to our order sheet. Peter Jarvis calls each Monday with his list of

At first, I would just order the more "usual" or "recognizable" varieties, because if people are not familiar with a species the chance of them trying it are fairly nil. I have found this to be so true with fish. Americans still eat less fish than any other flesh protein.

Many of us remember the obligatory Friday night fish dinners that usually consisted of fried fish and chips of frozen cod fillets soaked in milk to rid them of their fishy smell. For the last several weeks we have offered fresh grouper, mahi mahi, and snapper. Red snapper is generally acknowledged as the most favored and is difficult to buy due to the "blackened" phase that we experienced several years ago. Yellowtail snapper is becoming popular now.

Snappers are so named because they shut their mouths with an energetic snap. The flesh is firm and white. When possible it is best to purchase the fish whole. The skin is a beautiful red which intensifies with cooking. Whole fish may be broiled, baked, grilled or steamed.

The flesh of the grouper closely resembles snapper. Although their weight ranges from two pounds to hundreds of pounds, most of the commercial catch is in the fifty-pound area. The larger the grouper, the coarser the

Anyone who has ever spent time in Florida has eaten grouper. A grouper sandwich is the state's mainstay. Grouper is mild in taste so it lends itself to many presentations. We prefer to cook it Italian style, dipped in tosca batter, quickly sauteed then finished in the oven. Accompanied with homemade cheese tortellini and a fresh tomato basil sauce it is

Mahi mahi is growing in popularity. Mahi, or dolphin fish, is not related to the true dolphin which is a mammal and a protected species. It is also referred to as dorado. Mahi,

when cooked properly, has pink flesh which is mild and sweet. Our version was simply grilled, served with basmati rice and garnished with Florida fruit - oranges and

Two simple but elegant sauces finish the plate, a beurre blanc (white butter sauce) and beurre rouge (red butter sauce). The presentation was visually outstanding and the mahi delectible.

I hesitated to order pompano because the price is much more than what I like to commit to. The more my cost, the higher the selling price. But I couldn't resist. The worst that could happen is that I'd be forced to eat it myself. No such luck. We sold out the first night. Pompano is noted for its rich sweeet flavor. Sumptuous is more the word. What a

We cooked it in a traditional manner, en papillote or baked in a parchment case. The case keeps the moisture in and also allows the addition of vegetables and herbs to steam along with it. Our version included Julienne leeks, carrots and mushrooms. Just a touch of white wine was added along with fresh chopped herbs. When the fish was served the packet was opened at the table and all those magnificent aromas rushed out. Heavenly.

Stone crab claws never made it to the specials board. Our regulars know that I bring them in every 10 days or so and place their orders ahead of time. Even though I add on an extra they never seem to stay around for more than a few hours.

I'm sorry to keep using the word "sweet" to describe the above Florida fish but there is no other way to convey what my taste buds remember. As a testimonial I saw Michelle, who "hates" fish, take second bites during our show and tell session. We are expecting another shipment from Peter this week.

As a final note I like to relay a "restaurant" story. I took Tuesday off. It was my second day off since we opened. Laura, my sous chef, takes over the expediting position at night. Joe. a former student at Schoolcraft and now a valued employee, runs the floor. Joe was so good in the dining room class that he took my spot when I went to Singapore. Pat, my day

sous chef, handles the lunch. The place is in good hands. Well, anyway, I had to stop in just for a

moment to wish an employee good luck. It all started three weeks ago. A couple of the waitstaff wanted to play Secret Santa. As it was explained to me everyone's name goes into a bag and each person pulls a name. You are then to buy your pick a gift. There is a \$10

How creative can you be with \$10? There was some moaning and groaning and then someone had a great idea. A waitress had fust been diagnosed with breast cancer. We all waited anxiously for the verdict and when the test came back positive we felt devastated. In addition to the illness she was faced ewith a month off work and no insurance.

Why not give our secret santa money to her? We did on Tuesday. It was very emotional. When she started to cry so did most of us. I am very proud of each and every one of my staff for the wonderful thing you did. You're to be commended for your kindness and generosity. Thank you.

### Get the lead out at your table

If one took to heart all the alerts reported in the papers, we'd give up eating and drinking. Even jogging at times seems suspect. Often confusion sets in, so we do nothing. That's silly. Warnings are to

be taken seriously, but judiciously.

There is no need to panic. However,

at times, just by altering our habits a little we can reduce risk. Beyond just the dishes from which we eat, lead also can be a problem in the glasses from which we drink. Even the wine that is decanted gives some people concern.

In the late 19th century lead was added to crystal ware to produce brilliant glass of a high density and durability. Ever since, lead crystal has been the ultimate in glassware. Bad news came earlier this year from Lancet, the esteemed British medical journal. Lancet printed a report on studies conducted by two Columbia University physicians that showed the correlation between alconol in crystal decanters and elevated

levels of lead of the liquid inside. How often have you seen episodes sophisticated movies where the hero pours after-dinner brandy from a handsome crystal decanter that has been sitting on the sideboard? Since a little bit of brandy goes a long way, that decanter can sit on the sideboard for many a month. Actually, that brandy can be pretty poisonous stuff, depending on how long it remained in the decanter.

It's very easy to avoid any contamination from the lead. And it's proper service. besides. Have you ever watched a welltrained wine steward open a bottle of wine? Then you noticed that after removing the foil cap he wiped the top of the bottle with a napkin. Then again, once the cork has been pulled out, he wiped the lip of the bottle, reaching inside a bit.
